ANNUAL MEETING, 1894.

The annual meeting of the Halifax Dispensary was held Monday afternoon, Jany. 8th, at 4 o'clock, and was fairly well attended. W. C. Silver, President, occupied the chair.

Following is the director's report, which was read and adopted:

DIRECTORS' REPORT.

One of the duties of the Directors of the Dispensary is to present to its supporters and friends an annual statement of its doings, progress and position—financial and otherwise—in order to show what has been accomplished and what is desired. The annexed reports of the active medical staff in conjunction with this, and the abstract of the Treasurer, will afford such information as will prove the value of the institution in this community, and the necessity of its sustentation and extension.

STEADY WORK AND PROGRESS.

It affords the Board much pleasure to state that the Dispensary. as hitherto, has done a great and good work among the sick poor in all parts of the city and in Dartmouth, as well as for casual patients, such as sailors, indians and others applying for relief without ability to pay a doctor. Its "work goes bravely on" day after day, alleviating pain, restoring health and assisting distress wherever needed. That the doctors perform their duties faithfully and well is shown in the table of statistics and by the absence of any legitimate complaints of neglect or dereliction of any kind. Those practical results which fulfil the design and proclaim the benefits of this noble charity accrue so noiselessly that judging from the lack of enquiries and interest therein (except on the part of the numerous beneficiaries treated at the building on South Brunswick street and elsewhere) the institution is in danger of having its usefulness curtailed through insufficient support. The Board endeaver to obviate the latter disaster by appeals to all the various church congregations in the city and vicinity on a "Dispensary Sunday" in every year, and by personal canvass among our citizens; and the medical staff publish monthly synopses of the work done by them. As will be seen in their annual summary the number of

helped to do s consultations was 5,945 and of visits north, south and central 5,285. Prescriptions made up, 12,333, and teeth extracted, 579, all of which would seem to be a satisfactory equivalent for the contributions that the public bestow.

INCREASING WORK DEMANDS MORE FUNDS.

The Treasurer's abstracts, however, from year to year do not exhibit a corresponding ratio of supplies to demands ever increasing as the population of the city grows greater. The Divine blessing has so far rested upon this work, and the building and the essentials for carrying out the objects of the Dispensary being unincumbered, the Board rely upon the voluntary and liberal contributions of the public to enable them to meet all expenses and if possible to create a surplus. Special donations, an occasional legacy, or the creation of an endowment fund would be most acceptable. Present needs may be supplied, but suppose the cholera or some equally dreaded epidemic should visit Halifax, what then?

The Directors close their report with thanks to all who have helped to make the Dispensary a success in the past and intend to do so in future.

REPORTS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF.

Dr. Murray read the annual report of the Medical Staff, 1893.

The above is a synopsis of the work done by the Dispensary staff during the year just ended, and the amount of work done has been well up to the average of past years, in spite of the fact, that the city has been unusually free from epidemic and other disease. Diptheria which has been so prevalent during the past few years has, owing no doubt to the care exercised by the sanitary authorities, during the last few months been entirely absent from the practice of the Dispensary.

It has from time to time come to the notice of the staff that persons receiving the benefits of the institution are not such as should be the recipients of medical charity. Doubtless many more such cases pass unnoticed, no means being at present available for ensuring the worthiness of applicants. The staff have had this matter frequently under discussion and would suggest that all applicants should be provided with a form of certificate to be filled in by some responsible party having a knowledge of their circumstances. In consequence of the wide spread abuse of medical charities it has been found necessary to introduce this system in many institutions of a similar character on both sides of the Atlantic. Another abuse is the frequency with which persons well able to attend at the Dispensary request the services of the visiting physicians. This also might be remedied by the form of certificate

The staff regret the departure of Dr. Morrow whose long and valuable work in connection with the institution was highly appreciated and with whom they always had most cordial relations. They are happy to be assured of his success in his new home.

The severe illness of Dr. Crawford deprived us for some months of his services but the duties were efficiently performed by other members of the staff. We are glad to welcome him back.

The staff desire to acknowledge the obliging and attentive manner in which Mr. Lugrin has at all times met their wishes and the care and skill which he has shown in the performance of his responsible duties.

The staff desire to thank the directors for their continued confidence as evinced by their reappointment for the coming year.

In connection with the Indoor medical department Dr. Anderson would bring to the notice of the directors that the presence of the dental chair in the medical room is a source of annoyance to nervous and timid patients and interferes greatly with the work of that the most busy department.

In connection with the Surgical department Dr. Finn reports an unusual prevalence of skin diseases and a decrease in the amount of venereal diseases.

In the Women and Childrens department, Dr. Ternan reports that he refused to attend several applicants on account of their ability to pay.

The staff cannot close this report without bringing the attention of the Directors to the efficient manner in which the Janitress has performed her duties, the various departments have been kept scrupulously clean, and the heating of the building has been also satisfactory.

The Secretary, (Dr. Dodge being unable to attend) read the report of the Eye and Ear Department, 1893 as follows:

EYE AND EAR DEPARTMENT.

The attendance in the Eye and Ear Department for the year 189°, has been greate: than in any previous year—194 in all. Besides these, several were refused as having no claim for treatment at the Dispensary.

With the exception of children, the patients generally come direct from their work to the Dispensary, their clothes and hands are often soiled from the character of the work in which they have been engaged. All mingle together on the same benches as there can be no social or class distinctions. And from a professional stand point all are entitled to the same consideration. In the case of a visit from one who had "seen better days" I advised that the hospital was a preferable plea for treatment especially as an operation was necessary. To my surprise her friends objected to the Now, as a rule, the patients at the Hospital are of a better class than at the Dispensary, the beds and bedding are kept clean and tidy, the room and its appointments are similarly In the female eye wards there are but 7 beds; and if desired any patient can be screened off from the rest. trained nurses have charge of them and the house physician or surgeon is on the alert if any thing goes wrong, Our ordinary private patients are not as well looked after as the Hospital patients. So well known is this fact that the Hospital is taken advantage of in too many cases by persons who have no claim to its benefits. I have no hesitation in saying that if I were obliged to have an important operation performed I would prefer to have it done at the Hospital than at my own home.

From having been connected with the Dispensary for many years, I believe I can safely say that never at any time since it was founded has the work been carried on more thoroughly, or more harmoniously than at the present time.
