



Patriotic Work Of Great Value

Inventory of Scientific and Industrial Resources Now Being Made

in New Brunswick

The work that is now being carried on in New Brunswick by local members of the nadian Society of Civil Engineers and at through the Dominion by the same society and other associations will tend to help manufacturers in different lines of production, and is certainly deserving of a great deal of commendation; its importance is second to none except the winning of the war.

The work was initiated last November by a committee of the Privy Council, who appointed an "Advisory Council," composed of eleven members representing composed of eleven members representing the scientific, technical and industrial interests of Canada. After giving the subject a great deal of consideration this advisory council called on the several associations who could assist to work out ons who could assist to work out the details. Representatives were appointed to take charge of this work by the Canadian Manufacturers' Associa-

the Canadian Manufacturers Association, The Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, The Canadian Mining Institute, The Society of Chemical Industry and the joint committee of Technical Organizations of Toronto.

These societies the issued a call for the committee of the committee volunteers from their membership for whatever work might be required. At whatever work might be required. At present their work consists in taking a census or inventory of all Canadian industries, establish their output of products and by-products, the amount of machinery employed, whether scientifically carried on, the raw material employed, whether schedules and difficulty of the ed, where obtained, and difficulty of ob-taining the raw material, etc., the differ-

taining the raw material, etc., the different industries are also requested to mention in what way the production could be increased, and they are asked what could be done to improve scientifically the methods adopted.

Chemical and physical laboratories are also to concur in this work. A questionnaire of twenty-two questions has been prepared to be submitted to managers and owners of all industries, who will, no doubt, be pleased to give full will, no doubt, be pleased to give full consideration to the importance of giv-ing complete answers to all the questions

confidential although nothing of an indiscreet nature is asked.

It must be acknowledged that it is due to research of this nature that the German industries have been brought to such a high grade of efficiency. The United States have also adopted a simillar system and if Canada is to maintain and improve the position she has com-mercially created for herself it is high time that science and industry united to
