A Silver Badge for War Service

Canadians Eligible for Decoration Granted to Officers and Men of Imperial Forces Retired for Age, Wounds or Sickness

The secretary of the British war office has announced amended instructions in regard to the Silver Badge which will be granted to officers and others of the imperial military forces who, having served since August 4, 1914, had, on account of old age or physical infirmity, arising from wounds or sickness caused by military service, in the case of officers, retired, or relinquished their commissions, in the case of men who have been discharged from the army, in the case of the others mentioned below, relinquished their military employment.

Under amended conditions any of the invalids who may have retired, relinquished their commissions or military employment, or have been discharged from the army on account of old age, wounds or sickness or have been discharged from the army since August 4, 1914, under paragraph 892 (xxi) King's Regulations and are ineligible for any further military service on account of wounds, sickness or age, may be granted the badge, provided that the claims are approved by the army council.

A revised leaflet containing full instructions as to whom application should be made is available at all British post-offices.

In Canada As regards the forces of Canada and Newfoundland, applicants who have served with these forces should, if residing in the United Kingdom, make application as follows:

Canada—The officer in charge of records, Canadian Expeditionary Force, Green Arbor House, Holborn Viaduct, London, W.C.

Newfoundland—The officer in charge of the pay and record office, 88 Victoria Street, London, S.W.

India, Australia, New Zealand and Union of South Africa as designated.

If not resident in the United Kingdom, the applicant should apply to the military authorities in the dominion concerned.

BARON DE REUTER A HERO IN THE RANKS

The late Baron Hubert Julius de Reuter, who resigned a commission as lieutenant to enter the ranks of the Black Watch Regiment, so that he might the sooner go to the front, died as a hero.

The colonel of the regiment has made the following statement:

He would have gained a very high decoration had he lived. He was with his platoon in the attack, and through his courage and resource they captured 97 Germans. The whole of the platoon went over the first line of German trenches into the second. De Reuter went down a twenty-foot dug-out, shouted out in German, asking if any men were there. No answer; so he threw two bombs round the corner and came up two steps until they exploded. He then again shouted: "Anybody there?" and again threw two bombs.

He then found that some Germans had been passed over in the first line and were shooting from behind and from the right rear, so he put the German officer up on the parapet, threatening him with his bayonet, and made him order the men to surrender. Sixty-two men came over.

He then carried three badly wounded men into cover under heavy machine gun fire, and went back over "No Man's Land" for the stretcher-bearers. He was hit on the way back, and was buried the next day. By his gallant conduct and daring example this platoon (one sergeant and twenty men) captured one officer and ninety-seven men.

THE SYNOD MEETING YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

Following Bishop Richardson's charge, which was delivered to the forty-eighth session of the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton, yesterday afternoon, in Trinity church, the synod took up the actual business of the session. It received and adopted the reports of the standing committee of the synod, of the executive committee of the board of missions, and of the report of the committee on the work of the committee, and passed the schedule of grants for 1917.

The evening was devoted to the regular service of the session, held in the church with Bishop Courtenay of New York as the speaker. The session is being attended by sixty members of the clergy and about forty laymen, and will continue until Thursday evening, and possibly Friday morning.

The standing committee reported on its meetings held during the year, and of the communications that had been received and discussed. The report of the executive committee, much longer, was also discussed and passed in its entirety. The report of the sub-committee of the executive came in for a good share of the discussion, and dealt with simplification of the work of the committees. The report of the board of missions touching on resignations, appointments, vacant parishes, divinity students, grants for parsonages, special grants and bequests was considered at some length, and finally passed.

The schedule of grants passed for 1917 showed a total of \$15,276 as contributed from the missions for stipends, and \$18,690 as grants from diocesan mission fund, making the total of stipends, including clerical income or invested funds, \$33,966.

The synod did not pass the report of the committee on the work of committees with the meetings of the more important committees, which they suggested should be held semi-annually instead of annually was omitted, and the last two sections of the report were held over for further consideration. At the conclusion of this business, the synod adjourned until 11 o'clock this morning.

Previous to the evening service the standing committee took up the bishop's charge, but did not have an opportunity to go into it very fully, and adjourned to take up further consideration and discussion this morning.

The wedding of the Rev. R. W. Hopkins, pastor of the Baptist church at Hatfield's Point, Kings county, and Miss Ida May Barton, of Hatfield's Point, took place on February 5. The ceremony was performed by Rev. D. Price, of Chipman.

British Advance a Thousand Yards

Under instructions from headquarters, Ottawa, all buglers and drummers who are under seventeen years of age and who have enlisted in the C. E. F. are to be immediately discharged. Those over seventeen years of age, if physically well developed, may be retained, on the assumption that they will have attained the age of eighteen years by the time they arrive in England, or shortly after. In future no boys under the age of sixteen years are to be enlisted in the C.E.F.

Under the above action is necessary in view of the fact that all minors, on arrival in England are immediately returned to Canada as being under age. Commanding officers will be held personally responsible for the retention or enlistment of soldiers related to above.

Bruges harbor was attacked by naval airplanes on February 2. Many heavy bombs were dropped on torpedo craft in the harbor, and buildings in the dock were set on fire. All pilots and machines returned.

A Berlin report says that a German naval seaplane, on February 3, bombed the harbor works at Dunkirk, causing a fire in the sheds.

The British advanced 1,000 yards on the Somme yesterday and in an air fight ten German machines were driven down in a damaged condition.

Important progress was made in clearing the Tigris bank at Kut-Al-Amara.

WHERE BORDEN FAILED.

In parliament yesterday Mr. E. M. MacDonald read a letter from a Canadian colonel who has been overseas since 1914. In that letter the colonel said: "If the people of Canada knew what goes on here in the waste of public money the creation of jobs for disgruntled politicians and job pullers, it would make very interesting reading for the Canadian people, but our mouths are closed so long as we wear uniforms. In the opinion of many officers here the life blood of Canada is being exploited to glorify the Tory party, and I believe that opinion is true."

One of the saddest and most humiliating facts about the war, from the standpoint of Canada, has been the failure of the government to rise above partisanship. Everybody knows that the patronage committee was never more necessary than it has been since the war began. Had there been broad-gauge leadership at Ottawa in 1914, Sir Robert Borden would have abolished the patronage committee and called to his aid the best country had to give, regardless of political affiliations. He failed to do so, and as a result the country is today far short of having done what he declared it would do. There will be a long score to settle when the war is over.

THE TWO PARTIES.

The Times comments to its readers the speech of Mr. E. S. Carter, delivered at Norton last evening, and a report of which appears in this issue. Mr. Carter not only presents the case against the government, speaking from the record and from reports of royal commissions, but he explains the opposition policy in relation to the crown lands, the roads and prohibition, in a manner that is clear and unequivocal. Mr. Carter makes it clear that the opposition does not propose to assume or be saddled with responsibility for any of the acts of a government which was dealt with by the people in 1908. The issue before the people is the record of the government since 1908, and especially since 1910, and whether the people should endorse the acts of that government, or place in power men pledged to reform the whole administration of public affairs. Much water has flowed under the bridges since 1908. Starling revelations that shocked and shamed the province have proved to the people that whatever may have been the sins of any former government they were but mild faults in comparison with the greed and plunder of the last five or six years. The opposition stand pledged to replace the carnival of graft by honest government. If they should fail, they in turn should be condemned, but the opportunity should at least be given the opportunity to make good. That opportunity was given to the men who are now seeking a new lease of power, and we all know their record. They deserve no support, and to return them to power would be a confession that there is more partisanship than patriotism, and more regard for graft than for honesty in the province of New Brunswick.

AFTER PROHIBITION—WHAT?

One of the strongest reasons for social service organization in St. John is the fact that the saloons are to be closed the first of May. Not only should a public sentiment be aroused that will ensure a strict enforcement of the law, but there is the question of what is to take the place of the saloons in the life of a great number of men. The people cannot too soon take this whole question into consideration. They are moving rapidly toward a condition of affairs which will radically effect the daily lives of enough people to keep all the existing saloons in the city in a flourishing condition. The saloons will go, but their patrons will remain, with a good deal of leisure time to spend in some form of recreation or amusement. They will represent a great deal of energy which might be diverted to good uses if the proper appeal were made in a proper manner. It goes without saying that if the men of drinking habits decided to devote their spare time to more useful activity, and backed it up with even a fraction of the amount of money spent annually for liquor, they would do a great deal toward making St. John a cleaner and better city. Those who are now interested in social service work, and all who labor for better living conditions, should consider seriously the question of making prohibition a far greater boon to St. John than would result from the mere abandonment of the drinking habit. What people do when they have nothing in particular to do determines very largely the state of society. The period immediately following the adoption of prohibition in St. John will be a testing time, offering opportunity for a great development of community welfare-work.

STATE KINDERGARTENS

A bill to establish the kindergarten as a part of the public school system in Maine is to be introduced at the present session of the state legislature. An August letter says: "Under direction of the Bureau of Education at Washington, and the National Kindergarten Association of New York, decided impetus has been given to the kindergarten propaganda in recent years. The establishment and maintenance of kindergartens by law is now required or permitted in all states except one and reports from various sections of the country afford ample evidence of measures taken to co-ordinate the work of the kindergarten and primary school. The movement to give legal status to kindergarten education in Maine originated with the Bangor Federation of Women's Clubs. Keenly alive to the advantage of kindergarten training for the 32,800 children in the state in the formative period of life—from four to six years—that organization invited the Maine Federation of Women's Clubs to co-operate with it in its efforts to get the matter into some definite form of action."

At a conference in August this week letters of endorsement were read from the school board and superintendent of Bangor, and from the chamber of commerce, teachers' club, and many other clubs; while Mrs. Deborah K. Livingston of Bangor, who is well known in St. John, was present and spoke for the movement from the standpoint of a parent and a social worker of a national reputation. "The superintendent of schools at Old Town and Orono endorsed the movement by letter, as did the president of the Maine branch of the Parent-Teacher Association and many other organizations. Glenn W. Starkey, state superintendent, sent a letter offering to do anything in his power to aid the movement. Hon. Payson Smith, commissioner of education for Massachusetts, who is also well-known in St. John, wrote as follows: "This institution (the kindergarten) more than any other, has stood for the sound principle, that education deals primarily with the growth and development of the child. It has done more than any other institution to make our methods of education conform with the natural laws which govern human growth. Certainly, nothing can be of greater importance than that all children should have the advantage of a right start in their institutional education. I shall hope to hear that throughout the state there will be renewed interest in the establishment of kindergartens for all children."

The following was received from Miss Rose Archibald Smith of Halifax, Maine, writer of many kindergarten books and lecturer upon kindergarten subjects: "I believe that the provision of the necessary number of kindergartens in every community and their support by the state, constitutes one of the rights of the child. I believe that such a beginning of education is the only just and reasonable one that any expense it involves is the greatest degree of economy in the production of a good citizen."

The information here given is from the columns of the Bangor Commercial. It will add force to the argument in favor of having the kindergarten made part of the New Brunswick school system, as was urged by the recent Social Service Congress. It may be hoped the local school board will at least agree to provide space for free kindergarten classes in the fine new school building in Douglas square. To refuse to do so would be an extraordinary course of action.

AFTER THE FIGHT



SHOT GIRL DEAD

Further Particulars of Murder in Kentville, N.S.

Further particulars of a murder in Kentville, N.S., referred to a few days ago, have come to hand: Elsie Acker, aged twenty years, was shot through the heart on Saturday evening, and Andrew Feindall, her assailant, lies at death's door as the result of a self-inflicted wound. The shooting occurred at the home of P. C. Dimock, while the man was taken to a boarding house and doctors say that they do not think he will live.

Feindall, brushing past Mrs. Lyons, asked for Miss Acker, and Mrs. Botsford told him that she was having her tea. Feindall is said then to have made his way into the hall. A few seconds later Miss Acker appeared. Feindall spoke to her and she answered him. As she stepped nearer he drew from his pocket a revolver, aimed carefully at the girl and shot her through the heart. She fell to the floor dead.

Shot Himself in Head

The explosion of the revolver put out the light and the two ladies rushed into an adjoining room. They had hardly entered it when they heard the sound of another shot. Returning to the scene they found Feindall also lying on the floor, with blood running from his head. He had shot himself just above the right eye. A doctor was hastily summoned and pronounced Miss Acker dead. Feindall had a new .38 calibre revolver and in his pockets were fifty cartridges, as well as about fifty dollars.

Halifax, Feb. 6.—Andrew Feindall, the slayer of Elsie Acker, at Kentville, Saturday, died at Kentville today. He never regained consciousness.

Great Meeting Opens the Opposition Campaign Well in Kings County

E. S. Carter Reviews Local Government's Black Record and Explains Opposition Platform—His Challenge Renewed—The Endorsation of J.K. Flemming

Norton, Feb. 6.—The opposition forces held a most enthusiastic meeting here tonight, which sounded the first note of the big campaign which is now on; and the feeling was one of confidence. A very large number of electors were present and Councillor William Reynolds presided. The three opposition candidates, Messrs. Carter, Pearson and Sharpe, were present and addressed the meeting.

Mr. Carter spoke first and was given a very attentive hearing. He was followed by F. E. Sharpe who, in a half hour speech, dwelt upon the agricultural conditions of the province as related to the activities of the present government in that department. He was frequently applauded and his address was a splendid analysis of the present unsatisfactory situation.

Dr. Pearson followed Mr. Sharpe in a brief but pointed address. He dealt particularly with the public debt of the province, a subject which gave him a wide scope for his criticism. He explained how the burden of debt has been continually increasing under the present extravagant government.

At the conclusion of the speeches those present got down to organization work and named committees, mapping out a plan of campaign. The first meeting was a great success and promises well for the fortunes of the opposition forces in this county.

Mr. Carter's Speech. In his opening remarks, E. S. Carter, who was very handsomely received by the audience, paid some attention to Premier Murray and his invitation to discuss the record of the government and the issues of the day during this campaign at joint meetings. Mr. Carter pointed out the advantage of such gatherings as the people would have a much greater interest knowing they would be on both sides of public questions. If such meetings were more common, he said, it would tend to the elimination of the party system which has so had an effect upon our provincial politics. If men supporting the government and the opposition agreed to meet and talk to the people in full, fair, and frank manner about those questions in which they have so deep an interest, there would not be a shadow of a doubt that greater attention would be paid to the more important matters in the public mind.

Need Explaining. For, continued Mr. Carter, there are many matters, many matters of great importance that should be explained to the people, and it is the duty of the premier of the province, Hon. Mr. Murray, to do so. His manifesto, which was published a few days ago, while lengthy and verbose, was remarkable rather for what it did not contain than for what was in it. There were a score of subjects which the new premier omitted to touch upon in any way. No reference could be found, for example, to the fact that New Brunswick had during the past four years passed through the most trying period of its history and that in spite of the fact that there was a loss of population and that the cause of many disclosures have kept the government constantly upon the ground of public opinion.

Premier Standing for Flemming. But perhaps that which needed the promptest attention, said Mr. Carter, in an explanation of the Premier's position as he associated himself with ex-Premier Flemming after the latter had been condemned by a royal commission of inquiry, was the Premier's standing in relation to the Premier's standing for Flemming. He was Premier, and chief of the department of crown lands, and his knowledge and consent of the collection of a huge blackmail fund from the lumbermen.

Only a few months ago, Hon. Mr. Murray, in Carleton county, welcomed ex-Premier Flemming to the political arena. He and Hon. Dr. Landry and Hon. B. F. Smith surrounded the Premier who had brought shame and discredit to his province, who had been driven from the premiership, and who had been condemned by the people of his province; and Hon. Mr. Flemming, emboldened by this reception, encouraged and abetted by Hon. Mr. Murray and his colleagues, is one of the first men to take the platform in support of the new premier. If Hon. James Murray wanted to appeal to the best and noblest in the manhood of the electors of New Brunswick, he should have sent a telegram to ex-Premier Flemming that "he did not want his support and he had no use for his eloquence in defence of the government. I can imagine that such a bold statement from our new premier would have done more to win his appreciation in New Brunswick than any other act. But he was unable to do so, because he is bound hand and foot by the Fleming influence. We used to realize in Fredericton when the legislature was in session that there was a "Flemming wing" even after the man had been dismissed and disgraced.

Our policy goes further than that, and it was so good that I noticed Hon. B. F. Smith has appropriated part of it and proposes to issue short term bonds, the interest of which will be paid by the revenue from crown land licenses. The present minister of public works put this policy forward as his own, whereas the opposition party made it plain over a year ago that it was their plan.

The Crown Lands. Another plank of the opposition was to take the crown lands out of politics. Does anyone think for a moment that a non-partisan crown land commission, responsible to the legislature, would start a Bill herey out to collect \$100,000 from the crown land licenses? Do you imagine under such a commission that any member of the legislature could do to the crown lands what A. J. H. Stewart did, and not be prosecuted? Do you imagine that the Miramichi Lumber Co. would be allowed to export roused pulp wood in direct defiance of the law if there were three active members of a commission on their job? And do you imagine that this same Miramichi Lumber Co. would be fined a





Hun Piracy Campaign in Full Swing

(From The Telegraph) That the Hun piracy campaign is assuming its full proportions as threatened in Berlin's dictum to the world is indicated in the announcements of the U-boats' toll of British and neutral vessels, and her utter disregard of neutral interests is borne out by the statement of the captain of the United States vessel Westwego, who stated that on Jan. 31 a German submarine threw five shells at his boat.

Announcements indicate that a total of 42,174 tons or thereabouts have been destroyed in the last twenty-four hours, 29,174 tons of which is British, 3,512 Russian and about 10,000 neutral. Six British steamers have been sunk, including the passenger steamer Port Adelaide, in which many lives, it is expected, were lost. There were one Russian steamer sunk, two Norwegian steamers, and two barques and one Swedish steamer.

It is announced that the Scandinavian-American liner Frederick III, with Von Bernstorff and his party aboard, will call at Halifax for examination, as it is rumored that all vessels from United States will do hereafter to facilitate examination.

War Matters Discussed in Commons

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The government's war administration was again in review today in parliament in connection with the discussion in the committee stage of the war appropriation. A large range of subjects was covered, including the Besse report on the medical administration in Great Britain, the surplus of officers in England, inadequacy in recruiting methods, the scrapping of the Canadian equipment in England, and local economy and inefficiency generally. The Bruce and Bapiste reports were discussed all afternoon, although neither report is yet officially before parliament.

In connection with this phase of the discussion, Major-General Sir Sam Hughes came to the front with some characteristic criticism of social and "petty-coast" influences in England, and he warmly championed the recommendations made by Colonel Bruce. Sir Sam raised a storm of laughter by declaring the British V. A. D. hospitals had become known as "matrimonial bureaus," and many of these amateur nurses were now drawing the separation allowance of Canadian soldiers.

W. M. German, of Welland, and D. McKeanie and other Liberals made vigorous attacks on the government for failing to deal vigorously with the waste of hundreds of thousands of dollars in needlessly retaining in England thousands of officers who would never get to the front. They declared that the falling off in recruiting was due to the haphazard and lackadaisical policy of the government.

During a somewhat heated exchange of charges and counter charges as to justifiable and unjustifiable criticism of the war administration, E. M. MacDonald, of Pictou, read to the house a letter which he had received from a "fighting" colonel who had been overseas since 1914. The letter contained the following significant statement:

"If the people of Canada knew what goes on here in the waste of public money, the creation of jobs for disgruntled politicians and wire pullers, it would make very interesting reading for the Canadian people, but one month is closed so long as we wear uniforms. In the opinion of many officers here the life blood of Canada is being exploited to glorify the Tory party, and I believe that opinion is true."

Shortly after midnight the war vote was unanimously carried. The desks are now cleared for adjournment tomorrow.

Hon. A. E. Kemp informed E. M. MacDonald as to the arrangements made for the employment of the Nova Scotia Highland Brigade. The 88th Battalion had been selected for service in France; the 186th Battalion had been attached to the 6th Division, and the other two units had been absorbed into the 17th Reserve Battalion to provide reinforcements for the 88th and other Nova Scotia units at the front.

CENTENARY BROTHERHOOD STRONGLY IN FAVOR OF CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY

"Some things the social service council must aim to do," was the subject of an address by A. M. Belding before the Centenary Brotherhood last evening at the Fleetwood occupied the chair. Mr. Belding began with a review of social conditions in St. John as revealed by the work of the Children's Aid Society and then proceeded to enumerate some of the things that ought to be done. Referring to the need of a commissioner with provincial powers; larger children's homes—and a local agent to give his whole time to the work. With regard to the education of the children he said there were too many children of school age in St. John who are not at school and far too many leave school while yet in the lower grades. He urged the need of an industrial form of neighborhood centres; of more supervised recreation; the development of the big playground at the entrance to Rockwood park and above all the development of the community spirit which would make the people realize their common interests and their common duty to improve social conditions. He referred to the problem of the feeble-minded and the need of an institution for their care.

He asked what the citizens of St. John are doing to provide something to take the place of the saloons after the first of the city had expressed the view that St. John should establish a free maternity hospital in connection with the public hospital not only because it would save the lives of many infants but also from the humanitarian standpoint and the good effect the teaching given to mothers while in hospital, would have upon learning of the little ones. He suggested that the Brotherhood appoint committees to confer with the Children's Aid Society and the Playgrounds Association and become familiar with their work and their needs and also that the Brotherhood be ably represented on the social service council formed for the city and county of St. John. A vote of thanks was tendered to the speaker on motion of J. Hunter White, seconded by Rev. W. H. Barraclough and the following resolution was adopted: "That this body of Centenary men desires to express its approval of the objects and aims of the social service council and pledges itself to support in every way possible all efforts of that organization for the social and moral betterment of the city and county of St. John. Especially would it emphasize the work on behalf of the children as being undertaken by the Children's Aid Society."

MR. DENNIS SPEAKS IN KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS HALL

An Interesting Evening—Important Statement Made by Major-General McLean

Problems relating to returned soldiers and other problems arising from the war and which will arise after the war were discussed in a masterly manner by J. S. Dennis, in an address given last evening under the auspices of the Royal Standard Chapter, I. O. D. E. The Knights of Columbus hall was filled to its capacity for the occasion and the audience was a representative one, including many leading citizens and many officers of the local units and the general staff.

Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, regent of the Royal Standard Chapter, presided, and on the platform with her were the speaker of the evening, Lady Ashburnham from Fredericton, Major-General McLean, Mayor Hayes and Lieut.-Col. P. A. Guthrie.

While the audience was gathering a splendid musical programme was given by the 115th band, now attached to the 115th and they were heard again later in the evening.

In her opening remarks the regent paid a graceful tribute to the British navy as an introduction to the effective singing of "Rule Britannia" by Captain D. B. Pidgeon.

Major-General McLean was then called upon and he delivered a most impressive speech on the need for more recruits for the infantry units. He referred to the recent declaration of Lloyd George that Canada has not enlisted enough men for one infantry regiment and that Ontario has scarcely secured a platoon. Their powerful engines develop 18,000 horse-power, and gives them a surface speed of 28 knots. They are remarkable independence of supporting bases, enjoying a range of action of from 18,000 to 24,000 miles for surface cruising. They fight from ten to twenty-two tons of torpedoes, and carry three torpedoes for each tube. Moreover, these boats have the high speed of 17 knots an hour.

Germany Has a Diving Fleet

Submarine Cruisers of Large Size—From 2,400 to 5,000 Tons—Extremely Well Armed and Equipped

New York, Feb. 7.—The Tribune this morning publishes the following article by Louis D. Edwards on "The Diving Battle Fleet": Germany plays her trump. Three hundred or more submarines have plunged into the waters of the North Sea to make the final effort against Great Britain. They mobilized from Kiel, Hamburg, Wilhelmshaven, Bremenhaven, where many months ago crews have trained with anxious thoroughness. They form the world's first diving fleet.

Most numerous among the super-submarines is the new line of patrol established February 1 are the 7-inchers of 2,400 tons. These ships measure 290 feet in length, twenty-five feet in breadth, and nineteen feet in depth. The motors develop 7,000 horse-power, and drive the boats over at vice-consul at a speed of twenty-two knots an hour. The smaller cruisers carry a crew of from ten to twenty men, and are equipped with torpedo tubes, guns of small and middle calibre, wireless telephone and telegraph, with intricate devices for the transmission and receiving of unmistakable submarine signals and for the blind location of objects of attack. They have a radius of 5,000 miles.

The guns are carried below decks and are brought into action by powerful springs. The whole proceeding of raising and preparing the guns for action, as also their storage below decks again, does not take more than twenty seconds.

Rules of the Overseas Forces

All to be Treated Alike

Minister of Militia Explains System Followed in Regard to Promotions, Requests for Leave, Etc.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—In view of the great number of requests of a personal nature with reference to soldiers serving overseas with the Canadian forces, Hon. A. E. Kemp, minister of militia, has issued an official statement, explaining the methods which in the interests of fair and equitable treatment to all concerned are followed in each case. The exigencies of the military situation are the primary consideration in dealing with all cases. The memorandum deals with the following subjects: Requests for commissions for men serving overseas; every opportunity is given to deserving men to qualify for commissions, both in England and at the front. The only way an application can be considered is when it is made by the soldier himself to his commanding officer, by whom it must be recommended. Needed at Front Requests for return of men to take out commissions in Canada: The authorities in England have definitely asked that no further requests of this nature be forwarded, as every opportunity is given to deserving men to qualify for commissions in England and France, and they are all needed there. Requests for return of officers for duty in Canada: All experienced junior officers now in England and France are required there. As regards senior officers, the authorities in England have ar-

Miss Deinstdt Writes From Arc-En-Barrois

Nurse Speaks of Uses to Which it is Being Put—Demands Are Many—Some of the Cases

In a recent letter from Miss Hazel L. Deinstdt of this city, who is serving as a volunteer nurse, paying her own expenses, at Arcen Barrois, Hauts, France, near Verdun, France, she acknowledges receipt of \$115 raised by Mrs. Comeau and other ladies, and reports how the fund is to be used. Extracts from her letter are as follows:

That certainly was a splendid letter with all that money! We were delighted to have it for New Year, as the men here make much more of New Year than they do of Christmas, and we did so want them to enjoy it. I got each of them some nice little present that would be of use to them in the trenches. I am becoming quite adept now at picking out the right and useful thing, and I wish you could see how they appreciate what we give them. They presented to me a huge bouquet of flowers.

"On Monday I take charge of Salle Foch again, but have a good 'pro' to assist me. I am saving the bulk of the money to use there. There is a man here who will be terribly crippled if some one doesn't give him a leg. Unless another comes to his rescue, some of your money will have to go for that; but I do want to keep it for a general fund to buy things as they are needed.

We have a man shot through the mouth and jaw, so that much of what he eats falls out. However, he loves raw eggs and can manage them beautifully, so I have been buying a dozen every day for him. These he eats besides the four a day the hospital gives him. That sounds extravagant, but it is not, as he has horrible chest trouble, and I have seen him cough up blood. I have a man very ill with pneumonia who needs extra, too. When the men leave to return to the trenches, they need so many things the government does not supply, and which they really cannot afford to buy, that we are constantly helping them out in this way.

I shall tell you later just how the money is spent; but I fear some of it will have to go to the operating table, as that is so expensive to keep up. However, I do hope to keep it as an emergency fund.

We all appreciate very much the kindness of the people at home sending this money to us. It is necessary for us to be able to give the men all they need and so richly deserve. I do want everyone to know that the money is being used to the best advantage.

There is, as nothing is too good for them. Thank Mrs. Comeau and all those who have made it possible for me to be here. I have men so mighty comforts and so much cheer—I myself have little time for writing. We are full up at present and as busy as can be, but I never felt better in my life, so don't worry.

Corbet, had been converted into a field ambulance unit, and that No. 16 had been allotted to it. Hence in the future the unit will be known as the 16th Field Ambulance, C.E.F. Major Corbet of the unit has been promoted to lieutenant-colonel and Major Skinner has been appointed second in command.

The unit when first authorized, was known as the 8th Field Ambulance C. E. F., but when it was decided not to form the fifth Canadian division this unit was converted into a depot from which drafts were to be sent overseas and the complement of the unit, which at the time of authorization was 108 men including officers, was increased to 200 men, including all ranks. Lieutenant-Colonel Corbet is receiving congratulations today on his well-merited promotion.
