Reports Are That His CANADA AND **ACT AS ONE**

New Treaty And International Tribunal To Regulate And Control Through Railway Traffic Is Suggested.

New York, Aug. 11.—The suggestion of a new treaty between the United States and Canada, and the establishment of a joint tribunal in the nature of an internatioal traffic commission as the means of effective control of through railroad traffic between the two countries, was made at a conference here today between Martin A. Knapp, chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission and J. P. Mabee, chief of the railway commission of Canada. The meeting was preliminary to further conferences at which, it is hoped to outline plans for full control of such traffic. Any agreement reached will be submitted to the two commissions and reports will also be made to their respective governments. No statement was made as to the result of the conference, except that it was satisfactory to both parties.

Member For Carleton County Landed Dr. Weaver In Fat Job In Fredericton And Liberals Are Sore.

Fredericton, N. B., August 11.—A great deal of bad blood exists in Liberal circles here over the appointment of a surgeon to the Military School. The position has been occupied for some years by Dr. W. J. Bridges, who has been promoted to Montreal. For the vacancy thus created there were a number of applicants including Dr. J. W. Peake of Sunbury County, Dr. W. J. Weaver, Dr. W. J. McGrath, Dr. C. T. Holden and others.

There was a very general opinion that, from a political and military standpoint, Dr. Peake was entitled to the position. He had run two elections for the local house in Sunbury County at the personal solicitation of the leaders of the Liberal party in the province and opposed Messrs. Hazen and Glasier in 1908, when he knew there was not the slightest chance of his being elected. He had also helped engineer the movement that enabled Colonel McLean to obtain the Liberal nomination over Dr. Hetherington at the last Dominion contest, and, but for his efforts in getting the Sunbury County Liberals into line Colonel McLean would not have been nominated. It is to Dr. Peake, therefore, that the Colonel owes his position in the House of Commons today.

It is true that the door's ardor for Colonel McLean underwent considerable cooling and that he rendered him little, if any, assistance in the election It is believed by his friends, however, that this is due to the fact that Colonel McLean had failed to make good certain promises. Dr. Peake also qualified himself for the position from a military standpoint, and has attended the camps at Sussex for several years past. His friends have stated that in spite of the coolness between himself and Colonel McLean at the last election the latter would give him all the help in his power and would insist upon his appointment.

Vatican Announces That No New Proposals Will be Made to Spanish Government.

Premier Says "I Am Determined Not to Allow **Development of Cleric**alism in Spain."

Rome, Aug. 11.—The Vatican in a semi-official communication says that the idea of making new proposals to Spain is so far from the intention of the holy see that some of the officials support the suggestion of sending no further answer to the last Spanish note on the ground that this note is a reply to that addressed by the holy see to the government and there by requires no new answer.



His forefathers found the flag meant freedom in all things. They regarded it as a good flag under which to continue their citizenship. Had they felt otherwise there was no restraint placed upon them to remain under it. Sir Wilfrid can have no personal complaint against Canada. He has been called upon to make no sacrifices in her behalf. He has been given a post of honor that he would hardly have attained to in any other land under the sun.

Goldwin Smith was a student of men and affairs, and he classed Sir Wilfrid as an opportunist. Opportunity has come to him here. His birth of itself proved an advantage that brains could not equal. It is this advantage which Sir Wilfrid is still playing to the limit when he parades it as he is continually doing. It was this accident of birth which gave him an almost solid Quebec, and the same fact has enabled him to retain the Lower Province against his opponents. And despite this he flaunts his loyalty to the British Empire in the face of the people of the West as though this loyalty were something which has called for personal sacrifice.







New York Aug. 11.—The stock market today gave additional evidence of the dying down of the forces of recovery which had been at work almost continuously for the two weeks previous until the day before. The investment in the market which developed at the attractive prices of fered on the decline, seems to be satisfied and the more speculative operations for the advance show growing caution as prices get further away from the point at which the recovery started. There were no new factors developed which are considered of positive weakening force but the news fails to offer incertive to continue the advance.

The statement issued by the bureau of statistics of the value of agriculture exports for the month of July disappointed the hopes of a decisive favorable turn in foreign trade conditions, which seemed to be foreshadowed by the June return. Nearly every important item of the statement shows a contraction from the figures of a year ago, the total contraction reaching \$6,253,000 compared with July of last year. The complete foreign trade statement in July of last year showed an excess value of imports over exports already established so that the prospect of assistance in building up foreign credits by the workings of commerce in July of this year is poor. Statistics of permits for new Lulidings for New York and twenty six other leading centres for July aggregate \$45,432,776 compared with \$60.827,774 in July of last year. This showing bears out the assertions of extensive curtailment of credits in New York, for new building parposes which lending institutions have been practicing for some time. An important department of the steel trade is thus affected and the response of United States Steel to the showing was evidence of the significance attached to it. That stock was sympathetically affected by the special weakness of American Smelling which reflected some influence on the whole of the metal group.

New York, Aug. 11.—An attack upon the metal shares and particularly on the American Smelters and let'g stocks, based upon rumors that the dividend on the common issue would be reduced furnished the only speculative diversion in today's stock market. Smelters yielded easily to pressure and while the story mentioned could not be verified it would surprise few people to see this action taken. Amalgamated was under some pressure but showed strong resistance. The standard Issues were dull and reactionary, reflecting an impaired technical position and an apparent withdrawal of the strong banking support which had been a feature. It was inferred that these interests were not anxious to precipitate a sustained upward movement of prices at this time even if they were willing to prevent further demoralization. Aside from the rumors mentioned the day's news was if anything favorable. The regular Harriman dividends were declared, thus settling some of the rumors which were circulated a fortnight or more ago. The St. Paul road reported substantial gains in both net and gross for the manth of June and the complexion of other routine news was reassuring. The reactionary tendency of the market was the result of inertia and neglect rather than any measureable increase in the supply of stocks from other quarters.




