The Minister of Finance, who has had the matter under consideration since the gubilication of Sir Geo. The principle of treasury control has governed the change made in this respect, as the result that the estimates have been thoroughly digested and are in such shape that the minister will be able to lay them before the house much sconer than has been the rule in past sessions.

The coming bill will provide for these changes.
