Ottawa, Aug. 25.—Now that the Panama Canal Bill has been signed by President Taft and the discriminatory provision held to be within the treaty rights of the United States, the question of a Canadian protest is likely to come before the government here for decision. The Canadian government has not so far, it is understood, dealt with the question finally, although at no-stage have the interests of Canada been lost eight of. The position has been lost eight of. That a protest from Canada will be forthcoming is regarded as highly probable, despite official reticence on the subject. 
