Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following report:

BROTHER MODERATOR AND BRETHREN:

This report presents, sifted and classified, the facts furnished by churches and ministers for the Conference year just closed.

Churches.—The number of churches heard from this year is 132; one hundred and eighteen reported in regular form, and four verbally, to their District Meetings; ten reported to your Corresponding Secretary, after the District Meetings, in response to requests from him.

Of the reports received 123 give membership statistics. They have 9,555 members. The estimated unreported membership is 2,563, making a total of 12,218.

New Churches.—One new church has been organized—that

at Lambert's Cove, Deer Island. It began life with twelve members, it now has forty-one members.

Perry's Point Church, in the Fifth District, is nearly a new one, having been resuscitated after having been thought dead for several years. It has now forty-five members, twenty-two of whom were added this year.

Buildings.—Two new church buildings were dedicated—one at Riley Brook, V. Co., and one at Lambert's Cove, Deer Island. Two new parsonages have been purchased—one at Salisbury, and one at Penobscus, and one is in course of construction at Hartland, Carleton County.

Additions.—Forty-two churches report additions, the whole number being 316—by baptism 237, by letter 79. The net increase of members is 134.

Conference and Prayer Meetings, etc.—The reports of these meetings are much the same as the reports of last year. Three more conferences are reported; the regular prayer meetings are three less; the Lord's Supper has been administered to two less churches; missionary sermons have been preached in seventeen more churches; three churches less have had missionary prayer meetings; gain in spiritual life and Christian activities is reported by five more churches; the number reporting loss in spiritual life is nine less; twenty-three churches are financially stronger, and ten are financially weaker. The average condition, so far as it can be judged by the reports, is slightly improved.

Finances.—The financial returns are, as usual, incomplete, and, therefore, unsatisfactory. The following table presents the aggregates of the several items as they appear in the reports of the churches:

In the foregoing table the amounts paid for salaries, current expenses of the churches, and for buildings and improvements, are probably substantially correct. It must be noted, though, that in some Districts, notably in the Fifth, several churches have this year reported only the money actually paid for salaries, etc., from October, 1898, up to the time of their District Meetings this year, not more than three-fourths of a year. Their next reports, and all subsequent ones, will contain a full year's payments.

The other items in the financial table are incomplete. The same thing occurs, in some degree, every year. For instance: Last year the amount stated in the Corresponding Secretary's report as paid by the churches for Home Missions was barely more than half the amount they really contributed; the amount by Sabbath Schools was only about one-third of what they paid; and in all the other funds the amounts named in the table were considerably below the actual payments for the year. The explanation is this: The financial statement of this report is made up from the financial reports made by the churches to their District Meetings. A number of churches have a habit of delaying their contributions to missions and other general funds of the denomination till after their reports have gone to the District Meetings. Their payments are credited by the several treasurers but are not included in this report's financial statement. If the proportion of delayed contributions this year is the same as last year, there might be about \$2,500 added to the above aggregate.

The Corresponding Secretary's reason for continuing to embody in his report the financial statement, though incomplete, is that he understands it to be his duty to make the report, so far as possible, an exhibit of all the denomination has done in the year. The financial returns have improved much within a few years. If the churches will adopt the plan of making a full year's returns of everything to their respective District Meetings, this report will from year to year present to Conference just what the denomination has done.

Pastoral Care.—One hundred and seventeen (117) of the reported churches have had pastoral care this year. How the pastors have spread themselves among the churches may be stated thus: six churches have each one-eighth of a pastor's time; seven churches have one-sixth; eight churches have one-fifth; fifty-one have one-fourth; twelve have one-third; eleven have one-half; four have three-quarters; eight have what they call "part"; two have "occasionally"; and eight have "all," *i. e.*, they have each a pastor exclusively. Besides these, some of the churches

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have had missionary care and the visits of other ministers more or less frequently.

Ministers.—The year began with forty-seven ordained ministers enrolled. None have died. During the year two—Revs. F. A. Currier and A. H. McLeod—having become pastors, the first named in Lowell, Mass., and the second in Raymond, Me., were, at their own request, granted dismission by the Conference Executive. Two (Revs. Thos. Connor and J. S. Jones) have, owing to poor health, been unable to do any ministerial work. Four (Rev. J. H. Erb, C. F. Rideout, W. R. Reud, and W. C. Keirstead), are out of the province—the first two on account of poor health, and the last two pursuing their studies. Bro. Keirstead spent the summer at home, supplying the Carleton, St. John, church, during the illness of the pastor. Thirty-two of the ordained ministers have been pastors, viz.: Revs. John Perry, G. A. Hartley, D. D., J. T. Parsons, J. N. Barnes, T. S. VanWart, T. O. DeWitt, C. T. Phillips, W. DeWare, J. W. Clarke, J. A. Robertson, J. J. Barnes, O. N. Mott, G. W. Foster, G. F. Currie, B. H. Nobles, W. H. Perry, G. Swim, C. B. Lewis, F. C. Hartley, H. A. Bonnell, I. A. Cosman, D. Long, A. Perry, I. D. Harvey, S. J. Perry, J. B. Daggett, E. S. Parker, D. Patterson, F. G. Francis, L. A. Fenwick, A. J. Prosser, and A. D. Paul.

Those who have not been pastors have not been idle. Rev. J. Noble, the venerable senior minister of the Conference, now past four score and five years, has been almost continuously engaged in the work he loves, journeying from place to place, preaching the Word and ministering counsel and comfort to many. Rev. Jos. McLeod has been editor of the denominational paper, and has, also, been General Secretary by appointment of Conference. Revs. E. B. Gray, T. W. Carpenter, J. Henderson and H. Hartt have been engaged more or less regularly in the work of the ministry, and with good effect.

There were six licentiates at the beginning of the year—four licensed by Conference and two by District Meetings. Of the Conference licentiates, three (Bros. A. H. Williams, J. E. Puddington and M. L. Gregg), and one District licentiate (Bro. Chas. Stirling) have been pastors; one Conference licentiate (Bro. S. J. Case) has been teaching in a Free Baptist school in New Hampshire; and one District licentiate (Bro. W. Kirkpatrick) has been at school part of the year. District licentiate Stirling whose license would have expired the first of October, joined a Baptist church in September. The First District Meeting in June of this year, gave license to Bro. Z. Doody; and

the Sixth District Meeting in July, gave license to Bro. Fletcher Knollin.

Thirty of the ministers have complied with the rule of Conference (see Year Book, 1896, Resolution 38) requiring each minister each year to report his work to the Corresponding Secretary. The following are summaries of the reports received:

Rev. G. A. Hartley, D.D., has continued pastor of the Carleton, St. John, church, this being his forty-second year. Poor health has prevented him laboring as in former years. He says: "For nearly half the year I have done partial work only. Additions to the church have been few — one by baptism and two others. The spiritual condition of the church is fairly good and the temporal affairs rather better than usual." He also reports a visit to Lambert's Cove, Deer Island, where he went by invitation in October last. The people had erected a church building, and wished counsel as to their future denominational relation. "The result of the visit was that the house was given over to us." It was dedicated by Bro. Hartley, assisted by Bro. Paul, and they also organized a church of twelve members. "The accession of the church to the Deer Island pastorate makes it one of the best country pastorates in the Conference. The new church property is valued at \$1500, and is free from debt."

Rev. J. T. Parsons is now completing his eighth year as pastor at Marysville and Peniac. He has a fortnightly preaching service at Peniac. He is at Marysville every Sabbath. The various services of the church are well sustained, and the ordinances regularly administered. The year was a very good one; nine were baptized. There is an excellent Sunday-school and a good C. E. Society. The interest in all departments of the work is good and the outlook encouraging.

Rev. J. N. Barnes has been two years at Stanley, and will remain a third year. The pastorate consists of two churches (Stanley and Bloomfield) about thirty miles apart. At Bloomfield some revival was enjoyed, and three were baptized. The church raised considerably more money than last year. At Stanley the interest is somewhat improved; the people are more hopeful, and the pastor is too. He is expecting the new year to be better than its predecessors.

Rev. T. S. VanWart reports the churches of the Upper Hainesville pastorate, to which he has ministered part of the time, as but little changed from last year.

Rev. T. O. DeWitt spent November and December with the Wickham and Bald Hill churches. His labours were blessed; two were baptized. Since New Year he has been pastor of the

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Bear Island, Queensbury, Prince William and Dumfries churches. He has preached seventy times, made one hundred and eighty-two calls, attended thirty-six prayer meetings and twelve conferences; he has baptized three at Bear Island and three at Canterbury. For some weeks he was laid up. It has been, all things considered, a busy and quite trying year, but God's blessing has not failed.

Rev. C. T. Phillips is closing his fifteenth year as pastor of the Woodstock church, during which time he has done excellent work—in the earlier years of his pastorate heroic work, which held a church threatened with destruction, and made denominational history. Of the year now closing, he says, "The church had revival; nine were baptized. We have good congregations; a large number of young people attend. Good prayer meetings. Held fortnightly Sunday afternoon meetings at South Wakefield, a young and small church. It ought to have more care; it will pay to give it care."

Rev. J. W. Clarke is about closing eight useful years as pastor of the Waterloo street church, St. John. He says, "During these years there have come to us many evidences of progress, the year now closing being one of the best. As a result of special services last spring twenty-two were received into the church, fifteen by baptism and seven by letter. The first two weeks the Rev. B. H. Nobles and singing evangelist Britton led the services, after which the pastor continued them, with the above results. One of those converted, whom we all feel God is calling into public service, has on several occasions preached to interested congregations. The Sunday School and C. E. Society are doing good work; the Sunday services and the prayer meetings have been well attended, and most encouraging."

Rev. J. J. Barnes, pastor of the Waterville pastorate, reports the spiritual life in all the churches (Waterville, Third Tier, Seventh Tier, Lakeville and Brookville) "good and growing." He is to continue pastor another year.

Rev. O. N. Mott's pastorate consists of Blissville, Mill Settlement and Patterson churches, and Clarendon, which is a branch of Patterson church. He "held special meetings at Patterson which strengthened the church." Two were baptized. He will remain another year—the third.

Rev. G. W. Foster's pastorate consists of Keswick and Kingsley churches, the first named having two preaching places—Mouth Keswick and Douglas. He reports that "in the early part of the year he held special meetings at Mouth Keswick; four were baptized, and the spiritual life of the church was

helped." Later he "held special meetings at Douglas which were helpful; five were baptized." At Kingsley, also, special meetings were held, and though the time of year was not the best, good was done. "Good congregations in all the churches." "Spiritually, the condition is not all we could desire, but the outlook seems more promising." "More godliness will make the work more successful." A clearer sense that to be a Christian is to follow Jesus, to walk in his steps, is what is needed everywhere."

Rev. B. H. Nobles reports the work at Sussex encouraging. "This is the church's first year as an independent pastorate, and it has, in every particular, been very satisfactory. The Sabbath congregations have increased a good deal, and the prayer meetings have grown both in attendance and spiritual interest. The parsonage, which was built and finished a year ago, is now free of debt. The people are hopeful as to the future of the church's work, and are devoted to the cause of goodness."

Rev. W. H. Perry has spent his first year as pastor of the Hampstead group of churches. The churches in the pastorate are Upper Hampstead, Central Hampstead, Hibernia and Jerusalem; with Woodville Hall and Otnabog as preaching stations. He reports "the spiritual condition not what we would desire, but in all the churches are faithful Christians, who are hoping and praying for better times. No special services were held; one was baptized at Upper Hampstead. The church buildings are all in good repair and free of debt. A parsonage is needed, and could be secured without seriously burdening any of the churches." Bro. Perry says "all the ground possible is occupied in that section. To make Christian work more effective there is need of more self-denial and a deeper consecration."

Rev. G. Swim has had pastoral care of the Millstream, Apohaqui pastorate, consisting of five churches. He has preached three times every Sunday when possible to reach his appointments; it has been difficult to reach the mountain churches regularly in the winter. The drives are long—twenty-five miles one Sunday and twenty-one the next. "The spiritual condition of the churches is not what is desirable," but he thinks "there is an improvement of late." He has "endeavored to preach the word faithfully, the good seed has been sown, and some one will reap in due season." He is now retiring from the pastorate after two years of service; and he hopes "the right man will succeed him."

Rev. C. B. Lewis has just completed his first year with the Lincoln-Rusiagnonis pastorate. It embraces five churches. To

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cover the work requires him to preach three times each Sabbath and usually to attend three week-night prayer meetings. There is improvement in the pastorate, as a whole; just now there seems a quickened interest at some points. He is to remain another year.

Rev. F. C. Hartley reports: "I have been continuing my work as pastor at Fredericton. The year has not been one of special revival interest. All the regular work of the church has been maintained, and we are hoping to reap good fruit from the seed sown. Five persons have been added to the church by baptism, and two on experience."

Rev. D. Long, who has been two years pastor of the Victoria street, St. John, church, reports that progress has been made. "The congregations are large, there is more interest in the prayer meetings; notwithstanding many members of the congregation lost heavily by the fire the finances are good, and harmony prevails. And yet we are not doing nearly what we ought for our Master. More self-denying service is needed."

Rev. Abram Perry has spent the year with the Salisbury pastorate, which includes six churches; it is his tenth year. "Regular pastoral work has been done in all the churches, and at Lewis Mountain special meetings were held and six were baptized. . . . The spiritual condition of the churches is fair."

Rev. S. J. Perry "has pastoral care of Bath, Beechwood, Upper Kent and Lower Perth churches;" he also "extended care to Maplehurst and Mineral. Special meetings were held at Bath, Upper Kent, Lower Perth and Maplehurst, which resulted in four being added to the Bath church, one to the Lower Perth church, and four to the Maplehurst church." He has been four years pastor of the churches named, and now retires, "praying that the Lord may direct a faithful man to the field."

Rev. J. B. Daggett has been pastor of the Hartland-Brighton pastorate, which includes Hartland, Upper Brighton, Lower Brighton, Pembroke and Newburgh, with Havelock as a branch of Lower Brighton. He has maintained all the regular services of the churches, which necessitated preaching three times every Sunday, attending two mid-week prayer-meetings and four monthly conferences. He also "co-operated with Rev. L. A. Fenwick in establishing and maintaining a preaching appointment at East Florenceville," and has "preached there twice." There has not been much revival spirit. Three have been baptized. "Christian harmony prevails, and there is much to be thankful for." The church building at Hartland has been renovated, and they "expect to finish, except the seats, the new

church at Newburgh. A parsonage is in construction at Hartland; it is being built by the whole pastorate." Bro. Daggett is to remain another year—his third.

Rev. W. C. Keirstead reports that he spent the school year at Cobb Divinity School, and believes it was a profitable year. The summer months he spent as a supply for Dr. Hartley, St. John, West. Last week he started for Chicago University. He regrets that he cannot be at Conference.

Rev. A. D. Paul has had a good year as pastor of the Deer Island churches. The Lambert's Cove church was organized, the church building dedicated, and twenty-four members added by baptism; it is "in very good condition spiritually." Fair Haven church "has suffered loss of members by death and removals; two were baptized." "Chocolate Cove church has made some progress. There was a revival; four were baptized, and a number of wanderers helped." The pastor "preaches in each church every Sunday, and attends a week-night prayer meeting in each." He is to remain another year.

Rev. D. Patterson has had charge of a pastorate which includes Carpenter, Shannon, Henderson, Big Cove, Narrows, and Perry's Point, and has had a good year. It has been a "laborious year, but there has been the joy of seeing Zion prosper somewhat." He has "held three services every Sunday, giving each church two Sunday services a month." "For the greater part of the winter and spring special meetings were held. A revival interest of marked power was enjoyed." Churches were strengthened, difficulties were removed, and a forward move was taken by many in Christian service." Forty-seven were baptized, and forty-six added to the churches." The various branches of Christian work, as Sabbath schools, missions, the right support of the church, etc., have been given attention. One church in Bro. Patterson's pastorate, Perry's Point, which had long been dormant, was quickened into life and much increased in membership. And a new preaching station has been established—in the hall at Cody's, a monthly service. Bro. Patterson continues with the pastorate another year.

Rev. A. J. Prosser, pastor of Penobscuis, Newtown and Dutch Valley churches, reports the work "as going forward in the ordinary way." "The religious interest, if it is to be judged by the attendance at the prayer and conference meetings, is not what we desire." Special work was done at Newtown; one was baptized. "Penobscuis has purchased a parsonage, which is a decided advantage to the work."

Licentiate S. J. Case, writing from New Hampton, N. H., says, "The daily effort to uplift the young lives around me has

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True,

not, I trust, been in vain. It has been my privilege to preach on the Sabbath quite frequently during the year."

Licentiate A. H. Williams has spent the year with the churches at Geary, Victoria, Waterville and Greenville, in Sunbury County, and at Upper Gaagetown and Bethany, Queens County. He has preached 143 times, made 450 calls, and attended many prayer meetings, conferences, etc. He "held special meetings in Greenfield with good results, and two were baptized." He wishes he could have done more in every part of the field. A great revival is needed in all the churches.

Licentiate J. E. Puddington did another year's work among the churches of the First District, the Tobique river being the principal part of his field. His pastorate, he says, was eighty-two miles long. Long drives, and often deep snow, made it impossible to hold many special meetings. At Ortonville, seven miles below Grand Falls, a few meetings were made a blessing to the people. At California also, he helped Bro. Doody in meetings, and the church was helped. The cause in that part of our field needs help. Bro. Puddington is retiring from the pastorate.

Licentiate M. L. Gregg has been pastor of the Gibson church. His labors have been blessed. His report says,— "Spiritual life and the outlook were never so good as now. There have been no special meetings, but a revival all the year. Fifteen have been received into the church; some converted in our meetings have joined other churches. Some church members have been quickened into new life. The Young People's Society is a band of earnest Christian workers, and is a strong ally. Sunday School growing. Prayer meetings deeply spiritual. A good year."

Licentiate W. Kirkpatrick reports that he has been at school part of the year. He has also made frequent visits to Clarendon station, where are a number of our people. He thinks the place should receive some care by being attached to the Blissville pastorate.

Licentiate Stirling labored with the Lower Canterbury, Meductic and Campbell Settlement churches. "At Canterbury three were baptized and added to the church. Special meetings were held at Campbell Settlement, and the church revived."

Signs of Improvement.—Among the indications of improvement found in the foregoing facts are these:

1. Twelve (12) more churches have been heard from than last year, and the largest number ever heard from in any year. True, a few of the reports do not furnish much information, nor

show a very good condition ; but it is a satisfaction to have any word from them, and may be regarded as a promise of something better in future years.

2. Two new churches have been organized ; one church, long dormant, has been resuscitated ; and three new preaching stations have been established.

3. There is an increase of members—the net gain being slightly more than that of last year.

4. More churches report gain in spiritual life ; and a number report increase in financial strength.

5. One hundred and seventeen churches had pastoral care—a gain of seven over last year, and a larger number than ever before.

6. A larger number of churches than last year report revivals—sixteen more.

7. Nineteen churches have this year done something in looking after their non-resident members, and, in a majority of cases, with satisfactory results. Previously, practically nothing of this kind was done in a systematic way. The example of the nineteen churches will, it is hoped, be followed by a much larger number of churches next year.

8. The number of churches contributing to Home Missions, Foreign Missions, and the Conference Fund, is greater than last year.

9. Sixteen churches contributed to the Aged and Sick Ministers' Fund, and fifteen churches contributed to the Ministerial Students' Fund. This is a marked gain, for last year not a single church contributed to either of these funds. The action of the churches which have made a beginning in this matter is especially gratifying.

Needs.—Among the needs suggested by examination of the reports are more mid-week prayer meetings, more missionary prayer meetings, more general and regular observance of the ordinance of the Lord's Supper, better attendance at prayer meetings and conferences, better support of pastors, better support of home missions, more interest in the conversion of the heathen, more generous provision for aged and disabled ministers, more readiness to help the young men whom God is calling to the ministry.

These and kindred needs point to the great and pressing need of a wide-spread spiritual revival, for only out of a deepened spiritual life will come deliverance from poor views of Christian duty, and the enthroning of a holy ambition to be and do the most for our Saviour and King.

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Our Responsibility. We are here in Conference the chosen representatives of our churches. Our brethren have confidence in our love of the cause, our intelligence and our fidelity. We are here, too, in a sacred sense the representatives for our Lord. We have, in our hands, such interests of his kingdom, as this body stands for, to help or to hurt them by our manner of dealing with them. May we have in our minds more clearly than ever before, and on our hearts with a new and solemn pressure, the great fact that the mission of the church is to bring the world to Christ; and that everything we do here must be with the view of increasing the power of the Church in the accomplishment of this great work.

BROTHER MODERATOR,—The Executive Committee of Sunday-schools have pleasure in presenting the following report of Denominational Sunday-school work for the year now ending.

The First District report two schools, seventy-four pupils and eight teachers.

1. In this district there are twelve or more schools from which reports should have been forthcoming. Last year it only reported five schools, and your committee feel

alarmed for fear this comparatively large district will cease to communicate to this Conference. The two schools reporting are Beechwood and Lower Perth.

2. In the Second District we have 13 schools reporting 542 pupils and 55 teachers—the important school of Woodstock being missing. Those reporting are Tracy's Mills, Charle-ton, Lindsay, Newburgh, Upper Brighton, Rockland, Pembroke, Waterville, Hartland, Windsor, Victoria Corner, Mount Pleasant and Connell.

3. In the Third District we have 9 schools reporting 745 pupils and 61 teachers. The schools reporting are Upper Hainesville, Marysville, Fredericton, Campbell Settlement, Middle Southampton, Mouth Keswick, Kingsley, Bear Island, and Middle Hainesville.

4. The Fourth District reports 10 schools, 566 pupils and 42 teachers. Schools reporting are French Lake, Upper Gagetown, Fredericton Junction, Waterville, Blissville, Geary, Mill Settlement, Waasis Station, Gaspereaux Station and Rusiagornis.

5. The Fifth District reports 10 schools, 342 pupils and 36 teachers. Perry's Point, Jerusalem, Bethany, Carpenter, Narrows, Hibernia, Hampstead, Wickham, Westfield and Bellisle Bay, were the schools heard from.

6. The Sixth District reports 22 schools, 1,140 pupils and 105 teachers. Schools reporting are Head Millstream, Midland, Glenvale, Portage, Lewis Mountain, Cornhill, Newton, Butter-nut Ridge, Steeves Settlement, Waterford, Lower Millstream, Eagle Settlement, Snider Mountain, Taylor Village, Petitcodiac, Coverdale, Sussex, Moncton, Norton, Penobsquis, Apohaqui and Dover.

7. The Seventh District reports 12 schools, 1253 pupils and 106 teachers. Those heard from, are North Head, St. John, West, White Head, Beaver Harbor, Grand Harbor, St. John, East, Wilson's Beach, Lambert's Cove, North Roads, Chocolate Cove, Fair Haven and St. John, North.

You cannot but see by comparing the report offered with that of last year that there is a serious falling off of schools in nearly every district, the total number reporting being 78 schools with 4662 pupils and 413 teachers ; or 15 schools, 1000 pupils, and 90 teachers less than that year.

Your Committee note with pleasure that two of the District Meetings at least are cognisant of our losses, and have appointed committees to look into the matter. Let us hope that the other districts will make an effort to find the true condition of their schools, and this session would be a good time to plan for next year's work.

Fifty-five of the schools are evergreen, while twenty-three close in the winter. While there is no comparative loss in the number of evergreen schools, the number should to be greater. The number of conversions reported are 114 ; while not as many as last year, let us hope that there are those among them who will take hold of this grand work and lighten the burden of those who have been long in the work.

The average attendance of children improves, and while it is apparent that the recommendation of the "Children's Day" proposed last year has not been carried out by many, let us hope that our ministers will give one day in the year at least to the children ; other denominations seem to do it with profit. There are thirty of our schools using books, thirteen are using papers, and twenty-two use both books and papers. Seventy-two out of the seventy-eight use lesson helps of various kinds, while thirty-three schools have pastoral attendance.

Your committee feel that out of the hundred and twenty or more schools supposed to be in the seven districts, more than seventy-eight reports should reach us. Thus very much more is being done than we are able to bring before you. Let us, therefore, instead of getting weary in the Master's cause, work more steadily and earnestly for the salvation of the children, whose hands hold not only the destiny of our churches, but of whom the Master has said, "Of such is the Kingdom of Heaven."

Rev. David Long, Corresponding Secretary of the Executive for Home Missions, submitted the following report :

BROTHER MODERATOR,— The Home Mission Executive, in presenting their annual report, beg leave to say that they have convened three times during the year. The assistance received from the General Secretary, who has a knowledge of the needs of the field, was greatly appreciated by the Executive. The following pastorates and churches have received attention :
In the First District Licentiate J. H. Puddington gave pastoral care to the churches at Arthurette, Long Island, Riley

Brook, Rowena, and Ortonville, besides preaching occasionally at some out-stations. He reports the field so extensive that he had no time for special work. A grant was given to this pastorate.

The Prince William and Queensbury pastorate, in the Third District, has been cared for by Rev. T. O. DeWitt. He reports additions to these churches. A grant was given to this pastorate.

The Stanley-Bloomfield pastorate, also in the Third District, on which Rev. J. N. Barnes has so successfully labored for two years, received a grant of the same amount as last year. We are pleased to learn that he has decided to remain another year.

Licentiate A. H. Williams received some assistance for labor given in the Fourth District, to Greenville, Geary, Waterville, and Battery.

The church at Oromocto, in the Rusiagornis-Lincoln pastorate, received a small grant. Rev. C. B. Lewis is pastor.

Licentiate Fletcher Knollin spent three months with the churches at Wickham and Bald Hill, in the Fifth District. He reports the cause weak. Some aid was given to these churches. Bro. Knollin is now a student at the University at Fredericton.

In the Sixth District the church at Erb Settlement, which is in Norton pastorate, received a small grant. Rev. G. F. Currie is the pastor.

The church at Moncton, to which Rev. E. S. Parker ministered faithfully and successfully, as may be seen by the extensive improvements on the church property, as well as the lessening of the debt, received a grant of the same amount as last year.

Bro. Parker deserves great praise for the good work he accomplished during his four years in Moncton. He has resigned, and is now in Bates' College completing his studies. Rev. Joseph Noble spent six weeks with the Moncton church after Bro. Parker left. He received a small grant.

Licentiate Frank Dunfield spent five months on Campobello in the Seventh District, with the Wilson Beach and North Road churches. A grant was necessary to assist in paying Bro. Dunfield for his labor. He is now a student at the University, Fredericton.

Bro. Allen Rideout, of Hartland, spent six weeks with the churches on Grand Manan. His labors were greatly appreciated. He could not remain longer, having to take charge of his school at Hartland.

These brethren have all labored faithfully, and while we cannot report as much success as we would desire, we believe the good seed sown will bring forth fruit to the glory of God.

The means at the disposal of your Executive were so limited that they could not give assistance to all whom we desired to help. There is need of greater liberality on the part of all our churches toward the Home Mission Fund, as the success of our denomination depends upon our looking after and strengthening our weak interests.

We would recommend the continuance of the office of General Secretary, believing it will be in the best interests of our denomination.

Hon. Mr. Emerson, M. P. P., and Rev. Dr. Gates, delegates from the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces to this Conference, were presented to the conference, and conveyed the greetings of the Baptist Convention.

Rev. G. F. Currie, Corresponding Secretary of the Executive for Foreign Missions, submitted the following report :

BROTHER MODERATOR,—In presenting to the Conference this report, as Corresponding Secretary of the Executive of Foreign Missions, I cannot do other than, as I have done on similar occasions, express deep regret that we are not doing more as a denomination in foreign mission work. We are failing to measure up to the full height of our responsibility in this, the God-appointed work of the church. Such failure means not only the loss of precious souls who might have been rescued, but it means disobedience to our loving Lord, who commissioned us to disciple all nations. The consequences of such a course are, perhaps, far more serious than we know, or than we even care to contemplate and admit.

But wasting time mourning over past mistakes would only be adding another mistake to the long list. No tears nor sighs can call back the lost precious opportunities of the past year. So let us commit to Jesus Christ the work done, and also the work undone, assured that for the good we have His com-

mentations, and for the evil we hope for his loving forgiveness. It is for us now, with new courage, to look up, and look ahead, with present and future privileges confronting us. And if we do we will see what our blessed Lord called the attention of the disciples to when He said: "Say not ye there are yet four months and then cometh harvest. Behold, I say unto you, lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest." Now, the question is, "Are we willing to even look over those whitening harvest fields?" If we could, on the one hand, view the foreign lands as their doors open to us—see the grand triumphs of the gospel, already, in transforming savages to civilized Christians,—recognize the fact that we may give to heathens the one thing they need most, which is the gospel; then, on the other hand, listen to the words of Jesus Christ, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature;" and again, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth," we would at least know our duty, and decide as to what our course shall be in this matter as the opening dawn of another year, with its sturdy demands and grand privileges, open to us.

Is it not true that if the Church is to advance and occupy new ground, or be aggressive at all, she must be aggressive in foreign missions, unless she is satisfied with being merely an aggressive proselyter. What home church does more than care for its own. To do more, in most cases, is to encroach or trespass on the rights of others. In the home land the ground is more than occupied. If we would go into the "regions beyond," and not "build on another man's foundation," if we would "enlarge the place of our tent, lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes," we must go to foreign fields.

The Executive, at a meeting held a year ago at Sussex, after careful consideration, decided to expend \$500.00 for evangelistic work at Bhipore, India, in whatever way Dr. Burkholder thought best. This amount, as shown by the Treasurer's report, has been forwarded, and expended for the opening up of new work, according to the wish of the Executive.

Your Secretary regrets that the annual report of the Free Baptist Mission of India did not reach him in time to enable him to give any account of the work done on the mission field during the past year.

Dear brethren, we ought to be both careful and anxious to fulfil our part in this, the grandest enterprise of the Christian Church, so that we shall have a share in the general rejoicing,

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when all the missionaries will "come again rejoicing bringing their sheaves with them." The last command of Jesus Christ to his followers can be carried out, and if it can be it ought to be. We look to the future hopefully and with courage, believing that the missionary movements of the Christian Church commenced during this century, and increasing in interest and advantages, will never cease until the gospel is preached to every creature.

Rev. J. McLeod, D.D., General Secretary, submitted the following report :

BROTHER MODERATOR,—The General Secretary has been fairly busy. He has gone "to and fro" among the churches somewhat, endeavoring in various ways to help where help seemed needed, carrying out the instructions of Conference as nearly as possible. He has written 226 letters, visited 78 places, helped three pastors in special meetings, preached 107 times, made 22 other addresses, been at 6 district meetings, and attended 61 other meetings, travelling, in his journeyings, 6,022 miles.

The Executive for Home Missions, is the Secretary's Advisory Committee, and what he has done has been under the super-

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vision of that Executive. He has made frequent reports to and had frequent consultations with the Executive, to the members of which he feels much indebted for the thoughtful and sympathetic way in which they have sought to make the work effective.

Many of the things in the life of the churches which have come under the notice of the Secretary are gratifying because they indicate, in an increasing degree, intelligent Christian work, and assure permanency of effects. Of course, there are also things not as they might be.

1. The pastorate system, which in the earlier years, caused no little trouble, is now regarded with favor by both ministers and churches, and is working with a good degree of satisfaction. Some of the churches have not yet quite learned that they should not act independently of the other churches in their pastorates. Where each church clings to its own preference, either in choice of pastor or of other things pertaining to the pastorate, the system is destroyed. No church should alone make or cancel an engagement with a pastor. Such business should always be done by a committee of the pastorate, composed of duly appointed representatives of its churches. If individual churches are unmindful of pastorate obligations, ministers have always the power to correct their errors by declining to make engagements with portions of pastorates. The only way to make the pastorate system successful is for both ministers and churches to loyally observe pastorate boundaries and the other conditions of the system.

Cases like this are found: four churches are in a pastorate. They are not equal in numerical nor financial strength. The pastor is to receive (say) \$400.00. The church that is strongest pays \$100.00, which, because there are four churches in the group it regards as its share. It feels no responsibility beyond one-fourth, even though one or two of the other churches do not—because they cannot—make up an equal amount. In such cases there is a failure to understand the object of grouping the churches into pastorates. The stronger are expected to help the weaker.

It should be understood, too, that the payment of the pastor's salary is as obligation of the pastorate as such. The pastorate committee should make the arrangement with the pastor, and be responsible to him, and then adopt measures to collect the needed amount from the churches.

The habit of deferring the engagement of pastors till Conference, or after, is all too common. So far as possible, all pastoral arrangements should be made before Conference.

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Your Secretary has endeavored to help pastorates in these and other things pertaining to the conduct of their business, and hopes with good effect.

2. Several fields were supplied with mission labor part of the year, with all of which your Secretary had to do.

There is a disposition in some sections to ask aid for weak churches in fairly strong pastorates. Instead of asking aid for the weak church in the pastorate the other churches associated with it should increase their payments sufficiently to make up for the lack of the weak one.

There are new places that we might occupy if we had the men to put into the field; but we are for the present, at least, short of men.

3. We have a faithful ministry. But of the ordained ministers it needs to be remembered that not more than thirty can this year be counted on to undertake full work regularly. There are several others who can and do devote themselves in a considerable degree to the work of the ministry, but do not feel equal to the wear and tear, all the year, of pastoral work. Some others are too old or in too feeble health to do anything, while still others are out of the country for the time being.

The question of ministers' salaries needs attention. The mention of salaries always suggests to some people to say that the "ministers are getting mercenary," etc. But we might as well face the fact that our ministers are not well-supported. The average salary is less than \$400. And yet the very churches which offer so small support are demanding young, well-equipped energetic men, exclusively devoted to the work of the ministry. The support given is not such as our people generally are able to give. There is, surely, need of better and more scriptural views of both the obligations and privileges of the Christian life, in the support of the Lord's cause.

4. Early in the year it was decided to endeavour to introduce a new system of securing contributions to the several branches of work under the direct control of this Conference. To the Secretary was intrusted the duty of preparing and distributing the necessary literature, and to give the churches such instructions as was needed in carrying out the plans proposed. The plan sought to be introduced is that known as "the card system," which, when carefully attended to, has produced excellent results. The churches were provided with everything necessary in carrying out the plan. Copies of the cards, envelopes and circulars issued are presented herewith.

How many of the churches have adopted the system your Secretary is unable to say, but there is reason to fear that the

attempt to carry out the plan has not been as general as was hoped for. It would appear, though, that so much as has been done has had the effect of stimulating the churches, for the number contributing to Conference enterprises is considerably increased.

One thing must be plain to everyone who has given thought to the matter — that some system of keeping the work of the denomination before all our people, and of regularly appealing to them for help, is absolutely necessary. For want of it the work languishes, and some branches of it have been almost wholly neglected. Whether the system tried this year, or another is the better one, is a matter of opinion; the thing of importance is that some good system be carried out in every church. Our people are not poor; as one church report this year said, "Not so poor as they think." We, perhaps, have as small a proportion of really poor people as any Christian body in the province. They simply need teaching—more and faithful teaching as to the duty and blessedness of the better support of every department of Christian service; and system—a well-defined plan of paying into the treasury of the Lord. Increase of system does not, as some have thought, mean less spirituality, but more, and that more intelligently and effectively directed.

5. There are forty pastorates, located as to districts, thus: First District, 2; Second District, 6; Third District, 8; Fourth District, 4; Fifth District, 4; Sixth District, 8; Seventh District, 8.

At this writing twelve of these pastorates are not provided with pastors for next year. The whole of the First District is unprovided for; six churches in the Third District; five in the Fourth District; five in the Fifth District; twelve in the Sixth District; and seven in the Seventh District, have not secured pastors.

The First District is in pressing need of judicious pastoral care. To conserve our interests there we must not only have the right men in the field, but must guarantee them adequate support. Unless we do this we must every year suffer loss that can never be recovered.

The Grand Manan churches, also, are in pressing need of pastoral care. The work done during the year by Bro. Nobles in two weeks of evangelistic meetings, by Bro. Rideout in all the churches during the summer months, was good so far as it went, and was appreciated by the churches; but the conditions on the island are such that the churches must have the constant care of a settled pastor or they will continue to suffer and weaken.

Some of the pastorates might be changed with advantage.

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During the year, Rev. A. W. Currie, of the N. S. Conference, was secured for McAdam. We have no church there, but have a considerable number of people. There is a union church building, and the people of several denominations worship and do Christian work together, with Bro. Currie as pastor.

Rev. B. H. Nobles, pastor of the Sussex church, spent several weeks in evangelistic work—the places visited being St. John (Waterloo street) Campobello and Grand Manan. His labors were blessed. The great regret was that the time he was able to devote to the work was so limited.

If some pastors might follow the example of the Sussex pastor, devoting each a few weeks to evangelistic work, great good would doubtless result.

The foregoing is scarcely a report of work done, and only a partial statement of observations made and impressions received. The work endeavored to be done is of a kind difficult to put into a report. It is quite clear to your Secretary, however, that there is need of constant supervision of some features of the work of the denomination; and that though results may not be immediately apparent to the casual observer, good results will attend upon such work.

Rev. G. W. Foster, from the Committee on Temperance, submitted the following report:

BROTHER MODERATOR,—The position of this Conference on the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic has always been so unequivocal, and is so well and widely known, that to restate it is unnecessary; we simply re-affirm it.

The present is a momentous time in the history of the prohibition movement in Canada. The attitude of the government towards the liquor traffic, as revealed in the declaration of its disregard of the voice of the electorate in the plebiscite, makes a crisis which calls upon the temperance people of the country to express with clearness and emphasis their strong dissatisfaction with the government's action, and their purpose in the premises. The position taken by them now will determine the future of the prohibition movement in this country—whether it is to be steadily on to victory, or to be made the play-thing of political parties.

The vote polled in favor of prohibition was not small ; it was, to quote the Premier, " under the circumstances, a remarkably large one." It was a pure and unselfish vote, and in view of the many and unscrupulous forces arrayed against prohibition, the majority over the total liquor vote was gratifyingly large and decisive. A striking result of the plebiscite is that not only a majority of 14,000 electors voted for prohibition, but a large majority of the electoral districts of the country declared in favor of it. Of the 213 members of Parliament, classified according to the votes of their constituencies in the plebiscite, 128 represent constituencies favorable to prohibition. A political party having like support would have a majority of forty-three members in Parliament.

The temperance people of Canada did not ask for a plebiscite ; but when it was offered they accepted it in good faith, having been led to believe that the vote would decide the question at issue, and that the decision of the ballot boxes would be accepted and carried out by the government and parliament. There was no intimation to the electors that, besides those who voted against prohibition, all who failed to vote would be counted as opposed to it. Had it been announced that prohibitionists would be required to secure a majority of the registered voters, they would have refused to have anything to do with the plebiscite, because to secure such a majority for any cause is an impossibility. The announcement after the vote, that it had been the intention from the first to count the unpolled votes as anti-prohibition votes, cannot be regarded as other than such a trifling with the electorate as deserves repudiation.

For many years appeals, in various forms, have been made to Parliament to enact prohibition of the liquor traffic. In all these this Conference has heartily joined. Several times Parliament, in response to these appeals, has declared that to prohibit the liquor traffic is the only right and effective way of dealing with it, and has said that when public opinion was shown to be in favor of it, a prohibitory law would be enacted. The expression of public opinion in the plebiscite was sufficiently substantial to have embodiment in prohibitory legislation ; and we must, in faithfulness to the principles for which we stand, put on record strong condemnation of the refusal to keep faith with the people in this matter.

There are indications that the electorate may soon be called upon to elect Parliamentary representatives. Whether it be soon or longer delayed, the duty of prohibitionists is to be ready to make a more united and determined effort than ever before

to be represented in Parliament by men who shall correctly and faithfully voice and vote for prohibition sentiments and purposes.

It is the duty of prohibition electors in every constituency to confer and resolve upon the action necessary to secure Parliamentary representation; and this Conference urges all our people to co-operate in such movements, and to press the prohibition issue in every election—Federal, Provincial and Municipal—and to support only such candidates as are thoroughly trustworthy on this question.

A wrong or faltering step now by Christians will inflict an injury on the great cause, from which it would not recover in generations—if ever. It is their duty to “stand fast” in their loyalty to the prohibition cause, and to “press forward” for the triumph of righteousness, which is not far off if God’s people are faithful.

This Conference expects every minister to be a faithful teacher and leader in the great reform; every church to be the centre of influences which shall find expression in Christian citizenship, and every member an unwavering and brave supporter of the men and the measures that are set for the delegalization and final overthrow of the greatest foe to Christ’s church—the liquor traffic.

The illness of Mrs. Dr. McLeod was tenderly referred to by the President, and prayer was offered, led by Miss Jane Harper. Adjourned to meet on Tuesday, October 10, at 10 a. m.

PUBLIC MEETING.

Opened at 3 p. m., on Monday by singing "Throw out the Life-Line." President, Mrs. J. S. Smith, in the chair. Scripture reading by Mrs. J. W. Clarke, and prayer by Miss Jane Weyman. The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. C. W. Weyman, read her report as follows:

MADAME PRESIDENT AND SISTERS,—Time with unerring precision brings us to the close of another year, and it becomes my duty to help you review the past year's work. Much has been done both at home and in the foreign field which we can tabulate and review, more has been accomplished during the year which will never be known until we stand before the great white throne and the secrets of all hearts are revealed. Our work, as you know, lies at Ujurda, some twenty miles distant from Balasore. Thirteen years ago, as we met in this church, we had with us our beloved Bro. Boyer and his wife, who were just on the eve of their departure to India, together with Miss Hooper, who had been home on furlough. Shortly after Bro. Boyer's arrival in India he wrote the Woman's Board, asking them to take up this work at Ujurda, an entire heathen community. The Board complied with the request, and have had the full care of the work there since. We have now a Christian community of forty-eight, with a church membership of twenty. Over this

church our native preacher, Bro. Elliston Saren, has charge. We also have a Sabbath school, prayer-meetings, day school, colporteur, and Bible-women at work. Miss Gaunce has built and completed a comfortable bungalow or house, in which the missionary can live during her stay among the people, and also one large room is fitted up as a place of worship. She has also at considerable expense sunk a well, from which they get good water; and this well has proved a great blessing, as before they had nothing but dirty water from the tank to use. Among this people Miss Gaunce is doing a great work. As one missionary has said, "She is to them father, mother, teacher, lawyer and judge." She has gained for herself the full confidence of all the people, and is doing an excellent work for God and the church. In reviewing the work, we feel like exclaiming, "What hath God wrought!" And with the Psalmist saying, "Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me bless his holy name."

Speaking of the work at Ujurda, Miss Gaunce, in the annual Indian, report says:

"During the year, from time to time I have made trips to this village. Mishra, a colporteur, and two Balasore Bible-women, Sukha and Miriam, spent some weeks among the people and visited the adjoining villages. There are several markets, the largest of which is held twice a week at Singhla, about two miles from Ujurda. Hundreds of people attend this market, which affords a good opportunity for the preaching and teaching of the word. The Ujurda pastor carries on this work, and in the coming year I hope he may be assisted by the Christian teacher, who has lately been engaged for the day school. By reason of not employing a Hindu teacher the Hindu children, with the exception of one, do not attend school.

The quarterly meeting of Balasore district was held in February last with the Ujurda church. The Christians had been looking forward to it for weeks. During the meetings, for the first time in Ujurda, the Christian marriage ceremony was celebrated. The bridegroom was one of the Christian young men of the village; the bride, one of the girls of Sinclair Orphanage.

"On Sunday, last day of the meetings, seven persons belonging to the Christian community were baptized and joined the church.

"The Hindus of the village have a desire to become Christians. One from among them went so far as to cast off his beads and eat with the Christians. His friends, on learning of it, became displeased, and have resolved to pay the necessary sum of money in order for him to regain his caste.

"The majority of the Hindus are friendly to us. They not infrequently come to the missionary with their troubles. One of

the zemindars is often very unjust in the treatment of the *ryots* (tenants). If they do not do as he bids them they are punished. It is the old story of the rich grinding the poor, the strong trampling on the weak. Their oppression at times is a cause of just indignation. On account of their poverty the people generally submit to what is put upon them.

"The Sunday morning service and Sunday school are attended by nearly all in the Christian community. The prayer meetings through the week continue, the woman's meeting being well attended. Not all that happens is bright and encouraging, nor is everything dark and discouraging. The picture has its lights and shades; so in our work among the people we must expect sunshine and clouds.

"This spring the masonry of the house was completed. On its completion I felt like holding a thanksgiving service. We did have a prayer-meeting which was attended, with the exception of three or four, by all the Christian community. I ought not to allow the reader to think that the prayer-meeting alone drew this number, as at the close of the meeting the Christmas gifts were distributed.

"During the year death has entered the community and carried away two of its members, one of whom was Bonmali Ma. I miss her kindly old face. She had a habit, when she came to welcome me, of bringing flowers and putting them into my hand.

"Now the sowing and the weeping, afterwards the "reaping and rejoicing. When the Lord of the harvest comes, may he find us faithful to the trust he has given us."

As you know, at our annual meeting last year it was reported Sister Gaunce was assisting Mrs. Smith in Sinclair Orphanage at Balasore. Since then, Sister Smith, whom we loved for her work's sake, has gone "to be forever with the Lord," and Miss Gaunce has been called to the responsible position of superintendent of Sinclair Orphanage. It was by request of the Indian Committee and the American Ladies Board that Miss Gaunce assumed this responsible position; and she has as usual given satisfaction and gained for herself the love and respect of her pupils. The American Ladies Board have written, requesting your Board to allow Miss Gaunce to continue this work, speaking appreciative words of the excellent work she has been permitted to do during the year just closed. Our missionary has the love and esteem of all her fellow-laborers in India.

Of Sinclair Orphanage and the Bible-women, Miss Gaunce reports as follows:

"*Numbers.*—Including boarders there are forty children in.

the orphanage. During the year six new children have been admitted, one has died, two have married, and three have returned to their friends. One of the three, much to our regret, was by stratagem taken away by her mother. We can only hope that the teaching she received may not be forgotten.

"*Health.*—The general health of the children has been good. The spirit of helpfulness and kindness which pervades the school is a cause for thankfulness.

"*Religious Instruction.*—Every morning and evening prayers are conducted, generally by one of the elder girls. The Scripture reading for morning prayers is the Sunday-school subject for the following Sunday. This is studied by all. Even the tots are supposed to tell something about the lesson, and commit to memory the golden text.

"*C. E. Society.*—During the year a C. E. Society for the elder girls was organized. This meets Tuesday evening, and on Thursday evening all come to my room for prayer-meeting. Five have been baptized, and the testimonies of others give me hope that more will soon be ready publicly to acknowledge Christ as their Saviour.

"*Study.*—There is a regular study hour in the morning and another in the evening, during term time for all the children. At the last vernacular examination, one girl passed in the first division. She is now employed as a teacher in the girls' school. Three girls passed the upper primary examination, two being in the first division, and four passed the lower primary examination, all in the first division. At present three of the girls are employed as teachers and are self-supporting.

"*Work.*—The girls do their own cooking, keep the house and yard clean, and make most of their own clothes. During vacation the elder girls crochet lace for sale. The demand for it has not been equal to the supply, so it can hardly be said to be remunerative.

"*Items.*—The youngest member of our family of girls is Kusuma, aged two and a half years. She is the pet of the whole school, and seems to think very much of her sisters, as she calls the girls.

"Before closing the report I wish to make mention of the influence of the teacher, Rachel Das, upon the girls. Such a person as she is, is to be highly prized.

"In my work with the girls I have learned to love them, not because it was my duty, but for themselves. God bless each one of them, from the eldest to the youngest; and when He comes for His own, may they be found among those who will sit down with Him in His kingdom.

"*Bible-Women.*—On account of the orphanage I have been obliged to give up my work in the Hindu villages with the Bible-women. At present there are eight Bible-women, supported as follows: four by the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission, London; two by the F. B. W. M. Society of the United States; and two by the F. B. W. F. M. Society of New Brunswick.

"During the cold season two of the women spent four weeks in the country, going from village to village, and from house to house, teaching and explaining the Word. Rebecca, another Bible-reader, did several months' work in Chandbali. The women say, that within the last six years, there has been a marked change among many of the Hindu women. Several in secret have accepted Christianity; and in other Hindu homes the women regularly ask them to have prayers, not only with one or two of the household, but with all the women.

"One Bible-woman, Miriam, reports that from the 1st of July, 1898, to the 1st of May, 1899, she visited 152 villages, entered 392 houses, and spoke to 7416 people. She is one of our faithful Bible-readers, and may many through her efforts be led to accept Christ as their Saviour.

"Last year the women studied the Blakeslee lessons on the Apostolic church, and passed their examination. They are now studying the life of Christ."

During the year Miss Gaunce has been called to pass through a severe affliction in the death of her beloved mother,—an earnest faithful Christian woman, and a most tender, kind and loving mother. Yet amidst all this trial she has been graciously sustained by our Heavenly Father, who has said, "Lo, I am with you alway," and "My grace is sufficient for thee." We beseech of you, sisters and friends, to earnestly pray for our dear Sister Gaunce in this time of her bereavement that she may be kept, and that she may realize, as never before, the precious promises of Him who has said, "As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you."

Home Work. As I have before repeatedly stated this is one of the most interesting features of our work, and your secretary earnestly hopes that the day is not far distant when we will be able or willing rather to support a missionary at home. At our last annual session a grant of one hundred dollars was made to the Conference Home Mission Executive to enable them to assist weak churches and build up the cause at home. We also granted a small sum to our column and to the committee on missionary literature. This, we believe, is one of the most necessary and fruitful parts of our work. As we cannot do successful work in

the foreign field until our people at home are made acquainted with the work and its needs, and this can best be done by supplying our people with our own paper and by missionary literature.

Sisters, let us not grow weary in well doing. Let us undertake greater things for the Master. Listen to the cry of the millions who sit in heathen darkness, who are looking to us for the bread of life. Let us consecrate ourselves anew to this great work, "and the Lord, He it is that doth go before thee; He will be with thee, He will not fail thee, neither forsake thee; fear not, neither be dismayed."

The Home Secretary, Mrs. H. Hartt, read the following report :

MADAME PRESIDENT, — The wheels of time have rapidly borne us on to the close of another year's history of our Society, and we meet to-day in its twenty fourth annual session to take into account, as best we can, what has been accomplished and to make arrangements for the future. While evidently we have not done what we should, yet it is a pleasure to state that more money has been raised than during any preceding year. This conclusively proves that the sisters value their own religion, and hence sacrifice that others may enjoy its benefits. It is quite easy to record the money received, but to take note of the faithful labor in various lines, the sacrifices made to attend prayer-meetings, and the effectual fervent prayers that have ascended to high heaven in behalf of our loved cause, is not so easily done, but it is all known to Him who takes cognizance of all our ways. All the districts, with the exception of one, have exceeded last year's contributions.

First District.—This society has raised, as usual, only a small amount. Perhaps if our denominational paper found its way into more families there would be more missionary societies among the churches. Genuine Free Baptists (New Brunswick) are supposed to read the *Intelligencer*, and also to contribute to the mission cause. May the day soon dawn when the sisters of this district will realize their responsibility to God in improving upon the great privilege of aiding in the evangelization of heathen lands. There are, however, a few faithful ones who are willing to do what they can. Three societies are reported as follows :

Bath, \$11.00; Lower Perth holds monthly meetings, \$9.00; Arthurette, \$2.90; Mrs. Perry, \$1.00; collection, 60c.; total, \$24.50.

Second District.—This society is the banner district, having given a larger sum than any other. Eighteen societies have been reported. Woodstock auxiliary is in a flourishing condition, holds monthly prayer-meetings, raises the money by subscription, mite boxes and contributions; has 44 members, sends \$67.68. Hartland holds monthly prayer-meetings; has 12 members, sends \$13.95. Knoxville holds monthly prayer-meeting, sends \$8.59. Waterville holds prayer-meetings in connection with Third Tier; has 15 members, sends \$18.25. Third Tier has 9 members, sends \$25.35, \$17.00 of which goes to support a Bible woman.

The auxiliary at Connell is doing good work among the children. Holds its meetings quarterly, had a missionary concert, and raised \$5.00 towards the support of a Bible woman. It has 8 members and gives \$17.25.

Tracey auxiliary has resuscitated its prayer-meeting. There has been a decrease of four in membership during the year; they send \$26.84. Charleston raised \$2.55; Gordonsville, \$1.00. Windsor sends \$2.59, obtained by a child's mite box and collections. Lower Brighton has 15 members, sends \$17.70; Lindsay sends \$4.05; Victoria Corner sends \$16.00, two of which go towards supporting a Bible woman; Pembroke sends \$7.00; Knowlesville sends \$8.45; Rockland sends \$3.25; Somerville sends \$4.00; Upper Brighton sends \$4.30; total, \$260.35. Six dollars of this amount was given to home missions, and by vote of the society were given to Elder Noble. Twenty dollars were given by some of the sisters in addition to their regular subscription for the support of a Bible woman.

The president and secretary, accompanied by some sisters from Connell, visited Knoxville and Charleston, and formed a society at each place.

We take this opportunity to place on record the high appreciation of Sister Phillips, and our deep sense of loss at her removal. Words fail to express what our hearts feel. Year by year we have met in our annual gatherings, and side by side worked for the mission cause. She goes attended by the good wishes of all her co-workers.

Third District.—The secretary writes that "it is with interest that we look over the reports of our auxiliary societies and find an increase of interest manifest. For this growth we are thankful to Our Heavenly Father, and pray that each may give

willingly of that entrusted to us." Marysville reports a regular monthly meeting well attended, have 23 members, gives \$25.03. Frederickton is in a flourishing condition; holds regular monthly meetings, reports an increase of five in membership, has 29 members and sends \$54.66, exceeds last year's contributions by \$20.00; Bloomfield, \$6.00; The auxiliary at Southampton reports 7 members and sends \$7.00; Stanley has 6 members and sends \$6.00. Gibson auxiliary holds monthly meetings, has 12 members and sends \$12.00; Keswick reports 6 members and sends \$8.00; Kingsley, 50c.; Upper Hainesville has 2 members, sends \$3.00; collection, \$5.55; total, \$127.74.

Fourth District.—The secretary from this society writes that the reports show there are some faithful workers. No prayer-meetings are reported. Ten churches reported: Blissville has 16 members, sends \$23.45; Frederickton Junction has 9 members, sends \$15.25; Patterson Settlement has 3 members, sends \$9.15; Clarendon has two members, sends \$4.75; Rusiagornish collected \$7.45; Lincoln, \$1.00; Gagetown, collected by S. S. children, \$3.97; Junior C. E. Society, 43c.; Mill Settlement, \$2.75; Miss Lizzie Perley, Boston, \$1.00; Otnabog, \$3.67; collection at public meeting, \$2.58; total, \$78.00.

Fifth District.—This district contains some of our most intelligent and earnest workers, and doubtless the public meeting of this year, which was largely attended, will be conducive of larger contributions another year. Central Hampstead auxiliary holds monthly meetings in the winter and gives \$11.56; Wickham gives \$2.60; Carpenter gives \$4.25; Tenant's Cove gives \$1.50; Society at the Narrows gives \$5.30; Shannon gives \$2.50; Perry's Point gives \$6.25; Upper Hampstead gives \$11.00. The secretary from this society says: "She often wonders at the thoughtless remarks made by some when approached on this subject." Hibernia society failed to get last year's money to the treasurer, sends \$21.71; \$13.00 of this goes to the support of an orphan they have adopted; Brown's Flat, \$2.75; Bethany sends 32c.; half of collection at public meeting, \$2.30; total \$76.14.

Sixth District.—In this society seventeen reports were received. Some show a slight decrease, occasioned, no doubt, by death or removals, as in Apohaqui, which lost two by death and one moved away; also Taylor Village lost by death Mrs. Cochrane and Mrs. Taylor, who have done faithful work for twenty-three years. "They rest from their labors and their work do follow them." Other societies have increased their contributions. The new society at Newtown holds monthly

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meetings, has 12 members, gives \$17.02; Petitcodiac sends \$10.08; Midland sends \$8.80; Millstream Mountain sends \$5.25; Norton Station sends \$7.55; Penobsquis sends \$9.55; Cornhill sends \$21.00; Snider Mountain sends \$4.10; Lower Millstream sends \$15.50; Sussex sends \$39.00; Apohaqui sends \$8.55; Graves Settlement sends \$2.60; Dover sends \$6.40; Lower Ridge sends \$7.45; Dutch Valley sends \$4.30; Taylor Village sends \$6.00; Coverdale sends \$8.60; Moncton, holds monthly prayer-meetings, sends \$3.50; Lower Millstream Mission Band, \$5.99. Since coming to Conference I received from a lady \$25.00 and \$3.50; total, \$219.74. Two mission bands are reported, and other children give with older members. The Secretary regards this as a hopeful sign; as the future of the society will depend on the children.

Seventh District.—This society, as usual, has done nobly, when we consider the small number of churches it contains; however, it is the only district that has not exceeded last year's contribution; otherwise would have been the case had it not been one society that contributed eleven dollars last year was not heard from. Upon the suggestion of the W. F. M. the annual sermon preached at this district is to be a missionary sermon. The secretary expresses the hope that this will give the work such an impetus that will send it into all the churches which comprise the district. The auxiliary at Wilson's Beach report a membership of seventeen, they meet for prayer once a fortnight. This society was organized fourteen years ago and have the same staff of officers; it sends \$26.70. The society at North Head has 14 members, sends \$14.00. The society at St. John holds monthly meetings, have 22 members, and gives \$26.69, inclusive of \$3.69 contributed by the infant class and \$1.00 by Mrs. O'Brien's class. The auxiliary at St. John, North End, holds monthly meetings, and rejoice in a Mission Band, which contributed \$3.15. It has a membership of 20, and sends \$31.50.

St. John, West, auxiliary holds monthly meetings, in which collections are taken; they have also circulated a number of mite boxes among the families of the church, which is a great help in raising their contributions; it has a membership of 16, and sends \$40.81. In addition to this the C. E. Society gives \$10.00, \$6.00 of which was sent to the treasurer of the Widows' Home in India, and \$4.00 purchased a share in Miss Barnes' salary. She is sent by W. F. M. of the United States and supported by the children. Castalia, Grand Manan, sends \$3.30; Beaver Harbor sends \$2.00; Rev. Mr. Harvey, \$1.00; Mrs.

Wiggins, \$1.00; Mrs. W. Kendrick, \$1.00; collection, 7 churches, \$10.00. A new society of eleven members was organized at Lambert's Cove by Mrs. Paul. The secretary hopes to have a good report from there next year. Total from this society is \$168.00; Mrs. W. Uniacke, \$25.00; grand total, \$1,018.35.

In raising this money we are largely indebted to the missionary column, where the needs of the work are brought before us and also the knowledge of what others are doing, which becomes an inspiration to us to assist in this glorious work. We are saddened indeed to learn of the illness of our recording secretary, who for twenty-two years, with only a few exceptions, has competently filled her position in this Society. That she may speedily be restored to health is, I am sure, the sincere prayer of each one of us.

One thousand and eighteen dollars and thirty-five cents to help evangelize the dark regions of the earth! Let us pause a moment and consider it. If our love to God is measured by what we do, can we meet the King in His beauty and look in His dear face and say we have done what we could? If I go to every pew and ask every occupant, Have you done what you could? would you be willing to have your love measured by your works? If not, let us be up and do with our might what our hands find to do.

Miss A. Gertrude Hartley, of St. John, West, then read an excellent review of Sheldon's "In His Steps," which was followed by an interesting discussion on the book.

Treasurer T. A. Lindsay read his report, which shows balance on hand in all the funds of \$1,488.99.

On motion this report was ordered to the Auditor.

The Corresponding Secretary, Rev. F. C. Hartley, submitted his report, which was on motion adopted :

I desire to present a brief report of the work done by the Secretary and Executive of the League since our annual session. Acting on advice and by order of the League the Secretary wrote Rev. G. E. Hamlin and Miss Lizzie Gaunce in reference to the Orphanage expenditure. The letters received in reply, with others, were placed before the Executive at a meeting held in Woodstock. After a full discussion of the matter the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) be forwarded to the Indian committee, to be expended by them in improving the compound at Balasore, so as to provide the best possible accommodation for the Orphanage; and further

Resolved, That we request in return that the house now used by the Orphanage be placed at the disposal of our missionary when needed.

As this action is subject to approval of Executive of General Conference, nothing more can be done in the matter until after the meeting of the Conference Executive.

The Free Baptist Young People's Societies of the United States held their annual meeting last August at Ocean Park.

A letter of Christian greeting was forwarded to this meeting, also a report of our work in this province.

Bro. Henry Myers, the General Secretary of the United States societies, was present at the session of General Conference held at Sussex and had several conferences with the Executive of the League. Meetings were arranged for him at St. John, Fredericton and Woodstock. These services were well attended and no doubt productive of good.

In March a circular letter was prepared. This letter called the attention of the societies to the week of prayer and self-denial, and asked an universal observance. The attention of societies was also directed to the action of the League in educational and missionary matters.

During the year the Secretary had had the pleasure of addressing meetings at Marysville, Gibson, Fredericton, Gagetown, St. John, West, and Fredericton Junction. In June the Secretary, accompanied by Bros. Gregg and Lindsay, re-organized the society at Fredericton Junction. A report has also been received from a society organized during the year at Sussex, and from other sources information has been received concerning societies organized at Norton and Corn Hill.

In closing, I would say that reports have been received from twelve societies. While this is an improvement on other years, yet it does not furnish sufficient data to present any satisfactory statistics in reference to our work. It is to be hoped that another year each society will be careful to forward a report to the Secretary as soon as possible. If this were done, much of the time of the League might be saved and the report of the Summary Committee made considerably easier.

The programme, as presented this year, has had the careful thought of the Executive and cannot but be helpful to us all.

The Summarizing Committee submitted the following report:

1. On examination of the roll we find that some time in the history of our League forty societies have reported, seven of which are now known to be dormant, viz., Middle Southampton, Hartland, Beechwood, Tracy Station, Waasis, Keswick and Blissville. Of the following societies we have no information: Upper Gagetown, Seal Cove, Lily Lake, Upper Hainesville, South Wakefield, Brown's Flats, Oromocto, Canterbury, Patterson Settlement, Bath, Arthurette, Taylor Village, Lower Prince William, Eel River, Whitehead, Norton, Cornhill and Moncton. With regard to these societies we would recommend that this Convention take steps to ascertain the reason of their not reporting, and to remedy the same.

2. Fifteen societies have reported, showing a total active membership of 463; associate members 166; total of 629. During the year the increase in membership has been 72; 40 have been converted and joined the church; 354 attend the regular meetings of the society; 307 attend the weekly prayer-meetings of the church; 521 attend Sabbath School.

3. Funds raised were: For missions, \$132.07; education, \$51.68; miscellaneous purposes, \$305.70; total, \$489.45.
