HOME MISSION AND CONTINGENT FUND.

QUESTION XIII.

What are the resolutions of the Conference respecting the Home Mission and Contingent Fund?

3. The Chairmen of the several Districts are authorized and instructed to call the attention of the ensuing Financial District Meetings to the importance of uniformity of action in regard to this and other Connexional Funds, according to the published regulations, and to make very particular enquiries at the May District Meetings in order to ascertain whether each Minister has faithfully attended to the regulations of the Conference designed to secure in every congregation, and in every class, due consideration of the claims of this Fund upon their Christian liberality, and to report to the Conference the name of any Brother who shall appear to have been negligent.

4. That the Committee for the ensuing year shall consist of the President or Co-Delegate, the Secretary of the Conference, the Treasurers and Secretary of the Children's Fund, the Financial Secretaries of the respective Districts, and Rey'd. E. Botterell,

MOUNT ALLISON WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

QUESTION XVIII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the proposed establishment of a College at Sackville?

ANSWER.

The Conference fully concurring in the conclusions of the Board of Trustees of the Academy, that, although in view of

the great business depression which is prevailing almost every where throughout these Provinces, and of the pressure of various other Connexional schemes upon the liberality of our people, it is expedient to postpone the attempt for the present to establish a College proper, with all its departments, yet it is the imperative duty of our Connexion to make immediate provision for the establishment of the Theological department of the proposed Institution, in order that provision may be made for the suitable educational training of Candidates for our Ministry:

Resolved, (1.) That for the accomplishment of this object subscriptions shall be sought throughout the Connexion, to be payable one half in May and the other half in October 1860, to constitute an Endowment Fund, to aid in the maintenance of a Theological Professorship, to be established by the Conference, at Sackville, and to be designated, in honour of the late C. F. Allison, Esq., "The Charles F. Allison Pro-

FESSORSHIP."

(2.) That annual subscriptions of not less than one pound, Nova Scotia currency, for a period of not less than ten years, be received to aid in the endowment and maintenance of the proposed Theological School.

(3.) That the President, the Co-Delegate, and the Secre-

MOUNT ALLISON WESLEYAN ACADEMY.

QUESTION XIX.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference in reference to the Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy, Sackville?

ANSWER.

1. That the Report of the Board of Trustees relative to the condition and operation of both branches of the Academy during the past year, is, as it respects every department of the Institution, satisfactory, and that it be therefore adopted.

2. That the Conference feels itself called upon to mourn the absence from the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Academy, of one to whom the honour must be assigned of having taken the foremost place in the work of Christian education in these Provinces. It records with deep solemnity and sorrow, yet with unmurmuring resignation to the Divine will, the removal by death, since our last session, of the benevolent founder and, till the period of his death, the warmest friend of the Academy, Charles F. Allison, Esq.

Actuated, as it is believed he was, by the purest motives—those which are supplied by the Word and the Spirit of God—and discerning with the penetrating sagacity of an intelligent and christian patriot the necessity which existed for an Educational Establishment, which should combine a system of therough tuition with a sound and scriptural dis-

cipline, for the youth of his native land, and especially for those belonging to the denomination of Christians with which he himself was connected, he gave the first impulse to the formation of such Institution—contributed largely of his means towards its erection and support, and by his wise counsels, encouraging oversight, and unwearied assiduity, succeeded in carrying to a high state of efficiency one of the noblest and most useful seminaries of British North America.

The Conference had hoped that the presence of their late friend would have long been permitted among them, not only to further those interests with which he was peculiarly identified, but also to benefit the other schemes of our youthful Connexion. Yet as He, in whose sight the death of His saints is precious, had otherwise determined, it bows to the chastening rod with meek submission, satisfied that the bereavement was dictated by Infinite wisdom and mercy; and rejoicing to know that the dying hour of their brother was eminently peaceful—as they are also persuaded that his present state of existence is one of ineffable and continually increasing joy. For surely if it be true in any case it must be in his, that "blessed are the dead which die in the Lord, for they rest from their labours, and their works do follow them."

3. That the Conference desires to express its sympathy with the relict of the late Mr. Allison in her mournful be-reavement, and offers its fervent prayers that the consolations of Divine grace may be abundantly vouchsafed to herself and daughter, from Him who is a "father to the fatherless, and a husband to the widow." And it further directs that a copy of the above Resolutions be conveyed from the Con-

ference to Mrs. Allison.

4. That the cordial thanks of the Conference are hereby presented to the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., Principal of the Male Department—under whose judicious management and untiring labours for so many years, that Branch of the Institution has been brought into a state of great efficiency—for his continued and successful services during the past year.

5. That the hearty thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. J. Allison, B.A., Principal of the Female Academy, and to his estimable lady, Mrs. Allison, B.A., the preceptress,—under whose united auspices this department has been raised to its present high position—for the indefatigable

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manner in which they have discharged the duties devolving upon them during the last year.

6. The Conference would again embrace the opportunity of recommending these Institutions to the patronage of all those within its bounds who have the care of the rising generation. The results already achieved by the blessing of God are such as to warrant the confidence of parents and guardians, who may desire for their youthful charge an education at once comprehensive, economical, and religious. These advantages, it is believed, can nowhere be better, if so well, secured as at the Mount Allison Academy, Sackville,

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THE PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN:

In the name of our adorable Redeemer, the Head of the Church, we again salute you, desiring above all things that "grace and peace may be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus our Lord.'

Among the various duties which in our associated relation to you devolve upon us, there are none more sacred and delightful than this—of addressing you upon the subject of the "common salvation," and on such topics of kindred interest as have passed under our review during the sittings of

Conference.

Cherishing sentiments of gratitude to God for our conversion, and for the privilege of proclaiming His message of mercy to our fellow men, we are also bound to give thanks on your behalf "because when ye received the Word of God, which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the Word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe." Bear with us, therefore, while, with deep solicitude for your spiritual prosperity and for your eternal happiness, we exhort that as you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, even so should you walk in Him. Let it be your constant aim to serve and glorify God with your body and your spirit, which are His. Endeavor to hallow the secular affairs of this life no less than the circumstances of Divine worship, by a direct reference to the Revealed Will of the Most High. In a word, "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord:" and whatever may be the obstacles which arise in the prosecution of your various duties remember that in "due time you shall reap if you faint not," for "he that endureth to the end shall be saved."

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Were it necessary to present other inducements to stimulate your ardor in the pursuit of the higher attainments of the Christian life, they might be found in the Divine intention respecting the Church, and in the gifts and graces with which the Holy Spirit has enriched all true believers. "Ye are my witnesses," saith Jehovah, designating His people on earth to a position of greater dignity and responsibility than that assigned to any other creature or race in existence;—"but ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people, that ye should show forth the praises of Him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvellous light."

The fact of the redemption by Christ Jesus is also a motive of the highest value and most abiding efficacy towards the attainment and exemplification of a matured Christian character. Costly beyond comparison was the sacrifice which He offered "once for all,"—unlimited also in the extent of its influence—embracing us because it excludes none; and ample in its resources to save even unto the uttermost, it lays us under the strongest obligations to love the Saviour, and zealously to promote His cause in the world,—"Because we thus judge that if one died for all then were all dead, and that He died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto Him who died for them and rose again."

Do not attempt to devolve upon others what you can as well perform yourselves; and let not your expectations of success be associated only with some particular instrumentality. To disclaim all glory for man, and to ascribe it all to God, is indispensable to our prosperity in His cause.

We are rejoiced to announce that the number of those in Church fellowship with us has been again increased during the past year. Upwards of thirteen hundred souls have been added as full and accredited members to our Church, and to these must be further added two thousand who have given evidence of a desire to flee from the wrath to come, and are

received by us on trial for membership.

It is also matter of gratitude that our various Connexional Funds have been slightly augmented, and in some instances the receipts evince a large-hearted liberality fully answering our expectations concerning them; yet, in general, we cannot but regret, from the small average of the contributions to these Funds, that their importance to the prosperity of the work of God Non are ity V tend

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instances inswering we cannot is to these e work of God amongst us should seem to be so much underrated. None of them exist but for purposes of necessity; and they are so regulated as to meet the New Testament rule of equality between those who give and those who receive.

We especially commend to your liberality the fund for extending our Home Missions, and that for the aid of Supernumerary Ministers, and their Widows and Orphan children, both of which require a better support than has yet been

afforded to them.

It is gratifying for us to report that our Educational Institutions at Sackville have been maintained in a state of efficiency throughout the last year. Many young persons of both sexes continue to derive the superior advantages, literary and religious, which the course of tuition there is designed to impart, -and we most heartily commend the parents and guardians of the rising generations to avail themselves of the opportunities which are there afforded for a thorough training, combined with Christian influence of a superior order;—and we also hope that these establishments, and their respective Preceptors and inmates, will be frequently remembered by our people at the Throne of Grace. To this there is the more urgent call by reason of the bereavement which these Institutions have experienced in the decease of their Founder and long-tried friend—Charles F. Allison, Esquire. During his life he was instrumental in effecting a great work, and no tribute which his sorrowing friends might render to his memory could be more fitting than to sustain in Christian simplicity and effectiveness, the educational agency which he had the honor to commence.

After mature thought and council on the subject we have resolved to follow the example of the Parent Connexion by the formation of a Theological Class, for the better training of candidates for the work of the Ministry. The wide extent of our field of labor and the scarcity of young men well qualified to enter upon the responsibilities of the itinerant work, demand that some measures be adopted to secure an adequate supply of workmen that need not be ashamed, who shall rightly divide the Word of Truth.

The details of our plan shall be submitted to you in due time, when a practical expression of your sympathy with us in this movement will be solicited; meantime we may simply remark that the course of instruction which is thus contemplated is not intended to supersede a Divine call to the work of the Ministry, but to assist those who give evidence of having received that call the more effectually to comply with it.

It is with satisfaction that we again advert to the usefulness and increasing prosperity of our Book Room and Publishing Office in Halifax. The Provincial Wesleyan maintains its position as a first class family and religious newspaper. Large as its circulation is we could wish that it were still further increased, so as to put in the hands of all our adherents a serial at once useful and interesting—an exponent of our denominational views, and a record of our ecclesiastical transactions.

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The standard literature of our Connexion also—embracing the works of Wesley, Fletcher, Clarke, Watson, and others, together with the later publications of eminent Methodist Authors, both in England and America, and all the periodicals of our Church, are to be had of our Book Steward, whose laborious exertions to diffuse these valuable works among all classes of our people can hardly be sufficiently appreciated. To countenance and support, to procure and study, the literature of our own body must greatly tend to your stability and growth in grace.

After a very harmonious Session we are now about to repair to our respective destinations and spheres of duty, conscious that "neither is he that planteth anything, nor he that watereth, but God that giveth the increase." We desire to commend ourselves and our labors to His special favor and blessing—"Brethren, pray for us, that the Word of the

Lord may have free course and be glorified."

"Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we can ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, unto Him be glory in the Church by Christ Jesus, throughout all ages, world without end. Amen."

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THE ANSWER

OF THE BRITISH CONFERENCE TO THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHO-DIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.— (1858.)

REV. AND DEAR BRETHREN:

One of the first duties of our Assembly has been to welcome your esteemed President once more, and to receive

through him the official record of your salutations.

The assurances of filial love that you have written, move all the pulses of our heart toward you in return. Nothing that affects you can ever fail to reach us; and we have no greater joy than to observe your growing prosperity. The sympathy of the Church is an evidence of its life. Let us thank God for that Divine charity which binds us together; and let us continue to show in all lands that it is still our sign.

It is with the liveliest interest that we hear of your extending labours and influence, and of the encouragements you find in the Master's service. Our prayers rise in your behalf to Him, that He may enlarge you more and more with His blessing; while our confidence reposes in you, that you will go forward as you have begun, with the same harmony which directs your counsels and governs your intercourse, "endeavouring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace."

The review of the past year gathers around us abounding and strong persuasions of the Lord's almighty care over us, and over our work. Never were we more sure than we are now that a dispensation of the Gospel is committed unto us. The truth of the great salvation is yet our heritage in the midst of the earth; and we cannot doubt our commission to publish it far and near, in the steadfast hope of its universal sway.

We thankfully report an increase of 6,996 in our Societies, with upwards of 22,000 on trial. An unusually large number of chapels have been built during the year; and our various public Funds have been sustained, notwithstanding

commercial depression, in a way that proves the rich liberality of our churches, and the special Providence which has always hitherto marked the career of Old Methodism in the father-The project for evangelizing the neglected masses of our countrymen has been long and anxiously weighed by the present Conference; and fields open before us "white already to The Foreign Missions retain their ancient hold upon the sympathies of our people. "India for Christ!" is now the watchword of our hosts, and, we believe, stirs all hearts with more than chivalry. In a few months we look to have sixteen additional Missionaries upon that vast continent, to be speedily and further reinforced; for there is but one feeling-that we must at once go thither in strength, as we have never yet done. Christianity, which has broken up the imposing systems of the classic philosophies, is now girding itself for victories in the strongholds of Brahminism and of And, as we are well convinced that God is leading us to the expansion of our enterprise, both at home and abroad, so in His name we set up our banners, and wait in faithful prayer and praise for the promised Pentecost.

Your reference to those who have departed hence in the faith of Christ, finds us smitten with the sense of a more than common bereavement. Several of God's servants, eminent in their generation, have recently gained their long-sought rest. On the 16th day of June, in this year, Dr. Jabez Bunting was taken up from us, full of honour. During his course he stood among the first in this nation for his strong, pointed, evangelical theology; and never wavered in his testimony. He was one of the wisest in his century. God made him what he was, and long spared him to fill a place among us second only those filled by the Wesleys at the beginning. "The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken

away."

One of our sources of joy at this season, is an unprecedented supply of candidates for the holy office. Ministers die, but their successors arise to guard the fire of the altar, and to feed the lamps of the sanctuary. From age to age the living ministry is the evidence of the living truth and the living God. May such tokens of His favor never be wanting! We commend your scheme of a Seminary for probationers at Mount Allison, and trust soon to hear that you

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have many students, and much encouragement. Your Book-Concern is an important aid to your progress; and it is a worthy ambition to use your utmost means to furnish choice and safe literature to the schools and families of your Province. Sound authorship has now an opportunity of founding an empire that shall outvie all that has been won in war. The human mind is under training for its manhood in the glorious future, and, therefore, we should spare nothing that may contribute to its healthful action.

It is our call to proclaim the Gospel, in the old fashion, to

It is our call to proclaim the Gospel, in the old fashion, to the consciences of men, that ours may be more and more signally an awakening ministry. Society around us still lies in the deep death-slumber of the carnal state; and some in the Church are sinking into the drowsy spirit of the world. We must faithfully warn our congregations. At the same time we are bound to show that Christian experience is cheerful and lovely, transforming, refining, ennobling, making us all Divine, and yet fitting us both for earth and heaven. Among the social means of grace, the class-meeting is especially for the culture of the heart; and surely if we were as careful to cultivate our hearts as we are to cultivate our minds, we should be Christians of extraordinary degree. Above all, we covet for you (as for ourselves) the anointing of the Holy Ghost, to rest upon Ministers, flocks, and the populations around. The pledge of all good is, that we be "filled with the Spirit."

We have appointed your excellent representative, the Rev. Dr. Richey, to preside at your next Conference; and the Rev. Dr. Knight (of whose restored health we hear with pleasure) to be the Co-Delegate.

Finally, we would have you maintain the true catholic love toward all the faithful communion of Christ. Those who hold the Scriptures of God, and who trust in Christ alone, should feel themselves of one brotherhood. Least of all is Methodism a narrow sectarian thing. Open your hearts accordingly to all who are fellow-helpers to the truth, and who love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity: so shall you please God, and best accomplish the ends for which He has fixed you where you are. Leave it to little minds to gratify their vanity by high assumptions. We advise you not even

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to resent these things, but to count them beneath your serious regard. And may the God of peace be with you all. Amen.

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ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA,

TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE.

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REVEREND AND BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

We had become prepared for the assurance contained in your letter to us of the cordial welcome extended by your venerable body in its last assembly to our esteemed President, the Rev. Dr. RICHEY, by the statements he made to us preparatory to the reading of your letter. The consideration extended to him we know how to transfer to ourselves, and we are thereby greatly encouraged. Our purpose is by the grace of God never to forget your kindness, and never to be unworthy of it.

Our hearts have been greatly cheered by hearing of the large increase in your Societies. For successive years the great Father of Spirits has granted to you, as workers together with Him, many souls for your hire,—returning numerical prosperity to such a degree as you have lately enjoyed may well be taken as a divine attestation of the continued meetness of original Methodism for the Master's use. If this be set over against the times of humiliation and trial of a few years ago, it will powerfully tend either wholly to efface the recollections of these days of anxiety and loss, or to cause them to be remembered with commingled gratitude and hope.

We know that you will rejoice to hear that the Lord has been with us in our Circuit work during the year, and that so signally that we are enabled to inform you of an increase of members on every District, amounting in all to 1,305, besides more than 2,000 still remaining on trial. All our

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funds have been proportionately augmented. These facts, together with the peace, satisfaction, unanimity, and zeal, of all our Societies, confirm our confidence in our vocation to preach the Gospel of Salvation, and enlarge our expectation that our success in the future will increasingly approximate to

our aspirations and our aims.

The patriotic enterprise which you have been led to revive the evangelization of the neglected masses of England appears to us to be one of very great importance. That was the original calling of old Methodism. Its success there enabled it to assay its part in the great project of subduing the world to Christ. The continued progress of your triumphs at home comprise the pledge and the earnest that your work abroadwill be both more widely expanded and permanently con-How responsible and stimulating is the position that you occupy with respect to the conversion of India, and the teeming regions beyond. Mr. Wesley said "the world is my parish," because he could not be restrained by ecclesiastieal law; but his sons and successors may say "the world is our parish," in reference to the ample dimensions of the field in which they now labor. Nor shall its vast proportions be curtailed until India shall have become a brilliant gem in the crown of our Redeemer, and He shall have "the heathen for His inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possession."

Our successes during the past year have created a demand for more Ministers than we are at present able to supply. This regretted inconvenience has been aggravated by the necessary retirement from the ranks of our effective ministers of our greatly beloved Brethren W. Temple, A. Nightingale, and A. McNutt. These honored senior members of our Conference have been laborious, exemplary, and useful, for a long series of years. The seals of their ministry are widely and numerously dispersed throughout these Provinces. they have survived the physical capacity of their earlier days they never stood higher in our affectionate esteem than at present. Each will reside on a Circuit, where he will materially assist, we trust, in preaching and in pastoral duties. We hope and earnestly request that when the supernumerary relation, now reluctantly but necessarily assumed by these Brethren, shall be the subject of direct and special attention they to g nob V

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demand ly. This recessary of our cale, and · Conferor a long lely and Though lier days than at ill mateil duties. numerary by these attention they may receive that consideration which you are accustomed to give to those who in the service of our common Lord have

nobly borne the burden and heat of the day.

We thank God that our Ministerial ranks have not been thinned by death since we last addressed you. But we very much regret to have to say that presently after Dr. Richey's return from England, in the autumn of last year, he became seriously unwell. His illness was of a very serious and alarming character, and very protracted. He was consequently prevented from accomplishing those plans of travel through the Connexion which he had formed. We are truly thankful to the God of our lives that our President has been gradually restored to health, and that he has most acceptably resumed his public work. He has presided over our present deliberations with his accustomed urbanity. He purposes shortly to proceed to Newfoundland, where two of our young men await ordination—the exigencies of our work in that thriving District not admitting of their coming to this Conference.

It is our great pleasure most cordially to request that the Rev. Dr. Richey be re-appointed our President for another

year.

It is to us a matter of thankfulness that the Rev. Dr. Knight should, after so long and laborious a life, still enjoy so large a degree of health and strength, with only such marks of age upon him as serve to heighten our respect. We unite in asking that he may be re-appointed to the office of Co-

Delegate.

It has been no small disappointment to us that the Rev. Mr. West, whom you so kindly and wisely desired should be your representative to our Conference, has not been able to be with us this year. We hope the day is not far distant when we shall see either Mr. West or some other Ex-President of your venerable body upon the platform of our Conference; we are assured that the counsel which a man of such experience and wisdom may give will be of great value to us. We hope that we need not assure you that we shall receive any deputation from your venerable assembly in the most dutiful and affectionate manner. The highest wish of our hearts, cherished by every Minister of our Connexion, is to walk by the same rule and to mind the same things as our Fathers and Brethren in Britain.

You will be glad to hear that our Educational Institution at Sackville continues to prosper,-it commands the undiminished confidence of the people of these Provinces. During the past year, notwithstanding the heavy pressure in every department of trade, the number of students in both branches of the Institution has been large. The public examinations were creditable-equally to the pupils and their talented Teachers; and the state of the Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy in all its departments is highly satisfactory. But alas we have to write to you that its wise and benevolent founder—Charles F. Allison, Esq.—who, for patriotic and Christian benevolence, has yet had no equal in this country, finished his useful course on earth in November last. lamented death, as in his spotless life, he was peaceful, because he trusted in Him in whose name alone there is salva-Mr. Allison will long be remembered by us and by many others as one of the most levely of the children of Zion. We design to do honor to his memory, and to incite others to imitate his virtues, by establishing at Sackville a Theological Professorship for the benefit of candidates for our Ministry, to be called the Charles F. Allison Professorship. In this way it is our intention also to initiate a College, for which a charter has been obtained.

Our Book Room is in a flourishing condition under the able and enterprising management of the Rev'd. Charles Churchill, A. M. The sales of works of the most approved character steadily increase. Our Connexional organ, The Provincial Wesleyan, has a large circulation, and is growing in real efficiency and popularity. We look to our Conference Office in Halifax as a most valuable auxiliary to our other agencies for the spread of Scriptural holiness throughout these lands.

Encouraged by aid from the Missionary Committee in London one of our Brethren has proceeded to Labrador, where he will labor during the summer, and procure all possible information respecting the permanent establishment of a Mission on that coast. We hope to inform you at no distant day that among the scattered inhabitants of that wintry region, and the numerous summer visitors to it, our mission has taken root.

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e in Lonor, where I possible of a Misstant day y region, has taken Recognizing the essential unity of Methodism in all parts of the world, we have appointed our esteemed PresiJent, the Rev. Matthew Richey, D. D., to represent our youthful Connexion at the next General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which is to be held in the city of Buffalo, in May, 1860, and we have requested the Rev. Charles Churchill, A. M., and the Rev. John Allison, A. B., to accompany him.

We have also appointed our esteemed Secretary, the Rev. Humphrey Pickard, D. D., as our representative to attend the Canada Conference, which is to be held in the City of Kingston, in June, 1860, and we have requested the Rev.

James R. Narraway, A. M., to accompany him.

Thus do we indicate our desire that the family feeling may be continued and strengthened in the Methodist Church throughout the world, and especially that the earnest sympathy of the elder Branches of the Methodist family may be

secured for our youthful Connexion.

We endeavor to bear constantly in mind the unsectarian character of Wesleyan Methodism. Admirable are the arrangements of our discipline for transmitting the exalted catholicity of our Founder and our Fathers, expressed in the adage-" The friends of all, the enemies of none." As one evidence of our practical adherence to this maxim we might mention that the services of members of this Conference have been earnestly sought for the pulpits of every non-episcopal section of the Church of God in this city during our present session, and that these have been cheerfully rendered by our However dear to us our denominational peculiarities may be, we desire always to exemplify the apostolic spirit indicated in the prayer "that grace and peace may be with all them that love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity." There is among us no departure from these Scriptural doctrines, in which, under God, the power of Methodism to bless the world resides. Nor any indication of a tendency towards any, either ancient or modern, perversion of the truth as it is in Jesus. We can bear a like testimony in regard to our public services and our social means of grace. They correspond to those of our Societies in the Parent Connexion.

We deeply feel, however, that the very wisest measures for the preservation and advancement of the kingdom of God can succeed only as they are Divinely sanctioned. It is our incessant prayer, as it is yours, that the Lord, who hath the residue of the spirit, may be pleased constantly to water his heritage with showers of blessing. It is only thus that the maturity of Christian experience in the perfect love of God can be attained by our members; only thus that their children and their fellow citizens can become a seed to serve the Messiah; only thus that our own Ministry can become an awakening and a soul-saving vocation. Short of this we feel that we should not, and we say deliberately that we will not, rest. Our hope is steadfast, that while we thus preach the Word of God He will continue to give testimony to His servants by adding daily to the Church, through their instrumentality, such as shall be saved.

Our Conference has been one of unbroken harmony and abounding spiritual comfort. The Brethren have shown that they love each other with pure hearts fervently. The religious services have been very numerously attended by a truly devout people, who have daily felt them to be times of

refreshing from the presence of the Lord.

It is the first time we have met in Conference in this City; everything has seemed to combine to make us rejoice that we have met here. There is a true spirit of piety, of love to the ministers for their work's sake, and of liberality towards the Funds of our Connexion, especially towards our Missionary Society, prevailing in this City and neighborhood. We have never before witnessed in these Provinces on so large a scale as here the fruit of original pentecostal blessing, when all that believed were of one heart and of one soul. Knowing that this holy unanimity proceeds from the same spirit of grace, we glorify God on its behalf.

Earnestly seeking for you, beloved Fathers and Brethren, the continued gift of the spirit of wisdom and holiness, and praying that every affiliated Conference may be directed by God in all measures for the promotion of His cause throughout the world, and be abundantly prospered in every evangelizing effort, we remain your sons in the Gospel, and fellow-

laborers in the vineyard of the Lord.
