FIRST SÆDERUNT.

At the City of Hamilton, and within Knox's Church there, June 4, 1872,
7 p.m.
Tuesday, the fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two years, at the hour of seven of the clock in the evening, the Third General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church met, according to appointment. The Moderator, the Rev. John Scott, of London, opened the meeting with devotional exercises, and a sermon, from the first Epistle to Timothy, the third chapter, and part of the fifteenth verse—"That thou mayest know how thou oughtest to behave thyself in the house of the living God."

The Moderator then offering prayer, constituted the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

COMMISSIONS—REPORT ON.

The Recording Clerk read a Report in reference to the Commissions which had come into his hands, stating that in one Presbytery, one of the Commissioners had been appointed in place of another recently deceased, less than thirty days before this meeting of the Assembly; that in another a Commissioner had been appointed in place of another, recently deceased, less than thirty days before this Meeting, and at a meeting of Presbytery held by permission of Synod; that one Presbytery had transmitted a Commission to an elder, as alternate to another elder whose name stood on the general Commission; that in another Presbytery the name of a Minister was entered as alternate for another standing first on the list; that the Commission from one Presbytery bore the names of three Ministers and four elders; and that from another, while the names of four Commissioners had been forwarded in an extract from the minutes, a regular Commission had been received for one only of said Commissioners.

On motion it was agreed that the Report on Commissions be received, and that said Report and all matters relating to Commissions to this Assembly be referred to a Committee on this subject, to be hereafter appointed.

The Assembly proceeded to the election of a Moderator. The list of nominations by the several Presbyteries was read, embracing the names of Dr. Taylor, of Montreal; Mr. Thomas McPherson, of Stratford; Mr. Alex. A. Drummond, of Shakespeare; Mr. Wm. McLaren, of Ottawa, Professor Inglis; Mr. Wm. Reid, the General Agent of the Church; and Mr. Wm. Fraser, of Bondhead, Joint Clerk of the General Assembly. Messrs. Drummond and Reid asked and obtained leave to have their names withdrawn. Dr. Taylor, Professor Inglis, and Mr. McLaren, not being present, and Mr. McPherson, not being appointed a Commissioner by his own Presbytery, were not retained in nomination. Mr. Fraser alone remaining on the list, a vote was taken when he was unanimously chosen Moderator, and thereupon took the chair and addressed the Assembly.

On motion of Dr. Burns, the thanks of the Assembly were tendered to the retiring Moderator for the able manner in which he presided at the meetings of last year, and for the excellent and appropriate sermon delivered by him this evening.

On motion, duly seconded, Mr. Wm. Cochran, of Brantford, was elected Recording Clerk, *pro tempore*.

PROFESSOR YOUNG'S RESIGNATION. REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed to consider and report on the resignation of Professor Young, gave in their report through Mr. Ure, the Convener. The Report is as follows:—That the Assembly accept with regret the resignation tendered by Professor Young of his Chair in Knox College, and express their sense of the very great value of the services rendered by him in connection with that Institution, and of the loss which it sustains by his withdrawal from it. The Assembly at the same time are glad to know that in consequence of his appointment to the Chair of Metaphysics and Ethics in University College, those of the Students in the Church who prosecute their studies in Toronto, will still have the opportunity of availing themselves of Professor Young's instructions.

Further, the Assembly remit to the College Board to consider whether Professor Young cannot be continued in some connection however nominal with Knox College, such as may secure to that Institution, and to the courts of the church, the benefits of his counsels.

It was moved by Mr. Baird, seconded by Mr. Cuthbertson, that the Report be received and adopted. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Andrew Wilson, seconded by Dr. Taylor, that the Report be re-committed to the Committee, to be amended in the light of the remarks now made. It was further moved in amendment by the Hon. J. McMurich, seconded by Mr. John Scott, London, that the Report be received, the first and second clauses adopted, and the third clause sent to the Committee for re-consideration. Mr. Baird was allowed to withdraw his motion with the consent of his seconder, Mr. Wilson's amendment thus becoming the main motion. On the vote being taken, the amendment of Mr. McMurich was carried as against the motion of Mr. Wilson, and the assembly thus received and adopted the first and second clauses, and remitted the third clause for consideration to the Committee.

The Assembly re-appointed the Committee in this matter, with the addition of Mr. Baird, and Mr. McLaren.

LOYAL ADDRESS TO THE QUEEN.

The Assembly then unanimously agreed to present a Loyal address to the Queen, and appointed the following as a Committee to prepare such an address and report to the assembly at an early sederunt, viz.—Mr. W. Gregg, Convener, Dr. Taylor, Dr. Proudfoot

Mr. McLaren, Ministers; and Messrs. T. W. Taylor, Warden-King, and Hon. John McMurrich, Elders.

Professor Caven asked leave to present the report of the Committee on Remits, which was granted. The Report was read. On motion of Dr. Waters, seconded by Mr. Cochrane, the report was received, and the thanks of the Assembly given to the Committee of the Committee, and that it be an instruction to the Committee on Bills and Overtures, to make provision for an early consideration of the subjects, embraced in the report of the Committee.

APPLICATION FROM STRATFORD PRESBYTERY.

The Assembly then proceeded to consider an application from the Stratford Presbytery, asking leave for Mr. Alex. Young Hartley, formerly a Minister of the New Connexion Methodist Church, to be received as a student in Theology of the third year, with the view of his entering Knox College next Session. Dr. Waters was heard in support of the application. It was moved by Mr. McMechan, seconded by Mr. Tolmie, that the request be granted. The motion was unanimously agreed to.

APPLICATION FROM PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

Votes being taken the amendment of Mr. Cochrane was carried successively over the amendment of Mr. Cuthbertson and the motion of Mr. Gibson, and the court thus decided, that the next Meeting of Assembly be held in the city of Toronto and within Cooke's Church there, on the first Tuesday of June, 1873, at half past 7 o'clock, evening.

The clerk read a commission under the hand of Dr. Cooper, Principal Clerk of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church of North America, in favour of the Revd. John P. Scott of the Presbytery of Detroit, to represent said Church at the present meeting of the General Assembly; also commissions under the hand of Dr. Hatfield, stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States, in favour of the Revd. Wm. Hogarth, D. D., and the Revd. Arthur J. Pierson, both of the Presbytery of Detroit; also a commission from the same church, in favour of the Hon. Jacob S. Farrand, to represent said church at the Assembly.

Mr. Gregg reports diligence.

Mr. Gregg reported his diligence, as delegate from this Church, to the recent meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the City of Detroit, and introduced the delegates to the Assembly.

Moderator extends welcome to delegates.

The Moderator extended to the delegates the welcome of the Assembly, and called upon the Rev. J. P. Scott, of the United Presbyterian Church of North America, to address the Assembly.

Addresses.

Mr. Scott, in cordial terms, conveyed the fraternal greetings of his Church, and gave interesting details as to its growth and prosperity.

Dr. Hogarth, the Hon. J. S. Farrand, and Mr. Arthur T. Pierson, were heard in succession on behalf of the Presbyterian Church of the United States, describing the various benevolent schemes of their Church; the Sabbath School work; the Eldership, and the desire for Evangelistic preaching on the part of their membership.

Response.

The Moderator responded, warmly reciprocating the messages of Christian regard, to which the delegates had given expression, on behalf of their respective Churches.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the diet was closed with the benediction.

On motion of Dr. Topp, these reports and relative papers were received, and remitted to a Committee to bring up a deliverance at a future Sederunt; said Committee to be hereafter appointed.

DELEGATE FROM THE REFORMED CHURCH.

Delegate from Reformed Church.

The Assembly, at this stage of business, agreed to hear the delegate from the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America.

The Clerk read a Commission, under the hand of Dr. Demorest, stated Clerk of said Synod, appointing Dr. Charles N. Waldron to represent the Synod of the Reformed Church at our Assembly. Dr. Waldron.

The Moderator welcomed Dr. Waldron to the Assembly, who, Address. in an interesting address, sketched the history of the Reformed Church, its doctrines and discipline, and the struggles for religious liberty through which it had passed in by-gone years.

The Moderator, in suitable terms, responded to Dr. Waldron's Response. address, and asked him to convey to the Synod of his Church the fraternal regards of the Assembly.

OVERTURE FROM PRESBYTERY OF PARIS.—KNOX COLLEGE.

Gregg, M.A., of Cooke's Church, Toronto, for that chair; also an Overture from the Presbytery of Simcoe, asking the Assembly to institute a chair of Apologetics, and nominating the Rev. Wm. Gregg, A.M., for that chair. Overtures sent Professors in Knox College.

Messrs. Burnfield and Rodgers were heard in support of the Overture from the Presbytery of Simcoe. Messrs. Burnfield and Rodgers heard.

On motion, duly seconded, the Overtures were remitted to the Committee on the College reports; said Committee was appointed by the Moderator, as follows:—Dr. Topp, Convener; A. Young, Dr. McVicar, Dr. Taylor, Dr. Burns, Professor Inglis, Professor Caven, Wm. McLaren, J. Crombie, A. J. Traver, John Ross, W. T. McMullen, J. M. King, A. Rodgers, T. Wardrope, Dr. Proudfoot, Dr. Waters, R. Ure, Wm. McWilliam, Ministers; and Messrs. McMurrich, T. W. Taylor, Dr. W. Clarke, Kerr, Muir, Warden King, A. Mutchmor, and A. F. Wood, Elders. ASSEMBLY PULPIT.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Mr. A. B. Simpson, from the Committee for the supply of the Assembly Pulpit, reported that the Committee recommend Dr. McVicar to preach in the evening, and Professor Bryce in the morning, in Knox Church. Assembly supply.

The report was received and adopted.

The Diet was then closed with the Benediction.

The Assembly met and was duly constituted, Mr. Scott, of Napanee, at the Moderator's request, leading the Assembly in prayer.

The Minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained. Minutes sustained.

RECORDS—EXAMINED AND ATTESTED.

The Committees appointed to examine the Records of the Synods of London, Hamilton, Toronto, and Montreal, gave in reports, to

the effect that said Records were carefully and correctly kept. The Assembly received the reports and ordered the Records to be attested by the Moderator, in terms of the reports of the Committee.

The Committee appointed on the Records of the Assembly reported in similar terms, and the Records were ordered to be attested in the same terms.

OVERTURE ANENT PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE.

Overture

The Clerk read an Overture from the Presbytery of Owen Sound, transmitted by the Synod of Toronto, petitioning the Assembly to erect a new Presbytery, composed of congregations within the Presbytery of Owen Sound, and other congregations in the Presbytery of Huron, also an Overture from the Presbytery of Huron, transmitted by the Synod of London, asking the Assembly to erect said new Presbytery, embracing in addition to the congregations aforementioned, all the congregations and stations within the County of Bruce, except such congregations and stations as form a part of the charge of Ministers not residing within said county. Messrs. Anderson and Straith were heard in support of the Overtures. Messrs. Park and Moffatt, of the Durham Presbytery, were heard in opposition, to the said new Presbytery of Bruce withdrawing any of the congregations at present within the bounds of the Durham Presbytery. After parties interested had been heard and questions put and answered, it was moved by Mr. Lowry, seconded by Mr. S. C. Fraser,—That the Overtures be received, and, in accordance with the terms of them, the Assembly hereby resolve that a Presbytery shall be formed, to be called the Presbytery of Bruce, and that a Committee be appointed to define the bounds of it, and make necessary arrangements for its constitution. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. Waters,—Receive the Overtures, but delay further action until next Assembly. It was moved in further amendment by Mr. R. H. Warden, duly seconded, Receive the Overtures, grant the prayer thereof, in so far as to constitute a new Presbytery, to be named the Presbytery of Bruce, said Presbytery to comprise the whole County of Bruce, with the exception of the congregations in that County at present connected with the Presbytery of Durham, and the congregation of Allenford, in the Presbytery of Owen Sound; the said Presbytery to meet in Paisley, and within the Presbyterian Church there on the first Tuesday of August, Mr. John Fraser to be its first Moderator.

Mr. Cochrane was allowed to withdraw his amendment in favor of Mr. Warden's. The vote being taken, the amendment of Mr. Warden was carried as against the motion of Mr. Lowry, and the new Presbytery constituted in terms thereof.

PETITION OF MR. W. C. WINDELL.

The Assembly next proceeded to consider a Petition from Mr. W. G. Windell, asking the Assembly to restore him to his former Status as a Minister of the Church. The Petition was transmitted to the General Assembly by the Presbytery of Ontario. There was also read a Petition from the congregations of Cartwright and

Ballyduff, asking that the congregations be also received into the Church. Also Extract Minutes of the Ontario Presbytery of date May 28, 1872, to the effect that the restoration petitioned for by Mr. Windell, would cause injury to the Church and cause of Christ.

It was moved by Mr. Baird, seconded by Mr. Ross, that the Petition and relative papers be remitted to a Committee, to consider and report. Motion and amendments.

It was moved in amendment by the Hon. J. McMurrich, seconded by Mr. Cuthbertson, that the Petition for restoration be not entertained by the Assembly.

It was moved in further amendment by Dr. Topp, seconded by Professor Caven, that the Petition be received, and that a Special Commission be appointed, with full powers to call for parties and papers, and settle the case.

Mr. McMurrich was allowed, with the consent of his seconder, to withdraw his amendment.

The vote being taken, the amendment of Dr. Topp was carried by a large majority over the motion of Mr. Baird. Dr. Topp and Professor Caven were allowed till the evening Sederunt to submit the names of the Commission now agreed upon. Commission appointed.

King, the report was received, and remitted to the following Committee to consider and report on the matters therein contained—including the resignation of the Convener, viz: Mr. John Scott, London, Convener; Mr. McColl, Mr. A. Wilson, Mr. Warden, Mr. Mungo Fraser, Mr. A. D. McDonald, Dr. Taylor, Mr. Burton, Mr. A. B. Simpson, Mr. Ball, Mr. Baird, Mr. J. W. Mitchell, Professor Bryce, and Mr. John M. King, Ministers; and Messrs. Ballantyne, Gunn, Boyd, H. Young, Miller, Kennedy, Hunter, and Stevenson, Elders.

RECOGNITION OF MR. LAING'S SERVICES.

It was moved in Amendment by Mr. Thom, seconded by Mr. Murdoch, that inasmuch as the Presbytery of Ontario had only gone the length of commencing a pre-cognition, it is impossible for the Presbytery to furnish charges to the Assembly's Commission.

Pending the discussion of these motions, the Assembly adjourned, and the Diet was closed with the Benediction.

It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Simpson, seconded by Professor Inglis: Whereas in the opinion of this Assembly, it is desirable to change the mode of electing Moderator, the Overture be received and referred to a Committee, to prepare an act on the subject to be sent down to Presbyteries for consideration.

On the votes being taken the amendment of Mr. Lowry was carried successively against the amendment of Mr. Simpson, and the motion of Dr. Waters. The Assembly accordingly declared that it sees no reason to change the present law and practice of the Church, in the matter of electing the Moderator.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STANDING OF RETIRED MINISTERS.

Professor Young gave in a report from the Committee appointed to consider and report upon the standing of Dr. Willis, and Mr. McKenzie of Zorra, and to bring up a rule for these and similar cases.

The report was received and the Assembly agreed to consider its recommendations, clause by clause. On motion duly made and seconded, the first and second clauses were adopted unanimously. They are as follows:—I. That the case of Dr. Willis and that of Mr. McKenzie, having occasioned the appointment of this Committee, be determined on their own merits simply, previous to any future action of the Church. II. That the name of Dr. Willis be retained on the Roll of the Presbytery of Toronto, and that of the Rev. Donald McKenzie on the Roll of the Presbytery of London, as Senior Pastor of the congregation at Embro. The third clause is as follows:—That, according to the constitutional practice of Presbyterianism, none but settled ministers, Senior Pastors, Theological Professors, and ordained Ministers called to fill special positions in the work of the Church, should be recognised as Ministers entitled to have their names entered on the rolls of Presbyteries, and such being the case, any exceptions made should be made on their own merits, and therefore new legislation on this matter is uncalled for.

Dr. Proudfoot moved, seconded by Mr. Gregg, that the third clause be adopted with the exception of the closing paragraph, having reference to legislation in individual cases, namely: that any exceptions made should be made on their own merits, and therefore new legislation on this matter is uncalled for.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. McMullen, seconded by Mr. McLean, That the clause be adopted as a whole.

It was moved in further amendment by Professor Caven, seconded by Mr. Andrew Wilson, That the third clause be sent down to Presbyteries for consideration of the subject involved.

The vote being taken, the amendment of Professor Caven was carried as against the amendment of Mr. McMullen, and again over the motion of Dr. Proudfoot. The Assembly thus resolved that the third clause be sent down to Presbyteries, for consideration of the subject involved.

UNION QUESTION.

The Assembly proceeded to consider the subject of Union with other Presbyterians in the Dominion of Canada. The Clerk read the returns to remit from Presbyteries as follows:—Sixteen Presbyteries reported on union as follows—Six, approve simpliciter, viz., Brockville, Kingston, Ontario, Hamilton, Chatham, and Manitoba. Ottawa approves generally with slight modifications on the 2nd Article. Three, namely Cobourg, Toronto, and Paris, approve generally, with slight modifications of 2nd Article. One, Durham approves generally with modification on the 2nd Article, and would add an Article on the Headship of Christ. One—Huron—approves generally with the addition of modification of the 1st Article. One—Simcoe—approves generally with modification on 2nd Article; would add an act on Headship, and would separate Endowment from Union question. Montreal recommends an Article on the Headship of Christ, and modifications anent the Colleges. Guelph disapproves on the ground that the basis does not condemn Erastianism, and one—Stratford—thinks that the Assembly should take no further steps, till the other negotiating Churches have considered the basis. Thus six Presbyteries approve simpliciter. One, with modification of 1st. Article; Three, with

modification on 2nd Article. Four, desiderate an Article on the Headship, and two would recommend modifications on the College management.

Motion to consider Basis and next Collegiate Education. Amendments.

It was moved by Dr. Topp, seconded by Mr. Monteath, that the Assembly proceed to consider the Basis of Union, and next the matter of Collegiate Education. It was moved in amendment by Mr. McLaren, seconded by Mr. Lowry, that the further consideration of the returns be deferred until the Report of the Committee on Union, and the report of the Committee on the Endowment of the Colleges are laid before the Assembly. It was moved in further amendment by Mr. McMullen, seconded by Mr. Tolmie, that the further consideration of the subject to which the answers of the Presbyteries relate, be deferred till the Committee on Endowment shall have reported. The vote being taken the amendment of Mr. McMullen was carried as against the amendment of Mr. McLaren, and the said motion of Mr. McMullen having been put against the motion of Dr. Topp, the motion of Dr. Topp was carried as against the amendment of Mr. McMullen, and the Assembly accordingly decided to proceed to discuss the Basis of Union.

Dr. Topp then moved that, as it appears from the returns of Presbyteries on the Basis of Union, that a majority of Presbyteries approve of the four articles of the Basis, with some slight modifications, the Assembly re-affirm its adoption of the said four articles. Mr. Andrew Wilson seconded the motion. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Ross, seconded by Mr. McDonald, that the articles be taken up *seriatim*.

Dr. Topp's motion withdrawn. Articles considered *seriatim*.

Dr. Topp was allowed to withdraw his motion, and the Assembly proceeded to discuss the Articles of the Basis of Union *seriatim*. The first article was then considered. Mr. Ross moved that it be changed to read as follows:—That the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, being the infallible word of God, are the only rule of faith and manners. The motion was seconded by Mr. McAlpin. It was moved by Dr. Topp, duly seconded, that the Article remain as it is. The vote being taken the amendment of Dr. Topp was carried by a large majority.

The second Article was then considered. Dr. Topp moved that the article be adopted as it stands in the Basis of Union. The motion of Dr. Topp was seconded by the Hon. Mr. McMurrich. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Baird, seconded by Mr. Scott, that it be changed to read as follows:—That the Westminster Confession of Faith, together with the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, shall form the subordinate standard of this Church, it being distinctly understood that nothing contained in the aforesaid Confession regarding the power and duty of the civil magistrate, shall be held to sanction any principles or views inconsistent with full liberty of conscience in matters of religion. It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Ross, seconded by Mr. Alexander Young, that the Article read as follows:—That the Westminster Confession of Faith, together with the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, shall form the standard of the Church, and that the remainder of said Article which reads "It being distinctly under-

stood that nothing contained in the aforesaid Confession, or Catechisms, regarding the power and duty of civil magistrates shall be held to sanction any principles or views inconsistent, with full liberty of conscience in matters of religion," be left over for future consideration. The vote being taken the amendment of Mr. Ross was put against that of Mr. Baird, when the amendment of Mr. Baird was carried, and the amendment of Mr. Baird being put against the main motion of Dr. Topp, the latter was carried by a majority, and the Assembly accordingly agreed to adopt the 2nd Article as it now stands in the Basis.

ceiving the Report, the Assembly cannot but record its sense of gratitude to the great Head of the Church, for the auspicious opening up of a Foreign Mission work to the Church, such as is presented in the Report just read, and for the large increase of contributions to the funds of the Mission.

Warden, seconded by Mr. Archibald McLean, Receive the Report, extend the thanks of the Assembly to the Committee, and especially to the convener; express our heartfelt gratitude to the great Head of the Church, for the measure of success which has attended the work of the Committee during the year and for the largely increased contributions of our congregations to the Foreign Mission Fund, and proceed to consider, *seriatim*, the recommendations of the Report.

The vote being taken, the motion of Mr. Burton was carried by a large majority over the amendment of Mr. Warden, and the Assembly accordingly referred the Report to a Committee.

The convener of the Foreign Missions Committee having intimated to the Assembly that Mr. Edward Vincent, the recently ordained Missionary to the Saskatchewan, was present, the Moderator invited him to address the Assembly. Mr. Vincent then addressed the Court, after which the Moderator, in fitting terms, responded, and presented him with a copy of the Holy Scriptures, in the name of the Foreign Mission Committee.

At the Moderator's request, the Assembly was led in prayer by Professor Inglis.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

The Report of the Committee on Statistics was read by Dr. Waters.

On motion of Dr. Burns, seconded by Mr. Andrew Wilson, the Report was received, and the thanks of the Assembly conveyed to the Committee, and very especially to the convener, for the great pains taken in the preparation of the Report. Further, that the recommendations of the Committee be adopted, and that it be published in the Appendix to the Minutes.

REASONS OF DISSENT FROM THE ASSEMBLY'S DELIVERANCE ON THE UNION QUESTION.

The following reasons of dissent against the deliverance of the Assembly in the matter of the Basis of Union with other Presbyterian bodies in the Dominion, were received and ordered to be engrossed in the Minutes.

Reasons of dissent of Mr. Robert Ure and others who adhere.

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I. Because the Union Committee have already made known to the Assembly, in giving in their reports, that before entering upon the consideration of the Doctrinal Basis, at their first meeting in Montreal, there was found to be entire unanimity amongst the Committees of the negotiating Churches, with regard to the doctrine of the Headship of Christ, and its practical applications in the circumstances of the Church in this land.

II. Because, had the Committee, after obtaining such a declaration from the Committees of the other negotiating Churches, insisted upon anything more specific, this would have implied want of confidence in the sincerity of the representatives of these Churches.

III. Inasmuch as the doctrine in question is most clearly stated in the Confession of Faith, no repeated declaration of it is required, nor could such declaration be supposed to furnish any additional guarantee that this important truth is really held by the parties to these negotiations.

Reasons of dissent by Mr. John Ross and Mr. John Gunn.

I. Because by adopting a Basis of Union in which no place is given or allowed to a distinct testimony to the Lord Jesus Christ, as the only King and Head of His Church, and as Head of Nations, the Assembly has fallen from the testimony hitherto borne to him as such. We have opened our mouth to the Lord and have gone back.

II. Because by the terms in which the Confession of Faith and the Catechisms are received, all statements in said documents touching the Headship of Christ over the Nations are so stripped of their value and authority, that there is no means of determining what doctrine the standards so qualified teach on the subject.

III. Because the Assembly has failed to do honour to the King of Glory, at a time, and in circumstances which demanded that He should be recognized as King, and His own place given Him, in His own house, and by His own servants.

IV. Because the prosperity, power, and glory, and happiness of the Church are bound up with the lifting up of Him, as her Head and King, and as Lord of the world.

V. Because the testimony hitherto given to Him as King of Zion, and Lord of all, is not sent down by her hand to coming times and generations, but is substantially dropped.

Dr. Proudfoot moved, seconded by Dr. McVicar, that the recommendation be adopted. Dr. Topp moved in amendment, duly seconded, that we re-enact the Interim Act on this subject.

Professor Young moved in further amendment, that the Interim Act be changed on this subject to read as follows:—That Ministers, Licentiates of those Churches in Great Britain or Ireland, with which the Canada Presbyterian Church is in friendly communion, who hold and accept the Westminster Standards, in terms of the Articles of Union, and who come in the way of orderly translation, or are expressly designated or commissioned as Ministers or Missionaries to this Church, may be, on application to any Presbytery, and on producing the proper document of evidence, at once, be admitted as Ministers or Probationers of this Church.

Mr. Reid's amendment.

Moved in further amendment by Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr. Cochrane, that the Interim Act be re-enacted in the meantime, and the whole subject be referred to a Committee to consider and report to the next General Assembly.

Latter amendment carried.

The motions of Dr. Proudfoot, Dr. Topp, and Professor Young, were withdrawn and the amendment of Mr. Reid carried.

Day of Thanksgiving, 14th of November.

DAY OF THANKSGIVING.

Mr. Burns reported from the Committee appointed to suggest a day of Thanksgiving, that they recommend the 14th day of November—the second Thursday—as the day most suitable for a day of Thanksgiving. The report was received. The Committee was re-appointed, to confer with the Government and with the Supreme Courts of other Churches that may yet be in Session, and take any future action they may deem requisite in the circumstances.

Union question, Collegiate Education.

UNION QUESTION—COLLEGIATE EDUCATION.

The Assembly resumed consideration of Collegiate Education, as presented in the Resolutions on Union with the negotiating Churches.

Amendment by Mr. Cochrane.

It was moved in further amendment to Dr. Proudfoot's motion by Mr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. McVicar, that the Assembly delay further consideration of the College question in the meantime. Dr. Waters requested leave of the house to withdraw his amendment, which was granted by a vote of 43 against 36.

Dr. Waters' amendment withdrawn.

Dr. Proudfoot's motion carried.

The vote being taken, the motion of Dr. Proudfoot was carried as against the amendment of Mr. Cochrane, by 59 to 29, and the yeas and nays being called for, 64 voted yea and 27 voted nay. The motion of Dr. Proudfoot was accordingly carried. The following members dissented from the decision of the Assembly, Prof. Young, Dr. McVicar, Dr. Waters, Mr. Croly, Mr. Mitchell, Mr. Brown, Mr. Duff, and Mr. Cochrane.

Dissents.

The Diet was then closed with the Benediction.

EIGHTEENTH SEDERUNT.

KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON.

Wednesday, June 12th, 1872, 3, p.m.

The Assembly met and was duly constituted, Mr. Traver, at the Moderator's request, engaging in prayer.

The Minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

Minutes read.

COMMITTEE ON ACT ANENT RECEPTION OF MINISTERS.

The Committee to consider the subject of the Reception of Ministers appointed as follows:—Rev. Mr. King, Convener; Dr. Proudfoot, Dr. Topp, Dr. McVicar, Mr. A. Wilson, Prof. Caven, Mr. Reid, Professor Young, T. W. Taylor, and A. Mutchmor.

Committee to consider act anent reception of Ministers.

UNION QUESTION, COLLEGIATE EDUCATION.

Union question. Collegiate Education.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Resolutions on Collegiate Education.

Dr. Proudfoot moved, seconded by Mr. Wm. Gibson, that the 2nd clause be not adopted.

Dr. Proudfoot's motion.

Mr. J. M. King moved in amendment, seconded by Dr. Waters, that the consideration of the second resolution be delayed until the Report on the Endowment movement is presented to this Assembly.

Mr. King's amendment.

Dr. Proudfoot, with the consent of the Assembly, withdrew his motion, Mr. King's thus becoming the main motion.

Mr. Wilson moved, seconded by Mr. Bell, in amendment, that the clause respecting endowment be left out.

On the vote being taken, the motion of Mr. King was carried as against the amendment of Mr. Wilson. It was, therefore, agreed that the consideration of the second resolution be delayed until the report on the endowment is presented to this General Assembly.

2nd or the Endowment Clause. Consideration delayed.

The Assembly proceeded to the consideration of the 3rd clause. On motion of Dr. Proudfoot, seconded by Mr. King, it was agreed that the clause should be left out.

3rd clause left out.

The Assembly proceeded to the consideration of the 4th Clause.

4th clause. Motion by Dr. Proudfoot.

Dr. Proudfoot moved, seconded by Mr. Scott, of Napanee, that the fourth clause be adopted to read as follows:—The Assembly instruct their Committee on Union, in bringing this resolution under the notice of the Committee of the negotiating Churches, and seeking their approval thereof, to inform them that this Church still adheres to its repeatedly expressed opposition to state grants for denominational Colleges in these Provinces; and further instruct their Committee to ascertain whether there is a definite prospect of harmonious action in the United Church in this matter.

Mr. Wilson moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. W. S. Ball, that this clause be left out.

Amendment by Mr. Wilson.

Dr. Proudfoot's motion carried—
clause retained.
Dissents.

The vote being taken, the motion of Dr. Proudfoot was carried as against the amendment of Mr. Wilson, by a vote of 73 to 4.

Messrs. Wilson and Barton desired to have their dissent recorded, on the ground that the decision of the Assembly embodies a principle which has never been held by this Church as a body. Leave was granted.

APPOINTMENT OF UNION COMMITTEE.

Motion to re-appoint Union Committee.
Declines.

The Assembly then proceeded to appoint the Union Committee. Dr. Proudfoot moved, seconded by Mr. Cochrane, that the Committee be re-appointed. Dr. Topp, Mr. Ure, Dr. McVicar, Prof. Caven, Mr. Thos. McCrae, and the Hon. J. McMurich, declined continuing as members of the Union Committee.

Dr. Proudfoot, with the consent of his seconder, withdrew his motion.

Motion to appoint a Committee to nominate Union Committee.
Carried.

Mr. McLaren moved, seconded by Mr. S. C. Fraser, that the Moderator appoint a small Committee to nominate members of the Union Committee for the ensuing year.

Mr. Hugh Young moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. R. Rodgers, that the Moderator appoint a Committee to meet with the members of the late Union Committee in regard to this matter.

On the vote being taken, the motion of Mr. McLaren was carried by a large majority, and the Assembly accordingly agreed to the nomination of a Committee, to nominate a Union Committee for the ensuing year.

Other matters concerning Union deferred.

CONSIDERATION OF OTHER MATTERS APPERTAINING TO UNION DEFERRED.

Professor Inglis moved, seconded by Dr. Waters, that the consideration of all other matters appertaining to Union be deferred until next General Assembly. Agreed.

Instrumental Music.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC, CONSIDERATION OF ANSWERS TO REMIT.

Analysis of answers to Remits.

The Assembly proceeded to consider the answers from Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions, to the remit on the subject of Instrumental Music. The answers to remit, as tabulated by the Committee, were read by the Clerk, and are as follows:—Eleven Presbyteries approve *simpliciter* of the Interim Act; one approves, generally; one, while disapproving of its terms would grant liberty; four, disapprove. Twenty-three Kirk Sessions approve, and forty-two disapprove.

Motion by Dr. Proudfoot.

It was moved by Dr. Proudfoot, seconded by Mr. R. Rodgers,—That as the Interim Act in reference to the use of Instrumental Music in public worship has been approved by a large majority of Presbyteries, it be now enacted as the law of the Church in this matter.

Amendment by Mr. Monteath.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. Monteath, seconded by Mr. James Brown:—That in view of the conflicting opinions brought out in the returns on Instrumental Music in the worship of God, and in view also of the evils that might arise if the Interim

Act were adopted, the Assembly resolves to refrain from legislation on said question, and agrees to recommend to all parties who may differ on the mode of divine praise, to exercise mutual forbearance and charity.

The Diet was then closed with the Benediction.

NINETEENTH SEDERUNT.

KNOX CHURCH HAMILTON,

Wednesday, June 12th, 1872, 7.30, p. m.

The Assembly met and was duly constituted. Mr. Joseph White at the Moderator's request leading the Assembly in prayer.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE TO NOMINATE UNION COMMITTEE.

Minutes sustained.

The Committee named by the moderator to nominate the Union Committee for the ensuing year, were read by the clerk, and are as follows : Mr. Wardrope, convener ; Mr. McLaren, Mr. Alex. Young, Mr. Cochrane, Mr. A. D. McDonald, Mr. Drummond, Mr. Porteous, Mr. A. Wilson, and Mr. J. M. Gibson, ministers ; and Messrs. S. S. Hunter, Wm. Clark, and Robert Lawrie, Elders.

Com. appointed to nominate Union com.

CHANGE IN THE ORDER OF BUSINESS.

The Assembly agreed by a majority to continue the discussion on the question of Instrumental music, after Colonel Haultain had been heard on behalf of the French Canadian Missions.

Change in order of business.

COLONEL HAULTAIN HEARD ON FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

Colonel Haultain was then heard on behalf of the French Canadian Missionary Society. Ca. Col. Haultain heard.

It was moved by Professor Caven, seconded by Mr. R. Wallace and agreed as follows : The General Assembly having listened to an address from Col. Haultain, the agent of the French Canadian Missionary Society, record their thanks to him for his excellent and encouraging address, and their deep interest in the operations of this most important Society which he represents.

Motion of thanks.

The Moderator in fitting terms, conveyed the thanks of the Assembly to Col. Haultain.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC, DISCUSSION RESUMED.

The discussion on Instrumental Music was then resumed. The Assembly at this stage resolved that speeches on this subject should be limited to five minutes each.

Instrumental Music.

It was moved in further amendment to the motion of Dr. Proudfoot, by Mr. J. M. King, seconded by Mr. Cochrane as follows : The General Assembly declines to enact any law on the subject of the use of Instrumental Music in the worship of God, but judges that the matter is not one in which uniformity of usage should be enforced in this church, especially in view of the general expression of the Church's mind, in favour of extending liberty to congrega-

Mr. King's amendment.

tions therein ; nevertheless, in agreeing to this deliverance, the General Assembly deems it seasonable to enjoin due regard to simplicity of worship, and the peace of congregations, in connection with any changes which may be introduced.

Mr. Wilson's amendment.

It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Andrew Wilson seconded by Mr. John Gunn, as follows :—Whereas it is a doctrine held by this Church, as founded upon and agreeable to the word of God, to which all her ministers and ordained office-bearers are solemnly pledged—namely, that the true God is not to be worshipped in any way not prescribed in the Holy Scriptures. (See Confession of Faith, chapter 21.)

Whereas it has not been shown, that the use of instruments of music in His worship, under this new and more spiritual dispensation is so prescribed : whereas, to sanction their use in the worship of God, would be a violation of the Basis of the Union, so happily effected in 1861, which provides that the ordinances of worship shall be administered in this Church, as they have hitherto been by the respective bodies of which it is composed :

Whereas, to authorise their introduction, or grant leave to Kirk Sessions and Congregations to introduce them, would virtually, if not actually, cause division in the Church, and produce many evils in relation to the service of praise :

Whereas, it is unpresbyterian and unsafe to commit so important a matter as that of the regulation of the mode of worship to Kirk Sessions and Congregations, and to do so would tend to disturb the harmony and peace of Congregations, and destroy that uniformity in worship that should prevail in a Presbyterian Church: Therefore—Resolved, that the whole subject be laid on the table.

Mr. Scott's amendment.

It was moved in further amendment by Mr. John Scott, London, seconded by Mr. Lowry as follows :—The Report of the returns on the subject of Instrumental Music in connection with the public worship of God having been read, the Assembly agrees not to pass the Interim Act on the subject into a law of the Church, nor in any direct way to legislate on the question ; and, while laying no prohibition on the use of an instrument, where Congregations agree in desiring it, at the same time declare a preference for the expression of praise in vocal music alone, as more in keeping with the simplicity of the New Testament dispensation, and more fitted to secure the ends of spiritual worship, and recommend that Congregations confine themselves to this mode of praise, both in the Sabbath School and Church.

Dr. Proudfoot's, and Mr. Monteath's motions withdrawn.

Dr. Proudfoot craved leave of the Court to withdraw his motion, in favour of the amendment of Mr. King. The request was granted.

Mr. Monteath craved leave to withdraw his amendment, in favour of the amendment of Mr. Scott. The request was also granted.

Vote taken.

Votes were then taken on the remaining motion of Mr. King, and amendments of Mr. Wilson and Mr. Scott, with the following result :—For the amendment of Mr. Scott, as against the amend-

ment of Mr. Wilson, 68; for the amendment of Mr. Wilson, as against the amendment of Mr. Scott, 9; for the amendment of Mr. Scott, as against the motion of Mr. King, 40; for Mr. J. M. King's motion, as against Mr. Scott's amendment, 49. The Yeas and Nays being taken, 59 voted Yea, and 32 voted Nay. The roll was then called, when 60 voted Aye, and 37 voted No.

Mr. King's motion was accordingly declared carried.

Mr. King's

Mr. Ross craved leave to enter his dissent for himself and all who may adhere to him, for reasons to be given in at a future Sederunt.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

Dr. Waters, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, gave in a seventh Report, which, on motion, was adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSION REPORT.

In accordance with the order of business, the Assembly proceeded to consider the Report of the Committee appointed to consider and report on the recommendations of the Assembly's Home Mission Committee. The Report was read by Mr. Scott, of London, the convener. The Report was received, and the Assembly proceeded to consider its several clauses, seriatim. The first clause was read by the Clerk and adopted. The second clause was read and adopted. The third and fourth clauses were also adopted. The fifth clause, relating to Manitoba, and co-operation with the Ministers of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland, in that Province, on motion of Dr. Topp, seconded by Prof. Caven, was amended and adopted. The sixth clause, having reference to the employment of Mr. McKerracher, in Manitoba, was amended to read—That the Presbytery of Manitoba have leave to employ another labourer for such fields as they may deem necessary. The seventh clause, referring to the missionary sent out from the Irish Presbyterian Church, to labour at Red River, was amended, on motion of Mr. A. Wilson, to read as follows:—That when Mr. Donaldson is received by the Presbytery of Manitoba as a Minister of this Church, the Home Mission Committee be authorised to make his salary equal to that of the other missionaries, and pay his expenses from Toronto to the field.

The ninth clause was adopted.

The tenth clause, having reference to the subscription for the

endowment of Manitoba College, was remitted to a Committee to collect the subscriptions, and take such action in the premises as they may deem necessary—Committee as follows: Rev. W. Reid, convener; James Hastie, J. W. Mitchell, Dr. Prondfoot, Mr. McLaren, Jno. M. Gibson, A. B. Simpson, Ministers; W. King, Wm. Wilson, A. Mutchmor, Elders.

Rev. Mr. Laing's resignation.

The tenth clause, having reference to the Rev. Jno. Laing, lately convener of the Home Mission Committee, was adopted. The eleventh clause, having reference to the appointment of a Mission Agent for the Church, and nominating the Rev. W. Cochrane, M. A., of Brantford, for that office, was then considered. It was moved by Dr. Waters, that the 11th clause, in so far as regards the appointment of an Agent on the *Home Mission Work*, be adopted; seconded by Mr. John Scott, of Napanee. It was moved by Professor Caven, seconded by Mr. Gibson, that the Assembly approving of the appointment of a Mission Agent, remit to a Committee consisting of the gentlemen who composed the Committee on the Home and Foreign Mission Reports, to consider more fully the details, as to the province and duties of such an agent, and report to an early Sederunt of the Assembly,—Mr. J. M. Gibson, convener. It was moved by Mr. Burton, seconded by Mr. Andrew Wilson: That the proposal to appoint a Mission Agent for the Church be remitted to the Presbyteries and Synods, with instruction that they consider the matter, and report thereon to next Assembly.

Motions and amendments regarding Mission Agent.

Mr. Hugh Young moved, seconded by Mr. John Scott, of London: That the recommendation of the Committee be adopted.

Recommendation to appoint a Mission Agent approved. Committee to report as to duties of Agent.

Votes being taken, the motion of Professor Caven was carried, as against the amendments of Mr. Young, Mr. Burton, and the motion of Dr. Waters, and the Assembly accordingly remitted to a Committee, to consider more fully the details as to the province and duties of such an agent as is now proposed to be appointed for the missions of the Church.

The recommendation of the Committee that the \$750 voted by the Assembly, should be paid out of the Assembly Fund, was not adopted, but it was agreed, by a majority, that it should be paid out of the Home Mission Fund of the Church.

Request of Simcoe and Ottawa Presbyteries granted.

The request of the Presbytery of Simcoe, that the Rev. James Barron, B. A., be appointed to the Muskoka Missions, at a salary of \$600 per annum, and that of the Presbytery of Ottawa, that a missionary be appointed, called, and ordained by the Presbytery, to labour at Mattawan, and other points on the Upper Ottawa, at the salary which may be deemed necessary; both these ordained missionaries to have a seat in their respective Presbyteries, were agreed to by the Assembly.

Recommendations of Committee on Home Mission work adopted by Assembly.

RECOMMENDATIONS ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

The recommendations as adopted are as follows:—That the General Assembly express its satisfaction, and its gratitude to God for the decided progress which has been made in the cause of Home Missions during the past year, as shown in the amount of work accomplished; in the increase of contributions to the Fund, which

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exceed those of last year by the sum of \$2,744; and in the circumstance of nine mission stations having been advanced to be organized congregations, and the same number of supplemented congregations having become self-sustaining; and also notices with approbation the interest and zeal manifested in the cause of Missions by the students in Knox College and the College of Montreal, and the large amount of work accomplished by these respective societies: and, further, regards as of great importance, the city mission work, conducted at considerable expense by several congregations, exclusive of their liberal contributions to the general schemes of the Church.

That the Assembly observes with regret, that while the advance in the cause of Home Mission is considerable, it does not equal the increase of expenditure; that there is great inequality of liberality in the different Presbyteries, and that in the case of several, there is an actual decrease in the aggregate amount for the last year, and in the view of these circumstances, again urgently enjoins on Presbyteries to take a greater interest in the cause of Missions, and to employ all proper means for inciting defaulting Congregations to a performance of their duty.

The circumstance of 113 Ministers of the Church having stipends less than the minimum of \$600, and there being little prospect from the present rate of contributions of the number being diminished, is deeply regretted, and the attention of Presbyteries and Congregations called to this, as a reason for increased efforts to secure greater liberality.

That the Clerk is instructed to acknowledge the reception of £100, respectively, from the Free Church of Scotland and the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, and tender the cordial thanks of the Assembly for the same, and also to express the thanks of the Assembly to the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, for appointing a missionary to work in connection with the Canada Presbyterian Church, in the Province of Manitoba, with an allowance of £50, yearly, as part payment of his stipend.

With reference to the application of the Presbytery of Manitoba for assistance to Professor Bryce, the Committee having received unofficial intimation of the appointment by the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland, of Mr. Hart, an ordained Missionary, to labour in Manitoba, and the strong desire expressed by the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, for co-operation with this Church in the work in Manitoba, the Assembly express its satisfaction at the proposed co-operation on the part of a sister Church, and instruct the Presbytery of Manitoba to act in this matter as in its wisdom it may deem fit.

That the Presbytery of Manitoba have leave to employ another labourer, for such fields as they may deem necessary.

That when Mr. Donaldson, the ordained Missionary of the Irish Presbyterian Church, is received as a Minister of this Church, by the Presbytery of Manitoba, the Home Mission Committee be authorized to make his salary equal to that of the other Missionaries, and pay his expenses from Toronto to the field.

That a definite understanding be sought with the Presbytery of Manitoba respecting the salary to be raised for the Missionaries in the respective districts to which their labours are devoted.

That for the present year, also, the additional sum of \$100 be given to each of the Missionaries, whereby their salaries are raised to \$700.

That the Assembly, in accepting the resignation of the Rev. John Laing, as Convener of the Home Mission Committee, whose services are no longer available to the Church in that capacity, express its cordial thanks to him, for the important service he has rendered, at at no small sacrifice on his part, to the cause of Home Missions, during the seven years that he held the office of Convener, regarding, as it does, the extension of the Home Mission operations, and the efficiency with which they have been conducted, as largely attributable to his ability and diligence. The Assembly would take this occasion, also, to express its high respect for his character, and his ability, and devotedness as a minister of the Gospel, and, as he has accepted of another position of importance and usefulness, prays that the blessing of the Lord may ever rest on him and his family, and that he may be favoured with comfort and success in his work.

That in compliance with the petition from the Presbyteries of Simcoe and Ottawa, the former Presbytery be authorised to appoint the Rev. James Barron, B. A., to take charge of the Muskoka Missions, at a salary of \$600 per annum; and the latter Presbytery to call and ordain a Missionary to labour at the Mattawan, and other points on the upper Ottawa, at a salary which may be deemed necessary, and also, that both these ordained Missionaries have a seat in their respective Presbyteries.

REASONS OF DISSENT. INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC.

Reasons of dissent by Mr. Ross, and others, against deliverance on Instrumental Music.

The Clerk read reasons of dissent from Mr. John Ross and others, against the deliverance of the Assembly on Instrumental Music. The Assembly agreed to engross them on the records.

REASONS OF DISSENT.

We do hereby dissent from the finding come to anent the use of Instruments of Music in the worship of God, for the following reasons:—

I. Because it permits their use, and so far authorizes this peculiar mode of worship, which is not, under this new and more spiritual dispensation, "prescribed in the Holy Scripture," and hence inconsistent with the doctrine of Divine institution necessary to acceptable worship, laid down in the twenty-first chapter of the Confession of Faith.

II. Because, if so prescribed, it is the duty of the Supreme Court, in loyalty to the Church's King and Head, not merely to permit, but enjoin this mode of worship.

III. Because to authorize, in any way, this mode of worship, is a violation of the sixth article of the Basis of the Union of 1861, which requires that "the ordinances of worship shall be administered in the Church as they heretofore have been, by the respective bodies of which it is composed."

IV. Because many who are conscientiously opposed to this mode of worship, will be shut out of the pulpits in Churches where it is practised, and will be prevented from subscribing the formula which requires them to "own the purity of worship presently authorized and practised in this Church," and to be "persuaded" that it is "founded upon the Word of God, and agreeable thereto;" and to the utmost of their power "to assert, maintain, and defend the said worship," and conform thereto.

V. Because, "Christ being come our High Priest of good things to come, by a greater and more perfect tabernacle, not made with hands," nothing can be pleaded in favour of introducing things made with hands into Christ's worship, because of the place which they hold under the Old Testament. The tabernacle and priesthood being changed, there is also, of necessity, a change of the law, and Christ has now become the High Priest as well as the Altar, Sacrifice, and Priest of the New Testament Church.

VI. Because, by no precept, or statement, or example, or legitimate inference from such does the the New Testament give any sanction to the use of instruments of music in celebrating the praise of God, in public worship, but, on the contrary, enjoins the sacrifice of praise which we are to offer to God continually to be "the fruit of our lips," and to be offered to Him by Jesus Christ, and not by any Instrument of Music.

VII. Because, for these and other reasons, the Assembly has granted a liberty by its own authority, disallowed alike by the Word of God and the Standards of this Church.

In reference to the employment of Probationers in the vacancies of the Church, it was moved by Mr. R. H. Warden, seconded by Dr. Waters: That Probationers and Ministers without charge, whose names are not regularly put on the Probationers' list, be

declared ineligible to calls to vacant Congregations. It was moved in amendment by Dr. Proudfoot : That Ministers and Probationers seeking employment in the vacancies, with the view of obtaining a settlement, shall be required to send their names to the Committee of Distribution, it being understood that the said Committee shall take into their kind consideration the circumstances of persons who have already done good service in the Church, or who may have families needing their special care, so as not to occasion any severe hardship. The amendment was seconded by Mr. Duncan. It was moved in further amendment by Mr. Jno. M. King, seconded by Mr. J. W. Mitchell : That Presbyteries and Preachers be enjoined to conform to the regulations of the Church on the subject of Distribution.

On the vote being taken, the amendment of Mr. King was carried against the amendment of Dr. Proudfoot, and the motion of Mr. R. H. Warden, and the Assembly decided accordingly.

THANKS TO DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE AND ITS CONVENER.

On motion of Mr. J. M. King, duly seconded, the thanks of the General Assembly were tendered to Mr. Torrance and the Sub-Committee on the Distribution of Preachers, for their diligence in the matter intrusted to them.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF COMMITTEE ON COLLEGE REPORTS.

The Reports of the Committees appointed to consider the College reports of Knox College and the Montreal College, and also the Manitoba College, were called for and read by Dr. Topp, the Convener.

The Reports were received, and the recommendations thereof considered Seriatim.

KNOX COLLEGE—MOTION TO ELECT PROFESSOR.

The Assembly considered the report of the Committee on Knox College.

The recommendation of the Committee that Presbyteries during the ensuing year consider the whole question of an additional Professor, and nominate such minister, as they may deem suitable for the chair, was first taken up.

It was moved by Mr. Farries, seconded by Mr. Cochrane: That this General Assembly proceed at once to the election of a Professor to fill the vacancy in Knox College.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. J. W. Mitchell, and seconded by Mr. Hugh Young: that in terms of the recommendation of the Committee, the matter be sent down to Presbyteries for consideration during the year.

The vote being taken, the motion of Mr. Farries was carried by a majority, and the Assembly thus decided to proceed at once to the election of a Professor for Knox College.

REV. WM. GREGG, M. A., ELECTED PROFESSOR.

On motion of Mr. A. B. Simpson, seconded by Mr. Cochrane, the Rev. Wm. Gregg, M.A., of Cooke's Church, Toronto, was unanimously elected to the chair of Apologetics in Knox College Toronto, on the same terms as the other Professors.

LECTURER ON HOMILETICS.—DR. PROUDFOOT CHOSEN.

The recommendation of the Committee that a Lecturer on Homiletics be appointed was next considered.

It was moved by Mr. J. M. King, seconded by Mr. J. W. Motion. Mitchell, that in view of the election, by this Assembly, of a Professor of Apologetics, the recommendation be not adopted.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. R. C. Moffatt, duly seconded, that the recommendation of the Committee that Dr. Proudfoot be appointed Lecturer for the next Session be adopted. On the vote being taken, the amendment of Mr. Moffatt was carried, Dr. Proudfoot appointed Lecturer in Homiletics for the next Session in Knox College.

COMMITTEE TO INFORM MR. GREGG OF HIS ELECTION.

The Moderator appointed the following as a Committee to inform Mr. Gregg of his election, viz.:—Professor Caven, Convener; Professor Inglis, Dr. Topp, A. B. Simpson, F. W. Farries, W. Cochrane, T. Wardrope, Hon. J. McMurrich, H. Young, and Thos. McCrae.

Committee to wait upon Mr. Gregg.

SUNDRY RECOMMENDATIONS ADOPTED.

The recommendation of the Committee authorising the Senate to make additions to Knox College Library, was adopted.

Other recommendations adopted.

The following recommendations were also adopted:—

That the number of times that Students shall be allowed to preach while the work of the classes is going on be not greater than six, and that it be the same for each theological year; also that the establishment of additional Bursaries be commended to the liberality of the Church; that the Senate, in conjunction with the Board, be authorised to make provision for the teaching of Elocution, and that the first Sabbath of October be observed as a day of special prayer for the Colleges.

MONTREAL COLLEGE.—RECOMMENDATIONS ADOPTED.

The recommendations of the Committee on the Montreal College were next considered.

The 1st. That the Rev J. M. Gibson be appointed Lecturer in Exegetics, was adopted.

Mr. Gibson appointed Lecturer in Exegetics. Collection for French Evangelization.

The 2nd. That the collection for the training of the French Students, and for French Evangelization, be taken up as last year, in all the congregations of the Church, was adopted.

In regard to the third recommendation that the Presbytery of Kingston be added to the three Presbyteries now connected with the College for Financial support. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Burton, duly seconded: that the Assembly remit this recommendation to the Presbytery of Kingston, with the instruction that they report to the next Assembly their views thereon. Further, that this Assembly grant liberty to the Presbytery, to direct the congregations within its bounds, to send their College contributions to the Treasurer of the Montreal College during the current ecclesiastical year.

Kingston Presbytery relations to Montreal College.

Mr. Burton's motion carried. It was moved in further amendment by Dr. Waters, duly seconded, that the last clause of Mr. Burton's amendment be changed to read as follows:—Further, that the contributions be sent to Knox College for the current year.

The vote being taken, the amendment of Mr. Burton was carried as against the amendment of Dr. Waters, and the recommendation of the Committee.

Additional Professor. Election delayed. The fourth recommendation, that an additional Professor be appointed with as little delay as possible, was allowed to lie on the table, until next meeting of Assembly.

The fifth and sixth recommendations, which are as follows, were adopted.

Mr. McLaren and Mr. J. Campbell appointed Lecturers. That two Lecturers be appointed for three months each during next Session, and that the names of Messrs. McLaren, of Ottawa, and Campbell, of Toronto, be submitted to the Assembly for its approval.

That should the Lecturers appointed by the Assembly decline to act, the Board be empowered to appoint others in their stead.

Manitoba College.

MANITOBA COLLEGE.—RECOMMENDATIONS ADOPTED.

Draft Act, &c., &c.

I. That a small Committee, consisting of Mr. W. Reid, Dr. Topp, J. M. King, Professor Bryce, Rev. J. Black, Hon. J. McMurich, Hon. D. Gunn,—T. W. Taylor, Convener, be appointed to prepare a draft of an act for the incorporation of the College of Manitoba, to be submitted to a Committee composed of the members of the Board of Knox College, and of the Home Mission Committee, which large Committee, in concert with the Presbytery of Manitoba, shall be empowered finally to sanction such act, and have it submitted to the Legislature of the Province of Manitoba.

II. That the following persons be appointed the Board of Trustees of the College, subject to the revision of the Presbytery, along with the Committee above named, namely:—Donald A. Smith, A. G. B. Bannatyne, William Fraser, Donald Gunn, John Sutherland, (Senator), Neil Henderson, and Angus Polson.

III. That the following persons, along with the Committee above named, constitute the Board of Management, namely:—G. McMicken, John F. Bain, John Fraser, John Sutherland, M.P.P., Rev. J. Black, Rev. W. Fletcher, Rev. J. McNabb, Rev. Prof. Bryce.

IV. That the part of the fourth recommendation, referring to the recognition of theological training in Manitoba, be respectfully declined, and that the former part of the recommendation be referred to the Senate and Board of Examiners of Knox College, to consider to what extent the course of study in Manitoba College can be regarded as equivalent to the preparatory course in Knox and Montreal Colleges, and to report to next General Assembly.

That the fifth and sixth recommendations do not require to be now entertained.

Collection to go in aid of Manitoba College.

That the seventh recommendation giving the Presbytery of Manitoba power to appropriate the collections for College purposes, to the support of Manitoba College, be adopted.

On motion duly made and seconded, these recommendations of the Committee, regarding Knox, Montreal, and Manitoba Colleges as amended, were adopted by the Assembly.

DELEGATE FROM PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF CANADA, IN CONNECTION WITH THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

It having been announced that the Rev. J. B. Muir, of Galt, would be present in the evening as a delegate from the Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland, it was agreed to hear Mr. Muir at half past eight o'clock. Mr. Muir to be heard in the evening.

It was then moved by Mr. McLaren, and duly seconded, I. Instruct the Commission to inquire into the character and probable ministerial usefulness of the applicant. II. Instruct the Presbytery of Ontario to appear before said Commission, and supply such information and explanations as they may have to offer respecting the grounds on which the statement contained in their paper anent Mr. Windell's applications are based. III. Instruct the clerk of the Assembly meanwhile to issue circular letters to the Presbyteries, intimating Mr. Windell's application and its reference to a Commission, and informing them that if they have any advice to offer, it must be in the hands of the clerk of the Assembly for the guidance of the Commission on or before the 1st September next. It was moved in amendment by Professor Caven duly seconded,—that the Assembly instruct the Presbytery to prepare the case for the commission, by seeing to it that the parties who have brought charges or intimated to them their intention of bringing charges against Mr. Windell, shall have the charges presented to the Presbytery so that Mr. Windell, as also the Commission of Assembly, may be furnished with copies of them in due time for the purposes of the Commission : like as the Presbytery are hereby instructed accordingly. Motion of Mr. McLaren.

Amendment carried. On the vote being taken, the amendment of Professor Caven was carried as against the motion of Mr. McLaren and the Assembly accordingly decided in terms thereof.

The Assembly then proceeded to hear the Revd. J. B. Muir the delegate from the Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland. Mr. Muir's commission having been read, the moderator welcomed Mr. Muir to the Assembly and introduced him to the Court. Mr. Muir then addressed the Assembly conveying the fraternal regards of the Synod of his church, and giving some interesting details as to the progress of Union Sentiments in the recent meeting of that Court.

DUTIES OF MISSION AGENT,—REPORT OF COMMITTEE, SENT DOWN TO PRESBYTERIES.

Mr. J. M. Gibson, from the Committee appointed to define the duties of the Mission Agent to be appointed by the Assembly, gave in their report, which was read and received.

It was agreed that the whole subject of a Mission Agent or Secretary be sent down to Presbyteries for consideration (together with the specification of duties prepared by the Committee), and to report to next Assembly.

The following are the duties specified by the Committee.

1. That the designation of the Agent shall be—Mission Secretary of the Canada Presbyterian Church.
2. That under the direction of the Home and Foreign Mission Committees, he shall have the general oversight of the Home and Foreign Mission operations of the Church.
3. That he shall be *ex officio*, a member and Secretary of both these Committees.

4. That it shall be his duty to co-operate with Presbyteries in endeavouring to secure the more effective working of the Mission fields within their several bounds.

5. That it shall be his duty, so far as practicable, to visit Presbyteries and Congregations, with a view to stimulate their liberality, in support of the Home and Foreign Missions, and other Schemes of the Church.

6. That it shall be his duty, through the pages of the RECORD, or otherwise, to supply Missionary intelligence to the Church.

7. That inasmuch as this definition of the province of the Secretary is merely tentative, it be an instruction to the Home and Foreign Mission Committees to recommend to the next General Assembly such modifications of the above particulars as their experience may suggest.

Mr. McLaren, from the Committee appointed to give in answers to the reasons of dissents, on the part of Mr. Ure, Mr. Ross, and others, gave in their report which was read.

THE ANSWERS TO MR. ROSS'S REASONS WERE ADOPTED AS
FOLLOWS :—

Answers to
Mr. Ross's
reasons.

"Your Committee, without offering detailed answers to the reasons of dissent given in by Mr. Ross and those adhering to him, beg to reply generally.

1. That there does not appear to be any special necessity for assigning to the doctrines in question, a place in the Basis of Union, provided it be clearly understood that the negotiating Churches hold the teachings of the Confession of Faith.

2. That the design of the Assembly's resolution which is dissented from, is to secure some such "deliverance as shall meet the views of all portions in the Church" and your Committee submit that, while the resolutions may not definitely require from the negotiating Churches any statement regarding Christ's Headship over the nations, which as far as known, has never been questioned either theoretically or practically, by any of them, it nevertheless opens the way for such conferences as when duly reported, may remove all reasonable scruples on this score.

3. That the terms employed in the Second Article of the Basis of Union, in reference to the Confession of Faith, namely, "full liberty of conscience in matters of religion" are to be understood in that sense in which "liberty of conscience" is defined in the Confession of Faith, and has been historically held among the reformed Churches, the fullest measure of which gives no room for the consequences which the dissentients seem to fear.

4. The dissentients are apparently anticipating and pronouncing sentence of condemnation upon the results of conferences yet to be held, and which are intended to remove just such apprehensions or misgivings as those to which *they have given utterance.*

Leave was given the Committee to retire for the purpose of Committee

REPORT OF KANKAKEE MISSION.

The report of the Kankakee Mission was read by the Clerk, Kankakee

Committee, and the different clauses taken up Seriatim.

✱ The recommendations of the Committee in regard to placing
the congregation of St. Anne's, Kankakee, on the list of supple-
mented congregations, and the granting of \$800 from the French
Evangelization funds, were not adopted, but the annual collection
was appointed for St. Anne's as formerly.

ANSWERS TO MR. URE'S REASONS OF DISSENT ADOPTED.

were again read as amended and adopted by the Assembly. Answers to

ANSWERS TO THE REASONS OF DISSENT BY MR. R. URE AND
OTHERS.

I. In reply to the first reasons of dissent, your Committee have
to state that they have anew examined the reports of the Com-
mittee on Union laid before the General Assembly, and they find
that they contain nothing to indicate that any steps were taken to
ascertain whether there is "unanimity of sentiment in regard to
the Doctrine of the Headship of Christ and its practical applica-
tions in the circumstances of the Church in this land," and they
submit that no merely verbal statement, even when fully satisfac-
tory to those who heard them, can form a suitable basis for ecclesi-
astical action, much less can give satisfaction to the entire Church,
which had no means of becoming acquainted with them.

II. In answer to the second reason of dissent, they reply,—in as-
much as the Committee on Union obtained from the Committees
of other negotiating Churches no recorded declaration of the kind
desired, it cannot be justly construed to imply any want of confi-
dence in the sincerity of the representatives of the other Churches,
to seek something more specific.

III. In answer to the third reason of dissent, they reply that while
they gladly admit that the doctrine in question is clearly stated in the
Confession of Faith, they cannot regard a deliverance upon the
subject, or such a recorded statement of ascertained unity of senti-
ment thereon, as is contemplated by this Assembly, as useless, in-
asmuch as such deliverance or recorded statement of ascertained
unity of sentiment, would satisfy the minds of many esteemed
members of this Assembly, and of the Church.

LICENSING OF STUDENTS—REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The report of the Committee on the Licensing of Students was
read by Mr. McLaren, and adopted as follows: "The Committee
appointed to consider the applications of Presbyteries for leave to
license Students of Divinity, beg to report that they have exam-
ined said applications, and find that all the steps prescribed in the
Book of Forms in connection with such applications have been

taken by the Presbyteries of Montreal, Ottawa, and Simcoe, and they therefore recommend that leave be granted to the Presbytery of Montreal to license Messrs. J. M. McAlister, B.A., D. M. McLennan, and Henry Sinclair; to the Presbytery of Ottawa to license Messrs. James Stewart and Robert Whillams, B.A.; and to the Presbytery of Simcoe to license Mr. Mark Danby. They find:

II. That the Presbyteries of London and Paris do not appear from their applications to have required from the students on whose behalf they apply the requisite certificates from the Professors and Senate of the colleges where they studied, and they recommend that when such certificates are produced before said Presbyteries, the Presbytery of London shall have leave to license Mr. Armstrong, and the Presbytery of Paris shall be permitted to license, Messrs. Pettigrew and Cockburn.

They find III. That the Presbytery of Guelph while requiring from Mr. William Kay, A.M., the proper testimonials, that he had completed his theological curriculum, and his character, and conduct during his attendance on college, were suitable to his views of life, do not appear to have subjected him to the prescribed preliminary examination, and the Committee recommend that the General Assembly while noting the irregularity, should permit the Presbytery of Guelph, after due examination on the prescribed branches, both for the preliminary and public probationary trials of students applying for license, to license Mr. William Kay, A.M. The Assembly adopted the report and decided in terms thereof.

UNION COMMITTEE,—OLD COMMITTEE RE-APPOINTED.

Union Committee for 1872-3 old com.—re-appointed.

Mr. Wardrope moved duly seconded that the old committee on Union negotiations be re-appointed, which was carried. The following is the Committee:—Dr. Taylor, Mr. Ure, Dr. Topp, Professor Caven, Mr. T. McPherson, Dr. McVicar, Ministers; Messrs. D. McKay, Hon. J. McMurrich, T. McCrae, J. L. Gibb, G. Hay, T. W. Taylor, Elders; Dr. Topp, Convener.

The diet was then closed with the benediction.

TWENTY-THIRD SEDERUNT.

The Assembly met and was duly constituted, Mr. T. S. Chambers at the Moderator's request, leading the Assembly in prayer.

Minutes sustained.
Report of Com. on Foreign Mission Report.

The minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

The Assembly called for the report of the committee on the Foreign Mission Report, which was read by Mr. Gibson. The report was read and received and the recommendations thereof considered Seriatim.

In accordance therewith the General Assembly agreed. I. To grant the transfer of the work in British Columbia from the Foreign Mission Committee to the Home Mission Committee, but that, in consequence of the present state of the Home Mission Fund, one half of the liabilities be borne by the Foreign Mission Fund for the first year. Clauses, 3 and 5, were also adopted simpliciter; clause 4th was not adopted; clause 6th was also adopted as follows:

That the name of Mr. Edward Vincent, missionary to the Saskatchewan be ordered, as it hereby is to be removed from the roll of the Presbytery of Ottawa and added to the roll of the Presbytery of Manitoba. It was also agreed that the Foreign Mission Committee have power to send a deputy to visit the Prince Albert Mission, encourage the missionaries in their work, inquire into the method of its operations, and make any suggestions which may be deemed advisable.

The recommendations were agreed to as a whole thus amended. Recommendations adopted. They are as follows:—(1.) That the work in British Columbia be transferred from the Foreign Mission Committee to the Home Mission Committee; but that, in consequence of the present state of the Home Mission Fund, one half of the liabilities be borne by the Foreign Mission Fund for the first year.

2. That the General Assembly hail with much satisfaction the offer of certain young women in Montreal to engage in Foreign Mission work, and instructs the Committee to give them all due encouragement in preparing for this department of Christ's service; to select a field of labour for them; and as soon as it may be deemed expedient, to send them forth to labour in the Foreign field.

3. That the Foreign Mission Committee, in view of the employment of female labourers in the Mission field, be recommended to take into consideration the extent and manner in which the co-operation of the female membership of the Church may be most effectually secured, in connection with this department of the Church's work.

4. That the name of Mr. Edward Vincent, Missionary to the Saskatchewan, be ordered, as it hereby is, to be removed from the Roll of the Presbytery of Ottawa, and placed on the Roll of the Presbytery of Manitoba.

5. That the Foreign Mission Committee have power to send a deputy to visit the Prince Albert Mission, encourage the Missionaries in their work, inquire into the method of its operations, and make any suggestions which may be deemed advisable.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

Mr. J. M. Gibson, gave in the report of the Committee on the report of the Sabbath School work of the Church, which was read and received. Report of Committee on S. S. Report.

The clauses were considered seriatim and adopted as follows: Recommendations adopted. the recommendations of the committee being referred to the Sabbath School Committee.

I. That the Report be printed as usual in the appendix to the minutes of Synod.

II. That the first recommendations of the Report be adopted, viz: That the annual synodical and Presbyterian Conferences on Sabbath School work be continued, and that clerks of Synods and Presbyteries be instructed to send to this committee the results of said Conferences, with such suggestions as they may deem suitable for consideration and discussion by the supreme Court of the Church.

III. That the third recommendation of the report be adopted, viz: That the Committee appointed by last Assembly to recommend certain books for Sabbath School Libraries, be continued with special instructions to confer and correspond with the similar Committee appointed by the General Assembly of the American Presbyterian Church, and take such other steps, as may be considered advisable in the premises. The Committee is as follows:— Messrs. J. Fotheringham, Convener; Prof. Caven, Prof. Gregg, J. M. King, T. McPherson, W. Cochrane, Hon. Jno. McMurrich, J. L. Blaikie, J. Brown.

IV. That a Committee be appointed to consider the propriety of providing a uniform scheme of Lessons for the use of the Sabbath Schools of the Church, with instructions to examine the scheme now in course of preparation, by the International Committee appointed for the purpose by the late Convention at Indianapolis, and to adopt it if they consider it suitable.

V. That the attention of Presbyteries be called to the resolution of the Presbytery at Paris, engrossed in the report, and it be recommended that, so far as practicable, Presbyteries make arrangements for the holding of Sabbath School Institutes or Training Classes for Teachers within their bounds.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RECORDS OF MANITOBA PRESBYTERY.

Mr. Alex. Young gave in the Report of the Committee on the Records of the Presbytery of Manitoba.

Mr. R. H. Warden moved that the Report of the Committee be sent to the Clerk of the Presbytery of Manitoba, and his attention called to the regulations in reference to the Presbytery Minutes. The motion was agreed to.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

Report of
Committee
on Aged and
Infirm Min-
isters' Fund.

Mr. J. M. King gave in a Report from the Committee on the Report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. The Report was read and received and its recommendations considered, *seriatim*. The recommendations are as follows:

“The Committee to which the Report on the Aged Ministers' Fund was referred, begs to report to the General Assembly as follows:

It recommends 1st, That the thanks of the General Assembly be tendered to the Committee for its diligence and fidelity in attending to the interests intrusted to it.

2nd. That the action of the Committee in adding the name of the Rev. Andrew Melville to the list of annuitants be approved.

3rd. That the case of the Rev. John Fotheringham be remitted to the Committee for its favourable consideration, with this additional recommendation, that the grant, of whatever amount, be in the meantime for two years only.

"4th. That no further action be taken in the meantime in regard to the application of the Cobourg Presbytery for a retiring allowance to the Rev. T. Alexander, mainly, in view of the fact that Mr. Alexander is believed to be at present regularly employed in the work of the Ministry.

5th. That the recommendation of the Report, to the effect that in those cases in which the regulation requiring Presbyteries to correspond with the Aged Ministers' Committee before accepting the resignation of Ministers on behalf of whom application is to be made to this Fund is disregarded, the claim should date only from the meeting of the General Assembly to which their names are reported, and not from that of the resignation or vacancy.

6th. That instead of adopting the recommendation of the Report to add another to our annual collections, this Assembly should resolve to suspend, for a single year, the collection for the Ministers' Widows' Fund, and thereof to raise, during the next twelve months, by collection and subscription, \$10,000 for the Aged Ministers' Fund, with the view of increasing the present capital of the Fund, and that it be remitted to the Committee to apportion this amount, in the same equitable way among the Presbyteries of the Church, and that these be enjoined to co-operate towards the success of the scheme.

7th. That in accordance with the recommendation of the Report, this Assembly should give its sanction to the principle of aiding the Fund, by a small rate payable by the Ministers of the Church, and that it be remitted to the Committee to bring up to the next General Assembly, a well-matured plan for the future working of this important Fund, regard being had in the scale of payments proposed to be made, to the length of service rendered by the annuitant, within the bounds of this Church.

8th. That the Report should, for the future, embrace the names of the annuitants, and the amounts paid to each."

Clauses 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th were adopted.

Clause 5th was not adopted.

Clause 6th was not adopted.

Clause 7th was adopted in so far as it remits to a Committee to a Committee to bring up a well-matured plan for the future working of the Fund, without committing the Assembly to any principle which recognizes a rate payable by all the Ministers of the Church.

The recommendations as amended were adopted by the Assembly.

REPORT OF WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Report of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund was read by Mr. Reid, and received; and the recommendations left in the hands of the Committee to act as they shall see fit, and report to the next Assembly.

French Evangelization. The report of the Committee on French Evangelization was held as read, and thanks tendered to the Convener for his diligence.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Finance. The report of the Committee on Finance was read and received —thanks given to the Committee, and especially to the Convener, and it was ordered that the Report be printed in the Minutes.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RECORD.

Record. The report of the Committee on the Record was read by Mr. Reid. It showed an increase in the circulation of the Record, and proposed certain changes in order to a still larger circulation. The report was received and the recommendations left in the hands of the Committee on the Record.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF RELIGION.

State of religion. Report of Committee on Report. The report from the Committee on the report of the Assembly's Committee on the state of religion was read and received. On motion duly seconded, the report, with its recommendations, was remitted to the standing Committee on the state of religion.

ALTERNATES—CONSIDERATION OF DEFERRED.

Alternates. Consideration of the answers of Presbyteries to the Remits on Question deferred till next Assembly.

COMMITTEE ON CORRESPONDENCE.

Com. on correspondence. The Moderator of the Assembly, Mr. Scott, of London, and the Clerks of Assembly, were appointed a Committee on Correspondence with foreign Churches for the ensuing year.

COMMITTEE ON DISTRIBUTION OF PREACHES.

Com. on distribution of Preachers. The Assembly appointed the following as the Committee of Distribution for the ensuing year, namely:—Mr. Torrance, Convener; Dr. Waters, Mr. Cochrane, Mr. McCall, and T. McCrae.

ANSWERS TO REASONS OF DISSENT AGAINST INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC.

Professor Caven's answers to reasons of dissent on Instrumental Music. Answers to reasons of dissent on the subject of Instrumental Music, (submitted at the meeting of the General Assembly in Quebec) were read by Mr. Reid, (Professor Caven, the Convener of the Committee on the subject, being absent.) On motion the answers to the reasons were adopted and ordered to be printed in the Minutes.

They are as follows :

1. To the first reason it is answered that, in this matter, respect must be had to the teachings of the Old Testament as well as the New. The use of Instrumental Music in the public worship of God, was allowed and sanctioned, under the Old Testament, Economy : unless, therefore, it can be shewn that the New Testament expressly or by implication repeals the sanction given under the Old, the authority of the New Testament cannot be adduced against the use of Instruments in the worship of God.

As to the passage quoted from Heb. 13, 15, it is believed that a true interpretation would give it a much wider application than to praise, of giving of thanks *in song*. "The sacrifice of praise" or the "thank-offering" which is "the fruit of the lips" in "giving thanks" or "confessing to His name," refers to all the ways in which we speak our gratitude for the goodness of God; any inference, therefore, from this expression which proceeds on the supposition that it is a definition of Praise as an element in Worship will be illegitimate.

2. The second reason of dissent seems to rest on the assumption that the use of Instrumental Music in the Worship of God, under the Old Economy, was part of the ceremonial law which has been abrogated by the coming of Christ. It is answered that the ceremonial or typical character of Instrumental Music, under the old dispensation, is wholly without proof. In no part of Scripture is Instrumental Music said to have a typical meaning, and there is nothing, surely, in the nature of the case from which any such inference can be drawn.

3. If the use of Instrumental Music in aid of public worship is prohibited neither in the Scripture, nor in the subordinate standards of the Church, it does not seem that the third reason of dissent can have any special force as against the action of the Assembly. The Presbyterian Church, in her legislation, has wisely abstained from committing herself on the matter under consideration; our Church cannot, therefore, be accused of relinquishing her testimony, or falling from her practice, if she declines to enforce uniformity in the mode of conducting public praise.

4. It is certainly a mistake to represent the *finding of the Assembly* in this case as the introduction of "strife and confusion" into the Church. It is known to all that the question of congregations enjoying liberty in the matter of Instrumental Aid in Worship has been much discussed throughout the Church, and repeatedly submitted to the Supreme Court, and that the Assembly has not raised the question. Moreover, it is believed that the granting under proper regulations of the liberty sought, will result in cutting off much strife; and is much preferable, even in regard to the peace and harmony of the Body, to leaving the question in its present unsettled condition.

5. It is fully conceded that, in all such cases as the present, great deference is due both to the conscientious conviction, and the feelings of brethren on all hands. But, by the Assembly's decision, no congregation of the Church is required to employ Instrumental Music, nor is any pressure brought to bear upon congregations in order to secure such a result. It is believed, then, that it is an exaggerated view of their responsibility for the action of the Church,—a view hardly consistent with the freedom which is, indeed, qualified but not cancelled by the respect due to the conscientious convictions of minorities, which would lead brethren who have clearly and earnestly given utterance to their own sentiments in the Supreme Court of the Church, to feel their conscience aggrieved by the decision come to in a matter such as the present.

4. For the Kankakee Mission, on the first Sabbath of November.
5. For the Home Mission Fund, on the third Sabbath of December.
6. Contributions for Knox College, and Montreal College, not later than the 31st day of January.
7. For Foreign Missions, on the third Sabbath of March.

APPLICATION OF MR. LAFONTAINE.

An application from the Rev. Mr. Lafontaine was read, asking an increase of salary. It was remitted to the Kankakee Mission Committee.

COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISTIC WORK.

Evangelistic Work.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work was re-appointed for the ensuing year. The Committee is comprised as follows :—Mr. R. Hamilton, Convener ; Prof. Caven, Dr. Topp, Prof. Young, Dr. Waters, Rev. J. K. Smith.

PRINCIPAL CAMPBELL'S ADDRESS TO THE ASSEMBLY.

Principal Campbell addresses Assembly.

Wm. Wardrope intimated to the Court that Principal Campbell, of Aberdeen, was present in the Assembly. On motion, the Principal was welcomed to the platform and introduced to the Assembly by the Rev. William Reid, the Clerk of the Assembly.

Principal Campbell addressed the Court, expressing his gratification at being permitted to visit the Assembly, and seeing some of his old friends, who are Ministers of this Church.

On motion of Mr. Wardrope, seconded by Mr. Reid, the thanks of the Assembly were tendered Principal Campbell.

THANKS TO MINISTER AND OFFICE BEARERS OF KNOX CHURCH.

On motion of Mr. Andrew Wilson, seconded by Mr. McLaren, ^{Vote of} thanks were tendered to the Minister of Knox Church, the Trustees of the Church, the Christian friends in Hamilton who have ^{thanks to} so hospitably entertained the Assembly, and also to the Railroad and Steamboat Companies, for reduction of fare to the members. ^{Hamilton.}

MODERATOR'S CLOSING ADDRESS.

The Moderator then briefly addressed the Assembly, thanking ^{Moderator's} the brethren for the honour conferred upon him in electing him ^{Closing} to the office, and the kind forbearance exercised towards him during the Sessions of Assembly.

ASSEMBLY DISSOLVED—NEW ONE INDICTED.

The Moderator then gave out for praise the 122nd Psalm, ^{Assembly} verses 6 to 9, inclusive, which having been sung, Mr. Ure, at the ^{dissolved.} request of the Moderator, led the Assembly in prayer. The Moderator then announced that the Assembly was dissolved, and ^{New one} indicted another General Assembly, to meet in the city of Toronto, and within Cooke's Church there, on the first Tuesday of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, at the hour of half-past seven o'clock in the evening.

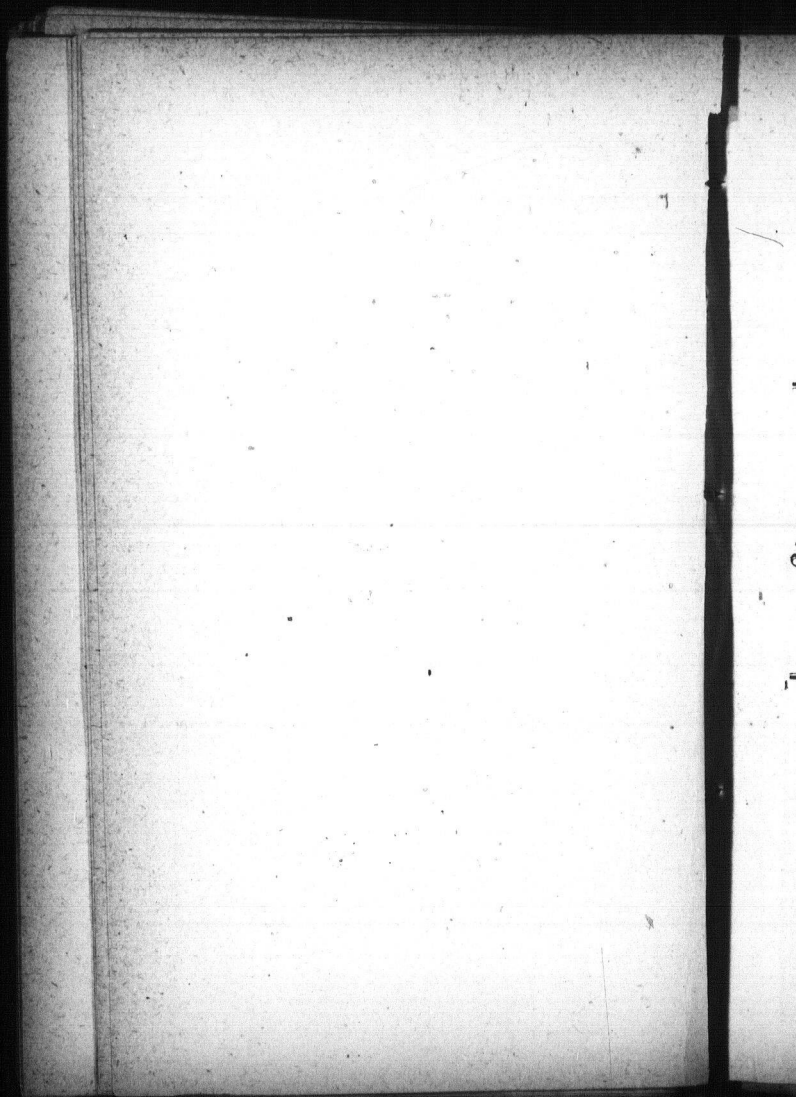

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

To the General Assembly of the Canadian Presbyterian Church.

Your Committee in presenting its annual report desire to draw the attention of the Assembly to the fact, that, notwithstanding the recommendations of the Committee, enforced as these recommendations were by the authority of the Assembly, too many congregations have entirely failed to report. Of these, 16 are settled charges, being as follows:—Farnham in the Presbytery of Montreal; Admaston in the Presbytery of Ottawa; Keene and Westwood, and Campbellford in the Presbytery of Cobourg; Columbus and Brooklin, and Lindsay in the Presbytery of Ontario; Ancaster East and West, and St. Ann's and Welland Port (both recently settled) in the Presbytery of Hamilton; Berlin (recently settled) in the Presbytery of Guelph; Forrest and McKay's Settlement, and Thamesford (recently settled) in the Presbytery of London; Wellesley in the Presbytery of Stratford; Bluevale and Wingham in the Presbytery of Huron; and Carrick and Clifford (recently settled) in the Presbytery of Durham. Some of these charges, as already noted, have only been recently settled, but there is no reason, that your Committee can see, why reports should not have been sent from these congregations. Of the non-reporting congregations 27 are vacant charges. There is by far too large a proportion of congregations sending no returns. These congregations are under the care and supervision of the Presbytery, and *should be required* to furnish reports. What is done by so many can be done by all. Some Presbyteries do not even think it incumbent upon them to insert the names of vacant congregations in the reports. In some cases your Committee has been compelled to obtain the names of vacant congregations from any source of information within reach. These congregations have, all of them, Moderators of Session, and these gentlemen could surely attend to the matter. The vacant non-reporting congregations are found as follows:—One each in the Presbyteries of Ottawa, Brockville, Kingston, Ontario, Toronto, Guelph, and Chatham; two in each of the Presbyteries of Huron and Durham; three in each of the Presbyteries of Montreal and Simcoe; four in Owen Sound and six in London.

In almost all cases the statistics of Mission Stations are given very imperfectly, and in many instances not at all. It is thus impossible to present anything like a perfectly accurate view of the condition of the Church as regards either our numbers or finance. Your Committee looks upon this as a matter requiring the attention of the Assembly.

I. STATISTICS.

1. MINISTERS.

Your Committee has prepared a summary of the changes which have occurred in the number of the ministers on the rolls of the several Synods. Up to the meeting of Assembly there were reported by the Synods to the Clerks of Assembly, two deaths. One of these, who had long "borne the burden and heat of the day," and who has now "fallen on sleep," was the late Dr. Boyd. The other, Mr. Duncan, was a much

younger man, and had apparently many years of usefulness before him, but he too has "fallen on sleep." There were also reported, 21 demissions, while to set against these there were 15 inductions, 14 translations, 15 ordinations, 13 received from other churches, and 12 students licensed. Up to the close of March of the current year there were on the rolls of the several Presbyteries 307 ministers. This number includes three ordained missionaries returned from the Presbytery of Montreal. At the same period last year there were 296 on the roll, showing a clear gain in the course of the year of 11, or excluding the ordained missionaries of eight. Making another comparison, viz., with the number on the Synod Rolls, as returned to the Clerks of Assembly last year and this, your Committee finds that while the number last year was 292, this year the number at the same period was 304, thus showing a gain of 12 from Assembly to Assembly.

2. CONGREGATIONS.

It is found that there are 615 Stations forming charges, or parts of charges, under the care of settled pastors, while there are 70 stations, not forming part of their regular charges, supplied by them. There is an increase in the first of 27, and in the latter of 12. This does not include the number of stations supplied by missionaries, concerning which no report has been made to this Committee.

3. OFFICE BEARERS, ETC.

The number of Elders reported to your Committee is 1825, being an increase over last year of 100. This is nearly an average of seven to each minister in charge of a congregation. There are also 2843—being an increase of 113—Deacons or Managers, who take the oversight of the temporal affairs of the church, while the number of Sabbath School Teachers reported is 3802, being an increase in that highly necessary class of workers of 188. There are 155 Missionary Associations, being an increase in that efficient instrumentality for advancing the missionary interests of the church of 27. While the increase is satisfactory, so far as it goes, it is the opinion of your Committee that no congregation can do justice to our mission schemes which does not, by an agency of this nature, endeavour to raise the necessary funds for the schemes of the church.

4. FAMILIES.

Your Committee finds that the number of families, after making the same allowance for non-reporting congregations having settled pastors as in past years, is 28,564. This it is believed is very much below the number of families actually in connection with the church. Some sessions, reporting a large membership, make no mention of the number of their families, while there are 27 vacant congregations for which no allowance has been made.

5. COMMUNICANTS.

It is highly satisfactory to note that there is a steady increase in the number of Communicants. Last year the number reported, including the non-reporting congregations having settled pastors, was 47,866; while this year the number, including 14 non-reporting congregations having settled pastors, is 49,772, giving an increase in the number of communi-

cants of 1886. Trying the increase by another method, your Committee finds that 2465 united with the Church by certificate from other churches, 2657 were received on a profession of faith—of these 140 were received by baptism—2981 were removed from the roll, leaving a net gain of 2141. This shows a difference of 254 in the increase obtained by the two methods of calculation. Did all congregations report correct returns, then the results of the two methods of calculation would be exactly alike.

6. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The number of children in the Sabbath Schools of the Church is 33,008, while the number in Bible classes is 8582, giving a total of 41,590 young people regularly and systematically trained in the Word of God. This gives an increase over last year of 1651. The Sabbath Schools have also raised for missionary purposes the respectable sum of \$3677 44, an increase over the past year of \$703 29.

7. CHURCH ACCOMMODATION.

It is reported to your Committee that Church Accommodation is provided for 128,210, that is, there are just so many sittings provided for worshippers. This is an increase of 8971 over the last year, and of 14,143 over the preceding year. This does not by any means give the actual amount of church accommodation provided for worshippers in our churches. Still it is a matter of congratulation that such marked progress is manifest. Nothing shows the rapid growth of the Church better than a comparison of different years. In 1865, the first year in which Church Accommodation was given in the statistics, the number of sittings was 82,971. This shows an increase in seven years of 45249 sittings.

8. CHURCH EXTENSION AND PROGRESS IN CITIES.

Your Committee has made a comparative estimate of the position and growth of the Church in all the cities in Ontario and Quebec for the period between the years 1867 and 1872, being for five years. The following table gives a condensed view of the state of matters.

In the case of London only one session has made a return of the number of communicants, consequently the comparison could be made for only one congregation.

In connection with this subject, it was the intention of your Committee to give a short account of church extension in these cities, but as the Home Mission Committee has already referred to that matter it is not thought advisable to do more than simply indicate growth. In Montreal the mission station in St. Joseph Street has grown to be a self-sustaining congregation, with a Communion Roll of 165, while the station at Mile

End is transformed into the congregation of Chalmers' Church, with a settled pastor. The membership of this congregation is not reported to your Committee.

In Toronto in 1867 the congregations in connection with our Church in that city were, Knox Church, Bay Street, Gould Street, Cooke's Church, and the West Church. There are now two more congregations with settled pastors, namely, Charles Street Church and the East Church. In different parts of the city mission stations and schools have been established and kept up by the congregations of Gould Street, Charles Street, Cooke's Church, and Knox Church. It is expected that in no long time some of these mission schools will grow to be self-sustaining charges. In Montreal and Hamilton there are missions of the same kind, concerning which your Committee does not possess any information.

II. FINANCES.

While our statistics thus show a highly satisfactory increase, both in the membership and ministry of the Church, the financial report has an equally encouraging tale to tell.

1. STIPENDS.

The amount paid for Stipends by congregations alone was \$203,711 53, being an increase over last year of \$15,767 21, and an increase over the amount paid five years ago of \$52,142 03.

While these comparative statements speak well for the whole Church, there is another and a darker side to the picture. Your Committee must again draw the attention of the General Assembly to the exceedingly inadequate remuneration which many of the most hard-working, faithful and zealous pastors of the church receive, and would therefore beg the attention of the General Assembly to the following facts. In the Presbytery of Montreal there are ten ministers, including ordained missionaries, who receive less than \$500 00 a year; in the Presbyteries of Brockville, one; Kingston, two; Cobourg, one; Ontario, three; Toronto, two; Simcoe, one; Hamilton, three; London, two; Chatham, one; Huron, one; Owen Sound, one; Durham, one; making a total of 29 who receive less than \$500 a year from all sources. Your Committee submits that it is anything but right or just that any of the ministers of the Church should be labouring for less than \$500 00—an amount of remuneration less than that which is received by any ordinarily well-paid mechanic. It is true that this state of things may be owing, to some extent, to the sub-division of congregations; but your Committee is clearly of the opinion that this is not the only cause of such inadequate remuneration. This in the opinion of your Committee demands instant attention. It is not just to these faithful men, that they should be permitted to toil from year to year on such a wretched pittance.

2. ARREARS.

There is also another matter demanding the attention of the Church. While there is a diminution in the amount of arrears reported, the total amount is \$3967 69. The amount is distributed among the several Pres-

byteries as follows:—Montreal \$1527 36; Ottawa \$241 15; Brockville \$116 82; Ontario \$37 00; Toronto \$405 57; Hamilton \$7 47; Guelph \$10 50; London \$551 74; Stratford \$87 50; Owen Sound \$122 59; Durham \$552 08. The Presbyteries of Kingston, Cobourg, Simcoe, Paris, Chatham, Huron, and Manitoba report no arrears.

3. CHURCHES AND MANSES.

The progressive nature of the work which is going on is indicated in the number of Churches and Manses which have been built; 21 churches, 11 manses, two school-houses and one lecture-room were reported to your Committee as having been erected during the year. The total amount expended on churches and manses is \$123,195 17½, being a sum considerably less than what was expended last year for the same purpose. Altogether there are 183 manses and eight rented houses provided for the accommodation of our ministers. Five years ago the number of manses reported was 118, showing an increase of 45, being an average of nearly nine for each year during that period. Your committee trusts that the time is not far distant when each congregation will feel that it is as necessary that a manse should be provided for the accommodation of the minister, as it is to provide commodious churches for the accommodation of worshippers.

4. CONTRIBUTIONS FOR CONGREGATIONAL PURPOSES.

The total amount contributed for strictly congregational purposes is \$405,519 85½, being an increase over last year of only \$6628 46. While there is a considerable increase in the amount paid for stipend and for general congregational objects, there is a diminution in the amount expended on churches and manses.

5. SCHEMES OF THE CHURCH.

The total amount contributed for the Schemes of the Church is \$48,091 55, being a gain over last year of \$2520 37½. The total amount contributed for the College Fund is \$10,601 17, showing a diminution of \$1869 79. On looking at the statistics, it is found that the amount contributed by the Presbyteries of Montreal, Ottawa, and Brockville for the Montreal College is less by \$2722 71 than the sum which was given last year for the same purpose. It is supposed that this is owing to the fact, that last year there were included under the head of College Fund, contributions which were intended for the endowment of Montreal College. In the amount contributed for Knox College there is a decided increase, last year the amount being \$6725 13, while this year it is \$7578 05. The Foreign Mission Fund shows an increase of \$3405 31, while the Home Mission Fund is only increased by \$565 36½. The Widows' and Orphans' Fund shows an increase of \$220 45. Your Committee is of the opinion that this important fund should be far more largely increased. The Assembly Fund exhibits a gain of \$589 89. The amount given for the purposes of French Evangelization is \$4652 21. This, in our Church schemes, appears to have taken the place of the French Canadian Mission. The Kankakee Mission shows an increase of \$593 71½. The total amount contributed for French work is \$7393 62½. It is to be noted that this is not by any means the whole sum given by our people for mission work among French Canadians.

Your Committee presents the following comparison of the average rate of contribution, per member, for all the schemes of the Church for the present and past years.

This comparison shows, better than any other method, how great is the increase in the liberality of our people in some Presbyteries. Your Committee would fain hope that those Presbyteries which show a slight decrease in the rate of giving will have a much more favourable report to make next year, and that the increased liberality in other Presbyteries is only the dawn of a happier and better state of things, when no scheme of the church will languish for want of that support which our people are so well able to give.

Your Committee believes that if the claims of the Church were only properly presented and an appeal made both to conscience and intellect worthy responses would be made. Much of the increased prosperity, your Committee is disposed to trace to the special efforts which have been made by the Home and Foreign Mission Committees to bring the claims of these great agencies before the Church. It is exceedingly pleasing to note the great and decided increase in the College Fund of Knox College. Is it not a promise that the more fully and completely the college is equipped with an able staff of professors, the more liberally will our people respond to the claims which may be made upon them.

6. INTERESTING PARTICULARS.

The statistics present some striking anomalies in the amounts contributed for the Schemes of the Church by some Congregations, as compared with others.

This shows that 52 congregations have given more than one-half of the total amount of contributions for the Schemes of the Church. But it should be stated, that the number of communicants in these congregations is 15,075, out of a total membership of 49,772. Putting the subject in another light, (3-10ths) three-tenths of the membership have contributed (9-16th) nine-sixteenth, or more than one-half of the total amount of contributions for the Schemes of the Church. The average rate of contributions for the Schemes of the Church in these congregations is at the rate of \$1 85 per member, while the remaining seven-tenths of the membership contribute at the rate of only \$0 60 per member.

Your Committee finds that some congregations contribute nothing, and some almost next to nothing, for the Schemes of the Church, and would therefore draw attention to the following particulars. In the Presbytery of Montreal, one congregation contributes \$5 00, and another \$16 00, for all the Schemes. In the Presbytery of Cobourg, one congregation gives \$4 66 for all the Schemes, while another in the same Presbytery gives nothing to the Home Mission, Foreign Mission, and Widows' and Orphans' Fund; and still another gives nothing to any of the Schemes. In the Presbytery of Toronto, one congregation contributes only to the Home Mission Fund. In the Presbytery of Hamilton, two congregations give nothing to the College or Home Mission Fund, while several congregations recently settled have reported nothing for the Schemes of the Church. In the Presbytery of Guelph, one congregation reports nothing for the Schemes of the Church, while another, paying a salary of more than \$1,000 00, contributes nothing to the College, and Widows' and Orphans' Fund. In the Presbytery of Paris, a congregation with a settled pastor gives nothing to the College and Foreign Mission Funds, and contributes only \$15 55 for all the Schemes of the Church; another, in the same Presbytery, gives nothing to the College Fund; this congregation pays a salary of more than \$300 00. In the Presbytery of London, a congregation of some importance reports only \$7 00 for the Home Mission Fund, and \$10 00 for the Assembly Fund, while all the other Schemes of the Church are left blanks. In the Presbytery of Huron, one congregation, paying a salary of \$700 00, gives no contribution to the Home or Foreign Mission Funds. In Owen Sound and Durham, the contributions, with a few exceptions in each Presbytery, are generally small.

In very many cases, vacant congregations fail in contributing to the Schemes of the Church. This should receive the attention of Presbyteries.

Your Committee submits that a congregation is of value to the Church in proportion to the interest which that congregation takes in the general welfare of the Church. Where such an interest is felt, it is generally shown in a more practical way than mere talk.

In reference to the instructions of the General Assembly of last year, your Committee has to report, that a few Presbyteries have dealt with those congregations which did not make any contributions to the Schemes of the Church. In the Presbytery of Montreal, these congregations were warned to be more liberal. At the time when the report of the Presbytery of Ottawa was sent in, the Presbytery was about to deal with those congregations which were falling into arrears, and had not contributed to the Schemes of the Church. In the Presbytery of Toronto, the Convener of the Home Mission Committee was instructed to communicate with those congregations which had failed in their contributions. In the opinion of your Committee, very little has been done by Presbyteries either in the way of dealing with those congregations which are falling into arrears, or that contribute little or nothing for the Schemes of the Church. There is still a great necessity for enforcing the recommendations of previous years.

7. SUMMARY.

Summing up the Contributions of the Church, your Committee finds that they are distributed as follows:—

8. RECOMMENDATIONS.

In conclusion, your Committee would beg leave to submit the following recommendations:—

1. To recommend to Presbyteries to take order that congregations send in their reports in good season, so that the report of the Committee may be prepared in time for the General Assembly.

2. That Presbyteries be enjoined to take such action as may be instrumental in leading congregations to the exercise of greater liberality, and *ESPECIALLY TO DEAL with those congregations who contribute nothing or very little to the Schemes of the Church.*

3. Your Committee would most earnestly urge upon the Assembly the necessity of impressing on Presbyteries the duty of dealing with those congregations who are falling into arrears.

4. That Presbyteries be instructed to take steps at the first meeting which may be held after the printed statistics have been received to carry out the second and third recommendations; and when sending in their returns to your Committee next year, to state what has been done regarding those congregations who have contributed little or nothing to the funds of the Church, or who may be falling into arrears, in order that a report may be made to the Assembly next year.

NOTE.—The principle upon which the Committee bases its calculations for non-reporting congregations is as follows:—For each non-reporting

congregation having a settled pastor, 75 families and 100 members are allowed. This, the Committee is satisfied, is below the average. An average was struck last year for those congregations, settled and vacant, which reported. It was found that the average number of families to each reporting congregation was about 50, and members 155.

In ascertaining the average amount of stipend, the calculation was made for reporting congregations, settled or vacant, and for none else. D. W.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE FOR 1871-72.

The past year in the Mission field has been one of progress and harmonious working, for which the Committee express their thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church. The details, as contained in the Appendices, are, however, very unsatisfactory, and do not exhibit what is being done with anything like fullness. Each returning year the Committee calls attention to the defectiveness of some returns, and the entire want of others, but still the evil grows, till this year it is so great as to make utterly valueless any generalised statement of statistics as compared with those of the past. This is to be regretted, and surely it is not going too far to express the hope that those Presbyteries which are to blame in this matter, will endeavour in the future to prevent a recurrence of these deficiencies.

Appendices I. and II. contain the Lists of Mission Stations and Congregations receiving supplement. Only a few items can be noted as to increase during the year. There are 122 mission fields reported, as against 96 last year; so that after deducting the small and new stations in Manitoba, there is still an increase of about ten mission fields. Not fewer than nine congregations have been organised during the year from the Mission Stations, and a pleasing growth is manifested in many others. Of supplemented congregations there is a decrease of two. Several of those which were vacant are now happily settled, and are growing fast. New arrangements have been made in some cases which have united two congregations in one charge, and so relieved the Central Fund, and not fewer than nine, formerly on the list, have become self-sustaining. Most of the Presbyteries seem to keep in view the propriety of making charges as large as possible, and the Committee has not failed, as far as its action can effect it, to prevent the separation of prosperous charges and the multiplication of weak congregations dependent on the Fund.

Appendix VI. is the Report of the Students' Missionary Society of Knox College. The results, as reported, are most encouraging, and show a high degree of energy and zeal in the prosecution of the mission work in the new and more inaccessible parts of the country. During the year twelve missionaries were employed in seven distinct fields, besides the mission work done in Toronto. The revenue of the Society was \$1,759 82; viz., collected from the stations, \$696 48; and the rest by the students in the places where they labour and among their friends. The Society's Missionaries are again zealously at work this summer, and the Committee rejoice in the great good which is thus being accomplished. Sabbath Schools are maintained at almost all the stations.

The students of the Montreal College are also engaged in the same work. The details have not been furnished, but your Committee are aware that a number of places are being visited, and good is being done by the Society in the Eastern parts of the Church, to some extent reaching the French Canadian population.

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In connection with these two societies, about *seventeen* missionaries are, during the summer months, kept in the field, and for the most part they labour in localities which might not otherwise be reached. In general, the operations of these societies are carried on in concert with the several Presbyteries of the bounds.

The Committee would again earnestly urge on the Assembly the indispensable necessity, for the satisfactory working of the missions, of Presbyteries^s revising the lists both of Mission Stations and Supplemented Congregations^s with great care *every year*, and sending forward the amended lists. Also, of Presbyteries making full enquiries and sending in statistics as full as possible whenever they make application for assistance.

Thus, for the first time since the present scheme was put in operation, there is a balance against the Fund. The income for the year has increased by \$2,744, but the expenditure has been increased by \$3,456. The excess of expenditure above income is \$209. Some items have been paid this year which ought to have fallen into last year's accounts, so that the income has not been very much less than the outlay. Still it is manifest that unless the liberality of the Church is much greater we cannot overtake the work that is opening up before us. The Committee cannot approve of employing missionaries beyond the income which may be fairly calculated on, and a reduction seems inevitable without a large increase of revenue. Attention is also directed to the fact that *ninety* dollars have been paid out as interest on borrowed money, which might be prevented if contributions were forwarded at as early a day as possible by the congregations.

The following Table exhibits the transactions of the several Presbyteries in reference to the Fund. Although the figures may not be strictly accurate, owing to discrepancies which it is very difficult to adjust, they, nevertheless, enable us to form a fair comparison of the present with previous years:

This table is far from encouraging. From it we are able clearly to see the cause of deficiency in the treasury, and to point out the region in which alone a remedy for the present unsatisfactory state of things is to be found. The Committee respectfully submits the following analytical remarks regarding the relations to the Fund of the several Presbyteries.

In some instances an increase is reported. The Committee refers with unmingled satisfaction and pleasure to the Presbytery of Toronto. Every year shows a steady and satisfactory rate of increase, as compared with the preceding. It contributes not very far from double what it did three years ago, reaching now the handsome sum of \$2,384. This has not been accomplished by a spasmodic effort, but is the result of intelligent and systematic working. Owen Sound also shows a regular and satisfactory advance from \$84 in 1870 to \$215 this year. Montreal has steadily increased, and now contributes one-third more than it did three years ago. To a great extent this favourable result depends upon the city of Montreal. Guelph and Chatham progress steadily. Ottawa and Paris have more than made up the decrease of past years. Ontario has recovered, and contributes \$76 more than in 1870. Huron has more than regained its lost ground, although this year's contribution exceeds that of 1869 by only \$80. Manitoba shows a pleasing increase, and is very hopeful. Three other Presbyteries, viz., Cobourg, Kingston and Stratford, show an increase as compared with last year. This, however, cannot shut our eyes to the fact: that, even with that increase, Cobourg sends to the Central

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Fund \$31 less than in 1869; and that Stratford is \$3 and Kingston \$127 under their respective contributions for 1870.

In all, there is an increase on the part of thirteen Presbyteries, amounting to \$1,471. More than a fourth of this is from Toronto, while several of the other Presbyteries, though showing an increase as compared with last year, have made little or no advance on previous years. But there is a darker feature of the table at which, though with sorrow, we must steadily look. Five Presbyteries show a decrease in contributions during the year, amounting to a total of \$500. Brockville, though showing a slight increase last year, is back again, and actually sends \$84 less than in 1869. Simcoe, in like manner, having advanced \$8 last year, reduces its contributions this year by \$22, and is \$16 under 1869. Hamilton shows an alarming descent of \$335, and contributes \$71 less than in 1870. London shows what indicates an even more discouraging state of affairs—a persistent decline from \$1,046, in 1870, to \$940 in 1871, and \$863 this year, or \$183 in two years. Durham has reduced its previous very small contributions to \$82, falling from 7½ cents per member to about 6 cents.

The Assembly, then, can have no difficulty in accounting for the grave deficit of this year. MANY OF OUR CONGREGATIONS HAVE NOT DONE THEIR DUTY. Had not the Free Church aided us for Manitoba, and the Church in Ireland sent its contribution, and had not an unusually large amount come into the fund by bequest, the report of this year would have been utterly discouraging, and our missionary operations must have been seriously endangered. The Committee see no reason, in the state of the country, for any falling off; nay, in a time of such general prosperity they had reason to expect a large increase. They are satisfied that the root of the evil is *want of interest in the work* among the office-bearers of the Church, and lack of information regarding it among the people. This conviction is forced on them by the two facts: first, that where ministers do plainly and earnestly bring the claims of the Home Mission before the people, they find a hearty response, and find little difficulty in establishing missionary organizations; and, secondly, that where appeals are made for other objects, there is no lack of liberality. An inspection of the accounts of the Church shows clearly that less important schemes in many instances receive far more liberal support than the Home Mission; and that often times both the people and office-bearers fail to give the Home Mission work that prominence which it deserves, and to advocate its interests.

The Committee urges upon the Assembly the adoption of stronger measures than mere resolutions, which, it is evident, are too often utterly disregarded by Presbyteries, office-bearers, and people. Nothing short of visitation and earnest addresses delivered by men who do feel an interest in the work, and the establishment, by injunction of Assembly, of *Missionary organizations*, can reach those congregations which are so utterly negligent of their manifest duty in this matter.

On the excess of expenditure as above income the Committee asks the Assembly to note how satisfactorily, in some instances, the strong are helping the weak; also how absurd it is that any Presbytery should take credit for an excess of contributions, as that depends quite as much on the amount of work left undone within the bounds as on the liberality of the people. It is desirable to find, on the part of a Presbytery, a large outlay as well as a large income, as every dollar of outlay represents work done in the mission field.

By the resolution of last Assembly the congregational contributions to the Central Fund are to be divided into two equal parts, of which one-half is to be expended in paying the supplement to aid receiving congregations, the other

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half in paying for mission work proper. In this way, after deducting current expenses, \$683, and Home grants, \$937, there would remain \$6,000 to be expended on supplements, and about \$6,000 for mission work. Now we find that \$5,395 has been paid to supplemented congregations, that is, about \$600 less than the half of the congregational contributions, and that \$8,642 has been paid for mission work, being about \$2,300 more than the half. But when we keep in view the Manitoba expenses, which are large, and bear in mind that the grants from foreign churches are intended for mission work, we find that the expenditure in the two departments is not far from being equalized. The Committee is of opinion that it is unnecessary to take further notice of this matter, especially as a balance is required to meet the engagements already entered into. The thanks of the Church are due to the Free Church of Scotland for a grant of £100 stg., (\$408.67), to be expended on mission work in Manitoba, and to the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, for its continued remembrance of us by a grant of a like amount. The Church in Ireland has also appointed a missionary to proceed to Manitoba, guaranteeing him £50 sterling for three years. In the opinion of the Committee an explicit understanding should be arrived at as to the ecclesiastical subordination of such a missionary before this Church commits itself to his employment and maintenance.

GRANTS IN AID.

The same mode of procedure as formerly has been followed in granting aid, and nothing has occurred requiring special notice. Last Assembly instructed the Committee to make an estimate of the amount which would be required to give all the ministers of the Church a *minimum* salary of \$600. This the committee has endeavoured to do, on the basis of the returns for 1871. In those returns there are some blanks, but as far as the Committee can ascertain the following is a statement of the matter as it was last year:

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Thus there are 113 ministers receiving less than \$600 each, the difference between the aggregate stipends received and the same number at \$600, being \$16,734. If all these congregations paid at the rate of \$6 per family, the difference would be \$19,694. Now, while a few congregations are contributing only at the rate of \$4 the great majority reach \$6, many of them \$8, several \$10 and \$12, a few, \$16, and one \$20 per family; but there seems to be a difference in the manner in which families adhering are computed, and unless uniformity in this be secured a satisfactory estimate cannot be formed.

If the rate of \$8 per family were reached, the amount required would be under \$15,000—a higher average is perhaps attainable which would reduce the amount required. Again, there are 29 of these congregations, which, if they paid \$6 per family, would not require assistance, and this would reduce the sum required at \$6 per family to about \$16,000, and if the higher rate of \$8 were attained, the amount required would not be more than \$12,000. A still further reduction is, in the opinion of the Committee, attainable, if Presbyteries put forth an effort in dealing with congregations. In this relation it is important to observe the unhappy effect of erecting small congregations by subdividing self-sustaining charges. A hundred families are not more than one pastor can overtake, and anything less than that number will not ordinarily be self-sustaining without an effort. A comparison between two of the Presbyteries will make this clear. The Presbytery of Ontario has seven congregations with stipends under \$600. At an average of \$6 the aggregate contributions of these would amount to only \$1,440, while \$2,160 would be required in supplement, say one-and-a-half times as much as they contribute. The Presbytery of Guelph has six congregations under \$600, with an aggregate at the same rate of \$27,040, and requires only \$1,178, not one-half of the amount contributed. The Presbytery of London has 19 congregations, with an aggregate of \$5,392, and requires only \$1,688, something under one-third the amount contributed. Thus, the Presbytery of Ontario, owing to the small size of the congregations, would draw upon the fund about four times as heavily as the Presbytery of London. In taking any measures to attain the end contemplated by the Assembly this must be borne in mind, and the multiplication of small charges eschewed.

In view of all these figures it appears that somewhere between \$10,000 and \$12,000 will suffice to give all the ministers of the Church a stipend of \$600. To attain this about \$10,000 would require to be added to the Home Mission income; giving say \$10,200 for mission work proper, and \$10,200 for supplement,—in other words, the Home Mission contributions would require to be increased by about two-thirds.

The Committee has made no account of Mansees in the above estimate. They are of opinion that every congregation should provide a manse and glebe where practicable, and urge this matter on the Assembly, though they do not think that the initiation of a Manse fund at the present time would be advisable.

In the opinion of the Committee a *minimum* of \$600 is attainable at once if every congregation is brought up to the amount of liberality now obtaining in the majority of the supplemented congregations. To accomplish this a general and uniform effort is required, and something more energetic than the dealings of Presbyteries, as too often shown in matters of stipend.

III. PROBATIONERS AND VACANCIES.

The Lists will be found in Appendices III, and IV.

The Sub-Committee on the Distribution of Probationers have to report :—

That for the quarter beginning with 23rd July and ending with 19th Oct., 14 names were on the Roll, and 36 vacancies were reported. At the close of the quarter one name was dropped, viz., that of Mr. Leutzinger, as he had then been two years on probation.

For the quarter beginning with October 26th, there were 21 names on the Roll, and 47 vacancies reported; but two Presbyteries, Ottawa and Kingston, had not made any returns.

Before the beginning of the following quarter, Mr. Heu de Boureck had left the Canada Presbyterian Church, and returned to the Congregationalists, from whom he had been received; Mr. Johnston had withdrawn his name, with a view to his being settled at Rockburn and Gore; Mr. Steven, to his being ordained at St. Ann's and Wellandport; Mr. Milne, at Waterdown and Wellington Square; and Mr. Marples at Beamsville. The names of Messrs. Alex. McTae, and John M. Goodwillie, were placed on the Roll for the first time, thus giving 18 Probationers for 47 vacancies.

For the current quarter the number of names is 19, but one of these is for only a part of the period, while the number of vacancies is 52. Messrs. Blain, Walker, McFarlane, Forlong, Hoskin and Scott have been settled over Congregations in different Presbyteries; and the names of Messrs. Gauld, Abraham, Currie, Halley, Hay, Moodie, Jamieson, and Knowles have been added. Mr. Macdonald, who had withdrawn, applied to be re-admitted to the Roll on being informed that he had acted contrary to the regulations of the Church, and that Presbyteries were enjoined not to grant employment to Probationers who did not come to them through the Committee.

On consulting the Minutes of the last General Assembly, the Sub-Committee find that leave was granted to Presbyteries to take on trials for License 13 Students who had completed their curriculum. Of these, the names of only 7 have been forwarded for employment, but it is understood that the others are engaged in Mission work, and one of them has been called to a prominent and influential field of labour in a distant part. In some instances Probationers have accepted calls, and been inducted into pastoral charges, without any notice being furnished by them, or by the clerks of Presbyteries within which the settlement took place. In very few instances do Presbyteries report their Inductions, although required, three weeks before the expiring of each quarter, to send information of all vacancies and settlements occurring within their bounds; and sometimes only the name of the congregation and that of the inducted minister are given, but no mention is made of the date of induction, and this cannot always be ascertained from the pages of the Record.

The Sub-Committee having had reason to believe that some Presbyteries were employing men contrary to the regulations of the Church, directed a letter of inquiry to be sent to the clerk of each, upon the subject. All, except one, assert that no Probationer or Minister without charge was engaged by the Presbytery. Your Sub-Committee, however, cannot but think that while some, it may be all of these replies are correct in one sense, they are not correct in another. Presbyteries, in some cases, allow the Sessions

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of vacant congregations to procure their own supply, and these, not knowing the rules of the Church, or not caring to be guided by them, engage men who are not on the Roll, and the Presbytery make no inquiry after them; and instances could be specified of Ministers who had resigned their charges, and who declared that it was their determination not to go upon the List receiving appointments, for which they applied, in what they considered the most desirable localities, from clerks of Presbytery. Such a course is unfair to those men who act the honorable part of reporting their names, and taking appointments in the regular way; is in opposition to the regulations of the Supreme Court, which should be known to all the subordinate judicatories, and most hurtful to the proper working of the scheme of distribution.

The Sub-Committee have endeavoured to distribute the services of Probationers, in what they considered the manner fairest to all parties, and most likely to be advantageous to the Church. All must admit that the principle of distribution must be to allow all Probationers the opportunity of seeing all the vacancies, should they not in the meantime receive and accept a call, and all vacancies to see the Probationers. Several examples of the wisdom of such a course could be adduced from the record of settlements during the last and former years; men having been called and inducted in sections of the Dominion to which they were unwilling to be sent, confirming the maxim that God's thoughts are not as man's thoughts, illustrating the propriety of those who are on Probation for the work of a stated Ministry, as of all others, committing their way to God.

IV. MISSIONARIES.

In Appendix V. will be found the names of all the Missionaries, more or less regularly employed. There are 12 Ministers and Licentiates, 8 Lay Catechists, 61 Theological Students, and 14 Student Catechists; in all 95; as against 87 last year; an increase of 8. The engagement of Missionaries in districts for a term of years is more and more desired; and as soon as men can be obtained, they will be sent into the newer and more distant fields of labour.

V. REMARKS.

In the Presbytery of Montreal a revived interest is manifest in the work of the Church. The Students during the College Session visit Stations within reach, and many of these Stations are full of promise. In the city of Montreal good work is being done, and some remote fields, long neglected, are being visited, with fair prospects. Much, however, remains to be done; and the difficulties presented by the predominance of a Roman Catholic population are very great. A door of entrance seems about to be opened before this Church for an extensive work of evangelism among the French population; and it is to be hoped that the Church will be able to enter on that work, and do it effectively. The Committee regrets, through lack of information, to be unable to give particulars regarding the good work which is being done in the city of Montreal.

In the Presbytery of Ottawa things are moving very satisfactory; many of the Stations are reviving, new fields are being overtaken, and happy settlements are being effected.

We hear nothing of particular interest from the Presbyteries of Brockville, Kingston, Cobourg, or Ontario; although in all of them, except Brockville, there is steady progress being made. Brockville is desirous of obtaining Missionaries for a term of years in several localities. The Mission field in Minden has now an ordained Missionary, and is quickly growing in numbers and means.

Considerable progress has been made in Home Mission and Church extension work within the bounds of the Presbytery of Toronto. A station has been opened and a congregation organized, with a communicants' roll of 31, at Aurora. A church has been erected, almost without debt, at Mulmur Centre Road. Preparations are being made for the erection, during the summer, of churches at Sandhill and Aurora. In the city of Toronto and suburbs more has been done towards church extension than in any previous year. Four buildings, suitable for the purposes of Sabbath School work and of religious service, have been erected during the year, by the congregations of Knox Church, Cook's Church, Gould Street Church, and Charles Street Church, at an aggregate cost of \$9411. Sabbath Schools are taught in each of these; and Evening Service has been held during the winter in the three last. In addition, a Sabbath School has been opened by the Young Men's Christian Association of Gould Street, in another part of the city, in a house rented for the purpose. A lot of ground, in a very desirable position, has been purchased by a few individuals connected with this Congregation, for the erection of a School House for this enterprise, and sufficiently large to admit of a Church being erected at an after period. This work in the City has been conducted hitherto without drawing on the funds of the Assembly Home Mission Committee.

In Simcoe, the demand for Missionaries is very great. It is matter for congratulation that the services of Rev. J. Barron have been secured for the Muskoka District; another laborer will probably soon be obtained. The field is extensive, and rapidly improving, and more men will be required.

In the Western Presbyteries there is a quiet, steady growth, but nothing of special interest has been reported.

From Manitoba comes an earnest and ever-repeated cry for men. Every effort has been made by personal appeals and calls through the *Record* to obtain suitable missionaries. In only one case has the Committee succeeded. In April last the Rev. Alexander Frazer, formerly of Port Elgin, was appointed with a salary of \$600, with travelling expenses to the field for himself and family. The period of engagement is for not less than three years. Mr. Fraser has left for his new field, and we hope is now, with earnest zeal, engaged in the work. If the Assembly approves of such a step, it may be possible to get two junior students to go thither, but the Committee desires to have the opinion of Assembly before asking them to undertake the work.

In accordance with the instructions of last Assembly, on the declination of Rev. J. Thomson, of Sarnia, to accept the appointment, the Rev. George Bryce, M.A., with the salary which the Committee understood the Assembly to have fixed last June, \$1,400, was appointed professor in the Manitoba College, and went out in October last. The institution has been quite successful; about twenty students are in attendance, with the prospect of an increase. Temporary

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accommodation, of a suitable character, was obtained in a stone building near the Kildonan Church. The new college will be ready for next season. The people of Winnipeg, to whom Mr. Bryce ministers on the Lord's Day have exerted themselves successfully, and will be able to do a good deal towards the support of ordinances; they have resolved to contribute at least \$400 towards his support. The church is free of debt. The congregation is growing and becoming consolidated, and is making further improvements. Mr. Bryce has been assisted in his college duties by Rev. John Black and another teacher, and it is hoped that some further arrangements will soon be made in the interests of the college. As the subject is to come before the Assembly, by overture from the Presbytery, further reference here is unnecessary. All the missionaries are exerting themselves. The new settlements have been visited and are fairly reported. At fourteen various points divine service has been held. Tenders have been called for for a new church at Little Britain, to cost \$2,500; a second church is in course of erection at Portage la Prairie, to be finished this summer, at a cost of \$1,000; a third is to be completed at the High Bluff, at the same cost. At White Mud River the people are taking steps for the immediate erection of a place of worship. The college building has already cost about \$3,500, and an excellent spirit in reference to its completion is manifested. The Presbyterian population have subscribed about \$2,500 towards the establishment of a ladies' higher school in the town of Winnipeg, although it is not intended to connect the institution directly with the Presbytery of the bounds.

The attention of the Committee has been directed to Pembina, where there is a population of about two hundred Protestants, but no Protestant minister, and the Presbytery have asked for a missionary who can preach in both the French and English languages. The people there are prepared to raise for his support at least \$200 at once.

The Presbytery of Manitoba, at its last meeting, passed resolutions to the following effect, which the Committee simply transmit to the Assembly:—

To the Home Mission Committee of the Canada Presbyterian Church:

At Kildonan, Manitoba, the 22nd day of May, 1872, the Presbytery of Manitoba being met and duly constituted, unanimously passed the following resolutions:—

1. The Presbytery would call the attention of the Home Mission Committee to the large amount of work done in the Manitoba Presbytery, both Collegiate and Missionary, at a cost, during the past year, of not more than (\$300?) in excess of the expenditure of 1870, though the points supplied are more numerous and the field wider.
2. The Presbytery would call the attention of the Committee to the largely increasing labor involved in the town of Winnipeg congregation, and the College—both of which have, during the past winter, taxed to the utmost the energies of Prof. Bryce, and would state to the Home Mission Committee that it is impossible for one minister to undertake this work during the coming winter. Attention is called to the fact that for 1872, they rely on \$400 from Winnipeg, \$200 from the College, and \$200 more from interest on endowments,—total, \$800; and that if the remainder of the contemplated endowment were raised it would entirely relieve the fund.
3. That if another Missionary, to assist in the town congregation and in the College, were appointed, the Presbytery are of opinion that \$400 could be raised here towards his salary, and perhaps more.

4. That from living being higher in Manitoba than in other parts of Canada, the Presbytery recommend that the salary of the other Missionaries be made \$700 per annum.
5. The Presbytery are in urgent need of at least the two Missionaries whom the Assembly have already agreed to send, and on account of the great immigration, beg leave to inform the Committee that the arrival of several thousands of people in this Province, many of them Presbyterians, during the present summer, must increase the demand for laborers. The Presbytery expect to be able, by the time of the meeting of the Home Mission Committee in October, to lay definite information before the Committee.
6. The Presbytery would reiterate its sense of the importance of stationing a missionary at Pembina, able to speak both French and English, and of the necessity there is for doing it, if possible, *at once*.
7. The Presbytery pledge themselves to use all lawful means to raise as much towards the sustentation of the Missions as possible.

Owing to the heavy responsibility incurred by church building, the Presbytery asks that those stations which are engaged in building may not be required to contribute for mission purposes for this year. The Committee suggest that this request be granted, although they are of opinion that an opportunity should in all circumstances be afforded the Christian people to contribute for the maintenance of Gospel ordinances among themselves. On the whole, the prospects of our work in this new province are very hopeful, if we can only secure the services of good, earnest men.

Fort William and adjoining stations were visited by Dr. Waters, last summer, with good effect, and a student was kept there during the vacation. This year, Mr. Hamilton, of Downie, is supplying the place for some weeks, and the Committee hopes, on his return, to find some one for the winter. It was matter of deep regret that no one could be sent there last winter. The Sault Ste. Marie is again supplied by the Students' Missionary Society. Unless both these fields are better attended to, we shall find them occupied by other denominations, while we look on. Though still comparatively weak, and the population not numerous, they will, in time, become of importance, and good results will follow from an early occupation. The people are prepared to do all that can be expected towards maintaining ordinances, and are deserving of all encouragement and aid.

The work of exploring and entering on new fields has, this year, received much attention. Several of the Presbyteries are alive in this matter, and it is hoped that the establishment of extensive mission districts may, during the coming year, be successfully carried out in different parts of both provinces.

SUGGESTIONS.

The Committee is fully convinced that for carrying on the Home Mission work with efficiency and effect, something more is required than we have had in the past. The work is growing, and the increase, both as to the extent of territory, and the administration of finance, requires a much more thorough superintendence, and a greater amount of time and labor than a minister in a pastoral charge can be expected to give to such work. The present convener has also intimated his determination to withdraw from the

convenerhip, and the committee, while expressing their regret at the step which he proposes to take, find themselves unable to do otherwise than recommend the Assembly to accept his resignation. In view therefore of the large and rapidly increasing field, and the desirableness of having the work more under personal superintendence, and also the important service which might be rendered by visiting and addressing the congregations of the Church on our Home Missions and otherwise directly advancing the work, the Committee recommend the General Assembly to appoint *at once* an Agent for all the Missions.

The Committee also request the Assembly to take such special measures as may suffice at once to discharge the balance due to the Treasurer, and put the Central Fund in a proper position.

With the view of giving effect to existing regulations of Assembly regarding Probationers and Vacancies, which the Committee regret to report are still disregarded to a great extent, the Committee recommend the General Assembly to enact that no licentiate or minister without charge shall be eligible to receive a call, or to be settled in a vacancy, unless he shall have duly transmitted his name to the Committee of Distribution for employment among the vacancies, or shall have served already among the vacancies for the term required in his case by the Assembly's regulations.

The Committee make the above recommendation, fully aware of their responsibility in proposing a measure so stringent; but they are convinced that unless some such strong means be used, it will be found impossible to work the scheme. They would much prefer its abolition, with all the confusion which would ensue, to a continuance of its present partial administration, which is producing most unhappy results.

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APPENDIX VI.

REPORT OF KNOX COLLEGE STUDENTS' MISSIONARY
SOCIETY FOR 1871-2.

This Society, composed of all the Students of Knox College, Toronto, was organized many years ago for the evangelization of the French Roman Catholics of Ontario. Its operations were, however, early extended to the newer English settlements, chiefly those outside the regular Presbyterial limits of the church. The Missionaries are selected from among the Students and occupy the Fields during the six months vacation. The ordinary funds of the Society are provided by its members, being obtained chiefly from the places where they labor during the summer, and are expended in the payment of missionaries, and the defraying of necessary expenses in connection with the Mission Fields. As will be seen by the following statements, the Society is yearly becoming more vigorous, the number of its Mission Fields increasing, and its finances continuing in a satisfactory state, while, from time to time, most gratifying reports of the spiritual good effected through its instrumentality, are received.

MISSION FIELDS, SUMMER OF 1871.

1. STEPHEN AND HAY.—within the bounds of the Presbytery of Huron,—have for several years been occupied by our Society. During the past summer there were 2 Missionaries in the field, one French, the other English. A new station was opened among the English speaking people, and the attendance at both French and English services in all the old stations was fully up to the standard of previous years. There are 3 Sabbath Schools, of which one is French. Meetings for Prayer were largely attended. This field has now been taken in charge by the Presbytery of Huron, to which this Society desires to return its sincere thanks for the liberal grants for this Mission, continued for so long a time. The amount raised in this field during the season was \$66.

2. PENETANGUSHENE, &c.—Each succeeding year finds this field in a more gratifying condition. An increased attendance, last summer, is reported at all the stations. These are 4 in number. Wyebidge, with attendance of 115; McRae's Settlement and Flos, 85; Vint's Settlement. 33; Penetanguishene, 85. The Missionary also made 4 visits to Muskosh Mills, about 16 miles from the Reformatory, and besides, preached occasionally in 3 outlying settlements. A prayer meeting at the Reformatory was well attended. Sabbath Schools are in operation at Wyebidge, and McRae's Settlement; and a Bible Class was conducted by the Missionary at Vint's Settlement. A class among the boys of the Reformatory is most encouraging. During the Christmas Vacation the Society sent, by the hands of the Missionary who occupied the Field during the summer, a present of books to these boys, who received them with thankfulness and delight. There are in all the Stations about 60 members in full communion. During the summer 14 were added, the most by profession of faith. Two Elders have been recently elected at Wyebidge and one at Penetanguishene. The contributions to the Society's funds are as follows:—Penetanguishene, \$21.18; Wyebidge,

\$85.56; McRae's Settlement, \$31.29; Vint's Settlement, \$27.45; Muskosh, \$26.05; Flos, \$19.90; total, \$282.48, being an increase over the subscriptions of last year of \$64.22. The progress of this field has been exceedingly encouraging, and it is confidently expected that, before long, it will become a regular pastoral charge.

3. WAUBAUSHENE AND PORT SEVERN are centres of an extensive lumber trade. Messrs. Dodge & Co., the owners of the Saw Mills at these places, with a commendable regard for the spiritual condition of their employees, erected, during the last year, two commodious Churches, which they have placed at the disposal of our Missionaries. Mr. T. W. Buck, the Superintendent of the Mills, has also constantly evinced the deepest interest in our work. These places are important as the probable base of future extensive Missionary operations. The attendance at Public Worship increased, from a very small number at first, to 85, at Waubauskene, and from a similar discouraging commencement, to 65, at Port Severn. Sabbath Schools are in existence at both places, and in addition, at Waubauskene, a Bible Class, numbering 30. Contributions: Waubauskene, \$71; Port Severn, \$61; A. Christie, Esq., \$20.75; Friends, \$3.25. Total, \$156.

4. RUSSELL SETTLEMENT, with HOGG BAY and STURGEON BAY, formerly united with Waubauskene and Port Severn, were supplied last year, with evident profit, by a separate Missionary. The attendance at Sturgeon Bay was small, about 15, at Hogg Bay 25, and at Russell Settlement 95. In the last named station there is a Sabbath School of 20 scholars, and also at Hogg Bay one with about the same number of children. A frame Church is to be erected in the Russell Settlement, if possible, during the approaching season. A new station has been lately joined to this group, which will be known, henceforward, as the Tay and Medonte Group. The position of these places in relation to new Railway enterprises renders their future prospects exceedingly hopeful. The amounts collected were, in the Russell Settlement \$40.50; at Hogg Bay, \$13.15; at Sturgeon Bay, \$8.55; in all \$62.50.

5. SAULT STE. MARIE, BRUCE MINES, &c. There are four stations here, of which Sault Ste. Marie and the Township of Korah are the most promising. The attendance of Presbyterians was, at the former place, 30, and in Korah (6 or 7 miles distant) 35. In Korah we have 2 Sabbath Schools, and at Sault Ste. Marie 1, all in a flourishing condition. At Bruce Mines and Hill ton, on St. Joseph's Island, the attendance was always very good. The collections were:—At Sault Ste. Marie, \$100; and at Bruce Mines, \$50.

6. PARRY SOUND, on the Georgian Bay, was the base of the Missionary's operations throughout a very extensive district, extending northward 60 miles to Byng Inlet. The Missionary's attention was devoted, in a large measure, to exploration. Three new stations were opened, at some of which he was the first Missionary. Besides Parry Sound, at which the attendance was 40, services were held in two places, distant respectively 18 and 25 miles north from Parry Sound, at which the attendance was from 9 to 70, and from 18 to 35; also at Bowen's Settlement, attendance from 15 to 40; on the Bay Shore, 7 miles north of Parry Sound, attendance 15 to 40; and at Byng Inlet, attendance 70. Here there are two large Saw Mills. This field is wide and new, but promising. Amount collected; \$47.50.

7. NORTH HASTINGS.—Two Missionaries. This district, 90 miles north of Belleville, near the intersection of the Hastings and Peterson Roads, was, until last summer, supplied at intervals by the Rev. J. Stewart, of L'Amable. It is a large and most encouraging field, comprising several new but flourishing settlements. The services of our Missionaries were gratefully received.

The following facts speak for themselves:—

GROUP I comprehends a district 15 miles in length, with three preaching places, in the Townships of Carlow and Mayo. Presbyterian families, 34. Attendance at the Central Station, 100; at each of the two others, from 15 to 20. Communicants 88. Large Sabbath Schools. A glebe of 25 acres, as yet mostly uncleared, on which it is hoped to erect a Church.

GROUP II. *Harcourt*, 9 Presbyterian families; attendance, 30. *Doyle's Corners*—12 Presbyterian families; attendance, 50. *Foss Settlement*—8 Presbyterian families; attendance 45. *Kernaghan's Settlement*—Attendance, 40. Sabbath Schools at all the stations.

Amounts collected—Group I., \$82; Group II.—Kernaghan's Settlement, \$36.50; Doyle's Corners, \$36; Harcourt, \$12; Friends, \$3.50. Total, \$88.

8. ST. JOHN'S WARD, TORONTO.—The expenses of this Mission have been defrayed entirely from a separate fund. The Missionary's labours during the summer were much appreciated. The work has been carried on during the session by house-to-house visitation, the distribution of tracts, and Sabbath evening preaching by the College Students, with considerable interest. From want of funds and encouragement from the City Churches, the Mission has been dropped until the College re-assembles in October.

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REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE.

FOR THE YEAR 1871-72.

The return of another General Assembly lays upon your Committee the duty of rendering an account of the manner in which they have conducted the Foreign Mission work of the Church during the year. The duty, on this occasion, partakes of the nature of privilege; for while there is nothing remarkable in the work accomplished to report, the steps which have been taken to extend the Foreign Missions of the Church, and the readiness which has been evinced by labourers to offer themselves for the work, and the willingness shown by the people to supply the necessary means, indicate that the past year forms an era in the history of the Foreign Missions of the Canada Presbyterian Church. It is now evident that the claims of the heathen upon the Church are beginning to find more general and practical recognition than in years past.

The work accomplished during the year in British Columbia is of the ordinary kind. Rev. R. Jamieson has continued to labour on faithfully at New Westminster and associated Stations, where we have reason to believe that his services are much appreciated. Your Committee have no recent information respecting his work, but from a late financial statement they learn that the Stations supplied by him have contributed \$600 towards his salary.

Rev. W. Aitken returned to Canada early in the year, as was expected at the time the last report was made to the General Assembly. Nothing has yet been done to supply his place. It has not, however, been overlooked by the Committee, but they deemed it better to await the instructions of the General Assembly, before embarking in additional work, of a nature alien to the general character of that committed to their care. It is for the General Assembly to say whether it desires the Foreign Mission Committee not only to carry on, but to extend Home Mission work. Your Committee are fully convinced that the work in British Columbia deserves the earnest attention of the Church. Every year indicates more fully that that Province has ample resources to sustain a large and prosperous population. It certainly is not desirable that the hold which the Church has already secured on the Pacific coast should be thrown away. It is for the Assembly to say in what manner this department of the work may be best accomplished; but your Committee earnestly desire to be relieved from the farther charge of this field.

In the Saskatchewan Mission, Mr. Nisbet has been labouring among the Cree Indians, as in former years. He finds the influence of the old men prejudicial to the progress of the work among the pure Indians.

A considerable settlement, chiefly of half-breeds, appears to be forming around the Prince Albert Mission. Mr. Nisbet states that they have now a resident population of about one hundred and sixty, of whom the majority speak English more or less perfectly. Mr. Nisbet holds a service in English every Sabbath morning, which is attended by about seventy persons; and a service in the afternoon in Cree, which is attended by about fifty. There are twenty-six children in the school. Eight children are maintained by the Mission. There are thirty names on the Communion Roll, twenty-four of whom were present when the Lord's Supper was dispensed in December last. Mr. Nisbet reports fifteen baptisms during the year, and three marriages.

The formation of a considerable settlement at Prince Albert, may possibly open up a way for certain changes in the mode of conducting the Mission, which would tend to set the Missionaries free from a class of duties which, however necessary in the past, it is not desirable to have permanently laid upon them. No change should be made without careful consideration of all the elements that require to be taken into account, and it is quite possible that none may be found practicable for some years to come.

The most important matter which your Committee have to report is the commencement, under very hopeful auspices, of a Mission to China. Mr. George Leslie Mackay, who was last year called to this work by the General Assembly at Quebec, was ordained by the Presbytery of Toronto, on the nineteenth day of September, and sailed for his new field, from San Francisco, on the 1st November. After a prosperous voyage, he landed at Hong Kong about the end of the month. After visiting Canton and returning to Hong Kong, he went North, and put himself in immediate communication with the brethren of the English Presbyterian Mission at Amoy and Swatow, from whom he received a most cordial welcome. He was strongly urged to remain in the Swatow District, but after spending some time in examining that field, he decided to visit the Island of Formosa before selecting a field of labour. After spending some time with the brethren of the English Presbyterian Church there, he decided to remain on the Island. Formosa is nearly two hundred and fifty miles long and eighty broad, and has a population of about three millions. It presents, therefore, a field of ample extent for all the labourers who are likely to be sent to it for many years to come. What is not less important is, that it presents a field manifestly "white already to the harvest." It is enough to say, that the English Presbyterian Mission, established there a little more than five years ago, has now a membership of 548, of whom 285, or more than one-half, have been received during the year. The population is partly Chinese, and partly aborigines of Malayan origin. Among both, a good work is going on; but the aborigines seem to be specially open to the reception of the gospel.

The Missionaries of the English Presbyterian Church have laboured chiefly in the South Western portion of the Island; and, as we learn from the Report of the Presbyterian Church of England for 1871, just come to hand, "a remarkable interest in the gospel has sprung up in the North of the Island, at a distance of five days journey, where many hundreds have destroyed their idols, and are listening to the message of salvation."

A visit was paid by Dr. Maxwell and Mr. Ritchie, of the English Presbyterian Mission, to this region, and the account is truly spirit-stirring. Of Lai-sia, Dr. Maxwell remarks: "Our hands might have been weary of shaking, if our hearts had not been refreshed by the loving kindness of God, in so disposing these dear people towards us. There are about two hundred inhabitants, among whom it is believed not a single idol is left. Yet, except two or three visits of a native evangelist, they have been left entirely to themselves. Dr. Maxwell and party were compelled, owing to the swollen streams, to return before visiting the entire field. Ho-lai-sia, which lies two days farther East, where as many as one thousand persons are reported to have abandoned idolatry, they were reluctantly forced to leave unvisited."

Mr. Mackay, who is now studying the language at Taeco, in the South, has, with the advice of the English Presbyterian brethren, fixed upon Tamsin, a treaty port in the extreme North-West of the Island and within reach of this deeply interesting region, as his future sphere of labour. There seems, therefore, every reason to believe that the Church in selecting China, and Mr. Mackay in choosing Formosa, have been led in the right way. It will be

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some months before Mr. Mackay can master the language, so as to address the natives effectively, in their own tongue. We must be content to wait patiently until he has mastered the initial work of conquering a new and difficult language.

The entrance of the Church upon this new department of Foreign work appears to have given an impulse to the Missionary spirit of the Church, of which we have now many pleasing evidences. The General Assembly, at its meeting at Quebec, authorized the Foreign Mission Committee to look out for, and secure the services of another Missionary, to labour in the Saskatchewan Mission. At the time this direction was given, the Committee did not know where they could find such a labourer; but their attention having been turned to Mr. Edward Vincent, student, at Princeton, and formerly of Knox College, Toronto, application was made to the adjourned meeting of the Assembly that leave might be granted to one of the Presbyteries of the Church to ordain Mr. Vincent, at the close of his second year of theology. This request having been complied with, Mr. Vincent was, on the 28th day of May, ordained by the Presbytery of Ottawa, and will be ready to leave for his field in the course of a week or two. His name, at his ordination, was placed on the Roll of the Presbytery of Ottawa. In Mr. Vincent, your Committee are happy to say that they believe they have found a man who has special qualifications for the work to which he has been called. He is now present, and the General Assembly will doubtless be glad to make his acquaintance, before he leaves for his future sphere of labour.

Your Committee would also state, that there seems now the prospect of a much more abundant supply of labourers for the Foreign Mission Field than at any previous period. In Montreal College, two of the most promising of the Students have intimated their intention of devoting themselves to the Foreign field. There is also in the Montreal College a young Brahmin, from Madras, who has providentially been led to Canada, and who is preparing to return, to labour among his countrymen. He speaks and writes three of the languages of India. The impression which he has left upon his Professors is very favourable, and the hope is cherished that he may yet return to India, to prove a blessing to many. In Knox College, and in the Western part of Canada, your Committee have also learned that there are others who are giving to the Foreign work very serious attention. There seems no reason to doubt that hereafter we shall have as many labourers as the liberality of the Church will supply means, to send to the heathen.

During the past year, another class of labourers, whose services are found in many parts of the heathen field, especially in India, China, and Japan, of essential value, have offered themselves for employment by the Church. Three young ladies in Montreal have intimated their intention of devoting themselves to Foreign Mission work. One of them intends to prepare herself for the work by a regular course of study, in Mount Holyoke Seminary, an institution from which a noble band of devoted Christian ladies have gone forth to the heathen field. The other two will be prepared to go sooner into active service. It is for the Assembly to say whether the services of our young women shall be rejected, and they shall be forced to offer them to some other section of the Christian Church. From what they have learned of these young ladies, your Committee have no doubt they will prove faithful and devoted labourers. The many openings which Christian ladies find for labouring among their own sex in the East, which are closed against men, has taught many Missionary Societies and Churches the necessity of employing such an agency. A resolution from Erskine Church, Montreal, of which these ladies are at present members, was sent to the Com-

mittee, urging them "to consider whether arrangements might not be made, without delay, to employ them in some of those fields where female labour is so urgently needed." It should also be stated, that this resolution was accompanied with the intimation of liberal aid, towards sending them to the field.

Your Committee are happy to be able to submit a more favourable financial statement than on any previous year.

From the Financial Statement, which will be found in the accounts of the Church, it appears that the debt of \$1,375 94, reported upon the Fund last year, has been wiped away, and a balance remains on hand of \$1,902 69: in other words, the income has been \$3,288 65 more than the expenditure. It is true, a portion of this income is from special sources, which cannot be counted upon regularly. But after deducting the legacy of the late Mr. J. McCulloch, of Niagara, and the contributions for Mr. Mackay's outfit, we find that the ordinary revenue for the year is \$10,043 83, or \$2,120 15 more than the expenditure. The increase in the ordinary income is about \$4,000 00, which may surely be taken as somewhat conclusive evidence of the fact that the Church is prepared to support Foreign Missions.

The satisfactory position of the Fund, while in some degree the result of the general prosperity of the country, and the improved methods now of raising Missionary contributions, more generally employed than formerly, is very largely the direct result of the interest excited by the commencement of the Mission to China. It is evident, that through the divine blessing, this step has done much to evoke the liberality of the Church. The visits which Mr. Mackay, prior to his departure, was able to pay to many congregations throughout the Church, did not a little to increase the interest felt in the cause of Missions.

At the time of Mr. Mackay's ordination, your Committee, as authorised by the Assembly at Quebec, took steps to meet the increased expenditure involved in a new Mission, by bringing the claims of the work more fully before the whole Church. Deputies were appointed to visit all the Congregations, as far as possible, within the bounds of those Presbyteries which desired their services, and agreed to make the necessary arrangements for meetings. In a few instances, Presbyteries declined to take any action in the matter, but in the great majority of cases, the visits of the deputies were cordially welcomed by the Presbyteries, and by the audiences who listened to their addresses. It is matter of regret, that owing to unforeseen difficulties in some instances, and unexplained causes in others, a few of the deputies failed to discharge the duties laid upon them. While such disappointments interfered in a measure with the entire success of the movement, your Committee are persuaded that, as a whole, it was productive of much good.

In view of the present position and prospects of the Foreign Mission work, there is manifestly good reason to thank God, take courage, and press on to higher achievements.

In conclusion, your Committee beg to offer, for the adoption of the General Assembly, the following Resolutions, viz.:-

1. That the request of the Foreign Mission Committee, that the work in British Columbia be taken from under their care, and otherwise provided for, be now granted.
2. That the Foreign Mission Committee be recommended to consider the propriety of sending a deputy to visit the Prince Albert Mission,

encourage the Missionaries in their work, enquire into the method of its operations, and make any suggestions which may be deemed advisable.

3. That the General Assembly hails with much satisfaction the offer of certain young women in Montreal to engage in Foreign Mission work, and instructs the Committee to give them all due encouragement in preparing for this department of Christ's service; to select a field of labour for them; and as soon as it may be deemed expedient, to send them forth to labour in the Foreign field.

4. That Presbyteries be urged to pay the travelling expenses of their representatives to the meetings of the Foreign Mission Committee.

5. That the Foreign Mission Committee, in view of the employment of female labourers in the Mission field, be recommended to take into consideration the extent and manner in which the co-operation of the female membership of the Church may be most effectively secured, in connection with this department of the Church's work.

6. That the name of Mr. Edward Vincent, Missionary to the Saskatchewan, be ordered, as it hereby is, to be removed from the Roll of the Presbytery of Ottawa, and placed on the Roll of the Presbytery of Manitoba.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF KNOX COLLEGE.

The Board of Management of Knox College have much pleasure in reporting to the General Assembly that the work of the College has been carried on during the past year with great satisfaction and efficiency. The Rev. David Inglis, lately of McNab Street Church, Hamilton, having been appointed Professor of Systematic Theology by last Assembly, he was, according to the instructions of Assembly, inducted into office by the Presbytery of Toronto, on the 4th of October, 1871. The Rev. John Campbell, A.M., of Charles Street Church, Toronto, has, at the request of the Senate, conducted Classes for instruction in Church History during the Session.

It will be seen, from the Report of the Senate, herewith transmitted, that the number of Students has been considerably larger than in any previous year. This is matter of congratulation, and of thankfulness to him who is the Lord of the harvest, inasmuch as the wants of the Church are so pressing, in connection with the opening up of new Settlements, and the rapid increase of population. The names of the Students are appended to this Report. There are 6 in the First or Senior Theology Class, 16 in the Second, and 23 in the Third. In the First or Senior Preparatory Class there are 17, in the Second one, and in the Third 9; making 45 in Theology, and 27 in the Preparatory Department; that is, 72 in all; besides a considerable number taking a Course of Arts, in Toronto University.

It will be remembered that Mrs. Willing intimated her intention of retiring from the superintendence of the Boarding-House held by her late

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husband. The Board, accordingly, selected from amongst the applicants for the situation Mr. D. Gunn, of Beaverton. It was found that the building required considerable repairs, and alterations in the internal arrangements. The Board has had these executed, previous to the occupancy of the house for last Session. Mr. Gunn has satisfactorily discharged his duties.

The Board has the pleasure of reporting that the contributions for the support of the College have amounted to a sum much larger than in any former year. The receipts last year were \$6,928 14; this year they are \$8,394 67. Thus, not only the ordinary expenditure of the College has been met, but also the cost of the necessary repairs; and the remainder of the floating debt has been nearly paid off. The debt still existing is only \$365 42, being \$247 71 less than last year.

The Board trust that still increasing liberality will be manifested to this important Institution; that so the Church may be encouraged to take steps for adding to the regular staff of Professors, and thus of rendering it more efficient for the ends contemplated in its existence.

The amount invested for Scholarships and Bursaries is \$3,600 00, and for endowment \$5,192 10.

The Board suggest to the Assembly the propriety of appointing, as hitherto, a day of special prayer for the blessing of God on the Theological Institutions of the Church.

The Board recommend that two Lecturers should be appointed, to superintend, during the next Session, certain departments of study, for which no provision is at present made.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE.

Session 1871-72.

The Senate has to report that the number of Students in attendance, during the Session of 1871-72, was in all *seventy-two*: of these, forty-five were in the Theological, and twenty-seven in the Preparatory Department of the College. This is the largest number of students found in the theological Classes since the Session 1864-65; in which year the number reported was *forty-six*. In the Literary Classes of that year the number of students was only *ten*, so that the entire attendance of that Session was *sixteen less* than the number now reported. It will be remembered, too, that the Montreal College had not been established at the time referred to. There is thus reason for gratitude to the Head of the Church, when we think of the numbers at present offering themselves as Candidates for the holy Ministry; though it would be misleading, to represent these numbers as yet adequate to meet the Church's wants.

Mr. Battisby, whose studies had been interrupted by imperfect health, joined the Classes after the Christmas holidays, thus completing his second year in theology.

The following brief Abstract of the Class Reports, is here given : for details, reference is made to the several reports themselves.

Professor Inglis had under him, during the Session, the Senior and Junior Classes in *Systematic Theology*; the former consisting of the second and third years' students; the latter of the first year's students. The Senior Class went over the whole subject of Anthropology, as also the Decrees of God. The Junior Class was occupied with the study of Theology proper. In both classes much attention was given to the Scriptural Development of Doctrine, and to the Historical Development of Opinion. Lectures were delivered to the Senior Class, twice a week, on Pastoral Theology and Church Government; and during the Session, there were given six Elementary Lectures on Homiletics. The members of the Junior Class produced, each, two Essays: one, on the Genuineness and Authenticity of Scriptures: the other, on the Evidence of Miracles. The closing Examination of this Class embraced the whole Subject of Inspiration.

Prof. Inglis reports that the attendance of the students in these classes was punctual and regular, their conduct exemplary, and their diligence satisfactory.

Professor Caven taught the following classes:—*The Senior Exegetical*; consisting of the students of the second and third years; the *Junior Exegetical*; consisting of the first year's students; and the *Class in Biblical Criticism*; also consisting of the students of the first year. In the Senior Exegetical Class, Lectures were delivered on the first six chapters of the Epistle to the Romans, on six chapters in Exodus, and on several Psalms. The Junior Exegetical Class read critically in the original, and heard expounded, the first six chapters of the Gospel of Luke, and eleven chapters in the book of Genesis. A course of Lectures was given to this class on the Principles and History of Scripture Interpretation. Biblical Criticism was taught, partly by Lectures, and partly in the use of a Text-book.

Prof. Caven, in conjunction with Prof. Inglis, heard the Homilies, Lectures and Sermons prescribed to the students of the first, second, and third years respectively.

Rev. Mr. Campbell, who, at the request of the Senate, undertook the charge of the Class in Church History, reports that the class taught by him was composed of all the students of the first and second years; that he lectured twice a week; and that the period embraced in his prelections extended from the Apostolical age to the Reformation,—the first nine centuries being, however, examined more closely than the remaining six. Mr. Campbell suggests that it would be of great advantage to the course in Church History to have it extend over all the Theological years;—the first year to be largely devoted to the History of the Church as given the Scriptures.

The number of students in the *Preparatory Department* of the College, was, as already stated, twenty-seven. One student gave attendance only during the last Term, and has it in purpose to matriculate in the University

of Toronto, and take the full course of that Institution. Three others were found scarcely qualified to pass the examination preliminary to entrance upon the Literary Course, and it was found necessary to institute a class specially on their behalf. The Senate deems it of essential importance to the welfare of the College that students should be fully prepared for the Entrance Examination before having the status of the first literary year accorded to them; and is farther anxious to emphasise its conviction that even in the case of students, whose attainments in commencing their studies may be exceptionally high, or who, owing to superior abilities, might find it possible to condense the work of three Sessions into two, it would, nevertheless, be an injury to the College, and, in most cases, to these students themselves, to abbreviate their preparatory course. The Senate is glad to know that the view now expressed is shared in by the Board of Examiners, and would here desire to record its purpose to act in accordance with this view, in all ordinary cases.

Professor Young, who, previous to the commencement of the Session, had been appointed to the Chair of Mental and Moral Philosophy in University College, has laid the Church under obligation by continuing to conduct the class in Senior Philosophy. Prof Young lectured to this class three times a week during the Session, carrying them forward in the study of Mental and Moral Science from the point which they had reached at the close of last Session.

The Senate, in accordance with authority given it by the College Board, secured the services of Messrs. J. Scrimger, M.A. and W. H. Rennelson, M.A., to teach the preparatory students in Classics. Mr. Scrimger taught the Senior Greek and the Junior Latin Classes; and Mr. Rennelson, the Senior Latin and Junior Greek Classes.

Mr. Scrimger reports, in the Senior Greek Class, an attendance of *seventeen* students in the first Term, and of *nineteen* in the second Term. The Class, in addition to its Exercises in the Grammar, read Homer, Iliad, Book vi. The Junior Latin Class, which numbered *five*, read Caesar, Bell. Gall. Book ii, and Virgil, Æneid, Book i, 1-100, besides studying the Grammar. The Class of Beginners, already spoken of, and which numbers *three*, studied the Latin Grammar, and Harkness' Latin Reader, pp. 1-25.

Mr. Rennelson reports an attendance of *nineteen* in Senior Latin. The Class read Livy, Book v, chapters 1-25. The Junior Greek, which numbered *five*, read Xen. Book v, chapters 1-4. The Class of Beginners were exercised in the Greek Grammar, and in rudimentary Reading Lessons.

In addition to the work above detailed as performed in Knox College, the Students in the Preparatory Course, gave attendance on the classes prescribed to them in the University.

It is not out of place in giving even a brief view of the work of the College, to make reference to the Students' *Metaphysical and Literary Society*. In connexion with this society a good deal of attention was given to the composition of Essays, and to Elocution, as well as to the Discussion of important Questions. Nearly all the Students of the College are connected with the Society; and the Senate, after making an unsuccessful attempt to secure the services of a competent teacher in Elocution, appropriated in aid of the Society the sum at their disposal for such purposes.

The *Metaphysical and Literary Society*, in concert with the Students' Missionary Society, may be said to have established the *Reading Room*, during last Session; for its past feeble existence hardly entitled it to recognition. The Room is now supplied with several of the leading Theological and Literary Quarterlies and Monthlies, and with a large number of Newspapers,

religious and general. The Senate deemed it proper to co-operate with the Students, to some slight extent, in putting the Reading Room on a better footing.

The *Monthly Prayer Meeting* was well attended, on all occasions, during the Session. It is truly gratifying to the Senate to note this fact, as well as to hear witness to the zeal with which the operations of the Students' Missionary Society are conducted, and to the interest which the Students evince in the Missionary Work of the Church.

The health of professors and students has, by divine goodness, been such as to allow the work of the Session to be steadily prosecuted. It would, however, be wrong to close this Report without recognising the hand of God in the sudden death, a few weeks ago, of Mr. Lochore, a student of the second Literary Year. Whilst kneeling in morning family devotions, with some fellow-students, and the members of the household in which he boarded, his spirit passed into the still nearer presence of God. The most favourable testimony is borne by his fellow-students to Mr. Lochore's high Christian character, and to the zeal with which he had consecrated himself to his Master's service. May we not fail to hear our Lord, in this event, say to us—"Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not, the Son of Man cometh."

The Examiners of the several classes of the Theological and the Preparatory Departments of the College, have reported—in general very favourably—on the closing Examination. They recommend, in all cases, that the Examination be sustained.

The Senate, after considering carefully, at the instance of some of the Class Reports, the matter of students rendering service in *preaching* during the Session of College, agreed to ask the General Assembly to define the number of times that students may be allowed to preach while the work of the classes is going on. The Senate would respectfully recommend to the General Assembly that this number be not greater than six, and that it be the same for the students of each Theological Year. Should the Assembly be pleased to adopt this recommendation, the Senate would feel itself in a better position to deal with this matter; seeing to it, on the one hand, that no student should go out oftener than the specified number of times, and, on the other, that the distribution of appointments among the students should be just and equitable. The Senate, in making this request of the General Assembly, is little more than asking it to revert to the previous regulations anent the preaching of students: these regulations, in the opinion of the Senate, being preferable to those under which the Senate now acts.

The following is a List of the Scholarships awarded in the Theological Department, with the Subjects of Competition:—

1. Bayne Scholarship, \$50: for best Examination in Hebrew by student entering Theology. Awarded to Mr. D. McDonald.
2. G. Buchanan Scholarship, \$40: for general proficiency on the part of student entering Theology. Awarded to Mr. H. H. McPherson.
3. Dunbar Scholarship, \$40: for best examination, at close of Session, on the Being and Attributes of God: open to students of first year. Awarded to Mr. T. F. Fotheringham.
4. Goldie Scholarship, \$40: for best Essay on the Design with which the book of the Acts of the Apostles was written: open to second year. Awarded to R. D. Fraser.
5. Bonar Scholarship, \$40: for best Examination, at close of Session, on Church History: open to second year. Awarded to Mr. W. H. Rennelson.

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6. John Knox Scholarship, \$40 : for best Examination, at close of Session, on Church Government and Pastoral Theology : open to third year. Awarded to Mr. E. Cockburn.
7. Gillies Scholarship, \$60 : for best Essay on the Scriptural Development of the Doctrine of Justification : open to students entering third year. Awarded to Mr. W. Armstrong.
8. Lindsay Scholarship, \$40 : for best Examination, at close of Session, on Hebrew Exegesis : open to students of second and third years. Awarded to Mr. A. Sinclair.
9. Loghrin Scholarship, \$50 : for best Examination, at close of Session, on Systematic Theology : open to second and third years. Awarded to Mr. J. Scrimger.
10. Special Prize for New Testament Greek (Lange's Commentary) : open to all Theological Years. Awarded to Mr. W. Armstrong.

The above Scholarships and Bursaries are exclusive of those competed for by students attending the University, with the Ministry of our Church in view. These will be reported on by the Board of Examiners.

The Senate, believing that not a little may be done towards stimulating Scholarship among our students, by the establishment of additional Bursaries, would take the liberty of earnestly recommending this matter to the consideration of the liberal members of the Church.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

WESTERN SECTION.

The Board of Examiners, in presenting the report of its operations for the past year, would congratulate the General Assembly on the fact, that a larger number of candidates for the ministry in the various stages of the course of preparation for the work, has appeared before it than during any previous year, while it is believed that the average standard of attainment reached by the students has also been higher.

I.—Students in Preparatory Course.

Ten students presented themselves for examination at the commencement of the Session, with the view of entering for the first time the preparatory classes in Knox College, and of taking such classes in University College as your Board might prescribe.

Seven of these, Robert S. Lochore, Alexander H. Kippan, Alexander McFarlane, Robert Fowle, William Gallagher, Hugh MacKay and D. D. Fraser, were found on examination to be fully qualified by their knowledge of the classics and, other specified branches, to enter on the course of study prescribed by the Assembly. The remaining three, Roderick Henderson, Alexander Fraser, Angus B. McKinnon, had not been engaged in the study of Latin and Greek for such a length of time as to qualify them to prosecute their studies along with the others. However, as they had come up under some misapprehension of what was required, and had made their arrange-

ments to remain in Toronto for the winter, it was agreed to make provision for their separate instruction in classics, and to make their standing dependent on the examination they might pass at the end of the session. The Board is of opinion that for the future no student should be received who is not able to pass a creditable examination in all the subjects prescribed for entrants on the preparatory course. With the exception of one student, who soon afterwards made profession of faith in Christ, all were found to be members of the Church in full Communion. The most had appeared before the Presbyteries of their bounds, and were by them certified to the Board as proper persons for entering on the course of study for the ministry. One or two who were not thus certified, had letters to the same effect from their ministers. With the exception of Angus McKinnon, who came from Prince Edward Island, these students were all residents of the Province of Ontario.

In addition to enjoining attendance in the suitable classes in Knox College, the Board prescribed certain classes in University College for the students of each year of the preparatory course, requiring not only attendance thereon, but the passing of the terminal examinations connected with these classes.

All the students in the preparatory course were examined at the close of the Session by the Board, in Latin and Greek, and those of the third year in Philosophy. The examinations were on the whole satisfactory, giving evidence in some cases of very marked progress. The certificates presented from the professors of University College attested regularity of attendance, and in the case of some of the students, not only great diligence, but the attainment of the highest honors of their classes.

The following is the list of the students in the Preparatory Course, with the standing to which they are entitled:

Students of the First Year, and entitled to enter the Second in October next.—Alexander H. Kippan, Robert Fowle, William Gallagher, Hugh McKay, Roderick Henderson, Alexander Fraser.

Of the Students who belonged to this class, Mr. Lochore died, and Mr. McKinnon left during the course of the Session.

Students of the Second year, and entitled to enter the third in October next.—Alexander McFarlane and D. D. Fraser.

Students of the Third Year, and entitled to enter Theology, on passing the required Examination in October next.—John H. Ratcliff, James Stewart, James Fraser, Donald McBae, F. R. Beattie, William Reid, Allan Bell, William C. Armstrong, John Carmichael, John A. McAlmon, William Frizzel, John McQueen, Robt. Scott, David Beattie, Stuart Acheson, D. McNeil.

It is pleasant to have to state, as showing the desire of the students themselves to be thoroughly educated, that it is the intention of some of those in the above list to take another year at University College before entering on the study of theology.

II.—Students in the Theological Course.

Seventeen students appeared before the Board in October, to pass the examination prescribed for entrants on Theology, viz.:—Hector Currie, B.A., Alexander Miller McLelland, Thos. F. Fotheringham, B.A., John R. Wightman, B.A., Helenus H. McPherson, B.A., James Bruce Fraser, M.D., Alex. Stewart, Donald McKerachar, William M. Martin, Samuel Fisher, Peter Nichol, John Henry, Donald McDonald, Thomas Johnston, John Bryant, G. G. McRobbie, James Paterson.

The Committee agreed as on the former year, to exempt students holding the degree of B.A. or M.A. from examination. Two only availed themselves of this privilege. These examinations were on the whole satisfactory to the Board. Supplementary examinations were prescribed in one or two cases, where a defective knowledge of some of the subjects had been shown. The scholarship for Hebrew, connected with the examination was gained by D. McDonald, and that for general proficiency by H. H. McPherson. In addition to the seventeen students mentioned above, six others, viz., H. McKellar, R. Thynne, R. W. Leitch, W. Rutherford, John R. S. Burnett, and Isaac Campbell, who were not forward to pass the requisite examination at the opening of the College, were examined before Christmas, and their examinations sustained. The Board continues to be of opinion that it is of the utmost importance that the examinations required by the Assembly should be passed before the work of the Session begins, and that supplementary examinations should be appointed only for those who have been detained from the regular one by illness or some unavoidable cause.

As a full account of the examinations in the Theological Department at the close of the Session has been given in the Report of the Senate, it is unnecessary to refer again to them here. They were conducted by the Senate and Board acting conjointly.

The Scholarships were awarded by the Board as on former years, to students attending University College with the view of entering the ministry of the Canada Presbyterian Church. Only five students presented themselves on this occasion. Three—Alexander Hamilton, of the third year; William A. Wilson, of the second year; and David Ross, of the first year—were successful. The Board granted a sum amounting to about half the value of a scholarship to each of the other two competitors. The number of students competing for these scholarships is smaller than usual, several who had intimated their intention to compete having been detained by illness from carrying out their purpose. There is the prospect of a larger number of competitors for these Scholarships next autumn, and the Board is still of opinion that this scheme is one fitted to advance the best interests of the Church, and deserves the liberal support of congregations.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

SESSION 1871-72.

The total assets of the College at this date amount to \$62,587 36, being distributed in the following manner:—

A detailed account of the work and financial condition of the College will be found in the report of the Senate and the Treasurer's audited balance sheet, both of which are herewith submitted. The number of students enrolled is 45, and the aggregate balance of moneys in hand at the close of the year, from the various sources of income is \$1056 41. When it is remembered that the College has hitherto been dependent for support upon a limited section of the Church, the results thus exhibited at the end of the fourth regular session are deemed highly satisfactory, and give promise at no distant period of a much more thorough equipment of the institution.

The General Assembly having in June last resolved to seek an Endowment for both its Colleges, and steps having been taking at the adjourned meeting in November to give effect to this proposal, the greater part of the year was necessarily allowed to pass before the issue could be known.

After it was fully ascertained that the Assembly's undertaking was in the meantime impracticable, an influential meeting of the friends and supporters of the College requested the Board to do two things: First—To provide for the support of an additional chair in Theology for five years; second—To erect College buildings, it being understood that this action should not hinder, but so far aid the Assembly's scheme, should its prosecution in the future be found practicable.

Sic The Board accordingly in view of the urgent necessities of the College, and feeling it to be most desirable not to lose a whole year in financial operations purchased an eligible ~~plot~~ on McTavish Street, adjoining McGill College, and procured plans and specifications of a building by which it appears that the cost, including the lot, will not be less than thirty thousand dollars. Within the last month the cities of Montreal and Ottawa have been partially canvassed for subscription, and the result is as stated above, viz:—ten thousand dollars, extending over a period of five years, have been subscribed for an additional professor's salary, and eighteen thousand dollars, payable one-third down, and the balance in March, 1873, and March, 1874, for the College buildings.

The following recommendations are respectfully submitted for approval, by the Venerable the General Assembly:—

1. That the Rev. J. M. Gibson, M.A., be appointed Lecturer in Exegetics for next Session.
2. That the collection for the training of French Students, and for French Evangelization, be taken up, as last year, in all the congregations of the Church.
3. That the Presbytery of Kingston be added to the three Presbyteries now connected with the College, for financial support.
4. That the Assembly appoint an additional Professor of Theology, with as little delay as possible.
5. That in case such appointment should not be made at the first meeting of Assembly, a Lecturer be chosen, who shall give his whole time to the work of the College next Session; or two Lecturers, for three months each.
6. That in the event of the Assembly not proceeding at once to appoint a Professor, the Board humbly requests the privilege of being allowed to nominate such.

All which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

SESSION 1871-72.

STAFF OF INSTRUCTORS.

Rev. D. H. Macvicar, LL.D., Professor of Systematic Theology and Apologetics; Rev. D. Coussirat, B.D., Lecturer in Theology and French Literature; Rev. J. M. Gibson, M.A., Lecturer in Exegetics; G. Gibson, M.A., Classical and Mathematical Tutor. Hebrew is taught by Rev. A. De Sola, LL.D., of McGill College.

The Rev. Wm. McLaren, Ottawa, having declined the appointment of the Board to Lecture in Church History, the Class was conducted during the Session by Dr. Macvicar.

Frequent oral Examinations were held during the Session, in all the subjects of instruction; and written Examinations before Christmas and in March, the results of which are entered in the Records of the Senate.

In addition to the ordinary course, French Students have attended special Lectures on the Popish Controversy, in order to prepare them for the work for which they are designed, and in which they are engaged during College recess.

A student can hold only one Scholarship, but if two or more are awarded him he is entitled to one fifth the amount of each additional scholarship, and the Senate may award the remainder to the student next in the order of merit. The Mackay Scholarship is an exception to this rule.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

During the past year 292 vols. have been added to the Library, viz., by purchase 246 vols. and by donation 46 vols. The total number of vols. in the Library is over five thousand, embracing standard and recent works in Theology and cognate subjects. The Reading Room has been regularly supplied with over 40 papers and periodicals; and our students have access to the excellent Library and Museum of McGill University.

GRADUATING CLASS, SCHOLARSHIPS AND GOLD MEDAL.

Four students closed their Theological Curriculum this session; and of the 45 now enrolled, 39 gave attendance in Literary and Theological classes.

Eighteen Scholarships of \$50 to \$60 each were competed for and awarded as already indicated in this Report; and the Senate has pleasure in announcing twenty such scholarships for next session, the subjects of which are given in the College Calendar.

A Gold Medal, founded by the students at their own expense, will be offered for competition annually in the Graduating Class. The conditions upon which it will be given are as follows :—

The Medal will be awarded to the student of the Graduating Class taking first Rank in the ordinary examinations of the third year in Theology, and the highest honors of the first Rank in the subjects stated below. *Canon*.—Westcott on the New Testament; *Hermeneutics*.—Fairbairn's Manual; *Christology*.—Ellicott, Life of Christ; *Historical Theology*.—Cunningham, vol. I., chaps. III., IV., V., VI., XIV., XV., XVI., XVII., and XVIII.; *Institutes of the Christian Religion*.—Calvin, bk. IV.; *History of Rationalism*.—Hagenbach.

Three fourths of the aggregate marks entitles a student to the first Rank. The Medal cannot be awarded to any student who has not taken first Rank Ordinary and Honor. The Honor Examination papers will be published in Calendars annually.

The Senate directs attention in this connection to the special advantages enjoyed by affiliation with McGill University. By means of Scholarships, which are in the gift of benefactors of that institution, students are exempted from the payment of College Fees during their Literary Studies; and in addition to these there are sixteen Exhibitions and Scholarships of from \$100 to \$125 each, annually offered for competition to students in Arts, and five Gold Medals at the close of the Curriculum, together with Prizes and Certificates of Honour.

The Arts and Theological Curriculums are so far united that Hebrew may be taken in the first and second years instead of Modern Languages; and Theological Lectures in the third and fourth years instead of Astronomy and Optics, Experimental Physics and Rhetoric.

DELIVERY OF SERMONS, ETC.

The Senate has enacted a rule to the effect that of the five discourses to be prepared by each student during his Theological Course, three, viz., the Homily, the Sermon and the Lecture, shall be delivered *memoriter* before professors and students. Exercises in speaking are to be conducted every Friday, at which all students will be required to attend. A record of such will be kept and taken into account in determining the standing of students.

SPECIAL LECTURES.

The Senate has agreed to take steps to secure courses of special lectures on such subjects as the connection between Science and Religion, the Popish Controversy, Sacramentalism, Inductive Philosophy and Religion, Missionary Enterprise, &c., to be delivered each session. The arrangements in this respect will be announced in due time.

STUDENTS' LITERARY AND METAPHYSICAL SOCIETY.

The Senate gladly recognizes the good accomplished by this society which has for its object the cultivation of the Literary Taste and Elocutionary Powers of the students by means of weekly meetings for Discussion, Essays, Readings and Recitations, in which prizes are offered to those showing the greatest proficiency.

STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

All students are connected with this Society, which meets weekly for prayer, general business, and conference on Home and Foreign Missions. It directs the efforts of students in the city and vicinity, and employs during college recess, four missionaries. Its income is derived from students and their friends. The members of the society preach, distribute tracts, visit among the destitute and neglected and in the Hospital, conduct prayer meetings, and take part in the exercises of Bible Classes and Sabbath Schools, while, at the same time, they have ample opportunity for observance of Pastoral Life, and of becoming practically acquainted with the best methods of Christian Work as carried on in large and active congregations.

RECOMMENDATION.

The Senate respectfully requests the Board to take steps to secure the appointment of another Professor with as little delay as possible.

The opening Lecture of the past session was delivered by Dr. MacVicar, and the closing Lecture by the Rev. Wm. McLaren, Ottawa.

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REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE

For 1871-72.

The Committee in Sabbath Schools in presenting their Annual Report congratulate the Assembly on the increased interest manifested during the year, in this important auxiliary of the Christian Church. Never before in the history of the Sabbath School enterprise, has so much attention been given to it, by the various Evangelical bodies in Great Britain and Ireland, by the Synod of the English Presbyterian Church, and the churches in the United States. Long and interesting discussions have been held, in regard to the best methods of conducting Sabbath Schools, and interesting the Church at large in the special department of Christian activity. Although the general good results of mere denominational connections and conferences are not to be undervalued, the feeling is becoming stronger year by year, that the interests of the separate churches can be better advanced, and the spiritual prosperity of the youth belonging to these churches better cared for by each denomination prosecuting the work with special reference to the wants of its own membership.

Among other recommendations of last General Assembly, it was suggested, that Presbyteries hold annual conferences on Sabbath School work within their bounds, and invite to said conferences Superintendents, Teachers, and all others interested. Reports of such conferences have been received by your Committee from the Presbyteries of Toronto, Paris, Guelph, and Chatham. In the Presbytery of Toronto the following subjects were discussed:—The best means of securing the great end of Sabbath School instruction; the influence of Sabbath School Libraries, their present character, and the means of improving them; the relation of the Sabbath School to the family; the relation of the Sabbath School to the Church; and the service of praise in the Sabbath School.

The Committee of Presbytery in charge of the conference, have the following recommendations in their report:—

"That particular attention should be paid to the judicious selection of Sabbath School Teachers, and the use of a good systematic scheme of religious instruction: That the Books in the Library be examined and read over carefully by the Superintendent, or other persons in charge, and added from week to week, or from month to month, during the year, and that the Supreme Court of the Church prepare a list of publications suitable for Sabbath Schools: That the parents should become acquainted with the teachers, and with the system of lessons taught, and in every way possible, aid the teachers in their work; that the church should provide the means of carrying on the work of the school, and give aid and encouragement to those that are engaged in it. The conference also recommend the church to provide schemes of lessons, a 'Child's paper,' a Hymn Book, and other requisites for the use of Sabbath Schools."

The Committee of the Paris Presbytery, in the resolutions submitted after the conference on Sabbath Schools, state their conviction "that many earnest godly teachers are unable to satisfy themselves, or accomplish much good, through lack of training. They are persuaded that some scheme, combining the best features of the Convention and Institute, would direct the mind

of the Church to this important department of christian work, and educate teachers in the very direction in which they feel their own deficiency. They recommend that Sessions, and especially pastors, take a more direct oversight of the Sabbath Schools, and adopt such measures as shall increase their efficiency.

At the conference held by the Presbytery of Guelph, two recommendations were adopted, and afterwards sanctioned by the Presbytery:—

- 1st. To instruct all Sabbath Schools connected with congregations within the bounds not to exclude the Psalms of David from their devotional exercises.
- 2nd. That a committee be appointed to examine different schemes of lessons that may be published and select one for adoption, so as to secure greater uniformity in Sabbath School teaching throughout the bounds. It has also been intimated by the clerk of the Guelph Presbytery, that an overture on the subject of uniform lessons will be laid before this assembly.

While detailed reports of conferences held during the year have only been received from four Presbyteries, several Presbyteries report having held such conferences previous to the last meeting of Assembly, and other Presbyteries have intimated their intention of holding them during the summer and autumn months. In every case there seems an earnest desire to give to Sabbath School work a more prominent place than it has hitherto held in the public discussions of our Church Courts.

The following are the Statistics for the year, as contrasted with those of 1871, as given in the Statistical returns of the several congregations belonging to our Church

These Statistics show a gratifying increase in all the details of Sabbath School work during the past year.

As it is of the utmost importance that full returns should be made from year to year, your Committee would call the attention of Superintendents and Ministers to a series of Sabbath School Registers, prepared, and to be had of Mr. Hossie, of Brampton. The set is arranged to accommodate an average-sized school for 20 years, and costs only \$3.

Your Committee in conclusion would recommend,

1. That the annual Synodical and Presbyterial conferences on Sabbath School work be continued, and that clerks of Synods and Presbyteries be instructed to send to this Committee the results of said conferences, with such suggestions as they may deem suitable for consideration and discussion by the supreme court of the Church.
2. That the assembly consider the propriety of sanctioning and recommending a uniform scheme of lessons for use in all our Sabbath Schools, either by indicating such a scheme at the present meeting of Assembly, or by appointing a Committee to examine the different schemes now in use, and recommending one they deem most suitable for adoption by next General Assembly.

3. That the Committee appointed by last assembly to recommend certain Books for Sabbath School Libraries be continued, with special instructions to confer and correspond with the similar Committee appointed by the General assembly of the American Presbyterian Church, and take such other steps as may be considered advisable in the premises.

REPORT of COMMITTEE on SABBATH SCHOOL BOOKS.

The Convener of the Committee on the Selection of Sabbath School Books, begs to submit the following statement of what has been done in the premises:—

In August last he issued a circular to the members of the Committee, requesting each to do something in preparing a list of suitable books, and to forward the same before the November meeting of Assembly. In reply, no list came to his hand. He called by circular a meeting of Committee at the fall meeting of Assembly, when it was agreed to apply to various publishing houses for catalogues, and to ascertain on what terms books could be obtained for examination. Messrs. Campbell & Son agreed to supply books at half-price. Mr. Young, of the Bible and Tract Society, agreed to supply, free, any books in stock, and to procure also any books that might be desired of the London Tract Society, the American Tract Society, the American Sunday School Union, and the firm of Carter & Brothers, stating that the number of volumes more or less suitable, that could be obtained from these houses would be about two thousand. On inquiry at the American Presbyterian Board of Publication, they at once forwarded 50 volumes for examination at the usual selling prices, deducting one fifth, with liberty to return all or any of them. These Mr. Macpherson and the Convener have had in examination. In January another circular was issued to the members of Committee, requesting lists which have not been forthcoming. Subsequently the members of Committee in Toronto were requested to call for books for examination at Mr. Young's, who had kindly arranged to supply them; but none were asked from him after the 23rd of May. A communication from Messrs. Campbell & Son to Mr. Reid, dated the 25th April, was forwarded to the Convener, intimating that they were prepared to submit to the Committee for their approval over eight hundred volumes, and to publish at their own expense catalogues with such additions as the Committee might make from other sources.

It is deeply regretted that so little has been done in a matter of such importance. Intimations from various quarters have come to us to show that the Church is becoming interested in it; and it is hoped that the Assembly will succeed in finding a Committee who will be able to command leisure sufficient for the onerous work required. The members of Committee appear to have been anxious that something should be done, but were unable to do it, because of other work in hand.

REPORT ON THE KANKAKEE MISSION.

To the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church :

Your Committee, on what has hitherto been called the "Kankakee Mission," beg leave to Report :

That as the Congregation at Kankakee, along with the Minister, Mr. Joseph Paradis, have been transferred to the Presbytery of Chicago, the Mission now consists of the congregation of Ste. Anne, Rev. Mr. Chiniquy the Minister, and the school in that village, under the charge of the Rev. Mr. Lafontaine. Owing to several causes, your Committee have made no arrangements with Mr. Chiniquy for special labours during the past year.

At the request of the Committee, the Revs. Messrs. Drummond and Mitchell visited Ste. Anne, and who have reported the state of affairs there much as usual, and on the whole satisfactory.

Your Committee recommend, that for the future there be no special collection appointed for Ste. Anne in the schemes of the Church, but that, as that congregation belongs to the Chatham Presbytery, it be placed by said Presbytery on the list of supplemented congregations; further, that as the work of the school there is of special importance, the Assembly be pleased to allocate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800) a-year out of the French Evangelization Mission Fund, for the support of the Teachers in said school. Your Committee further take leave to recommend that the supervision of the School be committed either to the Chatham Presbytery or to a special Committee appointed by the Assembly.

The Statement of Accounts is herewith submitted.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF RELIGION.

Your Committee after consideration, agreed to issue a list of questions, as in former years, and a short address requesting Sessions to send answers at an early date to their respective Presbyteries. This was done with some hesitancy, inasmuch as they knew, that if the injunction of the last Assembly were attended to, their action would not be necessary.

They have now to state that the Synods of Montreal, Toronto, and Hamilton reported to your Committee. Of these reports, that from Montreal is the most minute and valuable. The Synod of London, instead of sending any of its own, merely forwarded the reports of Presbyteries and Sessions.

The Presbyteries of Brockville, Cobourg, Ottawa, Ontario, Toronto, Simcoe, Owen Sound, Stratford, Paris, London, and Chatham reported. Those of Montreal, Kingston, Hamilton, Guelph, and Durham failed to do so.

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All the Presbyteries, except three, either sent in the reports received from Sessions, or stated the number from whom answers were obtained. Your Committee are thus able to present the following table.

Your Committee rejoice that the state of Religion in our Congregations is occupying such a prominent place in the deliberations of our superior judicatories, but they must express their regret that such a large portion of the Sessions seem to have no sympathy with the efforts made to get information on this subject. We cannot as a church dismiss it from our notice. We cannot afford to lose the Conferences which the consideration of it demands; and yet, if our conferences and reports are not to prove, if not utterly nugatory and a delusion, at all events of small value, some means must be found to awaken Sessions to the duty of giving such information as they may be able, and your Committee would solicit the careful attention of the Assembly to this matter. They know that some object to our enquiries regarding, and our dealing in reports with the inner life of men. Your Committee, however find that the Word of God, from its commencement to its close, abounds with statistics on this subject, and as it is written, "by their fruits ye shall know them," we conclude that the office-bearers of each congregation must, if doing their duty, have some opinion of the religious life of those under their charge; and that associated as we are in one body, the superior courts have a right to ask, and should be told, what that is, that we may triumph with them, or take steps to strengthen the things which remain.

Members seem to be admitted to full communion in substantially the same manner in all the congregations reporting, only some appear to have more regard to the religious experience of the applicants than others. In some cases these are examined in the presence of the Session, which method has this advantage, that it recognises the rights of that court, and devolves on it its responsibilities, while it affords the whole eldership an opportunity of gaining some acquaintance with those who are admitted.

The proportion of the adults in full communion, varies from one-third to three-fourths; in a very few cases it is still higher.

The Sabbath Schools are well attended, and a very large proportion of the teachers are believed to be seeking the conversion of their pupils.

The Shorter Catechism is used throughout the schools, and generally in the families. Intemperance is said to be decreasing in almost every quarter, some reports say, except in the towns, in which, of course, facilities for being initiated in the mysteries of that shame are more common; and it is pleasing to learn, that a growing number, both of the members in full communion and of the youth, oppose the drinking customs by abstaining wholly from the use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and that in various places congregational associations for this end exist, or are being formed. If the congregations take this matter in hand, and the office-bearers, without making it a term of communion, would only head the movement, our church (if not our country) would soon be rid of its most marked reproach.

The duty of being at once and completely holy is generally confessed, and some are truly striving to reach this point. Parents are said at last to acknowledge their responsibilities and to use some means for the conversion of their children to God.

The members give of their means to promote the conversion of the world, and some work for the conversion and edification of their neighbours. In a small number of instances, the answers to the questions on these heads are clear, and unambiguous in the affirmative. In the vast majority, they indicate very great short-comings.

Family worship seems to be more commonly observed.

About one-fourth of the members seem to attend the congregational prayer meeting; only one or two congregations seem to have no prayer meeting.

Christian liberality seems to increase; not only is more said to be given, but, in some places at least, giving is being regarded more as an act of worship.

There is in all this much ground of thanksgiving to God; and also in the facts, that the Synods and Presbyteries, in so far as they have given any deliverance on this head, are unanimous in this opinion, that the cause of God is making real progress; that the Conferences on the state of religion have been profitable; that they seek their continuance; that several have taken steps to have them more searching, and to turn them to practical issues, and that an air of hopefulness breathes through these reports.

But while not doubting that we are making progress, and are fully abreast of other denominations, yet, when we compare ourselves with our pattern, when we measure ourselves with the measuring-line of the Sanctuary, we see that we have no cause to be highly elated, but abundant cause to cry for mercy and grace to help in time of need. The common neglect by Sessions year after year of the injunction of the Supreme Court of the Church, anent the state of religion, and the apparent want of interest in religious progress which this appears to indicate, are not favourable symptoms. It is true that want of sympathy with the object for which the Committee is appointed, or its mode of action, does not necessarily, prove want of interest in the subject with which it deals, yet that is certainly no evidence of enlarged Christian philanthropy, or the deepest toned earnestness.

And when your Committee consider that some, who answer the other questions, decline answering as to whether the members *seem* to regard it as their duty to be at once and in all things like the Lord Jesus, and as to whether those of them who are parents hold themselves responsible for the use of all scriptural means for the conversion of their children to God, in the full confidence that He will fulfil His own promise to them that do, and that a large number of those who answer, say, "while the confession of duty is general, the mass do not seem to realise it practically;" that family worship is far from being universal; that few seem to work directly for the conversion of their neighbours; that the prayer meetings are not attended at all as they might be; and that a large portion of our youth shew no decided interest in spiritual things,—they feel that this is no time for mere congratulations. Past triumphs we may record, and should thank God for, but these, so far from calling us to rest, should only nerve our arms for more vigorous, prayerful persevering efforts, till we have wrought deliverance in the earth, and the inhabitants of the world have fallen.

It appears that a large majority of our Sessions do not regard family worship as essential for admission of heads of families to, or their continuance in membership, though all admit it as a duty to be strongly insisted on. Your Committee would call attention to the fact, that the morning and evening sacrifice was one of the most important institutions of the old dispensation; that in it the duty of morning and evening social worship, was emphatically taught; that its being ended is spoken of by Daniel as showing the desolation of the sanctuary, and the closing of the ritual to which it belonged. Your Committee find it hard to believe that true religion, (if it exists at all), can do so in vigour, or family training for God be possible, if family worship is neglected. Few among us doubt, that if we train our children for God, looking for His blessing believingly, we shall receive it. If we cannot expect to have children trained for God, where family worship is not observed, is it not the duty of the church, to deal with those parents as defaulters, who neglect it?

It appears also that few of the Elders of the Church visit much among the Congregations of which they have the oversight.

Your Committee are satisfied that every neglect of Duty is both a symptom of wrong and a hindrance of what is right. But besides these there is another class of obstructions more direct and palpable to the eyes of all. Among these are:

1. The use of Spirituous Liquors as a beverage, and the fashion of complimentary drinking. It is from these that the drunkenness we deplore and a large portion of our other evils flow, and by which they are nourished, and your Committee fear that a large number of those who have publicly sworn in the Saviour's Blood to live for Him, and even Office-Bearers of the Church, are still lending too much countenance to those practices, by which our drunkards are trained for earthly shame, and eternal loss.

2. They are also not without grounds for thinking that card-playing and kindred amusements, and dancing parties, are not regarded by some church members, as at all inconsistent with a christian profession; and that, sometimes, sums of money are spent, and labour bestowed on these which would be seriously grudged for the Lord's cause. Your Committee without adopting the statement of an old English Bishop, that the Devil invented amusements to keep mankind from thinking, cannot avoid the

feeling that he uses these largely, in order, as some express it, to kill time, to banish thoughts of God, and of eternal things.

3. Another manifest evil is the love of display,—alike in dress, furniture, homes, and equipage.

4. Another is the spirit of worldliness. Our progress in material wealth, and the feeling thus awakened, that such wealth lies within the reach of every hand, excite men to hoard, and foster that spirit of covetousness which is idolatry.

5. Another evil and obstacle in some places is the practice of burying the dead on Sabbath, and having livery stables open and conveyances hired out on that day.

The means which are recommended in order to our making higher attainments in godliness, and to hasten the conversion of the world, are :

1. More earnest prayer and study of the Word of God.

2. More earnest effort on the part of those who preach the Gospel, to live in communion with God, and to deal with the consciences of their hearers.

3. More personal dealing in private with those who are still out of Christ.

4. That means be taken to make Sessions look closely as to the state of religion in the congregations over which they have the oversight, and to report thereanent.

5. Careful exercise of discipline, to save the Church from conformity to the World, and to secure that even the amusements of members be such as become the Gospel of Christ—such as it would not be beneath, or inconsistent with the Lord's character to share, were He now walking on earth, and that the time and expense bestowed on these be such as He would not condemn; and also to prevent as far as possible the entrance into the Church of a mixed multitude, such as she is in danger of gathering, especially in times of ease, and which always proves a trouble and a loss. When a ship is launched, unless coppered to the water line, weeds and animals begin to fasten on it, and they do so the more readily, and grow the faster, if it is at anchor and in still water. The stormy ocean is some protection, but in any case they gather there, some eat into the wood, some fasten on the iron, all consume that on which they fasten and all delay the ship in its progress through the water; and the Church, afloat as she has been for ages on the ocean of this world, needs to be carefully guarded, and saved from being fastened on and used by the ungodly for their own ends, if we would not have her power marred, or even her very life destroyed. Your Committee are fully aware of the difficulties in the way of the faithful exercise of discipline in a divided community such as ours, where so many are ready to dispense Christian ordinances to fugitives, but they believe, with old Duke John of Saxony, that the straight line is always the shortest, and that if we cannot bear that which is evil, and carefully separate the precious from the vile, we are taking the surest way of having before us an open door, which no man can shut, and of keeping our crown.

Another recommendation is that the Assembly make arrangements for evangelistic deputations. As this subject must come otherwise under notice of the Assembly, your committee merely express their entire appro-

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val of such, as well as of continuous religious services for a number of days, especially at communion seasons, and of frequent presbyterial visitations.

Your Committee are deeply impressed with the fact, that traditional religion is fast losing its hold on men. Instead of the prejudice in favour of, we have now a prejudice against, old things, simply because they are old. We have entered on an intensely practical age, in which everything is put into the crucible; though too often that is held by hands that know not how to use it, and, of course, the results are worthless; while, alongside of this, there is a strong craving for something which shall affect our emotional nature. These tendencies are not necessarily evil, though, unless properly directed, apt to develop, the one into what is called broad or liberal Churchism, or in other words, into Sadduceism or Infidelity; the other into Ritualism or Phariseism, with its fiction and fanaticism, of which our most marked specimen is Popery. These tendencies your committee feel not unthankful for; these they do not think we are called on to oppose, but to direct, by striving to bring men into living contact with the living and risen Saviour, by making it manifest that He meets all the wants of our nature. This should be done by distinct statements of the truth, holding forth the word of life in its completeness, whether men will bear or whether they will forbear, and proving by holy, loving lives, that His religion is the regenerator of humanity, the grand panacea for all the ills to which we are liable, and the only means which elevates polluted, lost beings, to glory and to God.

Your Committee are painfully sensible that our works are not perfect before God, and that we must make progress or perish, and yet they are confident that we may, and, strong in the hope that we will, rise to a higher, a far higher, tone of personal Godliness, and a far higher degree of holy, personal effort for the furtherance of His glory, than we have yet reached, even so as to be fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners; in nothing terrified by our adversaries, but mighty through God for the pulling down of strongholds, plucking brands from the burning, and building up saints, who shall be a crown of glory in the hand of the Lord, and a royal diadem in the hand of our God, to the praise of the glory of His grace, whereby he has made them accepted in the beloved; and they desire to stir up themselves, as well as their fathers and brethren, to a fresh consecration and more decided efforts, knowing that the Lord is the strength of His people and they that wait on Him shall not be put to shame.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT of COMMITTEE on FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

The Students who occupied the mission field during the last season returned at the commencement of the College Session, in October. They reported much good seed sown by their hands: many copies of the Scriptures and of religious books sold and given away; many addresses delivered, visits paid, conversations engaged in, discussions held, and varied work accomplished, which has already issued in substantial results

and will yet prove as bread cast upon the waters to be found after many days. New ground has been broken; prejudices have been removed; the unwillingness of the people to receive the message and the messengers has yielded to a better acquaintance with both. In some instances, the interviews with the Priests of which graphic recitals have been published—have shaken confidence in them, and won respect for our Student Missionaries. Several conversions are reported, and in the quiet pursuance of earnest enquiry, the kingdom of heaven has been, in the fields overtaken, like unto leaven.

From the beginning of October to the beginning of April, eleven French Students prosecuted their studies at the Montreal Theological College. Two others (not French) have been qualifying themselves for labour in Roman Catholic fields, one of whom had previously been an approved teacher in the Jesuit College at Montreal.

Of the French Students, one, soon after the session commenced, was compelled to leave in consequence of ill health, and another, towards the close, ceased to be connected with the College.

The College Report fully attests the honourable position taken by these students (as a whole) in their respective classes, and the advantage which has accrued to the institution from the introduction of this department. The French Students were, during the session, in addition to the prosecution of their studies, associated with the other students of the College in occasional missionary labour within Montreal and beyond it. An important French station, thirty miles from the city, was regularly supplied by them under the auspices of your Committee, joined to an English-speaking station near it.

During the present summer six (6) of the French Students are in the mission field, two are teaching, two are at home on account of their health. Of those engaged in mission work, two were allocated to the Lower Provinces, as during the two previous years, the work there being very hopeful, and your Committee deeming it desirable to maintain the friendly relations thus happily existing with our Eastern brethren, and to keep open a field where our young men may find fitting outlet and scope for their energies after they have finished their term of study.

The Rev. N. McKay, of St. John, New Brunswick, thus writes:—"These (Paradis and Brouillette) are excellent young men. We are greatly indebted to you on their account." Another writes more recently with reference to the labours of these students: "So far they have succeeded in making a greater ferment than in any previous year. Owing to circumstances that I need not detail, they were, for a few weeks, sent into different places, instead of being kept together as they generally are. In both places large audiences waited upon them in public, and even discussions were engaged in, in one case, a challenge having been given the colporteur to discuss the points at issue in a public manner. The result is, several have professed to renounce the doctrines and practices of Rome, and even the Press has been invoked in aid of that church."

Calvin Amaron is labouring at De Ramsay, and E. Pelletier in the township of Cambridge, the expenses of both being borne by the Students' Missionary Society of the Montreal College. That excellent society has also supported a Gaelic student at Alexandria, to labour amongst the Roman Catholic Highlanders of Glengarry. They resolved

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some time ago to secure the services, if possible, of a Gaelic minister of talent and experience for this post, at a liberal salary, your Committee lending its countenance and aid, under the supervision of the Presbytery of the bounds.

Your Committee would recommend that a discretionary power be given in this matter by the General Assembly, should circumstances admit of this contemplated undertaking being carried out. They feel satisfied that it should be our mission to evangelize the Gaelic as much as the French Canadian Romanist; nay, that our own brethren, our kinsmen according to the flesh, sitting in the darkness of superstition at our very doors, have, if possible, the stronger claim. Extracts have occasionally appeared in the "Record" from the Journals of the Student Missionaries, and this plan of informing the Church respecting their doings will be continued, so that we need not occupy space and take up the time of this Assembly with any very minute details.

A. B. Cruchet has been stationed by your Committee in the Chateau-quay district, near where M. Amaron laboured last year.

Charles Brouillette has charge of four stations—Belle Riviere, Grand Frienere, St. Eustache, and St. Therese and he writes quite encouragingly regarding his work, which is largely amongst Protestants also. There are several fields where the two elements exist, and where these young men with the two languages become doubly serviceable.

New fields are opening. Two important districts in the West, for which missionaries were sought, we were unable to supply. There are also districts in the Province of Quebec, contiguous to some of our watering places, where lapsed Protestants are found intermingled with the native population, bearing familiar old country names, lost sheep of our House of Israel, that we should follow after into the wilderness.

Your Committee have also to report that some organised French congregations are applying, or are likely to apply for admission to our Church. Of these one, Riviere du Loup, in which the English element exists, has been received into our Church, and the application of its minister is on the table of the General Assembly.

To an important part of the Ottawa district, your Committee are about sending F. Rivard, an experienced missionary.

An application has come from Manitoba, for a missionary to be sent to the district of Pembina.

Your Committee rejoices to find that some of the largest congregations take quantities of 200 and 250 copies for free circulation. One of these reports that it has done this for some time past, with most gratifying results; that not only has there been a large amount of useful information respecting our Home and Foreign Mission work diffused among the people, but, as a result of that, their contributions to the various schemes of the Church have been largely increased.

The Committee having a firm conviction that a wide diffusion of missionary intelligence among our people, from month to month, through the pages of the "Record," would greatly enlist their sympathy and zeal in favour of the various Christian enterprises in which the Church is

engaged, respectfully suggests to the Assembly that Sessions and Congregations be recommended to adopt some means by which a copy shall be put in possession of every family in connection with the Church. In order to do this it would be advisable to diminish its price.

It is also recommended that the reports of the proceedings of Presbyteries be abridged, in order that a larger space may be devoted to missionary intelligence.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

Your Committee have to report that they admitted Mr. Andrew Melville, whose case was submitted to them by the last Assembly, to participate in the benefits of this fund, and granted him the sum of \$150 00 a year. During the past year two new applications were made to them; one by the Presbytery of Stratford on behalf of Mr. John Fotheringham, who is driven by ill health to retire, at least for a season, from the work of the ministry. It is hoped that he may resume it in three or four years; meanwhile absolute rest is required. The other is made by the Presbytery of Cobourg, on behalf of Mr. Thomas Alexander, who has retired permanently from charge of a congregation. The reason for referring these to the Assembly is that the Presbyteries had not complied with the regulations which requires that no resignation shall be accepted, if aid is to be sought from the fund, till the Committee shall have an opportunity of dealing with the Congregation, in order to obtain, if possible, an allowance from them for the minister when retiring from regular pastoral work. The Presbyteries, on being communicated with, expressed their full conviction that nothing would in these cases have been gained by the Committee dealing with the Congregations. The Committee do not object to the admission of these parties, but they feel bound to bring every case, in which the regulations are not complied with, under the notice of the Assembly, that it may deal with such.

Your Committee think that if the regulation is of value, it ought to be observed, and, inasmuch as it is habitually disregarded, they suggest that, if it is to be retained, some disability should be connected with its non-observance, such as, that in these cases the claim shall date only from the meeting of Assembly to which they are reported, and not from the date of the vacancy.

Your Committee have to notice the death of one of the participants, the Rev. Dr. Boyd, of Prescott, one of the last admitted to share the benefits of the fund, and of the first removed. His death makes no difference to the fund this year.

The Committee, from the inception of this fund contemplated the early arrival of a period in which the ordinary income, unless largely increased, would not equal the expenditure; and in order to provide in some degree against it, they endeavoured to accumulate a small capital.

In their report to the last Assembly they stated that they thought this time had nearly come, both because a large number of applications might be looked for henceforth, and because the allowance from the fund should be increased. As the season advanced, so many resignations were spoken of, that your Committee felt afraid that they must reduce their capital, and thus their income, or the grants—already too small—or reject new claims, unless a larger income was given them; and therefore they asked the last Assembly, at its November meeting, to recommend an additional collection for this object. The Assembly having postponed consideration of this matter, the Committee ventured to ask one dollar from each congregation in addition to its usual contributions, and they are glad to be able to say that owing mainly to the fact that the number of applicants has not been so great as they anticipated, the fund still continues to prosper, as the financial statement manifests.

Your Committee feel that it is now time for the Church to make further provision for its aged and infirm ministers, and they suggest that the Committee be empowered to give each minister who reaches the age of seventy, if he then retires from charge of a congregation, after not fewer than twenty years service, a sum not exceeding \$100; as well as to increase the grants to those who may be obliged to retire at an earlier period. And with a view to provide the amount necessary to enable them to do so, they suggest further:—

1st. That the Assembly allow them a separate yearly collection.

2nd. That each minister, in order to be eligible to share in the benefits of this fund, shall be required to contribute henceforth a certain yearly amount, say at the rate of one-half of one per cent. of his income.

Of the cash balance in hand, \$2000 has been invested since the 1st May, 1872, and the remainder will also be invested as speedily as suitable securities can be obtained.

One annuitant has been added to the list, and one has been removed, during the year; the number remaining at present on the list is thus the same as at the date of the last report—21.

The Committee, believing that the state of the fund is now such, that the question of increasing the annual amount paid to annuitants should be considered, beg to recommend that they be empowered to enquire during next year, whether any increase can be made in the amount of the annuities, due regard being had to the stability of the fund, and the probable income to be derived in future from investments and otherwise?

The Committee further recommend, that they be authorized to revise the rules and regulations for the management of the fund, and to report any alterations and amendments they may deem advisable.
