This organization shall be called "The Woman's Baptist Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces."

77

The objects of this Union shall be the evangelization of heathen Women and children, and the prosecution of Home Mission Work.

For the better prosecution of the Foreign Missionary work of the Union:—The Union shall either in conjunction with and through the Foreign Mission Board of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, or in any other manner, as shall seem to the Union, from time to time to be meet and advantageous (a) support and furnish facilities for work to Christian

women recommended by this Union, and resignated on such recommendations by the said Board or the Convention as Missionaries, and (b) by supporting native teachers and Bible readers, (c) by aiding the Foreign Mission Board in the prosecution of mission work that may from time to time seem to this Union necessary.

And for the better prosecution of the Home Missionary work of the Union—shall raise funds through a Committee to be annually appointed for that purpose; or in any other manner howsoever, for work in the Maritime Provinces, or in the North-West and Manitoba or in both, as shall from time to time seem desirable to the Union, and shall hand the same over to the Home Mission Board to be by them expended in such way as the Union shall from time to time designate; or shall expend the money through any other channel, or in such other way as shall seem to the Union most desirable and best adapted to attain the object sought by the Union:

III.

The following shall be the membership of this Union :-

(a) Each Woman's Mission Aid Society shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Union two of its members as delegates.

(b) The President and Secretary of any Mission Aid Society shall be members of the Union.

(3) Any woman by the payment of twenty-five dollars at any time into the funds of this Union shall become A Life Member.

IV.

The Union shall annually elect a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Corresponding Secretary, three Provincial Secretaries, a Treasurer, and an Auditor. These officers, to-gether with twenty-four other members (six of whom shall retire each year in the order of their appointment,) shall constitute an Executive Board. Retiring officers and members of the Board shall be eligible for re-election. The Union shall also appoint annually a Committee whose duty it shall be to raise money in connection with the Aid Societies for Home Mission work, by whatever means deemed most desirable, provided there be no new organization. This Committee shall report annually to the Union.

V.

This Union shall meet annually at such time and place as the Convention meets, unless otherwise directed by the Union, to elect its officers, hear and pronounce upon the reports of the Executive Board, and transact the proper business of the Union accompanied by suitable religious exercises.

The duties of the President, Vice Presidents and Auditor shall be those usually performed by such officers.

VII

It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to obtain and diffuse missionary information among the women of the churches in order to awaken a deeper interest in the special work of this Union, and to secure funds for its accomplishment; to encourage the formation of Aid Societies; to seek out and recommend to the Foreign Mission Board suitable women for missionaries; to choose from the annual estimates of the missionaries as endorsed by the B. M. Board, such objects for support as are in agreement with our Constitution, and recommend to the Society at its annual meeting for approval; to recommend the appropriation of Home Mission Funds; and to do all other business necessary to the carrying out of the purposes of this Union.

It shall be the duty of the Provincial Secretaries, each in her own Province, to conduct the home work of the Executive Board, and to report the same at its annual meeting. It shall also be the duty of the Provincial Secretary to appoint, whenever possible, a Secretary for each County, whose work it will be to organize

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to keep the minutes of the meetings, to conduct the correspondence of the Board, carry into effect, as far as possible, the measure adopted by the Board for missionary work, and to report the same to the Union at its annual meeting. And it shall be the duty of the Advisory Committee appointed by the Union to carry into effect all adopted measures relating to the Home Mission work, and to report the same to the Union at its annual meeting

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive, record, and acknowledge all the funds of this Union, and to place them quarterly as designated by the Union, in the hands of the Treasurers of the Home and Foreign Mission Boards, making a full report of the same at each meeting of the Board, and annually to the Union.

In case of the death or resignation of any of the officers of this Union, the Executive Board may fill the vacancy until the next meeting of the Union.

XII

A special meeting of the Union may be called at any time by the President of the Union on her motion or at the written request of the members of the Executive Committee.

IIIX

Notices of the meetings of the Union shall be given by notice in the Baptist paper, or in such manner as the Union shall from time to time determine. The notices of the special meetings shall state the object of such meeting and no other business except that specified shall be transacted at such meeting

XIV.

Those rules and the laws of the Executive Committee may be altered at any annual meeting of the Union by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, provided such alterations or additions shall have been proposed in writing as notice at a previous annual meeting of the Union, or on the recommendation of the Executive Committee made at any annual meeting.

- I. Every meeting of the Board shall be opened with reading the Scriptures and prayer.
- 2. The Secretary shall keep an exact record of all the business transacted by the Board; and the record of each meeting shall be read at the next following meeting, and when approved, shall be signed by the Secretary.
 - 3. All remarks shall be addressed to the chair.
- 4. All important resolutions shall be presented in writing.
- 5. No motion shall be in order for discussion unless it has been seconded.
- 6. All committees shall be appointed by the chair, unless otherwise ordered.

The regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the second Tuesday of August, November, February and May. Special meetings of this Board may be held at any time, subject to the call of the President through the Secretary, on the request of the members.

OF THE

Woman's Baptist Missionary Aid Societies.



i. This Society shall be called "The Woman's Missionary Aid Society of Baptist Church."

2. Its object shall be to aid the Woman's Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces in the evangelization of heathen women and children, and prosecution of Home Mission Work.

3. Any woman may become a member of this Society by contributing not less than one dollar a year, or two cents a week to its funds

4. This Society shall annually elect from its members a President, two Vice-Présidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Auditor, and a committee of four, who, together with the above named officers, shall constitute a Board of Management, one-third of whom shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

- 5. The funds of this Society shall be forwarded every quarter, or oftener if necessary, to the Treasurer of the Woman's Baptist Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces.
- 6. All amendments to this Constitution shall be submitted in writing at a regular meeting of the Society and shall be adopted by a vote of not less than two thirds of the members present.

Bye-Laws.

- 1. All meetings of this Society shall be opened by the reading of the Holy Scriptures and by prayer.
- 2. The regular meetings of this Society shall be held on the first after the first Sunday in every month, and the annual meeting as directed by the Board of Management.
- 3. Special meetings of the Society and of its Board of Management may be held at any time, subject to the call of the President through the Secretary.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of this Society, and its Board of Management. In the absence of the President, the Senior Vice President shall preside.
- 5. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of all the proceedings of the Society and its

6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and pay out, according to article fifth of the Constitution all the funds of the Society, keeping an exact account of the same, and reporting quarterly to this Society and to the Treasurer of the Woman's Baptist Missionary Union.

It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine the annual financial statements of the Treasurer, and certify to the accuracy of the same, before they are presented to the Society at its annual meeting.

ARTICLE I This Society shall be known as the Mission Band.

ARTICLE 2—The object of this Society shall be to plant and foster a missionary spirit in the hearts of the young, and to aid in the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom at home and abroad.

ARTICLE 3—The meetings of this Society shall be held once every on Special meetings may be called at any time by order of the President and Secretary.

ARTICLE 4—Anyone may become a member of this Band by paying not less than 2 cts per month.

ARTICLE 8—Each Band is entitled to send two delegates to the meetings of the W. B. M. U. held at our Associational gatherings. Also to the Annual meetings.

ARTICLE 9—The articles of this Constitution may be altered by the W. B. M. U. according to Article 14 of Constitution of the W. B. M. U.

"What shal! be the result of all these services?" these loving appeals, surely a fuller conseceration to the service of the Master, and a determination to carry out His plans and commands.

Our Missionaries.

Our faithful band of workers in India has been wonderfully preserved during this year, and enabled to accomplish much good among the Telugus.

Bimlipatam.

Mr. and Mrs. Morse have devoted the last seven years to mission work at this station. Mrs. Morse spends a good part of her time on tours with her hus-

hand and assists him much in his work. The number of paptisms reported from this field is larger this year. than ever before. The mission school is doing a quiet bu: deep work. Most of the pupils are caste Hindu boys. During the year one of them has been converted. and is waiting for baptism; he is about fifteen years of age. There has been a marked change in him which is visible in his new life and new face. Miss Newcombe. has been here since her arrival in India, with the exception of a few weeks spent at Bobbili with Miss Harris on, after the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Churchill for the home land in March last. She has made excellent progress with the language, and is now almost fitted for active service. She has made frequent tours with Mr 3. Morse and thus writes of one of these experiences. Eevery day was filled to overflowing with happiness. The living in tent in the midst of nature itself is a delight, but above all is the going out among the people. I was so glad to find I could understand so much o what was said, and could make myself understood too. Truly the Lord gives joy deep joy in this work. Grev, whose health will not permit of her returning this fall, expects to return to her loved work next year. Bobbili.

Since the departure of Mrs. Churchill she has taken charge of the schools, and in fact, taken Mrs Churchill's place, which for one so young was quite a responsibility, but she has succeeded admirably. We are very glad to welcome Mrs. Churchill to our yearly gathering, and hope to hear from her many additional items in regard to the work in Bobbili.

Report of Provincial Secretary for N. S.

In reviewing the year just closed we have no cause to be discouraged or doubt that the work we are engaged in is God given. More should have been accomplished, would have been, had we had the faith that removes mountains,—but steady progress has been made in many instances. Reports from the Aid Sscieties show a deepening interest and a steadily, if slowly increasing membership.

Our membership in the Aid Societies is 2799, probably a little over 134 Aid Societies. Eifty one reporting in the western Association, forty-seven in the Central and thirty-six in the eastern.

In the Central Association seven Aid Societies have been formed; in the Eastern Association, two, and in the Western Association one, making a total of ten new Societies for the year. More Societies report an increase in membership than last year, but an added effort needs to be made.

Report on Home Missions.

As years roll on we can but chronicle the loving kindness of our God. Work undertaken for him never fails, though the obstacles be mountains high. Walking out on His promises success is assured.

Your Home Mission Committee are realizing some thing at least of this as they have gone forward in the work you have intrusted to them. The work of the committee does not vary much from year to year. According to a resolution passed at our last annual meeting, Home Missions was to have a place in Tidings each month. The work has thus been kept pretty well before the societies. In January the committee decided to send a circular letter to all societies which had not contributed to Home Missions during the previous year. This was done. Forty-nine being sent to New Brunswick and fifty-seven to Nova Scotia. The Provincia Secretary of P. E. I. being ill at the time, it was impossible to obtain the names of Societies, so as to write them.

The Island sisters however did not need to be re-

minded so much as N. S. and N. B. as the report last July showed that out of 18 Societies 15 had contributed to Home Missions.

Our Finances.

We aimed at raising \$2000,00 but have fallen short by \$261.99. The amount raised being \$1738.01.

The question now before us is, on whom does the responsibility of this failure rest? Surely not wholly with your Home Misssion Committee. Let Presidents and Secretaries as well as your Committee search and see.

The committee recommend that the appropriations for the coming year remain the same as during the year just closed—\$2000 oo. Trusting that the leaders in each Society will bring the matter constantly before the sisters. Were every society to respond we would have a surplus and not a deficit.

work among the children and young people, educating them in the history of missions and the great needs and opportunities of the present hour?

To begat an interest in missions we must begin as near the cradle as possible. Mothers, sisters, grand-

mothers here is a work for you.

If we can awaken an interest in misson work in the hearts of our children, their youthful enthusiasm will kindle our duller minds, their quicker step quickens ours. They will lead us whither we never thought to go. Little Mary's lip trembled as she said good bye to the mother who had daintly dressed her for the Mission Band "you never come yourself mama to see what we are doing, some mothers do," Until this moment that mother thought her whole duty performed when she sent her child to the Mission Band. But now her eves were opened and a new duty was revealed. She left the work planned for that hour and hurried after her child, *She was amply rewarded for her self-denial by what she learned from the children. child's quiek sympathy and unselfishness will often awaken in parents hearts an interest in objects for which before they had cared little.

If we can only help our young people to realizo that there is something better for which to labor, td plan, to dream, to live than their own pleasure ane personal adornment. Only a few days ago a beautiful young lady asked most seriously. "How can you bear to go to so many missionary meetings?" "Are

they not all alike?" I tried to tell her of 23,000,000 widows in the east most of them children for whom Christ died as well as for her whose lives were one long scene of woe. Of baby girls by the hundred thrown out on the streets or left by the river bank to die. Of 40,000,000 women in Zenanas shut up from birth to death without ever walking God's earth or hearing His voice in singing birds, or swaying trees or babling brooks. They are denied God's voice in nature as well as in His blessed word. These can be reached with the gospel only by lady missionaries. I just hinted that missionary meetings could never be dull or all alike when we were planning and praying to save The expression of her face these heathen sisters. changed "Oh, if you put it that way"- she replied. A little light had entered her mind. Up to this time her whole life had been one of receiving only. She knew not the blessedness of giving.

Let us plead for an awakening among the members of our W. M. A. S. to see and feel the importance of this work among the children in the home as well as the Mission Band and Sabbath School. There are many of our churches where nothing is done to interest or instruct the children in mission work. In the mountain regions of Mexico hundreds of feet above the sea level in places seemingly inaccessible are found caves evidently used as homes for women and children when war made flight from the villages below necessary. God give us wisdom and strength so to train the children that their lives may be given to this great work, that the touch of hand head and heart may defy the ravages of time and endure unto eternity.

Let me ask and try to answer three questions, What are we as women doing for missions? Why are we doing it? How are we doing it? Each questions might profitably occupy all the time at my disposal.

What are we doing? The answer quickly comes. We are holding monthly missionary meetings, offering daily prayer for our work and workers, raising money to send out missionaries to India, to support schools, Bible women and native preachers in order to bring the Telugus to a knowledge of Christ. We are also contributing towards the Grande Ligne and North West Missions, the Indian work rnd our Home Mission. This we might call our answer on the foreign side. What is the answer on the home orindividual side? It is with that we shall deal particularly just now. What is this work doing for our women who are heartily engaged in it giving thought, time, talents and strength to its prosecution and extension? We are furnishing ourselves with one of the finest means of spiritual development that could be employed. We bless the heathens with our prayers and

gifts, but like mercy "it blesses him that gives as well as him that takes." Have you never felt in your own soul an increase of spiritual vigor clearly the result of missionary effort? Have you never felt a widening of your spiritual vision when you have laid aside the busy cares of life for one hour a month to contemplate the world for whom Christ died in its depths of woe and misery? Have you not been lifted heavenward many times during the year when you realized that you were "working together with God" for the redemption of this lost world?

Dr. Pierson has said that God has given his people this mission work not only for the evangelization of the heathen, but for their spiritual development. We sometimes think our missiou work means only praying praying and giving let us not forget that these reach upon ourselves and that God in using us for this work has given us a most wonderful aid to spiritual develop-

ment.

This mission work also forms a bond of love to unite women of all denominations. This tiny seed planted by Miss Norris's hand when under the direction of the Holy Spirit she formed the first W. M. A. S. in Canada has grown into a great tree stretching wide its branches into all christian churches and yielding its fruit for the healing of the nations. The hearts of women are being prepared by heavenly showers to send forth there 'various rills and rivulets of benevolence and self-sacrifice that the thirsty deserts of heathenism

Let us thank God that so many of my sisters gathered here are actively engaged in this "Woman's work for women" giving it a first place in their thoughts, time and hearts, asking daily "Lord what wilt thou have me to do"? If any before me are uninterested or unconcerned feeling no personal responsibility in this work let me entreatt you now to yield yourself to the call of the Master and unite your strength with ours to bring the knowledge of Christ to our heathen sisters.

Why are we doing this mission work?

Some reply because I love it and esteem it a great privilege, others, it is my duty others, some one asked me I did not like to refuse, another, it is expected of me as a pastor or deacon's wife. There is one answer comes that touches the main spring It is my Saviour's command Go and He has redeemed me "whose I am and whom I serve. It is my Father's business and requires all His children, all the time, to give all diligence to obey this last command Jesus said "As the Father hath sent me so I send you." Let each one ask herself just now this question and answer truly, "Why am I engaged in this mission

work"? If the command of Christ is the basis that forms our motive we have a foundation that is secure to build upon, nothing can interrupt or cause us to turn aside, neither adversity or prosperity, on the foreign field or at home domestic claims or social pleasures, sickness or health. This motive will prove a grand impelling force to lead us on thro' success or apparent failure. "I had to" is soon exhausted "It was expected of me" will be among the missing. The command of our loving Lord to His loyal child gives to us all an immortal impotus. My sisters rejoice if you by the Holy Spirit's help have grasped this motives so high up in the mount of God that the clouds, storms, disappointments and pleasures of life never move you to slacken your pace. Prayer for our missionaries that a double portion of this spirit may be granted them as they wrestle against the combined hosts of Satan amid the darkness of heathenism. Are we all daily remembering the Prayer Topic so that the missionary prayed for cach month may feel assured that hundreds of sisters are bearing them unitedly in the arms of faith and prayer. Let us not only do this mission work prayerful but intelligently. Can we pray effectually or give acceptably to an object we know very little about? A lady not long since was asked if she knew about Zennena work? Oh no, she replied I never find time for fancy work, thinking it was some new stitch in embroidery. Now such ignorance in this age is unpardonable. How many missionary Biographies have you read this year? One read over and over again until you have made the character a study and the facts concerning that particular mission your own is better than one dozen carelessly read to be forgotten the next week. Dr. Gordon read the life of David Brainard once every year, had that not something to do with his great missionary zeal? The stream of missionary literature has life giving properties, it communicates its own vigor to those who will drink from these crystal waters. The history of modern missions as given in the biographies of its missionaries is only a continuation of the "Acts of the apostles" and has the same effect upon those who study it. So frequently have I asked the question what first led you to become interested in missions the

reply has been reading the lives of the three Mr. Judsons. Eternity alone will reveal the good these sainted ones are doing even now. Their works do follow them and the tide of sacred influence flows on. One cannot carefully read and study the life of McKay of Uganda or John Paton without imbibing something of their spirit and being drawn, nearer Christ in his great purpose of saving the word. No person can plead that these books are not within their reach. Our missionary library in Amherst does not have the patronage it should receive. There are books and leaflets that have not been read by many of our sisters and they are suffering the consequence in lack of knowledge and interest in this great work of missions.

Work Among Women.

In reviewing the work of the past year it seems that "Praise" should be the key-note, for the Lord has been very good to me and has given me strength to spend the whole year on the plains and very much joy in telling the story of redemption. There have been changes and interruptions, but wherever I am there are those who need the Bread of Life. Still I have a longing to stay in one place long enough to get acquainted with the people and work

I came to Chicacole a year ago as it was impracticable for me to go to Parla Kimedi and began work with the Bible women who had been under Mrs. Archibald's care since Miss Wright's return to Canada. We visited in the town and surrounding villages daily and were much pleased by the attentive way the people listened to the message. For years they have heard as they testify, but they seem to stop there for their faith is too weak to grasp the promises of God and say "All for Jesus." Their question is "How shall we eat if we become christians?" We tell them that if they have

faith in God and are willing to work, He will certainly feed them. Because of the decision reached at Conference as to the re-distribution of our forces, I came to Chicacole and Mrs. Archibald passed the Bible women over to me; there are six in all, three at out-stations and three here in the town. One has not been doing much work since the first of the year as we have given her several little children to care for while their mothers are away studying so that they can support themselves and at the same time be able to help our suffering sisters in this land of superstition where all disease is attributed to demons.

We feel that this woman is better adapted to this work than Bible work. She is, I believe a christian, but not competent to proclaim the gospel. I tell her if she trains these children aright the Lord can bless the work just as much as any other. The other Bible women have all done faithful work and in looking over their monthly reports, I see that during the last six months thousands have heard the gospel.

We meet for Bible study and at present are studying the Book of Acts. Have spent days on the Holy Spirit; we realize he is with us, but we long to have more of His power, and I try to impress the thought that it we have not the power the fault lies in our own hearts, and I think that day by day we are getting

No touring has been done on this field by the Bible women or myself this year. The women at the out stations send us good reports of their work, I would like very much to visit them and encourage them in their work, for each woman is alone with the exception of her own household. In the mornings I teach Bible classes in the day school. Quite a number of heathen boys attend and seem as much interested in the lessons as our own christian boys.

Just a week ago after going to my room for the night, I heard a noise, and sent a punkah man to see what was wanted. He returned saying three women wished to see me and as they did not dare come in the day time they had come at night. I hurried out, and fater assuring them that there was no man in the house they shyly came in and I had a good talk with them. It was the first time they had developed enough courage to come to the Mission House. One is I trust a christian, but shut up as they are they have hardly the courage to speak or think for themselves. They said I had not been to their house for some time and as they wished to hear more they came to me. We need the faith of Paul to believe that all things are possible. Will you not ask our Father to give us all more faith, and help us to realize that
