#### TO FORCE FLEMMING OUT OF CONTEST?

Woodstook, N. B., May 24-There is a persistent report that J. K. Fleming will be forced to quit as the federal candiate for Carleton-Victoria. Considerable opposition has developed, and curiously enough much of it comes from the B. F. Smith camp, where they are circulating the report that it is utterly impossible to elect the ex-premier, and, as a striking vindication of clean politics, Smith wants to enter the contest as the Tory candidate.

Smith arrived here yesterday after an interview with the Tory leaders in St. John and Fredericton. It is announced that Premier Borden will not be connected with the Fleming nomination, as he publicly denounced Foster and Garland for their connection with charges not so serious as brought out at the royal commission.
