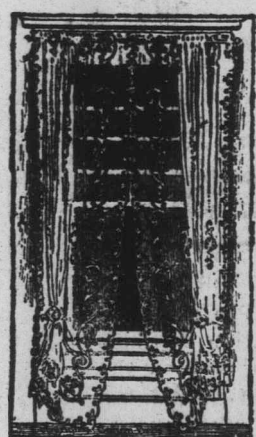

### BONAVENTURE NEWS.

Atlantic Quebec & Western  
Ry Bill Passed.

(Special to Events.)

The bill incorporating the Bonaventure and Gaspé Telephone company was assented to on Friday and is now law, so that the company can now go on and build up their system which they intend doing without loss of time. The system will connect with the N. B. system at Campbellton.

The bill authorizing the Atlantic Quebec and Western Railway to buy out the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway and extend it to Gaspé and Edmundston has passed the Senate and will become law next week. The new company expect to take over the old road on July 1st, and have cars running regularly during the coming summer between Matapedia and Port Daniel a distance of 120 miles. New rolling stock is to be put on the road and the road itself modernized. The company will also continue its work of construction from Port Daniel towards Gaspé, which it is expected will be reached within three years. A survey is to be made this summer between Matapedia and Edmundston.

The Point Schourie Light House is being moved out to Bonaventure Point by order of the Light House Board. This has been rendered necessary in the interests of navigation.

The bill authorized the Quebec Oriental Railway Company to build a line from Matapedia to Rivière du Loup has also passed the Senate and will be assented to next week.

The Light House Board has taken up the question of building a permanent pier and light at Point à la Garde in lieu of the present light ship.

In addition to the above improvements Mr. Marcell is improving the post office and mail service generally all through the county. Improved services have been granted between Matapedia and Deseronto and Runnymede, Escuminac and Fleury and other improvements are being urged at present and are under consideration by the Post office authorities.

The Carleton municipal council has voted its thanks to Mr. Marcell for his work in connection with the passage of the railway bill providing for the sale of the old road, the payment of debts and relieving the municipalities of the payment of bonuses voted by them.

At no place on the Bonaventure coast is a larger lumber business done than at the mouth of the Bonaventure river where business has been increasing year by year. It was lacking in customs facilities and parties interested and navigators had to go to Paspébiac fifteen miles away every time a vessel had to be entered or cleared. The citizens asked for an improvement and Mr. Marcell has now obtained this. Bonaventure river is established as a customs Preventive station for the entry and clearance of vessels during the season of navigation, under the survey of the Port of Paspébiac. Mr. James S. Harvey, Preventive officer at New Richmond, P. Q. has been given full powers and is to be notified by telegraph when his services are required.

### LADIES' COLLEGE.

The ladies' college library has lately acquired several valuable volumes from the Smithsonian Institute at Washington. These include volumes of the Contributions to Knowledge, Miscellaneous Collections and Reports, of which the ladies' college now possesses a complete set of 78 volumes. The total number of volumes in the library is now about 7,500 of which 1,500 volumes are of indexed periodicals.

### Mayor Murray Re-elected.

Large Vote Polled in Tuesday's Election

Mowat and Andrew Elected in Ward Two and Jardine and McLennan in Ward Three —Keen Contest

The civic election passed off quietly on Tuesday, notwithstanding that there was considerable hustling on the part of the candidates and their supporters to bring out the vote. The vote polled this year is considerably above the average, which is indicative of the interest in the election.

Dr Murray was re-elected Mayor by a much larger majority than was expected by his friends.

In Ward Three where the contest was keen and a close vote was expected, Messrs. Jardine and McLennan were elected by substantial majorities. In Ward Two Messrs. Andrew and Mowat defeated Messrs. Stewart and Pinault by slight majorities.

The returns from the different wards were received by the Town Clerk at the Council room and after announcing the result he declared the winning candidates elected. Then followed a short round of speech-making.

Dr Murray was the first to rise and in a few well chosen words thanked the electors for their support. He said he enjoyed the work of the Council, in fact it was a real pleasure, not because of the honor, but because of the work itself. He hoped to be able to serve the best interests of the town in the future with the same pleasure as in the past. He referred to the good feeling that had prevailed between himself and his opponent and had found Mr. Blackhall a perfect gentleman. There had been no unfair canvasses used as far as he knew.

Mr Blackhall then rose and expressed his gratitude for the votes he had received. There had been one unfair canvass used against him and that was that he had been brought out by the rum party. That was utterly false. He didn't know who started it but he had felt it all through the campaign.

Dr Pinault was the next speaker. He stood before them as a defeated candidate. In accepting nomination he felt that it was nothing but just and right that the French people of the town, comprising nearly one-third of the population, should have at least one representative at the Council board, and looked for support from the English people. He was sorry that he was not elected for this reason, and said that the time was surely coming when the French people would have a majority of voters in the town, if the present rate of increase continued, and he hoped that the French people would then give the English people better treatment than the French have received today.

### FIRE AT DALHOUSIE.

Restigouche Woodworking Co's Factory Completely Destroyed

Fire was discovered in the Restigouche Woodworking Co's factory at 10.15 on Friday evening of last week and the flames spreading very rapidly soon reduced the entire plant to embers. The Campbellton department was telephoned for. The fire engine and hose were loaded on a flat car and taken to the scene of the fire. When the engine and party arrived at Dalhousie however the factory was in ashes, but the work of saving the lumber piles which were in danger was begun. The Quebec hotel had a very close shave, and had it not been for the untiring efforts of the Dalhousie people all the upper portion of the town would have been destroyed. The Campbellton department returned home at ten o'clock Saturday morning.

The loss to the company is a heavy one. The plant was valued at \$90,000. The insurance was adjusted yesterday the Restigouche Woodworking Co. receiving \$45,400.

Nothing definite is yet known as to what the company intend to do, as a meeting of the directors has not been held, but it is generally understood that it will be rebuilt on the same site on a larger scale.

## ANNUAL REPORT

(Continued from 7th page)

er, The Confederation Life Association at their office in Halifax N. S. The interest on these as well as on the Fire Engine debentures is payable semi-annually while the interest on the water and light and Sewerage debentures is payable annually (with the exception of the 15,000.00 water and Light Bonds issued March 15th, 1906 which later is payable semi-annually. This debenture is held by the Bank of Nova Scotia collateral for overdraft).

The water and light and fire engine debentures with interest thereon are payable at the office of the Town Treasurer Campbellton, N. B. and sewerage debentures with interest thereon are payable in St. John N. B.

A record of all dates pertaining to these several bonds issued containing dates of issue and maturity as well as their numerical position and denominations, value etc., has been placed on file in the office of the Town Treasurer for identification of bonds and interest coupons, when presented for payment at maturity.

There is a floating debt against the town at the present time of from twelve to eighteen thousand dollars which is carried by the Bank of Nova Scotia as mentioned above. The bank holds the \$15,000.00 water and Light bond as collateral.

I beg to call your attention to the fact that the amount of over eight thousand dollars was expended on the water extension and the purchase of lands last year, and while there was no bond issue the overdraft in Bank has only increased by the sum of sixteen hundred and eighty seven dollars.

The total assets of the corporation including the water and Electric light plant, fire engine and appliances and real estate belonging to the corporation such as public buildings and lands but exclusive of street property is estimated to be worth about \$290,000.00.

The total value of untaxable property with the town, including the above assets, but exclusive of government property may be placed at about \$3,200,000.00.

The detailed amounts received and expended in connection with all the public departments of the town will be given in the annual Blue Book to be published shortly and need not be further referred to in this report.

FIRE.

To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton.

Gentlemen:—I hereby submit the following synopsis of the operation of the Fire Department for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1907.

During the year we have not added any stock to our fire apparatus except one doz. of firemen's rubber coats as we had in stock. A fire engine and 2,200 feet of hose all in first class condition. The hose were distributed in the three fire stations same as previous year that is in summer season one reel at station No 1 in ward 2 where the hose are kept one in station No 2 in Shives Lumber Co's Shed and one at station No 3 opposite Geo McKenzie's store in winter season hose in reel at station No 2 are distributed equally at station No 1 and 3. We only had one fire during the year Commercial Hotel on the 10th of Dec. 1906. The alarm was given about 6.30 p.m. and as it was cold weather the firemen were at a disadvantage and the Hotel burned down but the two buildings on each side which were very close were saved without any damage whatever. There was a few other fire alarms but only one Duncan & McLenau's has been necessary all the other blazes were extinguished by garden hose or other method of fire extinguished. As there was about 300 feet of hose condemned by the department after the fire at the Commercial Hotel I would recommend that about 300 feet hose be purchased and a tower of about 30 feet be built in station No 1 to be able to dry about 500 feet at a time.

A CHANGE

Next Move will be for his Release on Bail

New York, April 15.—Interest in the case of Harry K. Thaw centres about the probable changes he will make in his staff of lawyers. While no official announcement has been made in regard to this, intimations have come from lawyers themselves that charges have been made and that others will follow. D. M. Delmas, who led the fight at the recent trial has, it is stated, severed his connection with the case. In this connection the story of the remarkable proceeding of Thaw at a critical period of his trial, is published here to-day. The story recites that when the trial was resumed after the report of the Lunacy Commission Mr. Delmas called Dr. Hamilton to the stand to have him testify as to Thaw's mental condition when the murder was committed. He was just about to question him when he received from Thaw a note which read:

"You are no longer in charge of my case."

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## THE EARTH SHOOK THROUGH MEXICO

Mexico City, April 15.—The official record of the meteorological bureau on last night's earthquake gives the duration of the shock as lasting four minutes. The movement was from east to west in an oval shape. An observer declared that the centre of shock was probably to the southward and it is feared towns in that region may have suffered.

A driver of a circus wagon, who was taking paraphernalia to the railroad depot, was thrown from his seat by the force of the shock, but he was uninjured except slight bruises, but everyone of the animals he was driving was killed.

Telegraphic communication as far south as Oaxaca and San Juan Bautista has been re-established, but beyond the report that the shock was heavy in that region nothing more has been learned. From the city of Vera Cruz the shock is reported to have been very severe. At the time of the first shock the theatres were filled and a panic ensued, but owing to the peculiar steady owing of the earth's movement the crowds left the buildings in comparatively good order. This shock was accompanied by two slight electric flashes which lighted the sky to the northwest of Mexico city. Up to this time the property loss is not reported.

### UNJUST RESTRICTIONS.

Now that the day of elections contested by only two parties has passed away in Canada as well as in Britain and the United States, there being four or five distinct political organizations in the field in this country, it is time that the provincial and Dominion legislatures abolished the law compelling every candidate for parliament or the House of Assembly to deposit \$100 or \$200 before election, which sum is forfeited if he fails to get half as many votes as the successful candidate. Such law does not, as often argued, keep out undesirable candidates, unless all poor men are considered as undesirable. It allows the rich, no matter how unfit, to contest elections, but debar an honest poor man from offering as a candidate. It also serves to keep small parties out of the field, thus preventing a full expression of the popular will at the polls. There is nothing whatever to be said in favor of such a survival of ancient class legislation, and it should be repealed in New Brunswick this session, in order to have the next elections truly show the political affiliations of our people.

Another gross injustice is the laws many towns and cities providing that no person may be

Mayor or Alderman unless he owns real estate. The larger the town, the greater the number of men who own no property—the greater the number that never can own houses or land. The law implies that all propertyless people are unfit to hold office—a most mistaken idea and one that is working great injury to the country. Before it closes, the local legislature should see that this grievance is removed. Let all political inequalities be removed, and removed at once.

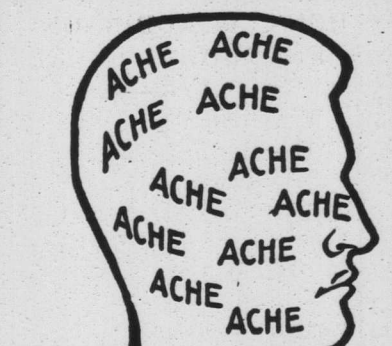
**NO NEW SCHOOL BOOKS.**

**H. R. EMMERSON.**  
The British custom of demanding that a leader in public life violate none of the conventional proprieties in his private relations, which requirement blasted the public careers of such great men as Chas. Stewart Parnell and Sir Chas. Dilke, has now, it seems, become a factor in Canadian politics, necessitating, for a time at least, the retirement of the able and successful minister of Railways, Hon. H. R. Emmerson. During the last forty years of Canada's national life, several ministers of the crown and high dignitaries—not all on the same side of politics—have been known to be corrupt in private morals; but their opponents, however anxious they were to acquire political honors, forbore to bring such private vices into public discussion.

Now, however, the charges brought against Mr. Emmerson by the Fredericton Gleaner of which Geo. W. Fowler, M. P., is a proprietor, changes the time-honored custom of Canada, and renders necessary a general house-cleaning in our legislative halls. The movement now starting may ultimately entrap its initiators, and will in all probability work out to the country's final advantage. In the meantime the government railway system has lost a most broad-minded and capable administrator—one who, while rapidly improving the condition of his department, was constantly looking forward to the extension of the Intercolonial to Lake Huron and to the absorption of the small branch lines. In his private capacity, Mr. Emmerson has long believed in the government ownership of railways; and, as chief of the I. C. R. and P. E. I. railroad, he was doing much to put that idea into practical operation. The country will miss his services, and we hope that as a result of the trial now pending he will be able to vindicate his character and return to the cabinet.

Premier Pugsley's motion to purchase 50,000 acres of land from

the New Brunswick Railway Co., at seventy-five cents an acre, and sell it to bona fide settlers in lots of one hundred acres at the same price plus the cost of survey is an excellent scheme that should meet the approval of all. This land will accommodate five hundred families, a very desirable addition to the population of the province.

Dear Editor:—Will you kindly allow me through the columns of your paper to make a statement in reference to a certain article which appeared in the two last issues under the heading of "A Warning?"

Now Mr. Editor Mr. Borden would lead the people to believe he was not used right by the company. The following is a true statement of matters pertaining to the Borden Clothes Reel Mfg. Co.

The company was organized with a capital stock of \$5000.00; Mr. Borden's so-called patent was to represent one half of the amount and the other half was to be put up by the rest of the company, which was done, namely \$2500.00. In order to try and make the thing pay we put some \$3500.00 extra and to the best of our knowledge we did not receive returns from sales to amount of more than \$300.00. On account of the article failing to give satisfaction, we were forced to the conclusion we had sunk enough money. A meeting was called and the company decided to dispose of the entire interest. The following is the motion which Mr. Borden calls "a cunningly devised document read to him by one D. R. McRae." Namely that the company sell out their entire interest for the sum of \$2500.00 to pay the indebtedness then standing against the company. Mr. Borden himself voted for the motion.

You will see by this that the three members of the company put in cash some \$6000.00 into the business, while Mr. Borden did not invest one cent in cash. He was paid at the rate of \$50. per month from the time the machinery arrived in Campbellton until it was closed down. Mr. Borden had the first offer to buy out the interest. After waiting some months and finding Mr. Borden had failed to interest capital in the purchase, the offer was open to anyone who would pay the price. You will remember it was advertised in your paper at that time. Mr. J. E. Miller decided to buy at the upset price namely \$2500.00. The

company accepted his offer and gave him a legal transfer of the same.  
Now dear Editor I wish to state that J. E. Miller, J. W. Kierstead and myself lost over and above the \$2500.00 some \$4000.00. This statement can be made under oath at any time. Thanking you for the space.

Fredericton, April 15th.—This morning Hon. Clifford W. Robinson was sworn in provincial secretary. This action makes vacant Hon. Mr. Robison's seat in Westmorland county, and the writ for the by-election has been issued. April 30th has been named as nomination day, polling will take place on May 7th.

The members of the provincial government returned to the city this morning after spending Sunday in their homes, and Lieutenant Governor Tweedie, who spent Sunday at St. John, returned today. Premier Pugsley was asked this afternoon as to the report that there would be another session of the legislature before the general elections are called on and stated that the five year-term of the present assembly did not end until March next. "However," he concluded "you may say that the matter has not been considered by the government as yet." The premier was asked when the Judiciary Act would be brought into effect he stated the necessary proclamation would probably be issued within a month. As to the appointment of the seven judges, he presumed that that would be made by the Dominion government about the same time.

Besides the Fredericton Exhibition grant, the government has also decided to give grants of \$1,000 each to Port Elgin exhibition and Bathurst exhibition.

## LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

### Liquor License Act, Highway Act and Game Laws Amended.

Fredericton, April 17.—Bills were introduced today to provide \$5,000 a year additional grant to the University of N. B.; to pay \$1,500 in aid of the Champlain monument in St. John, and to provide \$750 a year for five years for cold storage warehouses in any part of the province, the cost of such warehouses to be not less than \$15,000.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley gave notice of a motion to provide for a number of permanent bridges. Among the list are the following for the North Shore:—Kent Co.—McLeod's Mill bridge, Cocagne bridge, Little River bridge.

Northumberland Co.—Northwest Miramichi bridge, Tabusintac bridge, Chatham bridge, Donald's bridge.

Gloucester Co.—Bathurst Station River bridge.

Restigouche Co.—Eel River bridge.

Hon. Mr. Sweeney introduced a bill to amend the law relating to the protection of game. We propose to impose a fine of \$10 on non-resident sportsmen who come into this province to shoot our game birds. It also requires registered guides to make a return of the game killed by the parties they take into the woods. We also intend to shorten the open season for martin, fisher and sable and to extend the close season for beaver to the year 1910. We also propose to reduce the number of persons one guide can take into the woods from five to two. Another proposal is that when the wives of a hunting party accompany their husbands but do no shooting that it is certified by the guide the license fee will be remitted. It has been represented to me that the farmers' crops are frequently destroyed by deer, and this will provide that it will be sufficient justification for a violation of the game law if the animals are killed when destroying a farmer's crop. We also propose to prohibit the use of automatic guns and rifles in shooting our game birds. These are very destructive and cause immense slaughter.

Fredericton, April 17.—Hon. Mr. LaBelle introduced a bill to amend the highway act, stating it was intended by this bill to facilitate the keeping open of winter roads. It allowed the superintendent to spend ten per cent of the grant on winter roads at his own discretion. It also provides for the erection of snow fences. It appeals the section which places the ownership of highways in the crown. It also makes provision for the remuneration of certain officers.

The bills relating to the Champlain monument and cold storage were agreed to.

School Teachers' pensions were discussed.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill to amend the Liquor license act.

In committee, the House agreed to the bill to vest the title of certain lands in the trustees of the congregation of the Carmel Presbyterian church at Lower Napun, Northumberland county, as amended; the bill to ratify the sale of certain lands by the trustees of St. John's church, Chatham; and that amending the game laws.

Fredericton, April 17.—To-day, the bill in amendment to the Liquor License Act was considered in committee. The third section prohibits drugists from selling liquor without medical certificates. The fourth section prohibits slot machines, and the sixth provides that any city may appoint a Scott Act inspector.—Section 21 of the act requires that before the act can be brought into force the consent of a majority of the ratepayers shall be necessary. Mr. Maxwell moved that this section be amended so as to allow a majority of those voting to bring the act into force. His amendment was ruled out of order on the ground that it affected the revenue of the province.

Mr. Maxwell also moved that in the sixth section the word "may" should be changed to "shall" but the government refused to make the alteration.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley read his recent reply to the N. B. Temperance Federation, in which, among other things, it was stated that the government intended to appoint, during the recess, a commission of three reliable persons to visit Prince Edward Island with the view of looking into the working of the prohibition law there and to make a report thereon for the information of the legislature. The Temperance Federation is asked to name one member of the commission.

An amendment to the school bill was adopted ordering the Board of Education to urge all school trustees to see that the Canadian flag floats from every schoolhouse while school is in session.

The highway and bridge bills were agreed to. Mr. Hazen's amendment to the former providing that road money be spent by the municipalities was lost, 27 to 10.

Fredericton, April 17.—The report of the Privileges Committee on the Restigouche Election case was, for the first time in the province, unanimous. The committee found that the statements of fact contained in the charges made by Mr. Hazen were proved. The secrecy sought to be secured by the Election Act requiring the use of a screen in the polling booth was not maintained. In the Balmoral poll, because of the failure of many electors to avail themselves of the screen provided, and the result was a disregard and violation of the law. The evidence showed that all the persons in the booth had opportunity to determine for what candidates ballots were deposited in the case of those voters who, taking ballots from Mr. Reid, M. P., and proceeding directly to the desk, deposited them openly. The committee was not prepared to say that the result of the election was changed by any proceeding at the poll, or that either the deputy returning officer or Mr. Reid was able to determine for what candidate any elector voted. The committee did not believe that the improper envelope used at Balmoral interfered with the secrecy of the voting when the voters went behind the screen or turned from the desk when placing their ballots in the envelopes. Sheriff Robinson acted in good faith in securing the envelopes used. The deputy returning officer was aware that voters should have gone behind the screen, and his failure to compel them to do so was due to his belief that a strict compliance with the law was not necessary to the validity of the election. The committee recommended, among other things, that a table should be placed behind the screen attaching place.

In consequence of recommendations of the Privileges committee, Premier Pugsley introduced a bill to amend the Elections Act. The amendments included in the bill provide that no deputy returning officer shall receive a ballot until the voter inserts it in an envelope

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behind the screen; that at each poll a screen and table shall be provided by the deputy returning officer; that all envelopes used in an election shall be furnished by the Property, color, and weight and with unguessed flaps. The bill was unopposed.

His Honor, the lieutenant-governor then assented to a large number of bills and formerly prorogued the House. During the session 125 bills were introduced, of which 120 passed.

BLOWN TO ATOMS BY DYNAMITE.

A very shocking accident, with a fatal termination, occurred at the Intercolonial copper mines, about three miles from Dorchester, Wednesday afternoon. The accident was caused by the premature explosion of a stick of dynamite. L. Crossman, a resident of Fairville, the victim of the accident, was working in the slope getting a charge ready for firing, when the fatal explosive was prematurely discharged. The unfortunate man was thrown over 20 feet, horribly mangled, one eye was torn from its socket and the sight of the other eye destroyed, while the face was lacerated beyond description. After lingering in great agony until 8 o'clock he died. He was a widower, his wife having predeceased him about four years ago. He leaves five children, two daughters and three sons.

BORN IN ASYLUM.

At the Provincial Hospital in St. John, a few days ago, a babe was brought into the world under particularly sad circumstances, and much sympathy is left for the unfortunate mother. Mary Staples, who was taken to the Alms House a few days ago, in a delicate state of health, soon developed signs of mental derangement, which reached an alarming stage, and it was deemed unsafe to leave her alone, for fear she might do herself harm. She was removed to the provincial hospital, where last week, she gave birth to a child. The latter was taken to the Alms House, where it is being cared for. It is thought that the mother will recover.

Archibald C. L. Topley, a prominent lumberman, died of heart failure, in St. John, yesterday, aged 78.

MARITIME TECHNICAL SCHOOL.

The three Maritime provinces are talking of jointly establishing a technical school, which if agreed upon, may be built in Sackville.

## EARTHQUAKE DESTROYS TWO MEXICAN CITIES

City of Mexico, April 16.—The National Bank has received a telegram saying that 500 lives were lost in the destruction of Chilpancingo and Chilapa. The telegram adds that both cities were completely destroyed. In governmental circles the report is not credited. Both cities, it is admitted, were badly shaken, but it is not thought that the number of deaths will reach 500.

Chilpancingo, Mexico, April 16.—This city has been completely destroyed by one of the most serious earthquakes that ever visited this section. The known dead number eleven, and injured, twenty-seven. Among the debris is the wife of the postal inspector Leopoldo Lopez Guerra and the child of Postmaster Jose Lopez Martinez. The manager of the Federal telegraph office was injured by being struck on the head by a falling block of stone. Panic prevails everywhere, the people fleeing to the open country. The earth continued to rock at half-hour intervals, and many minor shocks completed the work of destruction. Midway between the two cities of Chilpancingo and Chilapa lies the city of Tixtla. This prosperous progressive community must have been destroyed. According to movement of earthquake, Tixtla would be directly in its line. If it escaped, it is only by miracle.

City of Mexico, April 17.—Death list in recent earthquake reaches fifty, number of injured three hundred. The Mexican Cathedral one of the most celebrated in the world split from top to bottom.

FIFTEEN KILLED IN WRECK.

Montreal, April 17.—The following official report was given out by D. McNicoll, Vice-president of the Canadian Pacific with regard to accident at Chapeau, Ont., yesterday in which fifteen persons are believed to have been burned to death in a wreck and fire which followed the derailment of an express train. "About twenty-two miles west of Chapeau, Ont., yesterday the west bound transcontinental train which left Montreal on Thursday morning was partly derailed, caused by a broken rail.

Five cars ran down an embankment and caught fire, apparently from a cooking range.

Nine adults and six children are missing.
