COAL.—Persons who have resided in the coal district of the Old Country, have frequently remarked in our hearing that the red sandstone abounding in St. Andrews, is a tolerably certain indication of the presence of the precious coal in our immediate vicinity. We have also, the authority of Dr. Gesner for this opinion. Who knows, but that at some future and not very distant period, this useful commodity may be obtained here and shipped from the Port of St. Andrews. Our local advantages as a shipping port are before either Sydney or Victoria. Would it not be worth while to forward a geological description of the land in our neighbourhood, to some one of the numerous scientific societies in Britain, with a view of eliciting information upon this highly important subject? There is no necessity for rigorous expenditure, in search of an *ignis fatuus*, indeed the salutary lesson taught us by the example of Sir Arthur Wardour in the Antiquary, is, to be before our imagination. But knowledge now a days is so easily and cheaply procured that it is worth while to obtain it, even should the possession of it, be not quite as gratifying as we had reason to anticipate.

The Packet Ship *Louis Philippe*, from Havre arrived at New York, on the evening of the 25th ult. bringing dates from France, six days later than by previous arrivals.

By a royal order the 25th ult. M. de Baccourt, resident minister to the duchy of Baden, was named as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States.

A subscription is getting up in Paris for the prisoners of Napoleon's grand army who was taken by the Russians and sent to Siberia. Prince Louis Napoleon takes great interest in the matter, and has contributed 2000 francs. The Russians have met with reverses from the Circassians. They have been defeated at every point. The Queen of Spain has dissolved the Cortes. Don Carlos was suffering greatly on account of pecuniary difficulties. The French Chambers were to meet on the 23d inst.

There appears to be nine plots on the French King's life. A respectable house at Hamburg, it is said, will open a credit for millions of marks here, about \$5,500,000, with the Bank of England.

The evidence taken on the examination of the Newport Chartres prisoners left no doubt of the fact, that a general rising throughout the kingdom was intended and that very great numbers of men were pledged and partially organized to effect it. The Emperor of Russia, during his recent visit to Moscow, laid the last stone of a magnificent church to be created there in commemoration of the configuration of the city, and the deliverance of the place from the French in 1812. The Empress and the Royal family were present.

CANADA.

The following is the Governor General's message to the House of Assembly, thanking them for passing the Union Resolutions.

GENTLEMEN,
It affords me the most sincere satisfaction to find that after a careful deliberation on the proposition, suggested by me for the re-union of this Province with Lower Canada, those propositions have received your consent. I shall take the earliest opportunity of transmitting your resolutions to Her Majesty's Government, with a view to their being laid before the Imperial Parliament.

The generous confidence which you have reposed in Her Majesty's Government and Parliament, respecting the civil list, and the details of the measure of re-union, will be duly appreciated; and it will be the anxious endeavor of Her Majesty's advisers, in all their proceedings upon this important subject, to justify that confidence, and promote the well being of the people of Upper Canada.

For myself, personally, I beg you to accept my thanks for the diligence and attention which you have devoted to the communications which it has been my duty to make to you. It is a full confidence, the union should be productive of the advantages to this province which I anticipate from it, it will be better be my greatest pride to have co-operated with you in that measure.

UNEMPLOYED MECHANICS.—We understand that there is, at this time, an immense number of journeymen mechanics out of employment, and that the great number of applications from their families, at the almshouse, for charitable aid, has induced the corporation to thus early commence the breaking of stone for McAdamizing the new avenues in the spring, by which means employment has been secured to a large number of mechanics, unable to obtain work at their regular avocations.

Fifty thousand barrels of flour have been shipped from Rochester and Oswego this season, to the Canadas. Considerable has also been shipped at Detroit, and Ohio has also sold very large quantities of pork for the same market.

The Charleston Mercury recommends that Georgiana and Virginia should proceed to confiscate the property and shipping of the citizens of Maine and New York, and that they

should enforce a strong non-intercourse with all the slave-stealing states. The same paper refers by observing that "nothing but a base spirit of submission, or a treacherous hatred of State Rights, would induce any man to talk of delay or moderation on a question like this."

St. John, Jan. 8.

A fire broke out on Monday morning about half past 9 o'clock, in the upper part of the house occupied by the Rev. Mr. Andrew, in Prince's street. It originated from a spark having lodged on the roof which ignited. The upper part of the building is much damaged. Had it broke out at night, no doubt the destruction of property would have been considerable, as the adjacent buildings are all of wood, and very close together.—*Com. News.*

The Rev. Mr. Archibald, and Lady, of Chatham, Miramichi, arrived in town on Saturday morning, and sailed in the Bq. Ritchie, for Scotland, on a visit to their friends. Mr. Archibald preached an excellent sermon in St. Andrew's Church on Sunday afternoon.—*Observer.*

The weather still continues very fine and the ground is bare of snow. Our more southern neighbours have had this last requisite in abundance. We understand that on Sunday last considerable snow fell in Nova Scotia: the want of which is severely felt in this Province.—*Gezelle.*

Jamaica.—We have received Jamaica papers of late dates. By the Royal Gazette of the 21st ult., we learn that the deficiency in the staples of the Island has been equal to one third the exports of the former year. The falling off as shown by official returns, has been on the following articles. On Sugar, to the amount of 18,135 hbls, 3070 tierces, and 1510 barrels; on Rum 9826 puncheons, 165 hbls, and 396 casks; on Coffee, 4,857, 974 pounds; and on Ginger, 1542 casks and 1062 bags. These deficiencies, it is stated, have resulted from the want of labor (not laborers) to take off the crops. The seasons have been found favourable and productions abundant.

Montreal, Jan. 4.

We have received a copy of a Bill which has been introduced into the Legislative Council of Upper Canada, for incorporating certain individuals therein mentioned for the purpose of holding certain lands and funds placed at the disposal of the Presbytery of Toronto by benevolent individuals, for the purpose of establishment of an Academic Institution, or College, in connexion with the Church of Scotland. We are happy to find that such satisfactory progress is made in this important matter, and there is now a prospect that the proposed College will be finally established. A public meeting was held at Kingston, on Wednesday last, approving of the Institution; and at which the members pledged themselves, by every means in their power, to forward the views and intentions of the Synod.

Toronto Dec. 30.—The Solicitor General's Resolutions on the Union of the Provinces, were carried last evening in the House of Assembly.—*Patriot.*

There was an important meeting of the Toronto Board of Trade on the 17th inst. for the purpose of considering the propriety of petitioning the legislature to increase the banking capital of the Province, which was entirely inadequate to the wants of the community.

Two females of the name of Eunice Whitney and Roda Morrison, escaped from the Provincial Penitentiary in this vicinity last night. The former was convicted at the

Gore Assizes for horse stealing and was formerly in the employ of the Patriots—used to dress in boy's clothes, carrying despatches, &c. She is about 17 years of age, and is said to be of prepossessing appearance. Morrison is a girl of 16 years of age, belonging to Kingston.—*Kingston Chronicle.*

Examination in Grammar at a fashionable
Seminary for young Ladies.

Secret worth knowing.—How to make three pair of boots last as long as six, and longer.

The following extract from Colonel Macarone's 'Seasonable Hints,' which appeared in the *Mechanic's Magazine*, dated February 8th 1838;—After stating the utility of sheepskin clothing for persons whose employment renders it necessary that they should be much out doors, &c. he says—'I will not conclude without inviting the attention of our readers to a cheap and easy method of preserving their feet from wet, and their boots from wearing. I have had only three pair of boots for the last six years (no shoes,) and I think that I shall not require any others for the next six years to come. The reason is that I treat them in the following manner:—I put a pound of tallow and half a pound of rosin into a pot on the fire: when melted and fixed, I warm the boots, and apply the hot stuff with a painter's brush until neither the sole or upper leather will suck in any more. If it is desired that the boots should immediately take a polish dissolve an ounce of beeswax in an ounce of spirits of turpentine, to which add a teaspoonful of lamp-black. A day or two after the boots have been treated with tallow and rosin, rub over them the wax and turpentine, but not before the fire. Thus the exterior will have a coat of wax alone, and shine like a mirror. Tallow or any other grease, becomes rancid, and rots the stiteling as well as the leather; but the rosin gives it an antiseptic quality which preserves the whole. Boots or shoes should be large as to admit of wearing cork soles. Cork is such a bad conductor of heat, that with it in the boot, the feet are always warm on the coldest stone floor.

The castors on a dinner table, are said by a late London work, to be a kind of medicine chest, containing drugs of great virtues. 1. Salt.—This is decided cathartic in the dose of half an ounce. It is also a vermifuge in large doses. Criminals in Holland were formerly sentenced to live without salt, and became terribly afflicted with worms. 2. Vinegar.—This is refrigerant and diaphoretic, and applied externally is moderately stimulant. If any overdose of soda has been taken or if any other alkali, it is a certain antidote. 3. Mustard.—Mustard emetic is said to be infallible in the cholera; a mustard poultice is almost equal to a blister plaster. 4. Olive Oil.—This, say the dispensaries, is 'demulcent, relaxant, and laxative.' It is an antidote against acrid poisons, and seems to be obnoxious to worms—killing them it is supposed, by stopping up their breathing holes. 5. Pepper.—This relieves

diarrhoea and the relaxed sore throat. Pepperin, the alcoholoid extract from the pepper, has cured the ague in the hands of Dr. Meli and others.

The usual salutation before that period was, 'God keep you! God be with you!' among the vulgar, 'How d'ye do!' with a hearty thump on the shoulder.—*Mirror.*

Effects of Dress on the Ear.—Curtis, in his remarks on the ear, says that the use of warm night caps is a custom certainly injurious to the organ of hearing; and there can be no doubt that deafness arising from cold is very often caused by persons sleeping with the head enveloped in flannel, and in the day time, even in winter going abroad with the ears completely exposed. The insufficient dress also renders them peculiarly liable to catch cold; and hence deafness frequently ensues. In slight cases a little eau de Cologne applied behind the ears, and cleansing them with soap and water, will generally remove the complaint.

A two-headed Snake.—The following very extraordinary statement, we find in the *Levensworth* (1st.) *Arena*, of the 3rd inst. A very singular looking snake was killed on the farm of Mr. James Van Winkle. It was about two feet long, uncommonly large in proportion, with a perfect head on each end of the body. It could crawl both ways, but did not appear to curl, twist and straighten, as snakes are accustomed to do, because its double head afforded an extra advantage over all other snakes. If it wished to go a different direction, it need not turn round, it had only to crawl with the other head forward.

Musical Festival at Florence.—A concert *monstre*, in which six hundred instrumental and vocal performers were engaged, took place lately at Florence to wind up the fetes of St. John. The Grand Duke on this occasion gave the use of the large hall of the Five Hundred in the old Palace. Haydn's Creation is said to have been executed in grand style, after only 3 rehearsals, by proctors and amateurs. Upwards of 4,000 persons were present.
