The latest reports of trade matters in  
Britain do not reveal any brighter aspect.  
Things indeed appear to be getting worse.  
There are more suspensions, more strikes,  
more reductions of wages, and of the hours  
of labour, and more general distress. A  
notice of 10 per cent. reduction in wages  
from the 15th of February has been posted  
in the Tyne ship-building yards. This  
will effect 6,000 workmen. Of the 142  
cotton mills in the Bolton district twenty-  
three are closed, and twenty-eight are  
working on short time. In Liverpool it is  
difficult to get men to land or unload the  
trans-Atlantic steamers on account of the  
dock labourers' strike. Things are reach-  
ing a crisis in which the intervention of  
the Government may be necessary.
