CAMPBELLTON WINS AT CHATHAM

Great Hockey Match Enjoyed By Big Crowds At Chatham.

(Chatham Gazette.) Before a large crowd which filled the College rink the Campbellton team defeated the local boys in one great game of hockey Friday evening. The score at end was 9-4. Incidentally Campbellton accomplished what few teams have ever done when it took a game from Chatham on home ice, considering the class of this year's local team that is saying something. The Campbellton boys turned the trick because they had that essential requisite of a good team—team work. The local boys had a margin on the ice in speed they had the bulk of the territory play but the heavy defence and superb combination of Campbellton overcame them.

From the spectators point of view it was one grand game full of thrills and excitement, with scintillating end to end rushes by the locals and beautiful two and three man combination of the Campbellton boys. As we said before Friday night's game would be a test for the Chatham team. It proved to be a real one. It showed in what departments of the game the locals were deficient and it forcibly pointed out that if Chatham wants to take full advantage of the material at hand it will have to shift around the players somewhat.

The Play. The game started off at breakneck speed, play shifting quickly from end to end. W. Veno got first blood rush for Chatham when with a nice rush he fooled the Campbellton defence and slammed one by Duncan. Shortly afterwards Starrak evened up for Campbellton. Chatham continued to force the play but the sturdy defence of the visitors kept our forwards from scoring. Shortly before the period closed A. Veno secured and with a clear field drove a shot which darted between Duncan's legs and nestled behind the posts. To the chagrin of the Chatham team and the spectators generally the goal judge declared no goal. He had impulsively perked up his handkerchief when he saw the play but through some inexplicable reason put it down much quicker and said no goal, the referee did not see the play so the goal judge decision had to stand. Dozens of spectators among whom were many visitors declared it was a goal but it was no use. Play continued and Chatham was knocked out on one shot from Veno's stick. This caused a slight delay and added to the second period. This was one of the "breaks" of the game and all to the favor of Campbellton.

The Chatham team attacked strongly in the opening minutes of the 2nd period but could not penetrate their opponents. The shot from Veno's beautiful pass from the corner with nobody in front but the goal tender. Campbellton then took the offensive and on one nice combination stroke notched three in a row. McMahon and Troy scored for Chatham and made things exciting. Campbellton however noticed another two goal period ended going them a two goal lead.

Both goalies had been putting up good exhibitions and saved their teams many times.

3rd Period. Chatham came on the ice in this period with the determination to even the score. COLDEST MONTH ON RECORD

January Surpasses All Previous Records for Severe Cold.

The month of January, 1920, now closed, will be remembered as the most frigid January on record, marked by its continuous low thermometer readings, and but few hours of above freezing temperatures. Rainfall, as might be expected from the thermal conditions, was nil, while snowfall during the last half of the month was fairly abundant and accountable for almost the entire precipitation.

NECESSARY LEGISLATION.

The town of Campbellton is asking for more special legislation, and very necessary legislation it is too, but while it is going to the legislature for one thing could we not as well ask for several changes or amendments, whichever are needed and save expense.

The matter of a town manager is a five one. It will need special legislation to authorize the appointment of such an official. While perhaps we have not studied this matter fully, so that we can decide to go ahead with the proposition, yet we could obtain the necessary legislation giving the Town Council power to appoint such a manager and when the time was ripe the necessary power would be available.

Then there is the matter of giving the ladies the right to vote in town affairs. We notice that some towns in Nova Scotia have given the ladies this right and they are taking a deep interest in town affairs. In provincial affairs they have been granted the right to vote, and why, we would like to know, should they be deprived of this right in the town in which they live.

We are sure that we have only to bring this matter to the attention of His Worship the Mayor, when he will take the necessary steps to have this important matter rectified and we can assure him that he would be a hard candidate to defeat if he wished the honor for another term, if he takes this matter up.

CANADIAN EXCHANGE.

Our friends across the border have cut and slashed the Canadian dollar until it hardly knows itself.

Exchange rates on Wednesday had reached 17 1/2 per cent in other words a Canadian dollar is worth only 82 1/2 cents when it crosses the boundary.

The only remedy we see in sight is for the Canadians to adopt the old Conservative slogan of "No truck or trade with the Yankies," so far as the dollar in the United States is concerned.

Let every loyal Canadian purchase nothing across the line which can be bought in Canada and if he can't get it do without goods which can only be purchased in the United States. If this was practiced for three to six months the exchange question would be speedily settled.

CANADIAN INSURANCE IN THE UNITED STATES

While many excellent Canadians when we all wish to be engaged in obtaining Canadian business for American life insurance companies, it is generally considered that the road Canadian money which is sent out of the country in payment of premiums is unfortunately assisting in still further to do without goods which can only be purchased in the United States. If this was practiced for three to six months the exchange question would be speedily settled.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH N. B.

EPIDEMIC INFLUENZA

As this disease has been reported as again epidemic in several cities of the Middle Western States, it is perhaps, probable, that it may again visit this Province.

In that event the following may be of service to the Public:

- (1) The disease is not carried in the open air.
- (2) It passes from person to person in close contact.
- (3) It is principally spread by sneezing and coughing, by the person affected, close to another.

TO AVOID IT.

- (1) Do not travel if possible.
- (2) Do not frequent crowded assemblages.
- (3) Keep clear of persons sneezing or coughing.
- (4) Do not visit neighbors merely for pleasure, and do not give parties or dinners or dances.
- (5) Do not give way to panicky fear of it.
- (6) Do not drink whisky or other intoxicants as a preventive. It is worse than useless.

HOW TO AVOID GIVING IT TO OTHERS

- (1) Always sneeze or cough in a handkerchief.
- (2) Go home at once if feverish or unusually chilly.
- (3) Go to once to bed and remain there till all fever and discharge from nose are gone.
- (4) Keep to one room and see no one except nurse, doctor or clergyman.
- (5) When able to get up and move around remain at home for ten days to two weeks. Pneumonia and death may result in consequence of neglect of this precaution.

First Announcement of Winners Will be Made Next July.

The Lord Beaverbrook scholarships committee announces that the first five annual scholarships, founded by Lord Beaverbrook, will be open for award to candidates who pass the University of New Brunswick matriculation examination to be held in July next.

These scholarships, each of the annual value of \$325 may be awarded for university courses in arts, sciences, applied science, theology, law, medicine, engineering and forestry, and will be tenable in each case for the period of four years at any Canadian university which (except in the case of theology) is not a denominational institution.

While the University of New Brunswick matriculation examination will be adopted as the test of the relative educational merits of the candidates, the committee in making the awards will, in addition to their scholastic attainments, take into consideration the financial position, moral character and industrious habits of the candidates, so that those may be selected who are, viewed from all standpoints, most deserving.

By the terms of the trust, three of the five scholarships must be awarded to students outside the St. John and Fredericton districts.



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DAVID McNAIR WAS PIONEER LUMBERMAN

Associate of the Late John Henry Died on Sunday in Los Angeles.

(Vancouver Province) His many friends and acquaintances in British Columbia will learn with regret of the death in Los Angeles on January 25 of Mr. David McNair, who for many years was engaged in the lumber industry of this province.

The late Mr. McNair was born in New Brunswick and came to British Columbia in the early days and was associated with the late Mr. John Henry in the sawmilling business in Nanaimo. Subsequently they formed the Royal City Planning Mills of New Westminster, having associated with them in the company the late Mr. C. M. Beecher.

The British Columbia Mills Timber and Trading Company of Vancouver was incorporated by the trio in the early nineties, the new company absorbing the properties of the Royal City Planning Mills, and the Hastings Sawmill Company, with the late Mr. R. H. Alexander an associate in the new corporation.

Mr. McNair was identified with the latter company until a few years ago when he disposed of most of his British Columbia interests and made his home in Los Angeles on account of Mrs. McNair's health.

He was one of the first locators of timber in the province and being a very practical man was an authority upon and had a great deal to do with the earlier development of the industry.

The late Mr. McNair married Marian Henry, sister of the late John Henry, and it survived by his wife and three daughters: Mrs. Colin Fernies of London, England; Mrs. B. Landes of Los Angeles, and Miss Ebelyn at home; also two brothers, Mr. Alex McNair of this city, John of Minneapolis and one sister, Mrs. Daniel McMillan of Ottawa.

Commenting on the passing of Mr. McNair, Mr. J. Alexander Hendry, secretary of the British Columbia Mills Timber and Trading Company, paid tribute to him as one of the leading men of his day in this province, and one who with fellow directors played a wonderful part in the earlier development of the lumbering and other industries of British Columbia.

Mr. David McNair was born in Restigouche county and many friends will regret to learn of his death. He was one of our boys who made good in the west, one we have been proud of.


THE PRINCE'S TOUR.
