Unrest in Metal Trades Reported in Toronto

INVOLVES 6000 MEN AND 100 FIRMS (Special to The Record) TORONTO, April 25.—Unless negotiations are opened between the employers in the iron trades in Toronto and Metal Trades Council before May 1, the whole of the metal trades will call a general strike, which will involve over 6000 mechanics and over 100 Toronto employers.

Forty four returned men were the recipients of an address of welcome and five dollar gold pieces at a monthly meeting of the Princess of Wales Chapter, T. O. D. E., held yesterday afternoon.

The dispute includes the pattern-makers, molders, machinists, boiler-makers, metal polishers and kindred trades in the iron industry. The delegates to the council last night decided to abide by the decision of the members in the metal trades to cease work on May 1 if negotiations are not opened by the employers.

Sarnia Housing Plans are Ready

COMMISSIONERS WORK OUT VALUES, RENTS AND LENGTH OF PAYMENT. Sarnia, April 25.—Mayor William T. Nesbitt and M.A. Sanders, two members of the Housing Commission, of which W.D. Giffey is third member, have returned from Toronto, where they interviewed J.A. Ellis, director of the Provincial Housing Commission, and they are now in a position to receive applications for the erection of houses as provided in the by-law passed by the City Council adopting the Ontario Housing Act. The scheme of the Housing Commission embodies two plans by which homes may be acquired first, where a man owns a lot he may have a house erected on it and may pay for same over a period of twenty years; secondly where he does not own a lot the commission will erect a home for him and give him an opportunity of paying for both house and lot.

Returned After a Long Period Overseas

Pte. Ion Voelker has returned after being a long period in France. He arrived on the 6.16 train last evening, where he was met by his parents and the Patriotic Committee. Pte. Voelker was also welcomed in London with the First Division forces, to which unit he was transferred to, from the 118th Battalion. He enlisted in this city with the 118th and went overseas with his brother, Pte. Harold, who was wounded and is now in Toronto, being paralyzed in the legs. Pte. Ion is in the best of condition, having gone through the fight without a scratch. He left today for Toronto, where he will visit his brother, who is in the Hospital. He also stated he was glad to get back to this city and his friends.

Woodstock Gets Busy To Build New Homes

Regarding the new housing commission in Woodstock the Sentinel Review says:—"The local Housing Commission consisting of Chairman Ben Gale R.W. McPherson and Mayor Gahagan met this morning and organized for carrying out the details of the Ontario Housing Act as it applies to Woodstock. John McBeth was appointed secretary of the Commission and will assume the duties of that office on Friday when the new office at 9 Graham street will be open for business.

For guidance of the commission in dealing with all applications for grants under the Housing Act, a form has been drawn up covering all the main conditions to be met by the applicant and all data required by the department relative to the prospective builder, his intentions, etc. These forms will be available at the office of the commission on Friday and all who intend to build according to the provisions of the Housing Plan, are requested to first get one of these forms and have it properly filled out. The secretary will be at the office of the commission, each day, beginning Friday from 9.30 a.m. to 4 o'clock in the afternoon. For the convenience of those who wish to get their plans under way immediately the office will be open from 7.30 to 9.30 on Friday and Saturday evening.

It is most important that all prospective builders become thoroughly acquainted with the conditions of the act and get full information on the complete building scheme before they go ahead with their plans. This will prevent all possible misunderstanding and will greatly facilitate matters both for the individual builder and the commission. Complete data will be available at the office of the commission at all times.

The office will be on hand at the above hours to supply full information and the public is requested to take full advantage of the facilities offered.

AN INGERSOLL REPORT

"The Ingersoll Housing Commission yesterday visited Brantford and Simcoe, looking over houses and lands in the hope of gathering data and information which may be of assistance to them in their summer's work here.

The Commissioners are very much impressed with what they saw and heard. For instance the town of Simcoe during the past seven or eight years, has built several hundreds of houses, ranging in value all the way from \$1,500 to \$12,000 and \$15,000. They saw where ten acres of land had been purchased for building at \$10,000.

The commission also in the course of their trip saw where forty acres of land had been bought in the country for \$40,000 and saw lots forty feet wide and a hundred and five feet in depth which sold five years ago at \$1,000 each. The result of the trip was that the commission returned to Ingersoll pleased, if possible, more than ever with the purchase they made here.

In fact, one real estate man in Brantford when told of the purchase and how closely the land was situated to the front street, asked if any more could be bought at double the price paid for this. 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SALIENT POINTS OF SCHOOL ATTENDANCE ACT

One of our readers, who lives in an industrial town in the North Riding and has been closely following reports on the new School Act, asks, Whether the provincial authorities have taken into consideration the fact that the majority of workmen, who have boys over 14 years of age, are obliged by the high cost of living to send them to work?

This is a practical question from a practical man. When a boy reaches fourteen and there are no continuation classes nor a high school in the community in which he lives, it is better for him that he enter upon some useful employment. This holds good in normal as well as in abnormal times.

The majority of parents in this thrifty riding have been able to make ends meet only by employing all the resources of their households. It accounts in a large measure for their having been able successfully to turn the corner. These would be right in viewing with some misgiving any change which would make a break in the family income, even to the extent of 400 hours for boys and girls of from 14 to 16 and of 320 hours per annum from 16 to 18 years.

Allowing 40 weeks as covering the school year, it would mean 10 hours for those of 14 to 16 and 8 hours per week for those of 16 to 18 years of age. The terms of the Act do not apply to every child: "Where, in the opinion of the school attendance officer, the services of an adolescent between fourteen and sixteen years of age are required in some permitted gainful occupation for the necessary maintenance of such adolescent or some person dependent upon him, he may be granted by an attendance officer, on the written application of his parent or guardian, an employment certificate to engage in such services."

This takes into account the necessities of a family. Whenever it can be shown that its circumstances are such that an adolescent's services are needed to help sustain it, he would be exempt from the terms of the Act.

So far as this particular questioner is concerned, the Act does not apply to any urban municipality of less than 5000 population.

Since the point raised by him is of general concern, it will be of interest to learn that the new Act will not come into force until a proclamation is issued by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. And this will not be done until preparations have been made. These include the building of schools and the training of teachers.

Presumably, the more progressive industrial centers will first make these preparations and probably will follow the lines laid down in the Industrial Education Act, providing courses of study for adolescents engaged in or about to engage in trades or in industrial or manufacturing occupations. To do this will require time. Probably several years. It is conceivable that by the time these occupational schools and courses are ready, those boys and girls, or the majority of them, will have passed their sixteenth or eighteenth year. Seeing that this new school act will in a sense be revolutionary in its effects, it will not be adopted in haste nor any attempt made to swallow it all in one dose.

Were it, however, adopted within twelve months by any forward-looking community, Clause 15 of the Act is worth careful consideration. This reads:

The time spent by an adolescent in attendance at part-time courses of instruction shall be reckoned as a part of the number of hours per day or week that such adolescent may be lawfully employed.

It is probably a fair construction to place on this clause to say that the 10 hours spent by a boy or girl of 14 to 16 and the 8 hours per week of those between 16 and 18, is to be considered as though they were at work for the full week. If so, no deduction in their pay would be made for the time they spent at school.

Employers are just as keen to increase the technical or occupational knowledge of their employes as are the employees or their parents. In fact they are urging the establishment of such schools. Does it not follow that the time which adolescents in their employ were to spend at these schools would be regarded as part of their shop training? That the majority of employers would sum it up as a case where the community will provide the schools, the courses and the teachers and the employer will bear the expense of sending the beginner in industry to these classes?

KEEP UP THE WORK

Hardly is the breath of life kept in any great national effort. Enthusiasm generated by voluntary cause is effervescent. Repatriation, though both a national and an individual problem, is subjected to this rule of life. Yet, the spirit must be kept strong, for the returned man has a paramount claim upon his country.

Eager humanity must be prevented from slow petrification and creatures of flesh and blood must not be treated as machines merely, through the business-like methods of departments. Workers for the cause must preserve their loquacity and refrain from all semblance of formal attitudes. All this though man is rarely constituted to deal out sympathy and helpfulness wholesale.

The need for breadth and living sympathy to the returned man is imperative. It is hard to criticize a disabled soldier making an attempt to get on terms with life again if he is exasperated by the lack of breadth and sympathy.

The gods have been very good to those who by accident stayed at home, and very ill to those who went out to fight. Every citizen who does anything for returned men can at least do it patiently, ungrudgingly and with a real desire to forestall their wants; for, otherwise, he is weighed in the balance and found to be base metal. The spirit in which citizens try to serve those who have truly served them should never change.

It may be that in the hearts of many men injured in the war there burns a feeling that the country they served is grudging them a fair recovery and a decent living. The country is not grudging it to them, but there is so much delay, deferred hope and so many sick hearts, that it may often seem so.

The disabled man may often be impatient and restive. Can it be because of the life he has lived dur-

ing the past four years? So much the more need for patience and sympathy in those who want to help him. Understanding is what he wants more even than he wants larger pensions and better allowances. He wants to feel that those whose duty and pleasure it is to deal with his case realize the nature of that case in terms of human emotion; that to get a training in what he really fancies, instead of what others fancy for him, may mean all the difference between an interesting future and blank drudgery; that to go back under a doctor who has begun his cure and gained his confidence would be half the battle of recovery.

In this machine-ruled world, where everyone strikes an attitude of facts and figures, all the broad humanism that can be got is needed, so that when a returned man comes into an office or an institution he may always feel friendliness about him and know that he will be treated, not in accordance with the letter but with the spirit of the law.

Keep up the work in the proper spirit.

BY THE WAY

Among the men in the public eye, Christian Jans Smuts, of South Africa, has gained foremost rank. A paper presented last December by him had much to do with the decision to form a League of Nations and the lines it should follow.

A city reader who likes an afternoon's sport with a fishing rod, points out, very sensibly we think, that the local authorities should not confine their efforts to stocking private preserves with trout and bass fry but should also stock the Grand river and other streams with bass, pike and pickerel. In support of this he points to the success attending an effort of this kind in the river Nith. It seems worth trying and would please hundreds of local fishermen.

WAIT A MINUTE

FIFTY YEARS OF HAMPTON INSTITUTE

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Hampton Institute, and the semi-centennial is to be celebrated with appropriate ceremonies next month. The plans for the celebration cover the first two days of May, and comprise the dedication of an auditorium erected in memory of Robert C. Ogden, for many years president of the board of trustees, and addresses by Dr. William H. Taft, the present head of the board, Chancellor Kirkland of Vanderbilt University, Isaac Fisher of Fisk University, Rev. Dr. M. Ashby Jones of Atlanta, Dr. R. R. Moton, president of Tuskegee Institute, and others.

The semi-centennial of Hampton Institute is noteworthy. It is the oldest and still one of the foremost industrial schools in America where men and women of the negro, Indian and other dependent races can learn practical trades by which to support themselves, and from which teachers are sent out to all parts to become instructors among their own people. In fifty years the institute has sent out more than ten thousand graduates and undergraduates, to carry the "Hampton spirit" of labor and service into the world, and the carefully kept records show that more than eighty per cent. have kept the faith.

It was Gen. Samuel Chapman Armstrong who at the close of the war between the States conceived the idea of a practical education for the negro and saw his dream come true in Hampton Institute. Gen. Armstrong was born in an environment that made it easy for him to understand the emotional and simple negro race. His father, who was of Scotch-Irish ancestry, went from Pennsylvania as a missionary to the Hawaiian Islands, and was minister of education there for many years. When the call came for troops in the civil war the younger Armstrong left Williams College and joined the Federal army. At the close of the war he was placed in charge of the Freedman's Bureau district that embraced the ten counties about Hampton. Here it was that he realized the desperate need of the freed negroes and the urgent necessity for giving them a practical training so that they might earn their livelihood.

The American Missionary Association came to Gen. Armstrong's aid, having faith in his views. Land was purchased on the shore of Hampton Roads—and the Hampton Institute began. The first man asked to take charge of it declined, and then Gen. Armstrong was asked, and accepted the trust at once. He lived to see the institute grow and prosper and to develop into a strong factor toward the solution of the race problem in the South.

Next to Gen. Armstrong, the genius who founded the school, Hampton owes its deepest debt of gratitude to the late Dr. Hollis Burke Frissell, who became principal of the institute following the death of Gen. Armstrong in 1893 and continued to direct its destinies for nearly a quarter of a century. In the late Robert C. Ogden, millionaire merchant and philanthropist of New York, Hampton also had a friend who gave freely of his means and labored long and faithfully for the development of the institution. Mr. Ogden was closely associated with Gen. Armstrong, the founder, whom he succeeded as president of the board of trustees.

The valuable work accomplished at Hampton during the half century of its existence needs little mention, for its record commands the attention of the world. In the industrial village into which the institute has developed hundreds of negro youth of both sexes are being taught not alone to labor skilfully in field and shop, in home and workshop, but to understand the dignity of labor and the honor of service. All over the South there have sprung up schools, great and small, modeled after Hampton, and directed by Hampton graduates. It was at Hampton that the late Booker T. Washington acquired the training which enabled him to make a wonderful success of the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama.

Hampton, since 1876, has always had a fair proportion of Indian students, and the institute's work for the red man has gone hand in hand with its labors for the negro.

"IN THE DAY'S NEWS"

To-day is the forty-fifth birthday of Signor Guglielmo Marconi, who has accomplished such wonders with his wireless telegraphy. Signor Marconi is half Italian, half Irish, his mother being an Irishwoman. He was born in Italy and was educated at Leghorn, and at the University of Bologna, where he made his first experiments in wireless telegraphy when he was but twenty years old. The success of his system proved rapid. In 1896 he was able to transmit messages across the mouth of the Severn River, and in another three years the first wireless communication was established between England and France. Two years later messages were sent over a distance of 2100 miles, from Cornwall to Newfoundland. Marconi's wireless has long become a commonplace of everyday life, and most of the great shipping companies as well as the navies of the world now use the system.

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

Big Hydro Radial Meet Was Held at Guelph
Federal Government Is Asked To Turn Over Branch Lines

SIR ADAM BECK CONDEMNED INTERFERENCE
 Guelph April 24—All Hydro gung were ranged on Ottawa from the Hydro-radial meeting to the Regent Theater here today. Primarily the 200 representatives of Hydro radial municipalities assembled to ask the Dominion Government to turn over to the people for electrification the branch lines of the G.T.R. and C.N.R. but Sir Adam Beck called to their attention Hon. Dr. Reid's statement in the House concerning Federal development of the St. Lawrence powers for railway purposes, and then he went on in vehement terms to tell both the meeting and the honorable doctor at Ottawa what he thought of such "unwarranted interference" with Provincial rights. After he concluded Mr. Sam Carter, M.P.P., wanted to start a new party The Same Opposition.
 In opening his address Sir Adam said that while the work on Hydro developments had entailed many years' labor on the part of its supporters no one could say that the power enterprise had not been an unqualified success. Hydro-radials, he prophesied, would meet with the same degree of success. "The same opposition," he said, "is still in evidence. It always seems to be present—no matter what effort you make, and no matter in what district the effort is made there is that constant and ever present opposition. It is probably only natural that the interests affected should endeavor to balk the possibility of going on with the Hydro-radial scheme."
 He referred briefly to the recent contest on the floor of the City Council and of Commissioners Harris and Bradshaw said "I am sorry to feel that there are in the employ of the great city of Toronto officials who would dare to recommend the Metropolitan scheme that they did. They addressed Council not as officials, but as the authorities who would carry out the agreement they had prepared. I am not going to question the loyalty of such officials, but I do say if any official on the Hydro-electric Power Commission had undertaken to use the language they did, to use the methods they did, in connection with the assumed obligations of the municipality they serve, they would not remain in the employ of the Commission twenty-four hours if I had any support on that matter. I think it is an iniquitous thing."
 Parting of the Ways.
 "I do not know," he continued, "that we have not reached the parting of the ways so far as Hydro-electric power is concerned in the Province of Ontario. The reason I make this statement is because of the apparent attitude of the Dominion Government." He referred to early efforts to balk the power scheme, and read Dr. Reid's statement on the floor of the House that the Dominion Government was considering developing the St. Lawrence water powers for the steam railroads "I, for one, am alarmed, and have been alarmed," he added "as to what the real attitude of that Government is going to be, not only in regard to the radial railway, but in regard to the Hydro-electric power scheme."
No Reason to Enter Ontario Field.
 "Surely the municipalities have demonstrated that they are capable of handling their own power business. Surely there can be no just reason for the Dominion Government entering the power field of Ontario. Fortunately for the people of this Province we are so firmly established at Niagara that the Government dare not attempt to interfere there, but even then credit might be given to a statement that I heard not more than a year ago, that dependent upon the Toronto Electric Light Company being uncolored upon the people of Toronto, the Government would take over the Electric Development Company."
 From the St. Lawrence waterways he said, more than 2,500,000 horsepower could be developed whereas it would require only 150,000 horsepower to operate all the train roads in Ontario. "Either Hon. Mr. Reid doesn't know what he is talking about or he is talking to a purpose," said Sir Adam.
 "Can you conceive of a more extraordinary statement coming from a Cabinet Minister? They have no right whatsoever to the waters of the stream or the body of the stream."
 "My regret is," continued Sir Adam, "that although our Legislature meets from session to session

who disregarded their interests "I am prepared" he said "to stamp this country from one end to the other on Hydro rights. I am prepared to call a meeting in every riding to defeat those members at Ottawa who will not stand up for the people. I am prepared to drop all economic questions and stick up with the West and the U.F.O. They want public ownership and let the Grits and Tories sink or swim. Ontario and the West can do it."
 Short speeches were made by W.V. Utley of Kitchener and J.P. Jaffray of Galt, both stating that the people of Ontario were behind Sir Adam Beck and wanted the G.T.R. taken over. They moved the following resolution which was unanimously carried.
 "That this meeting strongly petition the Government to co-operate with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario in that the municipalities through the commission, may acquire by lease purchase or otherwise such branch lines of the G.T.R. System and the C.N.R. System as will enable the municipalities to carry out the hydro radial scheme to best advantage throughout the Province of Ontario."
Three Resolutions Adopted.
 There were three resolutions carried. The most important that asking the Government to turn over to the Hydro-radials the branch lines of the G.T.R. and C.N.R. in Ontario, asked "the Government to co-operate with the Hydro-electric Power Commission of Ontario to that the municipalities may acquire by lease purchase, or otherwise" such branch lines as are necessary. Another asked for immediate authority by order in Council for the construction of Hydro-electric railways already approved, involving a \$82,000,000 expenditure. The third endorsed the action of the Hydro-electric Power Commission in opposing the Harris-Bradshaw proposed Toronto-Metropolitan agreement.
Other Speakers.
 Other speakers were: Geo. Wright, Toronto; Ald. O'Heir, Hamilton; ex-Mayor Lemon, Owen Sound; C.P. McGregor, Waterdown; Warden Brown Bruce county; ex-Mayor Clark, Mount Forest; President J.W. Lyon, Guelph; Mayor J.E. Carter, Guelph and Controller Halford, Hamilton.



Many palm trees also are seen along the highways. It was certainly a splendid sight to behold." Mr. C. A. Ahrens said when reviewing a trip to the states of California, Oregon, Washington British Columbia and the other western provinces from which he has returned. He was accompanied by Mrs. Ahrens, and Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Schneider of this city. They were joined by relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Ahrens in Kansas City, and at Los Angeles they joined Mr. and Mrs. L. McBride, sr., who had gone down several months previously and who also returned this week after many months' sojourn in the south. The party in California consisted of nine.

During the tour a wide stretch of country was covered, the mileage being over two thousand miles, all made by auto under the blue canopy of heaven with a smiling sun overhead. They left here on February the thirteenth and arrived in California on the twenty-fifth of that month. When they reached there it rained but soon more favorable and usual kind of weather set in and continued to prevail. Among the places visited in the states were Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland and Seattle. The prevalence of good paved roads makes travelling in autos over this section of the continent an easy and comfortable undertaking. 



Italian Delegates Have Left Paris

PREMIER ORLANDO, ON EVE OF DEPARTURE FROM PARIS FOR ROME, MAKES STATEMENT HIS AIDE SAYS DISPUTED TERRITORY TO BE OCCUPIED.

PARIS, April 24.—Reuter Limited learns that the Italian Government is taking measure to protect the American embassy at Rome, and consulates in all Italian cities in event of demonstrations in that country following the attitude of President Wilson at the peace conference regarding Fiume.

The possibility of ordering all American Y.M.C.A. workers out of Italy is being considered by John R. Mott, of the war work council of the Y.M.C.A. There are about 200 American workers in Italy, assigned to various units of the Italian army and Mr. Mott to-day was somewhat perturbed over the possibility that they might become involved in manifestation on anti-American feeling.

Guard U.S. Embassy.

PARIS, April 24.—Italian military forces will occupy that part of Dalmatia and other Adriatic territory named in the pact of London with about 100,000 men, it was said to-day by Capt. Pozzi, of Premier Orlando's staff. A similar force, the captain added, would be sent to the northern region and around

Fiume. It was stated in Italian quarters to-day that should the break become definite Italy would take steps to approach Germany with a view to making a separate peace.

Orlando To Quit.

Associated Press Cable. PARIS, April 24.—Premier Orlando, of Italy, and Signor Barbilal will leave for home to-night. This decision was announced after Premier Orlando's return from his conference with the other members of the council of four, at which, according to the Italian premier, only questions of principle and not territorial questions, were discussed.

This is explained as meaning that the discussions centered on the question of prestige, involved in the publication of President Wilson's statement, and that no effort was made to reach a settlement on a territorial basis. The conference lasted two hours.

Baron Sonnino, the Italian foreign minister, and the other Italian delegates, and representatives will remain in Paris temporarily.

Keen For Settlement. LONDON, April 24.—An official statement issued by the press bureau says that before his departure for Rome Premier Orlando had another meeting with Premier Lloyd George and Clemenceau and President Wilson. All displayed the strongest desire to reach a satisfactory solution of the problem. The heads of the British and French governments expressed to Premier Orlando the hope that the Italian Parliament would assist in arriving at such a settlement.

Orlando in a statement said: "We do not break with our allies, but hand over our interests to their hands, trusting they will loyally fulfill their mission."

Statement by Orlando. PARIS, April 24.—Premier Orlando, of Italy, issued a lengthy statement to-day replying to President Wilson, in which the premier states in so many words that he is compelled to withdraw from the peace conference after President Wilson's action, which is regarded as a departure from diplomatic customs and leaves the Italians no other course.

An Italian headquarters the announcement was made that the Parliament of Italy would meet immediately upon Premier Orlando's return to Rome.

Premier Orlando's course, it was said, would be to convoke Parliament in special session and secure from that Parliament the passage of a measure providing for the annexation of the Dalmatian and other Eastern Adriatic territory given to Italy by the London agreement, and also of Fiume.

Reports have been received, it was said, that a military demonstration by the Jugo-Slavs at Spalato was contemplated, in which event the Italians would take proper counter-measures.

Demonstration in Rome. ROME, Wednesday, April 23.—An imposing demonstration occurred here yesterday, parades traversing the principal thoroughfares acclaiming Fiume and Dalmatia and cheering for Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino.

The British, French and American embassies and the offices of the Socialist newspaper Avanti were each guarded by 200 soldiers to avoid possible incidents.

Addressing a throng that had gathered, Prince Colonna, the mayor of Rome, asserted that Italy's right to demand the fruits of her victory "would not have to be complicated by hypocritical combinations."

The Rome newspapers are unanimous in declaring that the Italian program, as set forth by its delegation at Paris, represented the minimum demands compatible with the dignity and safety of Italy.

The Italian press as a whole considers that the withdrawal of the Italian delegation from the peace conference is inevitable if Italy's aspirations are not recognized.



SEVERAL AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY OPPOSITION MEMBERS

Ottawa April 22.—This was a railway day in Parliament, the Commons devoting all its time to consideration of the bill for the reorganization of the Canadian National Railway System through the formation of a holding company to cover all public owned roads, including the Grand Trunk, if it should be absorbed. There was considerable objection to the bill from the Opposition. The plain fact is that most of the Opposition members are anti-public ownership, but only Hon. Jacques Bureau was candid enough to state so. Mr. Bureau's statement was important in view of the fact that he holds a front bench position on the Opposition and is one of the leading lieutenants of Leader Mackenzie.

I do not believe in Government ownership or operation" declared Mr. Bureau. "The experience of the United States Government in this line of undertaking should serve to cool the ardor of advocates of public ownership in Canada."

Chief criticism.

The chief criticism from the left of the Speaker was in regard to the Method of the appointment of the director of the roads. The bill provides that they shall be named by the governor-in-council, or in other words, by the Government. The opposition proposed a plan which is without Parliamentary precedent. The scheme which was embodied in an amendment moved by A. R. McMaster Brome, was to the effect that the directors should be selected from a list of not more than 15 to be furnished by the House, this list to be composed of 80 per cent nominated by supporters of the Government and 40 per cent by the Opposition.

The Government secured unexpected support from Hon. W.S. Fielding. Mr. Fielding pointed out that the functions of Parliament were legislative and that Mr. McMaster's resolution was an invasion by Parliament of the functions of the Cabinet which those of the Government were executive. The Government after taking cognizance of all the suggestions made by Parliament as to the best men to fill the positions should make the appointments and take the responsibility for them. The amendment was introduced a principle which could not be found in the statute law of any British Government. The British constitution did not recognize the party system, yet the proposed amendment recognized it by law. The opposition to the amendment developed such strength that finally Mr. McMaster withdrew it.

Amendments defeated.

There were several other amendments but they were all defeated the Government taking the ground that it should take the responsibility and should not have its hands tied by legislation. One amendment proposed by Major Powers asked that one of the directors should be a returned soldier. Ernest Lapoint moved a second amendment that two of the directors should be labor men selected from the employees. Sir Thomas White described the amendment of Mr. Lapoint as unsound in principle as the Government should take the responsibility and should be prepared to appoint directors satisfactory to the country at large. If the country was dissatisfied the Government would have to bear the blame if it was expedient the Government would appoint labor representatives on the board, but it should not be fettered by legislation. They wanted the best possible men. Incidentally during the course of the debate Dr. Reid said the present directors were only temporary, and the whole personnel of the new board would have to be considered. With such an extensive system under their control the selection of the directors was important.




