Hearty Welcome Promised Him by French Press When He Visits Paris.

Rome, April 23.-The correspondent of the Mail and Empire is assured that King Edward will call on the Pope next Wednesday. After taking luncheon with Right Hon. Sir Francis Bertie, the British ambassador to Italy, the King will go from the embassy to the Vatican in the ambassador's carriage. ANTHRACIFE STATISTICS

A Big Falling Off in the Coal Production Due to Strike.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., April 23,—The annual report for 1902 of James E. Roderick, chief of the Pennsylvania State Bureau of Mines, issued yesterday, shows that the total production of an thracite coal last year was 36,911,551 tons. This is a decrease of 22,994,400 tons, compared with the production of 1901, due to the five and a half months' strike. To mine this coal, 300 lives were lost, and 640 men were injured out of a total of 148,141 men employ ed. In 1901 working full time, 513 men were killed and 1,245 injured. The total production of bituminous coal last year was 98,947,170 tons, an increase over the previous year of 18,-032,934 tons, which was principally due to the great demand for fuel during the anthracite strike. The total number of days worked were 220 2-3, as against 2164 days in 1901. The report also shows total number of employes in the soft coal regions, 153,-456, increase 155; injured 861, increase 202. There were 14,741,091 tons of coke produced in the state last year.

Municipalities and Niagara Power thread of public business, which was broken off suddenly by the Gamey In the brief sitting on Tuesday the Government brought down two important bills. One embodied the amendments to the assessment act which were recommended by the Ontario Assessment Commission, and have been fully described in these columns. The other confers power on the municipalities to develop, distribute and sell Niagara electrical power. They are authorized to appoint commissioners, at their own expense, to report on the feasibility of the scheme. If they choose to go into it they may issue debentures, the assent of the ratepayers having been first obtained. A board of commissioners is to be appointed by the Chief Justice of Ontario to construct and operate the works. If there is more power developed than is needed by the municipalities or corporations concerned, they must offer it for sale to municipalities and individuals along the line at rates to be fixed by the Chief Justice of Ontario. If any dispute arises as to rates, the Chief Justice of Ontario is to determine them. The usual penalty clauses are included in case of failure to conform with the regulations of the act regarding sale and rates. A trust company is to be appointed to keep the accounts of the works. The moneys are to be paid in and out by the trust company at the order of the commissioners. The commissioners are given power to issue bonds up to the amount of the proceeds of the municipal debentures. They may make a special issue of bonds for preliminary expenses until moneys are re-

works. This is probably the most liberal measure of encouragement that can be given the municipalities, short of Government ownership or financial responsibility. The expense of a commission of experts to report on the cost and practicability of the enterprise would not be heavy, spread over a number of municipalites. 




