TWO VESSELS SINK.

Terrible Disaster Off the New Jersey Coast.

A Steamer and a Schooner Collide and Go to the Bottom.

the Disaster Told by a Survivor.

New York, Nov. 1 .- Six miles off Barnregat, on the Jersey coast, at 8:30 o'clock Thursday evening, was the steamship Vizcaya on her way to Havana. Near by was an unknown and probably unseen schooner. The night was clear, the moon shining brightly, the sea smooth. Seven minutes later both versely were to the terminate of the search minutes later both vessels were at the bot-tom of the sea, and with them sank 74 of their passengers and crews. In those seven minutes a collision and a death struggle with the waves had taken place.

All the passengers low.

All the passengers on the Vizcaya were lost. Their names are: Senor Juan Pedro, a partner of the firm of J. M. Cobaltos & Co., of this city, and one of the owners of the lost steamer; M. R. Calvo, wife and son, M. Furr and two children, Mr. A.

son, M. Furr and two children, Mr. A. Ruise, Jose Acabla, Rimora Alvarez, Juan F. Hedman, Oscar Islaur, Luigi Pellion and Jose M. Garcia. The chief officer, second officer, surgeon, one engineer and eight of the crew were picked up.

PATE OF THE SCHOONER'S CREW UNKNOWN.
The fate of the captain and crew of the schoonor is not known. The persons rescued state that, on the evening of Oct. 30 at 8 o'clock, the steamer was run into by a four-masted, coal-loaded schooner bound to the northward

seven from the Vizcaya were picked up by the schooner Sarah L. Davis, and were transferred to the Hercules. The tug Rattler, which has been at the scene of the wreck, picked up the body of a woman supposed to have been the stewardess of the steamer. The survivors report nearly 100 people were clinging to the wreck at one time. The schooner Hargrave, Capt. Allen, cleared from this port Ont. 27 with a cargo of coal for Fall River, Mass.

ONE OF THE SHIPWINECKED MEN.

New York, Nov. 1.—Late last night one of the shipwrecked crew of the lost steamer Vizcaya was seen on board the steamer Ciudad Condal, another vessel belonging to Cebalos & Co., lying at pier 21. North River. He repeated the story told by Dr. Rice, adding that at the time of the collision nearly all of the Vizcaya's crew were asleep, being worn out with the hard work attendant upon leaving port. Only those on duty were up and about. He said that before the lashing of the boats could be taken off preparatory to lowering them the Vizcaya's decks were under water. He saw several persons in the water clinging to floating debris, spars, latches and wreckage after he was on the yard, but all these soon sank. At the office of the Company but little information could be obtained. It was stated that Senor Colvo, who perished with his wife and son, was a partner in the house of Franche & Co., of Havana, the biggest and richest sugar house in Cuba. He was on his way home with his family.

FAIRLY TRIED AND JUSTLY CON-DEMNED.

It would perhaps be unjust to say that here is a desire to make a hero of the un fortunate man Birchall, and yet the course pursued with reference to him in some quarters is calculated to make a kind of hero of him. There is a measure of mystery less a great change takes place in public in his case, as there always must be where in his case, as there always must be where the evidence which leads to conviction is mystery there is almost of necessity a measure of sympathy.

The convicted man is no ordinary criminal. Had he been born and reared working classes of his native land; had he received the education of a farmer, a laborer, or a tradesman's son; ominous, and the Republicans had he been given no opportunities to the best use of it in the conflict. mingle in society and learn the ways of the world; and had he with the training and opportunities of his class taken a fellowman's life under the precise circumstances in which the life of Benwell was taken, who would have felt a curiosity in the matter? who would care to know what he thought or said or wrote con-cerning himself or his crime? But it is not so with Birchall. Everything that he says writes is given to the public. His own theories of the murder, his suspicions other men, every imagination of his mind, whether spoken or written, is faithfully recorded in the public journals, and read with as much avidity as the report of the trial itself. And apparently Birchall is vain enough to gratify the public curiosity respecting himself. Apparently, too, he not despair of producing on the public mind an effect favorable to the view of his ce, or at all events an impression of doubt as to his guilt. The story of his life which he has written, the manuscript of which was disposed of a few days ago to the highest bidder, may be assumed to be written for the main purpose of elevating the condemned man into the rank of a hero, as well as of throwing doubt upon the fairness of his trial and the justice of his sentence What he has told in this story we do not of course pretend to know, but if an opinion may be formed from what he has already given to the public since his trial there can be little doubt that he wishes to have the



Talk with Mr. Thomas Ballan tyne, M. P. P.

His Experience in England-He Advoeates Dairy Schools—Superiority of Western Cheese.

An Advertiser reporter met Mr. Thomas Ballantyne, M.P.P. for South Perth, in the Tecumseh House reading-room this morning, and the conversation turned on dairy matters. Mr. Ballantyne said he had suggested a meeting at the London cheese market, immediately on his return from England, to consider the question of establishing dairies—if in some way and at some place dairy schools could not be established by which they might further improve the quality of the product in this country.

On seeing in all the markets of England "On seeing in all the markets of England the summer goods which were then arriving." he said, "and comparing the price and quality with the best English and Scotch cheddars, I am strongly of the opinion that greater uniformity and cutside improvement might be accomplished by means of these agencies, which could be kept in operation the whole year round, experimenting and teaching the principles and practices of cheesemaking in summer, and butter dairying in winter, and to teach makers more effectually how to use the improved instruments; also to teach them the testing of milk more thoroughly as at present a small percentage could do nothing

"We hope the representative dairymen will take hold of it in a vigorous and energetic manner, and we have no doubt that the Government will render whatever assistance might be necessary. The dairy schools should be under the control of the Agricultural Department. ose, "Instead of a small percentage of the

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



Bulletin No. 25 of the Wisconsin Agricultural Experiment Station gives the details of experiments in feeding hard wood ashes and bone meal to hoga living on corn. The plan of the experiment was to feed corn to several lots of growing pigs in addition to water and sait. The first lot received nothing additional; the second was fed a little ground bone daily; while the third lot was allowed free access to a trough of hard wood ashes. The experiment was repeated twice, so that three trials are reported. Prof. Henry gives the following conclusions as drawn from the work:

1. That the effect of the bone meal and ashes was to save about 130 pounds of corn, or 25 per cent. of the total amount fed in producing 100 pounds of gain, live weight.

2. That by feeding the bone meal we doubled the strength of the thigh bones; ashes nearly doubled the strength of the bones.

3. There was about 50 per cent, more ash

d hard wood ashes than in the others. No difference was found in the proportion of fat to lean meat in the body. The benefits of the ashes, therefore, seemed limited to strengthening the bones and aiding disciplinary. These, however, are very impor-

Advantages of Drainage.

We drain to let water into the soil, as much as to take it out—i. e., to make the fertilizing rain filter through the soil. Draining makes the soil more porons, drier, looser and more frisile; it raises the temperature of the soil; a greater variety of crops can be grown; it gives an earlier seed time and harvest, and it makes manure more effectual. On a porous soil the action of the drains will extend to a considerable distance if the depth is made proportionate, while on clay soil percolation is greatly hindered, and the beneficial effect extends to a less distance from the drain. 


