British Parliament-The Budget.

London, April 24.—Sir William Vernon Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, intreduced the budget for the coming traduced the budget for the coming financial year in the House of Commons to day. The Chancellor estimated the expenditure for the current financial year at £91,464,000 and the revenue at £89,890,000, leaving a deficit of £1,574,000 due in part to a slight expected decrease of the revenue, but chiefly to the vast growth of expenditures not created by the Government, but through the Government would not propose to cover the deficit by encreaching upon the sinking fund devoted to the reduction of the national debt! He preferred to meet the deficit by the straightforward way of increased taxation. They had therefore resorted to the income tax, which it was proposed to increase by a

straightforward way of increase transcriber that therefore resorted to the income tax, which it was proposed to increase by a penny in the pound, which ought to add £1,750,000 to the revenue.

The Right Hon. G. J. Goschen, who was Chancellor of the Exchequer under Lord Salisbury's administration, said that he would refrain from criticising the budget, but he condoled with the Chancellor of the Exchequer in having to meet rising expenditures with falling revenue.

The Right Hon. Sir John Lubbock (Liberal-Unionist) said that he approved meeting the deficit by direct taxation. Other comments were made, generally favorable to the budget.

A LIFE-SAVING KITE

Tested in a Rhode Island Harbor with

Gratitying Recults.

Newport, R. I., April 24.—Prof. Davis' life-saving kite was successfully floated from Brenton's Reef lightship to the shore, a distance of a mile and a half, with a line attached, in a 25-mile breeze, this afternoon. One mile of life line was run out in about 41 minutes. Two kites were used, one attached to a float at the lead end of the line, and the other half a mile back of that. The breeze was much lighter than would occur in actual service, and it is claimed the heavier the wind, even at hurricane velocity, the better the kites will work.

THE LEVY FOR TAXES.

Ald. J. W. Jones took firm ground at a recent meeting of the London City Council, when he explained one reason for the high tax rate to lie in the fact that many persons who build houses have to pay taxes to improve the vacant lots of their neighbors.

There is a great truth underlying this

statement. Men hold vacant lots at a nominal assessment, streets are built past them, water service is supplied for them, miles of streets are opened up for their service that would never be surveyed if it were not believed that the owners meant to put houses apon them in a reasonable time. In this way the general tax rate is increased beyond the necesof the community, mainly to penefit the owners of vacant property, and if a new comer arrives and puts up a structure he, too, adds to the value that the citizens generally have created, while the ot holder waits his opportunity to collect

the enhanced price. It is true that in some instances there is vestment, taxes and interest.

But the fact remains that the present method of levying the assessment affords throw greatly to the expense of managing the highways and water supply.

In Ottawa, which is far more compactly

built than London, a strong agitation has been set on foot to counteract the present system of discriminating in favor of vacant lot holders. The Board of Trade has, by a large majority, indorsed Tax Commissioner Pratt's proposition favoring a tax on the land as the sole basis of taxation for municipal purposes. As the question has been shoroughly discussed on its merits at the capital, it is to be hoped that the Ottawa authorities will give the country an object lesson of a simple, fair and easily-collected municipal tax that will have for its chief object the discouragement of vacant lot holding and a consequent great improve ment in the financial management of civic affairs.

PROHIBITION.

The question of whether or not it is ad visable to have a plebiscite on the liquor question will be debated in the Legislature, in accordance with the many peti tions sent in from representative bodies in the Province.

Though we in London have taken a vote on the question of license reduction, and found it to work most satisfactorily, nevertheless the legislators must be conversant with the fact that there are no legal means now provided for adopting the pleliscite, and if the London City Council had refused to grant the popular vote on the question it would have been strictly within its rights. Mr. Davis, a strong temperance advocate, has very properly brought in bill recognizing and establishing the plebiscite for the purpose of ascertaining the voice of the electorate on this important

That action leading up to further legislation in the direction of prohibition is called for, few will doubt. But as the correspondence elicited by the ADVERTISER recently has demonstrated, there are differences of opinion upon the best means of attaining the end. Some would like to establish masterly inactivity for the time being, owing to the fact that the local option law, providing for prohibition by municipalities, is now the subject of litigation in the Supreme Court of Canada. Others would like to see Mr. Marter's bill pass, though even if its provisions to stop the sale of liquor by retail were made law, and were effective, it would still come far short of being a complete measure of prohibition. The plebiscite, however, would give the Legislature, or the House of Commons, if the Legislature is found not to have the power, a man-date that could not fail to influence public men in the right direction. At present they are able to say that the country, the Province, is not ripe for prohibition, and that they have no means of proving the sentiment of the electorate. THE SILVER CRISIS.

Why United States Money is Nov in Disfavor in Canada.

A Futile Attempt to Keep Too Much Silver Currency in Circulation.

"It is quite evident from the latest developments that President Cleveland's Government have great difficulties to contend with owing to ill-advised financial legislation—difficulties that will, unless grappled with in a broad and statesmanlike manner, based on the soundest business principles, prove to be as disastrous to the well-being of the nation as the McKinley tarifi.

*In 1878 the Bland Bill committed the Government to the coinage of \$2,000,000 a month, and in 1890 Senator Sherman carried through Congress, by the aid of the silver mine owners, a bill that compels the Government to buy more than double this amount per month. The sole object the ugne owners had was to obtain a market for their product, which they did at the nation's expense, while the treasury undertook the hopeless task of maintaining an artificial ratio between gold and silver in utter defiance of the most elementary rules of political economy. Since the Secretary of the Treasury began to buy the silver the price of it has been steadily going down from 94 cents to 65 cents on the standard silver dollar.

"It has been the policy of the Government at Washington to hold in the treasury vaults a 'sacred reserve' of \$100,000,000 for the express purpose of redeeming the greenbacks, and the former Cleveland Ministry's financial policy appears to have been sounder than the Harrison administration's, for they probably saw danger looming up in the distance and maintained an additional rest of \$100,000,000, but their successors in the Cabinet under Harrison soon managed to remove the extra reserve. On Jan. 31, 1889, the net gold in the treasury was \$194,000,000, while on Jan. 31, 1889, it had failen to \$108,000,000, and last Saturday was reduced to only \$700,000 above the 'sacred reserve."

"The people are beginning to realize what their legislators ought to have foreseen before, that if Sherman's law is not repealed Secretary Carlisle will, in order to keep gold in the treasury, soon be compelled to redeem the certificates now issued to the silver men in silver coin, instead of gold as at present, but this would be a breach of the law, and also would be breaking faith with the mine owners.

"To stave off the evil day temporarily the Secretary has just issued a circular to the bankers, and appealed to their patriotism to help him at this cris "In 1878 the Bland Bill committed the

ism to help him at this crisis. Patriotism sounds well, but it is a poor commodity in commercial transactions, being perhaps worse than an inflated value of silver, and the bankers appear to have driven a hard bargain, for though they have agreed to let him have \$4,000,000 in gold, yet he refuses to take the public into his confidence by declining to make known the terms.

"At present gold is worth in the markets of the world 25 times as much as silver, weight for weight, but on the artificial basis adopted by the Washington treasury it is only worth sixteen times as much. Thus the silver mine owners tax the people over 50 per cent. for their products.

"If the silver mines of Nevada and other States were to increase their output, while the gold mines of the Transvaal and Australia were to diminish,—no improbable asssumption—the discrepancy between gold and silver would become still wider, and if the American system of bolstering up silver wore followed, it would inevitably lead to commercial panic and disaster.

"It will thus be seen how grave the situation is, and although different remedies have been at various times suggested, we are firmly convinced that if the Americans wish to place their monetary matters on a sound financial basis and restore confidence in the market there is only one course open, and that is to a once repeal the obnoxious

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
