Date For Annual Voting.

Only 43 Per Cent of Voters Now Exercise Franchise. Says Sam Baker.

City Clerk Samuel Baker favors, the suggestion of the W. C. T. U. to change the date of the municipal elections, and while agreeing with Controller J. P Moore in the latter's desire to have the elections prior to the end of the year, thinks that they should be held the first week in December rather than two or three months before the close of the

Many Out of Town. "The fact that about only 43 per cent of the ratepayers exercise their franchises at the civic contests is not due te indifference alone," said Mr. Baker this morning, "but also to the reason that many citizens are out of town on New Year's Day, and hundreds of others are entertaining friends and find it hard to get to the polls on this account. Consequently, unless there is a project of abserbing interest they do not vote. Few Travellers Vote.

"The commercial travellers succeeded in having the elections held on New Year's Day, but my count in 1912 showed that only between five and six per cent of them voted. There is no doubt but that it is very difficult for the women voters to go to the polls on the holiday, owing to the extra household duties devolving upon them on such a

No Opportus for Raliroading.
"We should east only have the elec-tions before the end of the year, but st take into consideration the effect they might have on the sitting council if held, say two or three months before the end of the term. Certain aldermer after knowing that they were not to sit at the board the following year might become absolutely indifferent or too venuresome. By having the elections the first week in December, only one regu lar meeting of the council would be held before the end of the year, and it would be impossible to railroad through an undesirable legislation, as notice of motion would have to be given at that meeting and there would be no other meeting at which to press the matter. Meet and Discuss the Situation.

NOW UP TO THE PRODUCER

Four Million Dollars Lost in a Year Through Stale Produce.

To educate the producers to the necessity of providing an absolutely ingham Palace next week has been sent fresh article, by putting the loss for all stale eggs on the first seller, is the plan of the Canadian Produce Association, reaffirmed by the Western Ontario members at a big gathering in London yesterday.

The idea, as explained to The Advertiser by A. E. Silverwood, of Silverwoods, Limited, London, is to work the egg business on the loss-off basis, that is to pay for no bad eggs. Buyers Paid the Piper. "The buyers for many years have been in the habit of purchasing eggs," said Mr. Silverwood, "and taking the producers' word for it that the same were fresh and in good condition. In many cases they suffered heavy losses as a result of this plan. In a case, for instance, one might find five dozen eggs that were spotted or otherwise unfit for the best class of trade. The

"I might send a buyer out into the country, and he would approach a Victoria storekeeper and ask him if he had any eggs for sale. SEALER SOUTHERN CROSS SINKS OFF CAPE RACE WITH A TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIVES

DURING DECEMBER S. S. NEWFOUNDLAND AND MANY OF HER CREW LOST

LATEST DISPATCHES. [Canadian Press.]

St. Johns, Nfld., April 2 .- The sealing steamer Newfoundland SOLICITOR IS AT WORK NEW YEAR'S UNSUITABLE has been crushed in the ice just south of Belle Isle Strait, and the great part of her erew of 150 men are believed to have perished.

Steamers in the vicinity picked up several bodies, and a few of the crew who had survived on the ice floes, to which they escaped when their vessel went down.

Fifty of the crew have been accounted for in this manner. Most of them were dead when discovered, and several others were

ANXIETY FOR SOUTHERN CROSS.

Great alarm is also felt for the sealing steamer Southern Cross. which is also believed to have been caught in the ice. The first reports here said that it was a part of the crew of the Southern Cross that had been picked up, and that they were being brought into port by the Newfoundland. There are 173 men on board the Southern Cross. She wasd ue here Tuesday.

A BAD STORM.

The storm that has raged over Newfoundland for three days continued unabated today, and the telegraph service to points along the coast has suffered.

The captain of the Newfoundland was Wesley Kean. Meagre reports relayed from one vessel to another by wireless, and more or less confused, state that of the crew of the Newfoundland, 120 were right on the ice floes this morning. It is thought possible that some of the bodies picked up on the ice were those of members of the crew of the Southern Cross. One report says that the men who left the Newfoundland were scattered by the moving ice fields in different directions, radiating from the wreck like the spokes of a wheel. The wind was blowing a gale off shore, and there was a blinding snow storm in which the crew would be unable to find their way in any direction. They had little food when they left the ship, and no extra clothing. Without tents or other shelter many succumbed to hunger and exposure. It is feared here that very few will survive. The movement toward a peaceful setdement of the home rule controversy on the basis of a scheme of federalism for the British Isles, as suggested by Sir Edward Grey, in his speech in the House of Commons on Tuesday, continues to receive a good deal of attention in parlianentary circles.

Sir Edward Carson, who will reopen the nome rule debate on Monday, may be trusted to state the Ulster attitude toward the federal solution. Very Few of Crew of 170 - Thought to Have Escaped Alive.

NEWFOUNDLAND BRINGS SOME IN

Most of These Were Dead or Dying When Taken on Board.

ICE FLOES CRUSH

Disaster Came Suddenly and Men Had Only Time to Slide Over Ship's Sides Onto the Ice.

[Canadian Press.]

St. Johns, Nfld., April 2. -Stories were brought to port today of the loss of the sealing steamer Southern Cross and her crew of 170 men. The exact loss of life is not known, but it is believed that practically the whole crew perished after the Southern Cross had been crushed and sunk in the ice off Cape Race.

The Newfoundland picked up fifty of the crew, the greater number already dead, and others dying, from the tossing ice floes to which they escaped when their craft went down. Those who survived were able in their weakened condition to tell but little of the wreck and the probable fate of their fellows. Ships were at once dispatched in the hope of finding other survivors, or recovering more bodies.

Awful Suffering.

The sufferings of those found ov the Newfoundland beggars description. For 48 hours they were adrift on ice floes, while a furious blizzard swept over them. The Southern Cross had completed an unusually large catch in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Her holds were filled with seal skins, and her dinary course would not be in attendance decks were piled high with trophies of the cruise.

An Increased Crew.

The steamer also carried a crew greater by one-third than she had signed for her former trips, as sealing was reported to be unusually good and a large bonus had been offered by the owners. This unusual load added to her difficulty when she encountered the storm and ice.

The Southern Cross was reported off the southern coast on Sunday, and ought to have reached here last Tuesday. As far as can be learned she was rounding Cape Race when she ran into an immense field of drift ice from greater volume of opinion in favor of a the Labrador coast, and about the same time a blizzard enveloped the ship, cutting off observation. Not long after, the sealer caught between two ice floes, which crushed her plates like cardboards. The crew had just time slippery ice cakes when the steamer disappeared.

An amendment was moved by the Government expressing satisfaction with the proofs given in the last census that the decline in population had ceased, and in the general improvement in farm conditions the improvement in farm conditions ditions, the increase in area under cultivation, the number of live stock and in farm values, also with the efforts put forward by the department to secure an adequate supply of farm labor, and making rural life more attractive. Col. Mayberry put in a strong plea for an agricultural survey of the province that would inquire into every branch of the industry. The pressing necessity of good roads was also put forward by Mr. Mayberry.

Hon. Mr. Duff's lengthy oration contained paeans of praise regarding what the Government had done to benefit agriculture. He attributed the decline in rural population to the bringing in of machinery and the development of industrial life, which had gone on by leaps and bounds. "Rural Ontario," said Mr. Duff, "has made heavy contributions to up-building the cities and western provinces. Rural Ontario has lost; Canada as a whole has gained." There was really no need for such a commission in consideration of the work that was being done.







THE CLAUSE HE WOULDN'T DODGE. ANY persons have asked during the discussion on Panama canal tolls wherein the proposal to exempt American vessels from the payment of tolls conflicted with the treaty made by the United States with Great Britain.

The provision in the Hay-Pauncefote treaty which refers to Panama canal traffic put the thing clearly enough. It

"The canal shall be free and open to the vessels of commerce and of war of all nations observing these rules ON TERMS OF ENTIRE EQUALITY, so that there shall be no discrimination against any such nation or its citizens or subjects in respect of the conditions or charges of traffic or otherwise. Such conditions and charges of traffic shall be just and equitable.'

It was upon this clause that President Woodrow Wilson based his conception of national honor at the risk of wrecking his party. When such lieutenants as Clark and Underwood bitterly assailed the proposal, the bravery and keen sense of fair play of the President looms large in his nation's history.

Both Lord Pauncefote, who represented Great Britain, and John Hay, who represented the United States in the making of the treaty, are dead. But Joseph Choate, former American ambassador to England, who participated in the treaty negotiations, is still living, and when he was asked to place his interpretation upon this clause of the treaty, he referred graciously to the deaths of the framers of the agreement

"As the lips of both these diplematists and great patriots, who were true to their own countries and each regardful of the rights of the other, are sealed in death, I think that it is proper that I should say what I think both of them if they were here teday would say-that the clause in the Panama toll act exempting coastwise American shipping from the payment of tolls is in direct violation of the treaty.

'I venture to say that in the whole course of the negotiations of this particular treaty, no claim, ne sugestion was made that there should be any exemption of anybody."

"RUBE" WADDELL CROSSES GREAT DIVIDE

Baseball's Queerest Character and Greatest Pitcher Dies.

BEEN ILL FOR MONTHS

Succumbs to Tuberculosis as Result of His Inability to Keep in Condition

San Antonio, Texas, April 1.—Rube Waddell, the famous left hand pitcher, died here today. He had been ill for months with tuberculosis.

George Edwards Waddell, one of the greatest of pitchers, was noted nearly as much for his eccentricities as for capabilities as a hall player. In the geometry bilities as a ball player. In the seventeen years he spent in professional baseball, he held positions with twelve teams. including "return engagements," had fourteen jobs. His longest term of service was with the Philadelphia Americans where, under the watchful eye of Connie Mack, he pitched winning ball for a half

Great When In Form. Waddell's inability to keep in condition discouraged most other managers and was indirectly responsible for his con-tracting tuberculosis, which caused his death. There was no better pitcher than he when he was in form, but managers and club owners were aware of his powerlessness to resist temptation. As a result of his weakness, the largest salary he ever received was \$3,000 a year, from the Athletics.

Held Strike-Out Record. Waddell shared with Robert Glade the strike-out record of the American League. On July 29, 1908, while pitching for the St. Louis Americans, to whom he had just been released by Mack, he fanned six-teen of the Athletics, his former team

The Minneapolis Club bought Waddell in 1909 and he was two years with that club. Illness began to get the better of him and last spring he was sent to Texas in an effort to prolong his life. Waddell was born in Butler, Pa., October 13, 1876.

School Trustees Will Require Trades and Labor Council Wil Big Sum to Meet Expenses of Present Year.

The board of education will ask the and London Art and Industrial School this year. This was the amount of the estimates passed upon by the trustees yesterday. The sum of \$229,194.11 is for public school purposes, \$41,477.61 for the Collegiate Institute and \$8,430.45 for the ndustrial school.

The whole proposed expenditure shows an increase over last year of approximately \$29,000 which is made up largely of interest and sinking fund on debentures, and salaries of extra teach-\$11,000. The increases to various classes of instructors also do their share toward swelling the extra expenditure. Overdraft of \$3,859.92.

The items of public school expenditure nclude a net overdraft of \$3,859.92, \$159,-515 for salaries of teachers and officers, \$2,500 for substitute teachers, \$1,950 for the Normal training school, \$12,000 for janitors' salaries. The estimated reeipts, including seven distinct Government grants, and \$300 from non-resident pupils amount to \$12,755. In the estimate, \$33,189.92 is allowed for sinking fund and interest.

The big expense at the Collegiate \$1,100 for fuel, \$1,000 for examinations for and \$2,100 for janitors' expenses. Receipts are estimated at \$15,814.37, including \$1,400 for non-resident fees, \$3,400 for resident fees, \$1,900 in Government grants and \$5,300 from the County of Middlesex, \$2,841.98 is allowed for sinking fund and interest.

Art School Estimates Lower. The art and industrial school mates are, strange to say, lower to the extent of \$140,45 than last year. This year, the estimate is \$8,431.45, whereas the figure in 1913 was \$8,571.90.

The estimates, which have been thoroughly considered by the committees, were passed with but little comment. This year the board will also spend \$171,-000 in new schools.

No more fitting tribute could possibly be paid to the gal-lant little band of Britishers, the story of whose glorious achievement and tragic end thrilled an audience which completely

Told in the language of Commander Evans, in terse, simple phrases, without any unnecessary comment, the story was an epic such as the world seldom hears.

Splendid Views.
Added to this there were the pictures. Added to this there were the pictures. It is perfectly safe to say that nothing even approaching them in interest have been seen in this city. Many of them were taken by Dr. E. A. Wilson, the personal friend of Captain Scott, who was one of the five to perish with him. They formed a complete record of the expediformed a complete record of the expedi-tion from the time it left London in 1916 until the fatal return journey from the pole was begun. The pictures were a story in themselves—a story without words—and the audience accorded enthusiastic applause to many of the slides shown. A journey which took the mem-bers of the expedition three years to complete amidst almost unbelievable hard-ships the pictures made possible for a London audience to take in two hours, seated comfortably in a theatre.

"These Were Men." Commander Evans is a lecturer par excellence. Athletic and clean-cut in appearance, his style of narrative is conincing to the last degree, and he held the interest of his audience right through. A subtle vein of humor running all through his remarks relieved to a large extent the intensity of the story which was his to tell. To attempt to re-tell in any but his own words, would be but to mar it. The narration of the conduct of the sixty members of the expedition during the trying three years in which they were absent from civilization awakened in the minds of those who heard it, the thought: "These were

Not once was there the semblance of a quarrel, the members each working for the good of all the other members of the expedition. In the greatest good humor they went about their labors, beguiling the long stormy nights with songs and stories of home, and reading at times from Dickens' "David Copperfield" and 'Pickwick Papers."
