Belgian Soldier of 18th Finds **Relatives In Pictured Group** of Refugees.

FLEEING FROM GERMANS

With Belongings Packed On a Little Cart, His Family Was **Hurrying To Shelter** 

Recruit Breaks Down and Cries At Animated Story of Devastation.

Joseph De Nolf and A. Wilssens, Beigian soldiers, who enlisted in the Eighteenth Battalion, and are now in camp here anxiously awaiting an opportunity "to get a crack at the Germans," went to the Majestic Theatre and saw in an animated weekly film the scenes around Termonde, De Nolf's old home. Hardly had the shock of seeing the old familiar landmarks of his boyhood devastated now by the German invasion been brought home to De Nolf before he recognized in the pictures his mother and little brothers and sisters, with all their belongings, huddled on a little cart and fleeing before the Germans. Breaks Down Completely.

De Nolf was so upset by the sudden ealism of conditions in his own country that he broke down and cried. He en-listed in the battery at first, but has since been transferred to the machinegun section, so he could work more de struction on the enemy of his native Eleven Belgians in Eighteenth.

All together there are eleven Belgians the Eighteenth Battalion, and all ave relatives who are dear to them in the devastated country, although they do not know whether they are alive. 



Thirty-four Men Go Down were saved, and they were severely burned. With Vedra Off English Coast.



### Beware of Fake Baking Powder Tests

"THE SPICE MILL" (N.Y.), SEPTEMBER, 1913.)

Unscrupulous manufacturers of baking powder, in order to sell their product, sometimes resort to the old game of what is known as "the glass test." In reality it is no test at all, but, in cases where the prospective buyer does not understand that the so-called "test" is a fake, pure and simple, the salesman is sometimes able to make him believe it shows conclusively that the so-called baking powder he is selling, and which of course contains egg albumen, is superior to other brands which do not contain this ingredient.

Bulletin No. 21, issued by Dairy and Food Bureau of the State of Utah, reads as follows:

"The sale in the State of Utah of baking powders containing minute quantities of dried egg (albumen) is declared illegal. The albumen in these baking powders does not actually increase the leavening power of the powder, but by a series of unfair and deceptive tests such powders are made to appear to the innocent consumer to possess three or four times their actual leavening power."






