### THE DOMINION FOREIGN TRADE CROWDS THE HALF BILLION MARK sion, and better suited to devotional and moderately warm today; showers in purposes"; others speak of "its many localities during the night and on

Ottawa, June 14.-With an aggregate foreign trade amounting to \$483,-234,889 and exports to the amount of \$208,233,972, every branch of which exhibits an increase, Canada's commerce continues to expand at a phenomenal rate, and the farmer is enjoying a large share of this prosperity. The total foreign trade shows a gain of \$74,037,160 for the eleven months ending May 31, when compared with the same period of the previous year. The domestic exports were \$208,233,972, a gain of \$42,135,848. Although imports for consumption were considerably more, being \$257,421,427, they do not show as large an increase. The betterment was only \$24,146,800, or a little less than one-half that of the exports. Agriculture contributed most of the exports, as will be seen from the following statement: Agricultural products, total \$50,-48,588, increase \$22,409,500; animals and their products, total \$60,002,343, Increase \$3,614,359; products of the mine, total, \$30,388,753, increase \$3,789,-701; fisheries, total \$13,872,234, increase \$4,325,915; products of the forest, total \$21,888,258, increase \$4,570,665; manufactures, total, \$21,852,457, increase,

### DIJK SEDDON AND HIS WORK

### [From the Toronto Star.]

The fortunes of Richard Seddon, who died Prime Minister of New Zealand, were quite as remarkable as those of that other 'prentice boy, Richard Whittington, who was thrice Lord Mayor of London. Both began obscurely, both had their careers determined by accident, both rose to wealth and high station, and both walked before kings ere their time came to lay down earthly honors. When history slips into legend it will probably be told of Dick Seddon that he was a greater man than Dick Whittington because he was a greater democrat. Seddon was not a man of large in-

tellectual gifts, but he had driving power and an abounding love of his fellowman, qualities which served to place him among the benefactors mankind because his impulses wer right. He did not derive his social philosophy from books, but from hard experience. When he was a lad in England he was a fomentor of discord ameng his fellow workmen, kicker against the pricks, what would be called a mauvais sujet. Very wisely, as one sees now, he betook himself to other fields where there were not so many fences to annov a free spirit, to new lands with new skies which did not press so hard on the man of humble birth and high ambition. 





### LAND GRANTS FOR RAILWAY

Over Six Million Acres Likely To sum of \$1,000 be paid Dr. Fothering-Be Given Mackenzie & Mann ham for all his claims on the publicafor Hudson Bay Line.

Ottawa, June 13.-Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann are now in negotiation with the Dominion Government with regard to the construction of their proposed mentation fund committee's report, and line to Hudson Bay. More than 20 years ago a clause was inserted in the Dominion lands act providing for a land grant of some 12,800 acres per mile to assist the construction of a road to the shores of Hudson Bay. Some years later this subsidy was given to the Winnipeg and Hudson Bay Railway" Company, that is now controlled by Messrs, Mackenzie & Mann. The grant to this company was subsequently renewed, but runs out on the 1st of July unless it is renewed in the don, Granton; Synod of Manitoba and interval. It is understood that the western members, however, have signified their willingness that this re-

newal should be accorded. The line in question would be about 500 miles in length, and the Tand grant, therefore, would be some 6,400,-000 acres in all. The area reserved for the selection of the grant lies alongtransferred to the list of augmented side the route to be traversed by the new road, but it is understood that Mackenzie & Mann are desirous of getting land elsewhere and have expressed that wish to the federal Baysville, Tarbutt, Moorefield; Synod authorities. No action has yet been taken upon this request. Although the Synod of Manitoba and Northwest grant to the Winnipeg and Hudson Bay Railway Company runs out in another fortnight, there is still a clause in the Dominion lands act that reserves a large land grant to assist the building of a railway over this route, and the authorities may present this to whatever company they desire.

Elliot ......19 red flags, along the south side of the No. 6 Company, Capt. T. N. Elliott..16 grounds, until the western boundary was reached. From there they proceeded north until opposite the miniature ranges. On arrival at the ranges the squadron dismounted, and at the command "Action!" doubled to the targets, and lay down, proceeding to fire at the targets, eighteen of which were exposed. When the eighteen were "killed," the umpire gave command, "All dead!" and the squadron mounted and proceeded around the course until the starting point was reached again. Each competing squadron made three trips around the course, and fired on their first and second arrival at the targets, and on the arrival their time was taken. Any men over one minute late were counted as casualties, and each meant a deduction of fifteen seconds. The squadron making the shortest time minus the deductions for casualties, won the shield.
