THE MOROCCAN MIX-UP

French Cabinet Meet to Discuss Matter of Indemnity.

Parls, Sept. 10 .- A special meeting of the cabinet was held vesterday to consider the Moroccan situation. These conclusions were reached: First-The Moroccan Government

should be held responsible for the well as for the damages suffered as a result of the pillage or the repress-Second-The indemnities should be

fixed by an international commission. Incidentally this is France's answer to the demands of the German exporters at Casablanca, that France compensate them for the losses they sustained during the bombardment.

Germany's reply to the French note relative to the formation of a Moroccan police from French and Spanish troops says that Germany assumes that the measure proposed is that merely of a provisional character and without prejudice to the terms of the Algeciras convention. The reply of Germany calls attention to the opinion of the German representative at Tangier that the appearance of foreign police there and at other Moroccan ports now is likely to result in the mountain tribes attacking the cities, with consequent danger to the lives and property of Europeans. unless efficient military support for the police is provided.

In regard to the German claims for damages sustained at Casablanca, no difficulties, it is asserted, are likely to arise.


