St. Thomas, Sept. 15 .- One of the strangest happenings in railroading occurred on the Michigan Central between thiscity and Buffalo, when the fastest express on the road struck a handcar going at full speed, and carried it a distance of 70

No. 17, which leaves Buffalo at 3:25 a.m., struck the handcar in such a way as to fasten the pilot and car without the latter's wheels leaving the track. At full speed the car was shoved over switches, and not until St. Thomas was reached was the addition to No. 17 discovered by the crew. Inquiries were made, and it was found that the handcar had been standing unoccupied at Cayuga, 70 miles from here.

The Burning of Roman Fire Sent Up a Reflection Which Caused Lad to Shout---Good Work of 7th Regiment Band and the Directors Save the Lives and Limbs of Many.

While the attractions in front off the grand stand at the fair were in progress last night a small boy cried"Fire!" A panic resulted in which several people were injured, but none of them were seriously hurt.

The prompt action of Bandmaster Slatter in ordering the Seventh Band to strike up a tune averted a serious accident.

AN AWFUL CRUSH.

As soon as he saw the reflection he screamed "Fire!" The crowd in that section instinctively turned toward the light, and a mad rush was made to get out of the stands.

The noise attracted the attention of the entrie crowd, and thousands moved almost as one person towards the fence, which separates the paddock from the race track.

Women screamed, and regardless of danger jumped over the picket

Many of the cooler heads in the crowd tried to calm the fears of others, and this had a good effect in allaying the panic of the thoroughly frightened mob of people.

one was seriously injured.

LADIES WERE INJURED.

Mrs. Kilbourn, of South London, fainted in the crush, and was quite painfully bruised. She was carried out of the stands, and after some minutes was restored. Later she was taken to her home.

There were many others painfully bruised, but no bones were broken. It was a very silly panic, and had no justification whatever.

The stands were crowded at the time, fully 10,000 people being present. After the stampede fully one-third of the crowd left and went home. They were too badly frightened to enjoy the show.

Mrs. George Silliard, of Rectory street south, was also injured in the crush. She was carried off her feet when the cry of fire started, and was unable to save herself. She was badly crushed and bruised and when rescued by some of the cooler heads, was in a fainting condition.

Dr. Seaborne was called and she was removed to her home, where she is still being attended by the physician. It will take some time for the case to develop, as she may be injured internally. She is now resting easily.

WERE WEDGED IN.

A great many of the people who witnessed the panic in the grand stand last night have been commenting today on the fact that had there really been a fire or any urgent need for the people to have gotten out quickly, it would have been utterly impossible for them to have escaped through the gates.

The turnstiles are so constructed that only one person can go through at a time, and for about five minutes during the excitement last night hundreds of people were trying to get through them.

So excited did the people become that it was absolutely impossible for They were wedged in a solid mass around the entrance to the turnstile,

and the persons who were trying to get through could not, as those behind, in their excitement, seized the bars and prevented it from turning. This matter has been brought to the attention of the directors, and strong recommendations have been made by a number of citizens that suit-

able gates be provided at all points where dangerous congestion may oc-

KEPT OUT OF STANDS.

A large number of the remainder would not sit in the stands, but crowded down into the paddocks. "It is a fortunate thing it was not worse," said Secretary Hunt. "There

seemed to be no reason for the panic, but the people lost their heads for a moment. No person was seriously hurt so far as I can learn." The directors who were in charge of the stand acted in a cool manner.

They ran along from place to place, shouting to the people to sit down. It was remarked last night that the men in the grand stands were as greatly excited as the women.

VALUABLES WERE LOST.

Napoleon Lajoie will in all probability have made as much money out of baseball as any other player in the business by the time he is ready to quit. In his twelve years of big league ball playing he has netted about \$83,000, and since the Cleveland manager and second baseman appears to be of a careful nature, he is probably well off in this world's goods. His various contracts since the time he made his debut as a big leaguer with the Philadelphia Nationals in 1906 show that he has gathered in that amount in salaries. He drew \$2,100 his first year, \$3,500 the next, \$4,000 in the 1899 and 1900, all the while being with the same club. In 1901 he joined the Philadelphia Athletics, and during that year and gestion. 1902 he received \$5,500 each season for his services. Then Cleveland secured him under a three-year contract for \$26,000, which agreement was renewed at \$28,000. Since 1905 Lajoie has managed the Cleveland team, and while he has never won a championship, his club has always finished well up in the standing.
