More than 300 Liberals have been omitted from the voters' lists by the enumerators. This is not the whole number, of course, but that is the number reported to headquarters today. It is expected that it will be materially increased before the end of the week. Some sub-divisions are worse than others. Many of the enumerators have done excellent work, and few mistakes have been made. In others, it seems deliberate. PART OF HALIFAX WRECKED WITH SERIOUS LOSS OF LIFE; MUNITIONS SHIP IS RAMMED WHEN LEAVING HARBOR

St. John, Dec. 6 .- Communication with Halifax was established by the C. P. R. Telegraph Company this afternoon. It was learned that as a result of the explosion of the American munition ship this morning, nearly one-half of the north end of the city is flat, that a great fire is raging, that the dead are lying thick in the streets and that all the hospitals are filled to overflowing, so that many injured are compelled to walk about untreated.

A number of C.P.R. operators are reported injured.

RAID LONDON; **BRACE BAGGED**

Twenty-Five German Airplanes Make Attack on England.

London, Dec. 6 .- About twentyfive airplanes raided England today, it is announced officially. Of these six reached London Two of the raiders were brought

down, the crew of three men on each machine being captured.

Bombs dropped by the raiders caused a number of fires in London. but all of them were quickly brought under control. The casualties are believed to be light.

This is the first German air raid over England in more than a month. The last raid occurred on the night of October 31, being made by about thirty airplanes in 7 groups. An official British report on aviation last night said two raids were carried out over Germany on Wednesday by British airplanes, the first which had been possible for more than a month, owing to incessant bad weather.

BEING WAGED ON ITALIAN LINES

Italian Army Headquarters in Northern Italy, Dec. 6 .- (By the Associated Press)-Heavy fighting around Asiago has developed rapidly. The enemy assaults began with intense artillery preparation followed by liquid gas and waves of infantry. The fightgas and waves of infantry. The fighting continued throughout yesterday and last night along the heights back of Asiago marked by the zone between the heights of Monte Sisemol and Monte Meleteta. This line extends nearly ten miles.

Attack and counter-attack are going on, leaving the final outcome still open.

HAND-TO-HAND.

Italian Headquarters in Northern Italy, Wednesday, Dec. 5.—By the Associated Press.—The furious enemy attack on the Aslago Plateau has been repulsed with heavy losses, except at the northeastern sector, around Monte Tondarecar, where, after a desperate struggle which lasted until this morning, the enemy succeeded in occupying some of the advanced Italian lines, which were retired to more secure HAND-TO-HAND. which were retired to more secure

positions.

The fighting has been extremely heavy, with masses of infantry engaged in hand-to-hand combat. The first attack on the Italian left was met and repulsed by the 22nd Corps, with large enemy casualties. Many prisoners were taken. The main attack on the Italian right was contested 36 hours by our corps, which inflicted heavy losses before yielding ground.

Truro, N. S., Dec. 6.—It is reported here that the first estimate of the loss of life in the explosion in Halifax harbor this morning places it at 50, while the number injured is correspondingly great.

Amherst, N. S., Dec. 6 .- Scores of people have been killed and hundreds of buildings destroyed, and a portion of Halifax set on fire by an explosion which occurred following the collision of an American ammunition ship and another vessel at Rockingham, according to telephone messages reaching here this morning. The explosion was so terrific that it destroyed the installation in the telegraph and telephone offices for 30 miles around Halifax, while it was heard at Truro, 61 miles distant.

HALF OF CITY RUINED?

Halifax, Dec. 6-(Via Havana).-Hundreds of persons were killed and a thousand others injured and half of the city of Halifax is in ruins as the result of the explosion on a munitions ship in the harbor today. It is estimated the property loss will run into the millions. The north end of the city is in flames.

OLDER PART OF CITY RAZED.

Halifax, Dec. 6.—The portion of the city affected by the morning's disaster was the older part, many of the buildings being almost as old as Halifax itself. It was very thickly populated. The streets were narrow, and many of the houses were of the frame variety,

ALL OF CREWS KILLED.

It is reported that the American munition ship was movil g out from her pier and was rammed broadside by another vessel. Instantly there was a tremendous explosion, which practically destroyed the two ships and killed their crews. The concussion resulting caused the roof of the railway depot at North street to collapse, while all the warehouses on the waterfront for a mile and a half were damaged. The premises affected in many places caught fire. The force of the concussion was so great that freight cars were blown off tracks at a distance of nearly two

HELP IS RUSHED.

Messages asking for fire engines and fire fighting apparatus, doctors and nurses, hospital supplies, etc., were received by a number of localities in Nova Scotia from Halifax. Special trains were made up with everything required that could be secured.

FOOD SUPPLIES LOST.

At Truro Windsor and here the city councils met this morning and decided to take immediate steps to render aid to the afflicted people of Halifax. It is understood that large quantities of food were destroyed and that the citizens of Halifax may soon be in danger of starving. It was decided that carloads of food must be dispatched at once.

Rockingham is located well within Halifax harbor, at the mouth of Bedford Basin. It is at the northwestern portion of the harbor, and since the war has been used as an examining station for ocean steamers. It was at this portion of the harbor that ex-Ambassador Bernstorff and party were held and examined on their way from the United States to Germany.

MASSACHUSETTS OFFERS HELP.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 6.—Governor Samuel McCall, on learning of the disaster at Halifax today, filed the following telegram, addressed to the mayor of Halifax.

'Understand your city in danger from explosion and conflagration. Reports only fragmentary. Massachusetts stands ready to go to the limit in rendering every assistance you may be in need of. Wire me immediately,"

CIVI LSERVANTS IN CANADIAN FORCES GET NO "EXTRAS"

Debarred from Post-Discharge Pay, Say Orders.

Civil employees of the Federal or Provincial Governments who on their retirement or discharge are privileged to return to their former positions in the Government service, and members of the permanent staff or permanent force of Canada who on retirement or discharge from the expeditionary force are privileged to return again to their duty on the permanent staff or in the permanent force, are excluded from the right to receive the three months post-discharge pay, according to amended regulations, which state that

1. Every person who has served, is now serving, or may in future serve as an officer, nursing sister, warrant officer, n. c. o. or man in the C. E. F., and who, after six months continuous service in the said force, a portion of which has been performed overseas, has been honorably retired or discharged in Canada from such service, or returned to Canada within six months of such retirement or discharge in the United Kingdom, shall receive for a further period of three months the pay and allowances of the rank held on the date of his retirement or discharge charge.

(a) Civil employees of the Federal
or Provincial Government, who on retirement or discharge are privileged to
return to their former position in the

return to their former position in the Government service.

(b) Members of the permanent staff or permanent force of Canada, who on retirement or discharge from the expeditionary force are privileged to return again to their duty on the permanent staff or in the permanent staff or in the permanent force.

3. That the expression "pay and allowances" herein be considered to include the following only, namely: (a) pay of rank, (b) field pay, (c) separation allowance. d for 30 days each, and the third days, and where over-payments been made to the recipient or his dents prior to his retirement or large, such over-payments shall be

ted from the said pay and allow-That officers and soldiers serving in Bermuda or St. Lucia shall be considered as serving in the C. E. F. over-6. That this order shall have the same force and effect as if it had been made on the 18th day of April, 1917, the date of the order-in-council.

Collection Made Last Night for Soldiers' Orphans and Poor Children.

MEN IN HOSPITALS GRANTED WAR BADGES

Get "A" Class Decoration, According to New Order.

Transportation at the public expense is to be provided when desired, for relatives or other persons legally entitled to receive insignia of an order or decoration conferred by his majesty for distinguished or meritorious service since August 4, 1914, upon an efficer or soldier who has not survived to receive it, when such insignia is to be publicly presented. Instructions issued in camp orders state that "officers and soldiers who have been awarded orders or decorations by his majesty since August 4, 1914, and who have been invalided or otherwise returned to Canada before the orders or decorations could be presented to them should also receive transportation at the public expense under the above-mentioned conditions."

Soldiers in military or convalescent hospitals who have returned from service in France can now obtain Class A War Service Badges, instructions having been received at militia headquarters today.

Formerly only those who had been discharged, or were returned to Canada bedge, but this left the men in the hospital under the former regulations would need to wait until he was discharged from the hospital or sufficiently recovered to report for duty, but now for purposes of issuing the Class A badges, men in hospitals will be considered as "on duty."

This does not apply to Class B badges, and to obtain one of them, a man must be discharged through old age, wounds





Soldiers Both Coming Back From Firing Line and Those On Way There, at Port.


News of the Halifax disaster today and the first reports that hundreds of lives had been lost, caused great anxiety in London, Soldiers from this district, both those Soldiers from this district, both those who en route to England and France and invalided men who are returning to their homes, invalided or on leave, are at the Halifax port. One party of 37 men is now on its way to the city from Halifax.

As soon as the reports of the explosion and subsequent destruction and loss of life reached London, anxious inquiries began to besiege The Advertiser. The fact that the early reports mentioned no loss of life other than among the crews of the ships in collision and that the damage was principally confined to the Rockingham suburb was reassuring to those with loved ones in khaki who were at the port.

Skirmishes Have Taken Place From Struma to Vajusa.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Fighting has been resumed on the Macedonian front, and dispatches received here to day describe the activities of the Bulgarians as surprising. 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




