VANCOUVER, March 13.—"Any man who translates in this case is threatened with death," said Malcolm Reid, Dominion police agent, in the police court today, at the trial of Chen Chu Yen, alleged member of the Chinese Nationalist League, charged with being a member of an unlawful society. Comment was made in one of the letters put in as evidence on the murder of Tue Hua Long, Chinese minister of education, at Victoria, to the effect that that was a bad move, as it had the roof to cave in on the league.

Among the letters captured by the Among the letters captured by the poince was one from the accused to Dr. Sun Yat Sen, president of the league in China, in which the accused was alleged to have stated that \$10,000 had been collected here for the cause.



TORONTO, March 13.—"Four parties are necessary to industry, capital, labor, management, the community; is there anything in their present relations suggestive of a partnership? He declared that unrest in infustry today is no transitory affair, no mere aftermath of the hideous convulsion: it is the voice of a grief-stricken humanity crying for justice.


