Supreme Council Decides That Relief Will Amount to \$70,000,000.

\$9,500,000 EVERY MONTH

Distressing Conditions Are Reported by Chancellor Renner of Austria.

Paris, Dec. 17.—After further consideration today of Austria's requirements for the relief of her distressing food conditions, the supreme council decided that it would be necessary to furnish relief to the amount of \$70,000,-000 at the least, the relief to go forward at the rate of \$9,500,000

Belief was expressed by the Austrian delegation that the total sum Lecessary would reach \$100,000,000, which is the amount Chancellor Renner yesterday asked the council to loan disc to Austria.

The council today, presided over by Jules Cambon, heard a report from Louis Loucheur, the French minister of reconstruction, with regard to the needs of Austria. It was stated afterwards that measures had been agreed upon for the remedying of the situation. The execution of these measures, it was added, entailed the participation of the United States, whose adherence to the parteement was awaited.







CHAIRMAN OF BOARD HAS CRITICISM FOR CITY WATER SUPPLY

Says Commissioners Lax On Surface Water Danger.

YEAR'S WORK SUMMARY

Health Authorities Have Had Busy Time During Twelve Months.

A summary of the board of health's work during the year was presented at its final meeting Tuesday. It shows that thirteen meetings were held. Thirty-one complaints as to sanitary conditions were investigated. Bakeshop regulations were considered, approved and indorsed. Five suspicious cases of slink yeal were investigated, and on three occasions the offenders were successfully prosecuted. Contagious diseases to the number of 354 were reported, and 7,367 sanitary inspections were made. Four hundred herds of cows and dairies were inspected. Six hundred milk samsummary of the board of health'

Four hundred herds of cows and dairies were inspected. Six hundred milk samples were tested. Eighteen sewers were ordered constructed.

Mumps Lead.

During November 102 cases of contagious disease were reported. Mumps had the highest total, 33; diphtheria was next, with 22, while there were 5 suspects as well; whooping cough totalled 23. Of the dreaded smallpox there was only one case reported. There were five cases each of chickenpox and measles. There were five deaths due to contagious diseases. One of these was tuberculosis and the other four diphtheria.

Reviewing the work of the year, Chairman J. H. Saunders said that water examinations show that the city's water supply is not quite satisfactory.

"The water commissioners do not appear to realize the danger of contamination by admission of surface water," nation by admission of surface water," he said. "It must be understood though that the water supply, while perhaps too limited, is generally as pure as can







A LIVE SUGGESTION

The practicability and sound sense of the proposal contained in the mayoralty platform of Ald. E. S. Little, that London can now move to secure a new union depot and track elevation, were established yesterday in an interview given out here by W. D. Robb, vice-president of the Grand Trunk Railway

Mr. Little, who has given the subject much thought, and who has maintained close touch with the situation since the summer of 1916, is advised that the nationalization of the Grand Trunk has furnished London with her long-awaited opportunity.

His plan, which he intends to put into effect in the event of his election, is to proceed to secure action not through the railway authorities, buf through the Dominion Government. In the past the Grand Trunk has been a bankrupt private company, but it is now the property of the people of Canada, and the people of London are accordingly in a position to go direct to the capital with a demand for the improvements, in the interests of public service and safety.

Vice-President Robo of the Grand Trunk, in his interview here yesterday gave the weight of his authoritative opinion That the matter is now one for Ottawa to deal with.

London should therefore proceed as quickly as possible to give effect to Ald. Little's suggestion, and, inasmuch as he is the man who has developed this phase of a most important issue, it is fitting and logical that he, as mayor, should be deputed to see the scheme carried through to successful fruition

Though it is true that London's interests could be advanced in many ways, there is perhaps no avenue of endeavor which will have a more important bearing on the city's future than the campaign for a union depot and track elevation. The horrible loss of life and great suffering caused by the frequent level crossing accidents are but a phase of the grade-crossing nuisance. The company wants the street closed so that it can use the whole property as reclamation yards. It claims that this cannot be done if the property is cut up the centre by the street.

Must Adjoin Carshops.

The Grand Trunk carshops are immediately east of Egerton street, and Wilfon avenue is west of it. The company claims that its reclamation yards must adjoin the carshops, and that if the city blocks this by refusing to close the street, it may become necessary to move both the carshops and the reclamation yards out of the city. About 250 men are employed in the carshops, and that London would thereefore lose about 400 men if the move was made.

It is claimed that when a railroad owns property on both sides of a street, as in this case, that it can have it closed by making application to a county judge. It is asserted that the company thought this course would unnecessarily antagonize the city council, and therefore made application, as a matter of courtesy, to that body to close the street.



U. S. Distillers May Ship Liquor To Cuba To Avoid Wasting It

A way out apparently has been found for distillers caught with large stocks of liquor on hand by the supreme court's decision holding war-time prohibition constitutional. WHERE DOES CHARITY CALL? By the announcement of the Board of Commerce that Canadian children are starving in thousands for want of milk, Mr. J. W. Bengough is moved to an indignant poem on the subject. In another column of the page in the Globe (Toronto), which prints the poem, an editorial appeal is made for hungry children in Austria. The suffering of Canadian children is attributed by the Board of Commerce to the large exports of 'butter, cheese and condensed

wilk to make money for Canadian producers

and traders." Here is a difficult dilemma. The Austrians as well as our own people have certainly a call on us, it cannot be denied. But the more that is sent over to them, the more we have to pay at home, the only parties gaining by general generosity being "the producers and traders." Some government control of the whole matter may seem the only possible solution from the consumer's viewpoint. In the question of the price of each article sold, the consumer, that is the whole people, get clubbed on both sides of the head in order that some few may reap a harvest. Large sections of the people get their own turn in clubbing back the rest, but a large part of the people cannot even have a revenge and consequently do nothing but suffer.

Government price control might prevent the spirit of generosity and good-will from being altogether stamped out of the people. Already a considerable amount of class hatred is abroad: Formerly people in general used to be proud of the "snccess" of prominent business men in their community, tried to do them honor and would like to be represented by them. They were heroes, accorded a certain degree of heroworship. Now there is a disposition to look with suspicion and enmity at any one's "pile." Even if he uses it well, the rich dealer is looked i upon by many as a hypocrite, a Pharisee. Everyone feels that life is a constant shouldering and beating each other to it, and at the same time few like this state of things. People are on the wheel and can't get off it. When it is announced that a Brockville manufacturer gives each workman \$300 of last year's profits, there anxious to push up prices, as eager for profits as the capitalist, when they get their share? How about the consumer again?

So we long for a government regulation of prices in general, and we wonder whether the Board of Commerce will be able to bring that about, especially under the Ottawa Govern-Perhaps co-operative business may yet be a solution, in part at least, of the great question of the hour. In co-operative business the buyers of goods often get their share of profits, so that all are satisfied and no hog gets the hog's share. Once suspicion among the citteens of a country can be allayed by a fairer distribution of the fruits of industry, generosity will revive and charity will flourish more truly than ever before. Those with a surplus will be able and willing to subscribe to the relief of the unfortunate whether at home or abroad, without having to stop and think that by so doing they are starving one, or themselves, to feed another, or exercising generosity in order to heap up higher than ever some profiteer's pile.

A REBUKE FOR RADICALISM.

The radical element in Australian politics has been sharply rebuked by the triumph of the Hughes Government in the general elections. Hughes had to fight a powerful combination, consisting of Labor extremists, who championed the One Big Union, a party led by Archbishop Manuix of the Catholic Church, and a pro-Sinn-Fein faction headed by Hon. Mr. Ryan, ex-premier of Queensland. Allied with the Liborals. Hughes was able to down this triple alliance after one of the bitterest political struggles in the history of Australia. The participation of Archbisdop Manuix in the contest lined up the Protestant voters pretty solidly behind Hughes, and, as well, the conservative section of Le'or stood with him. The Mannix-Irish-Bodalist combination is accused of planning for separation, but whether or not this charge is tree, the result of the polling makes it clear that the anti-Government alliance was too radical and too factional for the Australian people. The victory for the Hughes Government is another triumph for that moderation that is so necessary in public affairs the world over, if humanity is to weather the prevailing dangerous unrest and discontent.

A GREAT CONFERENCE.

The great students' conference which is to meet at Des Moines, lows, next month, is an index to the religious spirit and the co-operative good-will of colleges all over the Englishspeaking continent. It is expected that about 7,000 delegates will be present. Some colleges will send only two or three, some a dozen. But it is evident that hundreds of institutions of higher learning are in close touch for the promotion of religious interests among students.

The prime object of this and preceding conferences is the furtherance of missionary work by college students at home and abroad. Missignaries in foreign fields are maintained by the colleges, and it is hoped to increase this work. In college towns and cities, students are implated to carry on social efforts, develop religious and moral efficiency of univer-

sity men. An immense amount of intellectua and moral power goes to waste, from a social viewpoint, among students, and these student assemblies are intended to create an enthusiasm that will utilize such power to the utmost.

The conference at Des Moines is a sign of the times, a proof of the determination among students to make intellect and learning count in the world's leadership, for the social good. "Studies flow into character," said the old Latin proverb, and we now measure character, not so much by its capacity as by its effective, social power. Not only the practical religious spirit of the colleges is seen, but their tendency to coalesce in a great body for intelligent leadership. Democracy is asking for leadership that will advance and uplift. The old aristocracy of family, wealth or position has passed away. In its place must come the aristocracy of disinterested intelligence, which will not forget its democratic origin and calling, and it is the colleges that are creating, by studies that pursue truth for truth's sake and for good's sake, the mass of devoted and capable leaders who will yet make a millennium upon the earth.

MAKING PERFUMES. [Kitchener Telegraph.]

Pomades are the commercial vehicle for absorbing and transporting the perfumes of the ionquil. tuberose, jasmine and a few other species of flowers. A square frame or chassis of white wood and about 20 by 30 inches in size, is set with a pane of strong plate glass. On each side of the glass is spread a thin, even layer of grease, which has been urified and refined. Thus prepared, the frames are piled up in ranks six or seven feet high to await the season of each special flower.

When the blossoms arrive the petals are picked from the stem-the pistils and stamens being dis carded-and laid so as to cover the grease in each frame. These being again piled so as to rest upon their wooden edges, which fit closely together, there is formed a series of tight chambers, the floors and ceilings of which are of grease, exposed to the perfume of the flower leaves within.

The gresse absorbs the perfume, the spent flowers are removed daily, and fresh ones supplied. and this process goes on from two to four or five months, according to the desired strength of the which, when sufficiently charged perfume, is taken from the glass with a wide, thin

spatula, and packed in cans for export. By these methods the delicate odors of flowers are extracted and retained for transport to distant markets, where, being treated with alcohol, the yield their perfume to that stronger vehicle, and

produce fieral waters and extracts of commerce, Coarser pomades are made by boiling the flowers the grease and subjecting the residue to pressure. The spent pomades are used for toilet purposes and in the manufacture of fine scaps. The process of preparing perfumed oils involves the same principle, except that instead of solid grease, superfine olive oil is used.

Besence and flower "water" are produced by ordinary distillation, in which the flowers are boiled in water in large elembics. The vapor carries off the perfume and is condensed in adjoining copyer tanks like ordinary spirits. Some of the retorts used for this purpose are of sufficient size to receive at once half a ton of fresh flowers, with the requisite water for their distillation,

Whiriwinds are produced by violent and contrary currents meeting and striking upon each other, roducing a circular motion. They generally occur after long calms, attended by much heat.

Whirlwinds occurring at sea, or over the surface of water, sometimes put the water in motion, and as the wind rises upwards it lifts with it a whirling mass of water, producing a waterspout.

Why do the wings of windmills turn around? Because the wind, striking at an angle upon the vings, forces them aside; and as there are four wings all upon the same angle, and fixed upon the same centre, coblique pressure of the wind causes the centre to rotate.

Commissioner Pringle added that if he were fixing a price to the Canadian publishers it would be not less than \$75 her ton as against \$55 already fixed. per ton, as against \$66 already fixed. The price obtainable in the States is \$90 per ton.






