## Some Famous Dogs.

## Canines Whose Virtues Have Entitled Them to Rank as Heroes.

The Grecks raised statues to their dogs, says the Gondson Gazette. Socrates swore by his dog and Alexander the Great honored his by building a city with magnificent temples, which he dedicated to its memory.

Piutarch mentions a sagacious dog that King Pyrrhus found beside the murdered body of its master. Afterwards it sprung fiercely upon two of the King's soldiers, thus pointing them out as the murderers.

The memory of "the dog of Marathon" lives with the memory of the Grecian heroes who fell with it in that famous battle against the Persian hosts.

A monument was built over the remains of the dog owned by Zantippus, the father of Pericles. Denied admission upon his master's ship, he swam alongside of it from Athens to Salamis and fell dead from exhaustion at the feet of Zantippus the moment he stepped upon shore.

Homer erected a beautiful memorial to Argos, the dog owned by Uly-ses-not out of marble, but in ferient verse that is far more enduring. When Ulysses after his long wanderings returned to his home disguised as a beggar, his dag, then twenty vears old, blind and feeble, was the first to recognice him.

There was a dog named Soter, so noted among the Corimhians for his fidelity and watchfulness that he was voterl a silver collar, on which was the inscription: "Corinth's Defender and Deliverer."

Another dog famous in history is "the dong Aubry" that belonged to De Montidilier, a brave officer under Charles V. of France. IIe saved his master from drowning, and, finding his body some time afterwards in the forest, watched beside it for days until reduced almost to a skeleton from hunger. During a game of temis Montdidier had a dispute with a brother officer named Macaire, and the latter waylaid and murdered him in the forest. One day the dog met Macaire in the streets of Paris and, actuated by some rare instinct, sprung upon him and would have killed him had not the people interfered.

Macaire was suspected of being the assassin and Charles the Wise ordered the issue to be decided by a battle between the dog and Macaire on the island of Nutre 1)ame. The man was allowed a club and a shield, and the dog a cask to which he might rotreat when hard beset. The dog scorned the place of refuge, and in the second encounter fastened his teeth in his antagonist's throat. Macaire confessed his guilt and was afterwards executed at la Roquette.

## The Seven Wonders.

## Practical Hints.

## Brilliant Stucco Whitewash will last on Brick or Stone Twenty to Thirty Years.

Many have heard of the brilliant stucco whitewash on the east end of the President's house, at II ashington. The following is a recipe for it as gleaned from the Nitional Intelligencer, with some additional improvements learned by experiments:-Nice unslaked lime, $\frac{t}{2}$ bushel, slake it with boiling water; cover it during the process to keep in the steam. Strain the liquid through a fine sieve or strainer, and add to it salt, 1 peck, previously well dissolved in water; rice, 3 pounds, boi ed to a thin past and stirred in boiling hot; Spanish whiting, $\frac{1}{2}$ pound, clean, nice glue, 1 pound, which has previously been dissolved by soaking it well, and then hanging it over a slow fire, in a small kettle, immersed in a larger one filled with water. Now, add hot water, 5 gallons to the mixture, stir it well, and let it stand a few days covered from the dirt. It should be put on hot. For this purpose it can be kept in a kettle on a portable furnace. Brushes more or less may be used, according to the neatness of the job required. It answers as well as oil-paint for brick or stone, and is much cheaper.

## To Destroy Weeds in Walks.

The following method is pursued at the mint in Paris, with good effect:-Water, 10 gallons; stone lime, 20 pounds; flour of sulphur, 2 pounds. B il in an iron kettle; after settling, the clear part is to be poured off and sprinkled freely upon the weedy walks.

Care must be taken, for it will de-troy weeds; and as certainly destroy edging and border flowers, if sprinkled on them.

## Another Use for the Onion.

A very convenient mucilage can be made of onion juice by anyone who wishes to ure it. A goed-sized Spanishonion, after being boiled a short time, will yield on being pres-ed quite a large quantity of very adhesive fluid. This is used quite extensively in various trades for paating paper onto tin or zinc, or even glass, and the tenacity with which it holds would surprise anyone on making the first attempt. It is the cheapest and best mucilage for such purposes, and answers just as well as many of the more costly and patent cements. Some of the cements sold by street fakirs at 10 cents a bottle consist of nothing but onion juice and water, and the buttle and cork cost a great de, more than the contents.
"Food and Health" suggests a practical and easy remedy for insomnia. Wet a towel and rub downward along the spinal column from the nape of the neck to the base of the spine; also across the back of the neck from ear to ear; wet the towel several times and repent the operation. The effect is rapid; the nerves are quieted the brain refreshed and sleep promptly follows. It is more effective than the strongent narcotic. Tepid water may be used if the patient can nut stand cold water but it is not nearly as efficacious.

## Odd Items.

## Gravestones of Glass.

A company of glass workers have recently determined that ordinary plate glass will make a more durable momment than the hardent marble or granite known. Glass is practically indestructible. Wind, rain, heat and cold have their effect on the hardest rock; solid granite eventually crumbles away, and one can seldom rat the inscription on a stone gravestone fifty years old. A gla-s stone will look as fresh a couple of centuries after its manufacture as oa the day it was erected, and the inscription can be made ineffigeable.

## A Luminous Cat.

A luminous cat has been invented and can be placed in any dark corner or nook and effectually scates away all rais and mice. 1 hs cat is struck or stamped from sheet metal or oher like material, and is the exact counterpart of its animated foline sister. It is painted over with a luminous paint, so that it shines in the dark like a cat of flame. After being used for about a week the place is entirely rid of either mice or rats.

## The Potato.

In 1596 the first potato was planted in England, in Holborn, about the time that Sir Walter Raleigh was pla ting the first Irish potato at Youghal, near Cork. For two centuries the potato continued as a botanical curiosity. When first eaten it was a delicacy, sometimes roasted and steeped in Sick, or baked with marrow ant spices, or preserved and candied. When Parmentier developed the plant in France, Louis XVI. and Marie Antoinette wore the flowers as ornaments. Frederick the Great had to force the Pomeranian farmers to plant potatues by the fear of his soldiers.

## Bacteria and High Altitudes.

A Swiss scientist has been te-ting the presence of bacteria in the mountain air, and finds that not a single microbe exists above an altitude of 2,000 feet.

## A Home Made Barometer.

A cup of coffee and a lump or two of sugar are said to be a very acceptable substitute for the official and not wholly accurate weather forecasts. Having dropped the lumpr of suger into the cup of coffee carefully, watch the air-bubbles that rine th the suffice. If they suidenly rush from the centre to the side of the cup, I e sure that it is going to rain very hard.
