CONSTITUTION.

1. This Convention shall be known as the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island.

2. The object of the Convention shall be to maintain Acadia College, and other Educational interests of the body; as also its Foreign Missionary opera-

tions; and to advance the general interests of the denomination.

3. The Convention shall be composed as follows:—1st. Each of the Baptist Associations, within the limits of the Convention, shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention, five of its own members as delegates to represent it therein. 2d. Every Church connected with either of the above named Associations, and contributing toward the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional delegate for every twenty dollars so contributed; provided, that no Church be at liberty to send more than five delegates. 3rd. Every ordained Baptist minister connected with one of the above Churches, shall be a member. 4th. Any member of one of these Churches, who shall contribute five dollars annually, or fifty dollars at one time, towards the objects of the Convention, shall be a member.

3. The officers of the Convention shall be chosen annually from its members, and shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, residing in the Province in which the Convention is at the time in session, and an Assistant Secretary, chosen from one of the other Provinces.

5. The Convention shall meet on the first Saturday after the 19th of August, annually, at such place as shall be agreed on by the body, when, in addition to the election of officers and the transaction of such other business as may be brought before the body, in accordance with Art. 2 of this Constitution, a Board of Foreign Missions shall be chosen, consisting of fifteen members of the Convention; also, a Ministerial Education Board, or Boards, of seven members each. One-third of the members of each of these Boards shall form a quorum. The Convention shall also fill any vacancies that may have occurred in the Board of Governors of Acadia College, and shall, once in three years, appoint six new members in place of six who will then go out in rotation, in accordance with the Resolution passed by the Convention in September 1859 and in accordance with the Act 14 Vict., of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, cap. 37.

6. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Con-

vention, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. Every sitting shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Persons invited to a seat, may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.
 - 3. No member shall absent himself without leave of the body.
- 4. No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion, unless by permission of the body.
- 5. Motions made and lost, shall not be recorded in the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.
- 6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention, these rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair.

The Committee of Nomination presented a report, nominating officers for the ensuing year. The report was adopted, and the officers appointed.

Resolved, That an invitation be extended to all visiting brethren, and that they be requested to hand in their names to the Secretary.

Resolved, That the respective Boards be requested to appoint their own Auditors hereafter.

The following brethren were appointed a Committee to nominate persons to fill the vacancies that have occurred in the Bill, D lace, T

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in the Board of Governors of Acadia College; Revs. I. E. Bill, D. A. Steele, W. G. Parker, G. Armstrong, I. Wallace, T. H. Porter, W. S. McKenzie, and W. H. Warren.

The resignation of Rev. E. U. Cady, A. M. (formerly of New Brunswick, now of Iowa, U. S.), as a Governor of Acadia College, was read, and accepted.

Resolved, That 2,000 copies of the Minutes be printed, and that Revs. I. E. Bill, W. S. McKenzie, and W. B. Boggs, superintend the printing and circulating of them.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention be tendered to the Railway and Steamboat authorities, for the reduction of fares for delegates.

The Committee appointed to nominate persons to fill vacancies in the Board of Governors of Acadia College, reported, recommending Z. G. Gabel, Esquire, in place of Rev. E. C. Cady, removed, and Benj. Douglas, Esquire, in place of Rev. J. E. Balcom, deceased. These brethren were elected by ballot.

Resolved, That Rev. Dr. Spurden be appointed to preach the sermon next year, and that Rev. W. S. McKenzie be the alternate.

The Committee of Nomination reported, nominating the Board of Foreign Missions for the ensuing year. The report was adopted, and the Board elected.

Resolved, That the Ministerial Education Board of Nova Scotia, be re-appointed; and that Rev. D. Freeman be Chairman of said Board, and J. W. Barss, Esq., Treasurer.

The Committee of Arrangements reported, in part, as follows:

That a prayer meeting be held at 6.30 o'clock each morning, during the Convention. That morning sessions begin at 10 o'clock, and close at 12.30; afternoon sessions begin at 2.30, and close at 5; and that evening sessions begin at 7.30; and that the services of the Lord's Day be as follows:

Afternoon Session, August 24.

Prayer by Rev. G. D. Cox. Minutes of former Session read and approved.

Resolved, That the Convention take up at once the subject of Foreign Missions, in order that the business before us may be brought to a close on Monday evening.

Resolved, That the next meeting of the Convention be held at Windsor, N. S.

The following Resolution was introduced by Rev. Dr. Cramp, and cordially adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention, assembled on the anniversary of the massacre of the Protestants in Paris, three hundred years ago this day—a massacre exceeding in horror all similar events recorded in history, inasmuch as it was perpetrated in the name of religion, and for the purpose of suppressing freedom of thought and action in things spiritual—takes this opportunity to express abhorrence of the principles and spirit of Romanism, which were embodied in that massacre; regret at the adoption of principles closely resembling those of the Church of Rome, and therefore inimical to enlightened godliness, by a large number of persons in Great Britain and many in North America; gratitude for the occurrence of recent movements on the Continent of Europe, indicative of a revival of evangelical religion; and confidence in the grace and faithfulness of the Head of the Church, who will at last "consume" that wicked one "with the spirit of his mouth," and "destroy him with the brightness of his coming."

The Committee on the State of the Denomination presented their Report, which was adopted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. (See Appendix.)

Resolved, That the Churches be recommended to set apart the first day of January next as a Day of Humiliation and Prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Resolved, That Revs. D. M. Welton, W. B. Boggs, and J. B. McDonald, M. D., be a Committee to make applica-

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tion to the proper authorities for the usual reduction of fares by Railway and Steamboat lines, for those attending the Convention at Windsor next year.

The Report of the Board of Foreign Missions was read by the Secretary, Rev. W. S. McKenzie, and after some

remarks, was adopted.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Foreign Missionary Board inform the American Baptist Missionary Union, that on account of our being about to undertake an Independent Mission, we cannot longer contribute to the sup-

port of Brother George.

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Resolved, That the Convention would again recommend to the Board of Foreign Missions, to bring the claims of our independent Mission specially before the attention of the Churches and individuals now supporting native preachers and teachers in Burmah, with a view of securing such control over the appropriation of these funds as may seem to the Board best calculated to promote the interests of the Foreign Missionary efforts in charge of this Convention.

Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed to consider certain modifications that have been suggested as advisable in our Constitution and mode of procedure; and to report during this session of the Convention. Professor D. F. Higgins, H. C. Creed, Esq., and Rev. J. H. Saunders were appointed as the Committee.

The Auditing Committee reported, that they had examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission

Board, and found them correct.

Voted to adjourn. Prayer by Rev. D. A. Steele.

Evening Session, August 24.

The meeting opened with prayer by Rev. J. Davis.

Minutes of previous session read and approved.

The Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board being too ill to be present, his Report was presented by Rev. W. S. McKenzie. Report referred to the Board.

The 834th hymn was sung, and the lxxii. Psalm read, and prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. Cramp. Addresses were then delivered on the subject of Foreign Missions by Revs. Dr. Murdock, W. S. McKenzie, and S. B. Kempton. A collection was taken, and the meeting closed with prayer by the President.

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Monday Forenoon Session, August 26.

The annual sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Crawley, from the words in Acts xx. 35, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." A collection was taken towards the current expenses of Acadia College. Prayer was offered by Rev. I. Wallace.

The Committee of Arrangements reported, recommending that the Report of the Governors of Acadia College be taken up immediately after the sermon; and that the time of this Session be extended fifteen minutes, for Rev. J. W. Willmarth to present the claims of the "Bible and Publication Society."

The following Resolution was introduced by Rev. I. E. Bill, and passed unanimously:

Whereas, The financial relations, which have so long existed between this Convention and the American Baptist Missionary Union, in regard to the work of Foreign Missions, are about to terminate, for the purpose of giving place to the establishment of an independent Mission in some section of the great heathen world;

Therefore Resolved, That we embrace the present favorable juncture to place upon record our grateful appreciation of the uniform courtesy and christian kindness extended by our American brethren to our Missionaries in the foreign field, and at the same time to express our heartfelt gratitude for the fraternal visits of the representative brethren of the Missionary Union from year to year, and for their wise counsels, and wholesome instructions, so important to us at this stage of our Missionary work. Especially would we tender our most cordial thanks to our highly esteemed brother, Rev. Dr. Murdock, the Foreign Secretary of the Union, for his present visit to this body, and for his manly Christian utterances, so full of cheer and of good will, and so valuable in their relation to our present action and future course. May heaven's choicest blessings rest upon our brother, and upon the noble Missionary enterprise which he so ably represents.

Resolved, That Rev. Dr. Crawley be requested to furnish his sermon, delivered this morning, for publication in our denominational papers.

The Annual Report of the Board of Governors of Acadia College was read by the Secretary, Rev. S. W. DeBlois. The Report was adopted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes.

In the absence of the Treasurer of Acadia College, his Report was presented by Rev. Dr. Sawyer, and adopted.

The Committee on proposed changes in the Constitution, reported. The clause of the Report relating to the Constitution was referred to the Committee, with the understanding that they will publish any changes they propose, a month before the next Convention. The following portion of the Report was adopted:

That the Committee on Obituaries, and also that on the State of the Denomination, be appointed each year, to report at the next Annual Session of the Convention. In accordance with the foregoing clause, the following Committees were appointed to report next year:

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n of the CommitObituaries-Revs. I. E. Bill, Dr. Cramp, J. Davis, D. A. Steele, T. Todd, and G. E. Day.

State of the Denomination-Revs. Dr. Cramp, W. S. McKenzie, and W. H. Warren.

That the Committee who superintend the printing of Minutes, should cause to be sent to each Church, one month before the meeting of the Convention, a blank form, to be filled up by the Church, stating the amounts contributed by the Church, during the year, toward the funds of Acadia College, and the Board of Foreign Missions, and giving the names of the delegates sent to the Convention: these forms to be signed by the Clerk of the Church, and forwarded to the Secretary of the Convention.

The time of the Session was extended fifteen minutes; and Rev. J. W. Willmarth, of New Jersey, presented the claims of the "Bible and Publication Society," with special reference to the Baptist Hymn Book, recently published by that Society.

Adjourned, with prayer by Rev. Jos. Murray.

Afternoon Session, August 26.

Prayer by Rev. W. H. Warren. Minutes of former Session read and approved.

The illowing Resolution was introduced by Dr. Cramp, and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, A Bill has been introduced to the Legislature of Nova Scotia, providing for the establishment of a Provincial University;

And Whereas, If the said Bill should become law, the power to confer Degrees will be taken away from all existing Colleges in Nova Scotia;

Therefore Resolved, 1. That, in the judgment of this Convention, the said Bill, should it become law, will inflict serious injury on the interests of Acadia College; that it will be an act of spoliation, for which there is no just warrant or excuse; and that the operation of the law will fail to secure to the people of Nova Scotia greater educational benefits than are now enjoyed in connection with existing Colleges.

2. That a petition to the Legislature of Nova Scotia against the contemplated measure, signed by the President, Vice-Presidents, and officers of this Convention, be prepared, and presented at the next session of the Legislature, should the aforesaid Bill be re-introduced, or any other Bill, containing similar provisions.

3. That the Governors of the College be requested to bring this question to the consideration of Baptist Churches and congregations in Nova Scotia, with a view to the preparation of petitions against the Bill in every part of the Province.

Resolved, That the Committee on Obituaries have time to prepare their Report, with the request that they forward it as soon as possible.

The following Resolution was moved by Rev. Isaiah Wallace, and adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention hereby recommend to the Agency Committee of the Board of Governors, the desirableness of securing the services of Rev. I. E. Bill as General Agent in raising the proposed endowment of Acadia College.

Rev. I. E. Bill introduced the following Resolution, which was adopted:

This Convention having learned that the health of our esteemed brother, Hon. Judge Johnston, a member of the Board of Governors of Acadia College,

has induced him to seek a residence in Europe;

Therefore Resolved, That we take this opportunity to render to him the tribute which his high character and long-continued and important services in the cause of education seem to demand, by thus recording the sense we entertain of the value of those services, his devoted and consecrated talents, and of his great worth as a man, as a christian gentleman, and especially as a christian Legislator and Judge; the influence and grateful memory of which we trust will not be effaced; and although at his advanced age, it may almost seem to be hoping against hope, yet this Convention would still trust that a perfect restoration to health and strength may yet, in the good providence of God, return our valued brother, as well as his excellent lady, to their former position and relations in this country.

The Secretary was instructed to transmit the foregoing Resolution to Judge Johnston.

The following Resolution was moved by Rev. Dr. Cramp,

and passed unanimously:

Resolved, That the establishment of a non-sectarian system of Common School education in New Brunswick, is regarded by this Convention with great satisfaction, as the only system adapted to the wants of a mixed population, and in harmony with the principles of universal religious freedom; and that it is earnestly to be hoped that a similar system will be introduced and maintained in every Province of the Dominion.

The foregoing Resolution was spoken to by Brother T. H. Rand, Provincial Superintendent of Education, Rev. J. W. Willmarth, and Rev. J. Davis.

Resolved, That the Convention recommend the Board of Governors of Acadia College to continue their annual appeals to the Churches.

This Resolution was followed by remarks by Revs. M. P. Freeman, J. H. Hughes, T. H. Porter, Bro. William Faulkner, Rev. I. Wallace, Bro. J. F. L. Parsons, Rev. W. S. McKenzie; and Dr. Sawyer, in an interesting address, gave a verbal report of the work of the Agency Committee.

Bro. J. F. L. Parsons moved the following Resolution, which was adopted by the Convention:

Resolved, That the Foreign Missionary Board, and the Board of Governors of Acadia College, be requested to have their Reports and Accounts printed in future, so as to put them into the hands of the delegates at the first meeting of the Convention.

Rev. I. E. Bill moved the following Resolution, which was adopted, after remarks by Revs. J. F. Kempton, I. E. Bill, Bros. R. Sanford, E. D. King, Revs. S. March, W. H. Warren, Dr. Sawyer, J. Davis, Bro. Wm. Faulkner, and Rev. Dr. Spurden:

Resolved, That we solemnly pledge ourselves, that on our return home to our respective Churches, we will exert our best influence to secure the proposed endowment of Acadia College.

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. W. G. Parker. Minutes of last session read and approved.

Resolved, That Rev. W. S. McKenzie be requested to furnish a copy of his lecture, delivered before the Ministers' Institute on Thursday last, for publication in our denominational papers.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be hereby expressed to the brethren and friends in St. Stephen, Calais, and vicinity, for their hospitality and kindness in entertaining the members of the Convention during the present Session.

Addresses were delivered on the subject of Education, by Revs. Dr. Sawyer, S. W. DeBlois, and A. Cohoon. Hon. S. L. Tilley being present, was called upon to make some remarks, and responded in a brief and interesting address. Remarks followed by Brother E. D. King, Revs. W. S. Mc-Kenzie and J. Davis; and a collection was taken in aid of the funds of Acadia College.

APPENDIX.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD.

Brethren of the Convention—Under the impulse of a re-awakened zeal, and with a remarkable unanimity of sentiment, you have determined to establish an independent Mission. The Board of Managers was also reconstructed, and ordered to be located in the City of Saint John. Special instructions, to which reference will presently be made, were given to your Board, relating to matters of paramount concern, and imposing responsibilities of no ordinary weight. You have requested your Board to suggest modifications of existing plans of action, and to counsel such methods of future effort as may be deemed essential to the success of your Foreign Mission project. This Annual Report, therefore, must contain much more than a mere account of strictly official services performed during the past year, and will, in consequence, exceed the customary limits of annual reports heretofore rendered to your Convention.

THE BOARD.

One of the members of your Board, Rev. J. W. Titus, a zealous and active brother, died on the seventeenth of last April; and two others, Brethren Hopper and Harley, left the Province early in the year. The brother whom you elected to fill the office of Treasurer, felt himself obliged to decline to serve in that capacity, consequently the New Brunswick membership of the Board was considerably reduced. Usually only six of the fifteen members have been in attendance upon the meetings of the past year, and on several occasions there was not even a constitutional quorum present. Hence business, that should have been despatched without delay, has been necessarily deferred. Such a Board of Managers, so largely entrusted with interests of the gravest character—interests that will hereafter increase in magnitude and importance, as the projected Mission develops more practical and pressing claims—should always be able to assemble at stated meetings, and on special occasions, for deliberation and action. We attach no blame to our absent colleagues. Many of them are at such a distance from the location of the Board, and so occupied with the duties of their respective fields of labor, that it is next to impossible to bring them together for the transaction of the business assigned to the Board.

Permit us to suggest that the three vacancies be filled by business men, resident in the City of Saint John.

TRANSACTIONS OF THE BOARD.

At the first meeting of your Board, convened soon after your last Convention, Hon. A. McL. Seely was chosen permanent chairman, and meetings were ordered to be called monthly. Henry Vaughan, Esq., having declined the service to which you appointed him, the Board elected one of its own members, Z. G. Gabel, Esq., to fill the vacancy. A better selection for the onerous and responsible labors of that office could hardly have been made. As Treasurer, Mr. Gabel has faithfully and efficiently discharged his duties, and is prepared to make such report of his department as cannot but be gratifying to the Convention and creditable to himself. Dr. Cramp, being requested by the Board to assist the Secretary in his official duties, very cordially assented, and has been rendering the Secretary most valuable and prompt assistance. Dr. Cramp has conducted all the foreign correspondence, besides performing other labors of the first importance to the establishment of your projected Mission. The Treasurer was instructed to deposit all Mission moneys received by him in the Bank of New Brunswick, at the rate of four per cent. interest. His books, as Treasurer of the Board, are open at all times for inspection by parties legitimately interested, and are kept in a strictly business style. The Secretary was ordered to provide himself with the materials required for an orderly and permanent preservation of records and of official correspondence. He was also instructed to furnish for publication, in the Messenger and the Visitor, the proceedings of the monthly meetings, that the Churches and individual contributors of Mission funds, might be kept informed of what was transpiring in the counsels of the Board.

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ONTARIO CORRESPONDENCE.

In the published Minutes of last year, it may have been noticed by you that the Board was in correspondence with certain brethren in the Province of Ontario, on the old question under new conditions, whether it is feasible and desirable to unite the energies of the Dominion Baptists in the establishment of a Canada Baptist Foreign Mission Society. That correspondence did not assume any official connection with our brethren in that quarter, but was on their part entirely informal, and no practical results were obtained. It, however, became manifest, and it is now the settled conviction of your Board, that such union and co-operation are not attainable, both they and we holding such relations as cannot well be dissolved. Our brethren of the Upper Provinces are intimately, if not inseparably, linked with the very prosperous Mission among the Teloogoos, and that, too, under an alliance with the American Baptist Missionary Union, an alliance with which the brethren in Ontario and Quebec have no grievance, and which they would hardly agree to cancel. We, on the other hand, are so far committed to a Mission among another people, that union with those brethren in a Teloogoo Mission—such union being a sine qua non in their judgment—would involve alterations in our plans for the present and our designs for the future, such as we can not safely admit. Thus much we deem it necessary to offer in this Report relative to that matter. The correspondence in question is at hand, subject to the call of the Convention, if further information is required.

A KAREN MISSION IN SIAM.

The Board has been, and is yet pursuing the instructions given by you last year, to seek information respecting fields for Foreign Mission effort, to be occupied, in case of our establishing an independent Mission. But your Board is not yet prepared to report any definite results of such inquiries as they have made. Valuable information has been accumulated by correspondence, especially with Rev. Mr. Carpenter, who, on his way to America, a few months since, went through Upper Siam, exploring that country, and making extensive notes of his observations. The facts and impressions gained by him in his tour through Siam, relative to the Karens of that country, have been only partially communicated to us, with the promise of further statements upon his arrival home. The last Annual Report of the Missionary Union, refers to Mr. Carpenter's tour through the Kingdom of Siam, and remarks, that "This visit has long been entertained by Mr. Carpenter, and we look to his observations for a fuller account of their (Eastern Karens) number, character, and state, than we have hitherto been able to gain." The Board is confident that at, or before, the next Convention, it will be fully prepared to report and recommend the location and definite plans for your independent Mission. It will not, we think, be premature and independent to intimate at this time that, in all probability, the final decision will be to open a Mission among the Eastern Karens in the Kingdom of Siam. The idea of entering the Toungoo district must, we suggest, be entirely abandoned. If the Karen people are to be contemplated in our foreign efforts, we must go into SIAM with our Mission. But a complete and definite report on that question must be reserved for your next Convention, at which time, and not before, it will be necessary to take decisive action relative to our field of labor.

SUPPORT OF NATIVE MISSIONARIES.

A single official communication published the past year, and one or two articles from unofficial sources, have gently and cautiously touched the delicate question of specific donations for the support of native preachers in India, and hinting at the necessity that may yet put an arrest upon this kind of effort. Those communications have excited alarm in the mind of our esteemed Brother Crawley, the laborious and successful Burman Missionary of the Baptist Union. Fearing that the native Burman preachers in his field are to be left without the essential support derived from funds passed through your Board, Mr. Crawley has made earnest appeals to the Secretary, and also through the Messenger to the denomination, deprecating, in the most impassioned terms, the proposed and possible withdrawal of such aid from his field of labor.

Now, that question must occasion more or less perplexity in every mind that weighs the interests involved. Your Board and yourselves cannot but share in the emotions of Mr. Crawley, and of other Missionaries of the Baptist Union, who may be materially aided in their efforts to evangelize the heathen by over thirty native laborers supported by funds from these Provinces. And if Mr. Crawley, in the ardor of his Missionary zeal, sees only his side of the question, entirely overlooking the fact of such special effort being adopted some years

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since as only a temporary one, and further, concealing from himself the bearing of such effort, if continued, upon our plans, oversteps, in his appeals, the bounds prescribed by a sober judgment, surely no one will care to hold him to

a strict account, or to restrain his eager words.

Your Board was instructed by you to "take into serious consideration the alterations which it will be desirable to make in your present arrangements," in order to establish and maintain the present projected Mission. One of the fundamental questions thus submitted to us, and which, in the judgment of your Board, should be immediately and seriously reviewed, is that of consuming, in another field and for another Mission Society, the resources upon which you must depend for maintaining your own independent Mission. The time is fast approaching when that separate Mission will, it is hoped, be put into successful operation. There are not yet in the treasury of your Society anything like the amount of funds indispensable for even the opening of such an enterprise as you contemplate. And it is not likely that there will be a sufficient accumulation of funds to meet the demands of the approaching hour of need, if the contributions of our Churches continue to come in as specific donations for the support of native preachers, and that, too, it must be remembered, for preachers on fields occupied by another Missionary organization. Hence your Board feel, and in their judgment all should feel it to be of the greatest importance, that at least some wise economy in respect of that matter should be at once introduced. It is objected that the parties now contributing such specific funds would curtail their contributions, if that specific object is abolished. But it should be remembered that one reason, if not the principal one, for such specific donations from those parties is the fact, that the denomination has hitherto had no Foreign Mission of its own to elicit and employ the Missionary contributions of those parties. We should not cast suspicion upon the earnestness and sincerity of their zeal in their efforts to evangelize the heathen by supposing that they would not be so liberal in their offerings so soon as the denomination opens a channel for Missionary effort of its own. And if there are those among us who would still prefer the support of native laborers, they will speedily have the opportunity for doing that kind of Mission work on their own foreign field. But if the brethren deem it sufficient to support the native laborers on the fields occupied by another Society-if they prefer to continue, what was originally designed to be only partial and temporary, because the denomination had no field of its own in which to use its funds for Foreign Missions, then let that policy be distinctly adopted and proclaimed. But the independent Mission must be thereby crippled, if not crushed. One or the other must, we foresee, be abandoned.

THE CONTINUED SUPPORT OF REV. MR. GEORGE.

Closely allied with the foregoing question is still another, demanding immediate consideration. For a few years you have been supporting one of the Mission families of the Baptist Union in Burmah. Nearly \$4,000 have been expended for the three years of this connection, and that connection still exists, though when formed it was designed to be temporary. Now, if the accumulation of funds for your own Mission is of such paramount importance, then should you relieve yourselves of the future support of Brother George and his family, casting that burden henceforth upon the Society in whose Mission the brother is laboring. Were our proposed Mission to be among the Burmans, for whom Brother George has qualified himself to labor, and he should prefer to enter our service, we ought, in that case, to continue his support, until we are ready to employ him. But there is not the least prospect of our Mission being Burman, and if it is to be Karen, and in another country, as is most probable, Brother George will not be likely to sever his alliance with the Burman Mission to enter our service, nor would it be wise, if he were willing to do so. The time, then, must come, sooner or later, when our present relations to him will close; and the necessity of present financial economy, preparatory to the near demands of our Mission plans, renders it most desirable to terminate those relations at once.

THE ANOMALOUS RELATIONS OF THE FEMALE MISSIONARIES ADJUSTED.

Our Sisters DeWolfe and Norris, after becoming qualified to some extent for Mission service among the Karens, began their labors in fields occupied by the Missionary Union. The Board considered it proper and needful to give an official approval of the course pursued by our female Missionaries, and to order their present connection to be continued until the Board shall be in a position to give those sisters employment in your own chosen field. It was

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subsequently observed that those sisters were under no official direction whatever, that the Society, in whose schools they were teaching, had no directing power over those Missionaries, their movements, and services, and it seemed to be inappropriate, if not intrusive, for your Board to attempt the exercise of such directing authority, even over your own Missionaries, so long as they were serving in the Mission work of another organization. Such a disorderly condition of things it was deemed necessary to rectify without any delay. Accordingly, when last December, the Board learned that Miss Norris had removed from Henthada to Bassein, to teach in the Karen school at the latter station, the Secretary was ordered to instruct both of your female Missionaries to place themselves, for the present, under the direction of the Society in whose service they were employed, at the same time the Executive Committee of the Baptist Union was requested by your Board to control by their counsel the Mission labors of those sisters, so long as they should continue in the service of the Union. This action of your Board does not annul or modify the relations and responsibilities of those sisters to your Society, or to the Woman's Mission Aid Society paying their salaries, but simply and reasonably delegates for the present a directing power to the Society in whose Missions our sisters are employed. Dr. Murdock, in answer to the proposal in question, replied, as follows: "Thankful for the confidence reposed in them by your Board, the Committee accept the trust confided to them, and hope always to exercise it with kindness and with such wisdom as may be granted to them. It will be their aim to consult at once the happiness of the young ladies, and the good of the Missions." In the published Annual Report of the Union, for 872, we find the following record: "The Provincial Board have kindly requested the Executive Committee to exercise such general powers of direction, both in the case of Miss Norris and Miss DeWolfe, as they exercise in the case of other Missionaries, so long as they work in connection with our Missions. The same Report states that Miss Norris, in the Bassein Mission, "is rendering very effective service."

MISS DEWOLFE'S SUPPORT.

Last November the Woman's Mission Aid Society made to your Board the gratifying announcement that they had agreed to assume the support of Miss DeWolfe, in addition to that of Miss Norris, and requested our concurrence with their action. The proposal was gratefully accepted; and the funds for the payment of Miss DeWolfe's salary have been derived from that source since January 1, 1872.

ANOTHER FEMALE MISSIONARY OFFERED.

During the past year another sister, highly commended for piety, gifts, and zeal, has applied to the Woman's Mission Aid Society to be sent into the foreign field, and that organization intimated an ability and willingness to assume the support of an additional Missionary at once. The election and assignment of foreign Missionaries resting with your Board, the application in question was lodged with them. But it was deemed best to defer all such applications until the Board can decide upon the location of an independent Mission.

WOMAN'S MISSION AID SOCIETIES.

The Woman's Mission Aid Societies, within the limits of your Convention, have been advancing in number, zeal, and liberality, during the past year, and give promise of becoming a very essential auxiliary in the work of Foreign Missions. We here submit the Annual Reports of the Central Boards of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE N. S. CENTRAL BOARD.

The Central Board of the Woman's Mission Aid Societies in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, to the Foreign Mission Board at Saint John, N. B.

In reviewing the second year of our existence, we feel that we have great reason for encouragement, and desire to go forward with increased vigor in the work of aiding our dear sisters in Burmah, arousing and keeping up the Missionary spirit at home, and, as soon as practicable, sending forth one or more volunteers, to join those who are now toiling so assiduously and faithfully in the field which is already white for the harvest.

While we would not ignore or undervalue the pressing necessities of Home Mission work in all its branches, we must ever remember, that this is a land of Bibles, education, and gospel privilege, while the Karen people are waiting to be taught the way of life, ready to receive christianity as soon as they can be

instructed. It is with this people our sisters are labouring, and among them Divine Providence may plant our independent Mission. "The harvest is white, but the laborers are few; let us, therefore, pray the Lord of the harvest that

he may send forth laborers."

During the past year, our Societies have raised \$1,304.74, from July 1st, 1871, to June 30th, 1872, being \$374.42 in advance of the previous year. Six new Societies have been formed, and five persons have been made life members. The sum of \$77.96 has been sent in by the children of Sunday Schools, Mission Bands, and a Knitting Circle; and the Central Board has advised the Societies, that in future all such moneys will be devoted to the education of children (orphans especially) in the schools taught by our sisters, Miss De-Wolfe and Miss Norris, and to be expended as their judgment may direct. The Central Board has thought it best to donate \$100 each to our Missionaries for this purpose for the present year.

The co-operation and assistance of the pastors of our Churches is carnestly requested, and is as much needed as ever, to re-kindle flagging zeal, to keep the subject before the people, and especially in aiding the sisters, by giving advice as to the best means of conducting the regular meetings of the Societies, so as to keep up the attendance and interest, thus making them important auxiliaries to our work, when entered into with a zeal and devotion befitting the cause.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE N. B. CENTRAL BOARD.

Report of the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies of New Brunswick, to the Foreign Mission Board in Saint John.

Two years ago this month, our beloved Missionary, Miss Norris, visited our Province, and through her earnest efforts, enlisted the sympathies of christian women in the work of sending the glad tidings of salvation to our benighted sisters in heathen lands, which should be, through God's blessing, the means of releasing them from their bondage, and elevating them to the privileges of christian womanhood.

Twelve Societies were formed through her efforts; and could her stay have been longer in the Province, many others would doubtless have been the result of her visit; for wherever she went, her spirit of devotion to the cause she had espoused, infused itself into the hearts of those who listened, as she

talked of the work in which she was so desirous of being engaged.

The work has not extended through the Province as we could have desired, but we hope another year to be able to report greater progress, as the Churches become better acquainted with the movement. We do not feel discouraged in the work, as we believe the blessing of God has rested upon it. Five new Societies have been formed during the past year, and four ladies residing away from any Society have become annual contributors to our funds. We have now seventeen Societies, all in a prosperous condition, and becoming increasingly interested in the work. Nearly all have reported an increase of membership during the past year. We have one life membership, the first Sackville Church having the honor of constituting their pastor's wife the first life member in the Province. And we hope other Societies will be found to follow their example.

The Treasurer of the Central Board has paid to the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board, since last August, the sum of six hundred and ninety-five dol-

lars (\$695.00).

In connection with the Societies of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, we have been enabled, through the concurrence of the Foreign Mission Board, to adopt Miss DeWolfe as our Missionary, as well as Miss Norris.

The Societies of the St. John Churches, including Portland and Carleton, had the pleasure of sending Miss DeWolfe a box of useful articles, valued at \$100, as a token of their esteem, upon assuming her as our Missionary.

Copies of our Constitution, accompanied with a presentation of the claims of these Societies, have been sent by the Secretary to a number of Churches where no Society exists; but they have, in most cases, failed to meet with the desired response. We now appeal to the pastors of the Churches of New Brunswick present at the Convention, and urge them to bring the matter before the sisters on their return home, feeling that they only need to have it presented to them, to have their sympathies enlisted in the good work.

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The knowledge that the women of India are eagerly asking for the light, and that there are sisters anxious to be sent out as soon as an opportunity offers, should stimulate us to greater exertions; and we trust that those of us who are interested, may be encouraged this year by the addition of many new Societies.

MISS DEWOLFE AND MISS NORRIS.

In a letter, dated Henthada, April 7, 1872, from Rev. D. A. W. Smith, connected with the American Baptist Karen Mission at that station, we have a most favorable report of the studies and labors of Sister DeWolfe. Mr. Smith, after enumerating the various efforts of your Missionary, says: "It is just two years this very month since she joined us in Mission work at this station. It has given me great satisfaction to learn that this change on the part of Miss DeWolfe has met with the approbation of your Board....In all these departments of labor, Miss DeWolfe commends herself as a faithful, persistent, successful worker, and instead of admitting that you are under obligation to me for giving her opportunity to study and labor in preparation for her ultimate position, I feel that the obligations are altogether on my side."

In December, 1871, Miss Norris was about to take work in the Female Karen school in Bassein. Since that date she has been employed most successfully in that school. In eight months from the time of her arrival on the field she had attained, besides a familiar acquaintance with the Sgau Karen dialect, a sufficient knowledge of the Pwo Karen, to be able to take that up at any time with very little trouble. In a letter, she remarks: "I cannot tell how it is that I find so little trouble with the languages." As much of her correspondence, breathing such an earnest spirit of piety, such determined resolution in her work, and such firm reliance on God for success, has already gone before the denomination in the pages of the Messenger and Visitor, we need not reiterate it in this Report. Should our contemplated Mission be located among the Eastern Karens, in the Kingdom of Siam, the acquisitions and experiences obtained by Sisters DeWolfe and Norris, in Henthada and Bassein, will be of immediate and invaluable benefit to such a Mission.

MISSIONARIES ELECT.

Your Missionaries elect, Brethren Sanford and Armstrong, the former for two years, and the latter for one year, have been studying at the Newton Theological Seminary. The President, Rev. Dr. Hovey, reports them to your Board as "Young men of decided ability, and faithful in all their duties as students." Your Board would commend these young brethren, as well as your Missionaries in the field, to your continued and earnest prayers.

We append to this Report, to be published in the Convention Minutes, the latest list of native laborers, Burman and Karen, supported by funds passed through your Board.

The studies of the year, have been conducted in accordance with the published Curriculum.

The following extracts from the Report of the President, to your Board, in June last, are herewith presented.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The internal affairs of the College have continued through the year without essential modification from the condition of the last few years. No marked variation has occurred in the numbers in attendance. We have had about forty

different names on the roll for the year.

Sixteen presented themselves for examination at the opening of this year, twelve of whom passed, and have kept their places in the class until the present time. About the same number will probably be prepared to enter during the coming year; and this appears to be what we must expect until more thorough interest is felt in the preparatory schools. Our students come almost exclusively from one Academy, a condition of things without parallel, so far as I can learn, in the history of Colleges.

The students in attendance have, on the whole, been marked by propriety of deportment, and a commendable degree of attention to their work. The pre-

scribed course of study has been faithfully preserved.

It should be added that the requirements for matriculation have been considerably advanced during the year. So far as we can reach the facts, it seems that no other institution in the Maritime Provinces is doing so much towards

raising the grade of scholarship requisite for entering College.

I believe that a healthful tone of morality is cherished by the body of the students, although occasionally an instance of departure from rectitude may occur. More than one half of the number are members of Churches, and a large proportion of those are studying with a view to ministerial labour. The year has not been marked by special religious interest; yet I am assured that it is the purpose of the Faculty to enter upon their respective duties with their various classes, every day impressed with the conviction that the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.

Rev. Mr. Balcom, during his agency for the College, collected a sum of money for the purpose of providing some more convenient chapel accommodation for the College. The money has been expended in fitting up a room on the second floor in the rear of the Academy, and in making a proper entrance to it. This change gives great relief to the Library, and has proved of great

advantage in various respects.

Soon after the commencement of the present College year, the Treasurer received from the executors of the will of the late Mrs. John Harris, the sum of \$400, which she had very considerately granted for refurnishing and improving the College Library-room. The gentleman who framed the codicil of the Will, by which this money was secured to the College, informed me that it was to be expended under the direction of the President. Arrangements were accordingly made to have the room put in good condition, and new furniture placed in it before the close of the year. Probably not much more than one half of the whole amount will be needed to meet the expense thus incurred. The accounts of this expenditure, and the proper vouchers, will be lodged in the hands of the Treasurer as soon as possible. The balance will lie subject to your order, to be expended at some future time for the object designated.

The Report of the Principal of the Theological department is here subjoined:

THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

In making a report of the studies in this department during the Academical year, it may be repeated, that the Senior class in the College course not containing any candidates for the ministry of the gospel, there were no students to form the class in Hebrew grammar.

In regard to the advanced studies proposed for a fifth year, it may be sufficient for the information of the government, to refer to the calendar, and to mention, that the course of Theological study there projected, was fully followed out in the various branches.

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serious consideration be given to the fact, that so large a number of graduates of this College and others on whose attendance in the Theological studies here provided the success of our incipient undertaking greatly depended, have failed to become members of the several classes in this department, and were, it is supposed, to be found in other Institutions during the year.

It appears plain that earnest and strenuous effort is called for in the use of all proper influences to retain our own students in the country, and to combine all our strength for the maintenance and growth of our own Institutions.

At the meeting of your Board, in December last, it was found, from the report of the Finance Committee, that the services of a suitable agent for the Provinces could not be obtained. It was hoped that a series of Educational Meetings would be held in different sections, where it would be feasible for the President and other members of the Faculty to attend, and present the claims of the College. Something in this way was accomplished; but the extreme severity of the weather, and difficulties in travelling, interfered greatly. At the different Associations in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, the matter of endowment was strongly urged, and cordially responded to. It remains for this Convention to mature such measures as will meet the pressing exigencies of our Institution. Your Board believe it to be a question of life or death, and our aim should be to reach the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, making a strenuous effort for at least twenty-five thousand the coming year.

Wm. Elder, Esq., A. M., Professor of Natural Science, has tendered his resignation of the post so ably filled by him during the past three years. This

resignation your Board were reluctantly compelled to accept.

It becomes the painful duty of your Board again to report a vacancy in their number, caused by the death of Rev. J. E. Balcom, in June last. An enthusiastic lover of our College—a large portion of the latter years of his life was given for her benefit. His services, until debarred by illness, cannot be too gratefully acknowledged. Such a loss cannot easily be repaired; but we bow in submission to the will of Him, who doubtless had a more excellent service for our brother in that world where His servants shall serve Him, and shall see His face.

The removal of Rev. E. C. Cady from the Provinces, has caused another vacancy—both of which can be filled at this session of your body.

It must be acknowledged that the state of the Churches, as represented in these statistics, is far from satisfactory. The number of conversions during the year, indicated by the baptisms, averages nearly four to a Church in Nova Scotia, and not quite one-and-a-half in New Brunswick. The nett increase in these two Provinces is about 2½ per cent., a slight advance on last year's returns. The number of baptisms in Prince Edward Island, averages not quite three to a Church.

In the Nova Scotia Western Association there have been some merciful outpourings of blessing; but the Eastern Association of that Province, and the Western of New Brunswick, have suffered a slight decrease. Believers, in those districts, lament the slow progress of the truth. The hearers are many; but the word preached does not profit some, not being mixed with faith: and perhaps it would be advisable for believers themselves to inquire whether some of the Saviour's rebukes in the letters to the seven Churches in Asia do not apply to them.

Four new Churches have been constituted—at Little Glace Bay, C. B.; Milton, Yarmouth; Margaret's Bay (second), N. S.; and Ellershouse, Hants Co., N. S. New meeting houses have been opened at Billtown, Cornwallis; Yarmouth (Temple Church); Brooklyn, Queen's County—all in Nova Scotia—and probably

An insufficient supply of ministers is still to be deplored. There are 163 Churches in Nova Scotia, but only 58 pastors: in New Brunswick there are but 45 pastors to 134 Churches. It is true, that in several instances ministering brethren spread their labours over two or three Churches, and thus endeavour (though inadequately) to compensate for the deficiency; yet still, 73 Churches in Nova Scotia and 59 in New Brunswick, are reported as entirely destitute of pastoral labour. If it be said that many of those Churches are small, and unable to support pastors, the fact may be admitted; but the inference will be that the number of home missionaries should be greatly increased, and the terms of their appointments lengthened. The home missionary work of the denomination is as yet but imperfectly done. If five missionaries were permanently employed in each Province, besides occasional assistance rendered to weak Churches, there would be ample scope for energy, and the benefits to the good cause would be incalculable.

Your Committee cannot but express their regret at the small success of the effort to endow Acadia College, and at the comparative indifference of many of our Churches to the educational interests of our denomination, generally. The Baptists of these Provinces have rendered essential service to education for more than forty years past, and the people are largely indebted to them for the wholesome influence of their efforts and their example. It will be a great misfortune if now, when more strenuous endeavours are required, to keep pace with the times, and especially to provide adequate instruction for the rising ministry, there should be any falling off of funds, or failure to realize the full force of the responsibilities resting on us. The material prosperity of the Provinces calls for a liberal tribute to our institutions of learning, which ought to be placed on a firm basis of endowment, yielding a sufficient income for the support of professors in all the departments of instruction.

But underlying these, and all other things that are deemed desirable, is a still greater need. It is not enough that we give and act, in accordance, in some degree, with the claims of important objects. The giving and the acting must spring from a right source, or they will be of ephemeral duration and destitute of blessing. That source is intelligent, heartfelt, continuous godliness; intelligent, because it can give "a reason of the hope"; heartfelt, being tinged with the blood of the cross; continuous, unlike the Eastern torrent, that is dried up half the year, but rather symbolised by the perennial stream in some temperate clime, that flows on from January to December, blessed and blessing. The religion of many professors is cold and unfruitful, for want of culture. It is not cared for. The soil is not stirred, nor the weeds cut up; it is left to itself. Here, the thorns spring up and choke it; there, the plant dies away for lack of moisture, or becomes such a dwindling, thread-like stem, that it is more dead than alive. What is needed among us, we repeat, is intelligent, heartfelt, continuous godliness; and that, not as a distinction of here and there a gifted one, but the characteristic of all. The "higher christian life," as it is sometimes termed, is the privilege and duty of all believers. When it shall be generally attained, the Church will "arise and shine, because her light is come, and because the glory of the Lord is risen upon her"

These blessings are to be diligently sought. He who "heareth prayer" will reward the faith of his people, and give effect to holy industry.

The Committee repeat the recommendation of former years, that the Churches set apart a day for united humiliation and prayer.

IN MEMORIAM.

According to his wont, death has again been reaping his harvest among our ministering brethren. Your Committee report as follows in regard to such brethren, availing themselves largely of accounts previously published elsewhere.

REV. T. BLEAKNEY, who was ordained to the work of the Christian Ministry, in Albert County, N. B., in 1861, departed this life, February 21st, 1872.

He was a devoted, energetic and successful minister of the Gospel of Christ. His ministry in Albert County, and more especially in Dorchester, was rich in good fruits. He was an earnest and able advocate of the Temperance Reform, and devoted much time and talent to its advancement. His pastorate at Woodstock was cut short by the resistless power of death, but it was sufficiently long to give him a large place in the affections and confidence of the people as a sincere Christian, and as an able minister of the New Testament. His sudden and unexpected departure to the spirit world has been felt to be a sad loss, not only to his family and to his Church at Woodstock, but also to the denomination at large.

REV. JOHN W. TITUS, the late beloved pastor of the Pitt Street Baptist Church, St. John, has also been numbered with the dead. He was ordained to the pastorate of the church in Pitt Street, St. John, in 1869, and was called to his rest in April 1872.

Brother Titus was emphatically a Gospel missionary in spirit and in life. Not satisfied with preaching the Gospel publicly, he was accustomed to carry its rich treasures of grace and love from house to house, and in the abodes of poverty, suffering, and death, to pour its precious consolations into the hearts of the afflicted and sorrowful. He was a good man, and laboured earnestly and constantly to do good to others, and was therefore highly esteemed, not only by the Pitt Street Church, but by the Churches of the City generally, for his devotion to the Master and to the salvation of souls.

REV. BENJAMIN SCOTT. This brother, honored and beloved, was born at Yarmouth, N. S., May 27, 1808. He was born again somewhere about the years 1827-8. Having previously left Yarmouth with his parents, he was then on a visit to his native place. There were extensive revival movements at this time among the Yarmouth Baptists, in connection with the labours of the Revs. Harris Harding and Thomas Ansley; and some three hundred persons were led to profess the religion of the Gospel. Among these young Scott obtained a joyful hope, and was baptized by Elder Harris Harding, in April 1828. Returning to Port Hood, C. B., where his family then resided, he began to work for Christ in his father's household, which was a large one, and among his friends in the neighbourhood; holding meetings in his father's house on Lord's day afternoons. These meetings were not without their good fruit. The young evangelist then began to preach at Mabou, C. B., on the Strait, and at the Cape of Canso, and at several places adjacent. Seeking to return to Port Hood, the vessel in which he was embarked was driven from her course, and Mr. Scott was thus taken to Prince Edward Island, to which the vessel belonged. On December 4, 1830, he was landed at Lot 49, a few miles to the east of Charlottetown. The hand of the Lord was in this clearly manifested. Henceforth, until the year 1852, some twenty-two years, Mr. Scott laboured much for the Island, and was greatly prospered. In connection with his labours, if not wholly as their result, Baptist Churches were formed and built up at Lot 49 (now known as Alexandra), at North River, at St. Peter's Road, in Charlottetown, at Grand River, and at Cavendish. He was ordained at Lot 49, in September 1832, the Revs. E. Manning and T. S. Harding officiating on the occasion. He laid himself out to promote the erection of meeting houses on the Island; and Lot 49, Charlottetown, Grand River, Cavendish, and Saint Eleanor's profited by his labours in this department. The record of his faithful and useful efforts during the period here indicated, could it be given in detail, would occupy a large space. In the summer of 1849, New Brunswick also shared in his Missionary labours. In 1852, he left Prince Edward Island.

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After this he travelled and evangelized through portions of the United States. Returning to New Brunswick, he laboured for a while at Portland, St. John. He then entered the service of the New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Board. While thus engaged he was enabled to establish Churches at Shediac, and at Newcastle, Miramichi. At Shediac, too, at Newcastle, and at North Esk, he took a leading and efficient part in the erection of meeting houses. Thus were several years of his life most usefully occupied. In November 1856, he removed to Nova Scotia, where he performed much Missionary work. While thus engaged he assisted in the organization of five Churches, and in the erection of a meeting house on the Shubenacadie, By and by, in 1858, he settled at Onslow. Here, and at Onslow East, he spent the closing years of his life. He baptized some ninety-three persons during this period. His last illness was short. On Lord's day, April 28, in the current year, he travelled from Truro, to which place he had removed in the previous week, to Onslow East, preached, and returned home to die. 1 Cor. xv. 2 was the text of his last sermon. He passed away on Wednesday, May 1. His last words were, "All is well—I am going home—heaven—happy." It may be said of him, as Luke says of Barnabas, "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith: and much people was added unto the Lord."

REV. James E. Balcom departed this life June 6, 1872, aged 46. For nine-teen years he faithfully declared the Gospel. On Long Island, N. S., the scene of his ordination, at Amherst, Great Village, and Hantsport,—in each of these places many have been raised up to call the Saviour biessed through his instrumentality. As a pastor he was affectionate, prompt, systematic, and indefatigable. As a preacher he was sound in doctrine, concise and clear in enunciation, earnest and tender in admonition. He was possessed of a fine business talent, and never failed to elevate the financial as well as the spiritual condition of his charge. He was a devoted friend of education, and laboured assiduously to advance our institutions of learning, devoting much of his valuable time gratuitously to the endowment of Acadia College.

From his dying bed he sent loving messages to those once under his care. "Tell them," said he, "that the Gospel which I preached to them is my support in a dying hour." Shortly before his end he asked his physician, "Doctor, how long have I to stay here?" On being told, "Not more than twenty-four hours," he replied, "Thank you, doctor, now I will go to sleep," and soon after fell into that "blessed sleep from which none ever wakes to weep."

Brother Henby McLatchey, Licentiate, has gone to his reward. He was an humble and devoted man of God, and in his removal the Church has sustained a great loss. His labours were principally confined to Albert County, N. B., though he often visited other parts, and his efforts were wont to be well received and appreciated. He took a lively interest in Sabbath Schools.

Obadiah Parker, Licentiate, of Lunenburg, N. S., departed this life in the triumphs of faith, December 19, 1871. He was converted in early life. Having removed to Bridgewater, for some years he filled the office of deacon in the Bridgewater Church, from which he received a license to preach the Gospel. He subsequently removed to Lunenburg, and became a licentiate of that Church, exercising his gifts as opportunity offered, chiefly within the Churches in his own neighbourhood. He was sound in doctrine, exceedingly useful in the Sabbath school, and his ministrations were highly acceptable.

Senator C. R. Bill, deacon of the third Cornwallis Baptist Church, and here-tofore a member of the Board of Governors of Acadia College, is also numbered with the dead. His life was largely devoted to the public interests of his country, and to the welfare of the community in which he dwelt. The poor especially found in him a benefactor and friend. This Convention is glad to learn that, in his last will and testament are found valuable bequests to Home and Foreign Missions; thus embalming his name in the grateful remembrance of all who love the Saviour, and pray for the coming of his kingdom. He "rests from his labours, and his works do follow him."

CONSTITUTION.

1. This Convention shall be known as the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Equard Island.

2. The object of the Convention shall be to maintain Acadia College, and other Educational interests of the body; as also its Foreign Missionary opera-

tions; and to advance the general interests of the denomination.

3. The Convention shall be composed as follows:—1st. Each of the Baptist Associations, within the limits of the Convention, shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention, five of its own members as delegates to represent it therein. 2d. Every Church connected with either of the above-named Associations, and contributing toward the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional delegate for every twenty dollars someontributed; provided, that no Church be at liberty to send more than five delegates. 3rd. Every ordained Baptist minister connected with one of the above Churches, shall be a member. 4th. Any member of one of these Churches, who shall contribute five dollars annually, or fifty dollars at one time, towards the objects of the Convention, shall be a member.

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3. The officers of the Convention shall be chosen annually from its members, and shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, residing in the Province in which the Convention is at the time in session, and an Assistant Secretary, chosen from one of the other Provinces.

5. The Convention shall meet on the first Saturday after the 19th of August, annually, at such place as shall be agreed on by the body, when, in addition to the election of officers and the transaction of such other business as may be brought before the body, in accordance with Art. 2 of this Constitution, a Board of Foreign Missions shall be chosen, consisting of fifteen members of the Convention; also, a Ministerial Education Board, or Boards, of seven members each. One-third of the members of each of these Boards shall form a quorum. The Convention shall also fill any vacancies that may have occurred in the Board of Governors of Acadia College, and shall, once in three years, appoint six new members in place of six who will then go out in rotation, in accordance with the Resolution passed by the Convention in September 1859 and in accordance with the Act 14 Vict., of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, cap. 37.

6. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Con-

vention, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. Every sitting shall be opened and closed with prayer.

- 2. Persons invited to a seat, may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.
 - 3. No member shall absent himself without leave of the body.
- 4. No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion, unless by permission of the body.
- 5. Motions made and lost, shall not be recorded in the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.
- 6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention, these rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair.

The Committee appointed to nominate persons to fill vacancies in the Board of Governors of Acadia College, reported, recommending Z. G. Gabel, Esquire, in place of Rev. E. C. Cady, removed, and Benj. Douglas, Esquire, in place of Rev. J. E. Balcom, deceased. These brethren were elected by ballot.

Resolved, That Rev. Dr. Spurden be appointed to preach the sermon next year, and that Rev. W. S. McKenzie be the alternate.

The Committee of Nomination reported, nominating the Board of Foreign Missions for the ensuing year. The report was adopted, and the Board elected.

Resolved, That the Ministerial Education Board of Nova Scotia, be re-appointed; and that Rev. D. Freeman be Chairman of said Board, and J. W. Barss, Esq., Treasurer.

Afternoon Session, August 24.

Prayer by Rev. G. D. Cox. Minutes of former Session read and approved.

Resolved, That the Convention take up at once the subject of Foreign Missions, in order that the business before us may be brought to a close on Monday evening.

Resolved, That the next meeting of the Convention be held at Windsor, N. S.

The following Resolution was introduced by Rev. Dr. Cramp, and cordially adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention, assembled on the anniversary of the massacre of the Protestants in Paris, three hundred years ago this day—a massacre exceeding in horror all similar events recorded in history, inasmuch as it was perpetrated in the name of religion, and for the purpose of suppressing freedom of thought and action in things spiritual—takes this opportunity to express abhorrence of the principles and spirit of Romanism, which were embodied in that massacre; regret at the adoption of principles closely resembling those of the Church of Rome, and therefore inimical to enlightened godliness, by a large number of persons in Great Britain and many in North America; gratitude for the occurrence of recent movements on the Continent of Europe, indicative of a revival of evangelical religion; and confidence in the grace and faithfulness of the Head of the Church, who will at last "consume" that wicked one "with the spirit of his mouth," and "destroy him with the brightness of his coming."

The Committee on the State of the Denomination presented their Report, which was adopted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes. (See Appendix.)

Resolved, That the Churches be recommended to set apart the first day of January next as a Day of Humiliation and Prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Resolved, That Revs. D. M. Welton, W. B. Boggs, and J. B. McDonald, M. D., be a Committee to make applica-

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Rev A o tion to the proper authorities for the usual reduction of fares by Railway and Steamboat lines, for those attending the Convention at Windsor next year.

The Report of the Board of Foreign Missions was read by the Secretary, Rev. W. S. McKenzie, and after some

remarks, was adopted.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Foreign Missionary Board inform the American Baptist Missionary Union, that on account of our being about to undertake an Independent Mission, we cannot longer contribute to the sup-

port of Brother George.

Resolved, That the Convention would again recommend to the Board of Foreign Missions, to bring the claims of our independent Mission specially before the attention of the Churches and individuals now supporting native preachers and teachers in Burmah, with a view of securing such control over the appropriation of these funds as may seem to the Board best calculated to promote the interests of the Foreign Missionary efforts in charge of this Convention.

Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed to consider certain modifications that have been suggested as advisable in our Constitution and mode of procedure; and to report during this session of the Convention. Professor D. F. Higgins, H. C. Creed, Esq., and Rev. J. H. Saunders were appointed as the Committee.

The Auditing Committee reported, that they had examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission

Board, and found them correct.

Voted to adjourn. Prayer by Rev. D. A. Steele.

Evening Session, August 24.

The meeting opened with prayer by Rev. J. Davis.

Minutes of previous session read and approved.

The Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board being too ill to be present, his Report was presented by Rev. W. S. McKenzie. Report referred to the Board.

The 834th hymn was sung, and the lxxii. Psalm read, and prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. Cramp. Addresses were then delivered on the subject of Foreign Missions by Revs. Dr. Murdock, W. S. McKenzie, and S. B. Kempton. A collection was taken, and the meeting closed with prayer by the President.

Monday Forenoon Session, August 26.

The annual sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Crawley, from the words in Acts xx. 35, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." A collection was taken towards the current expenses of Acadia College. Prayer was offered by Rev. I. Wallace.

The Committee of Arrangements reported, recommending that the Report of the Governors of Acadia College be taken up immediately after the sermon; and that the time of this Session be extended fifteen minutes, for Rev. J. W. Willmarth to present the claims of the "Bible and Publication Society."

The following Resolution was introduced by Rev. I. E. Bill, and passed unanimously:

Whereas, The financial relations, which have so long existed between this Convention and the American Baptist Missionary Union, in regard to the work of Foreign Missions, are about to terminate, for the purpose of giving place to the establishment of an independent Mission in some section of the great heathen world;

Therefore Resolved, That we embrace the present favorable juncture to place upon record our grateful appreciation of the uniform courtesy and christian kindness extended by our American brethren to our Missionaries in the foreign field, and at the same time to express our heartfelt gratitude for the fraternal visits of the representative brethren of the Missionary Union from year to year, and for their wise counsels, and wholesome instructions, so important to us at this stage of our Missionary work. Especially would we tender our most cordial thanks to our highly esteemed brother, Rev. Dr. Murdock, the Foreign Secretary of the Union, for his present visit to this body, and for his manly Christian utterances, so full of cheer and of good will, and so valuable in their relation to our present action and future course. May heaven's choicest blessings rest upon our brother, and upon the noble Missionary enterprise which he so ably represents.

Resolved, That Rev. Dr. Crawley be requested to furnish his sermon, delivered this morning, for publication in our denominational papers.

The Annual Report of the Board of Governors of Acadia College was read by the Secretary, Rev. S. W. DeBlois. The Report was adopted, and ordered to be printed with the Minutes.

In the absence of the Treasurer of Acadia College, his Report was presented by Rev. Dr. Sawyer, and adopted.

The Committee on proposed changes in the Constitution, reported. The clause of the Report relating to the Constitution was referred to the Committee, with the understanding that they will publish any changes they propose, a month before the next Convention. The following portion of the Report was adopted:

That the Committee on Obituaries, and also that on the State of the Denomination, be appointed each year, to report at the next Annual Session of the Convention. In accordance with the foregoing clause, the following Committees were appointed to report next year:

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Obituaries-Revs. I. E. Bill, Dr. Cramp, J. Davis, D. A. Steele, T. Todd, and G. E. Day.

State of the Denomination—Revs. Dr. Cramp, W. S. McKenzie, and W. H. Warren.

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That the Committee who superintend the printing of Minutes, should cause to be sent to each Church, one month before the meeting of the Convention, a blank form, to be filled up by the Church, stating the amounts contributed by the Church, during the year, toward the funds of Acadia College, and the Board of Foreign Missions, and giving the names of the delegates sent to the Convention: these forms to be signed by the Clerk of the Church, and forwarded to the Secretary of the Convention.

The time of the Session was extended fifteen minutes; and Rev. J. W. Willmarth, of New Jersey, presented the claims of the "Bible and Publication Society," with special reference to the Baptist Hymn Book, recently published by that Society.

Adjourned, with prayer by Rev. Jos. Murray.

Afternoon Session, August 26.

Prayer by Rev. W. H. Warren. Minutes of former Session read and approved.

The pllowing Resolution was introduced by Dr. Cramp, and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, A Bill has been introduced to the Legislature of Nova Scotia, providing for the establishment of a Provincial University;

And Whereas, If the said Bill should become law, the power to confer Degrees will be taken away from all existing Colleges in Nova Scotia;

Therefore Resolved, 1. That, in the judgment of this Convention, the said Bill, should it become law, will inflict serious injury on the interests of Acadia College; that it will be an act of spoliation, for which there is no just warrant or excuse; and that the operation of the law will fail to secure to the people of Nova Scotia greater educational benefits than are now enjoyed in connection with existing Colleges.

2. That a petition to the Legislature of Nova Scotia against the contemplated measure, signed by the President, Vice-Presidents, and officers of this Convention, be prepared, and presented at the next session of the Legislature, should the aforesaid Bill be re-introduced, or any other Bill, containing similar provisions

3. That the Governors of the College be requested to bring this question to the consideration of Baptist Churches and congregations in Nova Scotia, with a view to the preparation of petitions against the Bill in every part of the Province.

Resolved, That the Committee on Obituaries have time to prepare their Report, with the request that they forward it as soon as possible.

The following Resolution was moved by Rev. Isaiah Wallace, and adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention hereby recommend to the Agency Committee of the Board of Governors, the desirableness of securing the services of Rev. I. E. Bill as General Agent in raising the proposed endowment of Acadia College.

Rev. I. E. Bill introduced the following Resolution, which was adopted:

This Convention having learned that the health of our esteemed brother, Hon. Judge Johnston, a member of the Board of Governors of Acadia College,

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has induced him to seek a residence in Europe;

Therefore Resolved, That we take this opportunity to render to him the tribute which his high character and long-continued and important services in the cause of education seem to demand, by thus recording the sense we entertain of the value of those services, his devoted and consecrated talents, and of his great worth as a man, as a christian gentleman, and especially as a christian Legislator and Judge; the influence and grateful memory of which we trust will not be effaced; and although at his advanced age, it may almost seem to be hoping against hope, yet this Convention would still trust that a perfect restoration to health and strength may yet, in the good providence of God, return our valued brother, as well as his excellent lady, to their former position and relations in this country.

The Secretary was instructed to transmit the foregoing Resolution to Judge Johnston.

The following Resolution was moved by Rev. Dr. Cramp, and passed unanimously:

Resolved, That the establishment of a non-sectarian system of Common School education in New Brunswick, is regarded by this Convention with great satisfaction, as the only system adapted to the wants of a mixed population, and in harmony with the principles of universal religious freedom; and that it is earnestly to be hoped that a similar system will be introduced and maintained in every Province of the Dominion.

The foregoing Resolution was spoken to by Brother T. H. Rand, Provincial Superintendent of Education, Rev. J. W. Willmarth, and Rev. J. Davis.

Resolved, That the Convention recommend the Board of Governors of Acadia College to continue their annual appeals to the Churches.

This Resolution was followed by remarks by Revs. M. P. Freeman, J. H. Hughes, T. H. Porter, Bro. William Faulkner, Rev. I. Wallace, Bro. J. F. L. Parsons, Rev. W. S. McKenzie; and Dr. Sawyer, in an interesting address, gave a verbal report of the work of the Agency Committee.

Bro. J. F. L. Parsons moved the following Resolution, which was adopted by the Convention:

Resolved, That the Foreign Missionary Board, and the Board of Governors of Acadia College, be requested to have their Reports and Accounts printed in future, so as to put them into the hands of the delegates at the first meeting of the Convention.

Rev. I. E. Bill moved the following Resolution, which was adopted, after remarks by Revs. J. F. Kempton, I. E. Bill, Bros. R. Sanford, E. D. King, Revs. S. March, W. H. Warren, Dr. Sawyer, J. Davis, Bro. Wm. Faulkner, and Rev. Dr. Spurden:

Resolved, That we solemnly pledge ourselves, that on our return home to our respective Churches, we will exert our best influence to secure the proposed endowment of Acadia College.

Evening Session, August 26.

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. W. G. Parker. Minutes of last session read and approved.

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Resolved, That Rev. W. S. McKenzie be requested to furnish a copy of his lecture, delivered before the Ministers' Institute on Thursday last, for publication in our denominational papers.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be hereby expressed to the brethren and friends in St. Stephen, Calais, and vicinity, for their hospitality and kindness in entertaining the members of the Convention during the present Session.

Addresses were delivered on the subject of Education, by Revs. Dr. Sawyer, S. W. DeBlois, and A. Cohoon. Hon. S. L. Tilley being present, was called upon to make some remarks, and responded in a brief and interesting address. Remarks followed by Brother E. D. King, Revs. W. S. Mc-Kenzie and J. Davis; and a collection was taken in aid of the funds of Acadia College.

APPENDIX.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD.

Brethren of the Convention—Under the impulse of a re-awakened zeal, and with a remarkable unanimity of sentiment, you have determined to establish an independent Mission. The Board of Managers was also reconstructed, and ordered to be located in the City of Saint John. Special instructions, to which reference will presently be made, were given to your Board, relating to matters of paramount concern, and imposing responsibilities of no ordinary weight. You have requested your Board to suggest modifications of existing plans of action, and to counsel such methods of future effort as may be deemed essential to the success of your Foreign Mission project. This Annual Report, therefore, must contain much more than a mere account of strictly official services performed during the past year, and will, in consequence, exceed the customary limits of annual reports heretofore rendered to your Convention.

THE BOARD.

One of the members of your Board, Rev. J. W. Titus, a zealous and active brother, died on the seventeenth of last April; and two others, Brethren Hopper and Harley, left the Province early in the year. The brother whom you elected to fill the office of Treasurer, felt himself obliged to decline to serve in that capacity, consequently the New Brunswick membership of the Board was considerably reduced. Usually only six of the fifteen members have been in attendance upon the meetings of the past year, and on several occasions there was not even a constitutional quorum present. Hence business, that should have been despatched without delay, has been necessarily deferred. Such a Board of Managers, so largely entrusted with interests of the gravest character—interests that will hereafter increase in magnitude and importance, as the projected Mission develops more practical and pressing claims—should always be able to assemble at stated meetings, and on special occasions, for deliberation and action. We attach no blame to our absent colleagues. Many of them are at such a distance from the location of the Board, and so occupied with the duties of their respective fields of labor, that it is next to impossible to bring them together for the transaction of the business assigned to the Board.

Permit us to suggest that the three vacancies be filled by business men, resident in the City of Saint John.

TRANSACTIONS OF THE BOARD.

At the first meeting of your Board, convened soon after your last Convention, Hon. A. McL. Seely was chosen permanent chairman, and meetings were ordered to be called monthly. Henry Vaughan, Esq., having declined the service to which you appointed him, the Board elected one of its own members, Z. G. Gabel, Esq., to fill the vacancy. A better selection for the onerous and responsible labors of that office could hardly have been made. As Treasurer, Mr. Gabel has faithfully and efficiently discharged his duties, and is prepared to make such report of his department as cannot but be gratifying to the Convention and creditable to himself. Dr. Cramp, being requested by the Board to assist the Secretary in his official duties, very cordially assented, and has been rendering the Secretary most valuable and prompt assistance. Dr. Cramp has conducted all the foreign correspondence, besides performing other labors of the first importance to the establishment of your projected Mission. The Treasurer was instructed to deposit all Mission moneys received by him in the Bank of New Brunswick, at the rate of four per cent. interest. His books, as Treasurer of the Board, are open at all times for inspection by parties legitimately interested, and are kept in a strictly business style. The Secretary was ordered to provide himself with the materials required for an orderly and permanent preservation of records and of official correspondence. He was also instructed to furnish for publication, in the Messenger and the Visitor, the proceedings of the monthly meetings, that the Churches and individual contributors of Mission funds, might be kept informed of what was transpiring in the counsels of the Board.

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ONTARIO CORRESPONDENCE.

In the published Minutes of last year, it may have been noticed by you that the Board was in correspondence with certain brethren in the Province of Ontario, on the old question under new conditions, whether it is feasible and desirable to unite the energies of the Dominion Baptists in the establishment of a Canada Baptist Foreign Mission Society. That correspondence did not assume any official connection with our brethren in that quarter, but was on their part entirely informal, and no practical results were obtained. It, however, became manifest, and it is now the settled conviction of your Board, that such union and co-operation are not attainable, both they and we holding such relations as cannot well be dissolved. Our brethren of the Upper Provinces are intimately, if not inseparably, linked with the very prosperous Mission among the Teloogoos, and that, too, under an alliance with the American Baptist Missionary Union, an alliance with which the brethren in Ontario and Quebec have no grievance, and which they would hardly agree to cancel. We, on the other hand, are so far committed to a Mission among another people, that union with those brethren in a Teloogoo Mission—such union being a sine qua non in their judgment-would involve alterations in our plans for the present and our designs for the future, such as we can not safely admit. Thus much we deem it necessary to offer in this Report relative to that matter. The correspondence in question is at hand, subject to the call of the Convention, if further information is required.

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A KAREN MISSION IN SIAM.

The Board has been, and is yet pursuing the instructions given by you last year, to seek information respecting fields for Foreign Mission effort, to be occupied, in case of our establishing an independent Mission. But your Board is not yet prepared to report any definite results of such inquiries as they have made. Valuable information has been accumulated by correspondence, especially with Rev. Mr. Carpenter, who, on his way to America, a few months since, went through Upper Siam, exploring that country, and making extensive notes of his observations. The facts and impressions gained by him in his tour through Siam, relative to the Karens of that country, have been only partially communicated to us, with the promise of further statements upon his arrival home. The last Annual Report of the Missionary Union, refers to Mr. Carpenter's tour through the Kingdom of Siam, and remarks, that "This visit has long been entertained by Mr. Carpenter, and we look to his observations for a fuller account of their (Eastern Karens) number, character, and state, than we have hitherto been able to gain." The Board is confident that at, or before, the next Convention, it will be fully prepared to report and recommend the location and definite plans for your independent Mission. It will not, we think, be premature and independent to intimate at this time that, in all probability, the final decision will be to open a Mission among the Eastern Karens in the Kingdom of Siam. The idea of entering the Toungoo district must, we suggest, be entirely abandoned. If the Karen people are to be contemplated in our foreign efforts, we must go into SIAM with our Mission. But a complete and definite report on that question must be reserved for your next Convention, at which time, and not before, it will be necessary to take decisive action relative to our field of labor.

SUPPORT OF NATIVE MISSIONARIES.

A single official communication published the past year, and one or two articles from unofficial sources, have gently and cautiously touched the delicate question of specific donations for the support of native preachers in India, and hinting at the necessity that may yet put an arrest upon this kind of effort. Those communications have excited alarm in the mind of our esteemed Brother Crawley, the laborious and successful Burman Missionary of the Baptist Union. Fearing that the native Burman preachers in his field are to be left without the essential support derived from funds passed through your Board, Mr. Crawley has made earnest appeals to the Secretary, and also through the Messenger to the denomination, deprecating, in the most impassioned terms, the proposed and possible withdrawal of such aid from his field of labor.

Now, that question must occasion more or less perplexity in every mind that weighs the interests involved. Your Board and yourselves cannot but share in the emotions of Mr. Crawley, and of other Missionaries of the Baptist Union, who may be materially aided in their efforts to evangelize the heathen by over thirty native laborers supported by funds from these Provinces. And if Mr. Crawley, in the ardor of his Missionary zeal, sees only his side of the question, entirely overlooking the fact of such special effort being adopted some years

since as only a temporary one, and further, concealing from himself the bearing of such effort, if continued, upon our plans, oversteps, in his appeals, the bounds prescribed by a sober judgment, surely no one will care to hold him to

a strict account, or to restrain his eager words.

Your Board was instructed by you to "take into serious consideration the alterations which it will be desirable to make in your present arrangements," in order to establish and maintain the present projected Mission. One of the fundamental questions thus submitted to us, and which, in the judgment of your Board, should be immediately and seriously reviewed, is that of consuming, in another field and for another Mission Society, the resources upon which you must depend for maintaining your own independent Mission. The time is fast approaching when that separate Mission will, it is hoped, be put into successful operation. There are not yet in the treasury of your Society anything like the amount of funds indispensable for even the opening of such an enterprise as you contemplate. And it is not likely that there will be a sufficient accumulation of funds to meet the demands of the approaching hour of need, if the contributions of our Churches continue to come in as specific donations for the support of native preachers, and that, too, it must be remembered, for preachers on fields occupied by another Missionary organization. Hence your Board feel, and in their judgment all should feel it to be of the greatest importance, that at least some wise economy in respect of that matter should be at once introduced. It is objected that the parties now contributing such specific funds would curtail their contributions, if that specific object is abolished. But it should be remembered that one reason, if not the principal one, for such specific donations from those parties is the fact, that the denomination has hitherto had no Foreign Mission of its own to elicit and employ the Missionary contributions of those parties. We should not cast suspicion upon the earnestness and sincerity of their zeal in their efforts to evangelize the heathen by supposing that they would not be so liberal in their offerings so soon as the denomination opens a channel for Missionary effort of its own. And if there are those among us who would still prefer the support of native laborers, they will speedily have the opportunity for doing that kind of Mission work on their own foreign field. But if the brethren deem it sufficient to support the native laborers on the fields occupied by another Society-if they prefer to continue, what was originally designed to be only partial and temporary, because the denomination had no field of its own in which to use its funds for Foreign Missions, then let that policy be distinctly adopted and proclaimed. But the independent Mission must be thereby crippled, if not crushed. One or the other must, we foresee, be abandoned.

THE CONTINUED SUPPORT OF REV. MR. GEORGE.

Closely allied with the foregoing question is still another, demanding immediate consideration. For a few years you have been supporting one of the Mission families of the Baptist Union in Burmah. Nearly \$4,000 have been expended for the three years of this connection, and that connection still exists, though when formed it was designed to be temporary. Now, if the accumulation of funds for your own Mission is of such paramount importance, then should you relieve yourselves of the future support of Brother George and his family, casting that burden henceforth upon the Society in whose Mission the brother is laboring. Were our proposed Mission to be among the Burmans, for whom Brother George has qualified himself to labor, and he should prefer to enter our service, we ought, in that case, to continue his support, until we are ready to employ him. But there is not the least prospect of our Mission being Burman, and if it is to be Karen, and in another country, as is most probable, Brother George will not be likely to sever his alliance with the Burman Mission to enter our service, nor would it be wise, if he were willing to do so. The time, then, must come, sooner or later, when our present relations to him will close; and the necessity of present financial economy, preparatory to the near demands of our Mission plans, renders it most desirable to terminate those relations at once.

THE ANOMALOUS RELATIONS OF THE FEMALE MISSIONARIES ADJUSTED.

Our Sisters DeWolfe and Norris, after becoming qualified to some extent for Mission service among the Karens, began their labors in fields occupied by the Missionary Union. The Board considered it proper and needful to give an official approval of the course pursued by our female Missionaries, and to order their present connection to be continued until the Board shall be in a position to give those sisters employment in your own chosen field. It was

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subsequently observed that those sisters were under no official direction whatever, that the Society, in whose schools they were teaching, had no directing power over those Missionaries, their movements, and services, and it seemed to be inappropriate, if not intrusive, for your Board to attempt the exercise of such directing authority, even over your own Missionaries, so long as they were serving in the Mission work of another organization. Such a disorderly condition of things it was deemed necessary to rectify without any delay. Accordingly, when last December, the Board learned that Miss Norris had removed from Henthada to Bassein, to teach in the Karen school at the latter station, the Secretary was ordered to instruct both of your female Missionaries to place themselves, for the present, under the direction of the Society in whose service they were employed, at the same time the Executive Committee of the Baptist Union was requested by your Board to control by their counsel the Mission labors of those sisters, so long as they should continue in the service of the Union. This action of your Board does not annul or modify the relations and responsibilities of those sisters to your Society, or to the Woman's Mission Aid Society paying their salaries, but simply and reasonably delegates for the present a directing power to the Society in whose Missions our sisters are employed. Dr. Murdock, in answer to the proposal in question, replied, as follows: "Thankful for the confidence reposed in them by your Board, the Committee accept the trust confided to them, and hope always to exercise it with kindness and with such wisdom as may be granted to them. It will be their aim to consult at once the happiness of the young ladies, and the good of the Missions." In the published Annual Report of the Union, for 872, we find the following record: "The Provincial Board have kindly requested the Executive Committee to exercise such general powers of direction, both in the case of Miss Norris and Miss DeWolfe, as they exercise in the case of other Missionaries, so long as they work in connection with our Missions. The same Report states that Miss Norris, in the Bassein Mission "is rendering very effective service."

MISS DEWOLFE'S SUPPORT.

Last November the Woman's Mission Aid Society made to your Board the gratifying announcement that they had agreed to assume the support of Miss DeWolfe, in addition to that of Miss Norris, and requested our concurrence with their action. The proposal was gratefully accepted; and the funds for the payment of Miss DeWolfe's salary have been derived from that source since January 1, 1872.

ANOTHER FEMALE MISSIONARY OFFERED.

During the past year another sister, highly commended for piety, gifts, and zeal, has applied to the Woman's Mission Aid Society to be sent into the foreign field, and that organization intimated an ability and willingness to assume the support of an additional Missionary at once. The election and assignment of foreign Missionaries resting with your Board, the application in question was lodged with them. But it was deemed best to defer all such applications until the Board can decide upon the location of an independent Mission.

WOMAN'S MISSION AID SOCIETIES.

The Woman's Mission Aid Societies, within the limits of your Convention, have been advancing in number, zeal, and liberality, during the past year, and give promise of becoming a very essential auxiliary in the work of Foreign Missions. We here submit the Annual Reports of the Central Boards of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE N. S. CENTRAL BOARD.

The Central Board of the Woman's Mission Aid Societies in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, to the Foreign Mission Board at Saint John, N. B.

In reviewing the second year of our existence, we feel that we have great reason for encouragement, and desire to go forward with increased vigor in the work of aiding our dear sisters in Burmāh, arousing and keeping up the Missionary spirit at home, and, as soon as practicable, sending forth one or more volunteers, to join those who are now toiling so assiduously and faithfully in the field which is already white for the harvest.

While we would not ignore or undervalue the pressing necessities of Home Mission work in all its branches, we must ever remember, that this is a land of Bibles, education, and gospel privilege, while the Karen people are waiting to be taught the way of life, ready to receive christianity as soon as they can be

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instructed. It is with this people our sisters are labouring, and among them Divine Providence may plant our independent Mission. "The harvest is white, but the laborers are few; let us, therefore, pray the Lord of the harvest that

he may send forth laborers."

During the past year, our Societies have raised \$1,304.74, from July 1st, 1871, to June 30th, 1872, being \$374.42 in advance of the previous year. Six new Societies have been formed, and five persons have been made life members. The sum of \$77.96 has been sent in by the children of Sunday Schools, Mission Bands, and a Knitting Circle; and the Central Board has advised the Societies, that in future all such moneys will be devoted to the education of children (orphans especially) in the schools taught by our sisters, Miss De-Wolfe and Miss Norris, and to be expended as their judgment may direct. The Central Board has thought it best to donate \$100 each to our Missionaries for this purpose for the present year.

The co-operation and assistance of the pastors of our Churches is carnestly requested, and is as much needed as ever, to re-kindle flagging zeal, to keep the subject before the people, and especially in aiding the sisters, by giving advice as to the best means of conducting the regular meetings of the Societies, so as to keep up the attendance and interest, thus making them important auxiliaries to our work, when entered into with a zeal and devotion befitting the cause.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE N. B. CENTRAL BOARD.

Report of the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies of New Brunswick, to the Foreign Mission Board in Saint John.

Two years ago this month, our beloved Missionary, Miss Norris, visited our Province, and through her earnest efforts, enlisted the sympathies of christian women in the work of sending the glad tidings of salvation to our benighted sisters in heathen lands, which should be, through God's blessing, the means of releasing them from their bondage, and elevating them to the privileges of christian womanhood.

Twelve Societies were formed through her efforts; and could her stay have been longer in the Province, many others would doubtless have been the result of her visit; for wherever she went, her spirit of devotion to the cause she had espoused, infused itself into the hearts of those who listened, as she

talked of the work in which she was so desirous of being engaged.

The work has not extended through the Province as we could have desired, but we hope another year to be able to report greater progress, as the Churches become better acquainted with the movement. We do not feel discouraged in the work, as we believe the blessing of God has rested upon it. Five new Societies have been formed during the past year, and four ladies residing away from any Society have become annual contributors to our funds. We have now seventeen Societies, all in a prosperous condition, and becoming increasingly interested in the work. Nearly all have reported an increase of membership during the past year. We have one life membership, the first Sackville Church having the honor of constituting their pastor's wife the first life member in the Province. And we hope other Societies will be found to follow their example.

The Treasurer of the Central Board has paid to the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board, since last August, the sum of six hundred and ninety-five dol-

lars (\$695.00).

In connection with the Societies of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, we have been enabled, through the concurrence of the Foreign Mission Board, to adopt Miss DeWolfe as our Missionary, as well as Miss Norris.

The Societies of the St. John Churches, including Portland and Carleton, had the pleasure of sending Miss DeWolfe a box of useful articles, valued at \$100, as a token of their esteem, upon assuming her as our Missionary.

Copies of our Constitution, accompanied with a presentation of the claims of these Societies, have been sent by the Secretary to a number of Churches where no Society exists; but they have, in most cases, failed to meet with the desired response. We now appeal to the pastors of the Churches of New Brunswick present at the Convention, and urge them to bring the matter before the sisters on their return home, feeling that they only need to have it presented to them, to have their sympathies enlisted in the good work.

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The knowledge that the women of India are eagerly asking for the light, and that there are sisters anxious to be sent out as soon as an opportunity offers, should stimulate us to greater exertions; and we trust that those of us who are interested, may be encouraged this year by the addition of many new Societies.

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MISS DEWOLFE AND MISS NORRIS.

In a letter, dated Henthada, April 7, 1872, from Rev. D. A. W. Smith, connected with the American Baptist Karen Mission at that station, we have a most favorable report of the studies and labors of Sister DeWolfe. Mr. Smith, after enumerating the various efforts of your Missionary, says: "It is just two years this very month since she joined us in Mission work at this station. It has given me great satisfaction to learn that this change on the part of Miss DeWolfe has met with the approbation of your Board....In all these departments of labor, Miss DeWolfe commends herself as a faithful, persistent, successful worker, and instead of admitting that you are under obligation to me for giving her opportunity to study and labor in preparation for her ultimate position, I feel that the obligations are altogether on my side."

In December, 1871, Miss Norris was about to take work in the Female Karen school in Bassein. Since that date she has been employed most successfully in that school. In eight months from the time of her arrival on the field she had attained, besides a familiar acquaintance with the Sgau Karen dialect, a sufficient knowledge of the Pwo Karen, to be able to take that up at any time with very little trouble. In a letter, she remarks: "I cannot tell how it is that I find so little trouble with the languages." As much of her correspondence, breathing such an earnest spirit of piety, such determined resolution in her work, and such firm reliance on God for success, has already gone before the denomination in the pages of the Messenger and Visitor, we need not reiterate it in this Report. Should our contemplated Mission be located among the Eastern Karens, in the Kingdom of Siam, the acquisitions and experiences obtained by Sisters DeWolfe and Norris, in Henthada and Bassein, will be of immediate and invaluable benefit to such a Mission.

MISSIONARIES ELECT.

Your Missionaries elect, Brethren Sanford and Armstrong, the former for two years, and the latter for one year, have been studying at the Newton Theological Seminary. The President, Rev. Dr. Hovey, reports them to your Board as "Young men of decided ability, and faithful in all their duties as students." Your Board would commend these young brethren, as well as your Missionaries in the field, to your continued and earnest prayers.

We append to this Report, to be published in the Convention Minutes, the latest list of native laborers, Burman and Karen, supported by funds passed through your Board.

The studies of the year, have been conducted in accordance with the published Curriculum.

The following extracts from the Report of the President, to your Board, in June last, are herewith presented.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The internal affairs of the College have continued through the year without essential modification from the condition of the last few years. No marked variation has occurred in the numbers in attendance. We have had about forty different names on the roll for the year.

Sixteen presented themselves for examination at the opening of this year, twelve of whom passed, and have kept their places in the class until the present time. About the same number will probably be prepared to enter during the coming year; and this appears to be what we must expect until more thorough interest is felt in the preparatory schools. Our students come almost exclusively from one Academy, a condition of things without parallel, so far as I can learn, in the history of Colleges.

The students in attendance have, on the whole, been marked by propriety of deportment, and a commendable degree of attention to their work. The prescribed course of study has been faithfully preserved.

It should be added that the requirements for matriculation have been considerably advanced during the year. So far as we can reach the facts, it seems that no other institution in the Maritime Provinces is doing so much towards raising the grade of scholarship requisite for entering College.

I believe that a healthful tone of morality is cherished by the body of the students, although occasionally an instance of departure from rectitude may occur. More than one half of the number are members of Churches, and a large proportion of those are studying with a view to ministerial labour. The year has not been marked by special religious interest; yet I am assured that it is the purpose of the Faculty to enter upon their respective duties with their various classes, every day impressed with the conviction that the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.

Rev. Mr. Balcom, during his agency for the College, collected a sum of money for the purpose of providing some more convenient chapel accommodation for the College. The money has been expended in fitting up a room on the second floor in the rear of the Academy, and in making a proper entrance to it. This change gives great relief to the Library, and has proved of great advantage in various respects.

Soon after the commencement of the present College year, the Treasurer received from the executors of the will of the late Mrs. John Harris, the sum of \$400, which she had very considerately granted for refurnishing and improving the College Library-room. The gentleman who framed the codicil of the Will, by which this money was secured to the College, informed me that it was to be expended under the direction of the President. Arrangements were accordingly made to have the room put in good condition, and new furniture placed in it before the close of the year. Probably not much more than one half of the whole amount will be needed to meet the expense thus incurred. The accounts of this expenditure, and the proper vouchers, will be lodged in the hands of the Treasurer as soon as possible. The balance will lie subject to your order, to be expended at some future time for the object designated.

The Report of the Principal of the Theological department is here subjoined:

THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

In making a report of the studies in this department during the Academical year, it may be repeated, that the Senior class in the College course not containing any candidates for the ministry of the gospel, there were no students to form the class in Hebrew grammar.

In regard to the advanced studies proposed for a fifth year, it may be sufficient for the information of the government, to refer to the calendar, and to mention, that the course of Theological study there projected, was fully followed out in the various branches.

It may not be improper, however, to suggest, that it seems desirable, that

serious consideration be given to the fact, that so large a number of graduates of this College and others on whose attendance in the Theological studies here provided the success of our incipient undertaking greatly depended, have failed to become members of the several classes in this department, and were, it is supposed, to be found in other Institutions during the year.

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It appears plain that earnest and strenuous effort is called for in the use of all proper influences to retain our own students in the country, and to combine all our strength for the maintenance and growth of our own Institutions.

At the meeting of your Board, in December last, it was found, from the report of the Finance Committee, that the services of a suitable agent for the Provinces could not be obtained. It was hoped that a series of Educational Meetings would be held in different sections, where it would be feasible for the President and other members of the Faculty to attend, and present the claims of the College. Something in this way was accomplished; but the extreme severity of the weather, and difficulties in travelling, interfered greatly. At the different Associations in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, the matter of endowment was strongly urged, and cordially responded to. It remains for this Convention to mature such measures as will meet the pressing exigencies of our Institution. Your Board believe it to be a question of life or death, and our aim should be to reach the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, making a strenuous effort for at least twenty-five thousand the coming year.

Wm. Elder, Esq., A. M., Professor of Natural Science, has tendered his resignation of the post so ably filled by him during the past three years. This resignation your Board were reluctantly compelled to accept.

It becomes the painful duty of your Board again to report a vacancy in their number, caused by the death of Rev. J. E. Balcom, in June last. An enthusiastic lover of our College—a large portion of the latter years of his life was given for her benefit. His services, until debarred by illness, cannot be too gratefully acknowledged. Such a loss cannot easily be repaired; but we bow in submission to the will of Him, who doubtless had a more excellent service for our brother in that world where His servants shall serve Him, and shall see His face.

The removal of Rev. E. C. Cady from the Provinces, has caused another vacancy—both of which can be filled at this session of your body.

It must be acknowledged that the state of the Churches, as represented in these statistics, is far from satisfactory. The number of conversions during the year, indicated by the baptisms, averages nearly four to a Church in Nova Scotia, and not quite one-and-a-half in New Brunswick. The nett increase in these two Provinces is about 2½ per cent., a slight advance on last year's returns. The number of baptisms in Prince Edward Island, averages not quite three to a Church.

In the Nova Scotia Western Association there have been some merciful outpourings of blessing; but the Eastern Association of that Province, and the Western of New Brunswick, have suffered a slight decrease. Believers, in those districts, lament the slow progress of the truth. The hearers are many; but the word preached does not profit some, not being mixed with faith: and perhaps it would be advisable for believers themselves to inquire whether some of the Saviour's rebukes in the letters to the seven Churches in Asia do not apply to them.

Four new Churches have been constituted—at Little Glace Bay, C. B.; Milton, Yarmouth; Margaret's Bay (second), N. S.; and Ellershouse, Hants Co., N. S. New meeting houses have been opened at Billtown, Cornwallis; Yarmouth (Temple Church); Brooklyn, Queen's County—all in Nova Scotia—and probably at other places.

An insufficient supply of ministers is still to be deplored. There are 163 Churches in Nova Scotia, but only 58 pastors: in New Brunswick there are but 45 pastors to 134 Churches. It is true, that in several instances ministering brethren spread their labours over two or three Churches, and thus endeavour (though inadequately) to compensate for the deficiency; yet still, 73 Churches in Nova Scotia and 59 in New Brunswick, are reported as entirely destitute of pastoral labour. If it be said that many of those Churches are small, and unable to support pastors, the fact may be admitted; but the inference will be that the number of home missionaries should be greatly increased, and the terms of their appointments lengthened. The home missionary work of the denomination is as yet but imperfectly done. If five missionaries were permanently employed in each Province, besides occasional assistance rendered to weak Churches, there would be ample scope for energy, and the benefits to the good cause would be incalculable.

Your Committee cannot but express their regret at the small success of the effort to endow Acadia College, and at the comparative indifference of many of our Churches to the educational interests of our denomination, generally. The Baptists of these Provinces have rendered essential service to education for more than forty years past, and the people are largely indebted to them for the wholesome influence of their efforts and their example. It will be a great misfortune if now, when more strenuous endeavours are required, to keep pace with the times, and especially to provide adequate instruction for the rising ministry, there should be any falling off of funds, or failure to realize the full force of the responsibilities resting on us. The material prosperity of the Provinces calls for a liberal tribute to our institutions of learning, which ought to be placed on a firm basis of endowment, yielding a sufficient income for the

support of professors in all the departments of instruction.

But underlying these, and all other things that are deemed desirable, is a still greater need. It is not enough that we give and act, in accordance, in some degree, with the claims of important objects. The giving and the acting must spring from a right source, or they will be of ephemeral duration and destitute of blessing. That source is intelligent, heartfelt, continuous godliness; intelligent, because it can give "a reason of the hope"; heartfelt, being tinged with the blood of the cross; continuous, unlike the Eastern torrent, that is dried up half the year, but rather symbolised by the perennial stream in some temperate clime, that flows on from January to December, blessed and blessing. The religion of many professors is cold and unfruitful, for want of culture. It is not cared for. The soil is not stirred, nor the weeds cut up; it is left to itself. Here, the thorns spring up and choke it; there, the plant dies away for lack of moisture, or becomes such a dwindling, thread-like stem, that it is more dead than alive. What is needed among us, we repeat, is intelligent, heartfelt, continuous godliness; and that, not as a distinction of here and there a gifted one, but the characteristic of all. The "higher christian life," as it is sometimes termed, is the privilege and duty of all believers. When it shall be generally attained, the Church will "arise and shine, because her light is come, and because the glory of the Lord is risen upon her"

These blessings are to be diligently sought. He who "heareth prayer" will

reward the faith of his people, and give effect to holy industry.

The Committee repeat the recommendation of former years, that the Churches set apart a day for united humiliation and prayer.

IN MEMORIAM.

According to his wont, death has again been reaping his harvest among our ministering brethren. Your Committee report as follows in regard to such brethren, availing themselves largely of accounts previously published elsewhere.

REV. T. BLEAKNEY, who was ordained to the work of the Christian Ministry, in Albert County, N. B., in 1861, departed this life, February 21st, 1872.

He was a devoted, energetic and successful minister of the Gospel of Christ. His ministry in Albert County, and more especially in Dorchester, was rich in good fruits. He was an earnest and able advocate of the Temperance Reform, and devoted much time and talent to its advancement. His pastorate at Woodstock was cut short by the resistless power of death, but it was sufficiently long to give him a large place in the affections and confidence of the people as a sincere Christian, and as an able minister of the New Testament. His sudden and unexpected departure to the spirit world has been felt to be a sad loss, not only to his family and to his Church at Woodstock, but also to the denomination at large.

REV. JOHN W. TITUS, the late beloved pastor of the Pitt Street Baptist Church, St. John, has also been numbered with the dead. He was ordained to the pastorate of the church in Pitt Street, St. John, in 1869, and was called to his rest in April 1872.

Brother Titus was emphatically a Gospel missionary in spirit and in life. Not satisfied with preaching the Gospel publicly, he was accustomed to carry its rich treasures of grace and love from house to house, and in the abodes of poverty, suffering, and death, to pour its precious consolations into the hearts of the afflicted and sorrowful. He was a good man, and laboured earnestly and constantly to do good to others, and was therefore highly esteemed, not only by the Pitt Street Church, but by the Churches of the City generally, for his devotion to the Master and to the salvation of souls.

REV. BENJAMIN SCOTT. This brother, honored and beloved, was born at Yarmouth, N. S., May 23, 1808. He was born again somewhere about the years 1827-8. Having previously left Yarmouth with his parents, he was then on a visit to his native place. There were extensive revival movements at this time among the Yarmouth Baptists, in connection with the labours of the Revs. Harris Harding and Thomas Ansley; and some three hundred persons were led to profess the religion of the Gospel. Among these young Scott obtained a joyful hope, and was baptized by Elder Harris Harding, in April 1828. Returning to Port Hood, C. B., where his family then resided, he began to work for Christ in his father's household, which was a large one, and among his friends in the neighbourhood; holding meetings in his father's house on Lord's day afternoons. These meetings were not without their good fruit. The young evangelist then began to preach at Mabou, C. B., on the Strait, and at the Cape of Canso, and at several places adjacent. Seeking to return to Port Hood, the vessel in which he was embarked was driven from her course, and Mr. Scott was thus taken to Prince Edward Island, to which the vessel belonged. On December 4, 1830, he was landed at Lot 49, a few miles to the east of Charlottetown. The hand of the Lord was in this clearly manifested. Henceforth, until the year 1852, some twenty-two years, Mr. Scott laboured much for the Island, and was greatly prospered. In connection with his labours, if not wholly as their result, Baptist Churches were formed and built up at Lot 49 (now known as Alexandra), at North River, at St. Peter's Road, in Charlottetown, at Grand River, and at Cavendish. He was ordained at Lot 49, in September 1832, the Revs. E. Manning and T. S. Harding officiating on the occasion. He laid himself out to promote the erection of meeting houses on the Island; and Lot 49, Charlottetown, Grand River, Cavendish, and Saint Eleanor's profited by his labours in this department. The record of his faithful and useful efforts during the period here indicated, could it be given in detail, would occupy a large space. In the summer of 1849, New Brunswick also shared in his Missionary labours. In 1852, he left Prince Edward Island.

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After this he travelled and evangelized through portions of the United States. Returning to New Brunswick, he laboured for a while at Portland, St. John. He then entered the service of the New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Board. While thus engaged he was enabled to establish Churches at Shediac. and at Newcastle, Miramichi. At Shediac, too, at Newcastle, and at North Esk, he took a leading and efficient part in the erection of meeting houses. Thus were several years of his life most usefully occupied. In November 1856, he removed to Nova Scotia, where he performed much Missionary work. While thus engaged he assisted in the organization of five Churches, and in the erection of a meeting house on the Shubenacadie, By and by, in 1858, he settled at Onslow. Here, and at Onslow East, he spent the closing years of his life. He baptized some ninety-three persons during this period. His last illness was short. On Lord's day, April 28, in the current year, he travelled from Truro, to which place he had removed in the previous week, to Onslow East, preached, and returned home to die. 1 Cor. xv. 2 was the text of his last sermon. He passed away on Wednesday, May 1. His last words were, "All is well—I am going home—heaven—happy." It may be said of him, as Luke says of Barnabas, "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith: and much people was added unto the Lord."

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tail, also and. REV. James E. Balcom departed this life June 6, 1872, aged 46. For nine-teen years he faithfully declared the Gospel. On Long Island, N. S., the scene of his ordination, at Amherst, Great Village, and Hantsport,—in each of these places many have been raised up to call the Saviour biessed through his instrumentality. As a pastor he was affectionate, prompt, systematic, and indefatigable. As a preacher he was sound in doctrine, concise and clear in enunciation, earnest and tender in admonition. He was possessed of a fine business talent, and never failed to elevate the financial as well as the spiritual condition of his charge. He was a devoted friend of education, and laboured assiduously to advance our institutions of learning, devoting much of his valuable time gratuitously to the endowment of Acadia College.

From his dying bed he sent loving messages to those once under his care. "Tell them," said he, "that the Gospel which I preached to them is my support in a dying hour." Shortly before his end he asked his physician, "Doctor, how long have I to stay here?" On being told, "Not more than twenty-four hours," he replied, "Thank you, doctor, now I will go to sleep," and soon after fell into that "blessed sleep from which none ever wakes to weep."

Brother Henby McLatchey, Licentiate, has gone to his reward. He was an humble and devoted man of God, and in his removal the Church has sustained a great loss. His labours were principally confined to Albert County, N. B., though he often visited other parts, and his efforts were wont to be well received and appreciated. He took a lively interest in Sabbath Schools.

Obadiah Parker, Licentiate, of Lunenburg, N. S., departed this life in the triumphs of faith, December 19, 1871. He was converted in early life. Having removed to Bridgewater, for some years he filled the office of deacon in the Bridgewater Church, from which he received a license to preach the Gospel. He subsequently removed to Lunenburg, and became a licentiate of that Church, exercising his gifts as opportunity offered, chiefly within the Churches in his own neighbourhood. He was sound in doctrine, exceedingly useful in the Sabbath school, and his ministrations were highly acceptable.

Senator C. R. Bill, deacon of the third Cornwallis Baptist Church, and here-tofore a member of the Board of Governors of Acadia College, is also numbered with the dead. His life was largely devoted to the public interests of his country, and to the welfare of the community in which he dwelt. The poor especially found in him a benefactor and friend. This Convention is glad to learn that, in his last will and testament are found valuable bequests to Home and Foreign Missions; thus embalming his name in the grateful remembrance of all who love the Saviour, and pray for the coming of his kingdom. He "rests from his labours, and his works do follow him."
