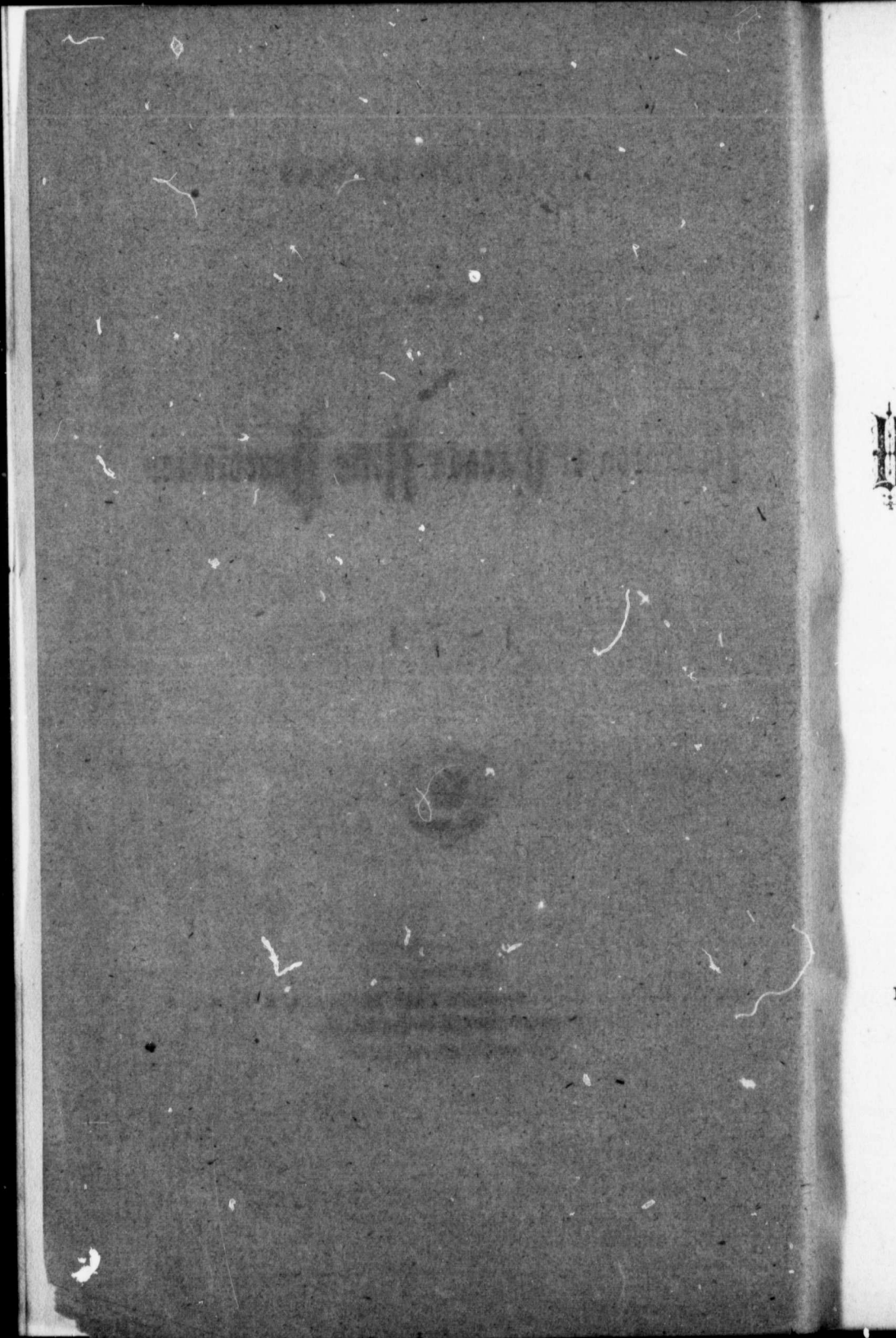

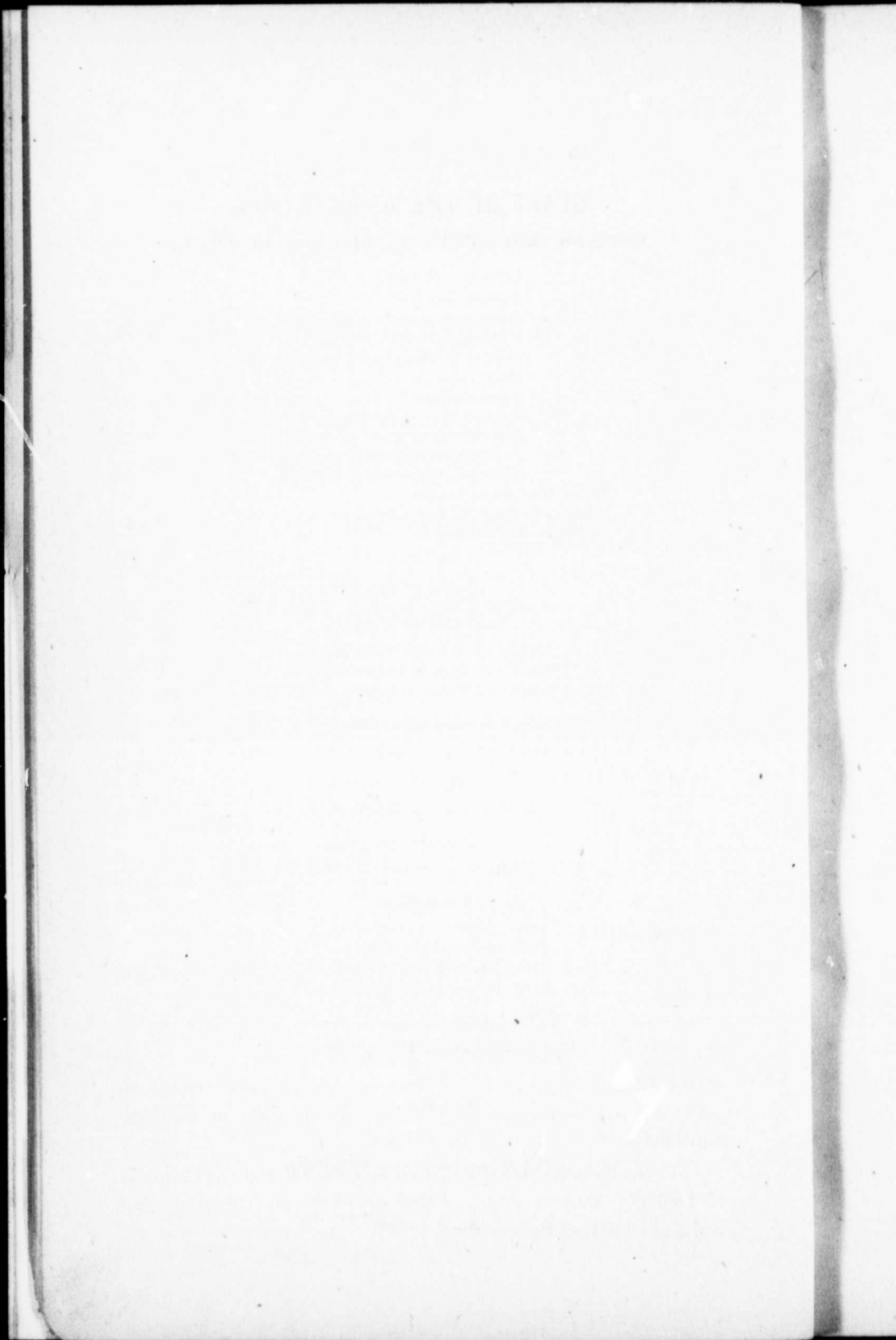

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL
OF THE
DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

1. The Council, in making this their Seventh Annual Report, desire to direct attention to the number of Affiliated Associations, which now number twenty-three as against seventeen last year.

2. The Government as on previous occasions granted aid in the following sums, viz:—

The whole of the Provincial Associations have affiliated with the Parent Association this year except that of Prince Edward Island.

County and other local Rifle Associations received grants in aid for the year ending, 30th June, 1874, through the Department of Militia and Defence.

3. On reference to the Secretary's Report, it will be observed that the Annual Prize Meeting of the Association took place for the second time at Ottawa, commencing on the 15th September.

Their Excellencies the Governor General and the Countess of Dufferin were present at the opening, and the first shot was fired by Her Excellency.

4. Records of the shooting at this meeting will be found in the appendix, the competition was attended by many of the best marksmen in the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

5. The ranges were in good order, and those previously in use were supplemented by the addition of three others making nine in all, target number nine being a circular one of canvas, similar to those now used at Wimbledon.

The construction of this new form of target was carried out by the Executive Committee for the purpose of introducing it to the notice of competitors and giving it a thorough trial. This enabled the Executive to demonstrate its advantages over the old iron targets, and the superiority of this form, as well as of the system of marking introduced with it, were fully appreciated. The competitors expressed the greatest satisfaction with both. A special report in relation to this target will be found annexed.

6. His Excellency the Governor-General again presented three medals, Gold, Silver and Bronze.

The President (Lt.-Col. Gzowski), presented money prizes to the value of \$250.

The Council were able to distribute the sum of \$2,375 00, in Money Prizes, and in addition thereto, prizes in kind to the value of \$1,391 00, were given, which included the "Merchants of London Vase," "the MacDougall Challenge Vase," the Telescope & Field Glass, presented by J. H. Steward, the celebrated optician of London, a Silver Cup, and the Gold, Silver and Bronze medals of the Association.

7. The Council records with much satisfaction that the meeting passed off without any accident.

8. Details of the Matches will be found in the appendix.

9. The thanks of the Association are due to Lt.-Colonel Powell, Deputy Adjutant-General, and Major Irwin, Commandant School of Gunnery at Kingston, for placing at the disposal of the Association, the services of non-commissioned officers and men of "A" Battery as markers, and to Lieut. Peters of that corps who took charge of them.

Thanks are also due to the Executive Committee under whose directions the arrangements for the Annual Match at Ottawa were carried out; and to Lt.-Col. Jackson, D.A.G., as Chief Executive Officer and Commandant of Camp; Major White, G. G. Foot Guards, as Chief Range Officer; Lt.-Colonel Bacon as Statistical Officer, and Capt. Grant, Camp Quarter Master, for valuable assistance rendered by them, and also to Surgeon Malloch, of the G. G. Foot Guards, for his constant attendance during the competition.

10. The Council beg to place on record the liberality of the Railway and Steamboat Companies in carrying competitors to and from their homes at reduced rates of fare.

11. The interest attached to the proceedings of the Team at Wimbledon this year, was greatly enhanced by the presence of the President, Lieut.-Colonel Gzowski, in the Canadian Camp during the whole competition.

The Report of Lieut.-Col. Gillmor, the Officer Commanding the Team for 1874, will be found annexed—the cost of sending the Canadian marksmen to Wimbledon, amounted to \$5,325 84.

In submitting this report the Council refer with pleasure and satisfaction to the excellent conduct of the members composing the Team, and would direct attention to their good shooting as detailed by Lieut.-Col. Gillmor.

The reception of Lieut.-Colonel Gillmor and the Team at Wimbledon as representatives of the Military Force of Canada, was most gratifying, and the Council desire to record their sense of the satisfactory manner in which Lt.-Col. Gillmor, as officer commanding, and Major Montizambert as second officer, discharged the duties assigned to them.

Although a large number of prizes have been won, the Council regret that the Canadian marksmen have again been unsuccessful in its contest for the "Kolapore Cups," in which it had for competitors besides the team from the United Kingdom, a team styled "The Indian Team."

It is not however to be expected that in a contest against a nation of marksmen success can always be secured, but it is

certain that the contest awakens the keenest interest, and has a most beneficial effect in improving the shooting of Canadian Marksmen.

It is understood that a Team from the Australian Colonies will contend for this prize at Wimbledon next July, and the Council fully recognizes the importance of exercising the greatest care in selecting the Canadians for 1875.

12. The Council have much pleasure in stating that the important Wimbledon competition for the *St. George's Challenge Vase* will in future be open to duly certified Volunteers under Military command from the Colonies, with the single restriction that the Vase itself is not to leave the United Kingdom. All the money prizes and decorations connected with this important competition will thus be open to the members of our next team, and they will therefore be in a position to compete for the *Grand Aggregate Prizes* on equal terms with British Volunteers.

13. The Council gratefully acknowledge the liberal support and encouragement extended by the Dominion Government (through the Hon. the Minister of Militia and Defence,) in aiding the funds of the Association, and for the money granted to the Provincial and Local Rifle Associations.

14. The Council have pleasure to record the continued generous support given to the Association by His Excellency the Governor General and the great interest taken by him in all that concerns Rifle Shooting in the Dominion; His Excellency's liberality in presenting prizes for competition, and the encouragement given by his presence on several occasions during the meeting is gratefully acknowledged.

15. The Council have to acknowledge the valuable services rendered by the Treasurer and Secretary.



FINANCE.

For a full account of the Finances of the Association, the Council refer to the Treasurer's Statement, to which is attached the Auditor's Report for the period, from the 10th November, 1873, to the 10th February, 1875.

The Balance Sheet exhibits the total income from all sources for that period, to have been \$11,751.02, while the expenditure amounted to \$10,573.63, showing a balance of \$1,177.39, which, with the balance of \$771.44 carried forward from last year's Financial Statement, leaves a total balance of \$1,948.83 in favor of the Association.

A detailed statement of the disbursements made by Lieut-Colonel Gillmor in connection with the Wimbledon Team of 1874, will be found in the appendix.

The receipts from Subscribers and Affiliated Associations as per list annexed show a small increase over last year. The number of annual Subscribers of \$2 during the year being 72, and Affiliated Associations.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY
OF THE
DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

1. The Annual Prize Meeting for the year 1874 took place at the Rideau Ranges, Ottawa, commencing on the 15th September and extended over the four following days.

2. A Local Committee of the Council of the Association superintended and carried out the arrangements for the meeting.

3. In addition to the three extra Butts with markers pits provided this year, a new Circular Target on the Wimbledon principle, adapted for the Association, and constructed under the supervision of one of the members of the Council (Lieut.-Col. Brunel) was added to the number now in use, and the ease with which it marked, and its apparent superiority over the old form of Target was universally acknowledged by all competitors.

4. It is still considered that additional Butts are required at these Ranges in order that competitions may be carried out with greater expedition.

5. A gratifying feature in connection with the meeting of 1874, was the presence of His Excellency the Governor-General, and the Countess of Dufferin, at the opening proceedings, the first shot having been fired by Her Excellency.

6. His Excellency the Governor-General, again presented three medals for competition, viz.:

A Gold Medal, which was one by	Lieut. Whitman, 60th Batt.
A Silver " " "	Sergt. Bennett, 49th "
A Bronze " " "	Lieut. Balfour, late 8th "

7. A Cup was presented by the Association as a 1st prize in the Battalion Match, in addition to the sum of \$200 in cash

which was won by the 2nd Batt., Grand Trunk Railway Brigade.

8. The MacDougall Cup was competed for for the sixth time, and was won by Captain Thomas, 54th Batt., with a score of 40 points.

9. The Provincial Match again took its place in the list of prizes, and the London Merchants Cup formed the chief prize, and was won on this occasion by the Team representing the Province of Ontario.

10. The Affiliated Association Match brought out some of the picked shots from the several affiliating Associations. The New Brunswick Association making the highest number of points, viz., 100.

11. Two valuable telescopes, presented by Mr. Steward, the well-known London Optician, were competed for, as also a cash prize of \$250, the liberal gift of the President of the Association, Lt.-Col. Gzowski; the competition for the Governor General's medals brought the meeting to a close on the 19th September.

13. The Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick

and Nova Scotia were represented, and several of the members of the Wimbledon Team for 1874 were present.

14. The weather during the meeting was very unsettled, but the scores made were of a very good average.

15. The same arrangements as last year, for marking in the Butts, was again made this year, and ably carried out by men from A. Battery, School of Gunnery, Kingston, under the charge of Lieut. Peters.

No accident occurred during the meeting.

MEMORANDUM *as to the new form of Targets used at the Meeting of
the Dominion Rifle Association at Ottawa, in 1874.*

So far as could be ascertained, the competitors were fully satisfied with the target, and the objects aimed at have been attained in a greater degree than was hoped for.

It may, I think, be said with confidence, that the markers were well protected in the open trench, and that there were no splashes of lead whatever. Under this system, the whole of the markers in a line of targets may be placed under the immediate command and supervision of an officer or non-commissioned officer. This will undoubtedly insure much better marking.

It is obvious that the work of marking is made much easier to the men who are relieved from the constant strain of watchfulness. The passage of the bullet through the canvas is distinctly heard in the trench, and when a hit is heard, the marker pulls down the target and has it at once in a convenient position for inspection.

It was admitted on all hands that the signalling was more satisfactory than by the old system, and that the exact position of the hit is more distinctly shown. Certainly, the giving of the signal is much less laborious to the marker who also escapes the dirt and paint splashes which are incident to the old system. The retention of the signal disc in its place until another hit has been made, is a great safeguard against error.

It is an important advantage of the system that firing can be carried on in wet weather, such as entirely stops practice on the iron targets. Of course a heavy driving rainstorm will wash the paper off the canvas target, but during ordinary showers such as will completely wash the paint from the iron targets, and in light drizzling mists which obscure the plate glass used in the old form of pit or mantlet, the practice at the canvas target can go on without interruption. This was fully

established at our last competition, when on one of the days the marking on the iron targets was entirely stopped by the rain and mist, while there was no interruption to the practice at the new canvas target.

With ordinary attention on the part of the markers, there will be no erroneous signalling. During the five days continuous shooting at this target no signal was questioned, nor did I hear of a doubt having been expressed as to their correctness. This result is largely due to the greater ease and comfort with which the markers did their work. They are infinitely more comfortable than in the old pit or mantlet, freer from danger, more sheltered from bad weather, and better protected from the sun. They are therefore able and more willing to do their work effectually.

It is no small advantage that all the expensive parts of the target are effectually protected from the effects of the missiles which always greatly damage the iron targets.

The marking on the whole was much quicker, the time required for changing the targets from one class to another is *not necessarily more than one minute*, and can be effected by *one man*, though of course two will do it more easily.

Some alterations,—all in the direction of lessening the cost,—have been found desirable, and measures have been taken for effecting these when more targets are made.

There is an advantage which may be realized in the use of these targets for the trial of which, no opportunity was offered last September; I refer to the use of the telegraph as a means of communication between the range officer at the firing point and the officer in charge of the markers in the trench. A single line of wire from a telegraph stationed at mid length of the markers trench, extending down the centre of the ranges could be readily constructed with a portable instrument at the firing points. This means of communication would save a very great deal of time as compared with the present system of bugle calls which are often misunderstood. By means of the telegraph the range officer could send and receive intelligence as to the marking on any one of the targets without interrupt-

ing the practice at the others, an advantage which will be readily understood by all marksmen, most of whom will have unpleasant memories of annoying delays arising out of the necessity of stopping the practice at all the targets in order to communicate with one. I am convinced that the adoption of this system of signalling, the cost of which would not be more than ten dollars per diem, would be exceedingly popular, and would in fact by shortening the contests, effect a very considerable saving in the gross expenses of the meeting.

The experience now gained justifies the conclusion that a pair of targets on the new plan, assuming that several are ordered at one time, can be constructed and equipped on the following estimate:—

Of this sum the permanent work costs...\$105 00

The remainder is estimated to last 20 days, and is therefore equivalent to 62½ cents per diem while target practice is actually going on. This daily expenditure takes the place of the cost of the paint brushes, signal discs, &c., now commonly used.

WIMBLEDON TEAM, 1874.

TORONTO, OCTOBER 1st, 1874.

To the President of the Dominion Rifle Association.

SIR,—I have the honour to report that, having been appointed by you to the command of the Canadian Team selected to proceed to Wimbledon, I received the instructions issued by you for my guidance, dated May 13th, 1874; and that, in compliance therewith, I proceeded on the 19th June to Quebec, where Major Montizambert, second in command, and the Team (20) reported themselves to me; Sergeant Hancock, of the 13th Battalion, also placed himself under my command, and, travelling at his own expense, accompanied the Team to Wimbledon:

Lieut.-Colonel Macpherson, Treasurer of the Dominion Rifle Association, met me at Quebec, and made all the necessary arrangements with the steamship proprietors for the comfort of the Team, leaving nothing for me to attend to in this respect.

Some members of the Team having informed me that the Snider Rifles in their possession were much worn, I represented the matter to Lieutenant-Colonel Powell, Acting Adjutant-General, who kindly furnished me with twelve new rifles out of store. Colonel Powell was also good enough to supply me with new uniforms for the non-commissioned officers and men; and the thanks of the Dominion Rifle Association are due to Colonel Powell for his earnestness in rendering all possible aid to make the Team effective.

We sailed from Quebec on the 20th June, the Team having been previously addressed by Lieutenant-Colonel Macpherson, who, in a few forcible words, told them of the duties required of them as marksmen and as Canadian volunteers.

We arrived at Liverpool on the 1st July, and, having made the necessary arrangements at Altcar for the use of the rifle ranges there, kindly placed at my service by the Liverpool Volunteers, I handed over the command of the Team to Major Montizambert, and proceeded to London.

Mr. George T. Haigh, Canadian Emigration Agent at Liverpool, gave me valuable assistance while there, and I request that he may be properly thanked by the Dominion Rifle Association.

Several invitations to dinners, &c., were, in the most hospitable manner, tendered to me for the Team; but I was compelled to decline them all, the time available for rifle practice being so limited.

Major Montizambert subsequently reported to me that the Team practised at the Altcar ranges on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd July, using the new Wimbledon targets; all the ammunition required having been supplied by the Lancashire Volunteers with their usual thoughtful generosity. I annex a statement of the scores made at Altcar.

Major Montizambert accepted challenges for friendly matches between the Canadians and the Liverpool Rifle Brigade and the 1st Cheshire, to be fired simultaneously. The scores were:—

Liverpool Rifle Brigade.....	1209 points.
Canadians.....	1161 “
1st Cheshire.....	1115 “

On Thursday, 2nd July, I went to Wimbledon, and found that—thanks to Lieutenant-Colonel Gzowski—the Canadian Camp had been already marked out, tents pitched, &c., and but little of preparation to be made by me for the Team.

I considered the supply of bedding, &c., as given to the Team in 1873, to be quite insufficient for health or comfort, and I procured such additional articles as seemed to me necessary, at a slight increase of expense.

On Friday, 3rd July, I saw Captain Mildmay, Secretary of the National Rifle Association, and made the entries for the Team.

A question had arisen whether the Canadians were entitled to compete—as in previous years—for the St. George's Vase, the conditions of the match stating, “That the Vase was presented for the thirteenth time to the Volunteer Battalions of *Great Britain*, by Lieut.-Colonel the Honourable C. H. Lindsay.” It was very manifest that the Staff of the Association, and the Volunteers in camp—to a man—earnestly desired that the question should be decided in favour of the Canadians being admitted to compete. It was finally arranged that the Team should compete, not paying entrance fees, and not claiming any prizes—the scores made, however, to count on the “Grand Aggregate;” Hickey and Omand, with scores respectively of 33 and 30, would have come in for prizes. The entrance fees for this match, £11, I divided among the Team 11s. each. I submit a copy of a letter I received from Major Waller, St. George's Rifles, and of my reply thereto:—

“MEMBERS' CAMP, WIMBLEDON,

“20th July, 1874.

“DEAR COLONEL GILLMOR,—I think it right to let you know that I have endeavoured to obtain from Colonel Lindsay the sanction for Messrs. Hickey and Omand, of your Team, to receive the prizes, and wear the badges they won in the St. George's competition. Unfortunately our rules do not allow any others than Volunteers of *Great Britain* to compete; so your men are most unfortunately shut out from receiving the prizes. At the same time, Colonel Lindsay feels only too

pleased to present them with the badges which he considers they are entitled to wear. I may add that I have no doubt that next year our rules will be so amended as to admit all our Colonists to competition in this prize, on the same footing as the Home Volunteers; and this, I am sure, would give all British Volunteers the liveliest satisfaction.

With kind regards, and wishing you and all your Team a safe and prosperous voyage to the old Dominion,

“MY DEAR MAJOR WALLER,—I have duly received your letter of the 20th instant, in which you say that the St. George's badges will be presented to Messrs. Hickey and Omand, and I thank you very much for the courtesy you exhibited towards the Canadian Team during the match.

“I am glad to be assured by you that hereafter your rules will be so framed as to place beyond all question the fact that the Volunteers of Canada are ‘British Volunteers.’

“I thank you heartily for myself, and for the Team, for your good wishes.

On Saturday, 4th July, Major Montizambert and the Team arrived in Camp at 9 P.M.

I made entries as follow :—

The results of the firing of the Team in the several matches were as follows :—

1. *The Queen's*.—Four prizes : Lieut. Whitman, with a score of 73, unfortunately missed the target with his last round, and thus lost a place in the first Sixty ; and, on firing off ties with sixteen others, was again unfortunate. Whitman, Mitchell, Macpherson and Baillie won prizes of £3 each. Major Gibson, with 64 points, lost on firing off ties with fifty-one others. Sergeant Hancock, 13th Battalion, with 68 points won £3.
2. *The Alfred*.—No prizes : highest score made by the Team being 26 ; and 27 was the lowest score that took a prize.
3. *The Alexandra*.—Nine prizes : Layton, Macnachtan, Disher, Macpherson and Morgan won £5 each. Mason, Omand, Pain and Whitman, £3 each. Gibson, with 43 points, lost on firing off ties with forty-five others.
4. *Windmill, 200 Yards*.—One prize : Pallen won £2.
5. *Windmill, 500 Yards*.—One prize : Mason won £2. Macnachtan, with 28 points, neglected to fire off ties, and thus lost a chance of a prize.
6. *Martins' Challenge Cup*.—One prize : Wolfenden won £5.
7. *Extra Prizes, 1st Series*.—No prize : Sutherland, with 32 points lost on firing off ties with seventeen others.
8. *Daily Telegraph*.—Three prizes : Baillie won 3rd Prize, £3. Church and Wolfenden won £2 each. Layton, with a score of 31, lost on firing off ties with forty-eight competitors.
9. *Rifle Oaks*.—One Prize : Macnachtan won 2nd Prize, £2 19s. 10d.
10. *Graphie*.—One Prize : Gibson won £5.
- 11, 12. *Curtis and Harvey, and Pavilion Prizes*.—In these matches competitors were allowed to make three entries each. I made one entry for each of the Team ; no prizes. Subsequently in the "Curtis and Harvey," Wynne and Macnachtan, with 34 points, lost their respective chances of the 1st Prize, but won £4 and £2 respectively. Brazeau also won £2. In the "Pavilion," Macnachtan and Baillie, with 29 points each, lost on firing off ties with twenty-one competitors.
13. *St. George's Vase*.—Two prizemen : Hickey, with 32 points (the highest score made being 35), stood 10th on list of competi-

tors, a place entitling him to a miniature jewel, a badge and £10. Omand, with 30 points, stood 37th to win a badge and £5.

14. *Snider Association Cup*.—No prize; Macnachten made 46 points; 47 won the one prize in this match.
15. *Grand Aggregate*.—No prize: Mitchell made highest aggregate score among the Team, 205 points; 240, 238 and 237 points won the three Prizes in this match.
16. *Battalion Sweepstakes*.—No prize: Five members of the 13th Battalion being on the Team, and Sergt. Hancock, of the same corps, having accompanied the Team from Canada, I entered the 13th for the Battalion Sweepstakes, this being the first Colonial Battalion Team ever entered at Wimbledon. The score of 13th was 342; 420 won a prize.
17. *Kolapore Cup*.—For this prize I entered the eight members of the Team who had made the highest aggregate score at Altcar and at Wimbledon. The scores, however, made in this match were not up to the previous averages, and the Canadians were far behind, the scores being:—

Home Team	542 points.
Indian Team.....	493 “
Canadian Team.....	450 “

With regard to the fact of a so-called “Indian Team” competing for the Kolapore Cup, I am unwilling to make any comments, but I may say that there was—if I except what the Indian eight may have felt—an universal feeling throughout the Camp that they ought not to have entered. The *Volunteer Gazette* says—“The Mother Country Team takes the Cup, or rather pair of vases, given by the Rajah of Kolapore, and £40 in money, with a score of 542, eight men at Queen’s ranges with Sniders. The Indian Team comes next with 493, and the Canadians last with 450. We observe that in the official return a prize of £80 is given to the Indians. This is certainly a liberal interpretation of the condition that ‘a money prize of £80 shall be given to the Indian or Colonial Team making the highest aggregate score,’ but we are not sure that the words will bear such an interpretation, though it was probably not intended. Probably the conditions will be altogether revised before the next meeting. They are at present very loosely drawn, and it is impossible to tell whether the words ‘home on leave,’ in the condition about the Indian Team are, or are not, intended to affect the whole of the classes subsequently mentioned; at any rate, it seems to us that the clause ought to be so modified as to make them do so in future. As they are interpreted at present, any one who has ever happened to belong to an Indian Rifle Association, and to have shot at one of its

meetings, is held to be eligible to compete in an 'Indian Team,' which seems absurd."

The *Globe* correspondent says :—"There were three Teams entered—one from the Mother Country, one from India (?), and the Canadians. The Team from England was about the best that could have been selected out of the whole camp, and consisted of the best eight in the International Snider contest ; the Team styled the 'Indian Team' was very mixed, and was, it is said, composed of gentlemen who had either lived in India or were absent from that far country on leave, and I need not say that this entry gave a great deal of dissatisfaction to many in camp, in which I can count some members of the English eight. Had the India men come purposely, as Canadians did, to compete for the prize, no one would have grumbled ; but to get up a scratch team, like this Indian one, was really stretching the point too far, and I hope that by next year the Council will see the wisdom of changing the conditions, so that none but *bona fide* Teams can compete. It was as pure an English Team as that from the Mother Country ; and, as a prominent officer expressed it, one had but to drink a glass of India pale ale to entitle him to enter for the Kolapore competition."

Members of the Team shot independently in the following matches :—

Bass.—Two prizes : Four competitors made 34 points. Wynne, firing off ties, lost his chance of 1st Prize, but got the 3rd, £3. Brazeau, with 32 points, won £2.

Walter Scott.—One prize : Brazeau, with 34 points, won, on firing off ties, 1st Prize, valued £20.

Extra Prizes, 2nd Series.—Whitman, with 30 points, won 1st Prize, valued £20.

Albert.—One prize : Mason, with 83 points, won £5. Disher, with 82 points, lost on firing off ties with four others.

Ladies' any Rifle Prize.—One prize : Mason, nominated by Miss Fairtlough, won 4th Prize, £5.

Ladies' Snider Prize.—No prize : Macnachtan, nominated by Miss Fairtlough, made 30 points ; 31 took prize.

Prince of Wales' Prize... Two prizes : Mason and Disher won £5 each.

Consolation Prizes.—One prize : Sutherland, with 34 points, on firing off ties with five others, won 5th Prize, £4.

This gives a total of 35 prizes won by the Team, including two first prizes. One prize was also won by Sergeant Hancock.

Messrs. Dollond & Co. presented the Team with a valuable teles-

cope, won by Wynne; and Mr. Steward, Optician to the National Rifle Association, also presented a field glass, won by Macpherson.

The several prizes won during the competition were distributed on Saturday, 18th July, by H.R.H. the Princess Christian, who also handed to each member of the Team the "Wimbledon Badge of 1874."

On Monday, the 20th July, the members of the Team were paid off and the camp equipage handed over to the proper authorities.

I have the honour to report that Major Montizambert carefully attended to the firing of the Team in the several competitions, as also to the interior economy of the camp, and performed all his duties in the most satisfactory manner.

The Dominion Rifle Association may well feel proud of the men selected to compose the Team of 1874; their conduct was invariably good; their soldierlike appearance was remarked by all in camp; the utmost harmony prevailed among them, and they showed a determination to meet my wishes in all respects, and obeyed implicitly all orders issued.

Marked attentions were paid to the Canadian Team by Lord Ducie, President of the National Rifle Association, and by Capt. Mildmay, Capt. Costin, Capt. Salmond; and indeed by all the members of the Staff of the Association we were treated with the utmost courtesy, and every effort was made to make our stay in camp as agreeable as possible.

On Friday, the 10th July, Lieut.-Colonel Gzowski presented an address to Major-General Sir Garnet J. Wolseley, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., &c., the full details of which have appeared in the papers.

Many officers of Her Majesty's Forces, who had from time to time served in Canada, visited and inspected the Canadian Camp, and expressed deep interest in the welfare of the Dominion and the Volunteers of Canada. Among them I may mention Sir G. J. Wolseley, Generals MacDougall, Napier, Hardyng, McMurdo; Colonel Sir Henry Havelock, &c.

H.R.H. the Duke of Cambridge inspected the Team, and was pleased to welcome them to England, and to express himself as much pleased with their soldierlike appearance.

Lord Carnarvon also inspected the Team, and afterwards addressed them as follows:—"It afforded him the greatest pleasure to see them all at Wimbledon. He was informed that the men came from all the provinces of Canada, and that they therefore represented well the Dominion. He was in receipt of letters at the Colonial Office from day to day which showed a strong desire on the part of the Canadian people to have their Militia made in every respect thoroughly efficient for

the protection of the Dominion. He was persuaded that there was no portion of the Queen's possessions more thoroughly British, more thoroughly loyal than the Canadians, and he felt that those present before him were as much members of this great empire as any others present at this meeting."

The opinion of the deep and devoted loyalty of the Canadians, so forcibly expressed by Lord Carnarvon, seems to be thoroughly understood by all parties in England; and there appears to be no room to doubt that Englishmen appreciate the value of the connection with Canada, and are determined, at any cost, to maintain it.

The Canadian Camp of 1874 will long be remembered at Wimbledon, in consequence of the lavish expenditure on its decoration by Lieut.-Colonel Gzowski, and his genuine hospitality. Colonel Gzowski pitched his tent in the Canadian Camp, and on Friday, 10th July, entertained there upwards of 800 guests. Their names, and the full details of the event, having been duly reported in all the papers, I do not think it is proper for me to dwell in this report more fully on the matter. I consider that it was not only the Canadian Riflemen and Volunteers, whose representative I was, who were served by Col. Gzowski's presence and exertions in our Camp, but I feel that all Canadians have good cause of pride at knowing that there is in our Dominion one who, on such an occasion, could so worthily and efficiently do honour to Canada.

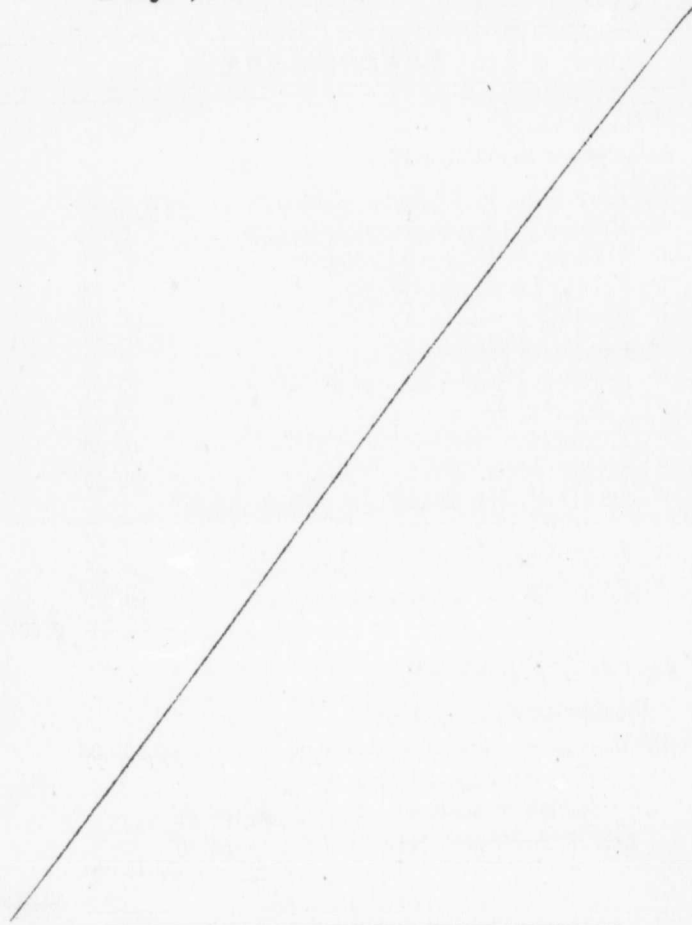

DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

We, the undersigned, agree to the following Regulations :

1. The Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates selected by the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association from the Active Militia of the Dominion of Canada to represent the said Dominion at the meeting of the National Rifle Association, to be held at Wimbledon in July, 1874, are, from the date of signing of this agreement, until discharged from duty at Wimbledon, to be under the immediate command of Lieutenant-Colonel Gillmor, Queen's Own Rifles, Canada; and to be subject to such orders and regulations as he may, from time to time, issue for their guidance.
2. No Member of the Team to be absent the Headquarters of the Team from the day of landing in England, and until released from duty, after the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, on any pretence whatever, without the permission of the officer in command.
3. Any member of the Team disobeying the order of the officer commanding, or contravening any of the orders made for the regulation of the force assembled at Wimbledon, or be under the influence of drink, shall forfeit his return tickets.
4. The Members of the Team shall have their steamship and railway fares paid, as well as their ordinary board on the steamship, and at such places after landing in England, and until the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, as the officer commanding may select. All such allowances to be stopped from any member of the Team guilty of a breach of this agreement.
5. No Member of the Team shall send communications to the Press for publication with respect to the shooting or any other matter connected with the Team.
6. The officer Commanding will provide the necessary ammunition, pay entrance fees and sighting shots for the matches open to the Team as a Team, or as individuals; and all prizes in *money* won by the

Team, or by individuals, in such matches, shall be divided *equally among the members of the Team.*

7. *Prizes in Kind* won by the Team as a Team, or by the aggregate shooting of the whole or any number of the Team, are not to be considered the property the Team collectively or individually; but, such prizes are to be handed over to the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, for such subsequent disposition as the Council of that Association may determine upon.

8. *Prizes in Kind* won by any member of the Team, individually, in matches open to individual competition, to become the property of the winner, if not inconsistent with the Wimbledon conditions, under which such competition is held.

9. At the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, and when relieved from duty by the officer in command, Return Tickets will be furnished to each member of the Team from Wimbledon to the port of embarkation, thence by the Allan Line of Steamships to Canada. Such members, after being so discharged from duty, may suit their own convenience as to time for returning to Canada; but no expenses will be paid on account of any member of the Team beyond the period necessary to complete the duty at Wimbledon, and the time of sailing of the first steamer of the Allan Line from Liverpool to Quebec, after discharge.

10. The Officer Commanding will make requisite arrangements for the transport of the members of the Team, on their return from Quebec to their homes.

11. Should any member of the Team from the Provinces of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick elect to return direct to Halifax, and in the event of any of the Allan Line of Steamships sailing from Liverpool to that port about the time, the officer commanding may authorize such arrangement, provided no further charge is made for the passage by the steamship company than that included in the Return Tickets to Quebec.

12. Each Member of the Team, on his being released from duty at Wimbledon, will sign an Acquittance Roll, to the effect that he has been properly settled with in accordance with these regulations.

13. The Officer in Command will, on the completion of the duty, forward a report to the President of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association on the manner in which the same has been carried out, accompanied by the Acquittance Roll and Statement of Accounts of all ex.

penditure connected therewith, full details of shooting and conduct of the members of the Team.

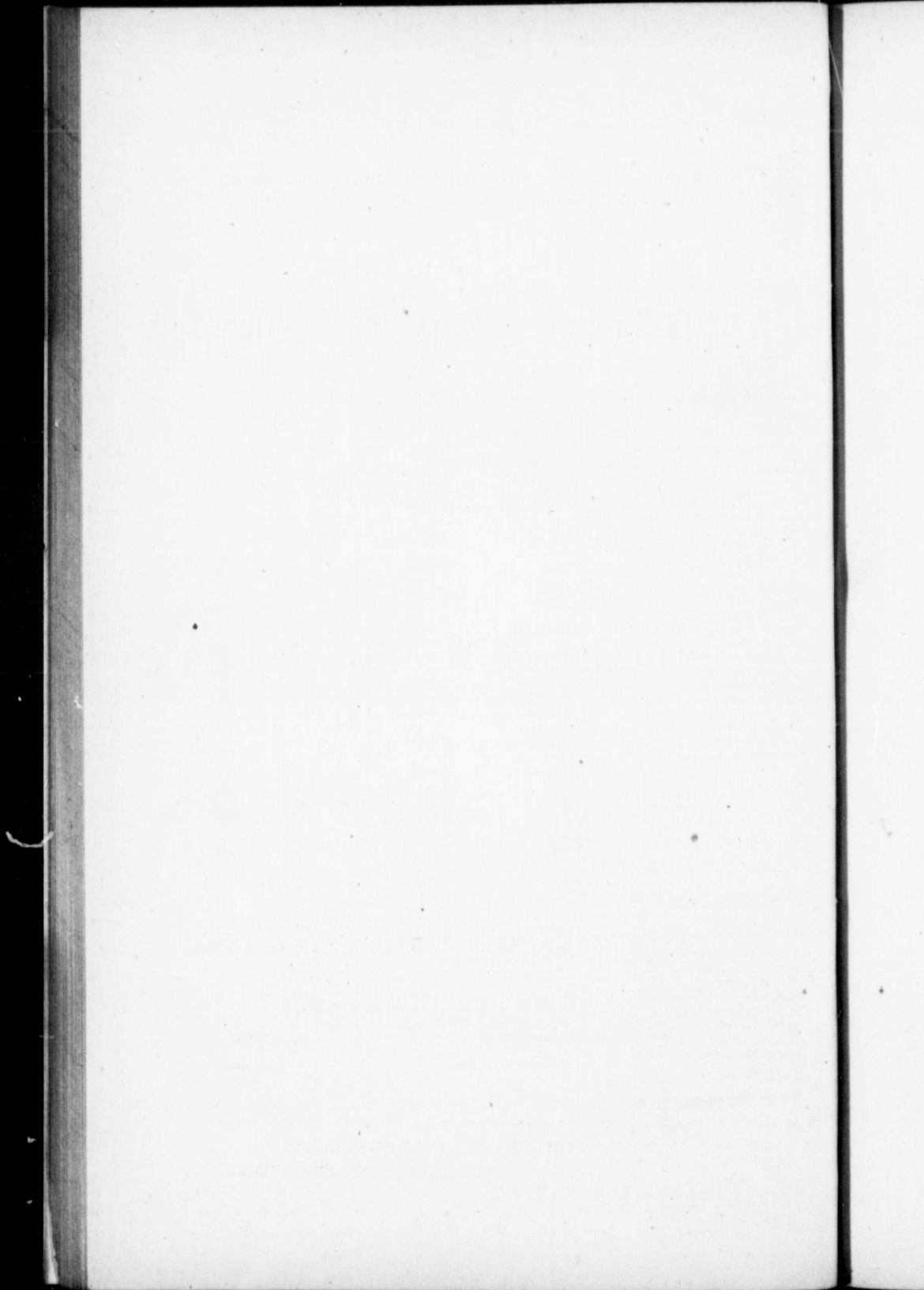

R U L E S .

- 1.—That this Association be denominated “ THE DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.”
- 2.—Any person being a subscriber of \$2.00 per annum shall become a member of the Association.
- 3.—Donors of \$40.00 at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a Prize of not less value, to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life Members of the Association.
- 4.—Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$40.00 annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion not less than \$20.00 annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it, and shall be entitled to a ~~number~~ of memberships in the proportion of one to every dollar thus subscribed. Each subscribing Association is to elect from its members the persons to hold such memberships, and return their names and addresses, when elected, to the Secretary of the Dominion Rifle Association, to be registered by him one month previous to the Match.
- 5.—There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons named by the Council.
(The Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become “ Patron.”)
- 6.—There shall be a President.
- 7.—There shall be Vice-Presidents.
- 8.—There shall be a Council of Fifty-two Members, who shall be elected in the following proportions :

Sixteen,	[16]	from Ontario.
Twelve,	[12]	“ Quebec.
Seven,	[7]	“ New Brunswick.
Seven,	[7]	“ Nova Scotia.
Five,	[5]	“ Manitoba.
Five,	[5]	“ British Columbia.

of whom four shall form a quorum, and who shall be elected, primarily, by the delegates now assembled at Ottawa, and hereafter at the Annual Meeting,—and the General Meetings of the Council shall be held at the Capital of the Dominion.
- 9.—The Council shall choose from the members elected the President of the Association.
- 10.—There shall be a Vice-President from each Province, selected from among the Members of the Association, and who shall be elected by the Council.
- 11.—The Presidents of the various Provincial Associations in connection with this Association, and the Militia Staff Officers in

charge of the several Militia Districts of the Dominion, being members thereof, shall be *ex-officio* Vice-Presidents, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.

- 12.—There shall be a Treasurer, and there shall be a paid Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.
- 13.—The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council, for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do, all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
- 14.—The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such By-laws as may from time to time be enacted by them;—no By-law being in any case altered, or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.
- 15.—The Annual Prize Meetings shall be held at Ottawa at such times as may be determined on by the Council.
- 16.—The Prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such Regulations as may be passed by the Council from time to time.
- 17.—An Annual Report, embracing the audited account of the Finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council) be published as soon after the Prize Meeting as may be found practicable.
- 18.—There shall be an Annual Meeting, to be held at such time as shall be selected by the Council.

BY-LAWS.

- Annual Meeting.** The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held at Ottawa on the third Wednesday after the assembling of the General Session of the Parliament of the Dominion.
- Meetings of Council.** There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council. The first of which shall be held on the day after the Annual Meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.
- Extraordinary Meetings.** Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required by any six of the members of the Council,—notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fifteen days previous to such Meeting,—and the requisition for the Meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meeting.
- The Council to keep minutes of all proceedings.** The Council shall keep Minutes of its proceedings at all Meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary,—and open to the inspection of any member of the Council.
- Finance Committee.** There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three of the Council.
- Treasurer to deposit sums received in Savings Bank.** The Treasurer is authorized to deposit from time to time, in the Savings Department of the Ontario Bank, all sums of money paid over to him on behalf of the Association.
- Expenditure of sums for current expenses.** All expenditure of sums for current expenses which may be required by the Secretary must be authorized by the signature of the President of the Association, or in his absence by some member of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.
- Expenditures of a general nature.** Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.
- Annual Accounts.** A detailed statement of all Receipts and Expenditure shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer.
