
Fire.—At an early hour on Friday morning last a fire broke out in the stable of Mr. T. E. Hay, at the rear of his residence. The stable contained Mr. Hay's horse and cow, several sets of harness, a cutter, a quantity of hay and a lot of tools, all of which, together with the building, were burned, the fire not being discovered in time to save them. It was only by the strenuous exertions of those who were first on the spot that Mr. Hay's residence was protected from the devouring element. For some reason the fire brigade did not arrive with the engine until it was too late to be of any service. If the want of an effective system of alarm was the cause of this dilatoriness on the part of the brigade, then no time should be lost in providing the remedy, as it is a waste of mouey incurring the expense of maintaining a fire brigade unless its services can be relied upon whenever required. Mr. Hay's loss is about \$800\cdot\text{ insurance on building and contents, \$440\text{ The fire is supposed to have been caused by a spark from Messrs. Climie's mill. About six years ago Mr. Hay had his stable burned in the same way. We think that the Council should investigate the matter, and see if something cannot be done to protect the property of citzens from the danger to which it is exposed by sparks and cinders from the nunerous smokestacks which tower up in the heart of town.
