Three knights only appeared on the
fourth entry, who, avoiding the

with touching those of the three
other knights, who had not alto-
gether manifested the same strength
and dexterity. This politic selec-
tion did not alter the fortune of the
field, the challengers were still
successful; one of their antagonists
was overthrown, and both the others
failed in the attack, that is, in
striking the helmet and shield of
their antagonist firmly and strongly,
