Tourist Trade & Forest Fires

The tourist trade of Canada present is estimated to be upwards of fifty million dollars a year. The railways handle so many enquiries from United States tourists planning outing trips to Canada that the chef difficulty at the present time is to provide proper hunting and fishing camps in Northern Ontario and Quebec to accommodate the influx of Americans. It s well to note 'that the income' of Canada is very largely a 'forest income.' The lure of Canada is identified in the Am erican mind chiefly with splendid epportunities for outdoor sport sport such as fishing and camping and thousands of our neighbors await only the extension of camp and guide facilities in certan districts of Central Canada.

Those identified with railways and tourist business realize that the chief foe of a vest tourist traffic to Canada is the Forest Fire. Many of the most beautiful and wellstocked woodlands have been horrib ly devastated by fires set by reckltss campers and smokers. Last year no fewer than 5.400 such fires were started by human agencies And it is safe to say that in hundreds of the burned areas the possibility of tourist traffic is eliminated for fifty years to come Any woodsman knows that and game are destroyed or out by forest fires. REDBANK MAN **UNSCATHED BY** MANY DANGERS

More adventures befell A.J. Mo-Allister; foreman of telephone con struction for the Ontario Forst Department on Saturday last in half a day's journey from Red Cedar Lake to Field on the C.N.R. than befalls the average man in a lifetime. In the course of the trip he escaped death from drowning; faced two packs of wolves: and was finally stricken snowblind before at last reaching Field.

Just below the dam the ice and snow broke from the bank where the current wa wift and McAllister was thrown into a small cedar tree overhanging the bank-just in time to save him self from being drawn under the ice by the current. After considerable trouble he managed to pull himself nately holding him firm. After wringing out his stockings and get proceeded on his trip down Island Lake to the canal leading to J.B. Smith's landing. Half a mile from the landing he was confronted by facd him but McAllister drew his hatchet and advanced whereat the the bush he stopped for another look at the forestry man then turned tail and disappeared.

CANADA THIRD LARGEST OWNER OF AUTOMOBILES

Canada has experienced an inrease of 1'170 per cent in the number of Canadian-owned motor the country compared with the official figures just made public of 642,571 at the end of 1923. 1903 the total motor vehicles registration for the stood at but 220. World registration of motor ears and trucks totals 18;241 477 of which 15:222:655 is represented by the United States and 653 318 the United Kingdom which although possessing a population considerably larger than that of Canada only boast of 10;000 more motor vehicles.

It will thus be seen that the Dominion is within 10,000 of being the second greatest motor-owning population in the world. In this regard it is far in advance of such nations as France; Germany; Russia and !Italy with many times her

In point of production Canada stands second only to the United States. A very large proportion of the motor vehicles in the United Kingdom bear the "Made-in-Canada" stamp.

SIR LOUIS DAVIES DIED AT OTTAWA

Sir Louis Davies; Chief Justice of Canada died at Ottawa Thursday morning at a 12:35 after an illness age.

In May 1872 he was married to Miss Susan Wiggins daughter Rev. Dr. Wiggins and had one son and three daughters.

Ninety per cent of the children in the United States tween the ages of 10 and 13 have enough tubercule bacilli in bodies to make them potential victims of the "white plague."

This was the statement of George E. Bailey Supreme Secretary of the Independent Order of Foresters, a fraternal society with 165;000 members in the United States and Canada which maintains tuberculosis sanatoriums for members affilicted with the disease at Lopez Canyon near Lso Angeles and at Rainbow Lake in the Adirondacks.

"Children are particularly suscept-'If the ravages of the disease are to be checked successfully we a must Legin with the youngsters. Tubercul osis can be permanently cured among children. Among adults in most cases it can only be arrested. For every death from tuberculosis there are nine active cases

"Growing children should have ten hours of sleep. They should have plenty of sunshine and fresh air. They should learn to sleep with their windows open. They should be trained not to put their fingers in their mouths or to chew the ends They should not bite of pencils. their finger nails. Thty should stand erect and practice deep breathing.

"All these principles of right living should be inculcated in the minds of children so that they may become familiar with the best means of resisting tuberculosis. Good health habits and sanitation are essential Instruction in the home factors. and school is of the utmost impor-..

Here and There

The Canadian Pacific steamer Empress of Britain will arrive at Quebec shortly on her first voyage from Liverpool as a cabin-class steamer under hes new name Montroyal. She is the fastest vessel sailing out of Liverpool and is scheduled to run from there to Quebec in six and a half days.

British Columbia's payroll for 1923 was \$150,000,000, according to the annual report of the Workman's Compensation Board. man's Compensation Board. The payroll for 1922 was \$122,592, 502, and for 1921, \$130,099,373. Em-ploying firms operating at the end of last year numbered 6,524, an in-crease of 145 over the previous year.

The 1924 season for the port of Montreal was officially opened on the morning of the 18th of April, when the Government ice-breaker Lady Grey arrived in the harbor. A big season is anticipated, especially by the Canadian Pacific steamships, whose vessels on the St. Lawrence route this year will exceed 197,000 gross tons.

Vancouver this season has beaten Portland, the great wheat port of the Northwest and formerly the great wheat port of the Pacific. Portland includes flour in its wheat totals, Vancouver does not. According to the Portland press the American city has moved over 29.000.000 bushels of wheat to date. Vancouver, in the same period, shipped 36,000,000 bushels, exclusive of a very considerable quantity of flour.

The much prized Wilder silver medal, the highest award of the American Pomological Society, the oldest horticultural body in North America, has been awarded to the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa for the sixth time. The medal on this occasion was given for the Lobo apple, one of the many fine varieties of McIntosh Red parentage originated at the Central Farm. originated at the Central Farm.

An estimate of \$1,500,000 for fire An estimate of \$1,500,000 for fire protection and management of forest reserves has been placed before the Government for approval by the Minister of the Interior. The Minister stated that more drastic measures of fire prevention would be taken this year and in this connection the Department of the Interior proposes to utilize the Royal Canadian Air Force for the detection of fires.

An appeal for increased pensions for the originals of the old Royal North-West Mounted Police is now before the Federal Parliament. The before the Federal Parliament. The present pensions are based on the pay standards of 20 to 30 years ago and are therefore quite inadequate, the appeal claims, and it is asked that they be raised to the same level as those granted members of the present Royal Canadian Mounted Police, on retirement.

"There is not a single geological reason why each and all of the world-famous mining camps, such as those of Kirkland Lake, Porcupine and Sudbury, should not be duplicated almost anywhere in the 650,000 square miles of the Quebec Laurentian Plateau, which stretches from the Ottawa and St. Lawrence Rivers to Hudson Strait." according to a statement made by T. C. Denis, Superintendent of Mines of the Province of Quebec, at a recent meeting of the Quebec branch of the Mining Institute of Canada.

Canada is financially sound. On April 14th the investors and savings account holders of the country were offered twelve million dollars worth of Canadian Pacific Railway five per cent bonds and by four o'clock that afternoon the issue had been over-subscribed and the books were closed. Telegraph orders came from all parts of the Dominion, a splendid evidence of the amount of money available for sound investment and the country's confidence in the future of the big railway. Another evidence is seen in the fact that evidence is seen in the fact that evidence is seen in the fact that small investors are putting savings into C.P.R. common stock which pays ten per cent on par value of \$100,000. Since 1907, Canadian holdings of this stock have increased from 9.75 per cent to 21 per cent at the present time and holdings in the British Empire total about 75 per cent.

Here and There

Shipments of grain from Vancouver for the 1923-24 season have now passed the 41,000,000 bushel mark. Officials estimate that the 50,000,000 bushel mark set for the season will be surpassed in the near future.

Reports from England state that it has been universally conceded that Canada's pavilion was in the best condition when the King opened the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley on April 23rd. "It was the Canadian building," the reports said, "spick and span and complete to the last nail that led all others in the race to the finish in time for to-day's official opening."

Over 3,000 settlers left Liverpool for Canada on April 24th. Thirteen hundred of these sailed on the Canadian Pacific liner "Montcalm." including a party of 200 skilled workers from Manchester, 38 belonging to engineering trades, 40 to building trades and 42 farm hands. Eighty skilled workers from Leeds and a party of engineers from Barrow-in-Furness were also on board.

A total of 40,000,000 salmon trouteges has been collected during the last season by the Department of Marine and Fisheries in Lake Huron, Georgian Bay and Lake Superior. The total number obtained compares favorably with the average collections of recent years, and is sufficient to fill all the hatcheries on the Great Lakes engaged in the prepagation of selmon trout.

Graphic and interesting educational motion pictures will bring Aberta's various resources to the eyes of those who attend the British Empire Exhibition this year. In addition to pictures illustrating the life of Alberta's citizens on the farms, on the ranches and in the mining districts, charts will be used to bring out interesting compilations of statistics illustrative of the province's agricultural and industrial output.

Carrying an invitation to the President of the United States to attend the celebrations of the 140th anniversary of the settlement of Upper Canada by the United Empire Loyalists, which will be held in June, Miss G. Laleer, herself a descendant of the Loyalists, left Belleville recently on horseback to ride to Washington alone, a distance of 600 miles. Elaborate arrangements for the celebrations are being made and it is expected that thousands of visitors will attend.

An attractive booklet entitled, "A Week in Quebec in the Spring," by Betty Thornley, internationally known writer associated with "Vogue" and other magazines, has just been added to the series of artistic pamphlets published by the Canadian Pacific Railway. It describes the Ancient Capital and its environs, is illustrated by many striking photographs and bound in striking photographs and bound in a cover which reproduces in natural colors the pattern of cloth called catalogne, woven by Quebec habitant

That the Indian village of Hochelaga, which stood on the site of the present city of Montreal, was a place of about fifty wooden houses having a population of some 4,000 souls when Jacques Cartier sailed up the St. Lawrence, was the assertion made by Dr. W. D. Lighthall before the Antiquarian and Numismatic Society of Montreal recently. Dr. Lighthall was able to give the boundaries of the village and described it as resembling the home of Cedric the Saxon, in "Ivanhoe."

Apropos of the recent "Save the Forest Week," E. W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, stated: "A week's concentration on saving the forests of Canada is well worth while—much better to make it a "Forest Saving Year' and, if the forest resources of this country are to be conserved to adequately avail the greater Canada of a few years hence it must be a 'Forest Saving Generation.' Forest wastage is to-day tragically too great and we Canadians must pay and are paying for the loss."






