The appointment was valuable from a publie standpoint as it gave the doctor an opportunity to enforce his views on matters relating to public health, as also to see the law carried out where

people as well as their property were more or less a source of public injury.

This appointment was absolutely non political, made at the request of two parish priests, and recognized by every man of intelligence as done in

Matters were progressing satisfactorily until a conglomeration of old Tories and Liberal deserters decided to join their fortunes in a new venture under the title of the People's Party. No sooner had Mr. Cashin secured a fat salary as Minister of Finance, with the coveted title of honourable, then he set to work to
