

Police Saves Seven From Fire

Crowds cheer when a family swing across gap to adjoining fire escape.

New York, Oct. 29.—Through clouds of dense smoke two policemen yesterday brought a man, his wife, his mother and four children down the fire escape of 148 Madison Street to the third floor, where they were barred by flames. Then, while a crowd cheered, they swung all seven across a gap to the fire escape of the adjoining building, six feet lower, and passed all seven from a cornice over a butcher shop to the street.

A few minutes before this the policemen, Glennon and Miller, had calmed a panic among two hundred worshippers in a synagogue on the third floor and got everybody out in safety.

The fire started in the basement of the four-story brick building, Isidori Jablins occupies the basement and first floor as a Turkish bath establishment. The second floor is vacant, the third is the synagogue of the neighborhood, and the fourth was the home of Morris Weingarten, thirty-nine years old, and his wife, Miriam, 30; his mother, Rebecca, 60, and his children, from two to 8 years old.

Hurrying to the spot on hearing a chorus of shrieks and cries, Miller and Glennon found the flames making good headway, while the stairways, narrow and dark, were choked with terrorized worshippers. Several persons were trampled on before the policeman gained the upper hand, but no one was badly hurt.

When all were out the cry went up that a family was still on the top floor. Unhesitatingly plunging up the smoky stairways, the two policemen found all seven of the Weingartens either asleep or semiconscious from smoke in their beds.

They dragged them to a front window and began to carry them down the fire escapes. They brought all to the third floor, but the flames prevented their descending further. The fire escape of No. 150 was six feet below.



CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 28.

The Minister of War, Nazim Pasha, who has reached the scene of operations at last, telegraphs that he is well satisfied with the position of the Turkish forces and expects a decisive battle soon. He says that the Bulgarian Army sustained such severe losses in the battle last Wednesday that they were unable to reform and resume offensive operations. On the other hand, he adds, the Turkish forces have gained strength and numbers and await with confidence the Bulgarian attack. Helmi Bey, who commanded a division at Kirk Killisseh, and is credited with inflicting heavy losses on the Bulgarians, has been promoted to Brigadier General. Nazim Pasha studied in the Military School of St. Cyr, France. For a long time he was exiled by the late Sultan, Abdul Hamid, and is now one of the most popular and trusted of the supporters of the Young Turk regime.

Household Notes.

Water bottles and decanters can be cleaned with salt and vinegar. Put a dessert spoonful of rough salt into a decanter and moisten it with vinegar; then shake the decanter until the stains are removed.

A very attractive way to serve scrambled eggs is to put the eggs into a deep dish and cover with bacon, which has been cut very thin and cooked rather crisp.

We always feel a risk when cleaning ruff, wine or grease stains from very dainty materials. Ether will remove almost any stain without doing the slightest injury.

Never allow the firebox of the range to be more than three-fourths full. When full, the draft is checked, a large amount of fuel is consumed and much heat is lost.

Tin funnels should not be used carelessly. The action of acids on tin is very dangerous. For this reason it is much better for every housewife to have a porcelain funnel.

To reheat a pie, stand it in a deep baking dish filled with boiling water for half an hour. Twenty minutes before it is to be served put it in the oven to heat the crust.

Your cabbage boiled until tender and served with a cream dressing, into which you have put a good quantity of butter, is as palatable and easily digested as cauliflower.

Cream soups and purees, if allowed to stand, separate. To prevent this, melt butter, and, when bubbling, add

an equal quantity of flour. When well mixed, add to the boiling soup, stirring constantly.

Before putting milk on to boil put a little water in the pan and allow it to come to a boil; empty it out and put the milk in immediately. If this method is followed the milk will not scorch or stick to the pan.

When hanging one-piece dresses, sweaters or children's coats out to dry, hang them to the line with a string. They will be more shapely than when pinned to the line.

One way to mend children's hose is to trim the hole smoothly and even with a crochet hook and darning cotton. Go backward and forward, or around and around with the single-crochet stitch until the hole is closed.

When mending broken china, also place it to set in a large box of sawdust. By this means it is easy to stand the article in any desired position, so that its own weight holds the piece in place when the cement is hardening.

A very good substitute for egg and bread crumbs is a fairly thick paste of flour and water. Dip the fish or cutlet to be fried in this paste and sprinkle thickly with finely crumbled bread. When fried, it will be a beautiful brown color.

Eggplant is very delicious served in the following way: First boil it until tender, then mash it very fine and mix it with butter and seasoning. Put it in a baking dish and bake until a nice brown. Serve in the dish in which it is baked.

It is often difficult when arranging flowers to make them stand up nicely. If a piece of wire netting is crushed up into a ball and placed in the bowl, the flower stems can be stuck into the wire, and they will stand up satisfactorily.

The most economical steaks you can buy are the round and the rump, because they have no bone in them. To make them tender, mangle them. After steaks are mangled they should be cooked on a very hot broiler, or they will lose their juice.

When the perforations in the percolator become clogged it is apt to make the coffee muddy. Take one teaspoonful of oxalic acid crystals to a pint of water and let it percolate about twenty minutes. Then take a stiff brush and clean it out thoroughly.

Stable Flies Cause Infantile Paralysis.

Washington, Oct. 25. — Ordinary stable flies have been conclusively identified as carriers of the dreaded infantile paralysis or poliomyelitis, according to a report made to the public health service to-day by Dr. John F. Anderson, director of the hygienic laboratory and past assistant surgeon Wade H. Frost. The report gives the result of experiments with three monkeys which, after being exposed to the bites of flies which at the same time were allowed daily to bite two monkeys inoculated with virus of the disease, developed typical symptoms of poliomyelitis seven, eight and nine days respectively from the date of their first exposure. In each case the diagnosis was confirmed by autopsy, the only or usual method of transmission of the malady.

Results of studies by Dr. Mark W. Richardson, Secretary of the Massachusetts board of health, first led to the suspicion that stable flies were carriers of this disease, and recent experiments by Dr. Milton J. Rosenau of the Harvard medical school tended to confirm the theory.



Sending Out Gold.

The Minister of Agriculture made a speech at the Agricultural Exhibition at Harbor Grace yesterday, so did His Excellency the Governor, and the Prime Minister. As the head of the Department of Agriculture was undoubtedly in his own province, his speech should naturally have been the speech of the occasion. It is interesting under the circumstances to examine how the Daily News treated his speech. One newspaper measure of value is the space devoted to the report. Under this estimate we find that the Daily News devotes one-third the space it devotes to the speech of the Governor, and one-fifth of the space it gives to that of the Prime Minister. Turning now to the intrinsic merits of the speech as shown by the contents of the report, we can express no surprise at the little space devoted to it, although the place was agricultural, the occasion agricultural, and the Minister agricultural. There is not one idea reported in the speech of any intrinsic agricultural value.

The Minister is reported as stating: (1) He had attended four exhibitions at Harbor Grace; (2) such exhibitions had been held there for 50 years; (3) financially they were always successful; (4) he congratulated the Society on their exhibits; (5) and he told the audience the Governor took an interest in agriculture, for which he called for cheers.

We are guided here solely by the report of the Daily News, the principal organ of the Government, and in which might be expected the most favourable setting forth of the speech. To those who heard the Minister's speech at the opening of the Exhibition in St. John's, the Daily News report will be no surprise.

Turning now to the Premier's remarks on Agriculture, we find the same old story. Millions in gold are being sent out of the country which might be turned to the raising of cattle, sheep and produce. He enlarged on the possibilities Newfoundland affords for poultry raising, and that much might be done in the raising of hogs, a million a year being spent on importing pork.

We agree with the sentiment expressed, but we differ widely from him in the way of bringing it about. The most caustic comment that can be made on the policy that the Government has pursued since they came into office is the fact that the Government has had to remove the duty on imported hay to save the lives of cattle.

Bonne Bay Herring Fishery.

Arrivals here by last night's express say that herring are abnormally plentiful at Bonne Bay. The Messrs. Cairnes this year are going in largely for the industry and have imported an expert from Germany to put the fish up after the method in vogue in that country and which is said to be excellent.

Stella Maris Report.

The Reid Nfld. Co. had the following message this morning from the Stella Maris via Grady:—

"Arrived at Nain on the 22nd. landed freight and passengers; weather north is best for season. Government crews from Turnavik, Iliak and Makovick proceeding to Domino."

These people will likely come up on the Solway, and the Stella Maris will likely make another trip north.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Oct. 30.
A big battle, perhaps the decisive one of the war, is proceeding some where east of the line from Constantinople to Adrianople, and fighting is taking place around Adrianople itself. Beyond the facts that the clash is coming, and that the General Staffs of the Turkish and Bulgarian armies are keeping the outer world in ignorance of events, no news has come, except a despatch from Mazin Pasha, saying that the position of the Turks is favourable. There are 150,000 troops engaged. While admitting that they have to depend on mere rumours and suppositions, military critics here are inclined to believe that the Turkish Army is at least ready to take the offensive and has the chance of relieving itself. The Bulgarian troops have suffered a check in the vicinity of Adrianople, as despatches from Sofia report the arrival there of many wounded from the front, and it is announced that the Bulgarian plan of storming the great fortress has been delayed until reinforcements arrive. The position of the Turkish commander is not clear, but it is believed that he will attempt to relieve Adrianople while 50,000 men endeavour to hold the Bulgarians on the left flank. He seems to take calmly the cutting of the railway between his army and Constantinople. This might indicate that he is obtaining supplies and reinforcements by way of Rodosto, or some other part on the Sea of Marmora. Rumours that the Bulgarians had reached the sea are unconfirmed, and it is more likely that only raiding bands have gone so far south.

HALIFAX, Oct. 30.
Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, at a luncheon this afternoon, outlined the Government's proposals for remodelling Halifax Harbour front and the I. C. R. ocean terminals. The changes will be revolutionary. The docks are to be extended for 1 1/2 miles from the Lumber Yard to Point Pleasant Park, and will consist of 6 piers, 1,250 feet long and 300 feet wide, with sufficient capacity to dock at least 30 ships. There will be one bulk head loading pier, 2,000 feet in length, for ocean greyhounds; equipped with immigration buildings, sheds and elevators. The new union passenger station will be erected at the end of Hollis Street, which will be ample in size and of suitable architecture. These terminals will be approached by a double-tracked railroad from the main line, and extend southerly through the low divide between Bedford Basin and the head of North West Arm, thence skirting the Arm, and passing under the lower end of Young Avenue to the terminals. The breakwater will be extended at the Meagher's Point light house. Estimated cost, about \$30,000,000.

BELGRADE, Oct. 30.
A quarrel occurred among the Turkish commanders after their defeat at Kumanovo by the Servians. The result was that Zekki, the commander-in-chief, ordered a retreat, while a few officers acting on their own responsibility, ordered the men to resist the Servian advance at Velez (due south of Uskub). It is also reported that the Turkish Commander at Monastu was killed by one of his own officers because he ordered further resistance.

UTICA, Oct. 30.
According to his doctors, the death of Vice-President Sherman (running mate of President Taft in the presidential election next Tuesday) is a question of only a few hours.
LATER—Vice-President Sherman is dead.

DANZIG, Oct. 30.
The Crown Prince of Germany, while hunting near here, was thrown from his horse. When picked up, he was found suffering from injuries to his head, face and right arm.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.
Lieutenant Becker, convicted of murdering the Gambler, Rosenthal, was today sentenced to die in the electric chair in Sing Sing, during the week beginning December 9th.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 30.
Trapped by flames that swept through Santa Rosa hospital to-day, six sisters of Charity and one child were cremated. Two children are missing.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 30.
A division of the Turkish army repulsed the Bulgarian troops yesterday at Teheksskem on the Teborlu River, midway between Constantinople and Adrianople, on the railroad.

SOPIA, this morning.
After two days' fighting, the Bulgarian Army has gained a complete victory over the principal Turkish forces. The Turks have retreated in disorder.

MUNICH, Oct. 30.
Lieut. Hamburger, military aviator is in the Bavarian Army, was killed this morning on the aviation ground.



LATEST War News


Special Evening Telegram, LONDON, To-day.

The silence of Sofia concerning the great battle in Thrace has at least been broken. A brief dispatch, announces a Bulgarian victory and the capture of Lule Burgas only news yet available and still leaves the situation rather obscure. The message from Sofia apparently refers to earlier events, while the dispatch of Mazim Pasha, Turkish Minister of War, describes two battles, one sortie from Adrianople in the direction of Maritsa other sorts direction Visa, from which it must be inferred that engagements are extending over a long front. The Sofia dispatch sent long before the capture of Lule Burgas was known, throws new light on the disposition of the Turkish forces. It is evident earlier reports of the taking of this Erskine River, with a second line from Demotica to Lule Burgas. Both sides claim a victory but there is no reason to doubt that the Turkish second line of defence has been broken. Up to the present Bulgarian official dispatches have been more reliable than Turkish.

Evidence of immense efforts on part of Powers to intervene in favour of peace comes from official sources. A pronouncement of the Bulgarian position is published in a semi-official newspaper Mibl, which plainly declares the Allies must not be deprived of the fruits of victory.

Churchill speaking at Sheffield delivered some remarks, relating to Balkan events. He expressed a fervent hope that when the war was ended, the nations would be found united in the resolve that about Balkan difficulties there should never be another war, and that the long dismal chapter of human misery, unfolded in that region of the world should in one way or another be closed once and for all. There happily were signs, he said, that all the Powers were honestly striving to put an end to a long, fierce and disastrous struggle, and secure a settlement just to be beneficial and beneficial to the populations concerned.

Harbor Grace Functions.

Under the most favorable circumstances the formal opening of the Marine Slip and Agricultural Exhibition took place at Harbor Grace yesterday and the ceremony was one long to be remembered in the annals of the Bay Metropolis.

About sixty passengers arrived there including Sir Ralph and Lady Williams, Miss Dean and Premier Morris who were in a private car, and the whole party were at their destination by 11 a.m. The C. C. C., under Col. Kennedy, and the K. E. B., under Col. Rogers, were drawn up at the station to receive the visitors who, as they stepped out of the train, were greeted with the National Anthem discoursed by the massed bands of both Brigades. His Excellency then inspected the machinery, etc.

His Excellency then declared the slip open. After which the visitors repaired to the residence of Mr. H. H. Archibald and partook of luncheon.

In the afternoon the Agricultural Exhibition was opened in Coughlin Hall. Mr. H. Archibald presided and called upon the Minister of Agriculture to speak. Hon. S. Blundford. He said that it was the fourth time that he had the pleasure of attending the opening of an Agricultural Exhibition at Harbor Grace and had been informed that such Exhibitions were successfully held at Harbor Grace for the last fifty years. He went on to congratulate the Agricultural Society on the splendid Exhibits produced and congratulated all interested.

His Excellency the Governor was the next speaker and gave a fluent and interesting address. He said the first time he addressed the people of Newfoundland it was on Agriculture and that this would be his last time to address them on the same subject.

"I have visited the Colony everywhere, with the exception of a few miles on the south of the island. I wanted to know what the people and what the country was like, and now I know. There are parts of Newfoundland that will compare with any part of the world. Such beautiful places as Hermitage Bay, Mortier Bay and Bonne Bay, ought to attract large numbers of visitors. But they do not know of these beauty spots. And then again I found out by working around from one settlement to another what the people are, not only as the representative of the King, but as a man amongst men I have always been welcomed, perhaps not at first to all places, and my time in Newfoundland has been to me the happiest time of my life. Everywhere I have experienced nothing but kindness. I now have the good feeling of the people, and I hope that I shall retain it long after the time when I shall cease my work amongst you."

Premier Sir E. P. Morris was then introduced, thanked the Committee for the invitation given, paid a tribute to the Governor for the interest he evinced in the work and congratulated the people of Harbour Grace on the prosperity evident in the town and showed the possibilities of the slip as a labour giving enterprise. He predicted that Harbour Grace would become in the future a large manufacturing centre; spoke of the boat and shoe and other industries in the place, showed the necessity for cattle, sheep and poultry raising and dwelt on the amount of money which such enterprises would conserve to the country. He hoped that the inauguration of remunerative industries would check the tide of emigration of the youth of the country and promised Government help towards the prosperity of the people, concluding by thanking the people for their kindness and hospitality.

The Chairman then addressed the gathering after which an address of welcome was presented to His Excellency. After the formal opening His Excellency and party went to the Court House where a reception was held after which the train started on the return and reached the city at 11 last night.

Obituary.

The death occurred on Tuesday last, at his residence, South Side, of Mr. Richard Carberry, at the age of 68 years. Mr. Carberry who was a carpenter by trade, was a man well liked in the community for his many good qualities. He was a life long member of the British Society, in which Institution he took a deep interest. To his sorrowing family and relatives the Telegram extends its condolence.

Champion Defeated.

Paris, Oct. 23.—Billy Papke, the middle-weight boxer of Illinois, tonight defeated the French champion Georges Carpentier, who quit after the 17th round.

A great crowd thronged the Cirque de Paris, hundreds of women being present. In fact, they were most enthusiastic supporters of Carpentier in the few rounds when he had the better of Papke and the most sympathetic mourners when Carpentier's hopes were dead.

At the weighing-in at 5 o'clock in the afternoon Papke exceeded the middle-weight limit, while Carpentier was under weight. The Frenchman's manager immediately claimed the title of middle-weight champion. He said: "The fight will proceed as arranged, but it will not be for the title, which now belongs to Carpentier."

It was evident in the first few rounds that Carpentier was no match for Papke, whose infighting tactics completely baffled the Frenchman. But he fought with great pluck and determination. At the end of the eighth round Carpentier's right eye was closed.

In the 14th the Frenchman came back quite strong, and in both that round and the 15th gave a good account of himself. Papke opened the 17th with a terrific hook to the jaw, which practically finished the Frenchman. Carpentier gamely got to his feet and managed to drag out the round, but obviously he was unable to continue, and after a brief consultation with his seconds he gave up.

Papke receives \$5,000 for his end of the purse, with certain other emoluments. He had to pay a forfeit of \$1,000 to Carpentier for overweight.

Death of Capt. Kennedy.

By to-day's train we regret to learn of the death of Capt. John Kennedy at his home in Carbonear. Capt. Kennedy had been suffering from a sore leg for some time past, blood poison developed and he came here and went to Hospital for treatment but only remained a short while. Killed The Laugh

The Story of the Prayer in Rossini's "Mose in Egitto."

The sublime prayer of the Hebrews when preparing to cross the Red Sea is perhaps one of the most solemn and majestically grand compositions to be found in the choral repertory, yet at the same time simple to a degree. This was an afterthought of the composer and was not introduction of "Mose in Egitto" at Naples.

The opera then, as now, terminated with the passage of the Red Sea by the Israelites; but, although the audiences were entranced with the music, they invariably saluted the passage of the Red Sea with peals of laughter, owing to want of skill of the machinist and scene painter, who contrived to render this portion of the affair superlily ridiculous and brought down the curtain amid uproarious mirth.

Rossini exhibited his usual indifference, but poor Tottola, the poet, was driven nearly crazy by this unwelcome termination of his literary labors and intensely chagrined at the idea of so sacred a subject exciting laughter. This lasted throughout the first season. The next it was reproduced with similar brilliant success (on the first night) for the music and similar laughter at the end of the opera. The next day, while Rossini was indulging in his usual habit of lying in bed and gossiping with a room full of friends, in rushed Tottola in a most excited state, crying out:

"Ehiva, I have saved the third act!" "How?" asked Rossini lazily. "Why," replied Tottola, "I have written a prayer for the Hebrews before crossing the dreadful Red Sea, and I did it all in one hour."

"Well," said Rossini, "if it has taken you an hour to write this prayer, I will engage to make the music for it in a quarter of the time. Here: give me a pen and ink," saying which he jumped out of bed, and in ten minutes he had composed the music without the aid of a piano, and while his friends were laughing and talking around him. Thus, owing to the blundering ignorance of a stage carpenter and scene painter, the world is indebted for the most sublime preghiera ever penned.

Night came. The audience prepared to laugh as usual when the Red Sea scene came, but when the new prayer commenced deathly silence prevailed, every note was listened to with rapt attention, and on its conclusion the entire audience rose en masse and cheered for several minutes, nor did it ever again laugh at the passage of the Red Sea.

Setting a Good Example



An Inventor's Romance

How The Inventor of Cold Storage Lives Almost in Poverty.

An extraordinary story is told by the Telegraph, which once more illustrates how the inventor is the last to profit by his brains, but makes fortunes for others.

The story of M. Charles Tellier, the aged French savant and inventor, whose process for cold storage is now applied the world over, and has given rise to a trade in which hundreds of millions are invested, while he himself is living in two little rooms at Auteuil and almost reduced to poverty, reads like a romance, and one is inclined almost to doubt whether we are not in the land of dreams," says the Paris correspondent of the Telegraph.

Attempts to Make Ice.
"Attempts at ice-making and refrigerating machines date back to the days when it was first discovered that combinations of certain salts had the effect of lowering temperatures to below freezing-point, and as far back as 1775 a machine was constructed by Dr. Collen for freezing water by its own evaporation in a vacuum. Other machines were invented by Perkins in 1834, Harrison in 1850, and Carre in 1859. The latter produced ice in large quantities for the first time by the use of a solution of ammonia, and other savants, such as Linde, in Germany, and Pietet, in Switzerland, studied the question. It was at this time that M. Charles Tellier, the French engineer, entered the field, and like his predecessors, first directed his attention to the production of cold by vacuum, compressed air, and ammonia. But it was not until he found the properties of methylis ether that he had complete success. That he is the father of cold storage is hardly to be doubted.

The house where M. Tellier resides at Auteuil is one of those large, modern buildings with fashionable flats not far from the Auteuil station. But the aged inventor cannot afford to live in one of those expensive apartments. He is just able to occupy what is called a small 'logement,' which is reached by a back stairs and consists of two small rooms such as a mechanic or prosperous workman can rent. The entrance is narrow and is taken up almost entirely by a bookcase filled with scientific volumes, and documents of every description lie on the tables or hung on the wall. M. Tellier has just had a great bereavement, as Madame Tellier died only eight days ago, and as he received me he gently apologized, saying that his house was in some disorder. He was pleased that the world at last took some notice of his labours, but, alas! the recognition is coming late, and when she who had been his faithful companion for so many years is gone. He is a little man, but a bright look in his eyes and a 'rosy colour' in his cheeks form a vivid contrast to his perfectly white beard and side whiskers. Even at the age of 85 he is still active and anxious to continue his scientific researches in other fields. When I asked him how he began his investigations in the particular direction in which he was so successful, though he had received little recognition, he said:

The First Experiments
"I grew up with a fondness for mechanical things, and when I became an engineer there was one problem which attracted me immensely. It was the question of the preservation of perishable articles of food, such as meat, fruits, and vegetables, and in these days the problem was discussed a good deal, but no practical method had yet been devised which could be applied industrially.

"Gradually I drifted into making it my life work. I experimented with the preservation of meat by means of vacuum. That was the

tendency in these days. We expected all sorts of wonders from the new principle of the vacuum, which scientists tried to apply in all directions. I found that during the cool season I could easily preserve meat indefinitely, but the moment the warm weather came all the processes based on vacuum failed. The meat disintegrated in spite of the vacuum, and was lost. I gave up my researches in that direction about 1862 and turned to a new set of ideas. This was suggested to me by Pasteur's first discoveries about microbes. We did not speak of microbes then; Pasteur himself did not use the word but he spoke of air germs or atmospheric germs. It was the atmospheric germs which, as we understood it in these days, caused the disintegration of animal tissues, such as meat, and no amount of vacuum could prevent it. Frost was the only natural principle which we knew indefinitely conserved such substances, and I therefore turned my attention to producing frost by means of compressed air. In time I was able to invent a machine which gave results, and in which I used a solution of ammonia.

An Historic Voyage
In 1868 he installed his apparatus on an English steamer with partial success. Then he used compressed ammonia and after myelitic either, and in 1875 the "Fouquier" was fitted out. She went to Buenos Ayres, and a great banquet was given there, in which the meat that had been shipped from Rouen and which had been preserved for three months was served up, together with fresh meat from the country, and the guests were unable to tell the difference.

A few years ago when a company asked for the right to cut over this section the cry with the "Picnic" party was hands off the peoples woodlands, but now that the railway requires the forest, the people may go to Hades. Why to partially offset this great loss to us here, we even have not the benefit of the railroad which is two miles distant from Toad's Cove. Never mind, Sir Edward, the time will shortly come when the people of this section will get a chance to resent this cowardly conduct on the part of the "Split" Government, and rest assured that Cashin and Moore will feel the resentment of the voters to their sorrow.


