How Hungary is Affected by the Russian Advance.

Parliament at Budapest Faced With Problem of Reassuring People on Account of Reverses.

(From the Christian Science Monitor) Budapest, Aug. 7.—The depression caused in Hungary by the recent reverses on the Russian front has been given expression in the Hungarian parliament by the leaders of the opposition, and although they emphatically demanded that the Prime Minister should find some means of reassuring the anxious population Count Tisza's reply was evasive and was not calculated to satisfy the public. It was stated by M. Stephen Rakovszky that over 100,000 Hungarian soldiers had fallen during the recent Russian advance and that the people, especially those in the capital, were very anxious as to the fate of the army as well as that of Transylvania. He demanded that the leaders of the army who were respon sible for the debacle should be brought to account. No answer was, however, forthcoming from the Prime meet after the sitting was over to discuss the situation and to decide what was to be done in the future.

The fact is that those members of parliament who have been serving as officers and have taken part in the battles during the last six months in Italy and on the Russian front, have arrived home with most discouraging stories, and have stated that according to the officers of General Bothmer's army, it is estimated that the losses on both fronts during the last six weeks exceeded 500,000 men in killed, wounded and missing. The great majority of losses have been amongst the Hungarians, for on the Italian front there are chiefly Hungarians and Croatins. It was made quite clear that the Hungarians killed in the recent engagements num bered over 100,000, and when Count Tisza referred to the fighting as "merely a passing episode," the feeling of the independence members was strongly roused against the Premier for treating such a matter so lightly.

Austria Criticized. M. Justh interrupted the Premier's statement by remarking that it was a shame to allude to the event as an pisode, and that it was doubtless owing to the brutality of the Austrian officers and their inclination to place the Hungarian soldiers in the most dangerous positions that such losses had been inflicted on them. M. Sumegi insisted that the Hungarians in the army were still being persecuted. We have, he added, to sacrifice our people to alien interests. All this anxiety is no doubt aggravated by the fear of a Russian invasion recognized in Hungary that after the debacle of the Pflanzer-Baltin army in the Bukovina there is little hope that by the passes of the Carpathians. BRITISH GAIN.

LONDON, Sept. 4. As a result of the fighting yesterday, north of the River Somme in France, says a British official issued to-day, British troops captured German defences on a 3,000 yard front, for an average depth of 800 yards, including the village of Guillemont The whole of Ginchy at first was captured, but the British were compelled to give ground, retaining a hold on part of the village despite the heavy counter-attacks. In the course of the night more than 800 Germans were taken prisoners.

SURRENDERED TO BRITISH.

Dar es Salaam, the chief town in German East Africa, surrendered to the British this morning. This was officially announced to-day. Dar es Salaam is a seaport and military station, with a population of 24,000, has a good harbor, and is the terminus ef an important caravan route.

FRENCH TAKE PRISONERS.

PARIS, Sept. 4. Operations on the Somme front have been retarded by bad weather, the ROUMANIAN MINISTER DETAIN War Office announced to-day. In a new action, fourteen guns have been captured by the French. Prisoners continue to arrive at the rear. East of the Meuse on the Verdun front, the French yesterday took 460 prisoners.

ALLIED AIR RAIDS.

LONDON, Sept. 4 Two more British air raids over Belgium have been made successfully it is announced officially to-day in the following statement: On Saturday the shipbuilding yards at Hoboken near Antwerp, were successfully bombarded by naval aeroplanes. On Sunday an enemy aerodrome at Chistelles. eleven miles south of Bruges, was bombarded with effect by a large squadron of our machines. All returned safely in both cases.

The village of Farm and Poultry Sovecourt was brilliantly carried by assault, as well as part of Verman Dovillers. Over 5,000 prisoners have been taken north and south of the Wire Strainers and Somme in the last two days. Progress was also made on the right bank of the Meuse in the Verdun sector in the Fleury region.

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
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
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
