





The Herring Fishery.

It is now very apparent that the herring throughout the country this season will fall far short of last year's catch. From Hall's Bay comes the statement that the total catch for that section does not exceed half a thousand barrels. Last year's Green Bay catch amounted to over twenty

thousand barrels. In Bay of Islands herring have been plentiful most of the season, and continue so, but buyers are few and market dull. Up to the present there have been practically no vessels for salt bulk. Those packing made very little preparation for this season's operations, and consequently the pack, particularly by the "Scotch" method, will be below that of last that the total pack for the season will not be more than one-fourth what it was last year, and likely even tion of the market? At present we unlerstand eleven dollars per barrel is the price offered for "Scotch" pack and other United States centres, large pack are held in cold storage, and buyers in the market for this seafall herring, and as supply and demand are claimed to regulate the price, we see no reason why fair

Last week up to Saturday there was From Tuesday to Friday boats loaded daily, the best fishing being on the Bar. On Saturday there was a slackning off, and this week the catches have been small. It would appear as if the fish are shifting from Arm to Arm, for during the past two or three herring in Middle Arm, where boats load daily. The price dropped to \$2, but afterwards came up again to \$2.50

improvement in the fishery at Hall's Bay, and it looks as if the packers there may yet secure sufficient herring to get themselves out of the hole. Up to last Thursday there had not been more than 500 barrels taken in the whole bay, but since then the fish struck in more plentiful, and packing stations have been kept busy. The price paid is \$4 per barrel from the nets. Owing to the scarcity of herring in Hall's Bay and vicinity, the pack promises to be superior to that of last year, though the class of packages used by some packers is a regrettable feature of the industry. In No Danger.

No Evidence of Predicted Cataclysm---Prof. Truman Gives the Other Side.

Plainview, Tex., Nov. 29.—According to Prof. O. H. Truman of the Lowell Observatory at Flagstaff, Ariz., no such dire calamity will befall the people of the earth next month as was recently predicted in a widely published statement by a popular meteorological scientist. The basis of this prediction was that several large planets will all occusy a position in the same direction from the sun.

"It is a fact that on December 17, and for some days before and after that date, six of the planets, Neptune, Saturn, Jupiter, Mars, Mercury and Venus, will be roughly in the same direction from the sun, Uranus in the opposite direction, and the earth somewhere near at right meetings alone, would benefit angles. This is doubtless a very unusual grouping, though nothing but a calculation which it would take too long to the speakers make, would tell how often it occurs. I should think, however, that this grouping or others equally remarkable must have happened several times in the course of recorded history.

NO CAUSE FOR ALARM.

"However, no bad results are to be feared from it There is no evidence of any influence of the planets either upon the sun or the earth; no evidence that they produce sun spots, for example; and it is highly improbable that they do. And sun spots have no influence on the weather of the earth of which any one knows. Great spots have often happened without any bad effects.

"St.n spots occur most frequently at times averaging about eleven years apart; at these times there is a general increased activity in the sun, of which the spots are only and Concert at 8 p.m. a symptom; there is a slightly greater emission of heat; northern lights on the earth are frequent; 'magnetic storms'-by which is meant not thunderstorms but unusual variations in the magnetism of the earth-are common; and occasionally the electric currents set up in the earth are such as to put the wire telegraph out of commis-

TO BE DEPRECATED.

"I remember one case, for example, where the east and west wires in Eastern Canada could not be worked at all for several hours, while the north and south lines were not affected. Then as the solar maximum passes, all these activities slowly die down and in due time build themselves up again for the next maximum. But nothing dangerous or destructive happens.

"I think it is too bad that such stories as that you read gain wide circulation. People believe them-they have no reason to do anything else, and if no other harm results when these terrifying predictions fail to materialize, science as a whole is discredited. There are as many disreputable men in proportion in the scientific world, or at least posing as scientists, as there are any place elseand no more.
