





Senator Hiram Johnson, former Governor Lowden of Ilinois and Senator Watson of Indiana are all looked on as probable entrants in the presitial primaries. Should Governor Pinchot enter the race, there is little foubt they would promptly follow and s hard struggle would be on for the 1924 nomination.

portance. In Quebec the manufacturing proindustry. Farming holds second place and forestry third. In the Province of Ontario a sim-

ilar order prevails. The pre-eminence of manufacturing is even more marked than in Quebec. Mining and construction come next. In Saskatchewan nearly 87 per

cent. of the income is derived from farming, and Manitoba and Alberta show large percentages as well. Alberta mining is also of considerable importance. In British Columbia lumber is the

chief industry although manufacturing, agriculture and mining are also of importance, indicating the versatility of the resources of the Western provinces. The Yukon district is chiefly im-



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
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
