The Village Blacksmith

AT THE MAJESTIC.

When Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wrote a sentimental poem of eight stanzas called "The Village Blacksmith," he probably thought that he had said all there was to say about the smithy and the smith. But since then movies have been invented and Mr. Longfellow, if he is aware of what is going on here to-day, must be spiritually startled to realize that his little piece, like the chestnut tree, has a remarkable spreading capacity. For with certain additions and interpolations, it now covers some seven reels of film exposed in the Fox studio and will be exhibited Monday night at the Majestic Theatre.

The picture tells a story of a morally and physically sturdy blacksmith, with two sons and a daughter, whose family is opposed in the plot to a mean-spirited village "squire" and his rascally son. Trials and tribulations are heaped upon the smithy and his family, but they bear up bravely and in the end are triumphant.

Most of the story, however, is told in the second half of the film. The first part of it, in the main, a series of illustrations fitting lines in the poem, and they have a genuine, simple quality that is pleasing. William Walling as the smithy, is upstanding and rugged, looking well at a forge, and the children used are spontaneously expressive, especially Gordon Griffith and Pat Moore as his sons. There are schoolroom, swimming and other scenes which are natural and amusing.

In the latter half of the picture, when the heavy melodrama comes in, there isn't much to suggest Longfellow's poem, but Mr. Walling, Virginia Valli, George Hackathorne, Tully Marshall, Caroline Rankin and several others make the scenes intense and interesting. And Mack Sennett's Eddie Gribbon is there as a village gossip and quite the most refreshing person present.

The picture was directed by Jack Ford from a scenario by Paul H. Sloane.

Unfortunate Dispute Over Wednesday's Race Ends the Contest.

Belgian Authorities Remove Separatists from Aix-la-Chapelle--Three Hold-ups in one Day-- The Prince of Wales will be Chief Pallbearer at Bonar Laws Funeral.

OFF FOR THIS YEAR.

HALIFAX, Nov. 2. The final action of the International Committee, struggling with the difficulties precipitated by the Columbus race, was proclaimed yesterday when the race was held at the Amherst challenge, and Capt. Angus' subsequent refusal to again take the Bluecross in this year's series, to declare the series off and hold cups and trophies for another year next fall. The Bluecross will be held at two o'clock this afternoon and the Columbus was made ready this afternoon to return to home port.

SEPARATISTS PUT OUT.

DUSSELDORF, Nov. 2. All Separatists in Aix la Chapelle, including Joseph Mathias, and Leo Mathias, leaders of the opposing forces, were escorted out of Aix la Chapelle by Belgian troops this afternoon and the city turned over to the old government of Reich.

ADMIT DEFEAT.

AIX/LA CHAPPELLE, Nov. 2. Separatists belonging to the party of Leo Deckers, who proclaimed the Republic here Oct. 21st, admitted defeat to-day and began to depart from the city in large numbers. Separatist flags have been hauled down from the Town Hall and the government quarters have been evacuated.

HELD IT FOR ONLY A BRIEF WHILE.

COLOGNE, Nov. 2. The Town Hall at Aix La Chapelle fell into the hands of a band of fifteen Separatists, who stormed the building early this morning and, using machine guns, ousted the defenders. Many were wounded in the fighting.

WRITING COMMITTEE DESTROYS ITS USEFULNESS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. The restriction of the proposed Executive Committee to an enquiry into the capacity to pay reparations

may render it useless to proceed with the plan in the view of President Coolidge as made known to-day at the White House.

THE KING'S REPRESENTATIVE.

LONDON, Nov. 2. It is officially stated that the Prince of Wales will represent King George at the funeral of Bonar Law in Westminster Abbey next Monday. His Royal Highness will be the chief pall bearer.

SOCIALIST GAINS.

LONDON, Nov. 2. The results of the Municipal elections yesterday in three hundred cities and towns of England, indicate that the Socialists are gaining some of the ground they lost last year in Municipal contests. Their gains were mostly at the expense of Liberals.

FAMOUS TAPESTRIES RECOVERED.

VERSAILLES, Nov. 2. The two famous Gobelin tapestries, each valued at a million francs, which were stolen from the walls of the Versailles Palace, on the night of Oct. 21st, were recovered to-day in the home of Frapier Charles, who was arrested yesterday.

BANK ROBBERED.

OTTAWA, Kansas, Nov. 2. Four men driving a large car robbed the First National Bank here this morning of about twenty-five thousand dollars, and got away safely.

PAYMASTER HELD UP.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 2. Five motor bandits wearing handkerchiefs for masks to-day held up the paymaster of John Wyeth and Co. and robbed him of five thousand dollars, a short distance from the chemical plant.

ANOTHER HOLE UP.

WINDSOR, Nov. 2. Three men, two of them masked, and all armed, held up two employees of the Dominion Forge and Stamping Company at Wilkerville this morning, robbing them of the entire pay-

Preserved Fruit Prices Drop During Trade War of Canners

Sydney, N.S. W., Nov. 2.—A trade war between the Australian fruit controllers and the canners of California has resulted in reduced prices for preserved fruits, notably peaches, in New South Wales, New Zealand and Java. A publicity campaign here also has caused increased demand, and it is estimated that there will be little difficulty in handling next year's crop if three-quarters of the fruit is eaten at home.

PLACENTIA FERRY SERVICE.

It is understood that Messrs. Kemp Bros. are to continue the contract for running the Placentia Ferry, formerly held by Magistrate Smeeth. The award was made at the last executive meeting.

Sensations in Court.

Thrilling Scenes in Great Murder Trials.

One of the most remarkable sensations during a murder trial within recent years occurred at the conclusion of the case against the Bristol taxi-cab murderer. On being found guilty, Mason calmly declared that he was "quite satisfied."

The nearest parallel to this dramatic incident occurred some years ago at the Old Bailey.

Two burglars, one of them named Campbell, who had a scar on his face, were indicted for murder. It was alleged they broke into a house, and when the occupier came downstairs there was a struggle, in which he was fatally stabbed. Everything turned on identification, and the principal witness to the crime—the dead man's wife—was positive that Campbell struck the fatal blow. She repeated over and over again, "He had a scar on his face," whereupon everybody turned towards the prisoner, and there was the scar.

Campbell was found guilty, and in reply to the usual question he made a thrilling statement.

"My lord," he said, calmly, "I must acknowledge I have been justly found guilty. I never intended to kill him. The blow was made for his shoulder, for at that moment he was holding my mate. He must have moved, and received the blow in the eye. I am sorry for it, and I hope that God will forgive me."

At the trial of Drinkley, the poisoner, there was a strange scene. Asked if he had anything to say why sentence of death should not be passed upon him, the prisoner did not answer orally, but made certain signs known only to Mason. For a moment Mr. Justice Bigham, who did not belong to the craft, looked slightly puzzled. Then the tension was broken by the even voice of the judge, who passed sentence of death without comment.

Bodden was a more dramatic figure. He clasped his wife, who was overcome with emotion on hearing the verdict, in a passionate embrace, and rose to a tragic height when asked the usual question.

"Before the Great Architect of the Universe," he said, raising his hand and pointing aloft with a Masonic sign, "I declare I am not guilty."

Mr. Justice Bucknill, himself a Freemason, was considerably affected. In passing sentence of death his voice faltered, and he ended with a sob.

Thrilling also was a scene at Stafford. While the jury in a trial for murder were considering their verdict, the electric lights failed and the court was plunged into darkness. Presently an attendant brought in a few lighted candles, and when the jury returned, and the foreman uttered the dread word "guilty," the judge, in the flickering light of the candles, assumed the black cap and pronounced sentence of death.

Carmarthen was the scene of an equally singular drama. A man named Rees was tried for murder. During the three days he was in the dock he did not speak a word, and he remained silent even when asked the usual question before being sentenced to death. On reaching the cells, he shook hands with the warders and bade them good-bye, signing that he would be glad to get back home. Then the truth came out—he could only speak Welsh and he thought he had been acquitted!

There was consternation in court when the position was explained to the judge. What was to be done? In the end the prisoner was brought back and the whole ceremony was gone through again, somebody interpreting the judge's words into Welsh. An unlooked-for incident at Chelmsford was more poignant. While a young woman, known to be in delicate health, was being tried for murder she became very ill. Ultimately she was removed from the dock and taken back to prison. The proceed-

ings were consequently invalidated. When she was again arraigned on the capital charge she was a mother, and everybody in court was moved with pity for her. In the end the jury, without leaving the box, returned a verdict of "Not Guilty."

In a similar drama despair trod on the heels of triumph. Catherine Wilson, indicted at the Old Bailey for poisoning a friend, was so ably defended by Montagu Williams that the jury acquitted her.

"I knew I'd win!" she exclaimed in ecstasy. Throwing back her head she left the dock, only to be arrested on seven separate charges of wilful murder immediately she set foot on the floor of the court, which some months later was the scene of her condemnation to death.

Nothing so grimly dramatic was ever presented on the stage as an incident at the Old Bailey. At the close of a session the judge (Mr. Justice Graham) caused those who had been convicted of capital offences to be brought into the dock and then sentenced, as he thought, each of them to death. But there were sixteen prisoners, and his lordship read out the names of only fifteen.

After they had gone below, and as everybody was wondering what would happen, the faller explained the situation, whereupon Mr. Justice Graham ordered the culprit whose name he had omitted to be brought back.

"John Robins," he said, in an excitedly modulated tone, "I had accidentally omitted your name in my list of prisoners doomed to execution. It was quite accidental, I assure you, and I ask your pardon for my mistake. I am very sorry, and I can only add that you will be hanged with the rest."

One drama of the French courts is probably unique. A remarkably eloquent advocate, Chair d'Est Ange, had to prosecute a man named Benoit, who was charged with killing a companion and suspected of having murdered his mother. The famous orator drew a vivid picture of the conduct of the murderer on the night of his mother's death—of how he refused to look at her body, how un-speakable terror prevented him from entering the room where his dead mother lay.

So great was the effect of the words and the gestures of the advocate that the man in the dock sank down gasping. "Ah! My mother! It! It! Yes, it is!"

Digging up History

There is a great deal of romance in the science of excavation, as people come to realize as the result of the Tutankhamen discoveries, but there is much that is interesting concerning many famous excavators and their work about which little has been heard.

The discovery of the clue to the ancient Egyptian writing, the unearthing of the priceless Rosetta Stone and the Elgin Marbles, now reposing in the British Museum, are some of the outstanding achievements of archaeologists, and the story of these and other finds is told by Mr. David Mas-

ters in "The Romance of Excavation" (John Lane).

The excavator has a vast area in which to set to work. He may dig fifty feet and find nothing and another man may come along, set up his tent a few yards away, just scratch the surface of the soil, and find a buried city.

A Wonder of the World.

The discovery of the tomb of Tutankhamen is a case in point. Week after week the diggers worked, and, as nothing resulted, Mr. Howard Carter and the late Lord Carnarvon thought of abandoning the quest. They decided to dig just one more day. They did so, and made the great discovery.

The Rosetta Stone was discovered by a member of Napoleon's army who, noticing the strange lettering, added it to his booty. When Napoleon was defeated the stone passed into the possession of the British.

It was by studying this stone that Dr. Young, an English medical man, solved the secret of Egyptian writing and laid bare much of the history of ancient Egypt.

Equally romantic was the finding by Professor Flinders Petrie of the long-lost city of Naukratis. An Arab offered to sell the Professor part of an alabaster statuette, and the scientist recognized it as a very early Greek work. (The Arab told him where he had got it. The Professor took train to the place, searched for and found the spot, with the result that excavations were started and the city unearthed.

Lord Elgin played a great part in adding still further to the work done by British pioneers in revealing the wonders of the past in Greece. At that time the Turks were destroying everything they could that existed of ancient Greek art, and Lord Elgin's excavations were made in the face of strong opposition from the despoilers. By wholesale bribery he succeeded in his work, but not until he had spent £50,000 of his own money. When he got the treasures to England—the ship sank on the way and the stones lay for three years on the ocean bed before they were raised—the authorities began to seek opinions as to whether they were really such precious marbles. To-day the Elgin Marbles are one of the wonders of the world, and are beyond price.

The value of the discoveries made in Egypt is beyond calculation. Lord Carnarvon's find is estimated at £3,000,000. But the money value means little to these pioneers, who work for the pure love of discovery. The work is very trying, as it is a matter of looking for a needle in a haystack.

Everywhere is the eternal rubble and sand. Rain hardly ever falls. If you eat and wait for a shower of rain you would have to wait on an average five years! And, after struggling against all these difficulties, your search may lead to naught! All your money, time and labour have been wasted!

Much has been discovered in Egypt, but there is still a great deal to be unearthed. The total manpower of the Pharaohs was devoted for over a thousand years to building tombs for the rulers. Who knows what fresh glories are awaiting the hand of the excavator to reveal them to an astonished world?

Venal Husbands Aid Foreign Women Win Access to England

London. — The many mercenary "bridegrooms" who are willing to

marry alien women for a financial consideration in order to allow them to enter the country, is providing the Home Office with a difficult problem.

Marriage to Britons makes these women British citizens, which is the goal at which they aim. The arrangement is generally that the bridegroom lends his name for the ceremony, receiving from \$50.00 to \$75.00 for his trouble. The couple part at the registry doors, and the wife is thereafter free to travel any place in Great Britain or the dominions without further question.

The Home Office has been able to intervene in many cases, however,

where the bridegrooms have overstepped their legal allowance and married in some instances as many as ten women. In these cases the women have been deported and the man sent to prison for bigamy.

The problem of the nationality of the wife was discussed several times during the last session of Parliament and will come before the Dominion's conference now meeting in London. Here it is expected a final decision will be made as to whether the wife retains her nationality, or takes that of her husband. If the former, the British government will take steps to

ried women to adopt English nationality at once, but prohibiting others from assuming it without going through the usual legal course.

During the year 1921 there were approximately 580 of these "convenient" marriages.

tribes was placed in his arms. At the same time the Indians gave him a belt of wampum and articles of the Indian manufacture for Dame Margaret and Miss Megan, who were among the most interested spectators of the ceremony.

Addresses in Welsh were delivered in receiving Lloyd George and at the luncheon Welsh citizens presented a testimonial on parchment in recognition of his services in the attempt to establish in the Holy Land a national Jewish home.

For the Oppressed.

Repeating, Lloyd George said he hoped the movement was the beginning of a restoration which will leave "almost as deep a mark upon the story of the human race as your first occupation of that holy land."

"All my life, he added, "I have fought against the oppressor. I have consecrated such strength as God has given me to fight for the weak and for those whom I conceived to be persecuted and trampled."

Referring in his luncheon address to his tour of Canada, Lloyd George declared the Dominion was a vast country "with immense possibilities but is naturally in the stage of development in which you were perhaps 100 years ago," adding that he "was anxious to see the amazing new civilization, untrammelled, freed from the difficulties, the embarrassments, the traditions, the hatreds and the terrible problems which are afflicting Europe and making it difficult at every turn to progress to have a clear path."

"I am from a troubled continent," he continued. "This continent is at peace. I crossed the frontier last night—the most remarkable frontier in the world—without forts and guns or soldiers, or barbed wire to protect it. The frontiers of poor Europe bristle with the mechanisms of slaughter. You are the continent of peace—and in God's name keep it the continent of peace. . . . there are races here which have been interlocked in Europe in fearful, savage, barbarous conflict for generations. You are welding them into one people, bring at the same national heartstone, warming their hands at the same great national fire."

His Looks Clipped.

Lloyd George had a "regular English haircut" in Minneapolis. It was the first haircut Britain's war-time Premier had had since his arrival from abroad and incidentally it was given by a native of Great Britain.

B. H. Thompson, manager of a shop here, was the barber. He talked as he worked and found Lloyd George to be a good company.

"I am pleased to see and meet you again," Mr. Thompson said as he

entered Lloyd George's suite at the hotel.

"And where did you see me last?" "It was during the Boer war, at Birmingham," Thompson replied.

"Is that so? You were not one of those who threw stones at me?" Lloyd George smiled as he directed the question at the barber. Mr. Thompson, somewhat embarrassed, hesitated before he replied.

"No, I did not throw stones at you. I was in the crowd, just trying to get out of it. I am sure I didn't throw stones."

Mr. Thompson was the only one to have a private chat with Lloyd George in Minneapolis.

"Lloyd George's haircut was a regular English haircut," the barber continued. "I just used the shears and clipped off the ends as I ran his wavy locks through my fingers."

Appeals to U.S. to Help Europe Towards Peace

LLOYD GEORGE DESPAIRS OF FUTURE IF AMERICANS STAND ASIDE.

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 16.—(Associated Press)—An appeal for the United States to help Europe make peace was made here yesterday by Lloyd George in his first public address in this country since his tour in Canada. Speaking before many hundreds of persons at a luncheon given by the Minneapolis Commerce Association, he said:

"I am not here on any mission, but let me say to you one thing, that until the United States of America with its mighty influence with its greater power, with the moral command which it has in the world, with the greater claim that you won by coming into the war without any selfish purpose but for a holy ideal, sending millions of your best young men across to fight for liberty and for nothing else—until this great land casts its influence in the scale of peace, I despair of the future."

The address was one formal public function on his program. Arriving early he was welcomed by huge crowds at the station and on the way to his hotel, while thousands crowded the streets and greeted him with applause as he was escorted on eight-mile trip to points of interest. In the evening he went to St. Paul for a private dinner at the Minnesota club and later left for Mooseheart, Ill., and Chicago, where he arrived to-day at noon.

The welcome to Lloyd George here was one of the entire north west. Seated at the head table at the luncheon were prominent men from this section, including Governor J. A. O. Pines, of Minnesota and Governor R. A. Nestor, of North Dakota. Behind the speakers table the British and United States flags hung entwined.

Indian Ceremony.

A colorful ceremony was held during the luncheon, when Lloyd George was formally made an honorary member of the Sioux tribes of Indians by chiefs in full tribal costume and paint, from the Cheyenne Indian reservation of South Dakota, who conferred upon him their degree of the Eagle Feather.

Chief Brave Eagle, heading the delegation with the assistance of an interpreter, gave him the name of "two eagles," explaining that one was in recognition of his achievement in war and the other in the field of civic affairs in peace.

The distinguished visitor was given the pipe of peace to smoke, while a feathered war bonnet was placed on his head, a bow and arrow in his hands, and a histolee quiver filled with arrows used in ancient battles of the

Possible Nominations for Presidency

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(By Canadian Press)—Governor Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania is looked on here as almost certain to become an active candidate for the republican presidential nomination against President Coolidge. The interpretation which is generally placed on a recent prohibition address in which he put prohibition enforcement up to President Coolidge, is that he intends to get into the presidential race. While his remarks were not in one sense antagonistic to President Coolidge, they were calculated to put the responsibility for enforcement of prohibition on the president in the mind of the public. With the responsibility for enforcement naturally goes the blame for non-enforcement.

It is certain that the lieutenants of President Coolidge look on the utterances of Governor Pinchot as politically significant and as meaning that the governor is already practically a candidate. Interest is keen as to whether he will get into the presidential primaries and, if so, when.

Should Governor Pinchot enter the field, there is little doubt he will have powerful dry support. His part in settling the hard coal strike has made him strong with labor.

Senator Hiram Johnson, former Governor of California and Senator Watson of Indiana are all looked on as probable entrants in the presidential primaries. Should Governor Pinchot enter the race, there is little doubt they would promptly follow and a hard struggle would be on for the 1924 nomination.

QUEER THINGS WE REMEMBER.

"I expect that will be one of his most vivid memories when he's grown up," said a neighbor, "at mine, speaking of her little boy and his first day at school."
I agreed without thinking, as we so often do when someone says the apparently self-evident.

And then something started me to thinking, and I wondered if it would be.
In the tapestry of childhood memories that remains in after years made up of the most unusual, the most epoch-making experiences in our childhood life?

No Proper Proportion.
Or is it more apt to be woven or members of lesser events that for more incomprehensible reason have remained vivid and colorful through the years?

As I look back I find many queer little things in the "tapestry" whose vividness is all out of proportion to their apparent importance.
There was the June evening when the porch was in process of construction on the house across the way. The bachelor son of the house—one of those horse-uncles to all the children in the neighborhood (and utterly without any sense or spheres of his own, by the way)—came out and played some games on the timbers of the half-built porch, and we were allowed to stay up half an hour longer than usual because we were having such a wonderful time.

What is there to make that memory stand out when events of much more apparent significance have faded?
A June Evening.
And then there was another June evening, when some of the grown up

folks in the neighborhood dropped in (I realize now that they must have been all of 11 or 22, those grown up folks) and we sat on the porch and sang all the old songs like Clementine and Annie Laurie, and the popular songs of the day ("I call the Western Union a Convenience" is the only one that I can recall).
