

A large majority of the 150 members present found themselves unable to accept the proposal on the ground that the Championship competitions are held in order to select the champion of the day as ordinarily played, and that they should not be used for purposes of experiment.



The League of Nations, the noblest conception in the realm of modern civilization, has come to life to lift the powers of the world out of the desperate mire of militarism. For six ' thousand years it had been the custom of so-called humans to kill each other, and to be killed in satisfaction for some real or supposed affront.

Thank God for the remarkable achievements of the League already, but it doth not yet appear that it can succeed in quieting the worse than bestial hatreds of men unless the Church of Christ reinforce the conscience of the world with a deeper sense of human value, of internation al obligation, and breathe into it the very soul of peace. Every national banner must be surmounted by the Flag of the Prince of Peace before unity can be relied upon.

Several of these disturbances can e obviated by care. The greatest nemy of all, known as atmospheric r static, is the one thing which man annot yet overcome.

We often hear one radio fan inorming another "that static was awful last night," but how many fans eally know the meaning of the word? to use simple terms, static electricty is stationary. For instance, if you were to leave an aerial unrounded for any length of time, it buld collect electrons from the ectrified particles of the atomsphere. New, should a person touch this un-trounded aerial and stand on the damp soil, or any metal substance, he or she would receive an electric shock, due to this collection of stationary electricity becoming mobile through the person's body to ground. Hence we get the term static, meaning stationary electrons with no journey to go, until they can find a path to travel. Therefore when we connect our aerial to the receiving set, old man static has a nice easy path to go, to the discomfort of the radio fan. Another bugbear to the radio world is that phenomenon sometimes called blank periods, fading, or dead spots.

We in Newfoundland often have periods when reception is practically nil, sometimes lasting for two or three weeks. This is caused by magnetic belts, barring entirely, or else weakening radio waves in various

Magnetic belts are apparently caused by a series of sudden climatic changes. (I think all Newfoundlanders will agree on this point).

The above theory is based on the study of atmospheric conditions all over the world for the past twenty

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



In 1921, the patient, a young girl, came up to the London Hospital suffering from mitral stenosis, or a gradual closure of one of the four valves of the heart. In spite of continuous treatment the patient did not improve and it was decided to oper-

ate.
A large flap of skin and muscle over the girl's heart was laid back and the ribs over the cardiac area were removed. The pericardium, or sac containing the heart, was then exposed to view, and the heart could be seen pulsating at the rate of 128 hears to the minute.

The sac was then opened, an incision was made in the auricle (one of the four chambers of the heart) and the gloved finger of the surgeon was inserted as a plug to stop the immediate fountain of blood.

After examination it was decided not to incise the valve as had originally been intended, but merely to dilate it with the finger.

The surgeon very slowly and with infinite care did this without any mishap; the incision was sutured, the pericardium closed, the ribs, the muscles, and the skin replaced layer by layer. While he was doing this the heart maintained a very nearly normal pulsation, which became wholly normal when the chest was closed. The patient made a speedy and uninterrupted recovery, and when I last heard of her stated that she felt perfectly well.

This is the first time this operation has ever been performed on the human heart. Each month, each week almost, sees some new advance in medical knowledge. But it is doubtful whether more than a very few of he people who hurry along under the grey walls of London's hospitals realise anything of the great pioneer work that is being carried on unceasingly within them.

# Man to Keep Two Wiyes by Order

LONDON, Oct. 22.—A case of a divorced man who re-married and had to keep two wives was disclosed at Willesden Police Court, when Wiliam Bartlett, of Wallasey, Cheshire, applied for the discharge of a maintenance order for 30s. a week made against him in 1921 respecting his first wife.

Bartlett's solicitor said that it had always been understood that a decree absolute put an end to a police court maintenance order. It was, however, urged by the other side that as the man still owed High Court costs he was "in contempt," and could not legally sue for discharge of the present order.

The Bench decided not to annul the order, but to reduce the amount to 20s. a week, with a 5s. weekly off the arrears of £24.

Berlin.—A dasfardly plot to ruin the happiness of millions of women has been hatched in New York. The conspirators have extended their work to Paris and their agents are active all over Europe. Fortunately a writer in the German Press has discovered their ugly secret and revealed their disgusting intrigues.

The plotters, he states, are makers of hairpins, tortoiseshell combs, wigs, transformations, fringes, and platts, who see ruin staring them in the face. In their despair they have engineered a world-wide war against the shingled woman.

The sum of £20,000 has already been subscribed by the wholesale dealers in false hair of America to finance the conspiracy. Money is being subscribed by manufacturers in Paris and, as the plot extends to London, Berlin, Vienna, Warsaw, and Rome, there will be ample funds to carry it out.

The aim of the conspirators is to burden women's heads with masses of plaits and curls and to stick them full of iron pins. Their method is to insinuate the idea that the truly fashionable woman is no longer cropped and to create in women a longing for flowing tresses.

Not a thought do they give to the misery of their victims in the months and perhaps years which must elapse before short hair has grown to rattails and rat-tails to a tress which can be plaited into a neat knob. All they think of is their own pockets.

The agents of these sordid men are hard at work. They are already sowing unrest in the minds of women by means of ingenious paragraphs in the newspapers. I am told that they are seeking to suborn artists to praise the fashions of bygone times and that they have gone so far as to drive poor girls into the stagets of Paris with bits of other girls' hair attached to their heads.

Here in Berlin they have no success. Three of the greatest actresses have just been cropped, and a fashionable hairdresser states that he chops off fifty pigtails a day. The only difficulty is the German husband, who appears to have a superstitious idea that a woman's hair is her glory. Husbands, however, were made to be managed, and the advice of a German to one of her friends who dreaded her husband's anger may be usefully repeated.

"Go and get your hair singled," she said, "and do what I did. When I got home after the operation and my husband began to fume, I just turned on him, declared that I had been shingled for a whole week, that he had not even noticed it, and that it was perfectly clear that he didn't love me. I made such a scene that he gave me a nice present next day."

### Horse Trainer Suicides

TRANSVAAL II.'S TRAINER-UT-TERLY RUINED.

The Cesarewitch has had a tragic sequel in the suicide of the trainer of one of the most prominent French candidates.

M. Wadomski, trainer of Transvaal II., which finished tenth at 100 to 1, was found hanging in his bathroom at his home in Maisons Lafitte, near Paris, where his stables are. In his pocket was a purse containing a sum equal to less than 1s. In his bedroom he had left three letters, in one of which addressed to M. Mantacheff, the owner of the horse and a Russian millionaire, he stated that he was utterly ruined, and that the only solution was suicide.

M. Wadomski learned of the failure of Transyaal II. by a telegram. He retired to bed early, after telling his head lad to call him as usual at 7 a. m. When the lad called he was surprised to receive no reply, and entering the bathroom he found the trainer hanging by a leather belt from an iron waterpipe.

M. Wadomski, who was of Polish origin, was training before the war for the world's largest stable, that of M. Mantacheff, in Russia, and was understood to have had in his charge at one time nearly 400 thoroughbreds. The advent of the Bolsevist regime compelled both owner and trainer to flee, and while most of M. Mantacheff's racing stable had to be abandoned to the Bolsheviks, the better horses were saved and smuggled out of Russia and brought to France, after travelling almost round the world, via Siberia and Vladivostock.

M. Wadomski lost his wife in tragic circumstances about three years ago, when, owing to a defective internal combustion stove, the couple were found unconscious in their bed. They were hurried to hospital, where Mme. Wadomski died.





### "Printing Isn't Expensive If You Pay Enough For It"




