Mr. Holton resumed the debate on the Treaty of Washington Bill. He confessed that it was far from a perfect measure, but he accepted it as a question of high Imperial policy; at the same time he coincided fully in all the censures that had been passed upon the conduct of the Pramer and administration in regard to the measure. The cession of the St. Lawrence without the consent of Camada appeared to Mr. Holton to be the most objectionable as to justify opposition to the whole measure. He criticised with great severity the pretence that Sir John A. Macdonald was, not responsible to Camada for the part he had taken in framing the Treaty, and also the change of Government policy from the protests of last July to the Jasse and humiliating acceptance of the guarantee bribe as a condition of ratifying what they had formerly condemned. He announced at the close, that he should vote for the second reading of the bill, and against the amendment of Mr. Bodwell. He should record his sense of the misconduct of the Covernment by supporting Mr. Blake's amendment.

Sir Geo. E. Cartice followed, and in his usual circumioentory and reiterative style gave the House to understand that he was the man who first recognized the value of the Canadian Confederation. He took credit to himself that he had destroyed what he called Mr. Blake's fallacjus pretensions; and, after referring to Mr. Holton's speech, paid a warm tribute to Quebec loyalty under his guidance, and contrasted it with the course pursued by Ontario, whose representatives looked at all quesions from a party point fixed.

After a short speech from Mr. Stewart Campbell, Hon. Mr. Dorion followed in a most able, clearly argued, and elequent address. He recapitulated the objections to the measure, and went on to argue that it was atterly impossible for Sir John A. Macelonald to divest himself of his responsibility to the people of Canada, or from the obligations of his eath of office. His duty was to remenstrate when he found Canadian interests were to be servifieed, and after his remonstrance failed then he was bound to resign his post as Prime Minister, or to cease to be a Commissioner. As to the final act of hundilation the begging of pecuniary compensation, it was merely to give an excuse to the Ministers for accepting the Treaty.

Several other members made short speeches, after which the debate was again adjourned.





On the Island of Borneo has been found a certain race of which kindred varieties have been discovered in the Philippine Islands, in Terra del Fuego, and in South America. 
