The Treaty Negotiations.

How they are regarded in the States. Some of the leading States papers—especially those which are unfriendly to the present Administration—are not well pleased at the agreement come to between the United States and Imperial Governments in regard to the question of indirect claims growing out of the Alabama seizures. The New York Tribune is very outspoken in its denunciation of what it calls the truckling policy of President Grant, who it says has allowed Mr. Gladstone to gain a decided victory over him. After referring to the negotiations and correspondence between the two Governments, which terminated in a satisfactory solution of the difficulty, it goes on to say:—

"On Monday a message was delivered to the Senate conveying all the correspondence on the subject, embracing the suggestion of Gen. Schenck for a new article to the Treaty, by which we are to withdraw our indirect claims, with the proviso that in case England ever goes to war and we remain neutral, she is never to ask indirect claims from us for any consequences of our wrong-doing of our analogies to her performance in the Alabama case. As we have by the other articles of the Treaty forever bound ourselves to commit no such wrong, it is peculiarly beyond expression for us to claim exemption from the remote consequences of such a predicament as we are doing. And upon this caveat peculiarly we revere with what grace we may from the position we assumed with such decision and defended with such persistence. Nothing is wanting to the discredit of the retreat. We march to the rear having our colors in the enemy's hands, and his banners beating loudly the Roman's March. It is infamous that the Senate will promptly adopt the proposed article, and so close the discussion and let the Arbitration go on. Perhaps it is best that it should, for with so eccentric an Administration any open question is a source of constant anxiety to the public. In our large good nature, we have not the right, of our strength, and of the importance of peace and leisure to attend to our affairs, it is possible that we will pass over all these affronts with the thought that they do not hurt us, and that by this new and most undignified compromise we are not damaged in our material interests. No special interest is felt, nor ever has been felt, in this question among the people at large. They have grown weary of the long squabble and desire an end of it. In certain business circles it is a matter of consequence that it shall cease. These circles have evidently great influence at Washington. But to all others, the contentions of the whole affair, and of the shabby figures of Government cuts in it, will provoke only an indolent disgust and a languid scorn. We are certainly the best natured people in the world."

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, May 13. Mr. Holton resumed the debate on the Treaty of Washington Bill. He confessed that it was far from a perfect measure, but he accepted it as a question of high Imperial policy; at the same time he coincided fully in all the censures that had been passed upon the conduct of the Finance and Administration in regard to the measure. The session of the St. Lawrence without the consent of Canada appeared to Mr. Holton to be the most objectionable clause of the Treaty, but not so objectionable as to justify opposition to the whole measure. He criticised with great severity the pretence that Sir John A. Macdonald was not responsible to Canada for the part he had taken in framing the Treaty, and also the change of Government policy from the protests of last July to the base and humiliating acceptance of the guarantee bribe as a condition of ratifying what they had formerly condemned. He announced at the close, that he should vote for the second reading of the bill, and against the amendment of Mr. Bodwell. He should record his sense of the misconduct of the Government by supporting Mr. Blake's amendment.

Sir Geo. E. Cartier followed, and in his usual circumlocutory and reiterative style gave the House to understand that he was the man who first recognized the value of the Canadian Confederation. He took credit to himself that he had destroyed what he called Mr. Blake's fallacious pretensions, and after referring to Mr. Holton's speech, paid a warm tribute to Quebec loyalty under his guidance, and contrasted it with the course pursued by Ontario, whose representatives looked at all questions from a party point of view.

After a short speech from Mr. Stewart Campbell, Hon. Mr. Dorian followed in a most able, clearly argued, and eloquent address. He recapitulated the objections to the measure, and went on to argue that it was utterly impossible for Sir John A. Macdonald to divest himself of his responsibility to the people of Canada, or from the obligation of his oath of office. His duty was to remonstrate when he found Canadian interests were to be sacrificed, and after his remonstrance failed then he was bound to resign his post as Prime Minister, or to cease to be a Commissioner. As to the final act of humiliation the begging of pecuniary compensation, it was merely to give an excuse to the Ministers for accepting the Treaty.

Several other members made short speeches, after which the debate was again adjourned.

EDITORIAL NEWS.

British immigrants to the number of 450 arrived in Toronto on Tuesday and Wednesday. They are all likely to obtain employment immediately. Miss Rye started on Wednesday for England, for the purpose of bringing out another party of children, having merely stopped here on the arrival of the boat from Niagara. Several large bush fires were visible from Ottawa on Tuesday, and if the dry weather continues it is probable a large amount of mischief will result from this cause. The exodus of French Canadians to the States continues this spring as large as ever. Last evening a num-

ber of families of mechanics left Quebec for ever to settle in Michigan.

The St. John Telegraph, N.B., says Mr. Blake's speech on the Washington Treaty was the ablest ever delivered in the House of Commons.

Mr. Greeley has ceased to have editorial control of the New York Tribune. He gives his reasons in the following card: The Tribune has ceased to be a party organ, but the unexpected nomination of its editor at Cincinnati seems to involve it in a new embarrassment. All must be aware that the position of a journalist who is at the same time a candidate, is at best irksome and difficult; that he is fettered in action and restrained in criticism by the knowledge that whatever he may say or do is closely scanned by thousands eager to find in it what may be so interpreted as to annoy and perplex those who are supporting him as a candidate, and to whom his shackled condition will not permit him to be servicable. The undersigned therefore withdraws absolutely from the conduct of the Tribune, and will henceforth, until further notice, exercise no control or supervision over its columns.


