Reciprocity Probable. THE following is from the Associat-d Press despatch from Washington

Washington, May 13.

There seems some prospect that the negotiations now going on with a view to a new treaty of commercial reciprocity with the Dominion of Canada may terminate successfully.

The Canadians say they have no need to sak favors from anybody, and do not want any, but if the United States think it to their interest to merge the fishery questions and all other troublesome questions in a comprehensive treaty, they will cordially agree to any equitable settlement calculated to place the commercial relations of the two countries on a friendly, unfettered, and mutually advantageous basis.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Mr. Dorion introduced the new Insolvency Act. Its main features are as follows:—It is proposed to abolish all voluntary assignments, and to require that every assignments, and to require that every assignment shall be made at the instance only of two creditors, each holding a claim on the insolvent of not less than \$500.

The official assignees will be appointed by the Government and become officers of the Court. So far as it may be found practicable the Sheriff will be appointed official assignee.

There will be one official assignee for every County Court district.

If at the first meeting the creditors do not elect an assignee, the official assignee will become the assignee of the cetate.

No official assignee is to hold a proxy for any creditor.

No assignee is to be allowed to hold over one hundred dollars at a time in his hands.

In future the claims of creditors, if contested, are not to be determined by the assignee, but by the Judge summarily.
