many from Orangeville, Toronto, Streets-  
ville and Arthur. The happy couple  
left by the midnight train for New York,  
Halifax, and other fashionable points.

**CHILDREN'S CONCERT**—We would  
rejoice our readers of the concert to be  
given on Friday evening first in the Town  
Hall, by the children of Chalmers' Church  
Sabbath School. They have been under-  
taught for some time by Mr. Maitland,  
and are well up in their pieces.  
We trust the concert will be a most enjoy-  
able one, and as it is given in aid of the  
Sabbath School funds, we hope it will be  
well attended.

**SOME FISH**—Two enthusiastic fishers  
—Messrs. M. Deady and Geo. Sleeman—  
left town on Monday for a little sport,  
and in a creek about five miles from  
Guelph they hooked some of the finest  
trout we have ever seen. Mr. Deady  
caught a fish, which weighed some 9 lbs.,  
one being a perfect beauty, weighing over  
a pound; and Mr. Sleeman catching 16,  
two of which were over a pound a piece.

**PASSED HIS EXAMINATION**—We notice  
that Mr. John Munro, who lately com-  
pleted his preparatory studies at the  
Rockwood Academy, has just passed a  
very successful examination before the  
Law Society at its late meeting in Tor-  
onto. This is another proof of the high  
character of this Academy, and the thor-  
ough training young men who are in-  
tended for the professions receive there.

**VERY DOGMATIC**—The Council of the  
village of Mount Forest, following in the  
wake of their Toronto brethren, have re-  
solved to check the mad career of the  
dogs in the neighborhood of their town,  
and to know no more of the kind. A by-  
law provides that all owners or  
harbors of dogs who have said dogs  
entered upon the assessment roll, and  
for which a tax is paid to the municipality,  
be furnished with a badge to put on  
every dog, and the constable will be em-  
powered to destroy every dog found  
running large without such badge upon them,  
and the same is furnished by the munici-  
pality.

**A HINT TO OUR COUNCIL**—The City  
Surveyor of Montreal has recommended  
that for the suburban streets a tamarac  
curb be used, the sidewalk to be filled in  
with a mixture of engine ashes, sand,  
gravel, and coal tar, sprinkled over  
with sand, and well rolled. This, he  
said, would make a path as good as and  
cheaper than the so-called asphalt which  
has been laid in several places, while it  
would be superior to the deal walk, and  
much less expensive. A piece might be  
laid on one of our own streets as an ex-  
periment. This is simply a modification  
of the cedar and gravel system so suc-  
cessful in Toronto.

**GARAPAZA ITEMS**—The spring has  
fairly opened now; the weather is fine  
and farmers are getting along well with  
their work. Mr. Smith's new saw mill  
has been stopped for a few days, owing  
to part of the race giving way, but he  
will have everything in working order in  
a day or two. He is turning out first  
class lumber. We wish him success.  
The Queen's Birthday will be celebrated  
in the village of Douglas on the 25th  
inst. Games and races will be the order  
of the day. There is a large amount of  
money subscribed for prizes for the suc-  
cessful competitor.—Com.

**WINTERBOURNE ITEMS**—There seems  
to be quite a demand for house accom-  
modation in this place this spring. A  
house which happened to become vacant  
a few days ago was applied for by no less  
than five families, some of whom wished  
to move to the village from the neighbor-  
ing village of Montrose. We hear of  
building operations in Guelph and other  
places, but no local capitalist seems to  
think it worth while to build a few cottages  
here to supply the demand for  
accommodation. This is a modification  
of the cedar and gravel system so suc-  
cessful in Toronto.

**Pat down your umbrellas!** You'll  
scarcely find the "back" of the  
engineer of the W., G. & B. Railway  
to a crowd of country people, who had  
gathered to see the first train of cars  
come in. They were all lowered at once.

**John Hampshire**, an old member of  
the Zion Baptist Church, St. Catharines  
died in that town on the 8th inst., at the  
age of 100 years.

## Local and Other Items.

**FIRE IN KINGCARINE**—The residence  
of Mr. John Culbert, in the outer part  
of the town, was totally destroyed by fire at  
ten o'clock on Monday morning. The  
loss is estimated at about \$3,000; no in-  
surance.

**TORONTO, GREY AND BRUCE BONDS**—  
The vote on the question of granting a  
bonus of \$100,000 to the Toronto, Grey  
and Bruce Railway Company was taken  
on Tuesday in Toronto, and resulted as  
follows:—964 for; 576 against.

**SUDDEN DEATH**—St. Catharines has  
lost an old and highly respected citizen  
by the death on Tuesday morning of  
Neil McGregor, Deputy Sheriff. He  
was an old schoolmate of Sir John Mac-  
donald and the Hon. Mr. Mowat, and  
held several offices of public trust in St.  
Catharines, where he resided for twenty-  
five years.

**HORTICULTURAL**—An attempt was made  
in Kincardine to organize an Agricultural  
Society and Poultry Exhibition, but the  
project failed, and it was resolved to con-  
fine all efforts to the formation of a  
Horticultural Society. The terms are  
liberal; in the words of the constitution:  
"All who wish to become sub-  
scribers can do so by paying at least one  
dollar, and as much more as they like."

**FATAL ACCIDENT**—On Monday after-  
noon a man by the name of Johnson, a  
Swede, employed on Brown's section of  
the new canal, was knocked down by an  
engine on the Welland Railway, at Thor-  
old, and instantly killed. His body was  
frightfully mangled and his head smash-  
ed to pieces. At the time of the acci-  
dent, he was trying to hold a team of  
horses back from the passing engine.

**FALL OF A BUILDING IN BUFFALO**—On  
Monday afternoon, with a momentary  
warning, Mr. Arthur's four-story block,  
on Main street, above Eagle street, fell  
with a terrific crash, crushing in an ad-  
joining two-story block. A daughter of  
goaler Frank Nagel, five years old, was  
instantly killed; also a son of Professor  
Bucham, Principal of the State Normal  
School, aged 14 years. Mrs. Buchanan  
had a leg broken, and was severely in-  
jured. Emma Galley, nurse, aged 14,  
had her left arm torn off and her skull  
fractured. Reports prevail that one or  
more are still under the debris. There  
were many narrow escapes. Some thirty  
persons were in the building. The acci-  
dent is attributed to careless masons  
knocking out a portion of the back wall  
of Mr. Arthur's block to connect with the  
new building in the rear. The loss is  
estimated at \$50,000. Insurance risks  
do not apply.

**A SCOUNDREL**—A journeyman harness  
maker calling himself Joseph Armstrong,  
was working for W. C. May, for some  
months past, during which time he was  
considered "fast," being an expert at  
billiards, cards, etc. On Monday week  
he got a fine span of horses, with buggy  
and buffalo robes, from Mr. James Water-  
son for the ostensible purpose of going  
to Owen Sound, promising to be back in  
four days; about the end of this time,  
Mr. Waterston received a telegram, pur-  
porting to be from Armstrong, but in  
reality from an accomplice, stating that  
the team was all right, and that he would  
be home soon. The next thing that is  
heard of Armstrong, he is in Buffalo,  
where he writes a letter to Walkerton,  
stating that he sold the horses and rig  
for \$300, and was going to start for Cal-  
ifornia the next morning. He added by  
way of postscript, that the people of  
Walkerton had always looked upon him  
as a "sharp," and now he was trying to  
deserve the appellation. Mr. Waterston  
started on Wednesday morning in search  
of the team, and to-day telegraphed  
from Guelph that they were purchased by  
Manassah Leeson, of Orangeville, whither  
Mr. W. at once proceeded.—Telegraph.

**BAIE-VERTE CANAL**—Referring to the  
Government grant to defray the cost of  
making a preliminary survey of the route  
for the projected Baie-Verte Canal, the  
Montreal Herald says, that this work  
would be extremely expensive, besides  
almost impracticable, owing to engineer-  
ing difficulties. It adds that, in view of  
these facts, it is to be hoped that the  
Government will pause before entering  
upon a work which will cost so much  
and return so little, but will rather cast  
about to see if there are not other works,  
such as the extension of the present  
railway system, and the improvement of  
legitimate navigation, which will be of  
far more service to the people of the Ma-  
ritime Provinces.

**MR. D. H. DAY**, formerly of Lightwell,  
is lecturing in Scotland on Emigration,  
and is doing a good work.

The Hamilton Times says that on Mon-  
day \$2 a bag were asked for potatoes on  
the market there.

A country boy having heard of sni-  
fers heaving up anchors, wanted to know  
if it was senseless that, made them do it.

A Philadelphia youth was recently  
married to a girl who had refused him  
eighteen times. He wishes now he  
hadn't asked her but seventeen.

A man asked Mr. Johnson if he liked  
children. "Don't know, ma'am," an-  
swered "that crabbed old gentleman";  
"never tried 'em; am not an ogre."

It is calculated that the loss by fire in  
Toronto on Saturday night will amount  
to about \$215,000, and insurance \$182,-  
000.

The village of Oshawa hopes to have  
a population of 5,000 soon, as the mal-  
leable iron works are to be enlarged, and  
the hat factory will open in July with a  
full force of hands.

The bush fires in the vicinity of Port  
Elgin, have been very bad the last few  
days, destroying a considerable amount  
of wood and fences. The weather  
has been very dry.

An appropriate testimonial to Sir  
Garnet Wolseley, to be sent home by the  
Canadian Wimbledon team, has been  
suggested, to take the form of an engros-  
sed address, to be presented in a silver  
casket.

The Episcopal Methodists have station-  
ed Rev. A. E. Griffith at St. Thomas,  
and until a place of worship is erected,  
the congregation will meet in the waiting  
room of the Canada Southern Railway  
Station.

Curiosity has been aroused in Toronto,  
by a personal in the papers asking for  
information respecting a girl, 16, who  
disappeared from the St. Joseph's Con-  
vent on the 5th inst. It is said that  
there are circumstances connected with  
the case that may bring it before the  
Courts.

## BY TELEGRAPH TO THE MERCURY

The Case of Professor Swing.

**Outrage on a British Consul.**  
**Trouble to be Anticipated.**  
**Fires and other Incidents.**

Chicago, May 13.—In the Chicago  
Presbytery yesterday the committee ap-  
pointed to consider the protest filed  
on Friday by Rev. Dr. Sweetzer, on be-  
half of himself and a number of other  
members of the Presbytery, against the  
action of that body in receiving charges  
against Professor Swing, submitted a re-  
port sustaining the protest, and further,  
that the vagueness and irregularity of  
the charges would not be sufficient if  
proved to constitute an offence.

New York, May 13.—It is stated that  
the British Minister to Chili has de-  
manded the release of Capt. Hyde, of  
the wrecked steamer *Tacna*, and an in-  
demnity of \$25,000. If the demand is not  
satisfied he asks for his passports.

The British fleet, it is said, has been  
ordered to Valparaiso.

It is stated that the British Consul,  
Mago, was recently sentenced by the  
Commandant at San Jose, Guatemala, to  
400 lashes, of which 200 were inflicted,  
nearly killing Mago. The Commandant  
has fled. A Panama letter gives the  
details of the affair. It appears that  
Gonzales arrested Mr. Mancifor, agent of  
a steamship company at San Jose, but  
released him, retaining Mago, who pro-  
tested against the horror in the name of  
the British flag. The American Consular  
agent, James, entered a protest just as  
Mago was about to be flogged, when  
Gonzales threatened to serve James the  
same way. Four soldiers performed the  
whipping, two hundred lashes being in-  
flicted, after which Mago was kept over-  
night to receive the remaining two hun-  
dred next day, and then he shot. Mr.  
Moncrief sent a messenger to the nearest  
telegraph station. Gonzales having  
guarded the telegraph offices at San Jose,  
and summoned Gen. Schares with one  
John Carroll, Librarian, Jas. Broderick,  
Treasurer of Library; Jas. Sugrue,  
Collector; D. Nunan, M. D., John  
Murphy, Mount Tara, J. P. McMillan,  
Barrister, and about twenty members of the  
Society.

Mr. O'Connor made a very feeling and  
appropriate reply, in which he returned  
heartfelt thanks for the mark of the  
kindness and friendship, and for their  
beautiful present—the most acceptable  
they could have selected for him—espe-  
cially the cross the emblem of our salvation.  
He felt he was undeserving of the honor,  
but he looked upon it as an expression of  
the faith and ardent love for the  
Catholic Church, to which they be-  
longed; and also as a mark of their ap-  
proval of his pilgrimage. In that  
pilgrimage they went not for amusement  
or pleasure, or show or curiosity, but for  
the glory of God and the good of their  
souls, and he felt sure that every one  
present would also go with him;—circum-  
stances permitted. He said they were  
in New York on the 13th for Exar's  
France, and from thence proceeded to the  
shrine of Our Blessed Lady of Lourdes.  
"Here," he says, "the Blessed Virgin ap-  
peared and ordered a Church to be built  
in her honor on the spot where she stood  
and where she also caused a fountain of  
water to flow from the barren rock, where  
hundreds of people who have been pro-  
nounced incurable by the best medical  
men of the land are instantly restored to  
health by drinking from this miraculous  
fountain. Here can be seen crowds of  
pilgrims, coming from all parts of Europe  
and distant countries to show their love  
and devotion to the Immaculate Mother  
of God, and to receive in return from this  
merciful and compassionate Virgin health  
and grace for both soul and body." They  
will then proceed to Rome, where he says  
"we will see Pius IX., that unflinching  
Christian hero, who stands firm as a rock  
amidst all his trials and persecutions. We  
will kneel at his feet and ask and receive  
his blessing. This gentleman, is a great  
privilege, and one I feel I am undeser-  
ving of. We will visit the tombs of St.  
Peter and St. Paul, and other holy places,  
and I trust you will all remember me in your  
prayers while I am gone. Accept my  
sincere thanks, gentlemen for the kind-  
ness and honor you have shown me, and  
for the beautiful present you have given  
me."

Mr. J. P. McMillan rose after the  
presentation, and said that the occasion  
should not be allowed to pass without  
making some practical remarks on the  
scene he had just witnessed. He paid a  
glowing tribute to the good which the St.  
Vincent De Paul Society was effecting,  
not only in the exercise of charity to-  
wards the poor and in the work of in-  
structing the young in the fundamental  
principles of Christianity, but also in the  
training it afforded to the young men who  
participate in its labours, both in spiri-  
tual and temporal affairs, for while they  
are endeavouring to sow the seeds of truth  
and virtue in the minds of the young,  
the order and charity which govern the  
proceedings and deliberations of the So-  
ciety are eminently calculated to fit them  
for their future duties as good and up-  
right citizens. He adverted in terms of  
well merited praise to the example of  
sobriety and piety which Mr. O'Connor  
has set to the young men of Guelph.

Mr. J. E. McElderry said that it afford-  
ed him great pleasure to present the  
address to the worthy recipient, whose  
truly Christian demeanor meted of the  
honor they had just paid him. He said  
that he could not permit the opportunity  
to pass without expressing his appreci-  
ation of the noble motives which induced  
Mr. O'Connor to enter the pilgrimage.  
He spoke in terms of praise of Mr.  
O'Connor's efficient and zealous discharge  
of his duties as an active member and  
officer of the St. Vincent De Paul Society,  
which will miss him during his absence,  
but which will reap great advantage from  
the merit which one of its members will  
gain by his pilgrimage to Rome, and to  
the Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes,  
through her powerful intercession. He  
said also that he felt it was a great honor  
for the Society that one of its members  
should be found among the band of  
generous Pilgrims.

Messrs. B. Heffernan, W. Heffernan,  
M. J. Moran and Dr. Nunan also made  
appropriate speeches, laudatory of the  
pilgrimage.

## Local and Other Items.

**FIRE IN KINGCARINE**—The residence  
of Mr. John Culbert, in the outer part  
of the town, was totally destroyed by fire at  
ten o'clock on Monday morning. The  
loss is estimated at about \$3,000; no in-  
surance.

**TORONTO, GREY AND BRUCE BONDS**—  
The vote on the question of granting a  
bonus of \$100,000 to the Toronto, Grey  
and Bruce Railway Company was taken  
on Tuesday in Toronto, and resulted as  
follows:—964 for; 576 against.

**SUDDEN DEATH**—St. Catharines has  
lost an old and highly respected citizen  
by the death on Tuesday morning of  
Neil McGregor, Deputy Sheriff. He  
was an old schoolmate of Sir John Mac-  
donald and the Hon. Mr. Mowat, and  
held several offices of public trust in St.  
Catharines, where he resided for twenty-  
five years.

**HORTICULTURAL**—An attempt was made  
in Kincardine to organize an Agricultural  
Society and Poultry Exhibition, but the  
project failed, and it was resolved to con-  
fine all efforts to the formation of a  
Horticultural Society. The terms are  
liberal; in the words of the constitution:  
"All who wish to become sub-  
scribers can do so by paying at least one  
dollar, and as much more as they like."

**FATAL ACCIDENT**—On Monday after-  
noon a man by the name of Johnson, a  
Swede, employed on Brown's section of  
the new canal, was knocked down by an  
engine on the Welland Railway, at Thor-  
old, and instantly killed. His body was  
frightfully mangled and his head smash-  
ed to pieces. At the time of the acci-  
dent, he was trying to hold a team of  
horses back from the passing engine.

**FALL OF A BUILDING IN BUFFALO**—On  
Monday afternoon, with a momentary  
warning, Mr. Arthur's four-story block,  
on Main street, above Eagle street, fell  
with a terrific crash, crushing in an ad-  
joining two-story block. A daughter of  
goaler Frank Nagel, five years old, was  
instantly killed; also a son of Professor  
Bucham, Principal of the State Normal  
School, aged 14 years. Mrs. Buchanan  
had a leg broken, and was severely in-  
jured. Emma Galley, nurse, aged 14,  
had her left arm torn off and her skull  
fractured. Reports prevail that one or  
more are still under the debris. There  
were many narrow escapes. Some thirty  
persons were in the building. The acci-  
dent is attributed to careless masons  
knocking out a portion of the back wall  
of Mr. Arthur's block to connect with the  
new building in the rear. The loss is  
estimated at \$50,000. Insurance risks  
do not apply.

**A SCOUNDREL**—A journeyman harness  
maker calling himself Joseph Armstrong,  
was working for W. C. May, for some  
months past, during which time he was  
considered "fast," being an expert at  
billiards, cards, etc. On Monday week  
he got a fine span of horses, with buggy  
and buffalo robes, from Mr. James Water-  
son for the ostensible purpose of going  
to Owen Sound, promising to be back in  
four days; about the end of this time,  
Mr. Waterston received a telegram, pur-  
porting to be from Armstrong, but in  
reality from an accomplice, stating that  
the team was all right, and that he would  
be home soon. The next thing that is  
heard of Armstrong, he is in Buffalo,  
where he writes a letter to Walkerton,  
stating that he sold the horses and rig  
for \$300, and was going to start for Cal-  
ifornia the next morning. He added by  
way of postscript, that the people of  
Walkerton had always looked upon him  
as a "sharp," and now he was trying to  
deserve the appellation. Mr. Waterston  
started on Wednesday morning in search  
of the team, and to-day telegraphed  
from Guelph that they were purchased by  
Manassah Leeson, of Orangeville, whither  
Mr. W. at once proceeded.—Telegraph.

**BAIE-VERTE CANAL**—Referring to the  
Government grant to defray the cost of  
making a preliminary survey of the route  
for the projected Baie-Verte Canal, the  
Montreal Herald says, that this work  
would be extremely expensive, besides  
almost impracticable, owing to engineer-  
ing difficulties. It adds that, in view of  
these facts, it is to be hoped that the  
Government will pause before entering  
upon a work which will cost so much  
and return so little, but will rather cast  
about to see if there are not other works,  
such as the extension of the present  
railway system, and the improvement of  
legitimate navigation, which will be of  
far more service to the people of the Ma-  
ritime Provinces.

The Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway.

We see by the Times' report of the Hamilton Council proceedings on Monday night last, that that body are taking steps to get the Southern Extension of the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway, from Palmerston to Kincardine, opened for traffic.

Our readers are aware that the road was finished more than a year ago, but the funds of the Company being exhausted, they were unable to pay the contractor, who holds possession of it until he is paid.

To this end the Finance Committee of the Hamilton Council, after consulting with the Directors of the G. W. R., and W. G. & B. R., brought in a report, recommending the city to sell to the G. W. R. the \$100,000 held in the W. G. & B. R. at 60 cents in the dollar, on the condition that the Southern Extension of said road be opened for traffic, on or before the 1st July, and also on the further condition that the G. W. R. shall undertake for all times that the rates for passengers fares and freights between points on the W. G. & B. line and the city of Hamilton shall not be greater than between the same points and any other point at greater distance than Hamilton.

Reciprocity Probable. The following is from the Associated Press' despatch from Washington this morning:— WASHINGTON, May 13. There seems some prospect that the negotiations now going on with a view to a new treaty of commercial reciprocity with the Dominion of Canada may terminate successfully.

The Pacific Railway. MR. MACKENZIE, in an elaborate speech on Tuesday, fully explained the Government scheme for the construction of the Pacific Railway. We are not able to-day to give a condensation of his speech, which was well received. So little opposition was manifested to the scheme, that the resolutions were adopted in Committee the same night. A bill founded on these will be introduced, and carried without any difficulty.

South Oxford. The nomination for this Riding takes place to-morrow. Col. Skinner is still in the field, having taken exception to the Convention, which nominated Mr. Edgar. We trust that the Reformers will settle their differences, so that only one will go to the poll, if such is necessary.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Mr. Dorion introduced the new Insolvency Act. Its main features are as follows:—It is proposed to abolish all voluntary assignments, and to require that every assignment shall be made at the instance only of two creditors, each holding a claim on the insolvent of not less than \$500.

The official assignees will be appointed by the Government and become officers of the Court. So far as it may be found practicable the Sheriff will be appointed official assignee.

In future the claims of creditors, if contested, are not to be determined by the assignee, but by the Judge summarily.

A new feature in the law is that it will take cognizance of the insolvency of incorporated Companies. In case of a judgment being obtained against a Company, if the claim is not satisfied the official assignee is to have full surveillance over its estate.

After some discussion, Mr. Dorion said he would have the Bill printed and circulated, and consider the question of deferring its further consideration during the present session.

Mr. Mackenzie then rose to move the House into Committee on the Pacific Railway resolutions, and in a long and exhaustive speech explained the Government scheme, an outline of which we have already given.

After he had concluded the House went into Committee, and passed and referred the resolutions.

Mr. Cartwright then moved the House into Committee on the Supplementary Estimates for 1874.

The Estimates were agreed to, and the Committee rose and reported.

James Aitken to be assessed instead of Martha Rea for north half of lot 32, in the 3rd con. The Court heard a complaint of John Ramsey against omissions which he considered should have been charged against certain parties. The Court then adjourned until next meeting of Council, and Mr. Ramsey to lodge his appeal with the Clerk in terms of the statute, previous to next meeting. The Council then proceeded to business. An account of \$2 from J. Hacking for printing was ordered to be paid. Moved by Mr. Harris, seconded by Mr. Duffield, that the road division under Jos. Lister extend to the top of Harris' Hill; that Wm. Torrance's division commence at the top of said hill and extend to Henry Strang's bridge and along the side road to the centre of the 5th con. Also that Henry Strang's division extend along the said road to the centre of the 4th con. Leave was given to Andrew Griffith to keep his fence on the road allowance between lots 30 and 31, in the 1st con., until the 1st day of Oct. next. A by-law to reduce and regulate statute labor was passed after the usual number of readings. Another by-law to separate lots 19, 20, all the seven concessions of the township from the 2d or centre Parliamentary Electoral Division, and to attach them to the third or North Parliamentary Division, was next passed after three readings. Messrs. Harris and Duffield were appointed a Committee to examine and report upon all roads below the Guelph and Erin road, for the improvement of which petitions have been presented, and that Messrs. Rea, Dunbar and the Reeve be a similar Committee for the roads above said Guelph and Erin road. Some other minor business was transacted, and on motion the Council adjourned, to meet again at the Centre Inn on Friday, the 29th inst. as a Court of Revision.

**ENGLAND'S NEEDS.**—Last year, owing to an unusually bad harvest, England imported for the consumption of her own people, upwards of twelve and a half million tons of wheat, and fifty million tons of potatoes, valued over five million pounds sterling. In addition, she imported \$20,000,000 worth of foreign animal food and live animals. Yet strange to say, after paying these vast sums for these immense quantities of food in a single year, the nation was found so prosperous that there was a surplus of over \$30,000,000 in the public treasury, and all branches of trade are reported in a most flourishing condition.

It was stated in the House on Monday that the Government intend to withdraw the twenty cent silver coins as fast as they are presented at the banks. The sooner we get rid of them the better, for one can scarcely tell them from the twenty-five cent pieces.
