Halifax, March 6.—Wednesday night a gang of 300 negroes boarded a coal train at Africaville, a suburb of Halifax, and stole a hundred tons of coat. Last night, in the expectation of a rep-etition of the raid, a squad of railway police went down the line and boarded the coal train. When it reached Africa-ville, the train was boarded by a gang of men. A fierce fight ensued, 25 ne-groes being injured. Officer McClure, in arresting a negro named Roan, went over a steep embankment and both were badly injured. The negroes say they were unable to secure coal, and it was simply a matter of stealing it or freezing to death.

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

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
