Montreal, May 20.—The Gilmore-Hawkins fight was finally decided to day at a point in this vicinity. NDING UP THE PROSECUTION IN THE WATERWORKS E. QUIRY. Mr. Foster Will Call But One More Witnes —Mr. Bigelow Demands Time to Pre-pare His Deleace—Adjourned Till Ma; 25, at 2 O'clock.

Mr. Foster has just about closed his case for the city in the Waterworks enquiry. When the Court adjourned at 5.30 last evening he said he had but one more witness, beside ex-Mayor Manning, to call. It was intimated that Mr. Manning would have to be "caught on the fix," or got to Court whenever a good opportunity presented itself. For half an hour before adjournment Mr. Bigelow, Mr. Foster and Judge McDougall had a three-cornered tussle as to how long Mr. Bigelow should be allowed to prepare his defence. Mr. Bigelow said he would require at least ton days, as the charges against his client, Mr. Venables, were so indefinite and mysterious that he could make neither head nor tail out of them. Mr. Bigelow glanced wistfully at the big tin-box which stood beside Ilis Honor; in this box wore 188 exhibits which had been put in during the enquiry.

"To prepare my defence," said Mr. Bigelow,
"I will have to send a man here to copy all
these documents"
Mr. Foster said matters were in such a
muddled condition in the Water Department
that it was absolutely necessary that the case
should close as speedily as possible. "If intended reforms are to be carried out in this
department," said Mr. Foster, "we cannot begin
the work too soon."

Judge McDougall insisted on consuming at least three days of next week in the defence. "If you don't do that," said His Honor, "I will not be able to give any more time to the enquiry until the middle of June. Besides I want to make my report to the City Council before vacation. I will, therefore, adjourn the case

vacation. I will, therefore, adjourn the case until May 25 at 2 p.m."

No one who has listened to the evidence taken so far, and to the Judge's strictures on the various phases of the case as they presented themselves from day to day, can have any doubt of His Honor's finding. It is almost morally certain that he will condomn the entire system that has prevailed in the Waterworks Department for years; that he will recommend radical changes inseveral of the civic departments, and that he will probably recommend the election or appointment of a commission to administer the affairs of the department. As far as the guilt or innocence of Mr. Venables on the charge of malfeasance of office is concerned, His Honor will evidently have something pretty straight to say on the subject. Clarke Wallace, M.P., was in court

Mr. N. Clarke Wallace, M.P., was in court costerday for about half an hour, and occupied a seat beside His Honor. Ex-Ald. David Walker was on the stand for two hours. Before Mr. Walker was called City Engineer Sproatt said that if the gauges on the new engines were correct his test was correct—that is, the figures were correct. He-did not hold himself responsible for the gauges (pressure gauges), as he depended upon other parties to see that they were correct. This was entirely in connection with the calculation of the duly of the new engine.

Mr. Walker went into an extensive account of his knowledge of the Waterworks Department during the two years that he was chairman of the committee which administers that depurtment. When Mr. Walker took the chairmanship of the committee in 1835 he found "The floors were dirty and torn." The floors were dirty and torn. department. "What is your deduction from this enquiry, Mr.-Walker?" enquired His Honor. "Do you favor the appointment of a commission to administer the Waterworks Department?"

"Yes, I think I do. At all events, I am totally opposed to our present system of returning aldermen. The term of one year is too short. It a man is elected to the council and does good work in committee, makes himself acquainted with the details of municipal institutions, he does not knew whether he is coming back or not. I think a good deal of the Quebec system, where the aldermen are elected for three years, one retiring each year. Ontario is the only state or province I knew of where the aldermen are elected annually."

Judge McDougall: "In Detroit and Buffalo the Waterworks Department is administered by a commission. As far as I am able to learn, this system works well in those cities. The commissioners are appointed for six years by the Mayor. He names his men and sends the names to the Council for confirmation, just as the Presidentsends his nominations to the Senate for confirmation."




