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THE ARREARS NOT CLEARED UP.

Matters before the Board of Works and Not Another Meeting To Be Held.

The Committee on Works held a special meeting yesterday afternoon. It was intended to be the final meeting.

Ald. Shaw presided, and there were present Mr. Ald. Small, Atkinson, Lamb, Burns, Bailey.

Mr. J. J. McLean, Q.C., representing Mr. A. R. Williams, asked that the city do not at present proceed with the passage of the bill for the diversion of York-street.

It will be recalled that at the meeting of council, when Mr. McLean will appear and advance reasons why his client's claims should be allowed.

A claim for \$3100. Mr. W. G. Murdoch, representing Mr. Frank Wisner, sub-lessee of the Crosby Hall, asked that the committee investigate the claim of his client, who was dispossessed of the Crosby Hall.

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DECLARING THE PRESIDENT.

HOW THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE VOTE IS TAKEN.

Take the Votes to Washington—The Mileage Costs \$10,000—The Reports of the Disruptive Steel-Strikes Counted on Feb. 8.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—To-day the Electoral College will convene in 44 States of the Union and cast their ballots for President and Vice-President.

Perhaps no other system of government is so little understood or so lightly regarded as this electoral process that will begin to culminate in the glorification of March 4; the people generally on the principle that known and certain things are better than uncertain ones.

According to the laws of the Governor of each state is required to send to the Secretary of State in Washington a certificate setting forth the names of the electors chosen by the voters of that state.

The 44 true and trusty messengers who will bring the votes to Washington will receive for their trouble the sum of 25¢ per mile traveled one way by the ordinary stage.

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ENGLISH KICKERS COMING

N. E. JACKSON'S CORINTHIANS WILL VISIT CANADA.

They'll Play Rugby and Association Football and Also Cricket—Dates for Their American Tour—George W. Orton Will Dominate in New York—Successful Canadian Horse—Hockey, Curling and General Sport.

A real live team of English Rugby football players will visit Toronto next autumn.

They are the gentlemanly members of N. E. Jackson's Corinthian Association Football Team, whose versatility is well known and brilliant.

Negotiations were entered into in December, 1891, with Mr. N. E. Jackson, secretary of the Toronto Football Club League, but were abandoned with a view of arranging a tour through the United States and Canada.

Mr. Baird's first idea was to boom the game of football, but as there are several brilliant cricketers in the Corinthian Club it has been decided to make the trip in the interests of cricket as well as football.

From the following list of players who have consented to come it will be seen that the team will be a powerful one.

W. Bradford, N. L. Jackson, G. W. Orton, G. H. Carter, P. Dewhurst, L. H. Gay, R. C. Joeling, A. G. Hanford, A. H. Howack, L. N. Perkins, S. M. J. Woods, all of Cambridge University; C. B. Fry, Oxford; T. Lindley, Cambridge University and Nottingham; W. R. Moon, Middlesex and Old Westminster; F. P. Kelly, G. M. Smith, Oxford University; E. C. Streetfield, Surrey and Cambridge University; J. G. Vetch, Cambridge; F. Challenor, Surrey; A. E. Stoddard, Middlesex; L. C. H. P. Palmer, Somerset; C. W. Bradford, Oxford and N. L. Jackson, Toronto.

Of the foregoing boys hold with Mr. Grace the honor of having scored a couple of centuries in a single match, which fact he accomplished last summer. Stoddard holds the record for the highest individual score, viz., 485, made against the Sticks at Hampstead in 1887.

The tour at present is planned thus: Start at New York with cricket; then Philadelphia, cricket; Pittsburgh, cricket and football; Chicago, cricket and football; Detroit, cricket and football; Berlin, football; Toronto, cricket and football; Montreal, cricket; Boston, cricket; Fall River, Mass., football; Pawtucket, R. I., football; Philadelphia, football, and probably finishing at New York with English Rugby.
