INTERNATIONAL S. S. CONVENTION.

NEXT week the International S. S. Convention meets in our city. Over 900 delegates are expected. A large number of visitors will also be in attendance. The meetings will be held in the Pavilion, (Horticultural Gardens). The building is being fitted up with every convenience for the visitors. A large lunch tent is to be erected, and no effort will be spared by the Committee of Arrangements to make the gathering a success. A circular has been issued asking that next Sunday this gathering be made a subject of special prayer that the power of the Spirit may be manifest in all the sessions.

A plentiful supply of paper, pens and ink, with a good assortment of daily and other newspapers and periodicals will be furnished free of charge to the volunteers; and we have provided somewhat for recreation also, having sent over dumbbells, clubs, &c.

We shall be pleased to receive donations of periodicals and papers, or contributions towards defraying the expenses, which will be about \$100. We have received from W. H. H., \$10; H. O. B., \$10.
