#### 11.00 o'clock a.m.

Today being the first day of the meeting of the First Session of the Twentyfourth Parliament for the despatch of business, Léon-J. Raymond, Esquire, O.B.E., Clerk of the House of Commons, Thomas Russel Montgomery, Esquire, Clerk Assistant of the House of Commons, and Lieutenant-Colonel William John Franklin, M.C., V.D., Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Commons, Commissioners appointed *per dedimus potestatem* for the purpose of administering the oath to Members of the House of Commons, all attending according to their duty, the said Léon-J. Raymond, Esquire, O.B.E., laid upon the Table a List of the Members returned to serve in this Parliament received by him as Clerk of the House of Commons from and certified under the hand of N. Castonguay, Esquire, Chief Electoral Officer. The said certificate and List is as follows:

### TWENTY-FOURTH GENERAL ELECTION

### OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ELECTORAL OFFICER

This is to certify that since the dissolution of the Twenty-third Parliament on the first day of February, 1958, writs of election were issued on the same date by His Excellency the Governor in Council for the election of a member or members to serve in the House of Commons for every electoral district in Canada, such writs being severally addressed to the returning officers mentioned in the attached list and directing that, with the undermentioned exceptions, the nomination of candidates be held on the seventeenth day of March, 1958, and the poll, if required, on the thirty-first day of March, 1958. In the electoral districts of Cochrane, Kenora-Rainy River, Port Arthur, Chapleau, Saguenay, Bonavista-Twillingate, Burin-Burgeo, Grand Falls-White Bay-Labrador, Humber-St. George's, Trinity-Conception, Churchill, Mackenzie, Meadow Lake, Prince Albert, Athabasca, Jasper-Edson, Peace River, Cariboo, Skeena, Yukon, and Mackenzie River, the nomination of candidates was held on the third day of March, 1958.

And that an election was accordingly held in every electoral district in Canada on the thirty-first day of March, 1958.

And that the persons named in the attached list have from time to time been returned as elected members to serve in the House of Commons pursuant to the said writs, their names having been duly entered in the order in which the returns were received in the book kept for that purpose pursuant to the provisions of the Statute on the subject, and notice of such returns having from time to time been duly published in the Canada Gazette.

The Clerk of the House of Commons, House of Commons, Ottawa. A Message was delivered by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod:

### Members of the House of Commons:

His Honour the Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General, desires the immediate attendance of Honourable Members in the Chamber of the Honourable the Senate.

Accordingly, the Members went up to the Senate Chamber, when the Speaker of the Senate said:

Honourable Members of the Senate, and Members of the House of Commons:

I have it in command to let you know that His Excellency the Governor General does not see fit to declare the causes of his summoning the present Parliament of Canada until the Speaker of the House of Commons shall have been chosen according to Law, but this afternoon at the hour of three o'clock His Excellency will declare the causes of calling this Parliament.

And the Members being returned;

The Right Honourable John G. Diefenbaker, addressing himself to the Clerk, moved, seconded by the Honourable Lester B. Pearson,—That Roland Michener, Esquire, Member for the Electoral District of St. Paul's (Toronto), do take the Chair of this House as Speaker.

And the question being put on the said motion, it was agreed to.

And the Clerk having declared Roland Michener, Esquire, duly elected, Mr. Michener was conducted to the Chair by the Right Honourable John G. Diefenbaker and the Honourable Lester B. Pearson, when he returned his humble acknowledgments to the House for the great honour they had been pleased to confer upon him by choosing him to be their Speaker.

The Mace was laid upon the Table.

At 11.47 o'clock a.m., the sitting was suspended until 3.00 o'clock p.m. this day.

3.00 o'clock p.m.

The sitting was resumed.

A Message was delivered by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod:

### Mr. Speaker:

His Excellency the Governor General desires the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Chamber of the Honourable the Senate.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker, with the House, went up to the Senate Chamber, and Mr. Speaker spoke to the following effect:

#### May it please Your Excellency:

The House of Commons have elected me their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me, and not to the Commons, whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and Country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to Your Excellency's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from your Excellency the most favourable construction.

The Honourable the Speaker of the Senate then said:

Mr. Speaker:

I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor General to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the House of Commons to Her Majesty's Person and Government and, not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence, he grants and upon all occasions will recognize and allow their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you that the Commons shall have ready access to His Excellency upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

And the House being returned:

Mr. Speaker reported that the House had been in the Senate Chamber, and that he had, in their names and on their behalf, made the usual claim of privileges, which His Excellency had been pleased to confirm to them.

Mr. Diefenbaker, seconded by Mr. Green, by leave of the House, introduced a Bill, No. C-1, An Act respecting the administration of Oaths of Office, which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported that, when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, and to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy, which is as follows:

#### Honourable Members of the Senate:

### Members of the House of Commons:

It is my pleasure to welcome you to this first session of the twenty-fourth Parliament of Canada. We all recall with pleasure the historic events of last autumn when Her Gracious Majesty was present to open Parliament Herself and to receive the warm welcome and wide acclaim of Her Canadian subjects. We look forward to the presence this summer of Her Royal Highness Princess Margaret to take part in the centennial ceremonies of British Columbia and to visit other parts of Canada.

As further evidence of the expanding sense of mutual interest among the countries of the Commonwealth as well as the growth of the Commonwealth itself, it is pleasing and significant that we will be welcoming to Canada this summer both the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom and the Prime Minister of Ghana.

My Ministers have been glad to note the widely expressed desire of the peoples of many nations that the manifold advances of science shall be devoted to the betterment of mankind rather than to the arts and engines of war. My Government will continue to make unremitting efforts to assist in the peaceful solution of international problems and in the accomplishment by patient negotiation of a substantial measure of disarmament. In the meantime, my advisers will ask your support to maintain, in cooperation with our allies, armed forces adequate to deter any potential aggression.

My Government believes that the condition of international economic affairs is such as to require major concerted efforts to encourage the expansion of trade. It is accordingly very gratifying that all countries of the Commonwealth have accepted the proposal of Canada that a Commonwealth Trade and Economic Conference be held in September of this year in Montreal.

We look forward with pleasure to the visits to Canada this summer of the President of the United States and the President of the Federal Republic of Germany. My Ministers welcome the opportunities which these visits will afford for useful conversations. My Government regrets to have to report that efforts to avert a strike of firemen on the Canadian Pacific Railway were unsuccessful. It is however encouraging to note that negotiations which my Ministers arranged between the parties have succeeded in narrowing the issues in dispute to the point where further direct discussions may yet resolve the question. My Government continues to maintain a constant watch over developments in this situation and will be ready in the light of events to recommend such action as the national interest demands and circumstances may require.

My Government will propose to you the enactment of a Bill of Rights to safeguard the rights of all persons in Canada in respect of all subjects within the jurisdiction of Parliament.

You will be asked to approve a number of measures and appropriations to continue and extend the programme of my Government in sustaining employment by the acceleration of useful public works and by encouraging the development and processing of our natural resources.

You will be asked immediately to amend the Unemployment Insurance Act in order to extend for a further six weeks, during the current year, the period during which special seasonal benefits may be paid. Already the amendments to this Act made in November last and those made to the Unemployment Assistance Act have proven their value in mitigating the difficulties of Canadians who are temporarily without jobs. Further amendments to the Unemployment Insurance Act will be proposed at a later stage in the session.

My Government will continue to promote a vigorous programme of house building, which has already proven to be a strong feature of our economy and which constitutes the best opportunity for increased work in meeting the needs of our people. My Ministers are ready to cooperate fully under the authority of the National Housing Act in further projects for slum clearance and urban re-development to improve the cities and towns of Canada.

In order to ensure the continuation of our national housing programme, you will be asked at an early date to approve an increase in the public funds made available under the National Housing Act.

You will be asked to make provision for a substantial programme of public investment to be carried out by Government departments and Crown companies and to provide assistance to Provincial Governments for certain agreed types of projects. In particular, a large expansion in the construction and equipment of our system of airports and airways will be proposed and an increase in our work on harbours and rivers and public buildings.

In order to promote our national development on the frontier in the north you will be asked to authorize the construction of a railway to Great Slave Lake. My Ministers regard this as a major step in the establishment of productive industry on an economic basis in the Northwest Territories. You will also be asked to provide for the construction of important roads needed for development in the Yukon and Northwest Territories and in the provinces, with the cooperation of their Governments. You will be asked to provide for the initiation of a programme of research to assist in opening up the mineral resources of our Arctic Islands. My Ministers have made progress in arrangements for the construction of the South Saskatchewan project. Proposals will be placed before you to make possible the commencement, this year, of the construction of the main dam intended to create a great reservoir in the heart of the prairie in order to further the productive development of this part of Canada.

The easing of the stringency in the capital markets of Canada during the past eight months encourages confidence in the expectation that large programmes of public investment can be successfully financed not only by my Government and its agencies but also by Provincial Governments and municipalities. My Ministers remain mindful of the importance of financing their large programme of expenditures in such manner as will best safeguard against a recurrence of inflationary dangers in future. They wish to urge upon all groups in our society a recognition of the dangers and inequities of inflation and the need to restrain demands which will give rise to increases in prices and the costs of production.

The improvements in our financial relations with the Provinces made by the last Parliament are having a beneficial effect upon our economy by making it possible for Provincial Governments and their municipalities to proceed with greater confidence upon expanded programmes of necessary services and works.

There will be placed before you a proposal to establish a new agency to regulate broadcasting in Canada and to ensure that the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and the privately owned broadcasting stations work effectively together to constitute a national system to provide satisfactory television and radio services to all Canadians within reach. Related amendments to the Radio Act will also be proposed.

To promote and guide the proper long-term development of our National Capital region upon lines worthy of our nation, my Government will request you to enact a new National Capital Act to replace the present Federal District Commission Act.

Changes will be proposed in the Hospital Insurance and Diagnostic Services Act to make certain that payments may be made to participating Provinces qualifying under the Act in respect of any periods commencing after June this year.

You will be asked to authorize the establishment of a Harbour Commission to combine the growing harbours at Fort William and Port Arthur and to fit this Lakehead harbour to handle the larger traffic to be expected as a result of the Seaway.

Unremitting efforts are being made to sell Canadian agricultural and fisheries products in the markets of the world and considerably larger exports of wheat and cattle have been made. Support prices have now been established for a considerable number of products under the Agricultural Stabilization Act to carry into effect, for the current year, the desire of Parliament that agriculture should be thus assisted to realize fair returns for its labour and investment.

The Act to provide cash advances on farm stored grain has proven to be of advantage to a large number of farmers and to the economy as a whole. Certain amendments will be proposed to that Act in the light of experience in its application. Amendments will also be proposed to the Prairie Farm Assistance Act and the Canadian Farm Loan Act.

In order to assist small business, there will be established a Small Business Section within the administrative machinery of government. The functions of this organization will be to provide liaison between the government and small businesses, to study the problems of small business and to advise on measures necessary to meet them.

You will be asked to replace the present Ticket of Leave Act with a new statute to establish a National Parole Board. There will be submitted for your consideration amendments to the Citizenship Act and the Indian Act to eliminate certain discriminatory provisions in these statutes.

Amendments will be proposed to the Veterans Insurance Act, the Returned Soldiers Insurance Act, the Children of War Dead (Education Assistance) Act, the Emergency Gold Mining Assistance Act, the Transport Act, the National Parks Act and a number of other statutes.

#### Members of the House of Commons,

You will be asked to appropriate the funds required to carry on the services and payments approved by Parliament.

My Ministers will lay before you in accordance with the law the Special Warrants which I issued upon their advice to authorize expenditures urgently required for the public good during the period since the twenty-third Parliament was dissolved. You will be invited to consider and approve these expenditures. An amendment to the Financial Administration Act will be proposed relating to the use of Special Warrants.

Other measures will be proposed to improve the effectiveness of the processes of Parliament.

The Government will ask your approval of the installation in the House of Commons of a system of simultaneous translation.

You will be asked to set up a Select Committee on Broadcasting, a Standing Committee on Estimates and a Standing Committee on Veterans Affairs, all with power to send for persons and papers. My Ministers will propose that a member of Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition be elected Chairman of the Committee on Public Accounts.

### Honourable Members of the Senate,

#### Members of the Commons,

May Divine Providence bless and guide you in the accomplishment of the high purpose which brings you here.

#### To the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons:

The Library of Parliament was re-opened two years ago and the wisdom of those who fought for its restoration after the fire is more clearly revealed every day. The distinctive "Confederation" appearance of the interior is almost the same as it was in 1876. Surrounding are modern offices occupied by an efficient staff. As the work of re-cataloguing and filling more and more shelves goes on so the usefulness of the library has increased both to parliament and government alike.

My last report was made as recently as October 14, 1957. Little needs to be added to the account then given.

From the large collection of books stored in the Supreme Court building or elsewhere since the fire of 1952, we have withdrawn over 200,000 volumes; these are now in the Library of Parliament building. Of that number 104,125 as of April 30th had been catalogued and classified. Several thousand others some duplicates, some thought to be superfluous to a parliamentary library have been transferred to the National Library. There still remain in the Supreme Court thousands more to be sorted and removed.

Two very large rooms under the Senate in which since 1920 we have stored 50,000 books have been repossessed by the Senate. Fortunately we have been able to find space for this material in the library and in the Supreme Court building.

My last report told of the plans made by the Department of Public Works to improve the general illumination of the main Reading Room in accordance with a recommendation of the Joint Committee on the Library of Parliament. Nothing however, has been done as yet to implement these plans.

From October 1, 1957 to April 30, 1958 our staff answered 2742 reference questions and circulated 8620 books.

Two valued members of the permanent staff, well known to Members and Senators in the past, have retired this year. Mr. Frank Fox had acted as a reference clerk for twelve years and Miss Winefride Raye had been a faithful and efficient secretary to successive Parliamentary Librarians for over thirty years.

It would not, of course, affect the rights of the House when third reading is called in any way at all; it just eliminates an apparently unnecessary motion. Is it agreed that we follow this practice?

#### STATEMENT BY MR. SPEAKER

Mr. SPEAKER: Before proceeding with the orders of the day, if the House would permit me one word, I should like to refer honourable Members to two citations relating to oral questions about public policy. There are many borderline questions, and there were some this morning. For the guidance of the House, perhaps I might refer to Bourinot's fourth edition, at page 314, where he expresses this view of the practice:

While explanations of the intentions of the government or of a minister may be asked, their opinion on a matter of policy or of law is not a proper subject of inquiry.

It is perhaps a rather fine distinction between intention and opinion, but it is one that can be drawn and is one that should be kept in the minds of honourable Members when they ask questions.

I should like to refer to Beauchesne and also to May, sixteenth edition, page 356. Beauchesne's second edition, citation 339, repeated in the fourth and latest edition, as citation 178, reads:

Questions addressed to ministers should relate to the public affairs with which they are officially connected, to proceedings pending in parliament, or to any matter of administration for which the minister is responsible. Within these lines an explanation can be sought regarding the intentions of the government, but not an expression of opinion upon matters of policy.

May I refer also to another rule of the House. I was not in the chair yesterday when a reference was made to the Governor General. Although I am sure that the honourable Member who made the reference intended no disrespect of the Governor General, perhaps what was said could be susceptible of that interpretation. For the guidance of honourable Members of the House, may I refer to Standing Order 35:

No member shall speak disrespectfully of Her Majesty, nor of any of the Royal Family, nor of His Excellency or the person administering the government of Canada; nor use offensive words against either House, or against any member thereof.

May I refer also to a comment on the practice which is found in May's sixteenth edition at page 457:

Unless the discussion is based upon a substantive motion, drawn in proper terms, reflections must not be cast in debate upon the conduct of the sovereign, the heir to the throne, or other members of the royal family, the Governor General of a Dominion, the Speaker, the chairman of ways and means, members of either House of Parliament, or judges of the superior courts—

and so on.

Since there are many new Members in the House, I thought it desirable to refer to the rules and the practice, so that in the future Members would be careful in making references of that kind.

Mr. Fleming (Eglinton), a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, delivered a Message from His Excellency the Governor General, which was read by Mr. Speaker, as follows:

The Governor General transmits to the House of Commons Supplementary Estimates of sums required for the service of Canada for the year ending 31st March, 1959, and, in accordance with the provisions of the British North America Act, 1867, the Governor General recommends these Estimates to the House of Commons.

On motion of Mr. Fleming (Eglinton), seconded by Mr. Churchill, the said Message and Supplementary Estimates were referred to the Committee of Supply.

On motion of Mr. Diefenbaker, seconded by Mr. Pearson, it was ordered,— That the Address of His Excellency Dr. Theodor Heuss, President of the Federal Republic of Germany, before the Members of the Senate and of the House of Commons of Canada in the Chamber of the House of Commons today, together with introductory and related speeches, be included in the House of Commons Debates and form part of the permanent records of this Parliament. Mr. Peters, seconded by Mr. Martin (Timmins), by leave of the House, introduced a Bill, No. C-19, An Act to amend the Canada Elections Act (Publication of Straw Poll Results), which was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Hamilton (Qu'Appelle), seconded by Mr. MacLean (Queens), moved,— That the House do go into Committee of the Whole at its next sitting to consider the following proposed resolution which has been recommended to the House by His Excellency:

That it is expedient to introduce a measure to provide for the withdrawal of certain Lands from Cape Breton Highlands National Park.

Resolved,—That the House do go into Committee of the Whole at its next sitting to consider the said proposed resolution.

On motion of Mr. Fisher, seconded by Mr. Peters, it was ordered,—That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General praying that he will cause to be laid before this House a copy of the clause or clauses in pipeline construction contracts of Northern Ontario Pipeline Crown Corporation for 1958, having reference to contractors' obligations relating to employment of Canadians, wage rates, hours of work, and working conditions. (\*Notice of Motion No. 4).

On motion of Mr. Argue, seconded by Mr. Herridge, it was ordered,—That there be laid before this House a copy of instructions to Canadian Immigration Officers in the matter of examination of Canadian citizens who are returning to Canada after a visit to the United States. #### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: May I take this opportunity to deal with the amendment which was moved by the honourable Member for Skeena (Mr. Howard) and seconded by the honourable Member for Timmins (Mr. Martin) while the Acting Speaker (Mr. Rea) was in the chair. The Acting Speaker expressed the view that the amendment was probably irrelevant but reserved decision. I concur in the view he tentatively expressed as to the irrelevance of the proposed amendment which I think is apparent from a consideration of the motion itself which calls for two things; first, that it is expedient that the Houses of Parliament do approve the agreement and, second, that the House do approve the agreement. That is all that the motion puts forward. In effect, if the motion is affirmed it will approve the agreement and if it is negatived it will disapprove the agreement. If the amendment has the effect of denying the motion it is unnecessary and irrelevant because those Members who wish to disapprove the agreement have only to vote against the motion as it stands.

If the amendment adds something to the motion in a positive way it is a declaration of principle in these terms, that it is advisable for the government to give consideration to the taking of such steps as are necessary to integrate these agreements within the structure of NATO. Assuming that the amendment and the motion were accepted you would have the agreement approved but you would have added to it a declaration of this independent principle which is not related to the motion nor is it necessary for the decision of the motion in question.

That view is reinforced by a consideration of the limited number of cases where it is possible to introduce a principle by way of an amendment. There are only three cases. A very similar matter was considered by the Speaker in 1932 as set out on page 48 of the *Journals* of the House for October 20, 1932. If I may, I should like to read the relative portions to indicate the limitation that all Members are under in an attempt to add a principle to a motion of this kind. The Speaker of that time said:

There is no doubt in my mind that under Standing Order 48 which is now 44.

—this motion can be amended. The original motion before the House approves the trade agreement entered into at Ottawa, 20th August, 1932, between representatives of the government of Canada and of the government of the United Kingdom. The amendment proposed both approves and disapproves of the agreement. It is out of order for the following reasons.

Then the Speaker deals with paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of the proposed amendment which I do not need to cite and goes on to deal with paragraphs 4 and 5 about which he says:

Paragraphs 4 and 5 affirm general principles which cannot be moved as amendments to motions of this sort but which could be moved on other occasions.

For example, a motion clearly could be brought forward for the purposes of this amendment but it would have to be on notice and as an independent motion. I continue with the quotation:

May, Bourinot and Redlich indicate that the only motions upon which amendments declaratory of principle may be moved are motions for an Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, motions to go into committee of ways and means and supply and for the second reading of public bills.

Then he cites the references in these three authorities. On these grounds I must declare the amendment to be out of order.

And the debate continuing on the main motion; the said debate was interrupted at six o'clock.

## RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: I am still finding some difficulty with this rule (Standing Order 47). I think it is open to any Member to put a Notice of Motion of this kind on the Order Paper, under "Notices of Motions", to which heading it will go if it is transferred at this time. As I understand the rule, the marking of the notice with an asterisk simply means that it is dealt with on Routine Proceedings with other matters that do not require an extensive expenditure of time, and where there is no debate. That is where we find it. If there is a change of mind and a debate is required on the motion, this rule apparently permits the notice to be transferred to the general heading "Notices of Motions" and, as the honourable Member for Assiniboia (Mr. Argue) points out, it will go to the bottom of the list where it will likely be buried for the rest of the session. However, I think that was the intention of the rule. The only thing that puzzled me was whether the mover of the motion could in effect change his mind. The question really is whose request or whose desire is to be given effect to. As there has been a request for a debate on this motion, I think effect should be given to that request and that it should be transferred to the Order Paper under "Notices of Motions".

Accordingly, the said motion was transferred to the order "Notices of Motions".

### INCOME TAX ACT

Resolved,—That it is expedient to introduce a measure to amend the Income Tax Act and to provide, among other things:

1. That amounts paid after June 17, 1958, for drugs and medicines which have been prescribed by a medical practitioner and recorded by a licensed pharmacist be included in the medical expenses that are deductible in computing taxable income.

2. That amounts paid after June 17, 1958, for eyeglasses, artificial eyes, laboratory or other diagnostic services or transportation to or from a hospital by ambulance be included in the medical expenses that are deductible in computing taxable income.

3. That for 1958 and subsequent taxation years the maximum amount deductible by corporations for contributions to charitable organizations be increased from 5% of income to 10% of income.

4. That the rate of interest payable to taxpayers on overpayments of tax for 1958 and subsequent taxation years be increased from 2% to 3%.

5. That the two year period within which a taxpayer may apply for a refund of an overpayment of tax for a taxation year be increased to four years from the end of the taxation year.

6. That for 1958 and subsequent taxation years a gift to the spouse of a donor of real property to be used by the donor and the spouse as their home, or a gift to a child of the donor of farm real property to be used in farming operations carried on by the child, or by the child and the donor, shall be exempt from gift tax to the extent of \$10,000, provided that no such exemption shall apply more than once during the life time of the donor.

7. That the amount by which any gift tax paid on a gift made within three years prior to death exceeds any succession duty or estate tax subsequently imposed in respect of a death after June 17, 1958, on that gift under any Act of the Parliament of Canada will be refunded.

8. That with effect after June 17, 1958, the exemption from the tax on income of non-resident persons now granted in respect of dividends paid by a non-resident-owned investment corporation be changed so as to apply only in respect of dividends paid after the time when the corporation has paid out dividends which in the aggregate equal the undistributed earnings accumulated by the corporation in years when it was not a non-resident-owned investment corporation.

Mr. Fraser, from the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

Your Committee has considered the following Bill and has agreed to report it without amendment:

Bill No. C-26, An Act to incorporate the Lakehead Harbour Commissioners.

A copy of the Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence adduced in respect of the said Bill is appended.

(The Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence accompanying the said Report recorded as Appendix No. 2 to the Journals)

Mr. Murphy, from the Standing Committee on Mines, Forests and Waters, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

Pursuant to its Order of Reference of June 3, 1958, your Committee has considered and approved items numbered 266 to 303, inclusive, and items numbered 506 to 508, inclusive, as listed in the Main Estimates 1958-59; and items numbered 580 to 588, inclusive, and item numbered 659, as listed in the Supplementary Estimates for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1959, relating to the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources.

Your Committee has held 14 meetings on the Order of Reference of the House concerning the estimates of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources. These meetings were devoted to the estimates pertaining to the under-mentioned branches, etc., approximately as follows: Departmental Administration, etc., two meetings; National Parks Branch, two meetings; Water Resources Branch, one meeting; Northern Administration and Lands Branch, four meetings; Forestry Branch, three and a half meetings; and National Museum of Canada and Canadian Government Travel Bureau, one and a half meetings.

Your Committee heard a full statement of the national development policy of the government and its emphasis on northern development. A policy of cooperation with the provinces to achieve the maximum reach of national development was explained. Your Committee has examined the substantially increased expenditures that are provided for in the current estimates for roads and other facilities in the North, and for the "roads to resources" program in conjunction with the provinces. Your Committee recommends the continuance of this program in the interest of national development.

It is obvious that the activities and responsibilities of the department will continue to expand rapidly during the years ahead, and your Committee feels it to be essential that this expansion should not be frustrated by insufficient financial attention. Your Committee has noted that there has been a steady increase in the estimates of the department over the years since its inception, and your Committee has noted that there has been an increase of nearly 250 per cent in the 1958-59 estimates over those of 1954-55.

This expansion has occurred during a period when the staff of the department has increased only by 42 per cent. Your Committee observes that the greatest single need of the department would appear to be an increase of its staff in order to keep apace of its rapidly expanding responsibilities.

Your Committee was given a report by the Minister of the need for a better and more complete inventory of natural resources in Canada, and also for the need of more comprehensive programs for the conservation and prudent management of such resources. It notes with approval the plans now under way for the summoning of a National Conference on Conservation in the next year or two and commends these plans in the interests of better resource utilization in Canada.

Your Committee heard a full statement from the Minister concerning the policy underlying the establishment and preservation of the National Parks and endorses it. In this connection your Committee commends to the attention of other Members of the House the publication entitled "Wisdom's Heritage: the National Parks of Canada", which is available on application to the department. Further, your Committee recommends the continuance of the work of establishing and preserving the National Parks, both for their underlying purpose and also to provide amenities and recreation for Canadians in the future.

Your Committee has examined the programs of the department with regard to Water Resources and Forestry and has noted the increased activity in relation to a number of aspects thereof. Your Committee recommends that increased attention be given to the compilation of material on water resources and to their multiple use, and, in the case of forestry, to forest research. Your Committee also noted the increased emphasis being given in the United States to forest products research and recommends that the government give consideration to increased support of that activity in Canada.

Your Committee carefully examined the program and policies of the department in the northern territories, including, in addition to economic development, matters affecting the Eskimo people, the Indian people, and all northern citizens. Emphasis was directed to the integration of the native northerner. Your Committee also examined the policies affecting the social advancement of the peoples of the north. Your Committee questioned the Minister and officials of the department concerning programs relating to the Eskimos. It shares the concern that is felt for the future of numbers of these people who have been dependent on the caribou, the numbers of which are declining in a catastrophic manner, and on trapping for fur, an industry which has suffered extreme price declines.

It commends the efforts now being made to construct schools, to provide more and better education, to give vocational training, and to secure employment for these people in order that they may be assured of a more secure future and of a better standard of living.

Your Committee endorses the continuance and expansion of the program to develop the northern areas as an integral part of Canada.

Your Committee recognizes that, at the present stage of development of the north, it is essential there continue to be a heavy balance of net investment for many years to come. However, your Committee is equally convinced that the resources of the north are such that investment today will be amply repaid by the development of future years.

Your Committee recommends that the government authorize the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources to organize familiarization trips for the Members of the House throughout Canada's Northland in the same fashion that similar educational trips are now being conducted for the members of the Armed Forces attending Staff and Defence Colleges, the National Research Council, the Defence Research Board and departmental officials, from time to time.

During its consideration of the estimates concerning the Forestry Branch, your Committee heard statements from and examined the following expert witnesses, namely, Major-General Howard Kennedy, C.B.E., M.C., M.E.I.C., Consultant Forest Engineer; Mr. G. W. I. Creighton, D.Sc., President, Canadian Institute of Forestry; Mr. H. C. McQuillan, M.P., Immediate Past-President, Truck Loggers Association of British Columbia; and Mr. Ian S. Mahood, B.Sc.F., B.Com., professional forester.

Your Committee noted with interest that the National War Museum has been transferred to and now forms a part of the National Museum of Canada.

Your Committee recommends that, to ensure efficient operation of the Canadian Government Travel Bureau, there should be continuity of its control and supervision by it remaining under one department of government instead of being periodically transferred to other jurisdictions.

Your Committee has noted the steady increase in enquiries concerning travel to Canada and recommends that the activity of the Bureau continue on at least as great a scale as to-day with a view to eliminating the adverse balance of payments on tourist account that now exists. Views were strongly expressed that there should be an increase in expenditure, both by the federal government and by provincial governments, to stimulate the development of this important industry.

Your Committee examined the policies that have been introduced under the Atlantic Provinces Power Development Act to assist those provinces in developing adequate and cheaper sources of electric power. It commends this policy strongly and recommends that it be continued in cooperation with the provincial governments.

Your Committee examined the program and estimates of the Northern Canada Power Commission and noted the growth of the operations of the Commission in order to make power available for industrial and community development in northern Canada. The basic policy of covering all costs from the sale of power but, within that, of making power available at the lowest possible cost, is considered as being in the best interest of northern development.

Members of your Committee took full advantage of the invitations of the Minister and witnesses to question them without restriction.

Your Committee records its appreciation of the conscientious attendance and hearty cooperation of the officials of all branches of the department, and of the valuable assistance given to it by other witnesses.

Your Committee recommends that it be activated during succeeding sessions, and with a larger membership than at present, for the purposes of keeping under close review the very important matters of the development of northern Canada as part of the national development policy and of the resources of Canada generally, and, thereby, of keeping the Canadian public well informed thereon; and that the estimates of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources be referred to the Committee in future sessions.

A copy of the Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence in respect of the said estimates is appended.

Mr. Fraser, from the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

On Wednesday, June 18, 1958, the House referred to your Committee for consideration Items numbered 414 to 430, 433 to 441, 444 to 472, 512 to 516, all of which are inclusive, of the Main Estimates 1958-59, and Items 628 to 634, 636 to 651, both inclusive, and 661 and 662 of the Supplementary Estimates 1958-59.

Your Committee has held 7 meetings and heard and questioned the Honourable George Hees, Minister of Transport, and the following officers from the Department of Transport and related agencies:

Mr. J. R. Baldwin, Deputy Minister;

Mr. R. J. Burnside, Director, Canal Services;

Mr. N. Wilson, Director, Marine Services;

Mr. A. Watson, Director, Ship Construction and Supply;

Mr. A. Cumyn, Director, Marine Regulations Branch; Captain F. S. Slocombe, Chief, Nautical Division;

Air Vice-Marshal A. de Niverville, Director General of Air Services;

Mr. F. G. Nixon, Director, Telecommunication Branch;

Mr. J. R. H. Noble, Meteorological Branch;

Mr. H. J. Connolly, Director, Construction Branch;

Mr. L. C. Audette, Chairman, Canadian Maritime Commission;

Mr. M. Archer, Chairman, National Harbours Board;

Mr. G. Morisset, Member, Air Transport Board;

Mr. R. Kerr, General Counsel, Board of Transport Commissioners;

Mr. J. E. Dumontier, Director, Engineering Branch Board of Transport Commissioners:

Your Committee has considered the above listed items, approves them and recommends them to the House for approval.

During its deliberations the Committee learned of the increased responsibilities accepted by the Department in recent years, arising out of the very rapid growth in transportation and communications in Canada, both in relation to movement between the settled areas of Canada and the opening of Northern Canada and our Arctic regions. Evidence was placed before the Committee concerning the large addition in the number of airport projects required to satisfy the needs of Canadian aviation in our major cities and in the extreme North, and information regarding the substantially increased requirements for icebreaking, marine aids and northern marine patrol work, and the related substantial increase in the construction program of departmental ships. Special emphasis was given to the greatly increased need for electronic aids to marine and air navigation.

The continued close co-operation between the Department, the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority and the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission toward the completion of the St. Lawrence Seaway and Power Project was noted with satisfaction. The importance of the Seaway and its beneficial effect on Canadian inland ports was recognized by your Committee, and a recommendation that municipalities which expect to enjoy maximum benefits from the Project should survey existing port facilities and endeavour to determine necessary additional requirements, received the general support of members. The Committee recommends for the consideration of the Department the establishment of an economic survey to consider the effects of the St. Lawrence Seaway Project upon all regions of Canada.

Your Committee was pleased to learn that amendments to the Canada Shipping Act relating to pilotage on the Great Lakes are contemplated.

The Committee wishes to commend the Minister and officers of the Department for the successful arrangements made with the Towns of Thorold and Merritton and the City of St. Catharines, Ontario, in connection with the remodelling of the Second Welland Canal locks and channel. The conversion of this abandoned canal, for many years a hazard to residents of the area, into a valuable asset for drainage in the area is appreciated. Work on this project is expected to commence this summer.

Your Committee heard with approbation the work of the Department in conjunction with the Canadian Boating Federation in the testing and determining of power and load capacities of small boats and the promotion of an extension of the use of "capacity loading plaques" by Canadian boat manufacturers. It is felt that this program coupled with the many improved items of safety equipment now available will further contribute to the safety of boating generally.

The major construction program relating to the maintenance, improvement and extension of runways, taxiways and aprons at airports across Canada in order to cope with the increasing amount of air travel and to accommodate the larger and more advanced types of aircraft was presented to your Committee. The Department's Airport Terminal Building Projects were outlined, and it was observed that more than 17 airports have benefited during the past year or will in the near future benefit from the construction of new Terminal Buildings. Your Committee was pleased to learn that provision has been made for the takeover by the Department, of direct operation and maintenance of the Northwest Territories and Yukon Signal System from the Department of National Defence. This will permit some degree of integration with services already operated in the area by the Department and make possible a saving of 10 per cent or more in the annual operating cost. It is intended that the high standard of public service maintained in the past by the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals will be continued.

Consistent with the Government's program for the accelerated development of Canada's North and Arctic regions, it is proposed to carry out, within the next year, certain improvements and the modernization of equipment and expansion of facilities.

Your Committee wishes to record its appreciation to officers of the Department of Transport, the Canadian Maritime Commission, the National Harbours Board, the Air Transport Board, and the Board of Transport Commissioners who appeared before it and contributed to its work.

A copy of the Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence is appended.

Resolved,—That it is expedient to introduce a measure to amend the Excise Tax Act and to provide, among other things:

    - (ii) cornice, freize, pilasters and other units or members of wood milled for use as structural or architectural building components, not including assembled or unassembled cabinets, counters, cupboards, furniture, ironing boards, work benches and similar installations;
    - (iii) ash handling and fuel handling equipment for use with furnaces for the heating of buildings, when connected directly to such furnaces and installed in the same building as such furnaces;
    - (iv) fuel oil tanks for use with furnaces for the heating of buildings and connected directly to such furnaces;
    - (v) latch sets, master key cylinder blocks, knobs and hinges;
    - (vi) hard surface plastic laminated building materials;
    - (vii) underlayment material for hard surface floor coverings for permanent bonding to floors;
    - (viii) articles and materials to be used exclusively in the manufacture of the foregoing.
  - (b) certain goods sold to or imported by municipalities for their own use and not for resale, as follows:
    - (i) culverts;
    - (ii) structural aluminum for bridges;
    - (iii) fire truck chassis for the permanent attachment thereon of fire fighting equipment to be used directly in fire fighting;
    - (iv) fire hose including couplings and nozzles therefor;
    - (v) diesel fuel oil for use in generating electricity;
    - (vi) goods for use as part of sewage and drainage systems;
    - (vii) articles and materials to be used exclusively in the manufacture of the foregoing.

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- (c) certain agricultural, horticultural and forestry goods as follows:
  - (i) stock conditioners, condiments and food supplements for addition to poultry, cattle and other stock feeds;
  - (ii) goods enumerated in Customs Tariff item 417:
     "Machinery and apparatus and complete parts thereof and structural iron and steel, of a class or kind not made in Canada, when imported for use exclusively in the construction or equipment of factories for the manufacture of sugar from beetroot, or for receiving sugar beets, under regulations prescribed by the Minister;"
  - (iii) individual tree guards and tree protectors not exceeding thirty-six inches in height;
  - (iv) cut flowers;
  - (v) materials to be used exclusively in the manufacture of grain or seed cleaning machines and parts thereof;
  - (vi) rodent poisons.

2. That the present exemption for fruit juices which consist of at least ninety-five per cent of pure juice of the fruit be extended to fruit juices consisting of at least eighty-five per cent of the pure juice of the fruit and concentrates thereof.

3. That the proposed wording of the exemption for "bases or concentrates for making beverages other than soft drink beverages" in Schedule III be changed to read:

"Bases or concentrates for making food beverages but not including bases or concentrates for making soft drinks or alcoholic beverages".

4. That the wording of the exemption for "flavouring extracts" under "Foodstuffs" in Schedule III be changed to read:

"Food flavouring extracts, emulsions and powders, not including those for beverages."

5. That the exemption for desks and chairs specially designed for class room use when sold to educational institutions be extended to apply to chalkboards, desks, tables and chairs, excluding upholstered chairs, without the requirement that they be specially designed for class room use.

6. That the exemption for fire brick, plastic refractories, high temperature cement, fire clay and other refractory materials be extended by removing the present condition requiring them to be "for use exclusively in the construction or repair of a furnace, kiln or other equipment of a manufacturing establishment".

7. That the exemption for materials consumed or expended directly in the process of manufacture or production of goods be clarified and brought into line with the exemption for fuel for lighting or heating, which excludes fuel for use in internal combustion engines.

7a. That diesel fuel oil when used in internal combustion engines used in logging operations and in the manufacture of rough lumber be made exempt.

8. (deleted).

9. That certain goods enumerated in Customs Tariff item 848 continue to be exempt from sales tax by listing in Schedule III of the Act the following Tariff items under which these goods are being regrouped by Customs Tariff Resolutions:

399a, 399b, 399c, 848, 848a, 848b.

10. That payments under section forty-seven of the Act to the institutions for children and aged, infirm or incapacitated persons to which that section applies, be increased

- (a) by enlarging the class of such institutions eligible to receive such payments by removing the present requirement that the shelter or care provided must be permanent or semi-permanent;
- (b) by including in the payments an amount equal to the taxes paid on purchases made within two years prior to certification by the Minister of National Health and Welfare, and made by or on behalf of the institution in the course of construction during that period.

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the following Bills, without amendment:

Bill No. C-28, An Act to implement a Convention between Canada and Belgium for the Avoidance of Double Taxation with respect to Income Taxes.

Bill No. C-29, An Act to implement a Convention between Canada and Belgium for the Purpose of Extending to the Belgian Congo and the Territory of Ruanda-Urundi under Trusteeship the Convention between Canada and Belgium for the Avoidance of Double Taxation with respect to Income Taxes.

Mr. Rowe, from the Sessional Committee on Railways, Air Lines and Shipping, owned and controlled by the Government, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

Pursuant to the Orders of Reference of the House of Commons of July 9th, 11th and 14th, 1958, your Committee had for consideration the following:

1. The Annual Reports of the Canadian National Railways; Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited; Canadian National Railways Securities Trust, for the year 1957 and the Auditors' Reports to Parliament in relation thereto, tabled on May 22nd, 1958 and the Canadian National Railways revised Capital and Operating Budget for 1958 tabled on July 14th, 1958; the Annual Report of Trans-Canada Air Lines for the year 1957 and the Operating and Capital Budget thereof for the year 1958, and the Auditors' Report to Parliament thereon.

2. Your Committee held eight Meetings in the course of which the officials of the Canadian National Railways and the Trans-Canada Air Lines as well as representatives of George A. Touche & Co., Auditors, were heard and examined.

3. The Annual Report of the Canadian National Railways for 1957 disclosed operating revenues of \$753,165,964.00 and operating expenses of \$734,556,041.00 resulting in a net revenue from Railway operations of \$18,609,923.00. However, after taxes, rents, other income and fixed charges were taken into account the net result was a deficit of \$29,572,541.00 for the year's operations. This compares with a surplus of \$26,076,951.00 in the year 1956, the change being attributed to a combination of lower traffic and higher wage and material costs. Your Committee noted however that in spite of the traffic decline in 1957 the Canadian National continued to improve and modernize its equipment, facilities, methods and techniques.

4. Your Committee observed that in 1957 three separate new rail lines were added to the Canadian National System, opening up additional areas of Canada for settlement and development. In Quebec, a 161-mile line from Beattyville to Chibougamau was officially opened in November and progress made on a 133-mile line from St. Felicien to Cache Lake, where it will link up with the Beattyville-Chibougamau branch. In New Brunswick, a 23-mile line was opened between Bartibog and the base metal development at Heath Steele. In Manitoba, Canadian National took over operation of a new 31-mile line from Sipiwesk on the Hudson Bay line to the International Nickel Company development at Thompson.

5. Your Committee also noted with satisfaction that progress was made during the year on the Company's long range plans for the construction of new automatic train marshalling yards at main strategic centres in the Atlantic, Central and Western Regions.

6. The Annual Report of the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited for 1957 disclosed a net deficit of \$648,849.80, compared with a surplus of \$23,280.72 for 1956. Operations of the company were curtailed during 1957 by a strike called by the Seafarers International Union effective July 4. As a result of the strike, which remained unsettled at the year end, the number of voyages made by company vessels was reduced to 33 from 54 in the previous year.

7. Your Committee was also informed that the decision had been reached to abandon the service, dispose of the assets by sale and wind up completely the above Company's affairs.

8. The Annual Report of Trans-Canada Air Lines for 1957 showed a net surplus of \$404,674, after provision for depreciation of \$6,819,160, and the payment of interest on capital invested in the enterprise in the amount of \$1,690,819. The year 1957 was the seventh consecutive one in which the company reported a profitable operation.

9. Of particular interest to your Committee was the fact that the programme of fleet conversion to turbine type aircraft, which by 1961 is expected to make TCA the first international airline in the world to have a fully turbine-powered fleet, was adhered to during 1957, fourteen additional Viscounts being placed in service, and six DC 3's retired. Your Committee also noted that, as planned, the company in 1957 had increased its capacity by 20 per cent in relation to a 15 per cent increase in traffic carried. This action, while reducing the over-all load factor from 73.1 per cent in 1956 to 70.7 per cent in 1957, substantially improved the company's ability to meet the peak period traffic demand. It was also noted that as of the year end, the company had on order nineteen Viscounts, six full jet DC 8 long range aircraft, and twenty medium range Vanguard turbine propeller aircraft, which, with associated spares, represent a capital commitment of \$118,000,000, exclusive of payments already made on these orders.

10. Your Committee adopted the Annual Reports of the Canadian National Railways and Trans-Canada Air Lines for 1957, as well as their respective Capital and Operating Budgets for 1958. Your Committee also approved the C.N.R. Securities Trust and the Auditor's Report to Parliament. It also approved the Annual Report for 1957 of the Canadian National (West Indies) Steamships, Limited, and the Auditor's Report thereon.

11. Your Committee, in accordance with an Order of Reference of the House, dated July 9th, considered Votes 431, 432, 442 and 443 as listed in the Main Estimates for 1958-59, and Item 635 as listed in the Supplementary Estimates 1958-59. In its Second Report to the House, your Committee recommended the approval of the said Estimates.

12. Your Committee feels indebted to all those who contributed to its inquiring by their attendance and their information, including the Minister of Transport and Mr. Donald Gordon, C.M.G., LL.D.; Mr. S. F. Dingle and Mr. R. D. Armstrong for the Canadian National Railways; and Mr G. R. McGregor, Mr. W. S. Harvey, Mr. H. W. Seagrim, Mr. S. W. Sadler for Trans-Canada Air Lines, and Mr. J. A. Wilson and Mr. J. W. Beech, Auditors.

13. Your Committee also wishes to express its appreciation to Mr. McGregor, his officials, and T.C.A. crew for a flight on board Trans-Canada Air Lines Viscount over the St. Lawrence Seaway Development project which took place on Wednesday, July 16th.

14. A copy of the Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence adduced in respect of the matters referred to is appended.

Mr. Fleming (Eglinton) raised a point of order to the effect that the amendment was out of order in that its terms were not relevant to the Bill or the principle thereof and also that it, in effect, proposed the addition of another provision to the Bill.

### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: As I see this amendment, it really is a declaration of a contrary principle to that which is under debate. The principle under debate is an amendment of the Excise Tax Act as the government has proposed. Now, the view which is brought forward is that the government has taken a wrong line and should have adopted another principle in amendment of the Excise Tax Act, that of reducing excise taxes instead of the tax with which it has dealt.

This is clearly not a matter which can be introduced as an amendment to the Bill in the course of its consideration in Committee. I think that has already been decided. At the resolution stage an attempt was made to propose an amendment in this category, and it was properly ruled out. Nor can it be introduced into the Bill when the Bill is in Committee of the Whole, because the resolution does not cover an amendment of that kind. Here, where the principle on which the government has proceeded is under consideration, it seems to me this is a proper declaration of a contrary principle. I realize that there are some difficulties in accepting this point of view. Members may raise innumerable minor amendments to the Excise Tax Act as matters of principle, and of course that could not be acceptable to the House as it would delay proceedings endlessly. But in the view I take of it—I may not be correct in this but as advised I feel I am—I think I should put the amendment to the House.

2. Your Committee held 4 meetings on the Order of Reference of the House concerning the estimates of the Department of Mines and Technical Surveys, and 4 meetings concerning the estimates of the Dominion Coal Board.

3. Your Committee heard a full statement by the Minister of Mines and Technical Surveys on the duties and responsibilities of his department and of himself as its Minister.

4. The study of the estimates of the department indicated to the Committee that the work of the department consists of technical and research investigations connected with resources basic to the future development of the country's economy. To a varying degree, this department contributes information essential to the planning and development in all phases of the national economy.

5. The Surveys and Mapping Branch provides the topographical information and base maps essential to all phases of our expanding economy. Rapid development during the last decade has severely overtaxed the mapping facilities of the department. In this connection new accommodation, now in the construction stage, and increased staff, should help to relieve the pressure. This branch is faced also with steadily increasing demands for navigational charts and other information on the continental shelves and the adjacent portions of the oceans. This problem is being met, in part at least, by an expanding effort. This trend must be continued so that Canada can meet her rapidly expanding navigational requirements off our coasts and in the Arctic.

6. It was apparent to your Committee that the Geological Survey of Canada is doing an efficient job; it has 77 parties in the field. Evidence submitted indicates that, at the present rate of activity, decades would pass before satisfactory geological maps of the pioneering areas of Canada would be completed. It would be unfortunate if this effort cannot be accelerated so that much-needed geological information can be provided at an earlier date. The Committee was pleased to note that the Geological Survey of Canada will soon occupy new accommodation which will allow a more intensive research effort. The Committee was also gratified that the Geological Survey expects to undertake more research on ground water resources. The scarcity of information on sources of ground water supply is already of grave concern in many parts of Canada.

7. The Mines Branch continues to play an important role in the development of our great wealth of minerals. The branch can be credited with much of the success achieved by Canada's uranium industry. It gives valuable assistance and advice to all parts of the mineral industry. Greater competition in world markets for the products of the mines has intensified the need for greater efficiency at lower costs to the industry. The requests for help to provide cheaper methods of production continue to increase the demands on the facilities of the branch. Here too, better equipment, increased staff, and new accommodation which will be ready in the near future, should help to meet the needs.

8. The Committee was interested to learn of the Minister's intention to expand the Geographical Branch into a program of study on land use. It appeared to the Committee that such information is required to plan the A.D. 1958

proper utilization of land with regard to such resources as agriculture and forestry. Canada does not have unlimited resources of good land and the proper use of this land is essential to the future development of the country.

9. The Committee was interested in the range of valuable research conducted by the Dominion Observatories. The Committee was also interested in learning that many of the research techniques developed to provide greater knowledge of the earth and the stars can be applied in a practical way to mineral exploration and navigation. The work of this branch is of increasing interest and value as man probes outer space.

10. The Committee noted the important contribution of the Mineral Resources Division which acts as the mineral economics unit of the department. The Committee is aware that the scientific and technical work of the department, in assistance to mineral resources development, must be supplemented by a complete knowledge of all factors, national or international, which have a bearing on the mineral industry. The Committee, therefore, values the important service which can and must be rendered to the government and the mineral industry by a competent mineral economics unit such as the Mineral Resources Division.

11. Your Committee recommends that the government give consideration to the necessity for increasing the department's research program and facilities in order to keep pace with the accelerated tempo of northern development.

12. Your Committee records its appreciation of the high calibre of the technical officials of the department. It noted, however, that the department has found it difficult over the years to recruit and hold good staff. As scientists and engineers become expert in their particular fields, industry attracts large numbers away with higher salaries. The situation has been better during the past year, but the condition will reappear with the return of a buoyant economy. The Committee holds the view that every means should be taken to attract and hold scientists and engineers of ability. This can best be done by providing good working conditions and adequate salaries.

13. Your Committee feels that the department is doing a good job with the staff and facilities at its disposal. In the overall picture, however, the efforts of the department fall short of meeting the requirements of the economy. The Committee is of the opinion that an expanded effort is required so that these requirements can be met and that normal national development will not be delayed. It recommends consideration of action to this end by the government.

14. Your Committee heard a statement by the Chairman of the Dominion Coal Board which dealt in considerable detail with the history of governmental policy over the years in relation to the assistance of coal movements by the payment of subventions—still the principal function of the board.

15. During its consideration of the estimates concerning the Dominion Coal Board, your Committee examined the undermentioned witnesses from the Crowsnest Pass Region, the Canmore region and the Drumheller region, of Alberta, and a representative of the industry of both the Alberta and British Columbia sides of the Crowsnest Pass, in regard to the problems of the coal industry in western Canada. These witnesses were as follows: Mr. Edward Boyd of Calgary, Alberta, President, District No. 18, United Mineworkers of America; Mr. William Ure of Calgary, Alberta, Secretary Treasurer, District No. 18, United Mineworkers of America; Mr. Henry Sherwood of Canmore, Alberta, Secretary, No. 7297, United Mineworkers of America; Mr. Thomas Mackie of Drumheller, Alberta, Secretary, Midlandvale No. 172, United Mineworkers of America; and Mr. Frank Aboussafy of Coleman, Alberta, President, Crowsnest Pass Industrial Planning Board.

16. Your Committee was concerned by the apparent necessity of importing foreign coal to fill Canadian orders due to export orders for Canadian coal exceeding expectations. Your Committee emphasizes the necessity for increased production of Canadian coal when export sales and Canadian requirements exceed the production of coal in Canada.

17. Your Committee expresses the hope that ways may be found through research and other avenues whereby more Canadian coal may be used. Your Committee was impressed with the necessity for Canadian operators to ensure that their deliveries of coal conform to the quality requirements of the purchasers.

18. Your Committee recommends that the government give consideration to the advisability of sending a mission to the oriental market for Canadian coal, there to study the economic possibilities of increasing sales of Canadian coal to that market.

19. Members of your Committee took full advantage of the invitations of the Minister and witnesses to question them without restriction.

20. Your Committee records its appreciation of the great assistance given to it by the Minister of Mines and Technical Surveys and the officials of his department and by the Chairman and the officials of the Dominion Coal Board.

21. A copy of the Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence in respect of the said estimates is appended.

Bill No. S-14, An Act respecting Stanmount Pipe Line Company.—Mr. Morton.

The said Bill was deemed to have been read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House pursuant to Standing Order 103(2).

Mr. Smith, from the Standing Committee on Estimates, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

For the first time, provision for the constitution of the Estimates Committee as a Standing Committee was made on May 30, 1958, when the House of Commons added it to the list of Standing Committees in Standing Order 65.

On Tuesday, June 3, 1958, the House by Orders of Reference, appointed the original membership of the Committee, and extended to it the powers ordinarily granted to Standing Committees in a Resolution which reads as follows:

"Ordered,—That the Standing Committee on Estimates be empowered to examine and inquire into all such matters and things as may be referred to it by the House; and to report from time to time its observations and opinions thereon, with power to send for persons, papers and records."

On the same date, the first referral to the Committee was made by the House, being the Main and Supplementary Estimates, 1958-59, relating to the Department of National Defence.

On Wednesday, July 2, 1958, the Main and Supplementary Estimates relating to the Department of Defence Production were also referred, on the recommendation of this Committee.

Your Committee has considered and approved these Estimates, (being items numbered 78 to 84, inclusive, 220 to 225, inclusive, 504, 505, 541 and 578) and commends them to the House with certain observations and recommendations.

During its consideration of the above mentioned Estimates, this Committee heard evidence from the Minister and Deputy Minister of National Defence, the Minister and Deputy Minister of Defence Production, together with many Departmental officials, and representatives of the following Crown Corporations: Canadian Commercial Corporation; Canadian Arsenals, Limited; Defence Construction (1951) Limited; Polymer Corporation, Limited; and Crown Assets Disposal Corporation. The Committee held 25 sittings, heard: 23 witnesses, called for and received 31 papers and documents in connection with the operations and expenditures of the two Departments. In addition, the answers to numerous questions were tabled in the Committee.

The Minister of National Health and Welfare, The Honourable J. Waldo Monteith, Air Commodore C. F. Johns, Assistant Deputy Minister, Construction and Property, Department of National Defence, and Lieutenant Colonel E. F. Churchill, Deputy Director, Army Works, were called before the Committee. The Committee also was requested to call certain former Senior Military Officers, other than Departmental Officials. On a recorded vote the Committee decided against calling the afore-mentioned former Officers.

In addition to the Committee's regular sittings, the Steering Subcommittee was called into session on six occasions to deal with matters referred to it by the Main Committee.

# I. DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL DEFENCE

With respect to the Estimates of the Department of National Defence, your Committee makes the following observations and recommendations:

# 1. Policy Related to CF-105 Program

The Committee recognizes its responsibility to examine and report on policy only where it is related to or influenced by an expenditure in the Department Estimates.

The line of demarcation which separates matters purely of policy as compared with those Votes where an economy may be effected, is sometimes difficult to define.

The complications of this problem are all the more involved where the Vote in question provides the Government with a springboard on which to embark on future expenditures as a result of the commitment already contained in these Estimates.

Perhaps the best example of this is the Vote authorizing the Government to continue for one year the further development of the CF-105. This item, representing approximately \$175,000,000.00, came under the close scrutiny of the Committee which, in addition to examining several witnesses, also visited the two plants involved in the manufacture of this model.

While the Committee concurs in the necessity of this expenditure, having regard to the terms of reference, it does not feel authorized to comment at this time on future action with respect to further development of this portion of the defence program. Having made that point, however, and in view of the heavy financial burden, the Committee does express its concern in the Government entering into any subsequent weapon program of this magnitude without first negotiating for some cost-sharing agreement with either NATO member countries or the U.S.A. under the NORAD Agreement.

# 2. Integration of Services

- (a) With a view to effecting economies within the Defence Department, your Committee recommends that a greater measure of integration of the ancillary branches of the three Services should be effected. This Committee is not satisfied that it is necessary to maintain separate provost corps, padre services, and medical corps. It is to be noted in this respect that the dental corps perform dentistry for all three Services.
- (b) Your Committee further recommends that the Department examine areas where overstaffing may occur resulting from duplication at the administrative level, and suggests that here also a measure of integration may be applied.
- (c) Recognizing the substantial cost of recruiting, your Committee suggested that the Department review its policy in maintaining separate recruiting establishments for the three Services. In addition to duplication of both manpower and accommodation, the Committee is concerned that the recruiting services, in competing with one another, are not obtaining maximum efficiency in relation to the cost of their operation. The need for Tri-Service recruiting units

is stressed with a view to reducing the requirements for accommodation, advertising, and promotion, and to effect some reduction in recruiting costs.

#### 3. Civil Defence

The Committee examined in some detail the statement of the Minister relating to the new and expanded role of the militia. It also called on the Minister of National Health and Welfare to describe civil defence under his authority and its relation to the militia. In view of the Minister's announcement that Lieutenant General H. D. Graham would shortly undertake a review of Canada's civil defence program, the Committee feels it would be presumptuous for it to prejudge or anticipate the conclusions of this review, but does recommend however, that the following points be studied in the course of the examination of the program:

- (i) The question of retaining the supervision and responsibility of Civil Defence under its present authority or returning it to the Department of National Defence;
- (ii) the desirability of intensifying training in civil defence and employing a greater measure of co-ordination between the various units whether civil or military;
- (iii) the need for providing a substantial increase in equipment to include transportation units and a communication system so as to carry out the civil defence role on short notice.

The Committee wishes to impress on the Government the urgency in having the review of the civil defence program proceed without delay so that appropriate action may be taken on the recommendations.

## 4. Training Command (Aircraft Purchase)

The Committee was informed that Training Command employs two types of piston engine aircraft—Chipmunk and Harvard, for elementary and intermediate training prior to service flying in T-33 jet aircraft. Your Committee recommends that consideration be given to replacing the outdated elementary and intermediate aircraft with a primary jet trainer. Such a program, it suggests, would make the step up to service flying more gradual with an appreciable saving through the elimination of high replacement and maintenance cost of present equipment. It is to be noted that this recommendation follows the pattern adopted by Air Forces in other countries.

#### 5. Service Colleges and University Training

- (a) The Committee commends the decision to award degrees at Royal Military College and wishes to encourage every possible measure to maintain this College's standards and general efficiency. It is recommended that the Department of National Defence include in its annual report a statement showing:
  - (i) The cost of all service colleges, with a breakdown of the various aspects, including the cost per student;
  - (ii) what remedial action may be necessary to attract more candidates from those provinces now producing less than their per capita proportion of students;

- (iii) what alterations in the Regular Officers Training Plan may be required to ensure that students come from all economic and social levels;
- (iv) what further steps may be necessary to maintain and/or to improve faculty standards, and to ease the problem in the recruitment of faculty.
- (b) Scientific research and studies in Canadian Universities are becoming more important yearly and are generally co-ordinated with the work of Defence Research and Development. Continuing co-operation between the universities and the Department is strongly urged so that greater advantages will accrue to the parties involved and to the Canadian people.

# 6. Civilian Personnel

Recognizing that consideration is presently being given to a general revision of the Civil Service Act, it is suggested that there should be more co-operation between the Department and the Civil Service Commission in the classification of personnel within the continuing establishment. Noting that it takes one civilian to maintain every two men in uniform, your Committee urges that there be a constant review of the numbers of personnel on each establishment to prevent any retention of unnecessary staff. It is further observed that there is an apparent tendency to re-classify an increasing number of prevailing rates employees in the Department of National Defence. It is the opinion of the Committee that under the present rigidity of the Civil Service Regulations, classification does not permit sufficient flexibility in adjusting the number of civilian employees to the requirements of the Department. This procedure, it is hoped, will come under the review of the Examining Board.

# 7. Interservice Equivalents Board

- (a) With reference to the equivalence procedure followed by the Department, the Committee suggests that consideration be given to its simplification so as to favour competition.
- (b) The Committee recognizes that in order to adequately cover the characteristics and quality features of a component on plans or specifications, it is often necessary to specify the component by name product. However, this practice results practically in the elimination of competition in view of the relatively short period of time available for tendering and the impossibility of then obtaining an equivalence certificate. Consequently, the Committee recommends that consideration be given to establishing standard procedure whereby at *least two* name products will be mentioned whenever it is felt advisable to use name products in plans and specifications.

## 8. General

(a) Your Committee feels that Item No. 220, of the Main Estimates, an amount of over \$1,600,000,000.00 should be divided into a number of smaller items. The Standing Committee on Estimates or the Committee of Supply then could more easily consider the expenditures and be in a position to better recommend what savings could be effected in a particular area; and Parliament would have more control of expenditures as the opportunity to transfer funds within smaller Votes would be lessened.

- (b) This Committee recognizes the need for more detailed information in order to enable Members to better consider the expenditures proposed in the Estimates for a particular year. With this in mind, your Committee recommends that at the end of each fiscal year the departments be required to present to Parliament a statement, on a quarterly basis, of actual expenditures and encumbered funds, together with the unexpended amounts, under each of the Votes relating to that Department. Members then could compare the expenditures of the previous year with those proposed in the Estimates. Where an Item includes a number of large expenditures, it is desirable that these large amounts be further explained in detail.
  - (c) Realizing the desirability of having an Annual Report from the Department, your Committee recommends that in future every effort be made to publish such a report.
  - (d) This Committee suggests that the Department should more carefully assess the quantity and specifications of items requisitioned, in order to avoid over-stocking.

### 9. Summary

It will be noted that the Committee has not made a specific recommendation to reduce any Vote but has rather offered a number of general recommendations. Notwithstanding this, the Committee is of the opinion that if the suggestions contained herein are followed, actual savings and improvement in the efficiency and the operation of the Department will be effected.

The Committee is satisfied that the Department and the Treasury Board have made a thorough examination of these Estimates in an attempt to economize where possible. In this respect, it is perhaps important to point out that a number of reductions in certain categories of technical equipment are shown in the Estimates for the current year. While it is not the responsibility of this Committee to comment on future Estimates, it is perhaps significant to note from statements contained in the evidence that substantial new expenditures may be anticipated in the coming year. Examples of this are to be found in the decision to replace certain military equipment, improvements in the radar detection system, and for the possible extension of the CF-105 program.

# **II. DEPARTMENT OF DEFENCE PRODUCTION**

With respect to the Estimates of the Department of Defence Production, your Committee makes the following observations and recommendations:

# 1. Destroyer Escort Program

(a) The Committee was disturbed at some of the features surrounding the destroyer escort program in relation to the methods of establishing cost and the accounting procedure adopted by the Department. Particular concern was expressed over the delay in obtaining final costs of ships of the destroyer escort class. It was apparent from the evidence that final invoices have not yet been received—in some cases three years after a ship's completion; consequently, total expenditure for each unit was not available. It is therefore recommended that a complete study should be made of the naval vessel procurement policy to determine if a more accurate assessment can be obtained of unit costs. The review should include a study of the advantages of the target-plus-incentive system as compared with the cost-plus and/or other type of contractual agreements. This study should be performed by such a Committee as the House may deem advisable.

(b) It is further recommended that the shipbuilding industry be given an opportunity to discuss and make recommendations with regard to methods and means of reducing costs of any further naval construction.

### 2. Performance Bonds

It is recommended that the Minister of Defence Production consider the advisability of accepting performance bonds and/or pay-andperformance bonds to secure Department contracts, keeping in mind the lack of protection involving sub-contractors in jobs associated with Crown properties, as well as the need to widen participation in such contracts by smaller companies.

## 3. General

- (a) The Committee is of the opinion that the liaison could be improved between the Departments of National Defence and Defence Production, and that the Government should consider redefining the responsibilities and duties of procurement and inspection officers of the two Departments.
- (b) The Committee suggests that the Department of Defence Production keep before it the following general recommendations:
  - (i) That the Department encourage, assist, and co-ordinate the growth of technical skills and knowledge in Canadian industry as a program of industrial preparedness;
  - (ii) that the Department distribute purchases as broadly as possible in Canada;
  - (iii) that the Department use the maximum of Canadian equipment and parts where possible;
- (iv) that technical assistance presently offered to larger corporations should also be made available to smaller Canadian companies;
  - (v) that Canadian plants should be provided every opportunity to tender on defence contracts;
  - (vi) that development contracts should be available for tooling and product development.

# 4. Crown Corporations

# Crown Assets Disposal Corporation

Your Committee regrets that in their opinion Crown Assets Disposal Corporation does not have any clearly defined method or policy respecting the sale of land or properties to municipalities. The operations of the Corporation seem to be poorly organized with too much authority being vested in the President. As a result of the accounting methods in that Organization, your Committee experienced difficulty in securing certain desired information.

#### 5. General

While there was no evidence to suggest any marked degree of inefficiency in the Department or Crown Corporations under review, the Committee, nevertheless, observed what it considers to be certain weaknesses in accounting and procedural methods. It is the opinion of the Committee, therefore, that the Government should consider the advisability of employing an independent business consultant to examine one or more of the Crown Companies. On completion of this review, the Government should then decide whether a further examination of the remaining Crown Companies is required.

# III. SUMMARY

It will be observed from this Report that the Committee has not attempted to summarize the area or detail covered by the examination of the two Departments, but rather has limited the report to a number of observations and recommendations. The Committee, however, would commend to the House the evidence attached hereto, believing that an intelligent appraisal of this Report can only be made in conjunction with a study of the evidence.

In addition to the recommendations, which it believes will effect economies and efficiency of a material nature, the Committee is of the opinion that its consideration of these Estimates has also produced certain intangible values which may at first glance not be easily recognized. As an example of this, there is evidence to support the belief that in its examination of the witnesses from the Departments, the Officials, in preparing their submissions, have stimulated interest within the Departments.

A second value of the Committee's work was the very broad press coverage given to the Committee's proceedings which, in its opinion, brought clearly into focus many aspects not generally appreciated in Canada's National Defence program. The Committee would like to express its appreciation to the members of the press for their very accurate report and interpretation of the evidence presented.

The Committee is indebted to the Ministers of National Defence, Defence Production, National Health and Welfare, their respective officials, and the representatives of the Crown Corporations, for the co-operative manner in which they gave their evidence and provided a considerable number of documents.

A copy of the Committee's Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence respecting the abovementioned Estimates, together with a copy of those papers and documents received but not printed, is appended.

# A.D. 1958

Mr. McCleave, from the Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented the Ninth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:

Mr. Kucherepa, from the Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which was read as follows:

Pursuant to an Order of the House of August 2nd, 1958, your Committee has considered the petition of Jacques Gerardin for a bill of divorce and the Clerk of Petitions' report thereon of August 1st, 1958.

While the time limit for filing petitions for private bills, under the provisions of Standing Order 93 expired on June 23rd, this petition was filed on July 31st.

Your Committee was informed that a similar petition was filed in November, 1957, but that the application was not proceeded with last session. In his representations to the Committee, Counsel for the Petitioner stated that the Montreal Solicitor was unaware that a new petition should be filed for the present session and that this requirement was brought to his attention only after his return from a prolonged absence from his office.

Your Committee is satisfied that no blame should be attached to the petitioner for the late filing of his petition, and is of the opinion that he should not be penalized for the delay.

Your Committee therefore recommends:

That Standing Orders 93 and 94 (3)(a) and (c) be suspended in relation to this petition, and that the said petition be received.

By unanimous consent, on motion of Mr. Kucherepa, seconded by Mr. Knowles, the said report was concurred in.

# RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: It may be appropriate at this time to deal with the point of order which was raised yesterday by the honourable Member for Burnaby-Coquitlam (Mr. Regier) which, as honourable Members will recall, was raised when the honourable Member for Peterborough (Mr. Fraser) presented to the House the seventh report of the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

The point of order was to the effect that this report was not in accordance with the findings of the committee and it was suggested by the honourable Member for Burnaby-Coquitlam that the Speaker should either declare the report out of order or recommit the matter to the committee. Since the point was raised yesterday I have considered the matter at some length and have had the benefit of the assistance of the Clerk of the House.

The report of the committee was as follows:

"Your committee has considered the following bill and has agreed to report it without amendment:

Bill No. S-6, an act respecting Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company."

This report was duly signed by the chairman as having been approved by the committee; moreover, it appears to meet every requirement of our practice in regard to content. It is suggested that on the face of it the report must be accepted as being in order. The point of order is in effect an appeal to the House from a ruling of the chairman on a proceeding in a standing committee. The regularity of that procedure is open to question; the only precedent in this regard arose in 1956 when the chairman of the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce reported that his ruling had been appealed in the committee and he submitted the question to the judgment of the House. As recorded at page 6388 of *Hansard* for July 24, 1956, the then Speaker in part dealt with the question as follows:

"I have to rule now that the appeal from the chairman's ruling should be settled in the Committee on Banking and Commerce and not reported to this House."

Many Members who are here today will remember that incident. The Minister of Justice (Mr. Fulton) took part in the discussion and supported the view which the Speaker announced, as did a former Member, Mr. Stanley Knowles, and as did Mr. Walter Harris and others. I think in fact all parties who spoke to the point of order were in agreement that the chairman's ruling in committee should not be brought to the House by way of appeal but should be settled in committee.

On the other hand, if the honourable Member for Burnaby-Coquitlam wishes to appeal to the Speaker rather than to the House, it must be stated that there is no known precedent wherein the Speaker of the House has acted either as arbitrator or as a judge in connection with the regularity of any proceedings in any committee of the House.

Without passing judgment on any proceedings in the committee on this bill, I suggest that it would be dangerous to follow this point of order as a precedent and thus allow Members to call into review any or all proceedings in standing and special committees. Such a course would inevitably involve numerous and interminable discussions which could seriously impair and impede the business of this House.

I find, therefore, that it would not be practicable for the Speaker, nor would it be competent for him, to review a ruling upon the regularity of a proceeding in a standing committee. This decision of course does not interfere with or deprive the House of its jurisdiction over its standing committees and their reports.

On motion of Mr. McBain, seconded by Mr. Hodgson, it was ordered,— That the name of Mr. Carter be substituted for that of Mr. Houck on the Standing Committee on Public Accounts.

Mr. Howard, seconded by Mr. Regier, moved,—That Bill No. S-6, An Act respecting Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company, be recommitted to the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

After debate, the question being put on the said motion, it was agreed to.

Accordingly, the said Bill was recommitted to the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines. The House resolved itself again into Committee of Supply.

The House resolved itself again into Committee of Ways and Means.

By unanimous consent, Mr. Fleming (Eglinton), seconded by Mr. Browne (St. John's West), moved,—That the said Bill be now read a second time.

#### And the question being proposed;

Mr. McIlraith, seconded by Mr. Bourget, moved in amendment thereto,— That this Bill be not read a second time until the Government has disclosed to the House the precise nature of the accusations and the evidence and has undertaken to make provision for an impartial hearing in cases of public servants accused by it of criminal offences for which they have not been tried or convicted in a court of justice.

# RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: This bill, as honourable Members are aware, is for the granting to Her Majesty of certain sums of money for the public service for the financial year ending March 31, 1959. We are on second reading of that bill, and it is a debate on the principle of the bill. The circumstances surrounding the proposed amendment are quite different from those which surrounded the amendment to which the honourable Member for Laurier (Mr. Chevrier) has referred. On that occasion there was a motion for second reading of a bill to amend the Excise Tax Act, and the principle which it was sought to declare by the amendment related to the subject matter of the bill. But today, I am asked to accept an amendment which, it is true, declares a principle but it is quite unrelated to the bill.

The bill is one for granting money. The principle declared in the amendment has to do with the treatment of public servants. Unless, as the honourable Member for Ottawa West (Mr. McIlraith) said, grievances which may be presented and should be dealt with before the House grants supply, can be urged at any stage of the proceedings for supply, I would think that this amendment is out of order. I am testing the amendment on the basis of the normal principles that apply to an amendment on second reading, notwithstanding that it is a money bill. If there is any different consideration that applies in the case of a money bill, and which would change my view, I should like to have the authorities now before I come to a final conclusion.

I thank honourable Members for assisting me in connection with this rather interesting proposition which the honourable Member for Ottawa West has raised. It is quite true it is an historic privilege of the House to present its grievances and complaints against the conduct of the government, and ask for redress, before granting funds. But there is ample opportunity for doing so. In fact, we have a rule which provides for six motions to go into Committee of Supply which are precisely devoted to the airing of grievances. I have not been given any authority which would warrant my accepting the proposition that the rule of relevancy is different for second reading of a money bill than it is on any other bill. I consider this amendment to be irrelevant and consequently rule it out of order. A.D. 1958

And the question being put on the main motion: That Bill No. C-46, An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending March 31, 1959, be now read a second time; it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and reported without amendment.

  - (g) "plate", when applied to iron or steel, means a flat-rolled product of any shape
    - (i) having a width of more than eight inches but not more than forty-eight inches, and a thickness of 0.23 inch or more, or
- -bergine (ii) having a width of more than forty-eight inches, and a thickness
- no hundbiclost of 0.18 inch or more;
- (h) "proof", "proof spirit" or "proof spirits" means any spirit having the strength of proof by Sikes' hydrometer, namely, spirit that at the temperature of fifty-one degrees Fahrenheit weighs exactly twelvethirteenths of the weight of an equal measure of distilled water at the same temperature;
  - (i) "rubber" includes synthetic rubber, which may be defined by regulations prescribed by the Minister;
  - (j) "sheet", when applied to iron or steel, means a flat-rolled product of any shape
    - (i) having a width of more than twelve inches but not more than forty-eight inches, and a thickness of 0.2299 inch or less, or
    - (ii) having a width of more than forty-eight inches, and a thickness of 0.1799 inch or less;
- (k) "strip", when applied to iron or steel, means a flat-rolled product of any shape
  - (i) having a width of more than eight inches but not more than twelve inches, and a thickness of 0.2299 inch or less, or
  - (ii) having a width of eight inches or less and a thickness of 0.2030 inch or less;
- (1) "steel" means any metal or combination of metals containing fifty per cent or more, by weight, of iron; and
  - (m) a reference to a unit or standard measure of weight, capacity or extension means the Canadian unit or standard measure established by the Weights and Measures Act.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Kucherepa, from the Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which was read as follows:

Pursuant to its Orders of Reference of August 8th and August 12th, 1958, your Committee has had for consideration two petitions for private bills filed after the stipulated time under Standing Order 93, together with the reports thereon of the Clerk of Petitions, viz.;

2. The petition of the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto.

It was represented to your Committee by Counsel for the petitioners that as a matter of courtesy towards the Council of Metropolitan Toronto it was deemed necessary to discuss the proposed application first with their Executive Committee and finally with the whole Council for its approval.

Your Committee is satisfied that these were sufficient reasons for the delay in filing the petition and recommends that the said petition be received and Standing Orders 93 and 94(3)(a) and (c) be suspended in relation thereto.

By unanimous consent, on motion of Mr. Kucherepa, seconded by Mr. Thrasher, the said report was concurred in.

Your Committee has held nine meetings during which it heard statements and evidence from The Honourable Sidney E. Smith, Secretary of State for External Affairs; Mr. Jules Leger, Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs; Mr. W. D. Matthews, Assistant Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs; Mr. J. H. Cleveland, Director, American Division; and Mr. R. Grey, Economic Division; assisted by the following; Messrs. H. B. Robinson, Special Assistant to the Secretary of State for External Affairs; H. B. M. Best, Executive Assistant; W. T. Delworth, Private Secretary; H. F. Clark, Director, Finance Division; H. F. Davis, Director, European Division, H. J. Armstrong, Financial Adviser to the Department; Ross Campbell, Director, Middle Eastern Division; M. Grant, Director, Supplies and Properties Division; M. Shenstone, Middle Eastern Division; F. G. Hooton, Defence Liaison Division (1); A. G. Campbell, United Nations Division; and d'I. Fortier, Economic Division; of the Department of External Affairs. From the Department of Trade and Commerce: Mr. R. W. Rosenthal, Acting Administrator of the International Economics and Technical Co-operation Division, assisted by Messrs. F. E. Pratt, Chief, Capital Projects Section; and D. Bartlett, Chief, Technical Co-operation Service. From the Canadian Section of the International Joint Commission: General A. G. L. McNaughton, Chairman, assisted by Messrs. D. G. Chance, Assistant Secretary; J. L. MacCallum, Legal Adviser; and E. R. Peterson, Engineering Adviser.

Your Committee has considered the above listed estimates, approves them, and recommends them to the House for approval.

The announcement by the Prime Minister of the preliminary step toward the establishment of a Parliamentary Committee to meet with a United States Congressional Committee, to examine problems common to both countries and to exchange views and interpret developments to their respective governments was welcomed by your Committee. Such a joint committee, it is felt, could be invaluable in the promotion of a greater degree of understanding between the two legislative bodies.

With regard to the recent report of the United Nations Scientific Committee on the effects of Atomic Radiation, your Committee expresses a hope that the Government will keep under constant review its policy on the suspension of nuclear tests, taking into account the results of the current meetings of scientists at Geneva on the methods of detecting nuclear explosions.

Your Committee endorses Canada's position with regard to preventing the spread of the development and manufacture of nuclear weapons.

The continuation of studies on the possible establishment of a permanent United Nations force to ensure peace and deter aggression, is considered of great importance.

It was learned that the Department of External Affairs has arranged through the National Gallery of Canada, for an exhibition of the work of certain Canadian artists with a view to purchasing a considerable number of oil paintings to replace those being recalled by the National Gallery from Canadian Embassies and Chancelleries abroad. It is strongly urged that the paintings purchased be truly representative of Canada.

In order to assist your Committee in its work, it recommends that, at future sessions of Parliament it should commence its sittings within one month of the meeting of the House. Consideration should also be given to the broadening of the role of the Committee.

Your Committee wishes to record its appreciation to all those who contributed to the successful completion of its work.

- 1. Page 5, line 31. Strike out "and".
- 2. Page 5, line 34. Strike out the period and substitute therefor:--"; and".
- 3. Page 5. Immediately after paragraph (d) of subclause (2) of clause 3, add the following as paragraph (e):—
  - "(e) notwithstanding anything in this section, the expression in paragraph (a) of subsection (1) 'property of which the deceased was, immediately prior to his death, competent to dispose' does not include the share of the spouse of the deceased in any community of property that existed between the deceased and such spouse immediately prior to his death."
- 4. Page 26, line 21. Strike out line 21 and substitute therefor:—"made for or on account of income tax, except where a superannuation or pension benefit is taxable under the *Income Tax Act.*"
- 5. Page 28, lines 1 and 2. Strike out lines 1 and 2 and substitute therefor:— "The value of the debt shall, unless it is established that at the time of the creation of the debt the deceased and such debtor were persons dealing with each other at arm's length, be determined for the purposes of this Part as though the amount thereof outstanding".
- 6. Page 35, lines 6 to 13. Strike out lines 6 to 13, both inclusive, and substitute therefor:—"43. (1) Any amount payable as tax, interest or penalties under this Act by a person as the successor to any property passing on the death of a deceased shall, where the property to which that person is the successor includes any estate or interest in land situated in Canada, be and continue to be for as long as that amount or any part thereof remains unpaid a lien upon such estate or interest; and".

## RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: While this amendment might be appropriate on a bill, I am not clear that it is in order on a resolution. I should like to refer the honourable Member who has moved the amendment to the obstacles which I see to it in case he has some citation or authority which would change the view which appears to me to be appropriate at this time. Citation 203 of Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, Fourth Edition, deals with amendments. Paragraph (1) reads:

It is an imperative rule that every amendment must be relevant to the question on which the amendment is proposed. Every amendment proposed to be made either to a question or to a proposed amendment should be so framed that if agreed to by the House the question or amendment as amended would be intelligible and consistent with itself.

The law on the relevancy of amendments is that if they are on the same subject-matter with the original motion, they are admissible, but not when foreign thereto.

This amendment does not propose to deal with the motion before the House at all; it proposes to declare that some other course of action should be taken, which I think is really declaratory of a principle, and that is dealt with by Beauchesne in his Third Edition, in citation 346 at page 137, where he says:

Moreover, the amendment could not be a declaration of principles because the only motions on which such a declaration can be moved are motions for the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, motions to go into Committee of Supply or Ways and Means and for the Second Reading of Public Bills.

On that basis it seems to me that the relevancy of the amendment must be that it relates to the subject-matter of the resolution. This proposed amendment does not seek to modify the resolution; it seeks to dispose of it altogether on the basis that the government should have taken some other course. Before I rule the proposed amendment out of order I would like to hear honourable gentlemen on it.

## And a debate arising on the point of order;

MR. SPEAKER: I thank the honourable Members for their help in this matter. In effect, the amendment asks that the resolution be not now dealt with but that some intermediate step be taken, and specifies what steps should be taken. To my mind it is not an amendment which proposes the opposite conclusion, as referred to in subsection (13) of Citation 202 of Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, Fourth Edition, to which the honourable Member for Bonavista-Twillingate referred. It is either an expanded negative in the sense that it changes the resolution entirely, or it is a declaration of principle, and on either of those grounds I do not think I can accept the amendment as being in accordance with the rules.

After further debate thereon, the question being put on the main motion: That it is expedient that the Houses of Parliament approve the Agreement between the Government of Canada and the Government of Saskatchewan respecting the South Saskatchewan River Project, signed on the 25th day of July, 1958, and that this House do approve the same; it was agreed to on the following division:

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Mr. Fulton raised a point of order to the effect that an amendment proposing a direct negative, though it may be covered up by verbiage, was not in order.

#### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: It is perhaps not always easy to draw the line between an amendment which is simply a negating of the principle of the bill and an amendment which is declaratory of a principle. It is clear that on second reading an amendment can be moved which declares a contrary principle as has been . . .

And a debate arising on the point of order;

MR. SPEAKER: I thank honourable Members for their views with regard to this proposed amendment. It is true that the effect of asserting a principle is to deny the bill and, therefore, perhaps, this is a negative resolution as has been argued by the Minister of Justice (Mr. Fulton). I think that is the necessary consequence of moving an amendment which asserts a principle. I might refer the House to The Parliamentary Dictionary which has a paragraph on an amendment which gives reasons, as this one does. The amendment proposes that the bill be not read a second time now, and it goes on to give reasons. This is what is said on that subject by The Parliamentary Dictionary on page 162. This is in the edition of 1956 by Abraham and Hawtrey:

REASONED AMENDMENT: A reasoned amendment may be moved on second and third reading of a bill and on certain other occasions, as stated below. This form of amendment seeks, by substituting other words for those of the question "That the bill be now read a second (third) time", either to give reasons why the House declines to give a second or third reading to the bill, or to express an opinion with regard to its subject matter or to the policy which the bill is intended to fulfil.

Furthermore, we have a clear precedent already referred to of an amendment which is about as close as one could expect to find to the amendment which is proposed today, and that is the one which will be found in the *Journals* of the House for September 16, 1930, at page 23, which was accepted without objection. In my opinion this amendment satisfies the requirements of the rules.

After debate thereon, the question being put on the said proposed amendment, it was negatived on the following division:

#### (Private Bills)

The Bill No. S-16, An Act respecting Westcoast Transmission Company Limited, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. SD-231, An Act for the relief of Kenneth Herbert Gregory, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, on division, and passed.

Pursuant to an Order made August 26, 1958, a Message was sent to the Senate to return to that House the evidence taken and the papers produced in respect of the foregoing Divorce Bill before the Senate Standing Committee on Divorce.

The House resumed debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Rynard, seconded by Mr. Doucett,—That Bill No. S-15, An Act respecting Mid-Continent Pipelines Limited, be now read a second time.

After further debate, the question being put on the said motion, it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines. The Bill No. S-17, An Act respecting The Board of Trade of the City of Toronto, was read the second time.

By unanimous consent, Mr. Maloney, seconded by Mr. Hamilton (York West), moved,—That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself into Committee of the Whole on the said Bill.

And the question being put on the said motion, it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly considered in Committee of the Whole and reported without amendment.

By unanimous consent, the said Bill was read the third time and passed.

The hour for Private and Public Bills expired.

Debate was resumed on the proposed motion of Mr. Nowlan, seconded by Mr. Harkness,—That Bill No. C-51, An Act to amend the Customs Act, be now read a second time.

And the debate continuing;

Mr. Cardin, seconded by Mr. Bourget, moved in amendment thereto,— That all the words after "That" be struck out and the following substituted therefor:

"this House re-affirms the adherence of Canada to the spirit and objectives of GATT, which are clearly violated in provisions of this bill."

Mr. Fulton raised a point of order to the effect that the amendment was not in order since it set forth a proposition which was foreign to the motion before the House and, as such, it could only be considered on a distinct motion after notice.

#### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: The Minister of Justice (Mr. Fulton) makes the proposition that the amendment deals with a matter which is foreign to the proposition involved in the main motion. Perhaps he would like to elaborate on that. We have been referred to treaty obligations under GATT which relate to the method of valuing goods for duty purposes and that this bill deals with that same subject matter. I do not consider it as self evident, as the Minister seems to do, that this is a foreign principle. It is an adverse principle. The question is whether it is relevant as being related to the subject matter of the bill or whether it is foreign.

Then, the other point which the Minister may make is that it raises a new question and therefore requires notice. Perhaps he wishes to deal further with the question of relevancy. What he has said scarcely establishes that principle.

And debate continuing on the point of order;

MR. SPEAKER: As this is the second time today we have had to consider the relevancy of an amendment on second reading, perhaps I might take a minute to refer to the principles that should govern the House in its procedure at this time. I think there they are well stated in May, 16th edition, at page 530 referred to by the honourable Member who moved the amendment to the motion for second reading. May refers to the usual six months hoist amendment, which is one type, at some length, and I will not read that. He then goes on to the second category of amendments into which this amendment must fall if it is to be sustained and calls them reasoned amendments. He says:

It is also competent for a Member who desires to place on record any special reasons for not agreeing to the second reading of a bill, to move what is known as a "reasoned amendment". A reasoned amendment is placed on the paper in the form of a motion and may fall into one of several categories.

(1) It may be declaratory of some principle adverse to, or differing from the principles, policy, or provisions of the bill.

That is the first test, that it declares an adverse principle.

(2) It may express opinions as to any circumstances connected with the introduction or prosecution of the bill or otherwise opposed to its progress.

(3) It may seek further information in relation to the bill by committees, commissioners, the production of papers or other evidence. At page 531 the following appears:

The following rules govern the contents of reasoned amendments:

(1) The principle of relevancy in an amendment governs every such motion. The amendment must "strictly relate to the bill which the House, by its order, has resolved upon considering." . . .

(2) The amendment must not be concerned in detail with the provisions of the bill upon which it is moved, nor anticipate amendments thereto which may be moved in committee.

That is the point the Minister of National Revenue raised, that this matter might more appropriately be dealt with by amendment in committee as it relates only to certain clauses of a bill which has a broader principle. I continue the quotation:

nor is it permissible to propose merely the addition of words to the question, that the bill be now read a second time, as such words must, by implication, attach conditions to the second reading.

(3) An amendment, which amounts to no more than a direct negation of the principle of the bill, is open to objection.

On hearing what has been said and from a perusal of the bill, I would have thought it would have been possible to frame an amendment which proposed, as an adverse principle, that the bill was in contravention of the treaty obligations of Canada under GATT, subject to what the minister says about that perhaps being a matter relating to specific sections rather than to the whole principle of the bill. I would have thought that such an amendment could properly be framed within that meaning and form the subject of a debate on the principles involved, focusing attention, as it were, on that particular objection to the bill and thereby providing an opportunity for a directed and perhaps limited debate.

But I must say that this particular amendment seems to me to go about the matter from the other end. It begins by reaffirming the adherence of Canada to the spirit and objectives of GATT and that seems to me to be going outside the matter that is before us at this time. That involves a new, different and quite extensive proposition that could scarcely be entertained in a debate on the second reading of this particular bill, and as an afterthought the following words are tagged on, "which are clearly violated in the provisions of the bill." In the form in which it is presented I am of the opinion that the amendment does not meet the requirements of the practice of the House.

And the question being again proposed on the main motion,—That Bill No. C-51, An Act to amend the Customs Act, be now read a second time;

Mr. McIlraith, seconded by Mr. Bourget, moved in amendment thereto,— That all the words after "That" be struck out and the following substituted therefor:

"this House declines to proceed with a bill the fundamental terms of which are repugnant to the spirit and objectives of the treaty obligations of Canada under GATT."

#### RULING BY MR. SPEAKER

MR. SPEAKER: The point raised by the Minister of National Revenue (Mr. Nowlan) is the one that bothers me most about this amendment; that is, that this alleged conflict with GATT could be dealt with at the committee stage; but having gone through the bill, I find the only part which does not relate to value for duty are the procedural clauses and to some extent they are related to the method of appeal from valuations for duty. If the Minister or any member wishes to speak they will have to convince me that this is not so.

And a debate arising on the point of order;

MR. SPEAKER: This is the third time I have had to deal with this matter today. I will not repeat what was said previously. The first question which must be considered is relevancy. I think the Minister of Justice (Mr. Fulton), in acknowledging that it would be relevant to debate whether the clauses of this bill are in conflict with our obligations under GATT, thereby acknowledges that an amendment directed to that same purpose is relevant, because if it is relevant to debate it,—if the amendment is otherwise good—it is relevant to move an amendment declaratory of a principle to the same effect.

I am troubled by the Minister's statement that this is an argument. It is an argument; any assertion of principle would be an argument. Hence I do not think the issue should be determined on that ground at all.

Then the Minister of National Revenue rather underplays the importance of the value for duty part of this bill. In what he said I think he in effect acknowledged that it is the one substantial change in the bill.

Many changes are made but they are more or less procedural changes. They are not important changes until you come to clause 39 which is new and which is an important change. The other items are procedural. It therefore seems to me that the value for duty strikes at the basic principle of the bill. On that ground I do not think that the principle of the amendment should be deferred for consideration in committee.

It remains then to consider whether this amendment is different from the one that I ruled out earlier. The earlier amendment called on the House to adhere to its GATT obligations and opened the door to a very extended debate which might have nothing at all to do with this bill. This amendment calls on the House to refuse to read this bill the second time because its terms are repugnant to the spirit and objectives of the treaty obligations of Canada

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under GATT, thereby declaring a principle which is to my mind relevant and which is adverse to the principle of the bill. The amendment certainly is opposed to the terms of the bill in that it calls on the House to decline to proceed. To my mind it is not a mere direct negative. It meets all these tests. It seems to me that on second reading, where the House has the acknowledged right to debate the principles which are involved in the bill, it is preferable not to be too restrictive in the type of amendment which brings before the House in specific form and emphasizes the principles which are involved, the principle in this case being that the clauses of this bill may be adverse to the spirit and objectives of the treaty obligations of Canada under GATT. I therefore rule the amendment to be in order and I shall now put the question.

Your Committee began its study on the same day.

- 1. To take full advantage of the presence before the Committee of Mr. Watson Sellar.
- 2. To call and examine witnesses in relation to:
  - (a) The construction of the new Printing Bureau (Department of Public Works);
  - (b) The operation of the said Printing Bureau (Queen's Printer);
  - (c) Postage rates in newspapers and periodicals;
  - (d) The form of presentation of Public Accounts to Parliament;
  - (e) The suggested adoption of having the revenues for the Services taken into the calculations when preparing an estimate of expenditures.

This being the first occasion in the history of the Standing Committee that such action has been taken, your Committee now records that the action thus taken is not regarded as in any way limiting or impairing the interrogatory powers of the Committee, but does imply that the Committee's reports will take a form that promotes application of sound financial principles throughout the Public Service.

The House of Commons referred the Public Accounts for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1957, together with the Report of the Auditor General thereon, to your Committee for enquiry and report. By reason of the Parliamentary Session being well advanced before the Committee was organized, no exhaustive review was made of either; instead, attention was directed to selected transactions and practices, in particular, the construction of the National Printing Bureau.

#### The National Printing Bureau

For many years a brick building in the area of Nepean Point, Ottawa, was occupied by the Queen's Printer. Space necessities outgrowing its dimensions, after the war it was decided to erect a new building in Hull, the selection of the site being influenced by recommendations in the Greber Plan for the National Capital. Quoting from the General Report presented to Parliament:

The Printing Bureau, inadequately housed on Nepean Point, requires a new building adapted to its growing needs. In keeping with our proposals, a site has been acquired by the Government in Hull, on Sacred Heart Boulevard.

The plans have been prepared for this new imposing building, the construction of which will commence the gradual rehabilitation of a part of the City of Hull, which is now blighted. The building will be accessible from all sides by direct arteries—Sacred Heart Boulevard, Laurier Avenue, and a new boulevard connecting Laurier, through Reboul and Montclair, to St. Joseph Boulevard. (p. 210, General Report of M. Jacques Greber dated 1950.)

Evidence given to your Committee clearly indicates that regardless of the suitability of the site from the town planning point of view, it was an unfortunate selection: Subterranean waters, flowing near the surface, greatly increased costs of excavation and construction, and have done harm to public confidence in administrative competence. Your Committee would have expected that, as soon as the situation became self-evident, those responsible for the erection of the project would have advised that a new site be selected. This not being done, costs increased to a disconcerting degree.

The matter of control of cost is of importance whenever, as in this instance, the project is to serve the needs of a department and also to improve, and to encourage others to improve, the architectural amenities of Hull. Evidence given indicates that administrative action was not of a nature as to make certain that the public interest was continuously protected in the financial sense. \$15,169,517 had been expended on this project to March 31, 1957. A relatively small amount has been spent in the fiscal year 1957-58 and it is observed that the Estimates now before the House of Commons include \$800,000 for "improvements" to the National Printing Bureau.

It seems reasonable to assume that in the future there will be other monumental edifices erected to embellish the National Capital. Accordingly, your Committee is strongly of opinion that no such projects should be undertaken until plans are sufficiently developed to permit reasonable approximations of cost to be given to the House of Commons when the Estimates first include an item to provide for construction.

It was also observed in the review of the Public Accounts that in three fiscal years amounts detailed in the Estimates for the Printing Bureau were exceeded: in 1952 the sum listed was \$1,300,000 but actual expenditures amounted to \$1,691,563; in 1954 the amount stated in the Estimates was \$2,750,000 but recorded expenditures amounted to \$5,208,386, and in 1957 the amount listed was \$400,000 with actual expenditures \$802,945. Annual Appropriation Acts have, since 1951, provided that the amount which may be spent on any listed public building, harbour or river work under the Minister of Public Works is the amount listed in the details of the Estimates "provided that Treasury Board may increase or decrease the amount within the vote to be expended on individual listed projects". While it is the exclusive constitutional right of the Crown to recommend appropriations to the House of Commons, your Committee entertains strong doubts as to either the desirability or propriety of Parliament also subordinating appropriating powers to the convenience of the Executive. In view of the fact that this practice has been in effect only since 1951 and is considered necessary for the needs of the Department of Public Works only, it would seem that the Department of Public Works could organize in such a way that it operates efficiently without any constitutional concession by Parliament.

# Agreements with Architects

Established practice is to enter into agreements with practising professional men to prepare plans and specifications and to supervise construction whenever a department has a works project and decides to retain architects and/or engineers to design and supervise. Your Committee understands that no invariable percentage rate is used but, generally, agreements with respect to the construction of buildings provide that the architect will receive 5% of construction cost. Whether 5% is invariably a reasonable rate is a matter of opinion and is a subject which might usefully be explored, but for immediate purposes the point of concern is the propriety of entering into agreements so worded that it is to the financial advantage of the architect that planning be grandiose and assent automatic to extras and additions, etc. Since a Minister, or the Cabinet, has little or no direct association with the project under construction, a heavy public responsibility rests on the architect. Your Committee is of opinion that contract terms should be the subject of exhaustive review between the professions and all departments contracting for professional services in order to make certain that in future the basis of agreement is such as will ensure that the public interest is ever paramount.

#### Second Class Mail

The rates for mailing of newspapers and periodicals are fixed by Parliament, section 11 of the Post Office Act being the pertinent section. The attention of the Committee was drawn to the probability that the cost to Post Office in handling this class of mail may have exceeded \$24,000,000 in 1957 while the revenues approximated \$6,000,000. This heavy deficit incurred in second class mail is likely to increase in future years. Your Committee accepts with reservation these financial statistics provided by Post Office and trusts that its costing programme now in progress will be both more comprehensive and informative than that followed in 1955-56.

In his report on 1956-57 accounts, the Auditor General points to anomalies in current application of section 11 of the Post Office Act because of changes that have since taken place in publishing practices and in the fields of distribution and communication, such as new types of publications, new arrangements with respect to places of publications and the growth of magazines where the recipients are members of associations rather than subscribers.

#### The Public Accounts

The Public Accounts and the Auditor General's Report were referred to this Committee for enquiry and report. The blue book, "Public Accounts of Canada", for the year ended March 31, 1957, presently under review, weighs five pounds, and while it may be of great utility as a reference source, it seems to be now overly voluminous for the requirements of this Committee. It is also noted that although the fiscal year ended on March 31, 1957, the Accounts were not tabled in the House of Commons until January 15, 1958, despite the fact that the Session commenced on October 14, 1957. Your Committee is informed that the cost of printing was \$52,600.

The Financial Administration Act requires that the Minister of Finance settle the 'form' of the Public Accounts, but long-established practice is that the book, especially the degree of particularization, be periodically discussed with the Public Accounts Committee. There has been no conference on the subject for several years, therefore it is suggested that the attention of the Minister of Finance be drawn to submissions recently made to this Committee, together with associated comments by Committee members, to the end that ministerial proposals for improving the Public Accounts may be considered when this Standing Committee is again organized.

### Treatment of Service Receipts

Since the war the nature and scope of public spending have changed materially in that now many projects are highly technical, troublesome to assess and in value large sums. These making major demands on parliamentarians' time, a risk now is that examinations of estimates items will more and more be limited to those showing increases with the possibilities of economies in those that are static to a large extent ignored. A.D. 1958

The Committee started but did not have opportunity to make an exhaustive review of current practices in computing vote amounts. Specifically, the problem is: whether the total of a vote providing for the performance of revenue services should be the net or gross amount; whether Parliament should vote all or only that part which will not be recovered by service charges. Obviously the latter will make departments more revenue-minded, although your Committee takes notice of possible administrative problems.

Practice in some countries and provinces takes one form and in others the opposite. Your Committee therefore maintains an open mind but is of opinion that the subject should be thoroughly explored because ever-expanding public activities correspondingly add to the responsibilities resting on Parliament when voting Supply. It is recommended that the Minister of Finance cause a review to be made of vote structures to provide for the needs of two servicing departments with some distinguishing characteristics in services provided in return for fees or charges-for example, the departments of Veterans Affairs and Secretary of State. It being a fact-finding study of administrative and parliamentary needs, it would be desirable were an officer of the Auditor General to participate.

# "MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

"The Commons of Canada have approved certain expenditures for the public service, and the application of certain amounts in the accounts of the year ended March 31, 1958.

"The Commons also have voted Supplies required to enable the Government to defray certain expenses for the public service of the year ending March 31, 1959.

"In the name of the Commons I present to Your Honour the following Bills:

'An Act for approving certain expenditures authorized for the public service, and the application of certain amounts in the accounts, of the financial year ended the 31st March, 1958.'

'An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending the 31st March, 1959.'

"To which Bills I humbly request Your Honour's Assent."

The Clerk of the Senate, by Command of the Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General, did say:

"In Her Majesty's name, the Honourable the Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to these Bills."

After which, the Honourable the Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the First Session of the Twenty-fourth Parliament with the following Speech:

#### Honourable Members of the Senate:

#### Members of the House of Commons:

The Twenty-fourth Parliament has commenced with a most active and noteworthy session.

We have been glad to welcome this summer Her Royal Highness the Princess Margaret on her visit to Canada. We look forward with great pleasure to the presence in Canada next year of Her Gracious Majesty the Queen on the occasion of the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway.

During this present session you have welcomed and heard in Parliament the President of the United States, the President of the Federal Republic of Germany, the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom and the Prime Minister of Ghana. These visits have provided a valuable and timely opportunity for discussions of problems of mutual interest and for an exchange of impressions on broader issues.

My Government has been encouraged by indications of progress during the last few months in the field of disarmament and by recent developments in the Middle East situation but the general outlook remains uncertain and in particular, the current tension in the Far East is a source of deep concern.

My Government took an active role at the emergency special session of the General Assembly of the United Nations in promoting measures that would serve as a basis for a comprehensive effort to reduce tension and improve conditions in the Middle Eastern area.

My Ministers have welcomed the announcement by the United States and United Kingdom Governments of their readiness to suspend tests of nuclear weapons for one year while negotiations for a political agreement take place; they hope that as a result there will emerge an effective agreement among the nuclear powers continuing the suspension of testing under effective international supervision. The prospect of further technical talks to examine possible safeguards against surprise attack gives ground for hope of additional progress in this important field of disarmament.

My Ministers welcome the approval you have given to the important agreement for the integration of the air defence of North America. Measures are being worked out to ensure that such defence is maintained on an efficient and economical basis consistent with the rapid technical changes in this field. Furthermore, arrangements have been initiated for closer consultation by Ministers with members of the United States Administration in the field of defence policy.

Your support of programmes to provide practical assistance to the peoples of the less developed regions of the world through the medium of the United Nations, under the Colombo Plan and under special arrangements for the West Indies and Ghana has been further evidence of the desire of Canadians to participate in international programmes of economic as well as humanitarian importance.

You have had laid before you a report on the International Conference on the Law of the Sea held in Geneva early this year and the five Conventions agreed upon by that Conference. My Ministers will support the early convening of a second International Conference on the Law of the Sea to deal with the important questions left unsettled at Geneva.

My Government has been gratified to observe the improvement in the general economic conditions in Canada. It will continue its efforts to increase employment and ameliorate the condition of those temporarily unable to find work.

During the present session you have enacted measures of major benefit to the people of Canada.

You have authorized an increase in the public funds made available under the National Housing Act to ensure the further progress of our housing programme.

You extended for a further six weeks during this year the period during which seasonal benefits were paid under the Unemployment Insurance Act.

You have provided for increases in the pensions of former members of the Civil Service, the Armed Forces and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

You have reviewed and improved the Veterans Insurance Act, the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act and the Children of War Dead (Education Assistance) Act, and increased the benefits payable thereunder.

As a further interim measure to meet the needs of the grain producers in the Prairie Provinces, pending the working out of long term measures, you have provided an acreage payment to such producers. The Prairie Grain Advance Payments Act has been revised in the light of experience in its operation. The benefits of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act have been extended to an increased number of farmers. The lending power of the Canadian Farm Loan Board has been enlarged. The Canada Agricultural Products Standards Act has been amended, and the amounts payable under the Animal Contagious Diseases Act have been increased.

You have approved the necessary arrangements with the Government of Saskatchewan for carrying out the South Saskatchewan Project and provided for the immediate commencement of construction of the main dam in this important undertaking.

You have made provision for the establishment of an office to assist small business in Canada.

You have provided a needed increase in the support furnished by Parliament for the universities of Canada.

The Hospital Insurance and Diagnostic Services Act has been amended to set a definite and earlier date for the commencement of the payments authorized by it.

You have completely revised the legislation relating to taxes on estates, making it more equitable and practical as well as alleviating the burden on smaller estates. You have revised the Income Tax Act, and increased the exemptions from sales tax under the Excise Tax Act.

The National Capital Act which you have passed will make possible the more effective continuation of the long term development and improvement of the National Capital and its immediate environs.

You have passed an important Act to provide for the regulation of broadcasting in Canada and to ensure the continued operation of a national broadcasting system that will furnish a varied and comprehensive service of a high standard that is Canadian in content and character.

In the Parole Act you have created an orderly and permanent basis for the reform and rehabilitation of those confined to penitentiaries and their integration into society as useful citizens.

There has been placed before you a Bill of Rights for the recognition and protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms in Canada coming within the jurisdiction of Parliament. There will now be an opportunity for this measure to receive careful study before action on it is finally taken by Parliament.

Other measures enacted at this session include Acts to approve the income tax conventions with Belgium and the Belgian Congo, the Canadian National Railways Financing and Guarantee Act, the British Columbia Coast Steamship Service Act, an Act to incorporate the Lakehead Harbour Commissioners and an Act to authorize the construction of a bridge between Campobello Island and Maine. You have also amended the Railway Act, the Indian Act, the Criminal Code, the Penitentiary Act, the Lake of the Woods Control Board Act, the Loan Companies Act, the Trust Companies Act, the Maritime Coal Production Assistance Act, the Emergency Gold Mining Assistance Act, the Customs Tariff, the Customs Act, the Judges Act, the Financial Administration Act, the Yukon Act and the National Parks Act.

#### Members of the House of Commons:

My Ministers welcome the approval you have given for the operation of a simultaneous translation system in the House of Commons.

Your Committees have been more active than for many years past and show promise of contributing to the greater effectiveness of Parliament in the future.

I thank you for the provision you have made for all the essential public services and payments in the current fiscal year and in addition for the approval granted for the payments made under special warrants last year.
