

ONE CENT

French Cabinet Receives Its First Check After Turbulent Scene in Chamber.

COULD NOT TOLERATE SITUATION

Premier Dependent Upon Opposition Groups-is Sustained by Large

Vote, Paris, Nov. 10.-The Rouvier ministry met with its first check to-day when M. Berteaux, minister of war, peremptorily withdrew from the ministerial benches during an angry debate in the chamber of deputies, and thereafter announced his resignation. For a time the entire cabinet hung in the balance, and Premier Rouvier anhis colleagues to give up power until they were supported by a substantial majority. After a debate of exceptional violence a motion favorable to the ministry prevailed by a vote of

210 to 147. However, the ministerial majority is made up of fractions of divergent groups, and the future of the cabinet

remains in doubt. The premier later went to the Elysee Palace and requested President Loubet to call a special cabinet council tomorrow at which M. Berteaux's successor will be decided upon, and at which also a further rearrangement of the cabinet will be considered. M. Etienne, now minister of the interior, is mentioned as the most probable successor to M. Berteaux, M. Thomson, minister of marine, succeeding M. Etienne. Generals Langlois and Brun also are mentioned for the war portalso are mentioned for the war portfolio, but the Socialists threaten not to support the ministry if a general be chosen head of the war office.

M. Berteaux to-night said his resignation was not intended to embarrass the ministry, but that he was unable to teleste the humiliating position of to tolerate the humiliating position of the ministry in being dependent upon the opposition groups in the chamber.

The crisis does not involve any important issue, but results from the breaking up of the groups of which the ministry has heretofore relied.

Mayor Urquhart Submits to Board of Control Conditions for Company's Acceptance.

City must have power to act with street railway in stipulating that any other company applying for future running rights must consent to an expiration of the same in 1921.
City would not exact a percentage of receipts for a term of years, to be stated later, but would require returns showing amount of traffic.
The new tracks must be of standard gauge of 4 feet 8 1-2 inches.
Where present stretches of track are to be used, a third rail is to be laid down. This would mean a third rail system on Bloor-street from Christie-street to Clinton-street, on Queen-street from Kingston-road to Eastern-avenue, and on Front-st.
Passenger rates to be same as those on the city lines, and the city to get like percentage of profits.
Company to pay city \$800 for single track per annum per mile, and \$1600 for double tracks.
Adelaide-street line to be built if wanted by the city.
Company to bear cost of crossing protection.

Station grounds to be allowed within the city limits.

Several months ago the negotiations etween the city and the York Radial Railway Company for an entrance of the radials into the city were broken off, a deadlock having been reached. The mayor has been known to have been engaged since then in drawing up a new set of conditions, and yesterday at the meeting of the poard of control he presented a draft of an agreement into which he thinks the city should

into which he thinks the city should be prepared to enter.

The plan, in a nutshell, is for two radial lines to converge at St. Lawrence Market, one coming from the eastern and the other from the northwestern portion of the city. The former is planned to begin on Queen-street at the Kingston-road point, and the route would be via Eastern-avenue, Trinity-street and Front-street to the market. Starting from the head of Christie-street, the other line would come down to Bloor-street, going down Clinton-street to Mansheld-avenue, and thence down Claremont-street to Queen thence down Claremont-street to Queen street, and by way of Niagara, Bathurst and Front-streets to the market. It is required that the city have dealings only with the Street Railway Company, and the compact to be made would provide that the company lay the new lines on the conditions imposed under the present agreement, while passenger cars were to be run

on the tracks.

Must Expire in 1921. The mayor showed that he had an eye on possible future complications that when the company's present fran-chise expires in 1921 the city have the right also to take over the new lines, on the same terms as the remainder of the property, while the city shall have the right, with the company, to make such an agreement with any other company whose cars may, under any future compact, use the lines. The city would be willing to make the concession that for a term of years, to be stated later, no percentage on freight traffic receipts would be col-lected.
